HOOVER URGES EARLY ACTION FROM CONGRESS

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE IS GIVEN TODAY

TARIFF, TAX CUT AND PRO LAW AID ARE GIVEN STRESS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—A speedy end to the tariff controversy, prompt tax reduction and strengthening of prohibition enforcement were urged upon congress today by President Hoover in his first message on the state of the union.

A score of other proposals were contained in a twelve thousand word document which the chief executive sent to the House and Senate for reading by the clerks and in which he gave account of his nine month's stewardship in the White House.

Message in Plain
Most of the message was plain, matter-of-fact recital of what he has done and hopes to do, but he resorted to strong language in dealing with prohibition and law enforcement, a subject which he frequently has stressed since taking office.

Calling for cooperation of the average citizen in making statutes effective, the president said that the attitude of the man who selects the particular laws he will obey "may obscure, but can not conceal, the ugly truth that the lawbreaker, whoever he may be, is the enemy of society."

Stands Square
Mr. Hoover stood squarely on the position he took at the opening of the special session when he asked for tariff rates beneficial to agriculture and to industries which have not been prosperous and put into official language his known desire for a 1 per cent reduction on individual income and corporation taxes.

Once again he asked that the broad principle of the flexible tariff, by which the executive may order rate changes upon recommendation of the tariff commission, be retained. The Senate has voted that this power should lodge with Congress.

Urges Early Action
The president, in making his suggestions to a Congress which has been widely divided over the tariff

The fire continued to fight flames that swept its decks. The ship's captain, Henry Bushe, estimated damage to the vessel and cargo at \$500,000.

BORGER MEN MAKE BONDS

BAILS RANGING FROM \$5,000 TO \$10,000 DRAWN IN CASE

AMARILLO, Dec. 3.—Most of the sixteen men charged in federal warrants with violation of the national prohibition law in Hutchinson county were free today on bonds ranging from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

Three of those charged, former sheriff, Joe Ownbey, E. T. Blasingame and John Harkness, had not been served with the warrants. Harkness is in the penitentiary. Those released and the bonds demanded follow: Glen A. Pace, former mayor of Borger, \$10,000; Bill Milhollon, Cal Baird and Jim Crane, former deputy sheriffs of Hutchinson county, \$10,000; Sam Jones, former deputy constable, \$10,000; Johnny Jones, former probation officer, \$5,000; R. T. Macey, H. C. Taylor, E. L. Lantion, Louis Weltzman, Louis Crim, and C. A. Mitchell, \$5,000. Bond for Ownbey was set at \$10,000. Bond for Jack Payne, once a deputy sheriff, Blasingame and Harkness were set at \$5,000.

Although the warrants merely charged conspiracy, avoiding all details, it was said all of the men were charged with belonging to the same liquor ring.

EDSEL FORD ANNOUNCES WAGE INCREASE TO U. S. EMPLOYEES

DETROIT, Dec. 3.—(P)—Wage increases that will add approximately \$20,000,000 a year to the payroll of the Ford Motor company were announced today by Edsel Ford, president of the company. The minimum wage of \$6 a day is increased to \$7 a day and increases graduating on the basis of five cents an hour were given employees already receiving between \$7 and \$10 a day.

The increase, effective Dec. 1, is confined to employees within the United States. Of these, 115,648 come in the classification of increases of five cents an hour to all employees who have been receiving \$7 or more per day.

Number 24,320
Those whose minimum wage will be increased from \$6 to \$7 a day number at the present 24,320. The increase is in line with the announcement recently made by Henry Ford at Washington during President Hoover's business conference.

The wage increase from a minimum of \$6 a day to \$7 is a third major step of this kind taken by the company since January, 1914.

At that time the company started the industrial world by raising the scale from an average of \$2.34 a day to a minimum of \$3. This increase generally was considered a radical industrial move and many economists contended it could not be successfully accomplished.

Simultaneously the company reduced the working day from nine hours to eight hours. The increase

SEARCH ON FOR AVIATOR

FIVE PLANES AND MANY MEN SEEKING LOST PILOT TODAY

CLARION, Pa., Dec. 3.—A search by air for Thomas P. Nelson, missing New York to Cleveland air mail pilot, was renewed today in a snow storm that blanketed the wooded, mountainous country where the flier was lost to a depth of six inches.

Five planes took off from the Clarion airport this morning to hunt over the territory covered by the air mail route from Bellefonte, Pa., to Cleveland.

No Definite Report
Whereabouts of the mail pilot was a matter of conjecture as the planes set out. While there were numerous reports of a plane passing the darkness early yesterday, there was no definite report of Nelson after he passed Brookville on his way westward to Cleveland, shortly after midnight Monday.

NEGRO HURT IN FALL FROM HILTON HOTEL

A. W. UPDAK DROPS 25 FEET IN HOTEL; IS SERIOUSLY HURT

A. W. Updack, 48, negro, was seriously injured about 1 o'clock this afternoon when he fell down the elevator shaft of the new Hilton hotel, under construction at the corner of Main and Texas.

