Light Rain and Snow Brings Quarter Inch Moisture

Snow Brings .05 Inch of Moisture Early Thursday

This week's winter rain, sleet and snow brought welcome moisture to this area with a combined total of .26 of an inch as recorded by Jack Allen, keeper of the government weather gauge. Drizzling rain accounted for .21 of an inch during the course of Wednesday. Dropping temperatures in the afternoon yesterday turned the rain into sleet which would have seriously threatened trees and shrubbery had it continued for any length of time.

A light snow covered this area generally early Thursday morning bringing .05 of an inch added moisture and low temperature. Despite indications late Wednesday night, ice formations on communication lines and power lines failed to do

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Postpone 4-H Annual Show

As a result of a conference of the fathers of boys feeding 4-H and P. F. A. Club calves for the Spring market and show, it was decided to hold all calves until sometime in April and then ship to Kansas City, according to E. W. Thomas, county agent.

Showing of the calves in Perryton will likewise be deferred until just prior to shipment of the calves to market. Tentative plans had previously been made for the show to be held March 1 before the Amarillo Fair Stock Show.

Definite dates for the Perryton show will be set after inspecting the animals and deciding on the shipment date.

The Perryton Chamber of Commerce will sponsor the show as in past years.

Tentative plans have been made to take the boys owning the calves to the market to study marketing methods and see their animals sold. A total of twenty calves have been on feed since early autumn and the additional time will permit the calves to attain a much higher finish than has been possible in previous years.

Southern Great Plains Loses \$80,000,000 Worth of Water Annually, says Finnell

Amarillo, Tex. — Farmers and ranchers of the Southern Great Plains are losing approximately \$80,000,000 worth of water annually, according to a recent report of H. F. Finnell, regional conservator of the Soil Conservation Service at Amarillo. In addition to the value of the lost water, the land values of the region are decreasing at the rate of \$30,000,000 a year as a result of soil erosion, making a combined net loss of approximately \$110,000,000 annually to farmers and ranchers of the region as a result of permitting run-off water to escape and soil erosion to continue.

Experiments and demonstrations of the Soil Conservation Service show that if practical water conservation practices such as terraces, contour tillage and strip cropping on cultivated lands, and contour furrows, water diversions and small storage reservoirs on pasture lands are used throughout the region the net increase in crop yields and grazing values would be approximately \$80,000,000 annually.

Investigations of the Service also have shown that the sale value of lands in the region has been decreasing at the rate of \$20,000,000 annually as a result of topsoil lost through wind and water erosion.

"Practically all of these soil and water losses can be prevented by use of proved conservation measures," Finnell stated. "The \$80,000,000 annual loss in income and land values that is being suf-

World War Veterans to Register For National Defense on February 22

On Saturday, February 22, all world war veterans are asked to register for national defense. This local registration is part of the nationwide program of The American Legion to catalog the qualifications and talents for future possible home defense service of all Legionnaires and war veterans. This registration is to be entirely voluntary. There is nothing compulsory about it, states A. R. Highland, commander of Perryton Post.

Registration will be at the Legion Hall, Perryton, starting at 9 o'clock Saturday morning. O. R. Truax is chairman of the committee, with A. P. Spicer, Beano Truax and Herman Hargrove, assistants.

Full endorsement of The American Legion nationwide plan to register all Legionnaires and World War veterans generally on a voluntary national defense service, was given today by Mayor C. E. Forbes of Perryton.

The American Legion national defense registration questionnaire is one legal size form in length and contains 28 questions. Commander Highland states. It contains also a list of 67 specific occupations, professions and trades, which are to be checked by each registrant. A space is provided for writing in vocations not listed.

This registration is purely a civilian undertaking. The filling out and signing the questionnaire in no way increases the obligation on the part of the individual to serve the United States to a degree greater than the obligations of citizenship generally.

ferred by present farmers and ranchers, however, is but a small part of the total loss to the nation and the region from soil erosion that is occurring in the Southern Great Plains," he states. "The ultimate loss to future generations who must depend upon the land for a living cannot be accurately estimated, but unquestionably runs to several hundred million dollars per year."

