EAGLES WIN FIRST CONFERENCE GAME AGAINST MARFA. 19 TO 0

The game here last Saturday afternoon between Sanderson and Marfa high schools, was, with the exception of the first quarter, a fair exhibition.

The game opened with Sanderson on the receiving end of the kickoff, the play being returned to midfield. In two plays the locals, with Halley plunging through the line, aided by perfect blocking, toted the pigskin over the line, and converted by another line plunge.

Sanderson then kicked to Marfa, and recovered the ball on downs, and with Halley and Cy Mussey doing the totting, had the second counter, just four and a half minutes after play started. Try for point from placement was good, but Sanderson was offside and the play called back. The next try missed by inches. Before the quarter ended Sanderson again scored, but failed to convert leaving the score at the end of the quarter Sanderson 19 Marfa 0. Incidentally that was the final score.

During the second quarter the visitors from the Big Bend came alive, and were successful in breaking up many of the plays that wrought havoc with them in the first period, and, aided by a string of long penalties against Sanderson, (five for ten yards, one for five yards, and one for 25 yards), held the Eagle flock scoreless.

In the third and fourth quarters Marfa unleashed an air attack that seemed to worry the Eagles, and started a march down the field until one of their flings was intercepted by Bill Smith on Sanderson's 45-yard stripe. That was about as close as Marfa got to the Sanderson goal.

Gonzales, captain of the Marfa squad, a triple threat man, was their outstanding player. They were outweighed, however, and line plunges were useless. The visitors chalked up but one first down on line plays, and two more via the air route.

No Game Saturday

The Eagles will be idle tomorrow, as the scheduled game with Alpine has been called off. Reason given is that Alpine is playing ineligible players, over age and over-weight; that a game against such a team would have no standing in the Interscholastic League, and there is danger of our lighter boys being hurt, crippling our chances against teams in the League. "We have no reserve worth mentioning," stated Coach Smith when approached on the subject, "and I don't believe it fair to match the game at this particular time. However," he added the boys are rarin' to tackle them, but after several consultations with school heads and citizens, I have decided to call it off."

Charter Granted For Stock Yards At San Angelo

San Angelo.—The secretary of state announced this week that a charter had been granted the West Texas Stockyards company at San Angelo, capitalization at \$60,000, and with S. S. Kistler, J. W. Johnson and Roy C. Vance as the incorporators.

Work was under way Monday at the stockyard site just northeast of the city limits and also on the site of the Whitaker Bros. feed lots adjoining. The roads and terrain are being graded by the city and county to improve accessibility and drainage.

Plans have been tentatively drawn for the stockyards but must be approved by the stockyards committee and the directors, the latter still to be elected. W. I. Marschall, county agent, who with John P. Lee, a leader in the project, were busy at the site yesterday. A dozen or 15 men will be put to work in the construction of the yards and the pens, the office building for the stockyards corporation, and the 60x100 feed storage and preparation shed that will be constructed at the feed lots. Whitaker Bros. workers were stacking feed Monday.

Construction of the pens is expected to start the first of next week. The two co-ordinated projects, due to cost between \$8000 and \$10,000, will be in operation late in October. They will give steady employment to eight or ten men.

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EDITORIAL COMMENT

MORE ENCROACHMENTS

The age limit imposed by the Interscholastic League in high school athletics, we believe unfair to the student body as a whole. Heads of the League, not in so many words perhaps, accuse most of our high school leaders of unfair tactics, when, as a matter of fact, the rules now governing high school athletics, are themselves a barrier to such tactics hinted at in the new code. If there is any "monkey business" going on, the fault is with those in charge of the schools. So, why lay down a set of rigid rules penalizing, not the leaders, but the innocent students? Football is the "big boys" game, they love it, and no hindrance should be placed in the path of any deserving student to play it. Many a youth, backward in the grades, finds himself, intellectually, in the high school, but the slow start finds him near the age-limit long before graduation. This student, being a part of the high school system of Texas, unless he has reached the normal age limit of 20 years, should be entitled to take part in all curricula and extra-curricula which is part of the high school system.