Updack, an employee of the McKee Construction company, had started up the stairs of the building and thinking the elevator shaft was the stairway, stepped off into space to land in the basement of the building, a drop of about 25 feet. He was rushed to the Lubbock sanitarium in a Bynum Brothers ambulance where an examination showed him to be suffering of a compound fracture of the left femur and severe bruises about the body.

On the operating table Updack stated that he was almost blinded when he stepped from the outside into the darkness of the building and that he could not see the stairway.

To Elect Officers

Included in the program are a discussion of whether the association shall maintain a bureau at Austin, conducted by a paid representative, who shall maintain an office for use of Texas cities for obtaining information, and also to all matters pertaining to bonds and other questions in which Texas municipalities may be interested; another discussion of whether Texas villages, towns and cities should participate in license fees collected by the state on automobiles and trucks, and also in the collection of gasoline, R. S. Sterling of Houston, chairman of the state highway commission, will lead the latter discussion in which City Attorney W. W. Brown of Texasarkana, Sam Neathery of Houston and W. Glover of Dallas will participate.

The closing day of the convention Gov. Dan Moody is to address delegates on "The Attitude of the Governor" toward public utilities.

Missionary Is Freed By Chinese Bandits

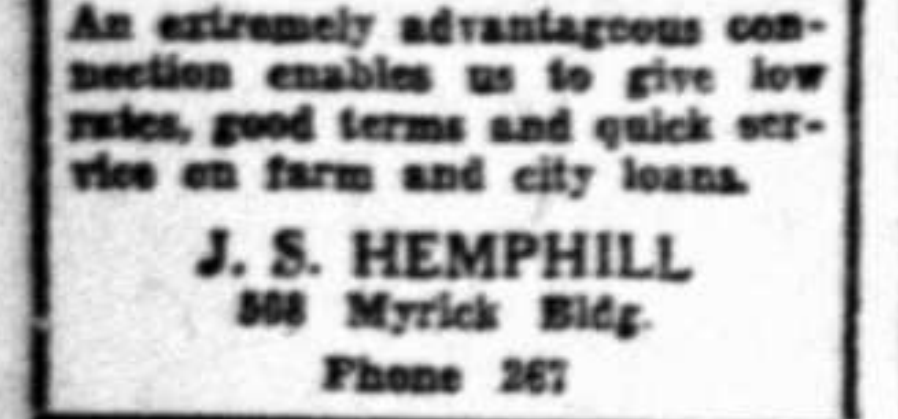

Supreme Court Acts

On Case Petitions

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (P)—Two decisions in cases from California and Montana handed down Monday by the Supreme Court stood out in a short session which saw seven cases accepted for review, and fifteen petitions for review denied.

Dividing six to three, the court held there was no contract binding the Los Angeles Railway corporation to operate street car lines in that city on a five cent fare, and affirmed the decision of a three judge court granting a seven cent rate or four tokens for 25 cents.

At the request of the Northern Pacific and three other railroads, the court ordered a three judge court to decide whether rates fixed for Montana by the state railroad commissioners were valid. The action of the court will have the effect of suspending the new rates pending the decision.

DELUGE OF BILLS FLOOD HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES HOPPER

TOTAL OF 675 UP
BEFORE GROUP IN
FIRST SESSION

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Representatives dropped bills into the House hopper today with a rapidity rivaling the sheet beating upon the huge skylight above the chamber.

In contrast, not a single measure was introduced during the nine minute session of the senate. Those having bills there were forced to withhold them for lack of opportunity to get them in.

Total is 675
More than ten measures a minute were introduced in the house, the total being 675. This brought the total for the Seventy First Congress there to more than 6,100.

Representatives sought additions to or changes in laws touching on International, National and sectional topics. Some dealt with, were inquiry into the Chinese-Soviet troubles, registration of lobbyists, highway improvement, prohibition, disposal of the Muscle Shoals project and setting up a permanent Radio Commission.

Almed at Lobbyists
Representative Tinkham, republican, Massachusetts, proposed to require lobbyists to register with the clerk of the house or the secretary of the senate, before they could appear before congressional committees or

otherwise in the interests of any legislation.
President Hoover would be requested to inquire into the possibility of peaceably adjusting the differences between China and the Soviet, under a resolution by Representative Morton D. Hull, republican, Illinois.

Chairman Dowell of the roads committee, proposed an increase of \$50,000,000 annually for federal highway aid, making a total outlay of \$123,000,000 a year.

Asks Completion
Disposal of Muscle Shoals to a corporation to be set up as was proposed by Representative Katherine Langley, republican, Kentucky. The measure would provide for completion of the project and authorize the leasing corporation to issue preferred stock to finance its operations in production of water power and fertilizers.

Chairman White of the merchant marine committee submitted a bill to continue the life of the Federal Radio Commission until otherwise provided for by law instead of continuing it from year to year.

Representative Iago, democrat, Illinois, introduced the only bill which would provide for repeal of the eighteenth amendment. Modification of the prohibition law was asked by Representative Doyle, democrat, Illinois, who proposed that states wishing to legalize wine and beer would be allowed to do so by referendum.

Another bill dealing with prohibition was offered by Representative Lankford, democrat, Georgia, to au-

thorize payment of pensions to dependents of any federal law enforcement officer killed in discharge of his duties.

