K of C mud bog Saturday

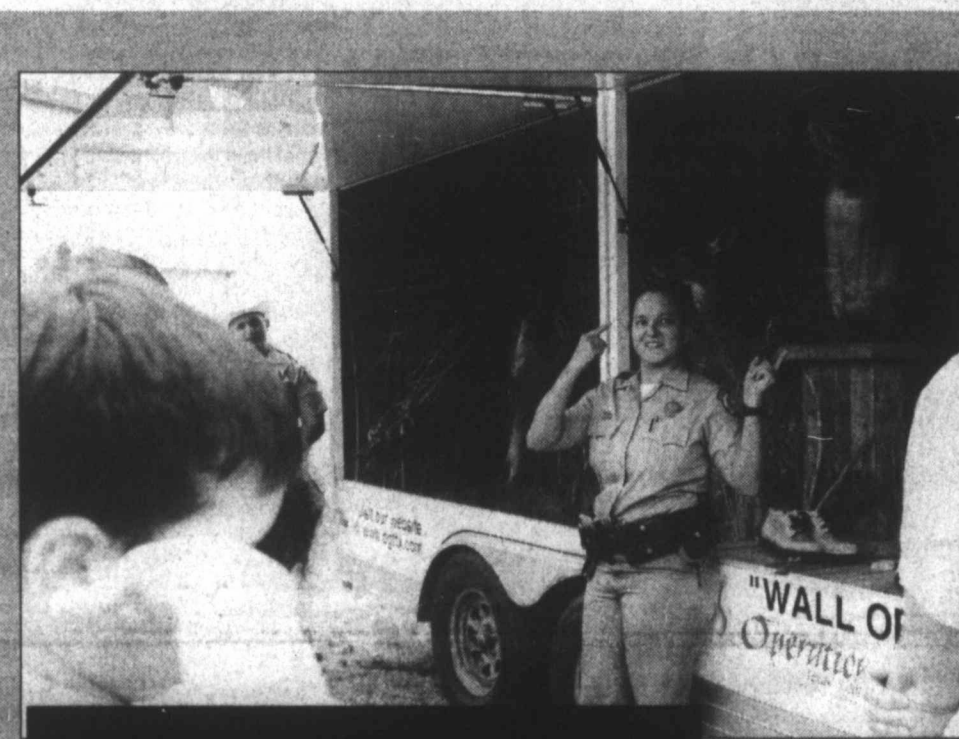

City of Loraine "back in business"

The Loraine City Council has the city getting back to business these days. They met last week and approved a budget for last year, as well as a tax rate for this year.

According to Mayor Dearl Messick, he has been working with a former city manager, Brenda Hammond, to gain control of the city's finances. The two prepared a budget for 2017-18 which

was approved by the council.

Messick and Hammond are now working on the budget for 2018-19 to bring before the council at the next meeting. The budget must be approved by September 30th, so the council will meet again on Thursday, September 27th at 6 p.m.

The council approved the tax rate for the upcoming budget year. The effective

rate of .888597 cents per \$100 of property value was approved. The rate consists of .378823 for maintenance and operations, plus .509774 for debt service.

While it's been widely known that the City of Loraine is struggling to make ends meet financially, Messick said the city is not too deep in debt. The city is behind on some payments, and Mes-

sick said he's being calling creditors to explain the situation. So far, most have been happy to work with the city to help them catch up on payments.

The mayor said the city is approximately \$45,000 behind on payments on a loan from Compass Bank. The bank loaned the city money a few years ago to put in a new lift station at the

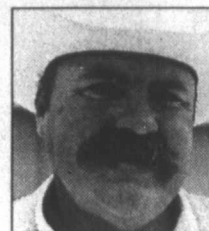

Plans underway for annual goat cook-off

Can you smell that? If not now, then you'll be able to smell the boer goat cooking soon, as it's time for the CCFVD World Championship Boer Goat Cook-Off. The contest is set to be held Friday and Saturday, October 5th and 6th in Rud-dick Park.

This year's cook-off is limited to the first 46 teams that turn in entry forms and at least a \$100 deposit. Cost is \$175 per three-member team, but a non-refundable deposit will hold your spot. All forms must be turned in at or mailed to the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department, 620 E. 11th St. in Colorado City.

