

Ransom Ready, No Word Heard From Kidnaper Of California Child

3-Year-Old Boy Snatched From Nurse

Police Withdraw From
Case To Permit
Negotiations

HILLSBOROUGH, Calif.,
Sept. 21 (AP)—"There has
been no contact with the kid-
naper."

These words came through
the dread silence of the De
Tristan home today, 24 hours
after three-year-old Marc,
son of several wealthy fami-
lies, was abducted by a man
who left a demand for \$100,-
000 ransom.

The money was ready, to be
paid for the safe return of the
little boy, son of Count and Count-
ess Marc de Tristan, socially
prominent members of this ex-
clusive neighborhood.

The kidnaper, who signed the
ransom note as "unconventional ec-
centric," had a free hand, police
said, to open negotiations with the
family. Police and federal agents
withdrew from the case at the fam-
ily's urgent plea, lest the kidnaper
be threatened of the "fatal result" of
interference be carried out.

But the dark, middle-aged man
with the hook-nose had made no
attempt to communicate with the
parents, a member of the im-
mediate family confided today in a
broken voice. Through the me-
dium of a classified advertise-
ment in a San Francisco paper,
the De Tristans had carried out
the kidnaper's first instruction—
to signify willingness to meet the
ransom note demands.

The curly-haired little boy was
snatched from his nurse yesterday
on a roadway near the De Tristan
estate. In a scuffle with the ab-
ductor the nurse, Mary Foley, 50,
was knocked to the ground. The
kidnaper lost his hat. The hat, the
ransom notes and a meager de-
scription of the man and the kid-
nap car were the only clues. But
federal agents said many cases had
been solved through less signifi-
cant clues than these.

Draft Funds Approved By Committee

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—
A \$1,500,000,000 defense bill which
includes funds for paying, feeding
and clothing army conscripts, re-
ceived approval today of a house
appropriations subcommittee.

Chairman Woodrum (D-Va.)
said the measure would be sub-
mitted to the full appropriations
committee early next week and
probably would come up in the
house Thursday. It is expected
to be the last major defense bill
of the session.

Originally, the bill contained
\$338,000,000 additional for barracks
for the army of drafters to be
called into training. This was tak-
en from the bill, however, and
passed as a separate measure ear-
lier this week in order to expedite
a start on construction of the
housing facilities.

At the war department, the
army announced a plan of rear-
rangement for its two cavalry di-
visions to convert them into
"heavy and powerful striking
instrumentalities" with "tremendous
fire power."

The divisions will be increased
from 500 to 600 officers and from
8,500 to 9,500 enlisted men.
Horses will be reduced in num-
ber from 8,000 to 6,000 for each
division, while motor vehicles
will be increased from 350 to 800.

The department also announced
award of \$31,747,513 worth of con-
tracts.

SLOT MACHINES ARE TAKEN AT COLORADO

Texas rangers swooped down on
operators of slot machines in Colo-
rado Friday and confiscated ap-
proximately 36 of the devices.

Eight of the machines, brought
here by the state officers, were
taken to the dump ground Satur-
day evening and smashed. Ranger
Mannie Gault said that money in
the units would go to the Salvation
Army.

Several were destroyed at Colo-
rado, it was reported, and one man
was fined for possession of the
slot machines.

DRAFTEES' JACKPOT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—
Army officials received a sugges-
tion today for a "conscriptoreno
jackpot."

George Durst of Jamaica, N. Y.,
proposed that each man registering
for military service contribute one
dollar, and that the first ten men
drafted in each district receive \$100
apiece.

Army officials commented only
that "it's an idea."

Cotton Harvest To Be In Full Swing Soon

Howard county's belated har-
vest season Saturday showed
signs of breaking suddenly into
full strides within the next two
weeks.

Although it has been three
weeks since the first bale of 1940
cotton was ginned here, possibly
no more than 250 bales have
been handled to date. Most gin-
ners estimated that it would re-
quire two weeks yet before cot-
ton starts rolling for the gins in
large volumes. Three reporting
gins had turned out 115 bales.

15th Night Of Bombing For Capital City

German Activity
Is Reported To Be
A Bit Lighter

LONDON, Sept. 22 (Sun-
day) (AP)—Individual nazi
raiders unloaded bombs on
London last night and early
today for hour after hour in
the 15th consecutive all-night
assault.

One raider, attempting to
pierce the London barrage of
anti-aircraft guns, came crash-
ing to his doom. There was an
explosion and a tremendous
flash as his bombs burst with
the impact, but the site was
declared to be an open space.

