

City hires engineer for airport project

The Colorado City Council Tuesday night, meeting in regular session, hired Big Spring engineer Joe Smoot to prepare plans and specifications for seal coating and striping the runway at the Colorado City Airport.

The city has received a grant from the Texas Aeronautics Commission which will pay 75 percent of the cost which Smoot estimates at \$68,000.

Smoot will charge the city \$4,200 for his services which will also include a followup inspection of the work once it is completed.

The runway to be seal coated and striped is 60 feet wide and

5,600 feet long.

In other airport-related business, the council took no action on a request from J. O. Dockrey who was seeking permission to build a private airstrip on property he owns at the north city limits near the landfill entrance.

Dockrey said he proposed to build a 30 by 1,160 foot runway for his personal use. The runway would run east and west and be parallel to a county road.

He said he wants to build the short airstrip so he won't have to drive 21 miles to the municipal airport.

City Manager Brenda Tarter explained that she had talked

with an official of the Federal Aviation Administration who told her the FAA must approve the plan before the proposal can be submitted to the city.

City Attorney Pete McKinney said there would be a zoning problem and that Dockrey will have to get the area rezoned or obtain a variance from the city.

Dockrey said he will go to the FAA before proceeding any further.

In other business, the council gave approval to the Masonic Lodge to erect a marble plaque on the new fire station to be built on 11th Street. Charles Godwin of the local lodge said the plaque will be similar to one erected at

the high school and will be placed on the northeast corner of the building. He said there will be no expense to the city.

The council awarded a bid to Rohan Co. of Waco in the amount of \$23,354.98 for materials for the Cypress Street waterline and to Mitchell County Utilities in the amount of \$10,872 to install the new line. Money for the project will come from funds left over from the Community Development Block Grant which was used to renovate the Sands area of the city. The city awarded a bid in the amount of \$1,200 to Water Works Municipality of Lubbock for a set of hydrolic

pipecutters.

Blair's Carpet Shop was awarded the bid for new carpet for the police department in the amount of \$1,890.50 for 190 square yards of carpet. It was the only bid received.

After hearing a report from council member Dee Hearn, the council agreed to advertise for bids for electrical maintenance at the lake intake station and to advertise for bids to pull a pump at the lake to make sure it is working properly. Mrs. Hearn said she anticipates the work to cost between \$7,000-8,000.

Mayor Elmer Martin reported that a proposal is being drawn up concerning the pollution pro-

blem at Lake Colorado City and that the proposal should be ready at the next council meeting. The proposal will also have to be approved by the county, he noted.

Councilman Tom Lovell said he and Mrs. Hearn have been reviewing the city's insurance policies and recommended that the plans be reviewed as they come up for renewal and that the city stay with the existing carriers. The council approved his recommendation after he explained that many municipalities are having problems obtaining the insurance coverage they desire.

School trustees study telephone proposals

The meeting room of the Colorado Independent School District board of trustees was filled with representatives from various phone companies Monday night as bids were opened for a new telephone system for the district.

Nine bids were opened and representatives from eight companies were present to answer questions and further explain their bids.

No action was taken on the matter so that trustees and administrators could study the bids further. The bid is expected to be awarded at a special November 25 meeting.

The bidders and the amount bid include Custom Communications Co. Abilene, \$21,407; Teleco USA, Lubbock, \$25,785; Excuteone, Abilene, \$18,534; Hi-Tech Data Corp., Midland, \$23,946 (\$20,710 alternate bid); Harris-Leneer, Midland, \$20,773; Superior Systems, Lubbock, \$29,232; Teleco USA, Abilene, \$27,112.50; Advanced Telephone Systems, Big Spring, \$18,683 (\$20,575 alternate bid); and AT&T, Midland, \$18,700.

In addition to the bids for the telephone systems, school officials will be studying the service contracts and warranties offered by each company.

The new phone systems are planned for the high school, middle school, Hutchinson Elementary, Kelley Elementary and the administration building.

The board also opened bids for a 15-passenger replacement van for the Wallace Center. The board agreed to accept the bid of

Hutchins Ford for \$15,620, pending approval of the State Department of Highways which is providing part of the cost for the new vehicle. The only other bidder was Bob Brock Ford of Big Spring with \$15,419.30.

