And a Howdy to you, too

A good Texan will deny it with strong language, but the greeting "howdy!" isn't copyrighted by the Lone Star state. It is, however, totally appropriated in this most blessed of places to live.

"Howdy!" with a 'y' belongs more to the southwest, probably, than to anyone else, but the dictionary better recognizes the Scotch and English slang 'howdie' - a contraction of the greeting 'how do ye?' used in northern England and Scotland.

We may not spell it so good in Texas, but the word 'howdy' means something over all these several hundred thousand square miles, including downtown Dallas. It's like the Alamo and San Jacinto. Don't mess with it.

You can stow that Middle English 'how do ye?' Our 'howdy' means, plainly, 'how you all?' and how are all your kinfolks too! It's a greeting with substance, a fraternal password for those who rank William B. Travis at the top of military commanders, above Napoleon, Julius Caesar, Genghis Khan - all those troops who had room to retreat.

For Texans, Travis and his 183 heroes still stand at the Alamo, rooted in eternal glory.

But we digress. The greeting 'howdy' is matched by Texas responses that vary over the state.

A West Texas cotton farmer is likely to reply to the salutation with 'fair to middlin' - an answer meaning that things are grading out pretty well, thank you kindly!

In the oil patch, the pleasant rejoinder is 'Running high, lookin' good.' The pay zone is showing up higher than the geology indicated and the show of oil is strong.

Along the border the answer is likely to be 'bueno' or 'muy bueno!' That, of course, is Spanish for 'good' or 'very good' - but even a Texan raised along the Rio Grande cannot impart to those words the warmth and vigor that Hispanics do naturally.

The cheerful 'buenos dias!' interchanges with 'howdy' through much of South Texas, and properly so. That greeting is part of the valued heritage Texas carries over from the days when Mexico was its parent country.

The less expressive 'have a good day' that Anglos use is a pale substitute for a hearty 'buenos dias!'

There are places in this country where people do not swap greetings as a matter of daily living, this happens in the busier parts of the Lone Star state, and the day loses something by the omissions.

A whole lot more is packed into that 5-letter word. What it says is: You are in Texas, friend, and in Texas we all are friends. Welcome to another day in God's chosen land!

You can even wave it, as Texans do from car to car, as a matter of habit. People who are blessed should share the good feeling, and we do.

People wave between vehicles in other parts of the United States, sometimes in a meaningful way and without using all their fingers. This greeting has varied geographic names, but here we call it an 'Oklahoma salute!'

To wrap this up... a hearty 'howdy' and 'buenos dias!'