Other raiders spread an arc of
incendiary bombs around three
sides of the city. Fires quickly
broke out. Auxiliary firemen were
reported to have subdued them.

Observers said the German air
activity appeared, however, to be
lighter than formerly.

One big bomb smashed several
shops and jarred an underground
public shelter in which hundreds
of persons were sleeping.

The British Press association
said raiders on the northeast
coast early today were driven
away by heavy anti-aircraft fire
and had to jettison their bombs
in the sea.

Bombs also were hurled in east
and north London, in Surrey and
on the northwest coast. The press
association reported several per-
sons were killed in a northwest
town.

The assault was renewed with
fresh vigor after a day of iso-
lated action during which two
major daylight thrusts at the
capital were beaten off, one by
coastal anti-aircraft and the other
by British fighter planes
which turned back a wave of 50
Messerschmitt fighter-bombers
over the southeast coast.

Tonight there were two warn-
ings before midnight, and the second
was followed by the intermit-
tent rumble of bombs and the high
cough of anti-aircraft fire, with
hulls of several minutes in be-
tween.

It appeared that the raiders, fly-
ing in small groups, first attacked
western, southwestern and south-
ern suburbs and later penetrated
to the central area.

Up to evening the London sirens
had screamed but once, and that
for a brief raid. Bombs fell in
east London and it was officially
announced that there were "some
casualties." An "industrial build-
ing" was hit.

Three Dead, 4 Hurt As Trucks Collide

CATHAGE, Tex., Sept. 21 (AP)—
Three men were instantly killed
and four seriously injured in a
head-on truck collision at 3:30 p.
m. today five miles south of Cathage.

The dead were Charles Johnson,
F. L. Bates and Roy Blankenship,
all of Arp.

All of the persons killed or in-
jured were riding on a lumber
truck en route to Cathage. The
driver of a freight truck involved
in the collision escaped injury al-
though his machine turned over in
a ditch at the side of the highway.

Still Big Demand For City Water

Heavy demands on the city water
system are still being manifested,
department officials said Saturday.

More than 1,000,000 gallons daily
are still being metered through the
filtration plant from the Powell
Creek lake. With consumption con-
tinuing above this level, sheet water
wells in section 17 were pressed
into service temporarily Friday
night.

However, the heavy producing
wells in section 33 were undisturbed
as they have been for the past
two months and Roy Hester, water
production superintendent, said
that the head in the basin had risen
23 feet to date. The rate of ascent
is slowing considerably as the level
increases into the wide portion of
the underground bowl.

Dictators May Demand Showdown Of Policy From Greece, Turkey

ROME, Sept. 21 (AP)—Fascist spokesmen in-
dicated tonight in the aftermath of the latest
Rome-Berlin consultation, that the axis may
call for a showdown from Greece and Turkey,
the last harbors for British influence in south-
eastern Europe.

Turkey still has a defensive alliance with
Great Britain; Greece still has a British pledge
to protect her independence.

From Virginia Gayda, frequently Mussolini's
sounding board, came the strongest indication
that Greece and Turkey may be asked to make
plain their positions.

The axis powers, Gayda wrote in Il Giornale
d'Italia, are ready to support conciliation and
respect for legitimate interests, but they "require

final clarification of still-pending problems and
attitudes still in doubt."

Gayda promised also that the war against
Britain "will develop with ever-more intense
energy and even greater and more irrevocable
application of means."

Joachim von Ribbentrop, Hitler's foreign
minister, still was in Rome today, sight-seeing,
following his conference with Mussolini and
Foreign Minister Count Ciano.

He will return to Berlin tomorrow, where he
again will see Ramon Serrano Suner, Spain's key
minister, who has been waiting there for him.
He is expected to tell Serrano Suner just where
Spain is expected to fit into the axis' future plans
and what Spain will get in return, perhaps in a
projected axis division of Africa.

Seek Gun Used In Slaying Of Four

MERTZON, Sept. 21 (AP)—Heavily guarded by three Texas rangers
and half a dozen other peace officers, Emilio Benavidez, 29, Mexican
charged with killing Henry Calcutt, Eldorado ranchman, and three
members of his family near Eldorado two weeks ago, was taken from
here at noon to look for the rifle alleged to have been used in the kill-
ings.

Officers declined to comment regarding a statement which Ben-
avidez made just before noon. They declared, however, that he had told
them he would take them to where
the gun could be found.

The Mexican ranch hand "start-
ed talking" after 12 hours of ques-
tioning and after Weaver H. Bak-
er, Junction, district attorney,
joined O. C. Fisher, San Angelo,
district attorney in the inquiry.

