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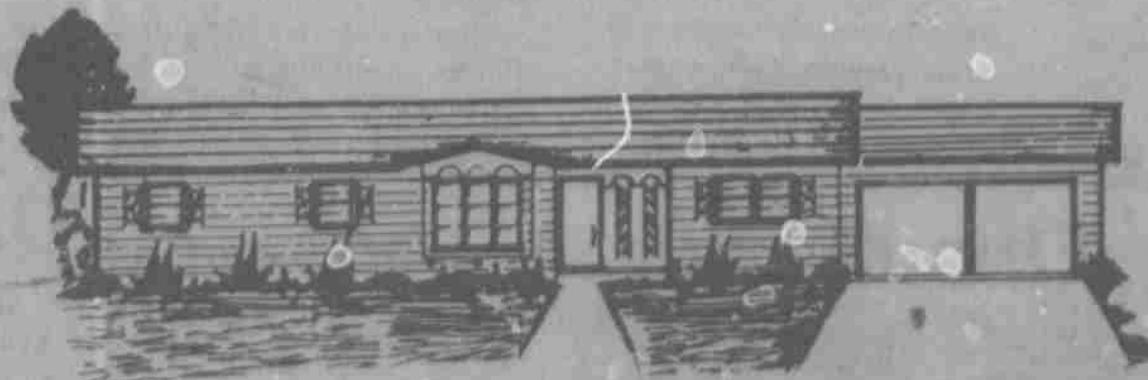
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Digest Supporter Succumbs

Our part in keeping AM 58 being geared to East Lubbock is simple, if we make it that way. First, turn your radio to AM 58 and listen to whatever part turns you on, but do be a regular listener. The most important part we, the community, must play is letting the people who matter know we listen to AM 58. We need to call our write the station and let them know we listen and like what's going on. And just as important, when you visit one of the businesses who advertise on AM 58, just say, "I heard your ad on the radio." You see, if not enough of us let the station and the sponsors know we are listening, then how will they know that East Lubbock supports AM 58. And for those of you who don't like AM 58 or have negatives to say, **KEEP YOUR MOUTH SHUT**, at least don't let the station know, not yet. Lay all your negatives on Emma Evans Bradley, tell her personally, let her work out any problems you may have. AN EDUCATOR'S OPINION

The Skills America Needs

Last month, the National Assessment of Educational Progress issued a report analyzing student achievement over the past 17 years. I wish it could be made required reading for all Americans.

The NAEP report, *Crossroads in American Education*, shows that the "back to basics" movement is succeeding. Our students are mastering the fundamentals. Virtually all 17-year-old students in U.S. schools can add, subtract, multiply and divide using whole numbers. They know basic science facts and principles. They've mastered the rudiments of reading.

But the NAEP report also presents hard evidence that our schools are failing to educate most students beyond the basics. The thinking and reasoning abilities of our nation's young people remain woefully underdeveloped.

Yet these higher order thinking skills—the ability to apply knowledge to new situations in thoughtful and innovative ways—have never been more essential. They are essential for college. They are essential for our democracy. They are essential for the vast majority of jobs in an economy increasingly dependent on a highly educated, skilled, and flexible work force.

Last year, NEA asked Columbia University researcher Sue Berryman to analyze what our changing economy means for schools. "Changes in the economy," Berryman concluded, "change what students need to learn, who needs to learn it, when they need to learn it,

and how they need to learn it."

What do students need to learn? They need to learn to think—analytically and symbolically. They must learn how to ask pertinent questions—and use the answers. They need to learn to work independently and collaboratively.

Who needs to learn all this? Everyone. The vast majority of today's jobs—as well as personal and political decisions—require a capacity for analysis.

When do students need to learn these things? Early. Students can-

not be taught in elementary school to sit quietly, work individually, and obediently follow directions—and then in secondary school, college, and on the job be expected to think creatively and work cooperatively.

Finally, I believe that how students learn is even more important than what they learn. In his foreword to the NAEP report, Greg Anrig, president of the Educational Testing Service, quotes Aristotle: "People become house builders through building houses, harp players through playing the harp. The obvious corollary is that students become thinkers by thinking and problem solvers by solving problems."