High school football is a credit to the youth of our land. It is thriving on the present basis, with the age limit placed at 20 years. The hypothetical perimeters set up by the Interscholastic League to lower this limit is nothing more or less than a rank injustice to the thousands of students whom, in future years, it will bar from, what to the average youth is the heart-blood of American athletics.

CALL A COP

Corpus Christi has adopted a plan, originated in Buffalo, N. Y., whereby drunks are furnished free chauffeur service on request. All the drunk has to do is call the police, inform them that he does not feel up to driving, and the cops will see to it that he gets home safely. In return for the inebriated one's candor and honesty, no charge will be filed against him unless there are other circumstances making it necessary.

Undoubtedly such a plan will head off many accidents, if generally followed. When a man knows he's to drunk to drive—and a single drink unfits some men for the task—he should be smart enough to delegate the task to someone else.

In some centers there have been an alarming increase in drunk driving. Not every drunk driver gets into an accident; if he did, the jails would be overflowing and the highways littered with wrecked cars. Men react in opposite manner to the influence of drink. Some become super-cautious at the wheel, others throw all caution to the winds. Regardless of his reaction, a man under the influence of liquor in any degree is not up to par in his emotional and muscular reactions. They are either increased or lessened, which means they are not functioning normally. For this reason alcohol and gasoline make dangerous combinations.

The problem of what to do about drunk driving is a real one in every part of the world. Possibly the plan of furnishing drivers for self-confessed drunks is as good as any. Denial of the right to drive is the obvious answer for repeaters.—Corpus Christi Times.

CONSERVATIVE AMERICA

Frank Kent has a piece in The American Mercury called "America is Conservative." He sets off no firecrackers and blazes with no serried columns. The subject is commonplace. It is unnecessary to decorate it. He uses the old arguments. He points at the multitudes of holders of life insurance policies, saving bank depositors, home owners. He might have added the subject of our excellent, if occasionally too agitated, friend, William Green. In ordinary times the American workingman is a prosperous bourgeois. His earnings and his style of living are higher than those of the average professional man. In these supposedly bleak times the assemblage of cars at any big factory, the artisan and the farmer rushing along roads, are a wonder to the European visitors.

The saver, unless he be an intellectual, is likely to be conservative. His conservatism is often the more intense, according to Mr. Kent, the smaller the amount of property he owns. As the country gets out of the depression, these millions of what may be called Little Conservatives, ceasing from the fears and emotions caused by it, become more and more frightened as they look at the interminable bill which the experiments of the New Deal have cost—and heavens knows how much more they will cost. So the Little Conservatives have lost their little faith of "33 and Mr. Roosevelt's calling and re-election have not the dead-sureness of '32.

This is no startling news. To put it in the manner kindest to Mr. Roosevelt, as we begin to be better off we cease to be as virtuous. Presumably there will continue to be cycles of conservatism and "liberalism," like those of bad and good times. There is something of Polonius in Mr. Kent. Straight conservatism prevents progress. Conservatives mustn't be too superior. One might ask how they can be when they are despised as Tories. They must be tolerant. Apparently "liberals" don't have to be.

Mr. Kent's article is, for the most part, sound, kind and improving. He has got so he is able to practice tolerance as well as preach it.—New York Times.

NOBODY'S BUSINESS

Austin.—Political straws which show which way the wind blows, appearing out of the August 24 election, brought about two important legislative events in the special session.

First, the senate passed by an overwhelming vote, Senator Clint Small's bill defining an open saloon as any place where liquor is sold to be drunk on or adjacent to the premises. The senate has heretofore been regarded as the more moist of the two houses; but the very close vote on repeal and the very large territory represented by the dry sentiment has had its effect on the upper body.

Second, the house recommitted to committee the Calvert-Hoffman bill providing old age pensions, with instructions to strike out its provision imposing a tax on domino tables. This provision was written in so that the house could consider and add from the floor all manner of taxes to finance the pensions. But the fear of many members that they might be charged with opposition to the pensions if tax measures which they felt they could not vote were added to the bill caused the reversal of procedure. It now appears the house is determined to pass a bill ordering pensions paid and then enact as separate laws the tax-raising bills necessary to finance the pensions. Meanwhile the senate indicated it may take a hand by writing its own revenue-raising laws, when opinions as to the legality of the senate originating revenue measures for this purpose were asked of the attorney general.

