John Deaver II Resigns As D. A., Darter Is Appointed



John Deaver II, District Attorney of the 100th Judicial District, serving Carson, Collingsworth, Childress, Donley and Hall Counties, has officially resigned from the office effective May 20, 1974.

Attorney Deaver of Memphis has remained in the office as de-jure District Attorney until today when his successor, Attorney Charles Darter of Wellington, was officially notified of his appointment to the post by Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe.

In a letter from Governor Briscoe to Mr. Deaver, the Governor accepted the resignation and said, "I feel that the service which you have rendered in your position to the people of Texas will stand as a tribute to dedicated public service and is one in which you and your family may take great pride."

Attorney Darter said he felt a compelling necessity to devote full time to the private practice of law.

Taking office on Jan. 1, 1973, Attorney Deaver has served a year and five months on his four-year term.

Attorney Darter of Wellington has been appointed to fulfill the duties of the office until the next General Election, under Texas Law.

New Telephone Directors To List New Numbers For Repair, Directory Asst.

In order to provide Memphis telephone customers with 1+ Dialing (or Direct Distance Dialing) in the last quarter of 1975, it is necessary to change the directory assistance and repair service numbers, and the number party line customers must dial to call another person on their party line, according to J. H. Davis, district manager.

The new directory assistance number for all customers is 411. The new repair service number is 4102. Both of these are effective immediately.

Also, if you are a party line customer and want to dial another number on your line, you must dial 4104 plus the seven-digit number listed in the directory.

These changes are necessary because the present numbers start with the digit "1". When 1+ will give you access to the long distance network. To avoid conflict, the numbers must be changed.

These number changes are reflected in the new directory now being delivered. If you have any questions, please call the business office, Mr. Davis said.

The Memphis Country Club hosted the best invitational tournament in recent history as a field of 100 golfers vied for prizes in five flights and the play was action packed for three days.

Lloyd Moody, an Oklahoma City golfer, a brother of Touring Pro Arville Moody, set some kind of a recent record of finishing 54 holes in regulation play one-under par, at 203, the first time under-par figures has won the tournament in several years.

Moody, a long hitting golfer, was displeased with his showing last year and brought his whole family to Memphis to take the course this year and he was more than successful, besting the tough field by six strokes to take the victory.

"It's just a super tournament, super," Moody said shortly after finishing play Monday. "All the golfers feel this is one of the best tournaments in this part of the country," he said.

Only the championship and first flight golfers were able to play Saturday, due to the wet conditions of the course, after about a two-inch rain. Moody posted a two-under par 66 on the wet course. His other rounds were 68 and 69.

Max Hickey of Pampa was second with a 205, and Ken Licks of Amarillo defeated Danny Reece of Amarillo on a sudden death hole. Both had 210s.

Ken Bailey had a 211, Ted Harrison 212, Bobby Mcatee 213, John Zett 216, Marvin Dick 217, Jimmy Holmes 218, David Parker 218, Danny Scarbrough 219, Mack Tubb 221, Dick Weston 222, Dick Tubb 223, Ben Parks 224, Sammy Moody 224 and Eddie Dunkel 225.

Elmer Wilson of Pampa won the first flight with a 218, and Bill Combs took second with a 220, while James Avery of Amarillo had a 225 for third.

Joe Bob Browning won the second flight with a 74, while J. C. Ward, 77 took second and Dr. Roddy Bice 76 was consolation winner.

Third flight was won by Harry Barclay of Gruver with a 78, with Lee Brown taking second with an 82 and John Christner winning consolation with an 83.

Fourth flight was tied and the end regulation play as C. E. Voyles and Larry Ripple of Claude each had 81s. Voyles won the play-off. Bobby Cosby with an 82 took consolation.

Camp Cibola Needs Volunteer Workers Now

The proposed rules and regulations for operation of youth camps according to the new Texas Youth Camp Safety and Health Act of May 1, 1974, have now been received at the Quivira Girl Scout Council office.

These rules mean that the planned camp development schedule must be pushed ahead by several months, if the summer sessions at Camp Cibola are to be held this year. In order to comply with these regulations by July 7th, it will be necessary to have a work force of at least 12 or 15 men. Work days have been set up for June 8, June 22, and July 6. Before camp opening the following jobs must be completed: A new sheetrock ceiling must be installed, perfortaped and painted in the Lodge area; an air conditioner installed in the kitchen area; another sink installed; more storage and enclosed cabinets built; all cracks and seams caulked and sealed; water lines laid to two units; handwashing facilities and connections finished; and roofs laid over latrines.

Summertime Safety Hints!