Benavidez had been held in the
jail here since last night
following his arrest earlier in
the day near the Mexican bor-
der, 80 miles from San Antonio,
by Sheriff Jim Nance of Terrell
county. Nance turned the Mexi-
can over to Sheriff O. E. Con-
ner, Eldorado, and Deputy Sher-
iff Cash Taylor, Sonora. They
brought him here. Rangers ar-
rived today to assist in the in-
vestigation.

Officers gave no indication
where Benavidez would be held un-
til time for trial. The Schleicher
county grand jury was to be re-
convened next week for further in-
quiry. Benavidez this week was
indicted by the jury for the slay-
ing of all members of the Calcutt
family.

MAN ARRESTED
FOR TOSsing EGG
AT WILKIE

MODESTO, Calif., Sept. 21 (AP)
Herman Boland, 29, Modesto
baker, was arrested today and
sentenced to 30 days in the coun-
ty road camp for throwing an
egg at Wendell L. Wilkie.

The egg struck the rear of the
railway car from which the re-
publican presidential nominee
spoke here yesterday and splat-
tered over the top of the speak-
ing platform. The egg was
thrown just as Wilkie's train
rolled to a stop.

It would, however, have only about
350 patrons.

Previous contacts with the
Washington REA office were to
the effect that an allocation is held
in reserve for this work. Saved
by the original line will be areas
in the northern half of Howard
county and central and southwest-
ern Martin county.

Coastal Area Is Target Of Heavy Blows

Nazi-Held Ports Get
Mightiest Blast-
ing Of The War

LONDON, Sept. 21 (AP)

The mightiest attack yet
made on German invasion
fleets and harbors across the
English channel was opened
tonight by British bombers
in a clear and star-lit sky.

For miles the Nazi-held French
coastline was alive with the light
of exploding bombs.

The British concentrated on
Dunkirk, Calais and Boulogne.
That whole area appeared to be
one long mass of fire.

It was a resumption, at even-
ing, of last night's attack against
German ships and barges jammed
beam to beam in clusters of 50 and
more in the harbors of the chan-
nel and North sea.

Attack after attack on the ports
from Boulogne and Dunkirk, fa-
talf town of escape for the
British army trapped in Flanders,
on up the coast to the tidal bases
of the low countries left devastat-
ion and flame astride quays,
moles, channels and docks, offi-
cials said.

Three hour-long raids were made
on Dunkirk alone, where the
pilots found the greatest concen-
trations of German troop vessels.

Other raiders penetrated in-
terior Holland, Belgium and Ger-
many itself and the pilot of one
came back to describe an at-
tack from 800 feet on a supply
train near Munster.

Two big bombs hit the train,
front and rear.

"The engine was lifted into the
air and blown to bits and frag-
ments of the wrecked train shot
up as high as the attacking air-
craft," the official account said.

At Dover flames from burning
buildings across the narrow
strait, the bursting of bombs,
star shells, the multi-colored
lights of the German "flaming
olon" anti-aircraft and thou-
sands of tracer bullets sent a
bright reflection into the sky to
light the chalk cliffs of England.

English men and women lined
the Dover cliffs, silent, thrilled be-
yond speech.

The orange glow of parachute
flares descending on the French
side helped light the scene like
some strange garden party as the
British thrust home their attack
in the face of fierce gunfire.

New Friction
In Indo-China

HONGKONG, Sept. 21 (Sun-
day) (AP)—An authoritative dis-
patch from Hanoi, French Indo-
China, said today French-Japan-
ese negotiations on Japan's de-
mand for military privileges in
French Indo-China today when au-
thoritative French sources de-
clared they would refuse to let
Japan make Tonkin a military base.

These sources said they were
ready to honor their word and
give Japan the military facilities
provided in the Vichy-Tokyo
understanding but would balk at
anything meaning Japanese mili-
tary occupation of Tonkin

Conservation Board Meets

STANTON, Sept. 21 (Sp) — The board of supervisors of the Howard-Martin County Soil Conservation district met in Stanton this week and completed work on the program for the district. They had called upon several of the agricultural agencies within the district for information as a previous meeting and this information was presented to them for inclusion in the program.

The supervisors now plan to go back to the people living on the farms in the various counties comprising the district, explain the program to them, and ask them for changes and recommendations on it. The program merely outlines the condition of agriculture within the district and recommends changes of these conditions. In the present form the program is a rather voluminous demonstration and a committee was appointed by the chairman of the board of supervisors, Joe Poindexter, to consolidate the information into a more brief and understandable report for the use of the individual farmer.

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Market Ends Week With Prices Up

NEW YORK, Sept. 21 (Sp)—Financial markets today ended a generally satisfactory week on the rising side.

