about \$1,000 worth of goods were found to be missing from a cabin at Lake Colorado City which is owned by Herbert Pinkert of Lubbock.

According to Mitchell County Deputy Jim Reynaud, the items missing from the cabin included several fishing rods and reels and other fishing equipment. Also missing was a nine and one-half horsepower

Mercury outboard motor.

Reynaud said that a suspect in the burglary is now in custody in Post.

Two other burglaries which the sheriff's department is still working on occurred on April

4 at the home owned by Johnny Shackelford near Lake Colorado City and at the Westbrook School.

Reynaud said that items missing at the Shackelford residence were valued at about \$1,500 and included five

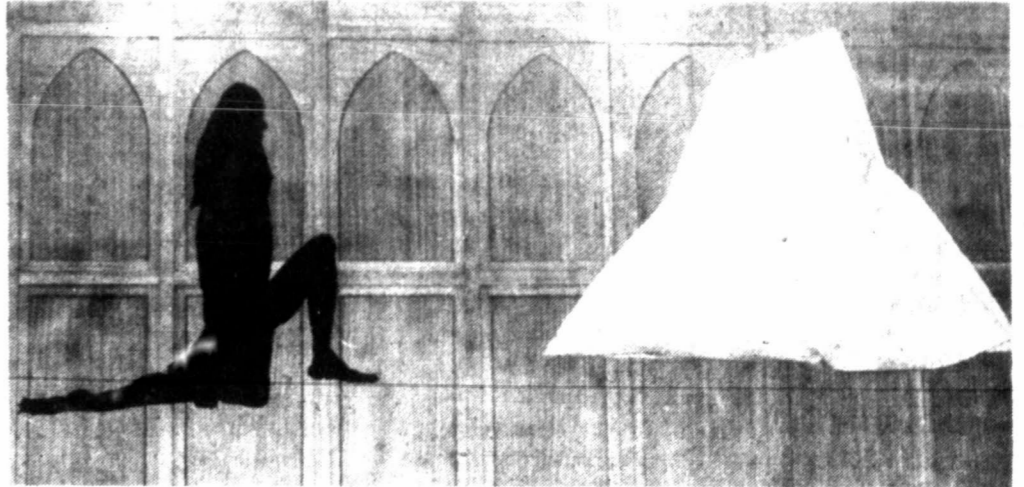
rifles, two pistols, an AM-FM eight track stereo system, a number of stereo tapes and a small radio.

Apparently sometime during the night of April 4, someone pried open a door on the north side of the Westbrook School and made an unsuccessful attempt to open the vault in the administration office.

Failing this, they went through the desk drawers in the office, left the place in disarray and finally found \$5 of "pencil money," they had to be satisfied with.

There was no damage to the school other than some scratches on the vault.

The sheriff's department is still searching for suspects in these latter two incidents.



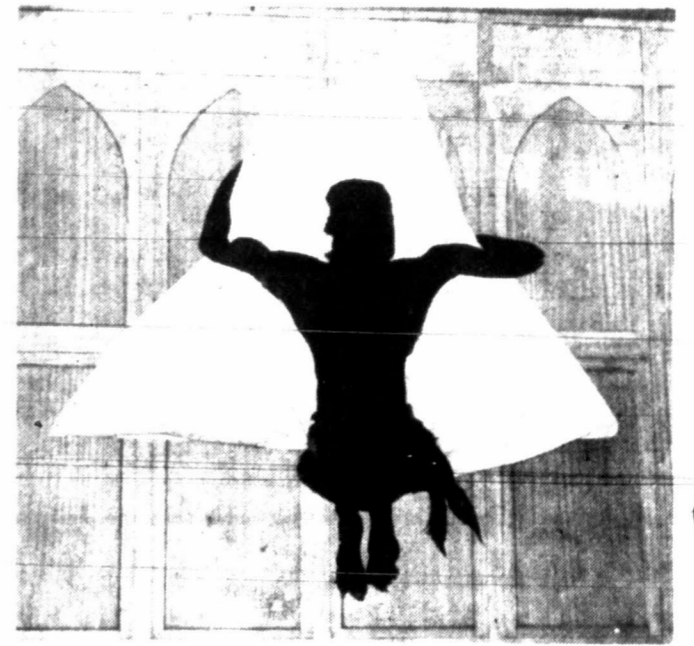
Sunrise Services Today

Easter Sunrise Services will be held today (Sunday) at 6 a.m.