Of a total of 135,000,000 acres included in the Southern Great Plains Region, comprising the state of Kansas and parts of Colorado, New Mexico, Texas, and Oklahoma, Finnell estimates that only 6,000,000 acres are non-erodible. Relatively small tracts of level, irrigated lands and river-bottom lands are not suffering any appreciable current loss from the escape of run-off water and soil erosion. These lands, however, make up less than five percent of the total area of the region.

Much progress has been made in the region during recent years toward the conservation of its soil and water resources. At the present rate of progress, however, the conservator estimates that it will require approximately 52 years for the establishment of a complete coordinated program of soil and water conservation on all of the farm and range land of the region.

Plans have been made by specialists of the Soil Conservation Service for complete treatment of approximately 7,000,000 acres within the region, and most of these plans

have been installed on the land, according to his report. Partial treatment in the form of individual practices, such as terraces, contour tillage, strip cropping, gully control measures, etc., has been applied to many other millions of acres, under sponsorship of the State Extension Services, Vocational Agriculture Departments, by groups of farmers and individual farmers, but, in most instances where individual practices have been applied, the land still requires a more intensive and coordinated treatment with other applicable practices to reach its most profitable use with an adequate factor of safety, according to Finnell.

He estimates that the job of planning and putting into effect complete conservation treatment on all of the land in the region could be done in 18 years, provided soil conservation districts of the type now operating in many communities were organized over the entire region. An attempt to do the job in this short period of time, however, would require the marshalling of larger forces of technicians than are now available for the area.

The cost of applying complete soil and water conservation treatment to all of the lands in the region would be about \$300,000,000 according to Finnell's estimate. Under the present system of operation the Government would contribute slightly more than \$130,000,000 of

Urges Maintaining Of Low Insurance

Perryton is at the present time enjoying the lowest fire insurance rates in its history due to the fire record credit of 25 per cent on fire insurance premiums again assured this year, according to local insurance men.

It is pointed out, however, that to maintain this low rate policies should be purchased through local agents.

Premiums on insurance placed through outside channels, such as non-capital stock companies, are not credited to Perryton premiums, and therefore the total premium credit is reduced for this city.

This together with decreases in insurance rates, are lowering the total figure perilously close to where the good fire record credit will be reduced, and this reduction would affect every insurer of property.

Local merchants who enjoy the trade of local Perryton people in fairness and reciprocity should buy their insurance from local Perryton agents.

Veto Change On County Bond Date

Canvassing of the ballots taken by counties on the question of changing the date of eligibility from January 2, 1939 to January 2, 1941, of bonds to be assumed by the state under the Bond Assumption law disclosed that among the counties that voted 43 were for the question and 130 were against.

In the past all surplus from state bonds have been distributed among the counties of Texas. In the event the measure had passed new bonds voted by counties would have wiped out any surplus as deductions were made.

Among counties in the 124th Representative District Hemphill, Ochiltree and Hansford voted against the measure. Hutchinson, Moore and Hartley voted affirmative. Lipscomb, Roberts, Sherman and Dallam did not vote.

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Prayer Needs Humility

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Feb. 23.

Text: Luke 18:1-14

IN two striking parables, Jesus enforces His teaching concerning prayer. One called the Parable of the Unjust Judge teaches a positive lesson from a seemingly unworthy incident, so that it is necessary for us to be discriminating in our interpretation.

The unjust judge feared not God; neither did he regard man. He was not likely on that account to give justice to a widow who had appealed to him; and yet, because the widow was persistent and came troubling him again and again, he finally did decide the case in her favor.

WHAT is the conclusion from this story? Certainly not that God is a unjust being, who will yield to our persistent pleadings, regardless of whether the things we seek are good for us or not. Quite the reverse, the teaching is that as an unjust judge would yield and grant a widow's request just because she was so persistent, how much more is God ready, because He is a just judge, out of His grace and mercy, to bestow blessing upon those who seek!

If we must be persistent in prayer, it is not because our persistence persuades God to do something that it is against His will and His nature to do. It is, rather, because it is only those who want things enough to be persistent who are in a

position to receive them, even in the world of spiritual things.

IT is fortunate that this parable is set alongside the Parable of the Pharisee and the Publican, because here we have a further emphasis upon the real nature of prayer. The publican, in a sense, could hardly be said to be persistent. He was so contrite of spirit and so conscious of his own sins that he hesitated to ask much of God except the mercy that God gives to a sinner.