Buying interest centered mainly in the heavy industrial stocks and a wide assortment of preferred issues. A number of the latter, trading in lots of 10 shares, pushed up 1 to around 7 points to new 1940 highs. Gains elsewhere ranged from fractions to around a point.

The turnover of 268,880 shares was the best for any Saturday so far this month and compared with 166,290 a week ago. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks, after being unchanged in the two preceding sessions, posted an advance of 3 of a point at 44.4. The composite showed a net gain on the week of 1.3 points. A month ago it stood at 42.3 and a year ago at 52.8.

GALVESTON EXPORTS HIGHER THAN '39

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (Sp)—The port of Galveston dropped behind New Orleans in the value of its exports the first seven months of 1940, but even so did a \$21,053,297 greater export business than during the same 1939 period.

A report by the commerce department on exports and imports of merchandise by customs districts showed the value of exports through the Galveston district

through July, 1939, was \$118,988,567, and through July, 1940, was \$139,986,860. Exports through New Orleans for the same periods were \$83,465,820 and \$152,779,262.

Statistics on imports for consumption for the seven months of 1939 showed Galveston \$16,234,681 and New Orleans, \$25,289,096, and for the same 1940 months, Galveston \$17,633,067 and New Orleans \$43,526,569, a rise through both ports.

Little too long. Feed prospects, generally speaking, were a little less bright than those of cotton. It appeared that previous estimates on quantity and quality might have to be revised slightly downward, but even so, the volume of production bids fair to be large.

The number of trench silos in Howard county is promising to again about double itself. County Agent O. P. Griffin said that some 70 had failed in previous attempts were giving up on the idea, but that others were confident their second trial would prove successful. There were many new trench silos being built, one battery being set up by a Glascock county rancher for more than 1,000 tons. He planned to buy feed for storage and move sheep for feeding.

Worm damage over the county failed to reach serious proportions, but in some areas, particularly the southwest sector, cotton fleas were taking a toll.

Late crops in South Texas and the alien registration program were credited with slowing up the autumnal migration of cotton pickers to the plains section. Mexicans, who do most of the picking, were having to show proof of citizenship or of having registered as an alien. Registration has been slow, holding many in the valley country.

Cotton prices here stood around 8.75-9.00 for 15-16 strict middling, but more than half of the amount ginned was going into the loan at 9.40 (about 18 pounds for bagging and ties, making it around 9). Seed, dropping from \$21 to as low as \$19, were back up to \$20 for the ton.

Meanwhile, allegations of fraud and theft in last Saturday's balloting came before the courts in seven counties and Dempsey brought action in district courts seeking to invalidate official canvases of ballots from late-reporting precincts.

This news intrigues the Judge and he manages to have Cole reprieved until further evidence in the trumped-up case against him is brought in.

The story reaches a smash climax in the scene where the cattlemen and Bean's henchmen set fire to the hundreds of homesteads and farms throughout the area. Cole realizes that the time has come for a showdown with Judge Roy Bean. He follows the weatherbeaten, grumpy old man to Fort Davis where Lily Langtry is to make her long-promised visit. How Cole waylays the Judge just as the gorgeous actress is about to step before the footlights and what happens when guns are fired provides the story with a swift, action-filled ending.

More than eight and a half miles of virgin roads were built by the Samuel Goldwyn company preceding the filming of "The Westerner" on location at Goldwyn City, Arizona, near Tucson. The roadway crossed a mountain range and meandered over forests of oaks and sycamores. In all, the company remained on location for four intensive weeks, during which time the largest herd of cattle ever photographed in movies passed before the camera. A herd of seven thousand was photographed as it crossed the Mexican border to Arizona. Among the most unusual sets constructed for the film is the saloon—a replica of that infamous liquor dispensary to which Judge Roy Bean held his court and ruled as the sole law west of the Pecos.

True, the Aggies must play three of their stoutest foes—Southern Methodist, Baylor and Texas—on enemy soil. True, also, is the fact that the Aggies never succeeded in beating Texas at Austin, regardless of the odds.

ny Clement, Dandy Dick Miller, Red McLean and a recently unveiled scab back named Bill Thomas, plus great blockers Will Mulligan and Horace Young. The Methodists rate only a half stride behind the Aggies. The

team that beats S. M. U. must score—and freely. P.S.: Matty Bell finally has the offense to go with his famed defense.

3. Baylor—Power, power that moves on speedy legs, makes Baylor fall in the same ranking

field combination. The line has been strengthened with big, fast men. Coach Morley Jennings whispers it's his best Baylor team.

