Information On Social Security

Workers over age 65 who have not yet applied for Social Security benefits have been advised to contact the Social Security District Office and file application now even though they do not plan to retire right away.

Vernon W. Daniel, Social Security district manager in Paris, explained that filing at age 65 may protect some rights not otherwise assured. He stated that a number of people continue to lose some benefits by not filing earlier, especially those whose total earnings are in the medium to lower brackets, and even if no benefits at all are payable right away, there is an advantage in having your claim already approved when you actually do retire some years later.

Comes Out Against Investigating Prize Fighting And Beauty Contests

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur apparently doesn't take prize fighting too seriously, his letter this week indicates.

Dear Editor: While I don't understand boxing, what I mean is, the way I get it is, if Clay had Liston hard enough the fight fans would have been satisfied, whether the fight lasted one minute or thirty, but a gentle tap about like you'd use to get a cat off the dining table if you allow cats in the house makes everybody unhappy and feeling cheated, still the thing about the whole affair is the clamor for an investigation.

It's a fact, fight fans are demanding that the fight be investigated, and several Washington officials have risen to the call.

What they say is, here Liston and Clay have fought twice, for a total of about four minutes, and the fans have paid out over eight million dollars to see it, either first-hand or on closed-circuit television, and they are tired of getting cheated and Congress ought to do something about it.

This is what I don't understand. If the fans are convinced the fights are fakes, why trouble

Congress to pass a law to keep them from wasting their money? Why don't they just stay away? Why don't they allow nature to take its course? When a football team loses nine games in a row, how many fans show up for the tenth one?

I tell you, when Congress takes on the job of passing laws to keep the public from wasting its money on phony entertainment, it'll be tied up from now on. In fact, if it succeeded, it'd wreck television.

Personally, I've always figured picking the world's champion boxer was about like picking Miss America. There's no such thing as the prettiest girl in the United States, anymore than there's such a thing as the world's best refrigerator. After a refrigerator manages to hold the temperature inside it at 38 degrees night and day, anything beyond that is ridiculous. There are thousands of girls in this country, each as pretty as the other, but the ritual requires one to be selected. I doubt if there's anything worth investigating.

However, if I was a Congressman, I believe I'd rather try to find out what's wrong with boxing than what the answer is to Viet Nam. Yours faithfully A. A.

Austin. — Political and Legislative history has been written in the 59th lawmaking session just ended.

Highlights: A \$3,600,000,000 budget providing for expanded services in every area of state government and affecting every citizen.

Record improvements in higher education, including creation of the powerful coordinating board for Texas colleges and universities.

A \$101,000,000 salary raise for school teachers, \$70,000,000 of which will be paid by the state.

A sweeping overhaul in the entire system of state mental hospital and tuberculosis control administration.

Major public welfare expansion, including a proposed constitutional amendment to permit full state participation in the new federal medical care program for the aged, blind and disabled. A provision of the amendment would qualify non-citizens who have lived in the state for 25 years or more.

Overhaul and extension of the state's program for water control and development.

Congressional and legislative redistricting which will change the makeup and complexion of future legislatures, shifting the balance of power from rural to urban areas.

If voters approve proposed constitutional amendments, the Senate will be enlarged from 31 to 39 members and terms of the governor and other statewide-elected officials now limited to two years, as well as those of state representatives, will be extended to four years.

Gov. John Connally emerged as the most powerful governor in modern Texas history.

WHAT IT WILL COST — Despite its record achievements, the 59th session handed a relatively modest tax bill to Texas citizens. Cigarette smokers will bear virtually the entire share of the cost. Tax was increased from eight to 11 cents a pack — the na-

tions' highest state rate. This will raise \$70,000,000 to \$73,400,000 in new money during the coming biennium.

A one-time gain of \$6,000,000 will be achieved by setting of a 15 months-from - date - of - death limitation on payment of the inheritance tax.

Teacher pay raise also will require financing at the local level. Present estimate is that the owner of a \$15,000 home will pay \$2.52 more in annual property taxes to school districts.