In other business, the board agreed to pay the fees for teachers participating in a teacher testing workshop conducted by the University of Texas. The fee schedule depends upon the number of teachers taking the workshop, but Superintendent Charlie Useitson said he anticipates the fee to about \$25 per teacher. The workshop will be conducted here January 25.

The board also approved the textbook committee for 1985-86 as recommended by Useitson who will chair the committee. Assistant superintendent Dr. Walter Bingham will also be on the committee along with Margaret Rees, supplemental readers, English and Spanish; Bruce Evans, introductory industrial arts, grades 7 and 8, general industrial arts, high school; metalworking and plastics; Glenn Dunn, auto mechanics, auto body repair; Karen Smith, life science; Orphie Conner, U.S. history, grade 8 and high school; Bo Merket, physics I and II; Kitten Arthur, English composition I-IV; Ronney Conner, journalism, advanced journalism, photo journalism and photography; Mel Gierhart, math of consumer economics, computer math I and II, pre-algebra; informal geometry; Joan Lemons, personal business man-

agement, office procedures, shorthand I and advanced shorthand; Debbie Goforth, computer literacy, grades 7 and 8; Tom Kelly, art, grades 7 and 8; and Barbara Hammond, pre-kindergarten.

A committee was also appointed to develop a discipline management policy to comply with state requirements. Those administrators named to the committee include Useitson, Bingham, Jerry Reynolds, high school principal; Jim McLean, middle school principal; Dell Riley, Hutchinson principal; Bobby Lemons, Kelley principal. Parents are Ronnie Aston, high school; Linda Hoover, middle school; Brenda Kelley, Hutchinson; and Vicki Ramage, Kelley. Teachers named to committees are Frank Brownfield, high school; John Richardson, middle school; Gaye Carpenter, Hutchinson; and Barbara Girvin, Kelley. Students are Blake Bingham, CHS student council president and Holly Tarter, junior class representative.

In other business, the board: -approved the annual agreement with the West Central Texas Education Cooperative for the Plan A Program; -amended the school board policy concerning the proper method of reporting suspected child abuse cases; -amended the 1985-86 budget to allow for changes in coding; -approved the financial report-tax roll change, and; -agreed to visit Hutchinson Elementary on November 20 as board members continue on-site inspection of each campus.

County OKs film plans

Mitchell County commissioners Tuesday gave their approval to Lazy E Productions to film a portion of the movie "Shadows on the Wall" in the Mitchell County Cemetery.

Ben Miller and David Hicks, representing the movie company, said several scenes will be filmed in an unused portion of the cemetery and that every precaution will be used to leave the cemetery in the same condition it is now.

Commissioners gave their approval pending approval from St. Ann's Catholic Church. The movie company is wanting to film in the west part of the cemetery which is used exclusively for Catholic burials.

In other business, the commissioners amended the 1985 budget after county auditor Georgie Griffith explained that the budget was exceeded in total expenses by almost \$24,000.

The commissioners also signed an agreement with the Taylor County Youth Detention Center which will permit juvenile offenders from Mitchell County to be sent there.

Steve Lawhon, chief juvenile officer for the 32nd Judicial District, said that juvenile offenders can no longer be kept in county jails and that almost 20 counties have contracted with the Abilene facility.

Lawhon said the Abilene facility charges \$50 per day per juvenile, but that almost \$10,000 in grant money is being used to foot the bill at the present time.

County Judge Bill Carter explained that only juveniles charged with a felony are sent to the detention center.

In other business, the commissioners agreed to cast the county's 2,107 voting entitlements for the Mitchell County Appraisal District to its candidate, Ronnie Easter.

Two playoff games set here

The football season may have ended for the Colorado City Wolves, but it hasn't for Wolf Stadium.

Two bi-district football games are scheduled this Friday and Saturday in Region One, Class AA competition.

Friday at 7:30 p.m., Hamlin (10-0) will meet Morton (9-1) while Saturday at 7:30 p.m., it will be Shallowater against Haskell.

Chamber of Commerce manager Penny Solomon said the playoff games are expected to bring in 4,000 visitors to Colorado City over the two-day period.

Chamber officials are hoping that Wolf Stadium, one of the finest facilities for its size in this area, will attract a number of playoff games this season. School officials recently completed a new press box at the stadium which should also enhance the stadium's desirability as a play-off site.