A second special session at a cost of about \$100,000, will be necessary, in the belief of most members of the houses. The pension matter is likely to be long drawn out. Two distinct schools of thought have developed. One wants to pay a pension to everybody who is 65 years old, without other restrictions, apparently just simply as a matter of reward for attaining this ripe old age. Sen. Roy Sanderford of Belton heads this group, with a bill providing a 3 per cent sales tax to raise the \$40,000,000 it would require. The bill is said to have been written by Ex-Gov. Jim Ferguson, who is here professionally lobbying for a sales tax. The senate is against a sales tax, and barring a miracle, will not pass one.

The other school of thought would pay pensions as charity only to old persons who are indigent and without relatives to whom they could lawfully look for aid. Such a bill following the restrictions laid down by most other states, would require about \$10,000,000 a year, experts here figure. This is most likely the form the law finally enacted will take.

Probably the largest gathering of the political clans seen this year in Texas will occur in Austin Monday, Oct. 7, when Jesse Jones of Houston, who has made an outstanding record as chairman of the RFC board, will visit Austin to participate in ceremonies connected with the unveiling of his portrait in the senate chamber. Jones will be the guest of Governor Allred, and an Austin committee will entertain him with a dance and reception. Representatives from every section of Texas will be on hand.

The state highway commission broke all records for the past 4 years when it let approximately \$1,600,000 worth of road building contracts here Sept. 24. With the letting this month of an additional \$2,800,000 now ready, about one-seventh of the total of the \$32,000,000 worth of highway construction expected to be finished by July 1, 1936, will be under contract. Thousands of laborers will be steadily employed for the next eight months on this gigantic road building program.

Highway commissioners and other public officers learned some new facts about Comal county when they visited New Braunfels recently to attend the dedication of a new \$200,000 concrete bridge over the Guadalupe river. County Judge B. W. Klingeman told them the county had the smallest percentage of delinquent taxes in the state. He also reminded them Comal was the first county in Texas to impose a tax for public education. The tax was declared unconstitutional at that time, but county officials collected it anyway, to provide free public schools.

So sings a gifted lady whose lyric outburst is occasioned by the contemplation of such names as Rising Star, Hope Dawn and one or two others which appear on the map of the Lone Star State. The lady wrote wisely and well, particularly as her list of "pretty names" was brief, but had she gone on she would have encountered others likely to prove stumbling blocks even to the most enthusiastic seeker after harmony and euphony. True, our small towns (always remembering that a small town in Texas may be anything from a proverbial wide place in the road to a city the size of Houston) sometimes bear names which are romantic and fanciful, but the majority of them suggest that their sponsors must have racked their brains pretty thoroughly, sometimes with strange results, in quest of a worthy designation for the future metropolis. Not only the United States but the ends of the earth have been ransacked for names; notable persons and others not so notable have been "honored"; the pages of history and fiction have been searched; in fact no source has been overlooked when a new town was to be christened.

Thus without going beyond the boundaries of Texas one may visit Albany, Atlanta, Buffalo, Boston, Detroit, Frisco, Lexington, Los Angeles, Nevada, Newark, New York (also Broadway), Nogales, Nome, Klondike, Omaha, Reno, Pittsburg, Raleigh, Salem, St. Paul, Sandusky, Saratoga, Tacoma, Washington, and a number of others.

If we wish to wander still farther afield we may indulge in an extended world tour and still remain in the State. Memories of the Emerald Isle are suggested by Erin, Ireland, Arah, Shannon, Shamrock, Kildare, Mickey and Dublin. We have a Scotland, also Edinburgh, Dundee, Argyll, Midlothian, and Highlands. From England we get English, London, Bristol, Cheapside, Manchester, Liverpool, Westminster, Oxford, Rugby and Windsor. Our northern neighbor is represented by Canadian, Toronto, Quebec and Kalgary—the last named doubtfully spelled.