How different was the attitude of the Pharisee—proud of his own orthodoxy and of his own attainment, congratulating himself that he was so just and so correct in his life, praying far more with himself and toward himself than toward God. Probably all he said concerning himself was true—that outwardly he observed all the practices of religion, and that he meant well—but he had not discovered the need of measuring himself against some higher ideal. He despised the publican in his proud self-confidence; yet it was the publican who went down from the place of prayer having really received the blessing of God.

Humility in prayer is quite as necessary as persistence, and if we are ever tempted to despise our fellowmen it is well for us to stop and consider how despicable we may ourselves be in the eyes of God. Yet God does not despise us. Is it not true that the better men are the less are they disposed to look down on others?

Henry Ford studies plastics with Robert A. Boyer, who is in charge of research in this field. Long ago the auto manufacturer envisioned a new age when harvests of the fields would become raw products of industry. His first commercial success in decorative plastics was in turning soybeans into instrument board clusters. With certain other crops

he has now advanced so far in structural plastics that he says he will be building a wholly plastic body within a few years—a body that will be lighter and stronger than steel. "Only door locks and hinges will be of metal," says Mr. Ford. Possibly a growing shortage of steel and the dwindling foreign markets for agriculture will hurry along the plastic car.

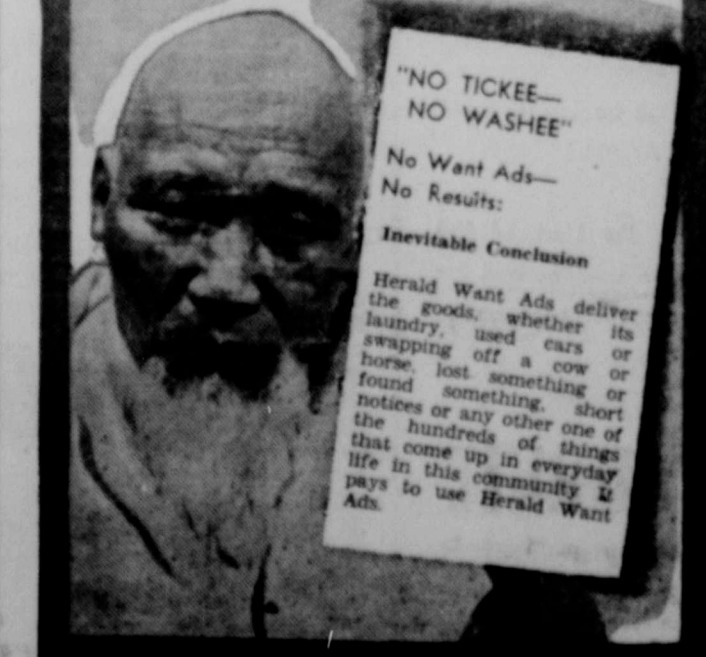

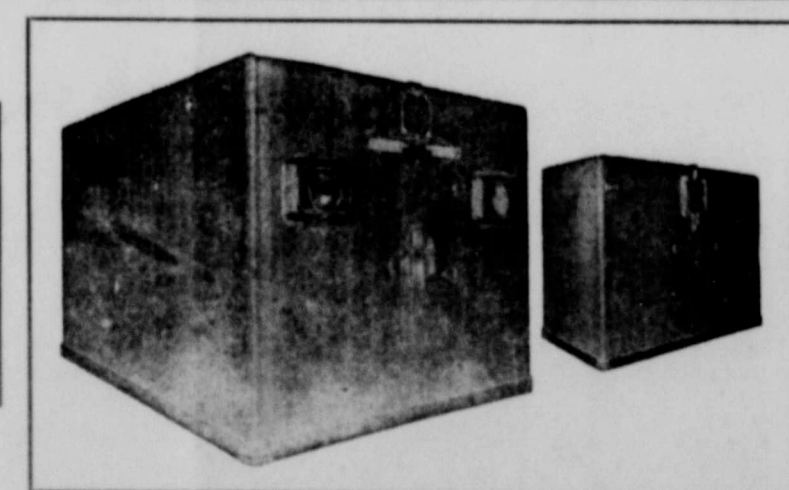

It's Farm Planning Time Now

College Station—Farm planning time being at hand, a complete plan should comprehensively consider all resources as in any other business, says Tyrus R. Timm, Extension Service economist in farm management for Texas A. and M. College. This because planning time is equal in importance to planning time on most Texas farms.