4. Texas—Blessed with a tailor-made home schedule and a back like Cowboy Jack Crain, Texas, with Southern Methodist, Baylor and the Aggies due on their schedule as guests, look slightly better than last year. But the knockout punch, outside of Crain, still seems a little removed.

5. Rice—The Owls could move past Texas in the final standings. Coach Jess Neely moved in, started to work on waist lines, got the talented Owls into shape and now throws a more agile and fleet Rice team on the field than you have seen in years. They have a rough schedule—but play seven games at home. Watch Rice.

6. Texas Christian—Doubt that Kyle Gillespie will play much football takes away from Texas Christian. But Dean Bagley, a grand sophomore runner, will be around and Texas Christian will be a swell team to watch.

7. Arkansas—Stripped of an offense and with three sophomores likely to play in the backfield, Arkansas seems feeble. But the Porkers were the champion hard luck boys last season. Coach Fred Thompson has a real job trying to mold a contender.

Colorado U's '40 Champs On Spot

BOULDER, Colo., Sept. 21 (AP)—Football veterans at college-high Colorado University are in much the same position as stockholders who gleefully pocketed an extra dividend but voted the president out of a job.

They spent part of the winter months demanding and getting a new coach not long after the famed (Bunny) Oakes, who had led the team to the national Big Seven conference championship a year ago.

Now Frank C. Potts, painstaking and solemn, is at the helm but not, as neutral observers look at it, on the spot. The spot is reserved for silver-and-gold uniforms. The natural public reaction is that the Buffaloes, now that they have a new skipper that they asked for should come through for him.

One difficulty is that the team is up against the toughest schedule in Colorado's football history. Starting against Texas in the autumn heat of Austin a week from today, C. U. plays nine games without a break, against six conference foes going to clip her and against Kansas state and Missouri of the Big Six.

"We are picked as favorites, whether we like it or not," said Potts, whose first love is coaching the Colorado track team. "I am not crying the blues—we have no blues to cry."

Colorado has enough trumps in lettermen to start another grand slam, Buffalo football, basketball, track and baseball titles in the 1939-40 school year, a record without equal in the high country.

It has the best backfield in the region, spearheaded by Leo Stancia, all-conference halfback, who used up a year of eligibility at Illinois before deciding to go west.

NEW YORK, Sept. 21 (AP)—The college football season, which has been warming up in the bull-pen for the last couple of weeks, finally got into action today.

There wasn't a great deal of action. A few small colleges tried to stop the few big teams that opened their campaign ahead of their rivals. None of the little fellows had any real success and for the most part scores were so lopsided they didn't even give a good indication of how strong the major outfits are.

Perhaps the most impressive showings of the day were made by Boston College, the only major eastern team listed for action, and Kentucky, North Carolina and Wake Forest in the south.

The Boston College Eagles whipped Centre, usually a stubborn foe, 40-0, with little aid of their passing ace, Chuck O'Rourke. Centre was able to resist only in the first half. Kentucky scored at a point-min ute clip against another small college rival that usually gives

good account of itself, Baldwin Wallace. The final count was 59-7, with the losers scoring on a 53-yard pass play.

North Carolina, rated as a Southern conference title contender, routed Appalachian State 56-6 in the same circuit, rolled up a 79-0 count against William Jewell of Missouri.

Other Southern and Southeastern conference teams found the going just a little harder. Mississippi whipped Union (Tenn.) University 37-0. Clemson beat Presbyterian 38-0. Virginia military defeated Roanoke 33-0. Virginia Tech turned back Catambara 34-12. Washington and Lee made it 26-0 over Hampden-Sydney and Richmond defeated the Newport News Naval Apprentice School 38-0.

The most important game on the mid-western program saw Iowa State, opening its season a week ahead of its Big Six rivals, beat Luther 27-0.

Austin Panthers Show Aerial Force To Blast Steers, 13-7

Tornadoes' Last Stand Beats Roswell, 12 To 7

LAMESA, Sept. 21 (Spl) F. T. McCollum, veteran Lamesa Tornado coach, says he has a green bunch of boys this year.

In fact, they are so green they don't know when they are whipped. They are so untutored in the matter of odds that they just disregarded them to turn defeat into victory in the last minute of play here last night to turn back Roswell, N. M. by a count of 12-6, avenging a loss to an out-of-state squad last season.

It was that indomitable spirit that carried the Tornadoes twisting down the field when all hopes seem blasted. With sharp passing, mixed with a few tricks and some fierce blocking, Lamesa rammed over a touchdown in the last 45 seconds to overcome a one point Roswell lead.