Santa Fe To Raise
Wages Of Clerks

GALVESTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—A wage increase of five per cent to the clerical force of the Gulf Colorado and Santa Fe railway company, effective today, was announced by S. C. Kirkpatrick assistant to the general manager in charge of personnel. The increase affects more than 500 division office clerks, station clerks and clerks in the machine shops and mechanical departments in Galveston alone, Mr. Kirkpatrick added. These clerks are paid on a daily basis and the increase will amount to an average of \$7.50 a month for each employee.

Extension Workers
Holding Conference

LLANO, Dec. 3 (AP)—Extension workers of Texas A. and M. College in district four, which includes 28 central Texas counties, opened a two day annual meeting here today under the direction of R. W. Persons, district farm agent, and Miss Kate Adele Hill, district home demonstration agent. Fifty county agents, home demonstration agents and bankers attended the meeting which discussed extension work problems.

MORE ROAD
WORK IN PLANTHREE MORE PROJECTS
TO BE AWARDED IN
DECEMBER MEET

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Dec. 3.—The state highway commission today announced three more projects aggregating 42.5 miles on which contracts will be let at the monthly meeting of the commission December 16-17.

This brought the total of the road construction projects to about 135 miles. In addition, three bridges are scheduled to be contracted for.

The projects announced today follow:

Shackelford county: 17.1 miles of gravel on highway 23 from highway 1-A near Albany to the Throckmorton county line.

Throckmorton county: 13.4 miles of stone base courses on highway 23 from Throckmorton to the Baylor county line.

Waller county: 10 miles of grading and drainage structures on highway 6, from Hempstead to the Harris county line.

Lord Cheylesmore is generally known in Alberta as Captain Francis Henry Ormand Eaton. Miss Sundberg came to Vancouver early in 1927 to take up nursing and was graduated from the general hospital.

Lord Cheylesmore, who is 35, succeeded his father to his title in 1925. He was cited in dispatches during the World War, and won the D. S. O. He once said: "I wouldn't exchange my life as a farm hand in Canada for a king's ransom."

NEW LINE IN
OKLAHOMA IS
BEING ASKEDTULSA MAN APPLIES
FOR RAILROAD IN
NEW AREAS

(By Associated Press)
OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Dec. 3.—Application for authority to build and operate a railroad from McDonald county Missouri, southwest to Waurika, Okla., and to purchase the Southwestern railway, Oklahoma Union railway and Fort Smith and Western railway, was filed with the corporation commission here today by Charles Clay Briggs of Tulsa.

Briggs proposed to connect his new line with the Kansas City Southern rails in McDonald county and to link it with the lines which he would purchase.

The new line would enter Oklahoma in Delaware county, near Grove, and range southwest to connect with the Oklahoma Union tracks at Tulsa. It would follow the Oklahoma Union line to Sapulpa, and thence would turn southwest to connect with the Southwestern railway north of Slick, following this line through Creek and Okmulgee counties.

New rails then would be laid southwestward through Okfuskee county, Seminole county across the corner of Pottawatomie county and into Pontotoc county, thence through Garvin, Murray, Carter, Stephens and Jefferson counties to Waurika.

To Connect With Line
Briggs asked permission to connect with the Wichita Falls and Oklahoma railway lines in Jefferson county and to use the rails of that company for eight miles. The petition requested authority for use of both steam and electricity for locomotion.

The Oklahoma Southwestern road which Briggs asked authority to buy recently applied to the corporation commission for permission to discontinue operation. The road extends from Bristow to Nuyaka.

More than 3,000 men are building the dam for a power plant near Bagwell, Mo. A lake 125 miles long is to be created.

MODERN HOME THAT HINTS OF COLONIAL FARM HOUSE

Written for "A Service" There is a very definite continuity of feeling between the Colonial farm house type exterior and the more modern exterior.

The pervasive aroma of pioneer days is inspired by the knotty pine, the twentieth century substitute for the old Jack pine of Colonial days, used for the woodwork and trim, and the rough finished, hand-troweled plaster walls.

The exterior is of double thick cedar shingles, except around the fireplace, which is rough fieldstone. The roof is of shingles.

Entrance is attractive. There is an attractive entrance hall, which leads both to the living or sleeping quarters. The spacious living room has for its dominant feature a large Colonial fireplace and is subordinated in point of interest by built-in book cases which flank either side of the fireplace.

Knotty pine panelling carries out the Colonial aspect of this room. The floor stained several shades darker than the woodwork should look well with and rug, in pleasantly contrasting tones.

To the left is an up-to-date kitchen, compact in size, arranged with a view to the quick dispatch of housework and fitted with practical modern equipment. It has a bright outlook and should be as gay as possible within—perhaps a refreshing soft green waterproof paint on the walls and the floor linoleum in two shades of green with bright glazed curtains at the windows and wild flowers dotting a lemon background. The furniture of a darker green outlined in black, truly this would be a kitchen one would enjoy working in. A pantry and dining alcove have been worked in this plan, making it part of our living room. The French doors can be entirely omitted, making this a nice sunny corner in which to place a gate leg table and a few Windsor chairs to match the other furnishing of our living room.