Sales tax rebates received by cities

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$35,913.46 in local sales tax to Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook as their share of the city sales tax.

Colorado City received a net payment this period of \$32,861.67 compared to \$31,342.07 for the same period last year. The 1985 payments to date total \$246,880.26, an 8.02 percent increase over the 1984 payments to date of \$228,525.10. Loraine's check totaled \$992.34 compared to \$1,212.75 for the same period last year. The 1985 payments to date total \$4,658.48, down 21.85 percent

from the 1984 payments to date of \$5,960.75.

Westbrook received a check for \$2,059.45 compared to \$2,008.17 for the same period last year. The 1985 payments to date total \$21,360.58, up 62.85 percent from the 1984 payments to date of \$13,116.76.

November checks represent taxes collected on sales made in September and the third quarter and reported to Bullock by October 20.

Bullock sent checks totaling \$115.2 million in local sales tax to the 1,010 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

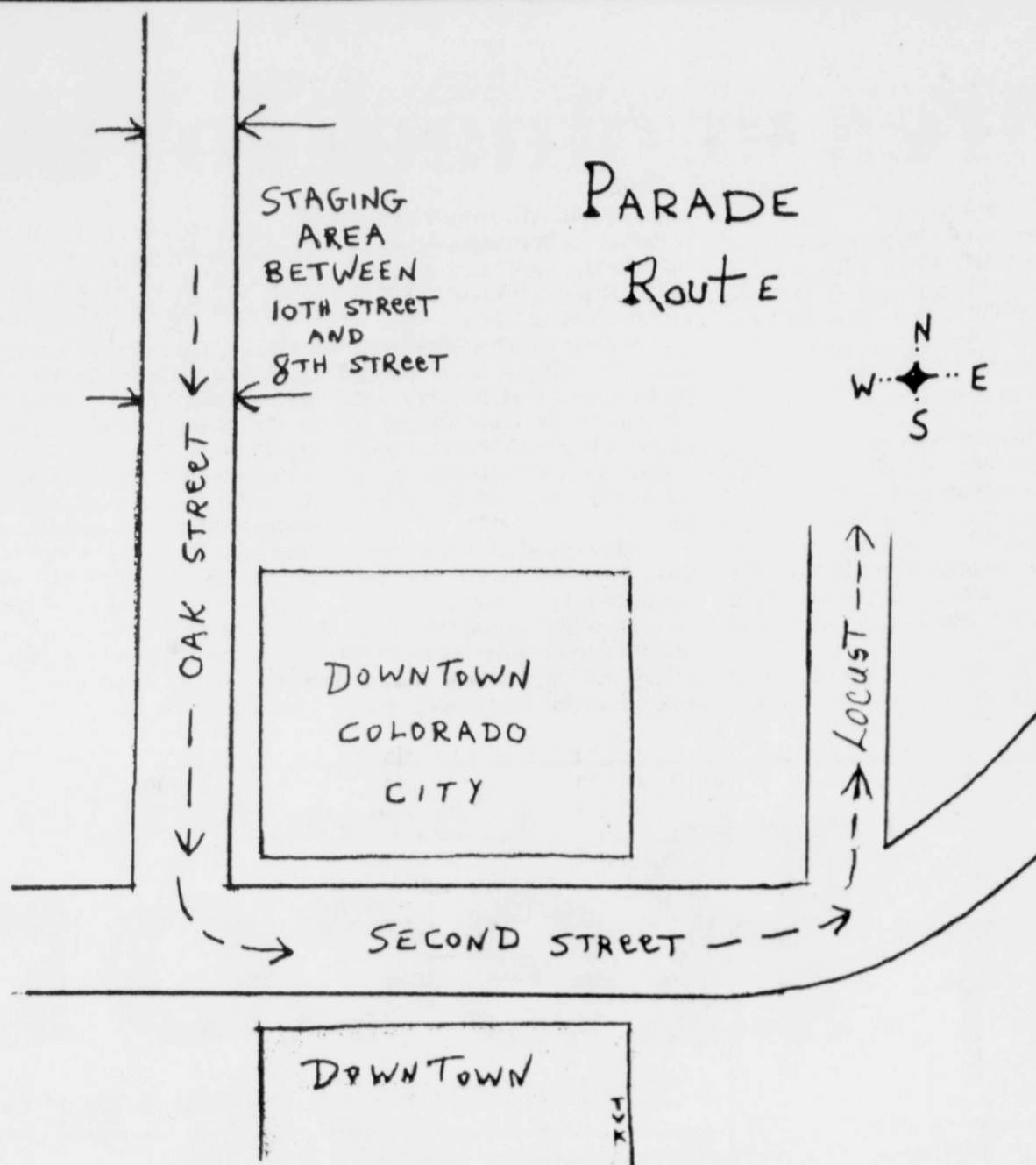

Farm-City Week slated November 22-28

COLLEGE STATION—Farm-City Week, November 22-28, focuses on the teamwork of farm and city people as partners in growing, processing, marketing and consuming food and fiber.

"In Texas, movement of food and fiber from the farm or ranch to the supermarket and family table provides jobs and income for almost a fourth of the working force," points out Dr. Carl Anderson, marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"One out of every 35 Texans is a farmer or rancher, and around 25 percent of the state's retail

trade business is directly associated with agricultural production and selling of food and fiber products," says Anderson.

Many businesses, financial institutions and individuals are involved in providing supplies, credit and services to farmers and ranchers and in processing and marketing agricultural commodities. Nationally, one out of every five jobs in private enterprises is tied to agriculture.

With its \$9.7 billion in cash receipts from agricultural commodities in 1984, Texas moved up in rank to second place behind California and ahead of

Iowa. Texas, however, is traditionally number one in the sales of cattle and calves, cotton, grain sorghum, sheep and wool, goats and mohair, cabbage and spinach.

Total farm assets in Texas are estimated at \$110 billion. With 185,000 farms in Texas, assets average nearly \$600,000 dollars per farm. Many commercial size, full-time operators have far more than a million dollars invested in their farm or ranch businesses.

"Producing an abundance of high quality food and fiber is inherent to American agriculture. Americans spend far less