But this is only a starter. By taking aboard a few gallons of gasoline and keeping a watchful eye on the road map we can visit such far-away and widely separated places as Athens, Belgrade, Cadiz, Canton, Carlsbad, Carthage, China, Corinth, Egypt, Eldorado, Harbin, Hanover, Holland, (also Nederland), India, Jericho, Malta, Moscow, Nazareth, Ninevah, Odessa, Paris, Sweden, Swiss Alps, Tokio, Vienna and Waterloo. We can emulate Mohammed by making a journey from Mecca to Medina or vice versa. Although we can visit Italy, Genoa and Naples, we do not find Rome on our map, but we can get close to it by visiting Rhome or Roma.

If we wish to condense our trip we can cover the entire Globe in Lamar county or Earth in Lamb county. By way of again recalling Mohammed who decided to go to the mountain when the mountain would not come to him, during a period of railroad construction, when the railroad would not come to Earth, they moved Earth bodily to the railroad.

But our travels need not end after visiting all these places. We may, right here at home solve the problem of interplanetary travel by calling upon Jupiter, Mars, Venus, Saturn, and Mercury. Should such names suggest Roman dieties, we may add Juno and Minerva, both of these ladies being domiciled in Texas. We can also include a Star in our itinerary.

Just why many of these names were selected it is hard to say, for certainly there is nothing in the

places themselves or their surroundings to even remotely suggest the originals. We can easily understand the desire of some newcomer to perpetuate the name of his former home, but we hardly think this reason would hold good in the case of such names as Jericho, Ninevah, Tokio or Mecca, to say nothing of Jupiter and Saturn.

Dozen of towns bear given names, feminine predominating, as Bess, Clara, Mildred, Margaret, Marie and a host of others. Masculine names are not forgotten, as Charlie, Guy, Davy, Daniel, and Thomas. Or the whole name may be used, as George West, Maryneal, Maudlow, Samfordyce, Ben Franklin and Robert Lee. A little variety is introduced by using the initials as Cee Vee. Another ingenious touch is added by spelling a name backwards, as Saxet, Tesnus, and Sacul, which are merely Texas, Sunset and Lucas in reverse.

In addition to a Washington we have a Whitehouse, and a Senate in Texas, also a Hoover, a Woodrow, a Wilson, a Roosevelt, and a Coolidge, although the last was not named in honor of the former president. The names of most of the presidents have been perpetuated by various Texas towns. We have a Union, also we can point with pride to a Flag and Old Glory, along with a Post and a staff for their proper display.

We have a House and Lott in Texas, also Barnes and Red Barn, a Lawn and a Yard. There is a Stranger in Falls county and a Pilgrim in Gonzales county, but they will find Friendship in both Harrison and Bell counties; New Hope in several counties, a Welcome in Austin county and a New Home in Lynn county.

Since our list includes such names as Thrift, Thrifty, Provident and Industry, it is natural that we should find Cash, Cost, Profit, Nickel, Dimebox, Dinero, Bonus, Hoard and Wealthy.

The spirit of the wide open spaces is reflected in such heartening names as Ginger, Pep, Energy, Enterprise, Grit, Pluck and Progress; also Pride, Prosper, Security, Hope, Reliance, Comfort, Concord and Content.

Hunt, Hunter and Nimrod suggest a train of thought which will bring us to Ames, Point and Pointblank. And that we will find a variety of game is evident from such names as Lyons, Ibeex, Hare, Antelope, Wild Horse, Elk, Buck, Mustang, Buffalo, Coyote, Wolfe City, Lobo and White Deer. Also we have Bryd, Byrds, and Birdville, and can take our choice from a long list which includes Quail, Peacock, Crow, Crane, Eagle, Dove, Goldfinch, Falcon, Mallard, Owlett, Chinati (Blackbird), Snipe, Turkey and Lark. We have a Fisher but he will find himself restricted to Pike, Salmon and Sturgeon. However, Finney invites further investigation.