Summertime is traditionally outdoors season as Americans move outdoors to find recreation and exercise, or to do the necessary chores, and with each summer comes a number of accidents which cause injury and sometimes death.

Some activities are just naturally dangerous and when people engage in these activities they must realize the risk involved. Riding a canoe down the rapids is an example and the weak and faint of heart should stay away from this one.

But there are a lot of dangerous things we should be aware of and plan to avoid or prevent accidents.

Consider mowing the lawn. Sure it takes a little extra time to pick up sticks and rocks, change into sturdy shoes, sharpen the mower blade, etc., but these are just practicing good safety hints. Mowing with electric mowers in wet grass, sticking hands into mower to clean out a clog, are unwise adventures.

Bicycle riding is getting more and more popular among the older set as well as youngsters. Motorists must be extremely careful, especially in the early evening hours. Parents of the bicycle riders should equip the bikes with lights, and check them regularly to see if they work. Also, parents should sit down and explain the "rules of the road." Bicycles must obey the same rules as motorists.

Summer is the fishing, skiing and swimming season and the danger to life is possibly the greatest on water. Many regulations have been passed about fishing and boating, but every week news accounts of drowning accidents indicate that the victim was not wearing a life jacket. Many of these victims are considered good swimmers up to the time they misjudged their swimming ability.

But swimming is a very important skill for all of us, and we should give our children the opportunity to learn to swim. A smart parent will supervise their youngsters in the early years at public swimming pools, and get someone to teach them the swimming fundamentals when their children are five or six.

Golf and tennis are other summer sports that need parental supervision if children participate in a safe manner. Another sport is baseball. Heat strokes are just as common among the youngsters as they are among the older set.

Golf courses are especially dangerous as golf balls are as large as big hail stones and they hit with equal force. The word, "fore" means that a projectile has gone astray and everyone is expected to be on the lookout. Each year on the local club course people are hit by balls. But this seldom occurs to those who play the game regularly. The local course this past weekend was extremely crowded for three days but no one was injured by a golf ball because tournament players are always alert to the dangers of the course.

Tornado season is here, and many nighttime hours are taken up by those cloud watchers alert for dangerous funnels. But some citizens add to the danger by racing around city streets splashing through puddles and creating hazards. En route to storm cellars in the past, this editor has witnessed several vehicle accidents caused when brakes failed.

The City of Memphis Police and Firemen will be alerting the town of dangerous clouds by a long blast on their sirens. When this signal occurs, take shelter.

Summertime is a wonderful season, but it can be more dangerous than winter's ice if we don't be careful. No one wants a vacation trip ruined because of an accident.

Crisis of leadership

It is commonly held today that this is an age of large crises and small men.

"Where are the giants of yesterday?" is the melancholy cry from those who often forget that some of the giants were ogres. Somehow, somewhere—the feeling runs—there must be men who can give us the quick, sure answers to our multiplying problems.

In general, we get the governments we earn. There is an interplay between the living ideals of a people and the leaders they choose—or reject. It is naive to suppose that there is not an influential relationship between the private citizen's sense of moral responsibility and the public servant's character in government is not something different from character in the office, the factory, the school, the theater, the law court, the kitchen, the ball park.

Nothing is gained by merely wishing for gifted leaders to do the job, but achievement of "a nobler race for legislation" — and for the administration of government — is a responsibility which every citizen shares to the extent of his present capacity to participate in the democratic process.

This is not a moment in history when it is easy to speak of nobility. Yet beyond all the clutter of a disintegrating past stands the superb Genesis vision of men and women created in the image and likeness of God. Either we rise to see the infinite possibilities of that divine creation or we fall among the ruins of the only destiny we deserve.

We've not often agreed with the White House about Watergate, tapes and withholding evidence, but we must admit they have a point over there when they argue that naughty language is not an impeachable offense.

And well that they didn't. Many of our presidents were generals (Washington, Jackson, Old Zachary Taylor, Grant, Garfield, Eisenhower) and one was an artillery captain (Truman) & when they were displeased they could sound like mule skinner.