of their take-home pay on food than people in other countries of the world," Anderson points out. "Today that averages about 16 cents of every dollar of disposable income, with 4 cents of that spent on food eaten outside the home."

"Together, farm and city people make the best food and fiber team in the world," he believes. "This gives a country the capacity to feed its own people and to export for economic gain as well as for humanitarian purposes."

In the U.S. about one person in every 40 lives on a farm or ranch. Each farm worker now supplies enough food and fiber

for 80 people, 20 of which live abroad. The proportion of U.S. residents living on farms has fallen from 30.1 percent in 1920 to 2.5 percent today. That compares with about 70 percent of the people living on farms in India, 36 percent in Mexico and 14 percent in the Soviet Union.

Farm-City Week is under the direction of the National Farm-City Council, Inc., which is coordinated by Kiwanis International.

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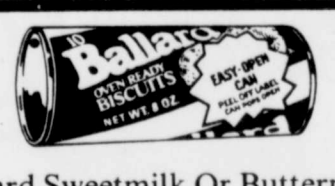


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4-H Food Show draws 23 entries

Brighter future seen for cattle market

COLLEGE STATION—Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus—and yes, cattlemen, the market finally seems to be turning around.

In the coming weeks, cattlemen may have another reason to feel a bit joyous other than the approaching holiday season.

Based on a variety of reports, cattle numbers are down and that trend should last into next year. The price recovery that began a few weeks ago should continue at least until the spring, says a Texas Agricultural Extension Service livestock marketing economist.

Dr. Ed Uvacek feels the latest cattle-on-feed report (covering 13 states) gives another "shot in the arm" to the cattle industry. "The number of cattle on feed has declined steadily in recent months and finally appears to be having an impact on market prices," Uvacek says.

October 1 figures show cattle and calves on feed down 12 percent, feed cattle marketings for July-September up 5 percent, cattle and calves placed on feed during July-September down 13 percent, other disapp-

pearance of animals during that same period down 25 percent, and expected fed cattle marketings for October-December down 4 percent.

"These figures suggest that the oversupply problems of the beef industry caused by larger marketings of overweight feedlot cattle are about over," Uvacek points out. "Even though

slaughter weights are still running a little above a year ago, some feedlots are already selling some cattle that are not quite ready."

Uvacek feels that the reduction in feedlot placements during the July-September period is the best news for cattlemen. "This 13 percent reduction sh-

ould assure light supplies of fed beef for the last quarter of this year and continued lower marketings through the first quarter of 1986," says the economist.