ILLS PASSED — Among the new laws passed during the final days of the regular session of the 59th Legislature were:

Continuation of the Bay Study Committee, which is concentrating on the problems of water pollution;

Regulation of the taking and processing of oysters and other shellfish for sale;

Creation of Permian State College, if higher education coordinating board approves, at Odessa;

Asking members of Congress from Texas to vote for keeping the section of the Taft-Hartley Law which permits Texas to outlaw closed union shops;

Prohibition of the use of .22 caliber rimfire ammunition to hunt deer, elk, antelope and wild sheep in counties not regulated by the Parks and Wildlife Commission;

Prevention of city councils from making residence within the city limits a condition of employment;

Legalization of free games on pinball machines;

Requirement for testing of all babies born in Texas for phenylketonuria (PKU), an inborn error in system which, if uncorrected, causes brain damage;

Parents liability up to \$5,000 for malicious and wanton damage by their children.

WOMEN'S JOB CORPS CENTER PROPOSED — McKinney Veterans Hospital would be used as a women's job corps center, if application of Texas Education Agency is granted.

Request was made contingent on closing of the hospital facility. However, Congressman Ray Roberts of McKinney is appealing decision to close the hospital.

Application calls for center with initial 600 enrollees and a staff of 275. A grant of \$3,600,000 is sought for program beginning August 1, with average participation of 500 enrollees per month.

Hospital has 100 acres of land and 100 buildings.

PRESS RIGHTS UPHELD — A conference committee report on the new Code of Criminal Procedure, which contained the nation's toughest restrictions on pre-trial news coverage, was rejected.

Revised information restriction states: "It is the duty of the trial court, the attorney representing the state, the attorney representing the accused, and all peace officers to so conduct themselves as to assure to the defendant a fair trial upon the presumption of innocence and at the same time afford the public the benefits of a free press."

A legislative resolution directs a study in the area of information on pre-trial activities.

SHORT SNOTS

A filibuster by Sen. Bill Moore of Bryan during the critical final days of the session kept from passage a bill by Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress, which would have directed the Texas A&M University to turn down applications for admission by women, other than members of the families of faculty and students and women who want to take courses not offered elsewhere.

Killed in the Senate was the bill which would have required that county tax assessor-collector levy and collect a property tax on automobiles and prohibiting license plates from being issued until the tax was paid.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Quail Hatchery at Tyler is shipping bobwhite quail to be used by game wardens in supplying owner stocking requests.

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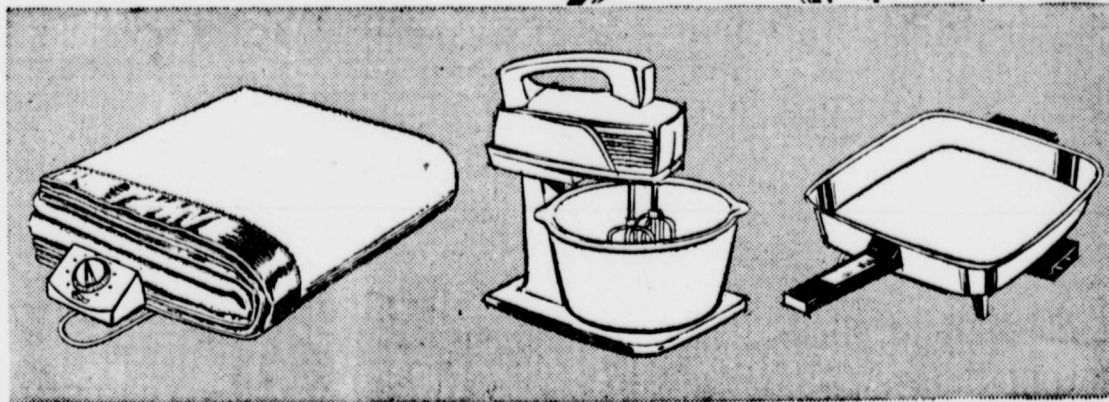
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
