However, he recovered sufficiently to return to

the United States for medical treatment, after which he started on the long trail to Lhasa, the city of priests and the last unconquered heathen stronghold. Mrs. Jennings related this week. Before reaching that place, he was shot by bandits and buried on the Tibetan road.

Mrs. Shelton, Miss Doris Shelton and a sister, were with Dr. Shelton at the time of his capture but made their escape. They, too, suffered many hardships in Tibet and Miss Shelton is to relate some of her experiences while she is here, Mrs. Jennings said today.

Solon Urges Speed In Flood Control

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—When a senator starts talking no big short of sudden death can be heard, Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, the democratic leader, told a House speed up flood control legislation.

"The legislation should be rushed to the senate, he said, so that a member of that body with a 'stutter, deaf ear and loud voice' could indefinitely delay its enactment."

Under House rules debate must be limited, the senator explained. Senate rules permit unlimited discussion. He wants the Senate to get an early start.

Senator Robinson submitted a bill, calling for an expenditure of \$100,000,000 annually, for flood protection projects.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 30.—Ace Hudkins of Nebraska unleashed his "wild cat" tactics against Herman Auerbach here last night and won by a technical knockout when the youthful Salt Lake boxer came up for the fifth round. The bout was scheduled to go ten rounds.

The Nebraska got well under way by the second round, and several times staggered Auerbach with powerful right and left hand slashes to the chin. With the savage attack that is typical of Hudkins at his best, the "wild cat" leaped upon the Russian in the fourth and in two smashing blows, a right to the chin, followed by a left to the same spot, he had Auerbach on the canvas, completely out. The bell saved Auerbach.

Auerbach was carried to his corner where his seconds worked frantically over him, but the fifth round found him unable to renew the fight.

COUNTERFEIT OLD VIOLINS INTO EUROPE
NEW YORK—A flood of counterfeit Stradivarius violins has swept down upon the European music centers. But only inexperienced buyers are being victimized for all the existing instruments made by the old masters are carefully inspected and records of their sales are carefully kept.

Before the war, musicians say, the spurious Strads were made in certain villages of Germany. An American in Paris has a collection of these instruments, all artificially aged. But the ones appearing on the markets now are made in Japan, and are so cleverly done that the eye cannot detect the deception.

The fake instruments are made of ancient wood taken from buildings or bridges. When they are offered for sale they always have some plausible history back of them. But the experienced musician can tell by the tonal quality that they are imitations.

To May's Landing and the country round about Mrs. Lillendahl is a stranger. This downy, old-fashioned lower Jersey town is made up of people who seem not exactly hostile to her, but certainly not at all excited over her predicament.

Mrs. Lillendahl lived in this vicinity only a little more than a year prior to her arrest, and she is not the sort of person who makes friends quickly.

The Tower of Strength—Her Lawyer

Robert H. McCarter, outstanding New Jersey lawyer who defended Mrs. Frances Hall at Somerville, is about the only tower of strength on Mrs. Lillendahl's side so far as personalities go. He is her chief counsel—and in any part of New Jersey, having a McCarter as counsel means much.

There remains a good deal of mystery about Willis Beach. He is a curious character. One moment since investigation of the murder started he has been the boaster—no suspicion possibly could attach to him. Then he has been the fugitive, hiding while the grand jury deliberated. Then, more recently, he has been reported the victim of heart attacks and a probable casualty if subjected to the stress of an open trial.

The Beach Clan is Staunch and Loyal
Beach has plenty of friends. His brother Roy Beach is one of May's Landing's most substantial citizens. The Beach clan, including Beach's wife and grown-up children, all are staunch and loyal.

It was at Vineland, some 26 miles away from Willis Beach and the Lillendahys—lived.

Vineland is a center of the chicken industry. Along the spur of road where the doctor and Mrs. Lillendahl resided are many prosperous, middle class homes, including Beach's.

"Yes I knew her, but not well," a neighbor will tell you, very conservatively. "She often went riding with the doctor. They took long drives together. No, I never heard of any scandal between her and Willis Beach."

But there is one who is more loquacious—Mrs. William Tamberlain, the postmistress of South Vineland, who received and delivered the "Peggy Anderson" letters, sometimes as many as three a day.