As we pass out of the living room through the entrance hall to the sleeping quarters, two large, well-lighted bedrooms with a separating bath compromise this section. Here also are three cedar-lined closets which will delight the housewife.

Such a house built entirely of American homes, especially of Colonial type.

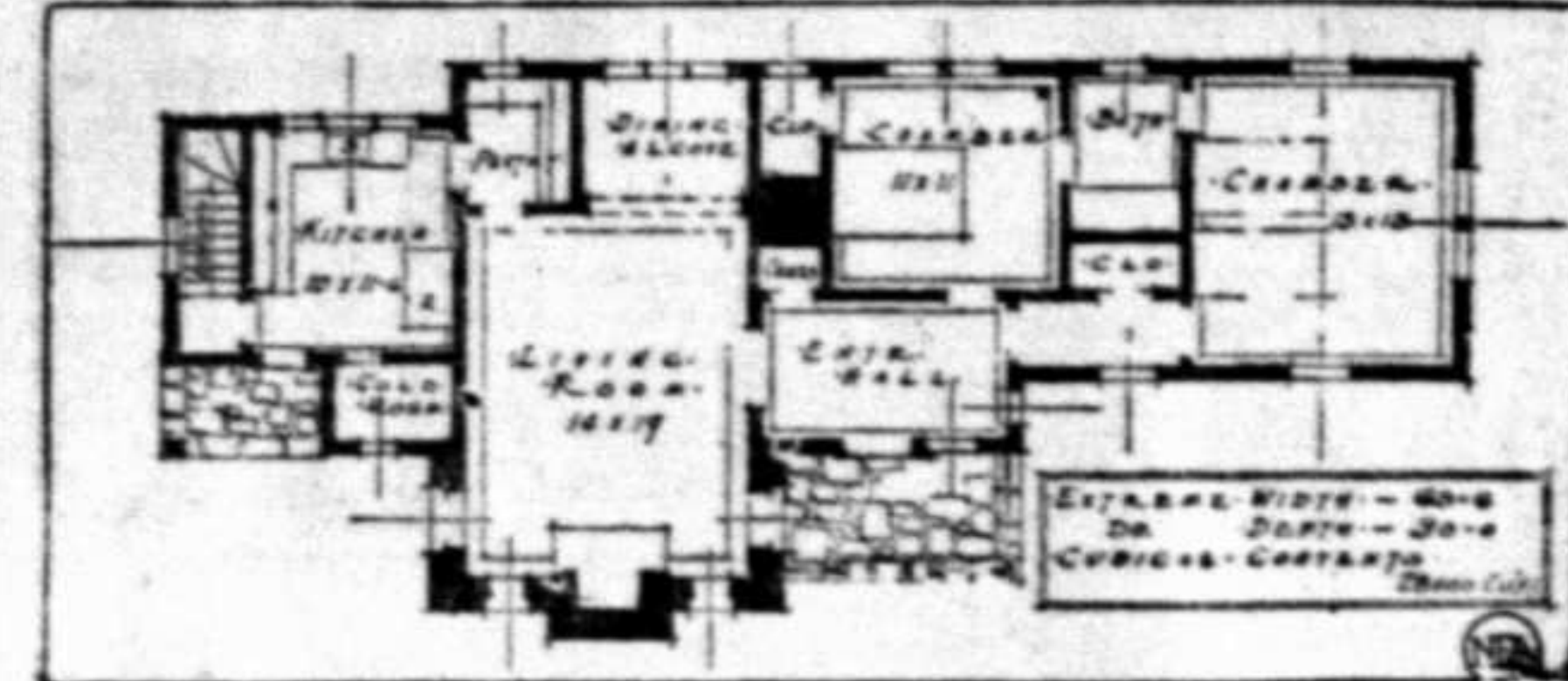

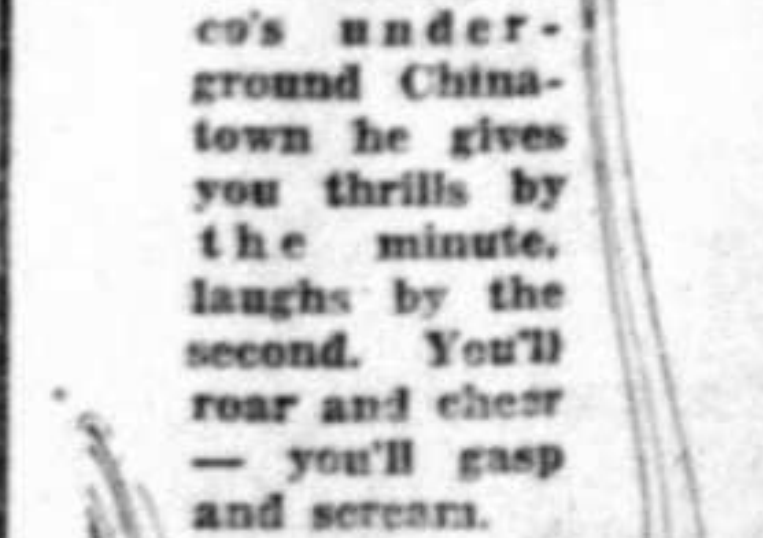
It was voted during the convention to authorize taking \$50,000 from the loan fund of the organization to build a headquarters building in Fort Worth next year.