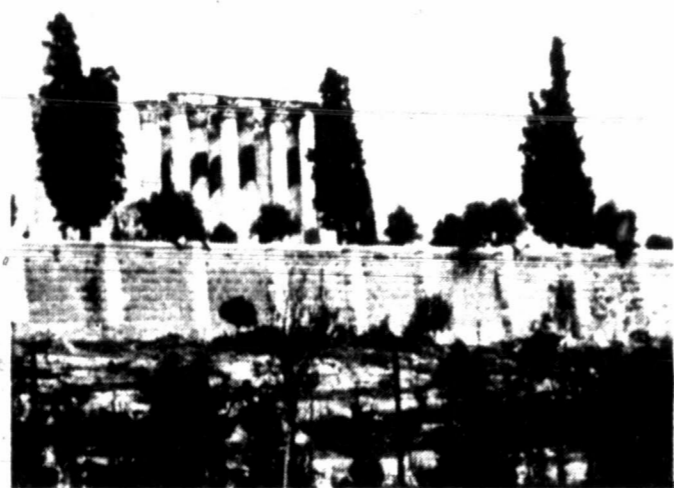
The services will be at First Methodist Church on the lawn between the chapel building and the sanctuary.

City To Check Water Meters

Colorado City is suffering a loss of an average of 20 million gallons of water each month.

According to City Manager Ray Mason, the normal loss is 20 per cent, which goes for water used by the city to water the cemetery, fill the swimming pool and other needs.

However, Colorado City is losing about 44 per cent annually.

"This concerns me," stated Mason.

At last week's regular city council meeting, Mason informed the councilmembers of the monthly water loss.

Mason told the council that technicians from Amarillo would check out the water plant meter since it had not been checked in 14 years.

However, when the Triple F Meter Company checked out the meter system, the calibration was one per cent off, which means the meter is in excellent shape.

Since the meter at the water plant checks out, the water is being lost after it leaves the treatment plant.

If the meter at the

water plant had been off register, the unaccounted for gallons would have tallied an \$1,000 monthly loss.

Since it is treated water which is lost, the cost is \$6,000 per month.

"We're going to find out where that water is going," said Mason.

Mason said that he suspects much of the water is being lost because of dead meters.

Thus, individual meters throughout Colorado City will be tested to see if they are operating properly.

Because of limited personnel, Mason noted that the procedure of checking meters and replacing ones which are dead will be a long process.

The normal house water meter costs from \$34-\$38 each, Mason said. A compound meter, which is used by large water consumers such as schools, costs "hundreds of dollars" to replace, he noted.

But, the cost of the meters will be justified by the accurate readings of water usage, said Mason.

Mason said that funds have been appropriated in the city budget to replace water meters.

She was a cheerleader for Colorado High School this year.

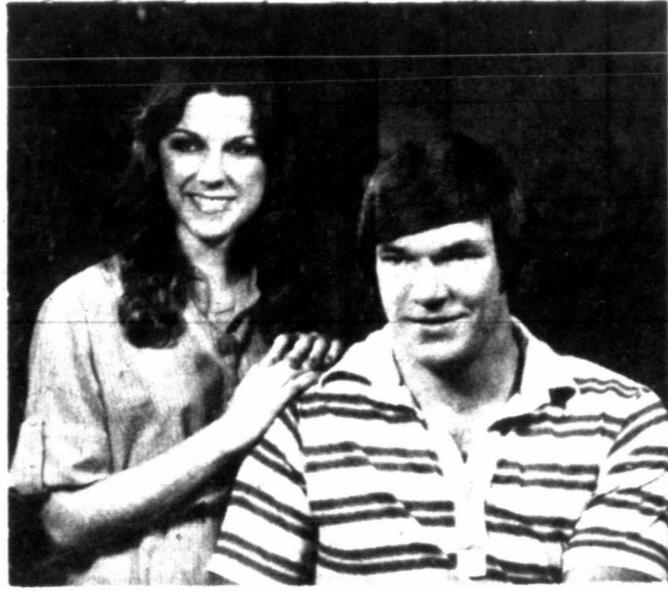

Finley Attends Meeting

Sweetwater Production Credit Association directors and officers joined other agricultural lenders in Houston Thursday thru Saturday for the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston's annual stockholders meeting.

PCA President F. C. Shillingburg of Sweetwater said area participants included board members T. L. Finley, chairman, of Loraine; W. J. Harvey, Jr., vice chairman of Roby; J. D. Crawford of Midland; L. D. Echols of Lamesa; Audry Head of Snyder; Othell O'Kelly of Trent and Marvin L. Standefer of Lenorah.