"She was always dolled up in gay colors, with her skirts getting shorter and shorter till they got to her knees," was her comment on Mrs. Lillendahl. Mrs. Tamberlain's own gingham skirts almost concealed her ankles.

The Doctor Talked About Adenoids
"I never knew she was the doctor's wife. He used to come in here for ice cream—fine old man who told me I ought to have my child's adenoids taken out. He asked me about his wife, but I never connected her with this gay creature who used to meet Beach here day after

day an dsl for hours with him out in front in an automobile."

But it was another Mrs. Lillendahl who appeared in court asking bail, following her indictment. Here was a stern, frowning woman in a long black velvet coat, a black hat and a black veil, all a bit shabby but uncompromising.

Mrs. Lillendahl comes from American revolution lineage, but the events of her life seem to have been not in the least colorful or romantic up to the time Dr. Lillendahl was slain.

After finishing convent, she spent years caring for a brother who died later. Her marriage was comparatively late, 34, to a man thirty years her senior. There is nothing to suggest that she has had a happy and carefree life, and much to suggest that she learned to repress and to build up defenses all along the way.

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VAUGHN ASKS PUBLIC AID IN MAIL SERVICE

PREPARATIONS GO ON AT POSTOFFICE FOR CHRISTMAS RUSH

Anticipating the advent of the busiest season the office has ever experienced, Postmaster John L. Vaughn is continuing his preparations for efficient mail service during the Christmas holidays for the patrons of Lubbock and his plans contain a number of improvements for the public. It was learned at the office this morning.

"The efficiency of our mail service depends upon the co-operation of the public," Mr. Vaughn said, "and this is a thing which we will need most in the coming weeks. He is attempting to get the merchants and organizations as well as the citizens of the city to mail their greeting cards early so that they may be handled easier. If the cards are mailed now, Mr. Vaughn points out, the clerk can accept them and pre-sort them to be held and sent on December 21, allowing plenty of time for them to reach their destination by Christmas Day."

Installing System.
Included in Mr. Vaughn's plans for efficient service is a parcel disposal system which he is installing in the office this week. The system calls for the use of numbers on the parcels and on the notice slips sent to the patrons. When an individual calls for a parcel, instead of looking for a name, the clerk can easily find it by a number which will correspond with the one on the slip. This will eliminate the shuffling of parcels so bothersome during the rush season. The success of this system depends upon the presentation of the slips by the patrons.

the success of advertising standpoint. Nine years ago St. Louis spent \$50,000 advertising itself as a jobbing center and since that time has run its expenditures along the same line to about \$300,000, showing a remarkable growth in its jobbing business and population.

Through a similar campaign, Mr. Roney stated, Detroit also benefited itself, showing a gain in business and population with St. Louis during a period of depression which admittedly caused a slump in Chicago, Pittsburgh and Boston, which cities, he said, are now planning advertising campaigns similar to those of Detroit and St. Louis.

Atlanta Is An Example

Atlanta, which according to the speaker is the best example of what concrete advertising will do for a community, was the next city mentioned. He told how a psychological depression struck Atlanta and how the Board of City Development rose up to hold the exodus of its citizens to Florida and other points. Through the plan of \$1 per capita Atlanta raised \$250,000 for advertising in 1925-26 and that campaign showed an income of 169 new industries and a payroll increase of more than \$2,000,000, he said. Since the success of its initial campaign Atlanta has set about raising \$1,000,000 for advertising over the period of the next three years.

Community advertising in Oregon, Florida and other sections were next touched upon, followed by the speaker's assertion that the eyes of the nation are now upon Texas. The Rio Grande Valley and East Texas have begun advertising their sections along with the cities of Galveston and San Antonio, he said. Corpus Christi, Dallas and Fort Worth are also laying their plans to advertise to assure their cities of a part of the growth which seems to be heading toward this state.

Sees Advantages Here

Mr. Roney next touched upon the advantages of the South Plains and of Lubbock, the natural hub of the territory. He told of his surprise at the growth of the territory upon reaching the cap-rock this time, on his first visit in four years. He pointed out that 2,500,000 acres of land in the South Plains have been settled and broken in the past few years and that there are

still 6,000,000 acres lying in wait for the plow. He closed his talk by saying that in his opinion an advertising campaign will bring a 15 year growth of population to the South Plains in a five year period.