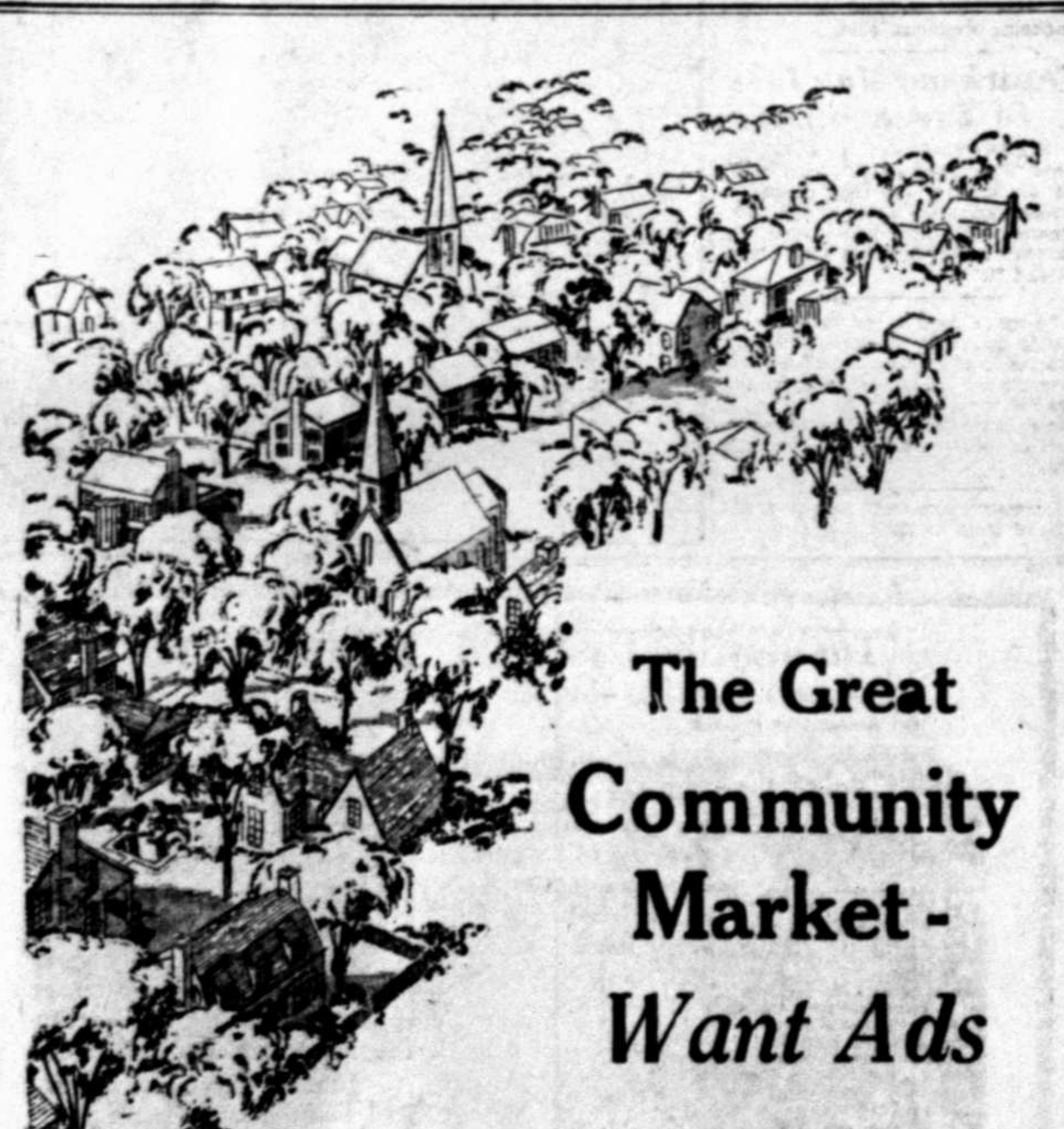

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DISMISSAL IN TRIAL LIKELY

AGED PAIR MAY NOT GO TO TRIAL FOR NEAR POISONING

(By Associated Press)
TEXARKANA, Ark., Dec. 3.—The trial of Mrs. Nancy Lynn, 63 and her sixty-one-year-old brother, Robert Morris, charged with having poisoned a well in an effort to halt the cutting of timber on lands in their family, probably will not get under way here today as scheduled. Prosecutors indicated that they would seek a continuance, or a dismissal of the cases. The aged pair are accused of assault to kill by poison.

Mrs. Lynn and Morris were charged with having placed a pound or more of poison in a well used by a lumber camp. The poison almost caused the death of 23 persons.

Chased Workmen
Mrs. Lynn, testimony at the preliminary trial showed, had tried to prevent sale of timber rights on land owned by her six children, claiming that they were selling her birthright. She was said to have chased workmen from the woods with a shotgun on one occasion.

When the well was poisoned a woman's footprints were found leading from the well to Mrs. Lynn's door. She maintained that she had spent the night in the house and returned a pound of poison she had bought to use on rats to the store where she got it a few days after charges were filed against her. She said that the package had not been opened.