The traditional separation between learning and working is fast disappearing. We must not only educate all our young people well, we must also prepare them to learn throughout their lives. That is the real challenge before our schools—and our nation.

Receives Grant

Lubbock: Lifetime Independence for Everyone (LIFE) announced this week that the Texas Rehabilitation Commission has awarded a grant to LIFE ILC, a disability consumer organization in Lubbock. The grant will fund an independent living center to help people with disabilities in Lubbock County to live and work more independently in the community.

The grant was awarded from state appropriations of the Texas Rehabilitation Commission. The money will be used to help the new center offer assistance to people with physical and mental disabilities by providing services including peer counseling, advocacy, information and referral for housing, transportation, and attendant care.

The establishment of this center shows the state's commitment to improving life for all Texans, including people with disabilities.

Like the existing nine independent living centers in other parts of the state, the board of the center in Lubbock will be composed mainly of representatives of the disabled population it will serve. The Lubbock Center will serve individuals that have not previously been served by either Amarillo or El Paso, both of which have had centers for several years.

LIFE's independent Living Center is located at 4514 Englewood Avenue, which is off the Brownfield Highway inside Loop 289. To contact the Center, call 795 LIFE (795 5433) between 8 and 5, Monday through Friday.

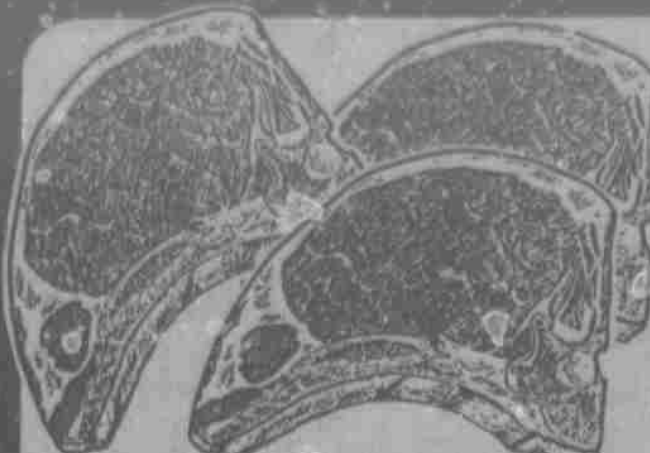

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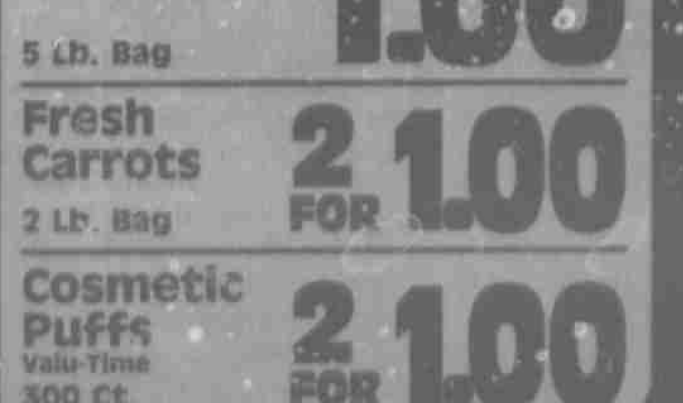

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Jack And Jill President Visits Africa

Over the Christmas holidays, the National President of Jack and Jill of America, Inc., Dr. Eva C. Wanton, toured drought stricken areas of Senegal and Mali in West Africa. Dr. Wanton was accompanied by Africare's Director of Constituency Development, Mr. Melvin P. Foote.

At their 50th Anniversary meeting held last July in San Francisco, the Jack and Jill's committed to financing a \$40,000 child survival project in Mali. An \$18,000 down payment was provided to Africare to begin the project with the balance to be provided over the next year.

Over the 10 day visit Dr. Wanton was able to meet with a wide variety of high level officials including Government Ministers, Development Planners and Experts, Education Officials, Village Chiefs and Local Government Officials and the United States Ambassadors to Senegal and Mali. In addition to the meetings, Wanton and Foote toured numerous rural villages and Africare project sites.

The involvement of Jack and Jill of America in development projects in these countries was clearly welcomed by all. Moreover, Dr. Wanton received strong encouragement to significantly expand Jack and Jill involvement to include both pre natal and post natal care, family planning, and the care of

young children.