Prior to the meeting Rev. E. L. Widdon, representing the Salvation Army, told of the drive which his organization will open here tomorrow. EXPENSES FOR TAX REDUCTION SESSION GIVEN

KIRBY SAYS TOTAL IS \$12,160 GIVEN BY MANY INDIVIDUALS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Expenses of the convention held here by the national council of state legislatures at the time representatives of the organization advocated repeal of the federal inheritance tax before the house ways and means committee were announced today as totalling \$12,160.

John Henry Kirby, president, in a letter to members of the organization said the money used to defray expenses had been contributed by individuals, state officials and commercial organizations.

Probe Threatened
During the recent tax hearings representatives of the legislative council were questioned closely by a number of committee members as to the source of their expense money and Representative Rainey, democrat, Illinois, threatened to initiate a congressional investigation.

ing the convention and that he felt members of the legislative council should be acquainted with the facts. He said that the expenses of the convention, amounting to \$12,160 did not include those delegates whose expense had been paid by states they officially represented or by state organization in their respective states.

"Every state in the union is represented in the list of contributors to the funds used in defraying the expenses of the convention at which the national council of state legislatures was established on a permanent basis," he said.

Thousands Contributors
"More than one thousand individual contributors averaging \$10 each made up the bulk of the sum. Among the contributors were a number of governors, speakers of the house of representatives and presidents of the senate in various states. The list of contributors also shows that about fifty commercial organizations took part in the movement."

At the time of the committee tax hearings Mr. Rainey and Representative Garner of Texas, ranking democrat on the committee, charged that part of the legislative council's funds had been obtained from the American Tax Payers' league, which they contended, received financial support from corporations seeking repeal of the inheritance levy for selfish purposes.

RAILS BUILDS AUDITORIUM AS CIVIC CENTER

STRUCTURE WILL COST \$15,000 AND SERVE GENERAL PURPOSE

RAILS, Nov. 30.—At the time of the building of the new Ralls high school in 1925 the citizenship of the district felt that the addition of an auditorium and gymnasium to the structure would too much increase the taxes of the Ralls school district. Therefore the building of the same was left off. But since that time the demand has grown for such a structure that the people of Ralls have gotten busy on the project of building a combined municipal auditorium and gymnasium to serve the needs of the community.

Need Basketball Court
It will be remembered that last year the Ralls Jackrabbits were defeated in basketball only by the state champions. The Athens champions themselves said that the Jackrabbits could not have been defeated by any team in the state had they had an indoor court on which to practice during the season. This year the Jackrabbits have already had letters from El Paso and Athens asking them to games in Ralls this coming season. Many other good teams in the state are also desirous of playing the Jackrabbits. The Ralls people are determined to give the boys a real chance this year under the leadership of the same coach, Frankie Lovren.

The need for such a building is again felt when the local school of those of the Ralls trade carry wish to stage a play. All other public gatherings are compelled to seek unsuitable quarters for their meeting place.

Would Cost \$15,000
This building when completed will aggregate a cost of over \$15,000. The walls and roof will be of tile. The building will be ninety feet wide and one hundred and ten feet long. The main playing court will have a span of fifty feet, the same being twenty-two feet in height. A stage with an opening of twenty-eight feet and a depth of fifteen feet will be built in the east end of the building. The floor will have a four inch concrete base, ship-lap over the concrete and hard wood over the first floor. The seating capacity will be over 2000 people. The building is to be constructed in the center of the present city park, the same having been donated to the public by the father of Ralls, Mr. John R. Ralls, and will face the main business section of Ralls. The building was made possible by the formation of a stock company. The stock was placed at \$10 per share and one privileged to purchase as much as he pleased. Already practically enough stock has been subscribed to erect the building.

Plan Accepted
Tuesday plans for the building were accepted by the building committee and a contractor employed to supervise the work. Mr. Ruffe of the city of Ralls is to oversee the construction. Completion is expected not later than the middle of January.