Harvey served as Sweetwater PCA's official delegate. Shillingburg and PCA officers Forrest L. Meeks and Ronnie Lynn Cloud accompanied the group.

More than 500 participants attended the three-day affair which featured the Houston bank's annual report by its president, Jack H. Barton. The session was designed to bring together 30 Production Credit Associations and 9 agricultural credit corporations.

Shillingburg said the FICB of Houston, source of most funds for these agricultural lending institutions, last year provided more than \$1.75 billion to Texas farmers and ranchers through its credit sources.

Former students of Texas A&M University will meet in Colorado City April 21 for the Annual Texas Aggie Muster.

Chairman Bob Benson noted that the Muster activities will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the Villa Inn.

The Muster is open to all former students and their families, parents of students and friends of Texas A&M.

Texas A&M is in its "Second Century of Greatness." During the last 100 years, Texas A&M has grown from a small land grant college to one of the leading research and educational institutions in the nation, Benson noted.

The Aggie Muster dates back to the mid-1880's and has been held annually since.

"More than 350 Musters will be held around the world this year," Benson said, "in places where Texas A&M former students live or work."

During war, the Aggies mustered in foxholes, on the battlefield, aboard ships, in airplanes and in medical hospitals. During World War II, a Muster was held on Corredgidor, shortly before the Japanese captured the island.

Benson noted that each Muster ceremony is the same.

The Texas Aggies pay their respects to those who are absent because of death since the last Muster. When the names of the honored dead are called from the Muster roll, a friend of the deceased answers "here."

Residents Walk In Garden, See Tomb

"He is not here, for He is risen." Matthew 28:6. Today, Easter Sunday, Christians around the world will celebrate the resurrection of Christ.

For some, it may be difficult to picture the Garden Tomb from which Jesus arose.

Several Mitchell County residents, however, will be able to picture the location vividly, since they returned recently from a trip to the Holy Land and were able to visit the Garden Tomb.

The tour group was comprised of Rev. Bob Grayson, Jaynee Grayson, Judy Chitsey, Hilda Feaster, Mary Humphreys, Ruth Humble, Tom Moore, Minnie Lee Moore and Billie Ruffin. Each is from Colorado City, except Mrs. Humble who lives in Pueblo, Colo., and is the sister-in-law of Mrs. Humphreys.

The group departed from Abilene March 20 and from there flew to Dallas and then to Chicago, Ill.

In Chicago, the group was joined by nine

people from Beaver Ore. From Chicago, they flew to Frankfurt, Germany.

After spending a couple of hours touring Frankfurt, the tour continued to Cairo, Egypt. While in Egypt, the tourists visited the Egyptian Museum, viewing treasures from King Tutankhamun's tomb. They took a short ride on camels up to the Egyptian pyramids.

While in Cairo, the group visited a factory where papyrus paper is made by using the same method of ancient times. The papyrus paper is what the Egyptians wrote hieroglyphics on.

The group took a sailboat ride on the Nile River and went to the Land of Goshen and saw the Bull Rushes of Moses.

After spending two nights in Cairo, the tour group flew to Athens, Greece, and visited the Acropolis and the Parthenon and stood on Mars Hill.

Next, they flew to Amman, Jordan, where they visited Petra, the hidden city carved out

of mountains. While in Jordan, they visited Mount Nebo where Moses once stood.

Leaving Jordan, the group crossed the Jordan River into Israel where they visited Jericho.

The tour group went to the foot of Masada, the high plateau where Herod built a fortress. When the Romans attempted to take over Palestine, some 960 Jewish people withstood the Romans for about three years on this high plateau. The Romans built a ramp from dirt and rocks to reach the top of the plateau. The Jews, realizing that capture was eminent, committed mass suicide. Therefore, this site has a great deal of meaning to the Jews.

After viewing Masada, the group waded in the Dead Sea.

March 26, the day the Peace Treaty was signed between Egypt and Israel, the group was in Jerusalem where they visited the Mount of Olives, the Garden of Gethsemane, the Temple site, Calvary where Christ was crucified and the Upper Room. They also visited Bethlehem and the Church of the Nativity.

Next, the tour progressed north to Haifa where they visited Mount Carmel, Megiddo and saw the Valley of Jezreel where the Battle of Armageddon will supposedly be fought.

They also visited Nazareth, Cana and saw Mount Tabor where the transfiguration of Christ is recorded to have taken place.

While in Capernaum, the tour group ate fish by the Sea of Galilee. The next day, the tour went to the Garden Tomb where they had communion and a worship service.