Half of a boer goat will be provided to each team at check-in on Friday from noon until 7 p.m. Contestants must cook and turn in the goat provided for judging, and all cooking must take place on site.

The best-tasting 1st place goat will bring in \$1,500, sponsored by City National Bank, plus belt buckles sponsored by Wood's Boots. Second place goat wins \$750, half sponsored

by Attorney Ty Wood, while the \$500 prize for 3rd place is sponsored by PJ's Wrecker. Attorney Sterling Burleson is sponsoring the \$250 4th place prize.

All teams placing 2nd through 10th will receive a plaque. Special camp awards presented are: Ronnie Clark Best of Show, L.R. Webb's Friendliest Camp, and Earnest Castillo Classiest Camp.

A jackpot cook-off will be held for beans, pork ribs, brisket and dessert. These will be judged in conjunction with the boer goat on Saturday.

Entry fee for each jackpot is \$20, and you may enter as many jackpots as you wish. You must be on a goat-cooking team to enter the jackpots. Registration and jackpot entry deadline is 7 p.m. Friday, October 5th. All entries must be cooked on site.

Contestants may begin setting up camp in the park on Wednesday, October 3rd.

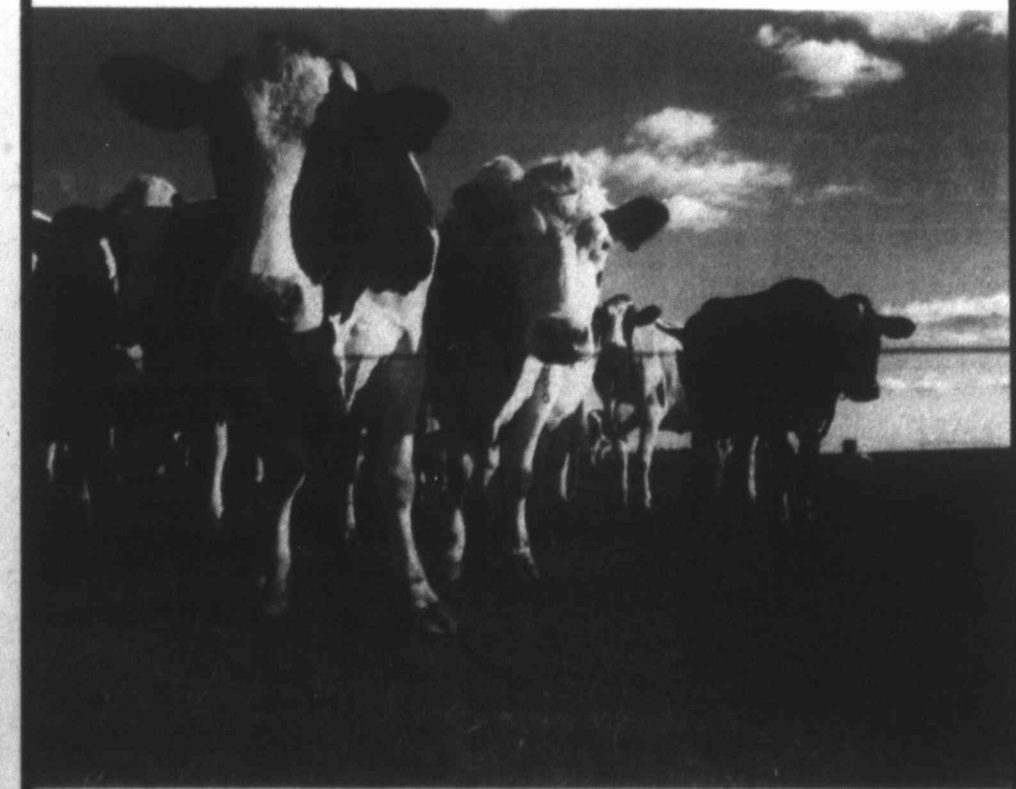

Lions Club members hear hospital updates

Two ladies from Mitchell County Hospital District served as the guest speakers at Friday's meeting of the Colorado City Lions Club. Public Relations Director Jessica Stone and Administrative Assistant Carla Sauer talked about the recent health fair and more.