The specialist says that farm resources include land, labor, equipment, buildings, feed, livestock and money or credit for current operation. Other factors, such as available markets and road conditions, are elements of almost equal importance.

A farm business plan, he explains, falls naturally into three divisions or phases. First, there is the plan for crop production, which involves the field layout of the farm, the cropping system, labor, and equipment necessary for growing and harvesting crops, and facilities for storage and marketing.

The second is the livestock production plan, which involves the kind and numbers of livestock to be raised, the feed, labor, equipment, shelter, sanitation program and marketing plan; and the third is the budget for expense and income.

Timm reminds farmers that soundness of any plan of production and marketing depends upon its ability to yield the maximum return over costs, and that expense of operation on any farm must be guessed at if no accounts are kept. By using the Texas Farm Record Book, which has been prepared by specialists at Texas A. and M. College, he adds, farmers can budget their expenses as accurately as the corresponding estimates of other businesses.

"In addition to the record book, the Extension Service has available for free distribution through county agricultural agents two pamphlets which may be of assistance in planning farm operations," the specialist says. "One is entitled 'How to tell whether you went forward or backward financially on your farm during the year,' and the other 'Farm and home production plan.'"

Begin by applying a good varnish remover with a brush. Use coarse sand paper to rub this down, then finish with fine sandpaper before using new varnish. Be sure to mend or replace any broken wood work, making the foundation firm before replacing new upholstery.

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Oklahoma Routes Open for Exams

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to fill the position of rural carrier at Gray, Okla., and at Edmond, Okla. The examination will be held in Perryton under the direction of Arvie Hale.

Receipts for applications will close on February 28, 1941. The date of the examination will be stated on the admission cards mailed to applicants after the close of receipt of applications, and will be about 15 days after that date.

The salary of a rural carrier on a standard route of 30 miles served daily except Sunday is \$1,900 per annum, with an additional \$20 per mile per annum for each mile or major fraction thereof in excess of 30 miles. Certain allowances are also made for the maintenance of equipment. THE EXAMINATION WILL BE OPEN ONLY TO CITIZENS WHO ARE ACTUALLY RESIDING IN THE TERRITORY OF THE POST OFFICE WHERE THE VACANCY EXISTS, WHO HAVE BEEN ACTUALLY RESIDING THERE FOR SIX MONTHS NEXT PRECEDING THE CLOSING DATE FOR RECEIPT OF APPLICATIONS, and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form 1977. Both men and women, if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Form 1977 and application blanks can be obtained from the vacancy office mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications must be on file with the Commission at Washington, D. C., prior to the close of business on the date specified above.

Isolationists Seem to Forget That Axis Powers are Also U. S. Debtors

Isolationist propaganda about the failure of Great Britain to pay its war debts to the United States has left the impression in the minds of many Americans that the British "failed to pay back a dime." Just to keep the record straight, Great Britain paid this country, in principal and interest, \$2,024,000,000 up until the depression brought England and most of the rest of the world close to economic collapse in 1931.

What is more important, and yet seldom is mentioned in discussions about war debts, is that of the Axis nations Germany and Italy owe the United States substantial sums of money. On October 31, 1940, Treasury Department figures showed

that Italy's debt was \$2,026,901,442.35, and that Germany's was \$1,209,798,249.74. At the same time Great Britain owed this country \$5,651,792,208.17.

But those figures do not begin to tell the story. When Great Britain's war debts were funded in 1923, they were set at \$4,600,000,000 with an interest rate of 3 per cent increasing to 3 1/2 per cent by 1933. In 1923, arrangements were made with Italy whereby its debt was funded at \$1,648,000,000, with interest rates to start at 4 1/2 per cent, and never to exceed more than 2 per cent during the entire life of the loan.

In other words payments made by Great Britain up until 1931 amounted to more than \$2,000,000,000, yet with the high interest rates have kept the debt increasing at such a rate that Britain now owes more than it did when the debt was funded. Meanwhile, Italy has paid only a total of about \$100,000,000, yet the low interest rates have kept its debt from increasing as rapidly as Britain's. During the same time, Germany has paid only slightly more than \$33,500,000 on its total indebtedness to this country.