Prosecuting attorneys also indicated that they would move for a continuance in the trial of Ott Larey, former city marshal of Focke, Ark., charged with assault to kill N. C. Colvert last March near Focke. Colvert was shot in the back from ambush. The chief state witness was said to be in prison on a bootlegging sentence.

POISSON AWARDED \$500 IN DAMAGES

DALLAS, Dec. 3 (AP)—Victor Poisson of Dallas, who was struck by one of the bullets which V. Ray Adams, Bartlett farmer, fired at Orville Mathews, bank cashier slain by Adams in an argument over an election bet, was awarded \$500 damages in his suit against Adams here Monday.

One of Adams' bullets struck Poisson in the mouth knocking out his front teeth. He had sued for \$50,000.

Adams was acquitted of the slaying in his second trial after the jury in the first trial had disagreed.

Grain Co-Op Takes First Step In Mart

CHICAGO, Dec. 3 (AP)—First steps toward active participation in the Chicago Grain market, today were taken by the Farmers National Grain corporation with the purchase of the Rural Grain company of Chicago, which will be operated as a subsidiary. Orders in the cash market were also executed. S. J. Cottingham, president, said.

Texarkana Man Dies Of Crash Injuries

TEXARKANA, Dec. 3 (AP)—C. W. Reed, 23, injured last Monday when his automobile was demolished by a passenger train entering the Texarkana yards, died here today. His back was broken and his head bruised and cut.

REVIEW OF THE WEEK'S FOREIGN NEWS

After five months of raids and watchful waiting that threatened many times to break into war, Soviet Russia and the Manchurian government last week began what seemed to be serious negotiations to settle their dispute about the Chinese Eastern railway.

Plenipotentiaries planned to meet at Khabarovsk, Siberia, to discuss terms. Reports affirmed that the Nationalist government had approved the direct contact between Moscow and Mukden.

Accept Conditions
Mukden was said to have accepted two of the three Russian conditions, but opposed reiteration of the Russian manager and vice-manager.

The negotiations followed a large scale punitive raid into Manchuria by Russian troops, who captured thousands of Chinese soldiers and drove the Manchurian armies in flight before them. The Russians later withdrew.

Delegation Sails
The Japanese delegation to the London naval conference sailed for the United States, where the delegates will confer with American officials. The first secretary of the delegation left for Paris by way of Siberia, and will discuss the Franco-Japanese attitude towards submarines.

The labor government made it plain England would not permit discussion of her naval bases in West Indian waters.

Evacuate Rhineland
French troops evacuated the Rhineland city of Coblenz, and the tricolor was hauled down at the famous castle of Ehrenbreitstein. Belgian soldiers began evacuating Aachen.

The German Reichstag voted down the nationalists' bill for rejection of the Young plan, and the bill will go to the people for a referendum on December 22.

The Tiger of France was buried beside his father in the land of his fathers. Clemenceau's wishes for simplicity at his funeral in the Vendee were respected.

The coalition cabinet of Premier Jaques resigned in Belgium after a dispute between the Liberals and the Catholics. The latter include a group of Flemish extremists, who caused the trouble by demanding that the courses at Ghent University be given wholly in Flemish.

A salary of about \$50,000 a year would have been received by the Kansas City grain man, had he accepted the post. In refusing he said, in part: "I am compelled to refuse the tender of responsibility as directing head of the Farmers National Grain corporation because of my sincere conviction that the plan, as at present outlined, will fail."

Davis, former guard of the State Training School for boys here, was recommitted to the Garber county jail here today for 200 days, at the expiration of his 30 day sentence imposed on conviction of assault and battery on Stanley Kelley, 16, former inmate of the institution, who died last summer after Davis beat him.

High school football in Texas enters the quarter finals this week as the champions of the eight Class A districts of the Interscholastic League prepare for the four district championship games. The Amarillo-Breckenridge battle at the Buckaroo stronghold Saturday holds the spotlight in the West section and the Denton-Marshall scrap is the big noise over at Denton. Central High of Fort Worth goes to Waco to meet the Tyson Tigers and the powerful Brownville Eagles face Port Arthur. 1929 runners-up in the other games for the week.

The majority of critics who have seen both Amarillo and Breckenridge in action this season have picked the Buckaroos to walk over the Sandies without much trouble. From our vantage point it looks like a rare battle with the Oil Belt team holding a slight edge, but we can't see a Breckenridge run-away, despite the fact that the game is played at Breckenridge. The Marshall-Denton fry is a toss-up, with the Mavericks doomed to win, but Brownville should walk up the Port Arthur Yellow Jackets handily. If the Waco Tigers were not playing the Central High team on the Cotton Palace gridiron, we would guess Fort Worth without a stammer, but the eight-year tradition will force the cohorts of Bennie Wiggelman to extend themselves to the limit to defeat the Bengals. In spite of this the Panthers should win.

Semi-finals will find the winner of the Amarillo-Breckenridge battle pitted against the victor in the Denton-Marshall scrap and the Waco-Central High winner matched with the winner of the Brownville-Port Arthur game. The final game for the championship of the state will be played a week before Christmas and it now looks like Brownville and Breckenridge.