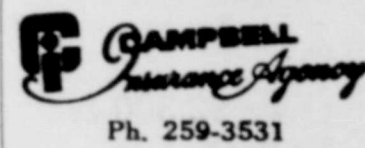
Of course Nixon made this worse for himself by posing as a

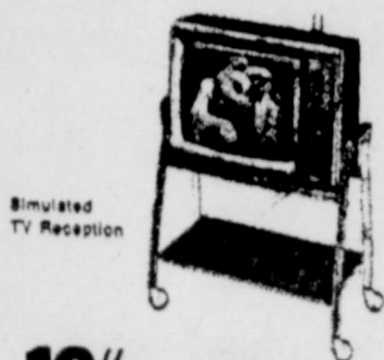

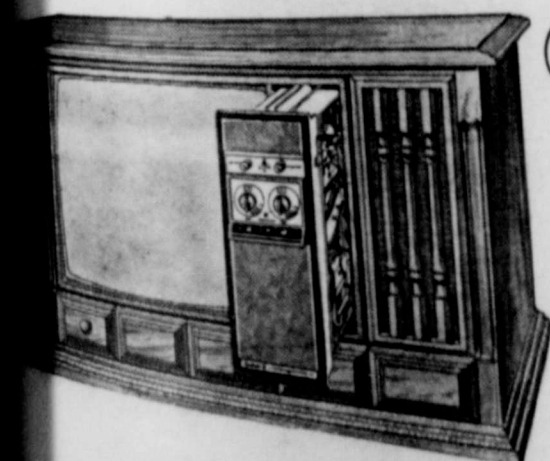

Consumer Debt Is \$1,400 Per Family Locally

NEW YORK, May 23 — How much do you owe? That's the question that many residents here are asking as they learn the results of a survey by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York.

The survey, which is the first of its kind, found that the average family in the New York City area owes \$1,400 in consumer debt.

Somewhat more than three years ago, the latest figure indicates, it reflects the fact that families, locally and elsewhere, were more expansive in their spending for high-priced goods, thus adding to their debt.

Nevertheless, they have within bounds. Because their incomes are higher than they were a year or two ago, they are in a position to carry a larger load. Inflation has been a back, however, making it harder for families to come up with monthly payments.

According to the latest Federal Reserve Board report, installment debt in the United States totals \$147 billion, which is \$1,400 more than it was a year ago.

In Hall County, based on the average earning and expenditure picture locally and nationally credit reports, the installment debt locally is estimated at \$1,400 per family.

That is the average, equal to about 16 cents of every dollar of income, after taxes, that families owe much more than others owe little or none.

For the entire local population, the installment debt standing comes to an estimated \$2,932,000.

This takes into account for automobile purchases, for the purchase of other consumer goods, personal loans for home repair and renovation. Not included are mortgage debt, charge accounts, single payment loans.

With repayments taking in of every \$6 or so out of the average family's net income, the amount to approximately \$100 month per Hall County family.

