TIGERS WIN BASKETBALL CROWN

New School Trustee

Leslie Darsey Is Named to Board

A new board of education member was appointed and present coaches and principals were offered contract renewals Monday night at the monthly meeting of McLean trustees.

Leslie Darsey, area rancher, was named by the board to complete the unexpired term of Tom Greenwood, who has moved to Post.

Darsey will serve the year remaining in Greenwood's term.

Coach Derral Davis, Assistant Coach Lloyd Hunt and grade school coach R. L. Cline were offered new one-year contracts by the board, as were high school Principal Robert L. Green and grade school Principal Jack Riley.

All contracts are the same as the five men are employed under at present. No increases in salary were given by the trustees.

PE Program

The board also discussed setting up a wider physical education program in the grade school, but took no immediate action.

However, the teaching of Spanish in grades two through six was approved, with the program to begin next year.

Supt. Lee Welch explained that he is unable to acquire Spanish textbooks at the present time.

A request for permission to construct a permanent Little League baseball park in its present location west of Duncan Field was okayed by the board of education, which owns the property.

No Parking Interference

Roy Hess and Don Blair, representing the Lions Club, appeared before the board to make the request.

School trustees said they had no objection to making the park permanent, provided the baseball field doesn't interfere with parking facilities for athletic events at Duncan Field.

Home plate is to be located in the northwest corner of the property, and the construction of bleachers on the west side is planned.

Election April 7

Saturday, April 7, was set as the date for the school trustee election this year, and Mr. and Mrs. Homer Abbott and Mrs. E. L. Price were named voting officials.

Three trustees will be elected. The three-year terms of Spencer Sitter, Faris Hess and Dr. Joe Suderman expire this year.

In other action, the board voted to permit seniors to be away from school four days during their annual field trip; authorized Coach Davis to spend approximately \$100 for warmup suits for track participants; and granted Davis permission to attend a coaching clinic in Dallas this weekend, but authorized no expense money.

FACTORY TO BUILD DOCK

Marie Foundations was granted an easement by the city commission Tuesday night to construct an enclosed loading dock on the west side of the present factory building.

Cal Fraser, owner of the factory, asked in a letter to the governing board for the easement in order that the loading dock may be built over part of city-owned property.

Fraser explained that the enclosed dock was especially needed in inclement weather.

City Attorney Don Lane was instructed by the commission to prepare the easement.

Alldermen also voted to call the city election for Tuesday, April 3, and authorized Mayor John C. Haynes to select election officials.

3 to Be Elected

Three alldermen are to be elected. Incumbents whose terms expire this spring are Joe Burroughs, Creed Lamb Jr. and Roy Barker.

Mayor Haynes informed the commission that the city had received permission from El Paso Natural Gas Co. to connect onto the El Paso line for emergency purposes.

Permission was requested last month after it was discovered during extremely cold weather that the city's gas wells were not producing a sufficient amount of gas to meet the demand.

Gas pressure dropped during the heavy consumption period, and some sections of the city were without gas for a time when temperatures plunged below zero.

To meet this emergency, a well near the city owned by Frank Storm of Amarillo was connected to the city gas lines.

Letter From Owner

The mayor read a letter from Storm stating that he had no objection to the action, which had been taken without the owner's knowledge.

Under emergency conditions, permission is not necessary and city officials decided to connect lines to the well after being unable to contact Storm by telephone.

More than 500,000 cubic feet of gas was used from the well.

No gas will be used from the El Paso lines except in emergencies.

The commission approved a request from the Lovett Memorial Library board to remove flood lights on the west side of the library building.

The library board pointed out that the lights are of no benefit now, and stated a desire that a fenced area be maintained where the floodlights are now located.

Invocation at Tuesday night's commission meeting was by Rev. Dan Bell, pastor of the McLean First Baptist Church.

Future Farmers To Hold Parent-Son Banquet on Friday

L. L. (Red) Males, Cheyenne, Okla., banker, will present his color slide-illustrated talk at the event, to be held in the Methodist Church at 7 p. m.

Special guests will be parents of the FFA members.

Friday will mark the second time Males has spoken in McLean. Last fall he was guest speaker at the Lion Club's Farmer-Rancher Day program.

Long a leader in the conservation movement, Males is vice chairman of the Upper Washita Soil Conservation District in Oklahoma, where the first upstream flood control project in the world is located.

The banquet here will kick off locally the observance of National FFA Week, Feb. 17-24.

Master of ceremonies for the banquet will be Ernie McCracken. The speaker will be introduced by Edgar Bailey.

Others with parts on the program are: Jim Weatherford, high school vocational agriculture instructor and FFA advisor; review of the chapter's accomplishments; Mike Johnson, conferring of honorary FFA degrees on persons selected by the boys for assisting with their program; Ronnie McCracken, welcome address; Max Coleman, introduction of guests; Joe Taylor, honoring of mothers.

HESS SEEKS RE-ELECTION

Faris Hess filed for re-election to the board of education Tuesday, becoming the first incumbent school official to announce for a new term.

Jim Hathaway, owner of Master Cleaners, filed this morning, bringing the number thus far making bids at four for the school board and two for city commission.

Bob Willoughby and Ernest Watson filed for the board of education earlier, while Creed Lamb Jr. and Jack Shelton are candidates for the city commission.

Three positions are to be filled on each of the boards.