Stone said the recent health fair, held September 8th, was a success. The hospital district had about 215 people attend, with 85 taking advantage of free lab testing, 74 people were vaccinated for flu and 16 were vaccinated against pneumonia.

Another flu clinic is planned to be held Wednesday, October 17th at Lowe's Market from 3 to 6 p.m. Stone said the location was changed in an effort to reach out and make it easier for citizens to get their flu shot. Most insurances are accepted.

Two hospital administrators, CEO Robbie Dewberry and clinic manager Murray Hall, have been out-of-town attending a Texas Organization of Rural & Community Hospitals (TORCH) conference. Stone and Sauer were informed that the pair were chosen to win an award, and both men were surprised at the conference.

Dewberry and Hall received Essence Leadership Awards. There were only three such awards presented at the conference and two of them are coming back to MCHD, Sauer said. There are over 500 hospitals that are members of TORCH.

Stone mentioned that Mitchell County Nursing & Rehabilitation Center has a new administrator. Jessica Whitesides took over the admin duties the week the facility had a fire. She said the hospital board is considering the construction of a new nursing home and assisted-living center, and she invited Lions to attend board meetings which are held on the fourth Tuesday of each month at 5:30 p.m.

Sauer also talked a bit about the Mitchell County Healthcare Volunteers, formerly known as "Pink Ladies". She

is hard-working and provides many essentials for the hospital. The volunteers raise money with a gift shop and the MCHD Wellness Center, and they purchase equipment for the hospital and provide many services for needy individuals and families in the county.

Right now, the MCHV members are looking to increase their numbers. So, if you're interested in becoming a volunteer, contact the hospital gift shop.

Sauer mentioned the cleanliness and nice appearance of the hospital. She said the housekeeping department does a great job keeping the floors clean and shiny.

"We're really proud of our facility. The staff takes pride in their jobs," Sauer said. "We have a great thing going, and I am excited to be a part of it."

Hunter Ed Course to be held at state park

Lake Colorado City State Park will be the site of a Hunter Education Classroom Course this Saturday. Every hunter born on or after September 2, 1971, must successfully complete hunter education, so make plans to sign up for the local class.

The classroom course is planned for Saturday, September 22nd at the state park recreation hall. Lake Colorado

City State Park Superintendent Jeffery Ellis will be the instructor.

Registration for the class starts bright and early at 8 a.m., and those participating should be aware that it will be an all-day class. As of Monday, September 17th, there were 14 seats available, so hunters should sign up as soon as possible.

According to the TPWD

website, cost is \$15 per hunter, and minimum age for certification is nine years.

Once certification is completed, it is good for life. Texas certification is honored by other states and provinces requiring hunter education. All hunters must carry proof of certification or deferral on you while hunting, but proof of certification is not required to purchase a hunting license.

The Classroom Course covers the core standards in Firearm, Hunting and Outdoor Safety, Hunting Responsibilities and Wildlife Conservation. Some classroom courses are extended to cover additional topics such as Bow-hunting, Muzzleloaders, Outdoor Survival and First Aid.

wastewater facility. Bank personnel assured Messick they will be happy to work with the city.

Because the City of Loraine does not have an employee with a water license, Joe Vick of Roscoe has been coming over to check the water systems. He is working with David Johnson, a full-time Loraine employee, helping with hands-on training.

Messick said Johnson has a back-flow license from another state, but he will be going to training to get his water certifications for Texas soon.

Colton Wilkes, a CPA, is helping the city come into compliance with regulations from the Texas Water Development Board. Wilkes attended the recent meeting and explained to the public the consequences of remaining non-compliant.

Messick said the City of Loraine hasn't complied with TWDB water rules for about three or four years. Wilkes told attendees the state can come in, take over the operations of the city, hire a private company to sell water, and water rates would at least double. Messick told those attending he doesn't want that for the citizens, as he is a citizen of Loraine himself.

Loraine's finances are more than tight right now, Messick said. He's hoping relief is coming next month in the way of people paying their property taxes. In an effort to ease money worries, the council is proposing a \$10 increase on the minimum water rate. The council will hold two public hearings on the topic, one on September 27th and another in October, before the measure comes to a vote.