We not only have a Best, but a Veribest, also Acme, Climax, Ideal, Peerless and Sublime. If you don't like to live in Ragtown you can move to Dresay, or Tuxedo or Satin may appeal to you. But should you desire a quiet little game (say in Bean's place) we can provide Ace, Spadd, Odds and Fairplay. Possibly Call, Draw, Bluff and Raisin might fit in here. When you wish to retire for the night we can offer an

INTERESTING ITEMS PICKED UP HERE AND THERE

Fall and winter months bring to the housewife again the problem of keeping some kind of fruit on the table. During the summer months fruit is abundant and the price is low, but in the fall and winter fruit is more scarce and the cost is greater. Yet it is during these months, when the hours of sunshine are fewer, that fruit is needed most to furnish the vitamins, minerals and cellulose that are valuable in regulating the body.

Two pathways are open to the women who wishes to keep fruit on the menu and who finds fresh fruits too expensive or unavailable: she may substitute canned fruit or she may make use of the dried fruits or citrus fruits. The dried fruits are usually cheaper, but the canned fruit market offers a wider range of selection. Either offers a solution to the problem of keeping the table supplied with valuable substances during the seasons when fresh fruits are scarce.

Dixie Salad
2 halves peaches
1-3 cup cottage cheese
¼ cup nuts
4 tablespoons salad dressing
Mix cheese and nuts. Shape into 1-inch balls. Place on top of peaches and cover with salad dressing.
Have all ingredients thoroughly chilled before serving.

Chocolate Cake
1-3 cup of fat
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1-3 cup cocoa
¼ teaspoon of salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1¾ cups of flour
1 teaspoon soda
1 cup buttermilk
Cream fat and sugar. Add rest of ingredients and beat 1 minute. Pour into greased shallow pan. Bake 30 minutes in moderately slow oven. Cool and frost.

Frosting Creamy
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons hot cream
¼ teaspoon salt
1-3 cups confectioner's sugar
Mix ingredients. Beat 1 minute. Let stand 5 minutes to dissolve sugar. Beat until creamy and frost cake.

Chopped Pickle
(Using Green Tomatoes)
8 cups chopped green tomatoes
4 cups chopped green peppers
2 cups chopped red peppers
2 cups chopped onions
½ cup salt
2 tablespoons white mustard seed
1 tablespoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1-3 cups sugar
2½ cups vinegar
Wash and remove blossom ends from tomatoes. Do not peel. Mix tomatoes, peppers, onions and the salt. Let stand 2 hours. Drain well and add rest of ingredients. Slowly bring to boiling point and simmer 35 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars and seal. Store in cool, dark, dry place.

Museum Started In High School

Weapons, probably used by some of Pancho Villa's men during the Villa Acuna raid in 1917, have been added to the museum started by students of the American history class at Sanderson high school. These and many more specimens are being collected and placed in the museum under the direction of Mr. R. D. Holt, teacher of the class, and Dick Mussey, a student.

The American Legion contributed four German guns, two bayonets, and a shrapnel shell. All of these were used in the World War. A Birdwell of Dryden donated an old Spanish sword made in 1600, a German gun about 3 feet long, and 45.10 rifle. These were found in a cave in Old Mexico, and they were probably left by some of Pancho Villa's men in the raid on Villa Acuna. Dick Mussey contributed a collection of uniform buttons used during the World War period.

Indian Headband Contributed

Nell Lea contributed an Indian headband made of woven beads. This was found in a grave of an Indian squaw in Arizona, and it is a real piece of Indian work. Homer Richardson contributed a photograph of the first artillery of Fort Sam Houston, taken in 1888. Bernard Kerr brought a pair of woman's shoes similar to the ones that were worn in the early days of this country.

The museum is located in the manual training room of the high school building. Many more objects of historical value will be put in this museum from time to time.

Inspiring Talks Feature Students' Assembly Period

The Rev. Philip Brown spoke to members of the Sanderson high school and the seventh grade last Tuesday afternoon at the regular assembly period. His subject was "Character Education."