Up at Amarillo the boys who write the publicity for the Golden Sandies are all steamed up because scribbles over the state have repeatedly mentioned that Lubbock should be representing District One instead of Amarillo. Much of this is based upon the simple fact that the Westerners outplayed the Sandies for approximately 50 minutes of the Nov. 3 clash between the two teams. The fellow who blows with the Golden Sandstorm comes back with a few quotations on scores, which he should know means nothing. Does manufactured from comparative scores is invariably used when no other comparison can be used. The fact that Lubbock made monkeys of the Wichita Falls boys, who only defeated them, 6-0 while the Sandies took the Covettes into camp to the tune of 27-0 means nothing. We might be able to show by comparative scores that Texas Tech is on a par with Syracuse, but the comparison is absurd. Here's how Tech tied McMurry, Howard Payne tied McMurry, S. M. Y., Johnnie Walker, Cup team, and Tony Manero, New York, finishing in a tie for third, one stroke behind the titleholder from Agua Caliente.

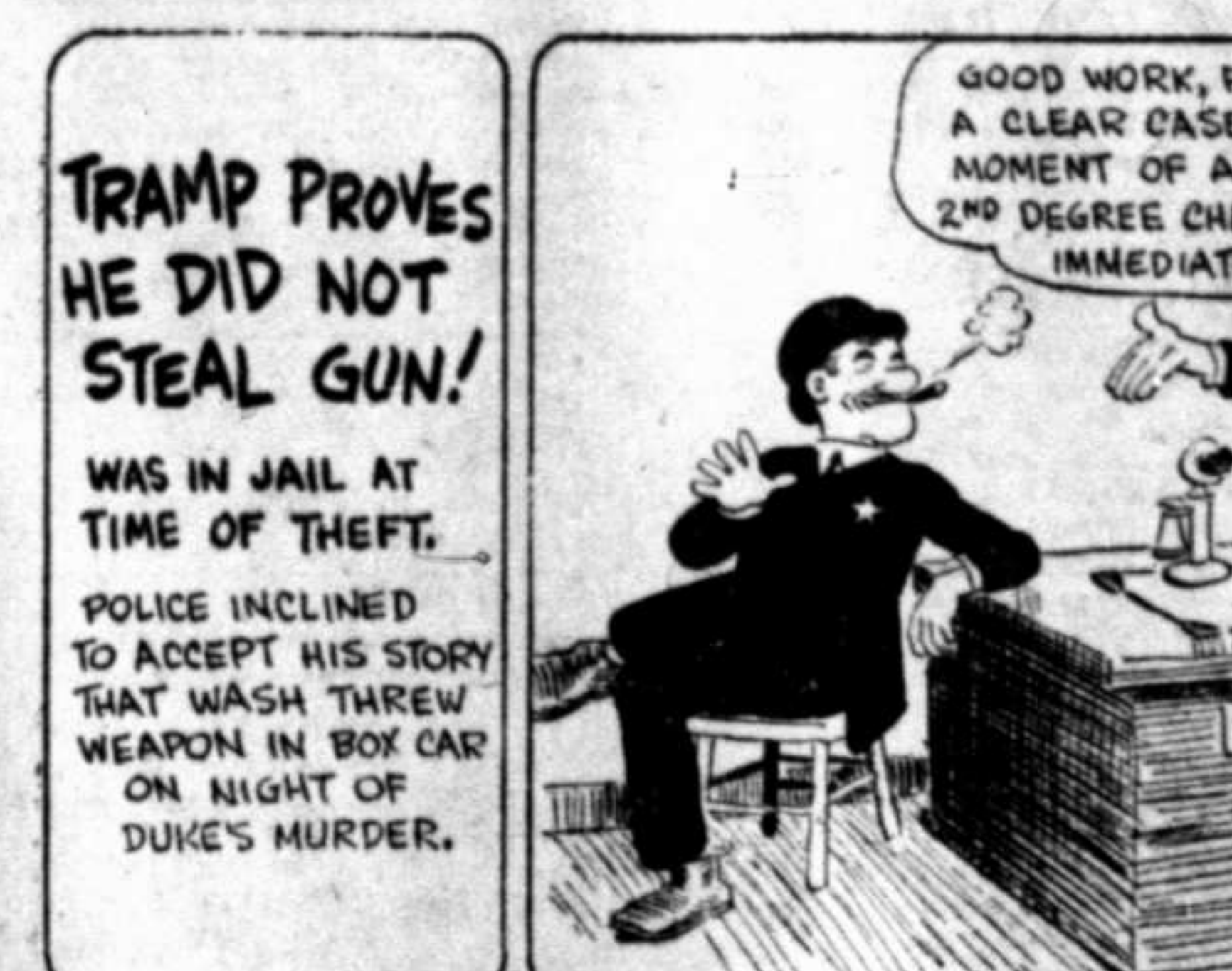

COTTON OPENS QUIET TODAY

PRICES DECLINE EARLY BUT MAKE RALLY ON CROP REPORT

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 3 (AP)—Owing to lower cables than due, the cotton market had a quiet, but easier, opening, and first trades showed losses of 3 to 5 points. In the absence of sustained support, prices continued to decline until January traded at 17.15, March at 17.40 and May to 17.65, or 5 to 7 points under yesterday's close.