During the mayor's report, Messick told those attending he is trying to get help from TDCJ Wallace Unit to help with cemetery cleanup. He's hoping to appoint a committee for cemetery projects. He said the City of Loraine is also in need of hiring a Code Enforcement Officer and Animal Control Officer.

"Loose dogs are a real problem in Loraine. There are so many, they are starting to run in packs, and it is a danger to citizens," Messick said.

On a different note, Messick said an outside auditor will be in Loraine in a couple of weeks to perform an audit on his financial statements prior to his taking office in July.

CISD board discusses school safety steps

Student safety was a big topic of discussion in Monday's meeting of the Colorado ISD Board of Trustees. School leaders are working on ways to keep students safe, while still allowing community involvement at the campuses.

CISD Superintendent Reggy Spencer informed the board the signs providing notification of armed staff have been ordered.

He said four such signs have been ordered so far, one for each campus, and more may be added in the future.

Spencer told the board that much of student safety is now dealing with mental health. Service centers and other organizations are providing training on mental health issues, the potential danger and how to prevent incidents involving those

with mental health problems.

CISD is advertising for bids for an eight-foot wrought iron fence to be put up around the back of the high school. The fence is a measure to cut down on locations of possible entry at the campus. Once the fence is up and functional, doors to the out-buildings will no longer have to be locked.

The fence will make it where CHS has one entrance through the front doors of the main building. Teachers, students and other staff will have to start parking out in front of the school, as the other doors around the campus will be inaccessible due to the fence. As a matter of fact, everyone, including pep rally attendees, will have to go into CHS through the front doors.

Another feature being considered for high school is the addition of an entrance office

that could be manned all the time. The structure would mean everyone coming into the high school would be seen and acknowledged by personnel.

Spencer said every measure is being undertaken with one purpose in mind: To harden targets. In other words, the safety measures under consideration make it harder for an offender to enter a campus without being seen and approved.

Most parents have easily adjusted to the new campus entrances at Colorado Elementary and Middle School. Anyone entering the campus must pass through the office, and visitors must present a photo ID and get a badge before going any further into the school.

Starting immediately, everyone entering must surrender their identification until they come back out of the school. When leaving, visitors will pass through the office to get their ID back.

Issues have arisen when special occasions beckon large crowds to come into the campus. CES Principal Melinda Alexander said on those special days, scanning of IDs has been abandoned and sign-in sheets have taken its place. She said the staff tried scanning IDs on Valentine's Day parties, and the line extended out the door, far out into the parking lot and the parties were finished by the time some parents got into the school.

Spencer mentioned that police presence at the campus on special days may help deter anyone with malicious intent from entering the building. It is just one of the options under consideration.

Student safety is a topic that will be revisited again and again in the coming months.

Late surge sends Wolves past Ballinger, 42-34

BALLINGER - Colorado High School head coach Dan Gainey breathed a sigh of relief when the final seconds ran off the game clock in his team's non-district showdown with the Ballinger Bearcats. Despite a career performance from quarterback Markis Monroe, the veteran head coach felt fortunate to walk off the field with a 42-34 victory.

The Wolves, despite an impressive start, needed 22 fourth-quarter points to break open a tight game and put Ballinger away.

"We kind of got away with

one," said Gainey, who saw his team improve to a perfect 3-0. (It was) not our best effort. We were fortunate enough to hit them with some big pass plays to Tracy and Reid and hold on for the win."

Colorado City dominated the first quarter on both sides of the ball. The Wolves marched their initial possession deep into the Bearcats' end of the field before Monroe registered the first of his five touchdown passes. He staked Colorado City to a 7-0 advantage by lofting a 32-yard strike to Reid Harris.

Bubba Williams added to the Wolves' happiness minutes later. The Colorado City stand-out thwarted Ballinger's attempt to pull even on their ensuing series. After the Bearcats had marched into the CHS red zone, Williams put Ballinger in a deep hole by scooping up a fumble and returning it the distance for a touchdown.

Ballinger managed to get its offense going in the second quarter. The Bearcats reeled off a pair of touchdowns in the frame. Including an 8-yard TD pass from Edgar Nunez with just 6.7 seconds left in the frame, and pulled to within 14-13 at the half.