It must also be remembered that Great Britain loaned about the same amount it received from this country to France and other Allies. These countries failed to keep up their payments to Great Britain during the world economic crisis, and the British were deprived of an important source of income they expected to use in keeping up the installments due the United States. Despite these facts, we still hear of plans to seize British possessions in this hemisphere as payment for these back debts. Little is said, however, of seizing the 27 Italian and 2 German ships now lying in American harbors as part payment for the back debts of the Axis partners.

Tree Planting Time is Here

"Tree planting time will soon be here and a good time to start thinking about the trees that are to be planted this spring, is now," George C. Twombly, Agronomist of the Soil Conservation Service states. "Several farmers who are cooperating with Camp SCS-12-T are expecting to plant trees for erosion control or as shelter belts this spring."

The Soil Conservation Service will have considerable quantities of various species of adapted trees that it expects to furnish the Camp this spring. They expect the trees to be available early in the planting season, but state that those farmers who are expecting to use quantities of these trees should begin to make their plans at once.

The varieties of trees which will be available from the Service are Chinese Elms and Honey Locust.

Approximately 4,000 trees were furnished cooperators with the Camp last spring. Most of the trees that failed to survive the summer drought were not properly cared for by the farmers on whose places they were planted. Either the tree sites were not properly prepared, or weeds were permitted to make rank growth around the young trees and sap the moisture they needed for proper development, Twombly stated. He urges that those who expect to plant any considerable quantity of trees this spring, begin to prepare their tree sites early, and suggests that during the winter months, while farm work is slack, is the best time in which to do this job. He stated that present prospects gave hope for greater success this year provided the cooperators would be careful to give sufficient attention to the trees to give them a chance.

Official 1940 census reports for Ochiltree county show that 2,287 or over 54% of the 4,213 people in Ochiltree county reside in Precinct No. 2, the northwest one-quarter of the county.

In Precinct No. 1, the northeast one-quarter, there are 1,287, slightly over 30% of the total. Precinct No. 3, the southwest one-quarter, drops to 113 people, about 2.5% of the entire population, while down in the southeast one-quarter, Precinct No. 4, there are only 236 persons, just a little over 5% of the county's total.

Ochiltree county is sub-divided into four precincts of the same size, the dividing lines intersecting at the center of the county. Main street in Perryton is the boundary line between Precincts No. 1 and 2.

Of the 4,213 county population, 2,321 or 55% per cent reside within the city limits of Perryton. The great preponderance of the county's population is in the north one-half of the county, 3,574 or 85% of the total.

Did you know that there are 1,255 dwelling houses in Ochiltree county? That 1,136 are occupied? That 83 are vacant and for sale or rent? That 36 are vacant but are not for sale or rent? Well we didn't know it either until the housing census reports were released a few days ago.

According to the Retail Business census reports the 78 retail stores of Ochiltree county did a retail business of \$1,963,000 in 1939. This was divided as follows: food, \$327,000; general merchandise, \$115,000; wearing apparel, \$126,000; furniture, household goods and radio, \$53,000; automotive, \$383,000; filling stations, \$160,000; lumber, building material, hardware, \$399,000; eating and drinking, \$62,000; drug, \$104,000.

In most instances the costs to farmers and landowners, however, would be offset by soil conservation payments of the AAA. The cost to the Government could be reduced by about \$15,000,000 if the program were speeded up and certain administrative costs eliminated, he estimates.

"Three hundred million dollars spent toward the conservation of the soil and water resources of the entire Southern Plains Region seems relatively cheap," he said. "The current losses of water and soil run to approximately \$100,000,000 per year without including the ultimate cost to the region if the soil is permitted to deteriorate until it becomes entirely unproductive."

damage in this vicinity. Last November 22-23 similar freezing rains reached wide scale proportions through the Panhandle and caused thousands of dollars damage to trees and utility companies.

Farming circles report that crop prospects are brightened with moisture received thus far in the season. Although moisture is somewhat below the average this year little damage is being done at the present time.

George C. Twombly, agronomist of the Soil Conservation Service at Camp SCS-12-T, located here, stated that soil blowing may be expected this spring where crops failed last year or where fields have insufficient protection from crop stubble or trash.

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