The initial Tornado effort bogged down, but Roswell was immediately stalled and Lamesa took over when English kicked poorly 14 yards and the oval was killed on the Roswell 42. Futrell and Cates picked up a first down. Roswell lost six at left end, and Futrell was smeared on a pass attempt for 10 yards. "Big Un" White dropped back from his end slot to kick, but instead he scampered around right end 25 yards and a first down on the 16. Futrell and Cates made it a first down on the six yard stripe and Roswell slipped through for the counter. White missed the kick. Score, Lamesa 6, Roswell 0.

Roswell missed a first down by a foot on the Lamesa 33 and the ball went over. A 10 yard loss on an attempted pass nullified a 14 yard heave from Futrell to Calhoun. Then Roswell's spinners got to working momentarily and two first downs were picked up.

Blair broke through with a magnificent tackle to suddenly solve the riddle and force Roswell to kick. Cates, Roswell's punter, plugged away for a brace of first downs at half time.

The New Mexicans came storming back in the third with Deshires and Dennis passing and running from the Roswell 35, pushed four successive first downs to end up two yards from pay dirt with four new tries.

Here these "green" little Tornadoes didn't know enough to give up. They bristled, Roberts threw a pass, Brennenman's pass to Joyce was knocked down, and Roberts powered through to dump Brennenman for a two yard loss.

After Futrell worked it out five yards, White booted Lamesa out of immediate danger with a 40-yard kick. Roswell had to kick and it was killed on the Tornado 33. Lamesa drew a 15-yard penalty and 10 yards by Futrell and Cates were not enough. White got off a 43 yard punt, but Brennenman scattered back up field for 20 yards on the return.

Brennenman tossed to Dennis for a first down on the Lamesa 37 at the quarter's end. Brennenman found Dennis again for 19 to give Roswell a first on the Tornado 18. Brennenman shot one to White for 6 and Brennenman made it first on the seven yard stripe, where Brennenman shot through for the score and then, cool as an iceberg, kicked the point. 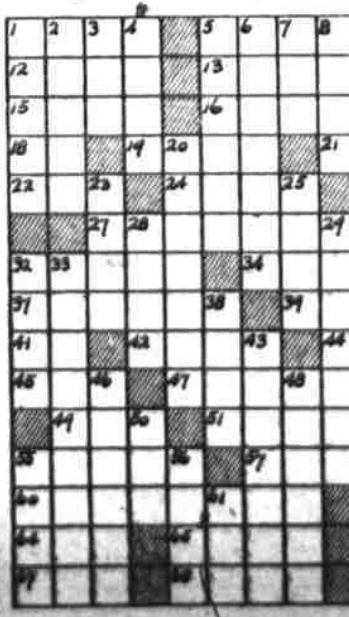

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Editorial

A unit that can be of inestimable service to the people of West Texas is the newly formed Central Tax Committee of the Permian Basin Association, which will function in 49 counties of the oil producing region through county committees.

The Howard county group's first meeting was held this past week at which time aims and purposes of the tax committee were outlined. Broadly speaking, these include:

Work to insure equalization of all taxes, make a survey of key counties to show accurately costs of efficiently operated government, and how these costs are being borne by the public; to all governmental bodies and budget hearings; stage meetings and promote a public campaign to educate the people of the Permian Basin on the importance of the tax committee.

The Permian Basin group is taking a head-on step into a field that requires attention. Summed up, its aim is to bring to the attention of the public more tax information. For it must be recognized that the big money behind the methods of government financing is the tax of public interest in what should be the most vital item to the public its taxes.

That concerted public action can achieve

beneficial results has been demonstrated. The West Texas chamber of commerce taxation committee accomplished fine results a few years ago, and this program is being revived with effect. The East Texas chamber of commerce is making progress with a similar project.

As Permian Basin officials pointed out, the tax committee's idea is not to criticize unduly officials of the various taxing units, nor to attempt to tear down in suitable tax structure. The aim is on the contrary to work with tax boards—such as commissioners courts, city commissions and school boards—toward the solution of their many fiscal difficulties. These officials hold no malicious intent, for they know too well that the job of levying, collecting and spending taxes is a heavy one, but one in which the taxpayers should have a voice. They welcome cooperation, and are frequently discouraged from lack of public interest.

If the new Permian Basin group accomplishes no more than making the people tax-conscious, it will have proved its worth. When taxpayers take an active and intelligent interest in public affairs, and give the officials the benefit of their experience and aid, the tax dollar will go much farther. It brings about a healthy condition, and the committee's work is to be highly commended.

Washington Daybook

WASHINGTON—The WPA was founded in the belief that work is better than a dole. Most Americans still think so.