The terms of Hess, Spencer Sitter and Dr. Joe Suderman are expiring on the school board this year. Aldermen whose terms expire are Lamb, Joe Burroughs and Roy Barker.

School trustees are elected for three years and alldermen for two years.

The city election is scheduled for Tuesday, April 3, with the filing period ending on March 3. The school balloting will be Saturday, April 7, and the filing period closes March 8.

Basketball Royalty Crowned at Rally

The 1961-62 basketball king and queen were crowned Tuesday afternoon during a pep rally in the high school gymnasium.

Mary Ann Carter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wheeler Carter, was named queen and Jim Watson, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Watson, was chosen king.

Miss Carter was presented a gift by Kenny Willingham, co-captain of the Tiger basketball squad, and Watson received a gift from Phyllis Flowers, a Tigrette co-captain.

The Tiger Band, directed by Jim Boyd, played pep songs for the rally, and the cheerleaders led the student body in several yells.

Meet White Deer Monday Night

The McLean High School Tigers annexed the District 2-A basketball championship Tuesday night—to go with their football crown—and they'll clash with the White Deer Bucks next Monday in Pampa for the bi-district representative's place in the regional tournament.

Scheduled for 7:30 p. m. in the Pampa High School gymnasium, the game will decide which of the two district winners will enter the regional competition at 9:30 a. m. Saturday, Feb. 24, in the Texas Tech Coliseum in Lubbock.

The victor there will go to the state tournament the following Friday and Saturday in Austin.

Coach Derral Davis' Tigers polished off Canadian 58-47 for the second time this season Tuesday to become the first McLean team in years to win the district basketball title.

Even though the locals were defeated by Memphis 38-31 last Friday, the Bengals were still named champions of 2-A. They had earlier beaten Memphis 76-47 in the first round of district action.

20th Season Victory

Tuesday's victory gave the Tigers their 20th win of the season against four losses. Three of these defeats came at the hands of the White Deer Bucks.

Kenny Willingham's 18 points were the best effort of the night for McLean. Jim Watson, the team's top scorer for the season, came through with 13. Clyde Windom nine, Tommy Hill eight, Derrith Welch seven and Donnie Woods three.

The Tigers led throughout the contest, with the scores at the quarter marks of 10-7, 27-20 and 43-33.

The Memphis game was a different story.

Weakened by illness, the Tigers started strong but couldn't keep up the pace. They led 15-9 at the close of the first period, but the Cyclone tied it at 21-all at half time then forged in front 31-27 at the three-quarter mark.

Welch Sinks 14

Welch was top man in the Memphis game, scoring 14 points. Watson could manage only three points and Willingham two. Donnie Woods got two, Clyde Windom four and Bill Goldston six.

Coach Lloyd Hunt's Tigertettes fell to Canadian 38-34 in the season finale for them.

Cindy Rice kept the nets swishing with 21 points, followed by Jan Bailey with 11 and Helen Smith with two.

Canadian's S. Petree scored 32 of her team's total points.

McLean took an 11-6 first-quarter lead, and was in front 26-25 at intermission. The visitors tied the score at 31-31 after three quarters.

Dr. Joe Suderman, McLean physician, was reported resting comfortably late Wednesday in the Groom Hospital, where he was admitted Tuesday after suffering a light heart attack.

He was expected to remain in the hospital for several days.

The Lions Club board of directors voted at a breakfast meeting Tuesday morning to hold the horse show on Saturday this year in an effort to attract more outstanding entries.

Haynes encouraged local business men and women to take part in planning the celebration, which through the years has become the biggest annual event in McLean.

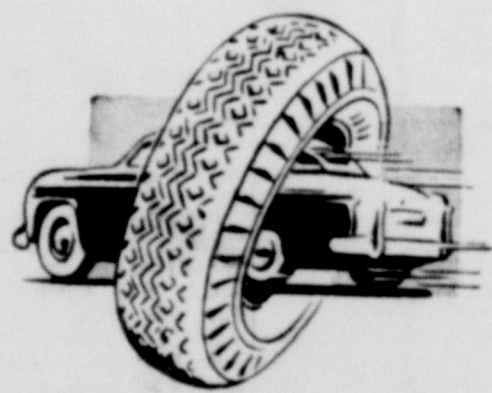

SPECIAL KIND OF LANGUAGE

Ever occur to you how often on the telephone you say "Thanks for Calling" and "I'll Call You Back" . . . or "Give Me a Ring"? Probably not, for these like many other expressions we use almost every day have become as commonplace to us as "Good Morning" or "How Are You?"

SCREWORM PROGRAM
Guy Beasley reports that \$936.50 has been raised through donations to the Gray County animal health committee.

The mother organization is the Southwest Animal Health Foundation, which was organized to combat many of the problems facing the livestock man.

Their primary goal is to eradicate the screwworm.
Guy says he believes over \$1,500 will be raised in this county. Many of the committeemen working on the drive have collections to turn in. Several in the Pampa vicinity have good collections they will turn in shortly.

On Feb. 14, three delegates from this county flew to Austin for a state meeting. A progress report was expected at that time.

Due to extremely cold weather the screwworm program has been stepped up. If plans go as anticipated, we could have a screwworm-free year in 1962. This is what is expected.

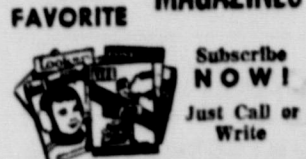