Before crossing back into Jordan, the group visited Bethany where Lazarus was buried.

March 29, the tour

group flew from Amman to Frankfurt to Chicago to Dallas. They arrived back in Colorado City March 30.

Because of terrorist activity, the tour group was not able to visit a few of the planned spots, such as Beersheba, Hebron and Mount Hermon.

Rev. Grayson noted that there was tight security going into Israel, but that the group did not encounter any serious problems.

The day the Peace Treaty was signed, there was much tension in Jerusalem. The shops were closed in protest of the treaty.

However, Moore noted that it rained and hailed in Jerusalem the day the treaty was signed and that the weather was the "Lord's way of keeping a demonstration from starting."

Rev. Grayson said that the Jewish people were happy about the Peace Treaty but the Arabs viewed it as an agreement between Menachem Begin, Anwar Sadat and Jimmy Carter and that it was not necessarily representative of the two countries.

For most of the tour group members, this was their first trip to the Holy Land. Rev. and Mrs. Grayson previously visited the Holy Land in 1974.

Rev. Grayson said that there were more soldiers patrolling the streets when they visited this time in comparison to the previous trip. Inflation has hit hard, he noted, explaining that in 1974 an American dollar was worth four pounds but now is worth 20 pounds.

Poverty is especially severe in Cairo, a city with a population of more than 10 million.

Rev. Grayson noted that the tour group saw varied terrain during the trip. Within a 50 mile radius, there are high mountains, sandy barren areas, flat green plains and rolling hills.

Several of the group members noted that they were especially impressed by the Garden Tomb.

"Seeing the tomb of Jesus empty was inspiring to me," said Mrs. Humphreys.

Mrs. Ruffin said that the communion and worship service at the Garden Tomb was the climax of the trip.

The scenery in Petra also impressed Mrs. Ruffin with the buildings carved from sandstone. The group rode horseback into Petra to view the city.

To Mrs. Moore, seeing Mars Hill was particularly striking.

Mrs. Moore noted that one of the spiritual high points during the trip came when the group was attempting to pass into Israel.

While at the Amman Airport, each of the tourist's passports was stamped. However, in the rush, the clerk missed stamping the passport of Rev. Jerry Kennedy, the pastor of the Oregon group.

When the group tried to get into Israel, the guard would not allow Rev. Kennedy to enter because his passport had not been stamped in Amman.

Rev. Kennedy returned to the bus and the group prayed together. Rev. Kennedy then confronted the guard again and was allowed to enter.

"It made us realize the power of prayer," said Mrs. Moore.

Mrs. Chitsey said that seeing the people at the Wailing Wall in Old Jerusalem especially impressed her.

Mrs. Chitsey explained that the Jewish people write prayers on pieces of paper and stick them in the cracks of the Wall. They place their hands on the Wall and hold prayer books. There is a place for the men and boys to stand at the Wall and a separate place for the women and girls to stand.

Inside the Wailing Wall is the Temple Mount. There is a sign posted outside the Temple which states that Jewish people are forbidden by the Chief Rabbi to enter the Temple area. The reason for this is that when the Romans destroyed the Temple, the Ark of the Covenant was lost and it is feared to be buried somewhere under this former Temple site. To step on it would defile the Ark and the person.

To Mrs. Grayson, visiting authentic sites where Jesus and men of the Bible once lived was thrilling. She noted that Old Jerusalem was one of her favorite stops. "I enjoyed it all," said Mrs. Feaster about the trip to the Holy Land. "I recommend it for everybody—it's the dream of a lifetime."

Addie V. Payne also visited the Holy Land recently, but she visited with the Worldwide Methodist Evangelism Commission.

Mrs. Payne toured the Holy Land from Feb. 26 to March 10 and it was a "marvelous experience."

She noted that the place she visited which had the most emotional impact was the Garden of Gethsemane.

"It was still and quiet and looked as you might expect it to," said Mrs. Payne.

Mrs. Payne noted that 799 people from all over the world visited the Holy Land in conjunction with the Worldwide Methodist Evangelism Commission.

"It was a once in a lifetime experience to get a feel of the Holy Land," said Mrs. Payne.



Oil Activity

A wildcat was scheduled in Mitchell County.

Samedan Oil Corp., Midland, will drill the No. 1 Ellwood Estate, a 7,400-foot wildcat in Mitchell County, five miles southeast of the Champion Lake (Yates gas) field, eight miles north of the Dixon (Ellenburger, Odom and Strawn) field, one and five-eighths miles north-northwest of a 7,330-foot failure and 9 1/2 miles south of Colorado City.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the east lines of 13-J.F. Smith.