When the building is complete, Ralls will not be ashamed to welcome to her midst the district convention of the West Texas chamber of commerce, the Baptist con-

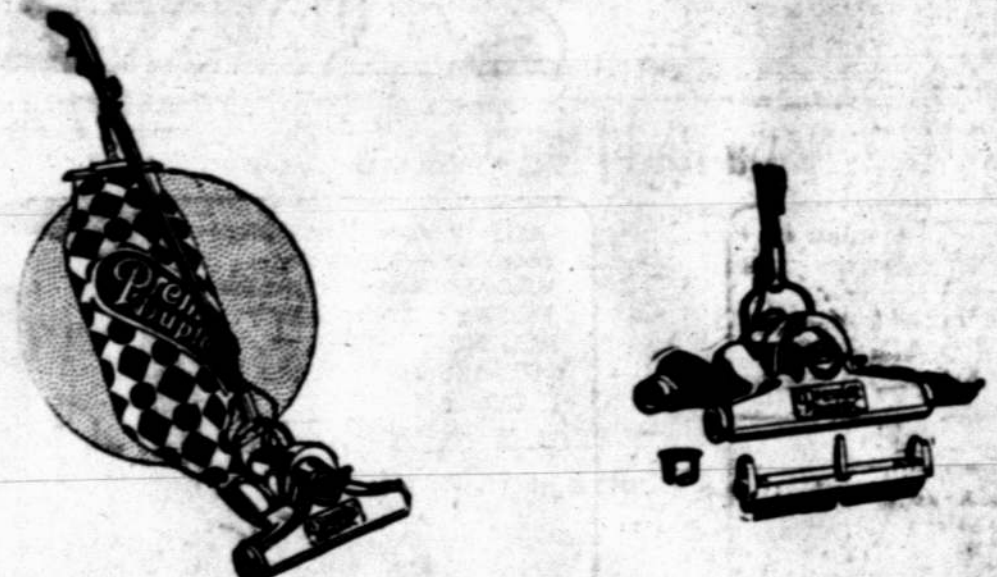

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Prosperity
Has the business cycle been abolished, or will we have a periodic repetition of old-fashioned "hard times"?

Here is the opinion of Herbert Hoover, as given in an interview just printed in the Magazine of Wall Street:

"I can say that I believe that the profound forces which have been in motion in the whole business world, particularly during the past 15 years are making for greater stability, and have, in my view, greatly mitigated the violence of the business cycle."

"It seems impossible that the old terror-stricken panic can ever return, and I fervently hope that these periodic stretches of heart-breaking unemployment, bankruptcies to business men through no fault of their own, are on their way to history if we only continue wise."

"Many factors contribute to this hope. The Federal Reserve System has already proved its ability to guarantee against money panics. It gives a large measure of assurance of continuous flow of credit. Businessmen have today larger working capitals of their own. A less proportion of inventories carried on bank loans. All this contributes to freedom from interruption of production and distribution through accidental or artificial restriction of credit."

"One of the supposed broader causes of the business cycle is that in the years from a slump, increased employment brought larger savings and profits, that these savings and profits sought employment in expansion of industry which in time brought about over-expansion and over-production, thence the slump again. One might conceive this to be true if the variety of business was limited and if increased production did not bring about decreased costs and consequent wider consumption. If all savings had to be poured back into expansion of the industries from which they were derived, and if there were no expansion in demand for their products, this would probably be true."

"If, on the other hand, the demand for capital was for new industry, such as was recently the case in automobiles, and still is for electrical power and apparatus, foreign loans, better homes, processes of production in old industries, then this mechanistic theory would be less applicable. This is to a great extent taking place. We have an increasing skill in business and technical direction, in scientific discovery and invention due to the enormous spread of education. Thus we have new fields for investment in new products meeting new satisfaction."

"We have a large growth of co-operative sense in business—an increased feeling of mutual responsibility and an undoubted decrease in wasteful labor conflicts. Our foreign trade has greatly expanded, thus giving a wider base to production and a greater variety and spread of customers. We have shifted our merchandising methods degree from advance orders to hand-to-mouth buying—making for less inventories and thus less hazards in price movements."

"Finally, we have enormously improved our private and governmental information services as to economic movements. We now have a lot of useful statistical and economic light thrown by which many of the business becomes more secure. We also have some new safeguards in business which, I believe, are really of minor importance that may work against these stabilizing forces."

"That all these stabilizing forces amount to abolition of the business cycle no one would say, for some part of that movement is due to the imperishable—politics, international relations, fear, optimism, etc. Certainly we have had an unprecedentedly long period of stability—and the fundamental forces of stability are growing. In any event, none of the signs point to a slump at the present time."