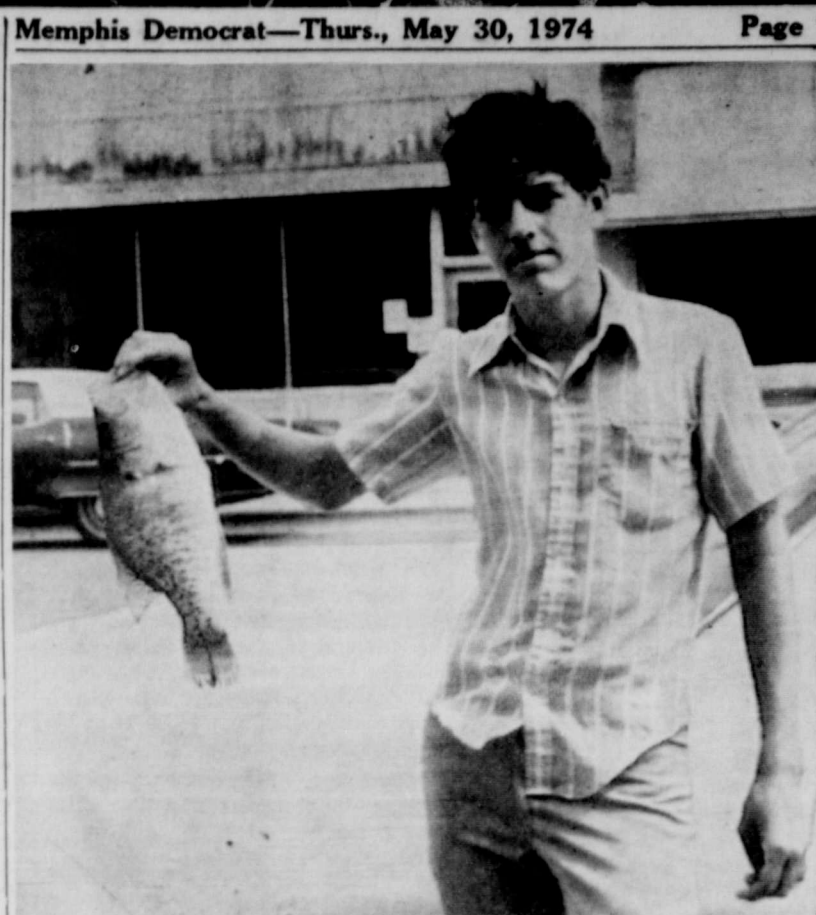

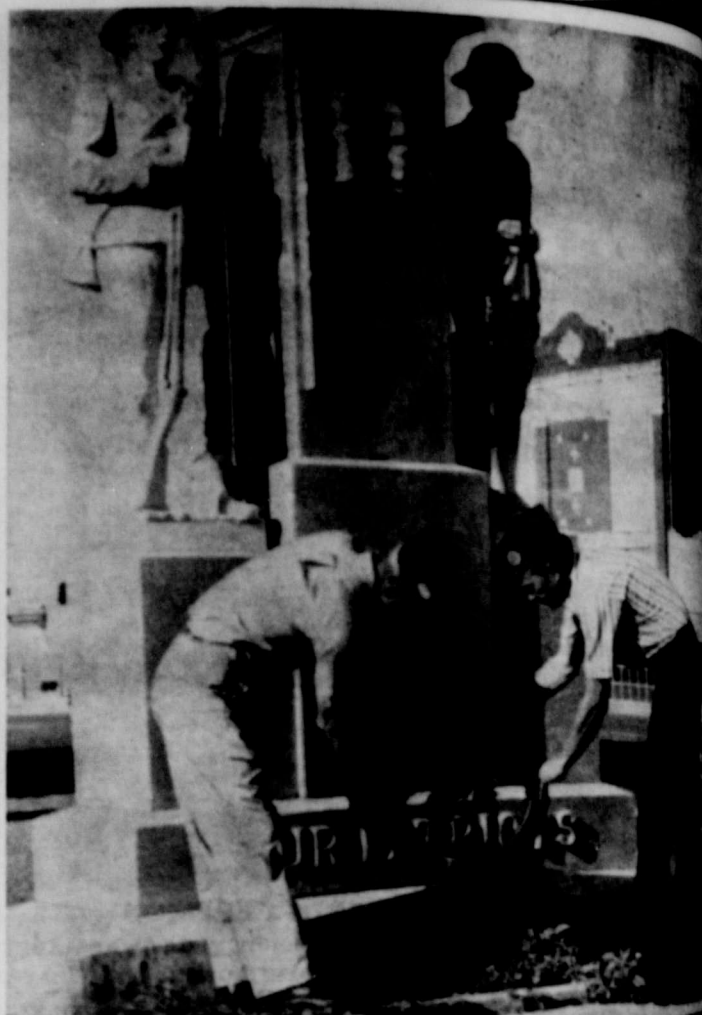

For the first time since 1962, all 50 states in the nation are recognized by the U. S. Department of Agriculture as being "hog cholera free". A state must go for 12 months without a confirmed case to qualify for the designation.

"However, we must remain vigilant," he continued, "and keep up surveillance at farms and markets until we're sure this disease has, in fact, been eliminated." He said it was especially important for swine producers in the Southwest to remain vigilant

because of the proximity to Mexico where the disease is still widespread. Hog cholera is caused by a virus which is highly infectious and usually fatal to hogs. It is completely unrelated to human cholera that infects humans.

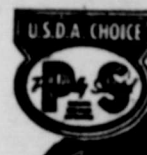

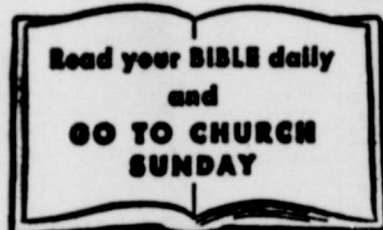

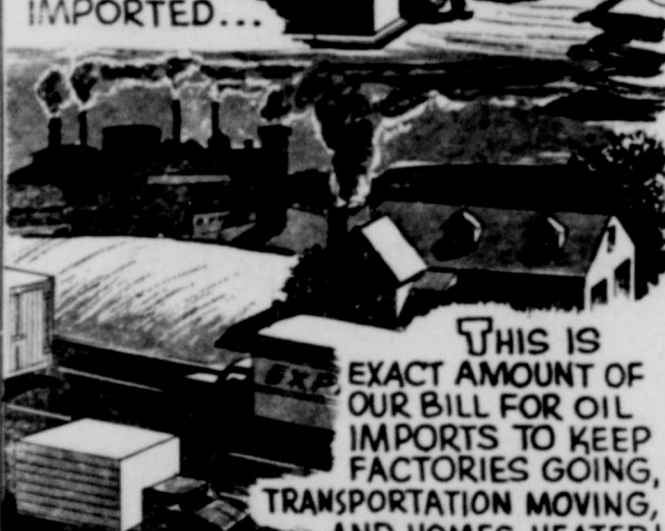