The failure, Peninsula Resources Corp. No. 1 Mayse, abandoned March 10, 1978, topped the Caddo at 5,038 feet and the Ellenburger at 5,136 feet on ground elevation of 2,090 feet.

Police Response Calls Increase

Colorado City Police Chief Fred McWhorter released his department's annual report for 1978 this week and while it showed slight decreases in some types of crime locally over 1977, it showed big increases in others. McWhorter attributed some of these increases simply to an increase in police response calls and more contact with the public.

The number of adults arrested locally in 1978 totaled 267 which was an increase of seven (three per cent) over 1977. As might be expected the most adult arrests came in December with 39. The month with the fewest arrests was February with 11.

While adult arrests decreased slightly, the number of juveniles handled by the department more than quadrupled over 1977.

In 1978, 39 juveniles were handled as compared with only nine the year before. McWhorter noted that this wasn't unusual. "Everyone has had a drastic increase in juvenile crime," he said.

Crimes against persons in Colorado City in 1978 totaled 34. This figure included—27 assaults, one attempted murder, one rape, one sex offense, two assaults on police officers and two robberies.

The 1977 figure for crimes against persons was 41, so there was a decrease of 17 per cent in this type of crime in Colorado City in 1978. Crimes against property increased locally last year. There were 144 property crimes in Colorado City in 1978 and this figure included the following—86 thefts, 49 burglaries, 30 vandalism and nine auto thefts.

In 1977 there were 122 property crimes in Colorado City. If you combine the crimes against persons and property crimes together, you will find there were 178 in Colorado City in 1978 as compared with 163 in 1977. This represents an eight per cent increase.

The average national increase in crime in 1978

over 1977 was 26.9 per cent.

Crimes against persons are usually easier to solve than property crimes and this was borne out by the fact that 33 of the 34 crimes against persons committed here last year were solved, giving the police department a clearance rate in this area of 97 per cent.

The clearance rate of crimes against property dropped to 42 per cent as 51 of the 144 property crimes mentioned earlier were solved.

The Colorado City Police Department had a 1978 clearance rate on all crimes of 42 per cent. This was about 20 per cent above the national average.

Last year local citizens lost goods valued at \$37,708 as a result of property crimes. Of this figure, \$15,104 worth of this property was recovered.

In addition to this property lost, there was \$16,705 worth of property damaged in property crimes locally last year. This figure included \$11,000 worth of property damage in burglaries, \$1,235 worth damaged in auto burglaries and \$4,370 worth damaged in vandalism.

Traffic accidents in Colorado City decreased slightly in 1978 over 1977.

Last year there were 196 accidents locally including 177 minor accidents and 19 major accidents. There were no fatal accidents inside the city.

The accident figure for 1977 was 221 with there being 195 minor accidents and 26 major accidents with no fatalities.

August was the worst month for local accidents here last year with 22 being recorded during that summer month. The lowest number was 14 with this figure being recorded in February, May, September and December.

Estimated dollar value of these 196 accidents last year was \$44,870.

Citations issued by the Colorado City Police De-

partment increased markedly in 1978 over the previous year. In 1978 there were 1,310 citations issued as compared with 1,080 in 1977. This is an increase of 15 per cent.

Finally, there were 256 dogs impounded in Colorado City in 1978. This figure would probably have been greater except that the city had no animal warden during the months of January through March.

Artist Depicts Gethsemane

Some 20 yards of cloth have brought special meaning to Easter to those who have visited First Methodist Church.

During the 40 days of Lent, the struggle of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane has been depicted in the form of cloth sculptures on the wall above the altar at First Methodist Church. Leola Anderson, local artist and member of First Methodist, has created seven scenes from Jesus' experience in the Garden of Gethsemane.

Through the cloth sculptures, the additional changes of Jesus in the Garden are suggested.

The first Sunday of Lent, Mrs. Anderson formed 10 yards of heavy cotton duck into the shape of a Rock, representing God. Since the first Sunday, the Rock has remained in the scenes.

For the second Sunday of Lent, Mrs. Anderson used 10 yards of brown burlap to shape a human form, representative of Jesus. The Figure was depicted with Christ falling on His face.

For the third scene, the Figure was on His

knees and His left hand was raised, pushing the Rock back. The Figure suggested Christ's wrestling with fright, fear and agony.