With another presidential election coming on, Hoover's confidence as to the future seems reasonable.

Two grid stars by the name of "Smith" have been given places on the 1297 "All American football team" so it seems that this year, anyway, the selection at least includes two Americans.

But seriously speaking, what is this America of ours? Who are the real Americans? What are the real American names? Here and now we must admit that whether we like to believe it or not, this America of ours is an international melting pot; the real Americans are those who best radiate our beliefs and characteristics and there are no names which can truthfully be catcalled as typically American.

The Plainsman knows of no better proof than the same "All-American football team." Let look's it over and see what we find. We find the names Oosterbaan and Jostling—which are Swedish, Danish or Norwegian, certainly Nordic to the core. We find the name Paakowski, probably Polish, but not Slav in its extraction. We find Cagle, an Irishman, Charlesworth, evidently of English extraction, and Drury, in whose veins courses the blood of a family once-time French, also listed as being the best football players in their respective positions, of which the nation boasts.

All this means that in this America of ours in this great American game, which is just as much ours as the Star Spangled Banner, it is not necessary to boast of a Mayflower family to be accepted.

If athletes who bear names not smacking of Cape Cod are able to shine in an American game why won't the same situation hold good in business, in professions and in traditions just as peculiar to America as football? The Plainsman believes it will.

There are a lot of us Americans, whose ancestors on one side of the family tree or the other, date back to Pilgrim days, who may resent the invasion of those not quite so acceptable in the light of our self-satisfied ideal of the "Anglo-Saxon supremacy." But whether we fall into that category or not, we must admit that in America, above all other lands, "the race is to the swift and to the victor," belongs the spoils, whether his name be Smith, McGinty, Levinsky, Swenson or Loderick.

Just as "All the world loves a lover" all America loves a winner and no matter whether the victory lies upon the athletic field or in more staid lines of endeavor, the winner, despite his ancestry, will cash in on glory and also, perhaps good, hard American dollars.

If the sons and daughters of Abraham Levinsky, late of Petrograd, are more apt, quicker, more successful than those of the sons and daughters of John Smith and John Alden, then it is not through any fault of the ancestry of Abraham Levinsky. We should be glad that Abraham's children are here along with those of Mike Murphy, Ole Swenson and John Adams so that the future generations, which will likely encompass all the nationalities mentioned, may also embrace the business judgment of the Levinskys, the aggressiveness of the Murphys, the solidity of the Swensons and the conservatism and high ideal of the Adamses. If it takes a great deal of experimenting and the blending of essentials to make a new triumph in chemistry why isn't it just as logical to wonder if the same system might not be just as necessary and, in the end just as successful in the moulding of national characteristics? At any rate, these new forces of ancestry are upon us; the necessity of assimilation faces us as never before. Whether we enjoy seeing the ultimate passing of what was once considered the "typical American" or not we are going to observe just that and those of us who are the most "set apart" the change might just as well make the best of it.

Statesmen Do Say Things When "They're Not Talking For Publication" Dutcher Reveals From Washington

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—When a statesman makes a speech or talks for the newspapers, he is apt to be something of a bore.

But when he talks "not for publication," he is likely to have something interesting to say. The reason for that is that the statesman—or politician, if you prefer—knows full well that if he speaks his mind, he is likely to offend someone or express what may be deemed a half-baked idea. He always has one eye on the voters or the houses or financial backers on whom his career may depend, and when he says something any of them are likely to hear or read, he chooses his words very carefully.

The situation causes some of them to become apparent victims of repression. Your correspondent, who originally arrived in the capital weighted down by great awe, somehow became hep to the fact that they must say anything for publication. Those tactics seem to put some of them at ease. Others, who feel that their views seldom receive proper newspaper attention, are disappointed.

Still others, perhaps the most important ones, seem glad to take the opportunity to get something off their chests. Thus, one is able to pass along ideas and facts of interest without quoting anyone, the only drawback being that if they were attributed to the actual source they would often be good for eight-column headlines on Page One.

For instance, an outstanding leader of the Democratic party who often has been suggested for the presidency, unburdened himself the other evening of certain beliefs which, publicly expressed, would cause him to be cursed and damned by Democrats wherever they are to be found.