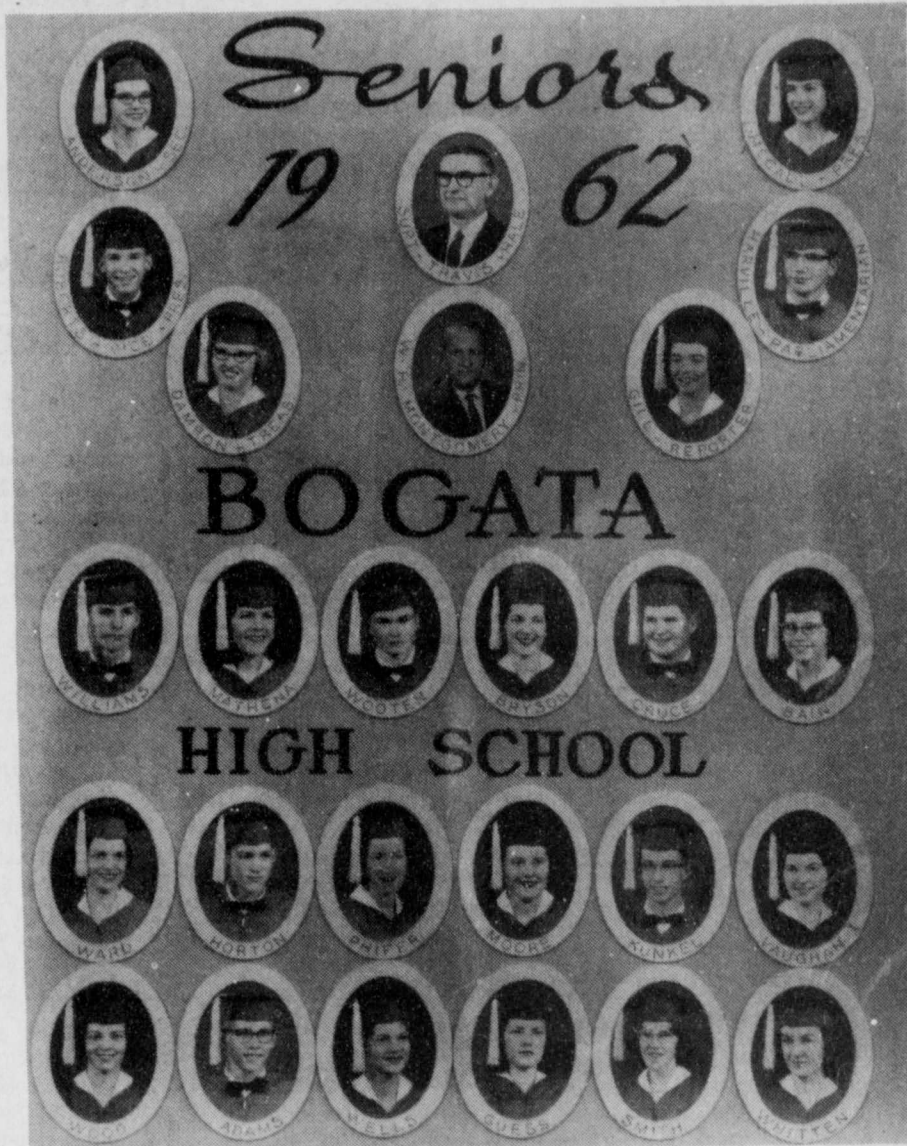

58 Votes In Runoff At Bogata

With no countywide or local level office on the ballot, Bogata, Joliet, Fulbright and Rosalie Democrats were small in number at the runoff primary balloting Saturday.

A total of 58 votes were reported cast at the Bogata city hall, which served as a consolidated voting precinct for the four communities.

Area voters had only a district runoff for state representative and four statewide races on which to make a ballot decision.

Countywide, only about 1,100 Red River County Democrats showed up for marking ballots in the runoff. Most of those were in Pct. 2, the Bagwell-Detroit area, where Jackie Ray Barton won the runoff duel with Bobby Yarbrough as the Democratic nominee for county commissioner from Pct. 2.

Barton, who resides in Bagwell, had trailed Yarbrough in the May primary but came through with a 411 to 349 vote victory in the unofficial results. With no Republican challenger on the November ballot, Barton will succeed Clifford Ritchie in the commissioner's chair. Ritchie was appointed to the

The youth, son of Lindy and Tana Guest of Bogata, suffered critical injuries when a heavy butcher block table toppled over on top of him. He is listed in critical condition in the ICU at Presbyterian Hospital in Dallas.

The Stewart Mobile Blood Unit will be in Bogata from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. on Friday, June 11 for blood donations. They will be located at the Razor's Edge and Pat's Place parking lot in Bogata for the convenience of those wishing to donate blood.

to elect former Talco banker Ronnie Logan of Wilkinson as their nominee for county commissioner in Titus County Pct. 3.

Logan scored a 133 vote margin victory, 590 to 477, over Roy Price in the runoff primary for the county commissioner's nomination on the Democratic ticket. Logan will now face Republican Hill Nichols in the November general election.

The Logan-Price runoff was one of three local precinct level runoff elections on the Saturday balloting for Talco area voters, in addition to the countywide runoff for county judge, a district runoff for state representative and four state level offices.

Bill R. Harper won the county judge runoff with Jimmy R. Shields although Talco voters gave a heavy endorsement to Shields.

Johnny Mac Brown defeated Hubert Martin in the runoff for Pct. 3 justice of the peace and Jack Daniel won over Steve Stevens in the runoff for Pct. 3 constable.

Logan won five of the seven voting boxes in his win over Price. Talco voters supported Logan by a 193-48 count; while he also won at Wilkinson, 119-36; at Bridges Chapel, 30-26; the county clerk's office, 130-103; and the absentee box, 32-16.

Price was a 180-57 winner at Argo and won at Harts Bluff, 68-29.

In the JP runoff, Brown won all voting boxes except at Harts Bluff where Martin scored a narrow 50-44 edge. Talco voters gave a 170-64 support to Brown. The final count on a precinct wide basis was 638 votes for

Talco Phone Rates Go Up

New and higher monthly telephone rates for Talco customers went into effect June 4, although the rate hikes, from 65 cents to \$1.75 per month, are subject to refund.

General Telephone Company of the Southwest announced it was placing the systemwide rate changes in effect on the June 4 date, under statutory authority granted by the Texas Legislature, to reduce revenue losses that it claims are in excess of \$4-million a month.

For Talco telephone customers, the one party residence charge goes up 65 cents, from \$6.95 per month to \$7.60 per month.

One party business phones at Talco are increased by \$1.75 from \$18.30 per month to \$20.05.