Resignation was suggested in the fourth scene with the Figure taking a step forward.

Palm Sunday, the Figure was thrown upon the Rock in the image of a subtle cross. The kneeling position of the Figure suggested submission and consummation.

Today, Easter Sunday, the Figure on the First Methodist altar wall will be made from purple drapery. The Figure will suggest an invitational attitude.

Mrs. Anderson noted that presenting Christ's emotional experiences in the Garden has been "a terrific challenge—I go through Gethsemane each time."

Sculpting with cloth is not a common form of art. Mrs. Anderson roughly sketched each scene before she began to work, but she noted that the forms were not practiced and would "happen" as she worked.

Each week, Mrs. Anderson would spend between four and seven

hours working on the Figure.

Mrs. Anderson earned a degree in art from the University of Texas at Permian Basin in 1977.

She and her husband, Warren, have four children. Their daughter, Kathy, is involved in church work in Switzerland. Woody is a graduate from the University of Texas at Austin and is engaged in farming in Mitchell County. Leslie teaches speech and drama at Lamesa School and Randy is a freshman at Texas Tech.

The district tournament was held in Sweetwater and Alvarez and Claxton in their opening round match took on Abilene Wylie and came

out on top in straight sets, 6-1, 6-1.

Alvarez and Claxton's next opponents in the second round were a pair from Stamford and the Wolves netters again had no trouble as they disposed of the Bulldog duo in straight sets, 6-2, 6-1.

Having taken care of everyone else, the only pair that stood between Alvarez and Claxton and the district doubles title was another pair of Wolves, Don Jones and Rod Reeves. After two tough sets Alvarez and Claxton again emerged as the winners by 7-5 and 6-3.

Tony Franco also qualified for the regional tournament by coming in second in district.

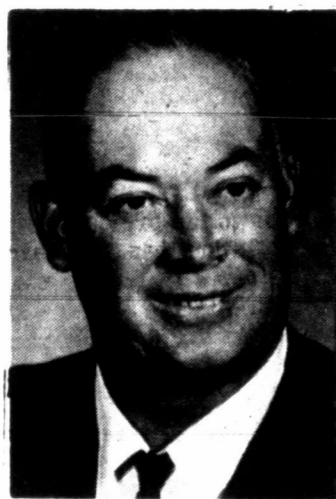

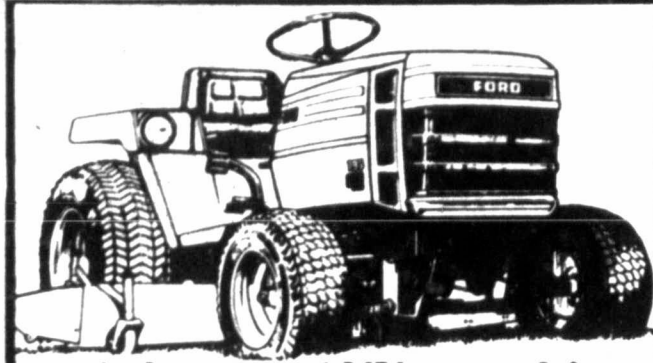

Nutrition Program To Be Presented At Wallace

McClure Owner Of Livestock Auction

The Colorado City Livestock Auction, located on East U.S. 80, reopened recently and held their first sale on April 7.

New owner Bob McClure said that last week's auction was very successful with some 780 head of cattle being sold for a total of about \$350,000. It was the first of the auction's weekly sales which are scheduled to begin at noon every Saturday.

McClure stated that last week's auction attracted buyers from as far away as Phoenix, Ariz., as well as some from New Mexico and Oklahoma. There were also buyers from Fort Stockton and Midland as

well as area buyers from Sweetwater, Snyder and Colorado City.


The prices which the cattle brought at the sale included—packer cows, 62½¢ per lb.; fat bulls, 76¢ per lb.; stocker steers, \$1.21 per lb.; pairs, \$900 and springer cows, \$790 per head.

McClure said there were several reasons why he had purchased the cattle auction. He stated that he felt that there was enough cattle in the area to justify a good sale and also that it was much easier for area buyers to come to Colorado City than to leave town.

He added that the auction would bring about \$1,000,000 per month of revenue into the area.

McClure said that he has plans to remodel the auction house and this would include the enlarging of the cafe which opens at 6 a.m. on Fridays and Saturdays. There are also plans to add a dining room to the cafe and to add a porch onto the structure.

Finally, McClure said that he wished to thank everyone who had made the first sale a success, both those who had helped get the place ready and to the buyers.