"Our political set-up," said he, "is based on silly, artificial lines. It is a Republican party which we have men on our side of the Senate who are no more Democrats than Coolidge and Republicans on the other side who are no more Republicans than I am."

"The only thing that keeps the Republican party dominant is the fact that we have a solid south. The north has been warned against putting the south in the saddle, and enough of it votes that way to elect Harding and Coolidge."

"The only solution I see is to break up the solid south and the best way to do that is to nominate Al Smith. I admire Smith, but he would take a terrible licking."

"Smith wouldn't carry one single southern state except Louisiana. The more states he carried elsewhere, the better for the party, but he couldn't win."

"Then, with the south an open field, we would have a national party. There wouldn't be many more of these fearful handshakes. The more states he carried in nearly every state, I don't see any other way out for us, because except in case of a terrific depression we're already licked in 1928."

The speaker, incidentally, was a Southerner. One may agree with him about the meaningless nature of the present political lineup, but his views regarding Smith's acceptability in the south are extreme. There are many other southern

PUBLICITY IS BEST
Publicity in public affairs is attracting the attention of the people at this time, possibly more than for several years. Cities where the officials have been causing before appearing before the public to pass upon measures have come to the conclusion that it were better to come out in the open and discuss city affairs so the people will know exactly what is going on. The same is true in the work of chambers of commerce, and especially so where the chambers are the more successful. At Wichita Falls all work originates at a public luncheon, where the subject matter is brought up and discussed and if the members present decide that it would possibly be a good thing for the community, the board of directors are instructed to proceed in the matter. But, too, often the exact reverse is the rule. The board of directors meet behind closed doors, discuss matters before them an decide what will be done by the organization, even if their action does not suit the great majority of the members. This is leading to trouble in these organizations, as under that rule and usage three or four men control the organization and force through the ideas of their own instead of the chamber of commerce. It is time that more publicity be given to all matters coming before our governing bodies and before our commercial organizations. In fact too much publicity cannot be given upon any question that is to come before the people—Childrens Index.

The people should know, and have a say in what is being done, to a very large extent. It is usually best that the smaller groups work out the details because they are usually men or women who are in closer touch with the situation, and can handle the situation with less delay.

We are of the opinion that the general public should be kept well informed regarding the actions of all official bodies. The country, the city, the schools etc. We elect men to take the lead and act in an official way, and this we believe should know what they have done, and are contemplating doing. We believe this will be more generally satisfactory than to pick along, and have the guessing and getting hold of wild rumors that are the result of some "leak" from behind the door.

People are going to talk, and if they know the truth, and get the matters straight from the shoulder they will not have the forty and one different stories about what is going on, and this we believe will keep down a great deal of misunderstanding.

When Winston Churchill, firing at H. G. Wells, asserts that "it is indescribably mean to tell an untruth to cage a few paltry voters," he seems to indicate that some British politicians are as hypocritical as our own, and you can take that either way.

FORD ANNOUNCES SPECIFICATIONS OF HIS NEW CAR; MODERN FEATURES ARE OUTSTANDING, SAYS AUTOMOBILE KING

After six months of "saying nothing but saying wood," Henry Ford today announced the specifications of the new Ford car which succeeds his famous Model T. A bare listing of those specifications presents a picture of an automobile that in performance, appearance, and mechanical features has heretofore been associated with a considerably higher price class.

Unusual speed and acceleration are among the outstanding features of the new car. It is announced as being able to make 35 to 40 miles an hour, with ease. In recent tests it has made even more without difficulty. What is more important, it is said that when traveling at such speeds, it holds the road easily, and with comfort to driver and passengers. It is also stated with equal positiveness, however, that it performs in an equally spectacular manner on bad roads. In its design, Mr. Ford has held to his original idea of a car which can meet all conditions and types of roads.

Has Good Pickup
Appreciating the constantly increasing importance of acceleration, the company has given a great deal of study to this feature of the new car. In high gear tests with two passengers in a Tudor sedan it has shown an acceleration of from 5 to 25 miles an hour in 8 1/2 seconds.

The new car also introduces a new type of four-wheel brakes. An exclusive Ford development, they are of the mechanical, shoe-expanding type, and are self-centering. The brake pedal and hand brake each operates all four wheels. It is stated that this is the most reliable and simplest type of four-wheel brake, and also the easiest to adjust, all adjustments being made from the outside without removing any parts.