The first project to be supported by Jack and Jill is a \$10,000 project to equip a maternity clinic which was contributed by Africare in the village of Digon in the Quelesseboungou Region of Mali. Mali was hard hit by the African famine of the mid 1980's; both before and since, it has suffered periodic drought and chronic poverty that have tragically hindered agriculture. As a result, malnutrition, which is a primary cause of ill health among children, is widespread. In the Quelesseboungou area at least 30% of the children die before the age of five! The infant mortality rate in Mali is higher than in any other country in the world with the exception of Afghanistan!

A second project which the Jack and Jill President

committed to fund is a vegetable gardening activity in the village of Zilani, also in the Quelesseboungou Region. This \$8,000 project will help finance the construction of a garden well, provide a revolving stock of seeds and provide management and agricultural training to the 50 women in the village who, on their own initiative, began a village garden in 1938.

This project activity will help these women attain their goal of increased agricultural production and income. The availability of fresh produce is also likely to improve the nutrition and health of the approximately

250 inhabitants of this community. As an associated benefit, the women will have access to clean water for drinking purposes at the garden site.

Other projects to be financed by the Jack and Jill organization in Mali will include school vegetable gardening, construction and equipping of maternity clinics, well construction and income generation. Similar projects will be financed in neighboring Senegal in years to come.

In addition to support for projects in Africa, the Jack and Jill organization is also planning to collaborate with Africare in a program to educate Jack and Jill Mothers and Teens nationwide about Africa and African development issues. This program is being designed to enhance the adult leaders and youth participants of Jack and Jill, understanding of development problems faced by children in rural areas of Africa as well as provide a balanced picture of Africa's infrastructural development and its urban and rural lifestyles. The educational program will be known as "Jumoke Inspired African Development Education" project. The word "Jumoke" is Yoruba for "everyone loves the child."

Yes, East Lubbock, while we gather for fun, let's spend some time in deep serious conversation on how we can do those things to make East Lubbock "the place to chill."



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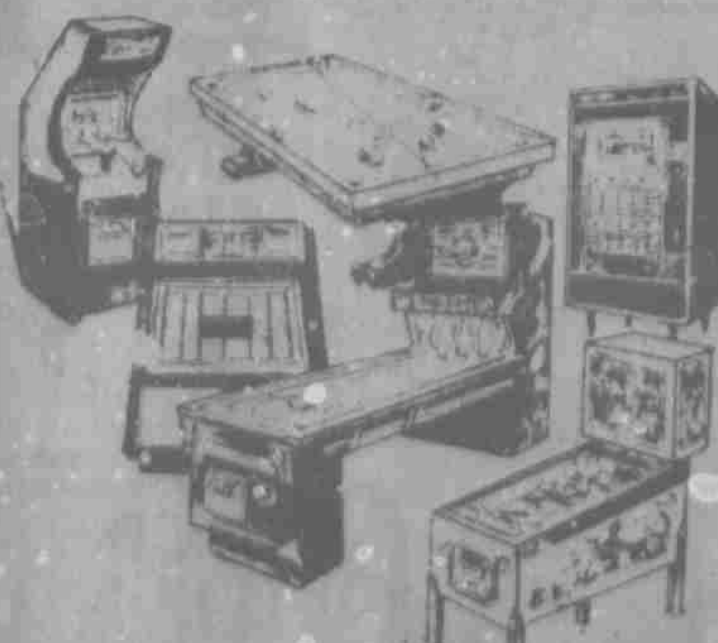


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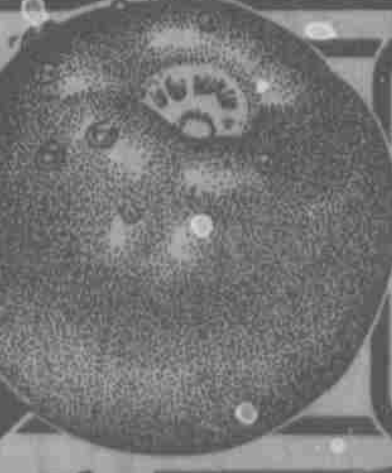
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