But there is another equally good reason for a public work program, and that is that there are a great many things that need to be done to build up the nation.

It is necessary that there be an extensive public works program in America. This is so whether there is unemployment or full employment. It is only good sense, however, to spend up and extend this program at a time when there are many men who cannot be absorbed into private employment.

During the past few years the public works and construction schedule have been telescoped with the result that building programs in some parts of the country have been set ahead several years.

This is all to the good. We get the improvements sooner than they would otherwise be available and we extend employment at a time when it is most needed.

The truth is, however, that the present is of the recent public works program is more important than real. What has happened is a proper and necessary transfer of much of the public improvement work from local to a federal tax base. In this way relief has been afforded to local communities and the public has received a third major benefit from the WPA program.

There has been no objection of the WPA from quarters unacquainted with the program. It is said that the expenditures are enormous and the increase in the public debt has weakened the nation so that where the law prepared to incur the expense of national defense.

The truth is that exactly the opposite is the case. Our strength or weakness in the present

an international crisis such as the one we are now facing has nothing to do with the local, internal debt of the nation. It has a great deal to do with our industrial productivity, the skill and morale of our workers and the physical and tangible equipment which can be utilized for defense purposes.

In days of motorized armies it should not require much argument to demonstrate that we are in a much stronger position by reason of the four-billion-dollar investment during the past seven years in paved highways and streets. Nor is it difficult to understand how valuable are the results of the four billion dollars invested in flood control, reclamation, rivers and harbors and power dams.

It has been only a few weeks since the non-partisan defense commission demanded from the congress appropriations for an additional dam in the Tennessee valley. We should be thankful for the ones we already have.

Most of the assets they are assets because of the useful work they can do. So long as there are men in America who are able to work but unable to find jobs, a WPA program is essential to our welfare. So long as there are public improvements necessary, it is essential for our security. And the greater the threat to that security, the greater the need for public works.

The idea of a public program of public works to keep idle hands employed and to obtain useful improvements at a time when they would otherwise be unemployed is a new idea to most people. It is a new idea for a time to comprehend its significance. But when the public has thoroughly grasped the advantages of the WPA, it will be regarded as one of the greatest contributions of the administration to modern political economy.

I did not win the ship's pool today. It takes seven turns around the deck to make a mile. We have a number of Spanish priests aboard en route to the West Indies and also six nuns, but the nuns are Americans. The Spanish fathers do not speak English. We also have a doctor from Albany who has been invited to recommend an anti-tuberculosis program for the Dominican republic, and a concert pianist from Boston who is along merely for the ride. So you can see that we have a mixed company.

Midland C.C. Backs Road Bond Issue

MIDLAND, Sept. 21. — Steps have been taken by Midland chamber of commerce directors to complete Midland county's paved road system within 12 months.

At a special meeting in Hotel Scharbauer Friday the directors endorsed a proposed \$250,000 road bond issue and guaranteed citizens it would not increase their taxes.

A petition was drawn and quickly signed by Clarence Scharbauer, Dr. John B. Thomas, P. J. Mipe, Dr. W. E. Ryan, Roy Parks, Bill Collins, J. W. House, Daniel H. Griffith, Fred Wemple, P. A. Nelson, Paul McHargue, J. C. Smith and others.

Addressed to county commissioners, the petition asks that a special election be called as soon as possible, probably next month, for submission of the bond issue to the voters.

Commissioners meet Monday. The road boosters plan to take

the petition before county commissioners Monday and they will be asked to call the election immediately, arrange for proper notices and set the date.

All agreed there would be no increase in Midland county taxes as a result of the project. County Judge Elliott Barron said the work would be done by the federal government, the State of Texas and the Texas and Pacific railway.

The proposed hard-surfaced road will run from the Upton county line on the south to the Martin county line on the north. It has already been designated a state highway by the state highway department.

25 4-H Boys Feed Calves

Slender hood lines, even longer and lower than those of the Lincoln-Zephyr, lend stunning style appeal to these unusual cars.

A new Lincoln Custom series of fine family and formal cars also makes its debut in the Lincoln line. Rich appointments characterize the two body types, an eight-passenger sedan and a limousine, which offer several wholly distinctive features. Interesting results in pick-up and ease of handling are said to have been achieved through elimination of the excess weight and bulk which long have been associated with cars of this class.

12-Cylinder Engine
High performance characteristics distinguish the entire Lincoln line. All are powered by the 12-cylinder V-type Lincoln engine with reserves of power that promote sure and effortless driving. A compression ratio of 7-1, together with improvements in manifold and distributor design now permit this

precision-built motor to deliver 120 brake horsepower at 3,600 revolutions per minute. Resultant gains in fuel economy and engine life may be extended even further, if desired, by means of overdrives, obtainable as special equipment in either the manually-operated or the automatic types.

