Cleatus Lebow is Wounded In Sinking of Indianapolis



Cleatus Lebow, FC3/c, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Lebow of Abernathy, was wounded July 30 when his ship, the heavy cruiser, Indianapolis, was torpedoed and sunk 450 miles off Leyte. The cruiser was on a record run from San Francisco to Guam, carrying material for atomic bombs. More than a thousand of the Indianapolis crew were killed, missing, or injured. Survivors were picked up five days after the sinking. Mrs. Cleatus Lebow and her two daughters live here.

AWARDED ARROWHEAD WITH 36TH TEXAS DIVISION
Pfc. Myles F. Loper, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Loper, Rt. 2, Abernathy, member of the 143rd Infantry, of the veteran 36th "Texas" Division, has been awarded the Bronze Arrowhead to wear on his European Theatre of Operations ribbon. The Arrowhead was awarded for participation in the Salerno and Riviera invasions when the division made D-Day amphibious assaults.

The 36th saw action in two D-Day invasions: Italy and Southern France and to its credit are such battles as San Pietro and Cassino, the Rapido river and Anzio. It fought at Montelimar, where the German 19th army was annihilated, and drove across the Sainte Marie Pass of the Vosges mountains. It breached the powerful Siegfried line defenses at Wissembourg and completed 400 days of actual combat plunging through Germany and deep into Austria.

believe that I'll probably see the Pacific before it is all over . . . I am glad you got the message from General Beauh. He had just made general and he said he would send our greeting to everyone's mother who would send in their addresses—so I thought that would be a good way to send a Mother's Day greeting and signed up for it. You know he has been our wing commander ever since we were activated . . . Since censorship has ceased to exist I can tell you a few of the places I have been since being over here. We left Baer field at noon on the 31st of September, 1942, and went to Camp Joyce Kilmer, N. J. Go there Oct. 2. All we did while there was to listen to security lectures and load our equipment on the boat. We left there and went to New York harbor and loaded on our boat, which was the Queen Mary, the evening of Oct. 8. We didn't set sail until 3:30 the afternoon of the 9th . . . There were 17,000 on board and we came across unescorted except for an air escort about the first night and day out, and about that long before we reached Scotland. We landed at Gurock, Scotland, about mid-afternoon, on the 15th. We had a very uneventful trip (which was very satisfactory with me) except for a rough sea for about 15 hours . . . Was so rough that when we went to the dining hall to eat, your plate and the coffee pot and everything would be right over in your lap before you had time to get it, it would be over against the wall, and the wall you were facing looked like the ceiling one minute and the floor the next . . . Didn't get sick, although had no ill effects from it except we all walked around four or five days swaying from side to side like a boat — HA! . . . We caught a train at Gurock at noon on the 1th. Rode until three o'clock the next morning, stopping at Oakham, England. Was at a camp there for about four or five days, and then went out on detached service with nine of the other boys from our department to finish assembling and make final inspections on a number of gliders we were going to receive. This was at Ramsbury, or about 60 miles southwest of Oxford. We were there about a month. During this time the squadron had moved from Oakham to a base about 49 miles north of there, or Fulbeck, near Newark. That is about 40 miles northwest of Nottingham, so that is the place we visited while there. Anyway, the Air Echelon left the ground crews there shortly after that and moved to a place called Wilfrid Pars, which is about 15 miles east of where we guys were. When our work was completed they picked us and the gliders up and we were on that base taking our part in the maneuvers in Southern England you probably read about in the papers there, until Jan. 9, 1944. At that time we moved back to Fulbeck and joined the "ground crews. We were there accumulating gliders and airplanes and doing a little training when the weather permitted, until about March 15. During that time we had one of the largest snow storms that England had had in 50 something years. We really had the mud there and I sure'y would have

If you can, Buford, I'd like to have Lewis Collins' and Rayburn Moore's addresses. Mother sent me a clipping of the paper and I noticed they were in the Philippines somewhere. Well, I'll quit for now. Be good, 'til I see you again. A friend, Charles Ray Owens.

Dear Buford: Just a line to let you know I was discharged from the WAC recently. My mother has been ill for sometime so it was necessary someone come home. I want to thank you for the Review. I did appreciate it so much. At present my plans are somewhat uncertain. As soon as I'm settled I want to subscribe to the Review . . . G. W. is home now on a 30-day furlough after 33 months in Africa, Sicily and Italy. He looks well, but whether he is in the states to stay or on his way again, no one knows. We can just hope. He made S/Sgt. just recently. He has 8 battle stars and has 125 points, but we still won't know for quite a while yet. Thank you again for your kindness and your time and trouble, too. Please give my thanks to Miss Merritt, also. Sincerely, Johnie Rodgers, Box 13, Covington, Tex., Aug. 6.

(Editor's Note: Mr. and Mrs. C. P. Webb of Commerce, formerly of Abernathy, received the following letter from their son, Sgt. Hubert T. Webb.)

France, May 21, 1945. Dear Mom & All: Just wonder how everything is going with all of you there now. Am doing just fine myself, though our weather did turn bad on us a couple of days ago. Guess you know I mean it is raining again . . . Received your letter of May 12 or the 14 yesterday, also got one from Louise of one of those dates, so I don't remember which date was which. Sure glad to know Grand Dad is doing so good . . . I only have 75 points, but think we'll be awarded another battle star, or maybe two before the final tally is taken on us. That would give an 80 or 85, but I still don't think I would get out as they say the critical score for the Air Forces is going to be higher. However, I do think I'll get to make a visit home this summer, maybe not too many weeks from now, I hope. Although I also