An engine that is practically vibrationless develops 40 horsepower at 2,200 revolutions per minute. This low revolution speed in ratio to the high horsepower is illustrative of the unusual efficiency of the engine. Also, it means longer life, the lower engine speed insuring less wear on engine parts. The low revolution speed is also a substantial factor in lessening vibration. The bore is 27-8 inches, stroke 4 1/2 inches. The unusually large crankshaft, which is both statically and dynamically balanced, weighs 28 pounds. This balance, combined with the lightness of aluminum alloy pistons, further combine to reduce vibration and increase riding and driving comfort and safety.

Car Runs Quietly
In addition to freedom from vibration, it is announced that the car is unusually quiet. A great deal of attention having been paid to this feature by the Ford engineers, in the engine, the timing gears are made of bakelized fabric, which is much quieter than metal. The caps on the camshaft have been so designed as to prevent valve clicking.

The chassis of the car is as distinctive as its performance. There is a noticeable European touch in line and contour. It is not only designed for exterior beauty, but has as well the interior roominess, convenience and luxurious appointments to be found in much higher priced automobiles. On an instrument board of satin-finished nickel are mounted the

speedometer, gasoline gauge, ammeter and ignition lock, with a dashboard in the center. The new military-type sun visor, with crown roof and round corners, are features of the closed models. Unusually narrow pillars and very wide doors and windows give maximum vision. Nickled radiator shell and headlamps further accentuate the exterior attractiveness, while choices of four colors in pyroxylon finish are offered.

Simplicity is Keynote
Simplicity has also been carried to the ignition. There is only one coil, in a waterproof case. There are no vibrators to adjust, and no exposed cables to work loose or short circuit from water. The distributor is located in a readily accessible position on top of the engine.

Centrifugal water pump, large radiator and airplane propeller-type fan provide a cooling system which makes the motor every difficult to overheat, except from abuse, such as running without enough oil, or dry radiator.

From 20 to 30 miles to a gallon of gasoline, depending upon driving speed, is the gasoline consumption announced. Feed to carburetor is by gravity.

Oiling System Unique
The oiling system, also a distinctive Ford design, is a combination of pump, splash and gravity feed. The new transmission is of the selective sliding gear type, with standard shift, three speeds forward and one reverse. The main shaft runs on ball bearings, the counter-shaft on roller bearings and the reverse idler on bronze bearings, a never-saying design unusual on light cars. Shifting of gears is noiselessly and easily accomplished at the pressure of a finger.

Multiple dry-disc floating rear axle of three-quarter clutch type housed in electrically welded steel and spiral bevel gear drive are interesting features. The axle shafts carry none of the weight of the car, the wheels running on roller bearings on the housing. Newly developed springs of the transverse semi-elliptic type and hydraulic shock absorbers prevent excessive up-and-down movement and remove side sway.

Irreversible steering gear, which prevents shocks from being transmitted back to the hands of the driver, makes handling exceptionally easy. Maximum steering safety is further provided by a gear housing of welded steel forgings, and a steel tube steering column welded into the housing, making a sturdy and exceptionally safe one-piece unit.

Wheels Are Steel
Ford-designed steel spoke wheels completely welded into a one-piece assembly, are provided.

There are six models of the new car. They are the phaeton, roadster,

sport coupe, coupe, Tudor sedan and Fordor sedan.

Local dealers are preparing for a public reception Friday, when models of the new line will be shown in photographs and charts.

BANK REPORT ON BUSINESS SHOWS MUCH OPTIMISM

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Nov. 10.—One of the most optimistic reports of recent months was made in the November 30 issue of the Monthly Business Review of the Federal Reserve Bank of the eleventh district. Rise in the gross deposits of member banks to the billion dollar level for the second time in history, and the rise in both net demand and time de-

posits on October 26 to the highest point on record were cited.

These indexes "evidence the remarkable recuperative powers of the district," the Review declares, adding that the increase in deposits has been made possible by reason of the fact that farmers have followed the policy of crop diversification, have raised their living at home, have reduced the cost of production, and have been able to market a large proportion of the cotton crop at or near the 20 cent level.