Monroe and Tracy Smith put the Wolves on their shoulders in the third. The two put

the momentum back in the Wolves' favor early in the second half when they connected on the team's longest play from scrimmage this season. With the ball sitting at the CHS 10, Monroe lofted a pass to Smith, who outraced the Bearcat defense 90 yards for a 20-13 cushion.

Ballinger answered back later in the frame. The Bearcats pushed the ball into the end zone and sent the game into the fourth quarter tied at 20-20.

The Wolf offense responded dramatically in the final 12 minutes. Monroe passed for more than 100 yards and three touchdowns in the frame.

Harris, who finished with 102 receiving yards on just five receptions, got the Colorado City barrage started quickly in the fourth. He put the Wolves back on top by hauling in an 18-yard scoring strike from

Monroe who completed 10 of his 15 passing attempts in the game.

Leading 26-20, Monroe turned to Smith moments later to all but seal the Wolves' victory. Midway through the frame, Smith inflated the CHS lead to 14, at 34-20, by snaring the second of his three touchdown receptions - a 35-yarder.

He tacked on a 68-yard TD reception later in the frame to close out Colorado City's scoring.

Smith finished the game as the Wolves' top receiver, netting 193 yards on three catches. Ballinger scored late in the period and pulled to within a touchdown.

"We need to do a better job of blocking and tackling or we will, potentially, get into some trouble against some good teams still left on our schedule," said Gainey.

Monroe also completed two passes to Zachary Thompson for 11 yards.

Akimas Clarrett led the C-City rushing attack, rolling up 35 yards on 10 attempts. Williams added 34 on seven carries.

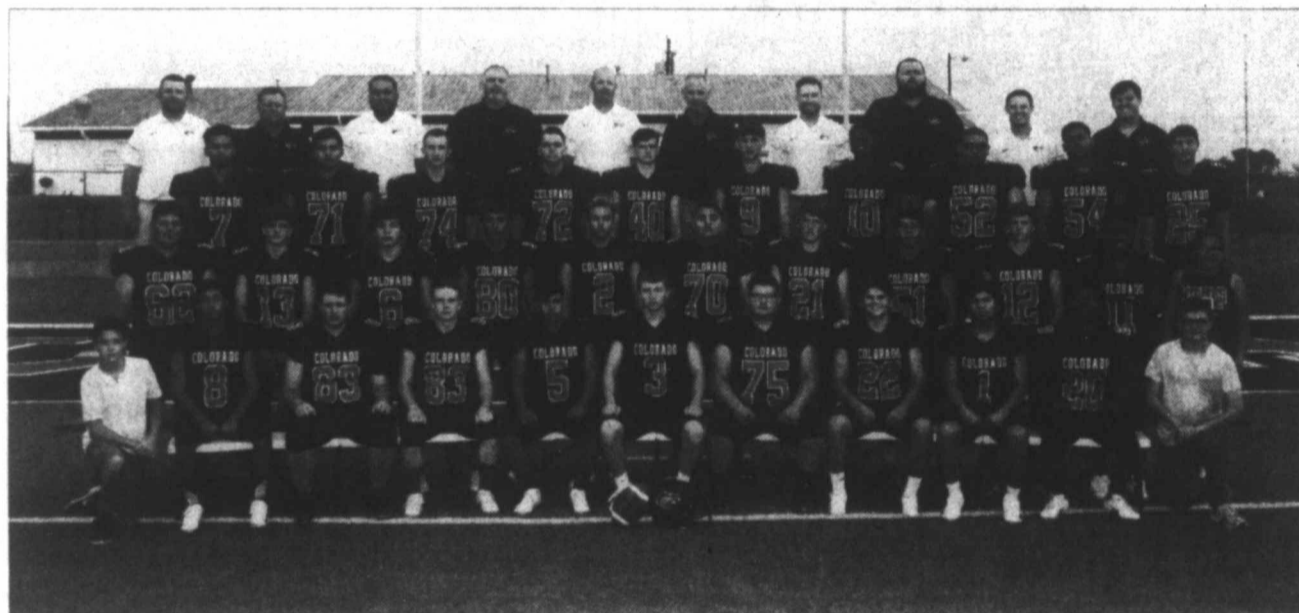