All in all, the future is starting to look a little brighter for the beef industry, and it couldn't have come at a better time with the Christmas season approaching.

Sore Throat Medications

Sore throat are a symptom of many different illness such as flu, strep throat, viral pharyngitis and infectious mononucleosis. Most often, the pain from a sore throat is mild. It is more of a nuisance than a real danger to the person who is ill. This kind of sore throat often can be aided by over-the-counter products such as aspirin and lozenges. It must be emphasized, however, that these treatments are designed to provide relief from the symptoms, that is, the pain. They do not constitute the definitive care that is needed should one have a bacterial infection such as a strep throat. It is only a doctor who can prescribe the anti-biotics needed to treat strep throat.

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Home health services beneficial

When people are no longer capable of living alone, either because of age or infirmity, arrangements must be made so they can get the care they need. The two major sources of such care are home health care services and nursing homes.

Home health care services can include part-time nursing care, physical therapy, home-

delivered meals, transportation and escort services and many other programs of assistance.

It is always best to find out what home health care services are available in your area before contracting with a nursing or custodial home. Contact your local office of the Texas Department of Human Services or call the Texas Department on Aging's toll free number (1-800-252-9240) to find out the name of your local area agency on aging.

They can tell you what services and kinds of financial assistance are available for home health care.

A nursing home is a medical facility and must be licensed by the State of Texas, but a nursing home is not a hospital. For those who cannot afford the payments, many nursing homes will accept residents under the Medicaid program if they qualify.

Most Texas nursing homes participate in the Medicaid program, which certifies two categories of nursing homes: skilled nursing facilities (SNF) and intermediate care facilities (ICF).

Skilled nursing facilities offer 24-hour nursing services, regular medical supervision and rehabilitation therapy. Intermediate care facilities have regular nursing services, but it is not provided around-the-clock.

If you decide that a nursing home is necessary for you or a family member, visit and compare at least three nursing homes in your area, if possible. The decision must be made carefully because you are deciding where you or a loved one is going to live. You might regret a hasty decision for years to come.

Some of the things you should look for are:

-Location. How close and how easy is it for family and friends to visit? But don't pick the first home you visit just because it is close.

-Layout. The design and the condition of the home are important. Is it safe, well designed and well maintained? Does each resident have space for personal possessions and have privacy when necessary?

-Cleanliness. The home should be orderly and reasonably free of unpleasant odors. The

employees should be clean and well groomed.

-Food. Ask to see typical menus for a week and, if possible, sample a meal.

-Atmosphere. The residents should be treated with dignity, like honored guests. You may want to talk to the residents and those who have relatives living there.

-Administration. The administration sets the tone and establishes the policies of the home. You should talk with the senior administrator when you visit. Find out exactly what is provided for in the cost and what "extras" would have to be paid for from personal funds. The administrator should provide you with a copy of the patient's rights. You should also find out how the home safeguards residents' valuables and how it administers their private funds for personal use. Ask to see the current nursing home license and a summary of the most recent state inspection report. You may also want to know if the home is owned locally or part of a chain, and whether the home is associated with a religious or charitable group.

The Texas Department of Health's Bureau of Long Term Care can tell you which nursing homes in your area have been awarded a "superior" rating and will try to answer any questions you may have about a particular home. Their toll free number is 1-800-252-9106.

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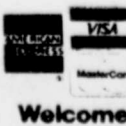

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Stenholm stresses sound financial future

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Charles Stenholm praised the House version of a deficit-reduction bill at a Thursday morning breakfast of the United States Chamber of Commerce.

Speaking to more than 200 of the country's business leaders, Stenholm said the bill is essential to a sound financial future for America. He said the Senate's Gramm-Rudman legislation is the closest Congress has come to dealing with the realities of the \$2 trillion-dollar national debt.

"I commend my fellow Texan Phil Gramm for forcing Congress to do something that the majority of my colleagues did not want to do," the Stamford native said. "His version was not perfect, but it was the impetus for the measure in the House, which is better."

"The House Democratic revision of Gramm-Rudman is now the key to real deficit reduction," he told the crowd. "It trims more and does it quicker. We cannot put deficit-reduction off. We have to make those crucial decisions today and let the people see where we really stand. It's time to bite the bullets."