And he didn't falter, even after he clinched the title. He finished the year with \$7,810.57. The runnerup in bareback riding was Brian Base of Brookville, Kan., who earned only \$4,975.42.

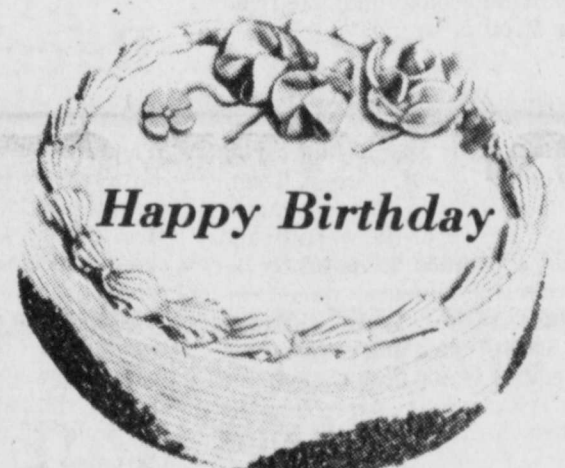

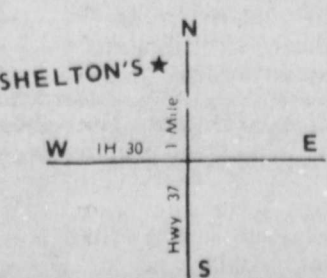

Threadfins From Lake Monticello Go To Oklahoma

Three Oklahoma reservoirs have been stocked with threadfin shad captured below the Lake Monticello dam near Mt. Pleasant.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists assisted Oklahoma crews in netting the shad, a prized forage fish which is subject to winter die-offs in cold water lakes.

More than 40,000 of the three to four inch long shad were caught on Texas Utilities Generating Co. property which is closed to fishing.

Threadfins are more desirable than the harder gizzard shad as forage, because they remain small enough to be eaten by

predator fish such as bass throughout the shad's life cycle.

Netting and relocation of threadfins from one lake to another in Texas has proven to be inexpensive and beneficial technique for enhancing sport fish production, according to biologist Bruce Hysmith of Denison.

Daniel won all of the voting boxes in the precinct as he scored a 656-304 win over Stevens. Talco voters gave Daniel a 127-98 win.

Harper was a 320 vote winner over Shields in the unofficial countywide tabulation on the county judge runoff. Shields, however, compiled a better than 3 to 1 edge in Talco, 185-54; and also won the Wilkinson box, 112-42.

Attorney Sam Russell of Mt. Pleasant defeated Gary Willeford of Hughes Springs in the Democratic runoff as the nominee for state representative of District 8, a position being vacated by Buck Florence of Hughes Springs.

Russell, who lost only Cass and Camp counties on a district wide basis, easily won his home Titus County by a 3,270 to 911 vote count. Talco voters supported Russell by a 189-43 vote. The Mt. Pleasant attorney will now face Republican Mike Ellis of Daingerfield in the November finals.

In addition to the county commissioner's job in Pct. 3, Titus County Democrats in two other precincts also selected their party nominees. Loyd Clark won in Pct. 4 and James C. Thomas won in a Pct. 2 runoff. Logan, however, is the only Democrat commissioner candidate with a Republican rival in the general election.

The large ballot of runoff races at the county and precinct level, along with the state representative race, resulted in a record for absentee voting in a second runoff, according to the county clerk's office. Some 240 absentee ballots were cast in the runoff, more than the number cast in the May primary.

Texas Legislature, a utility can place rates in effect 125 days after filing a request if final action by the Texas Public Utilities Commission (PUC) has not been taken. Rates placed in effect under the procedure are subject to refund, including interest on the difference, if any, between the interim rates and those ultimately approved by the PUC.

However, if the commission were to approve higher rates, the company is not able to collect the difference.

In a statement issued to the Talco Times, E.L. Langley, president of General Telephone said: "We have lost eight months of badly needed revenues as we go through the lengthy process of assembling data, filing the paperwork, holding hearings and other requirements."

"To delay placing rates in effect until a final order is issued, probably in August, would mean we would not begin collecting any new revenues until September, resulting in even greater losses."

Langley says General's losses will continue "even with the interim rates since we did not place all of the recommended rates in effect on June 4. However, this amount will help reduce our losses."

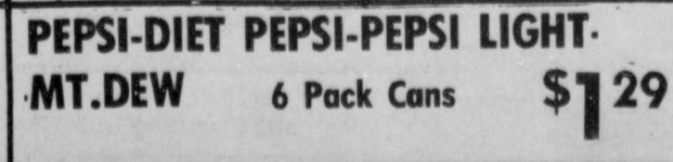