The cars operate quietly, a complete system of rubber insulation forming the contact between running gear and body-frame unit. Women should appreciate the exceptionally comfortable steering wheel, finger-tip gearshift on the steering column, soft clutch action, and powerful hydraulic brakes which permit quick stopping with slight pedal effort.

The Lincoln-Zephyr and Lincoln Continental are on a chassis of 128-inch wheelbase, while the wheelbase of the Lincoln Custom is 138 inches. Strength and rigidity resulting from unit body-frame construction contribute toward exceptional stability under difficult driving conditions. Other stability factors include an increase of two and one-half inches in the rear tread and the widening of wheel rims to five inches. This last change, which has the effect of "putting more tire on the road," gives added traction and stability that become particularly welcome on loose gravel, slippery highways or when the car is cutting through sharp cross winds.

The smoother ride of the new Lincoln cars results from the introduction of longer, wider, "slow motion" springs with greatly reduced rates of deflection. They are anchored in rubber and permanently lubricated. Work Progresses On Colorado Bridge

COLORADO CITY, Sept. 21. — Construction is due to move more rapidly on the new highway 101 bridge over the Colorado river in south Colorado City now that work on the footings and piers is nearing completion, it was said this week.

Steel work on the structure will probably begin within the next 30 days, according to Chas. T. Trickey, resident engineer for the state highway department.

Footings have been completed for seven of the nine piers which will support the bridge. All have been placed on a firm sandstone ledge, the deepest being 27 1/2 feet. Piers have been set on all the completed footings with the exception of the first one on the south bank of the river, and this one has been poured to the top of the ground.

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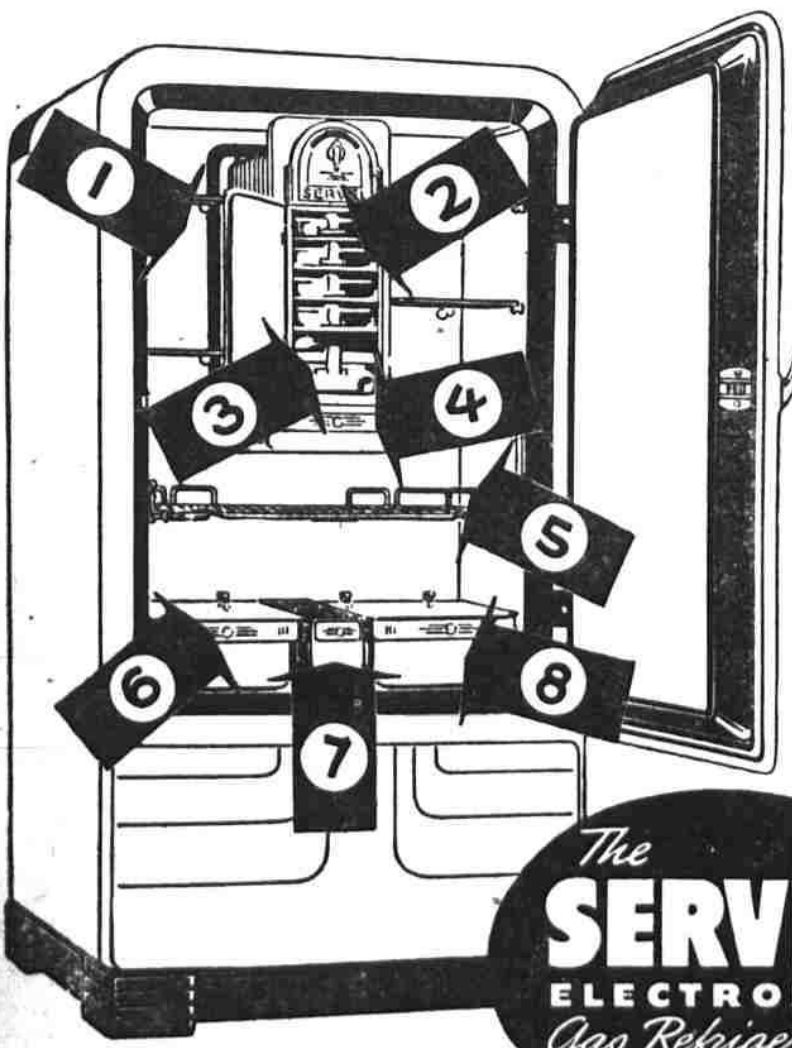