The Senate bill requires phasing in a balanced federal budget by 1991, but would not require major spending cuts until after the November, 1986 elections for 34 senators. The House bill cuts spending immediately and balances the budget by 1990. In both, a balanced budget is enforced by making automatic, across-the-board spending cuts in

most programs if the President and Congress fail to write annual budgets that meet the phase-in targets.

The largest controversy has been which, if any, programs would be exempt from the automatic cuts. The Senate version exempts from cuts \$250 billion in entitlement programs, none of which are targeted for the poor or disabled, totalling one-fourth of the entire budget. The House added \$10 billion more in exemptions, which includes protection for Disabled Veterans benefits and programs for the poor.

"I do not agree with those who say that adding the House exemptions will gut the bill," the Congressman said. "My question to them is how can you oppose the House bill because it

exempts \$10 billion, when you took out \$250 billion? How in the world can they honestly tell their constituents that the deficit is a grave threat and at the same time say we can't cut that much that fast?"

Stenholm also told the Chamber that he supported Texas Congressman Marvin Leath's proposal last April, which asked for the reductions now being considered in Washington. That bill would have required cuts across the board.

"Gramm-Rudman shows the direction we need to go in order to control spending, but it is not the best vehicle. The only fair and equitable legislation, the one that would help our country the most, will allow us to have deficit-reduction across the bo-

ard. I have heard from senior citizens in my district and they tell me, they don't want their benefits cut if we keep heaping money on defense at record levels. But they always say, 'If everybody else is tightening their belts, then I'll do my share. That's only fair.' This is what must be done," the four-term Democrat said.

Stenholm added, "We can reduce the budget by cutting out the waste and unnecessary benefits for people who don't need government help. We can and must continue to help the poorest of the poor. This is not just farmer's optimism. This is a goal that we must reach for the sake of the nation's children and grandchildren, who will bear the costs of this monster-deficit unless we do something now."

Terrorism continues to plague U.S. citizens

Leon Klinghoffer, a wheelchair-bound passenger on the Italian cruise ship Achille Lauro, is the most recent American victim of international terrorism.

He was senselessly, brutally shot—his body dumped overboard—during the recent hijacking.

We can derive some satisfaction from the capture of the terrorists who hijacked the ship, and the promise that they will be brought to trial.

It is fair to say, though, that terrorism directed against U.S. citizens and property in the Middle East will not be ended by the successful apprehension of

these men, because much of the terrorism in that war-ravaged part of the world is state-sponsored.

The targets of more than 40 percent of international terrorist incidents over the past few years have been Americans and their property.

The United States must find ways to put terrorists, and the nations which support them, on notice that there is a price to be paid for such activities.

The Administration has officially identified seven nations as supporters of international terrorism: Iran, Libya, Syria, Cuba, North Korea, Nicaragua and South Yemen.

Incredibly, the first three of these nations still benefit from special trade privileges reserved for nations friendly to the United States.

The Iranians, we can say to a moral certainty, were the force behind the bombings in Beirut of the U.S. Embassy, the embassy annex and the Marine barracks. The Libyans and Colonel Qaddafi have established themselves as supporters of terrorism, not just in the Middle East, but here in the United States as well. And the Syrians, despite the help they may have given us during the TWA hijacking last summer, are strong supporters of the PLO.

Yet these three foreign governments are enjoying what we call Most Favored Nation status, the "column one" trade preference we give countries

considered friends. It cuts in half the tariffs placed on their exports to us.

As a member of the Senate Intelligence Committee, I have introduced legislation that would deny trade preferences, including Most Favored Nation status, to any country listed by the Secretary of State as a supporter of terrorism, now or in the future.

Iran, Libya, and Syria would thus be moved to "column two" trade status, at least doubling the tariffs we charge them.

During the first seven months of this year, these three countries exported \$280 million in goods to the United States. My bill would double duties on crude oil from Iran and Naptha from Libya, among other items, and would triple the tariff on Syrian tobacco.

Ending the favorable tariff status of these terrorist-supporting nations will give additional credibility to U.S. Air Force actions that brought into custody the four PLO hijackers of the Achille Lauro, so that they could be tried for their crimes.

And it will tell nations that support terrorism that they cannot continue to do so and expect to be treated as though they are among our best friends.