Towards the end of the first hour the market rallied somewhat, recovering 4 to 6 points from the lows on a rather bullish crop report by a private authority, making the crop 14,869,000 bales.

The market ruled quiet but steady during most of the morning and towards noon prices rallied on rather bullish private crop estimates, some made buying and covering by shorts. The main stimulus appeared to be the President's annual message to Congress, January advanced to 17.25 March to 17.51 and May to 17.75, or 5 to 10 points above the lows and 5 to 6 points above the close of yesterday.

At noon the market was steady with a slight upward tendency.

IRREGULARITY APPEARS ON NEW YORK OPENING

NEW YORK, Dec. 3 (AP)—Cotton opened steady at unchanged prices to a decline of 3 points which was only a partial response to relatively easy cables. The decline seemed to be checked by trade buying around 17.75 for May and after showing net losses of about 4 to 5 points, prices steadied up on covering promoted by smaller private crop figures. Fluctuations were narrow but the market held steady and within a point or two of yesterday's closing quotations at the end of the first half hour.

Reports of firmness in the stock and grain markets seemed to bring in a little more buying of cotton and prices worked up to 17.15 for December and 17.58 for March or about 3 to 5 points net higher. Trading was comparatively quiet, but the market held steady within a point or two of the best at midday.

LESTER TRIAL TO COST STATE OVER \$3,000

The wheels of justice are oiled by expensive fluid, an analysis of expenses in the Clay Lester murder trial reveals.

Approximately \$3,000 will be spent by the State of Texas in the trial, the figures indicate.

When the case was first set for trial November 4 about \$1,000 was spent for mileage, sheriff's fees and daily pay to witnesses. The proceedings in November resulted in a continuance. Each witness, residing outside the county, receives 4 cents for each mile travelled and \$2 per day for the time required away from home.

In addition, there are the sheriff's fees for serving subpoenas.

An increased number of witnesses have been brought to Lubbock for the present scheduled opening of the trial, and no less than \$2,000 will be the State's expense, it was estimated.

question, declared it "would be most helpful if action should be taken at an early moment, more especially at a time when business and agriculture are both cooperating to minimize future uncertainties."

Standing out among his suggestions was one that the major prohibition enforcement activities should be transferred from the treasury to the justice department. At the same time the president declared his wish that the District of Columbia, around which a furor has been raised recently as a result of charges of liquor drinking in and out of public life, should be a "model city of law enforcement" for the nation. He asked that the necessary laws be enacted to make it so.

His First Annual Message
The annual message, the first of its kind submitted by Mr. Hoover, set forth the alternative of naval limitations at the London conference or a six year building program costing \$1,200,000,000. He asked that Congress "give earnest consideration to the possibilities of prudent action which will give relief from our continuous mounting expenditures" for national defense.

President Hoover's suggestions, which if followed, would give the Senate and House many issues for debate, included a range touching almost every phase of the nation's domestic and international problems. They included:

Adherence to the world court.
Delegation by Congress of power to reorganize government departments to the president with reservation of congressional review power within a limited period.
Early construction work on an

extended public buildings program throughout the country.
An increase from \$30,000,000 to \$35,000,000 in the next fiscal year to push the Mississippi flood control work and more liberal appropriations for general river and harbor work.

Investigation into feasibility of amending national banking laws to permit chain banking in limited regions.

Creation of full time federal power commission of three members.
Establishment of permanent federal radio commission along lines of the present temporary commission but with the removal of the requirement that commissioners must be chosen by zones.

Appointment of a special commission to negotiate contracts looking to the resumption of activities at the Muscle Shoals properties.
Congressional study of an immigration plan to more fully meet national necessities.
More liberal appropriations to strengthen the diplomatic and state department services.
Return of most of the seized alien property within a year.

burban and the Missouri Pacific railroad corporation in Nebraska.

To Give Direct Control
The unification, if approved by the commission, would give the Missouri Pacific direct control of the roads which it now operates as individual properties. At present accounts of each road are kept separately, and the merging of the properties would permit operation under a single system.

The Waco, Beaumont, Trinity and Sabine Railway and other short lines adjacent to the Missouri Pacific system intervened in opposition to the application. Examiner Weed held, however, that while some of these presented strong reasons for their inclusion in some larger system, he did not believe the record justified assigning them to the Missouri Pacific.

Protesting against the proposed plan, the state of Texas held it would be in violation of the constitution and laws of the state.

alone resulted in an increase of \$11,000,000 a year for the workers concerned while additions to the number of employees by reason of the shorter working day caused an additional wage payment throughout the Ford plants of \$6,000,000 a year.

The second major increase was announced on January 1, 1919, when the minimum scale was increased from \$5 to \$6 a day.

In announcing the increase, Mr. Edsel Ford said:
"We are able to make this wage increase partly because of anticipated economies and the great volume of production which we have had over a period of months and partly because of our excellent outlook for next year."

"Wage increases cannot be collected from the public nor can they be taken out of the quality of the product; they have to be made up by better management of the work. That is the way we intend to justify this increase."
