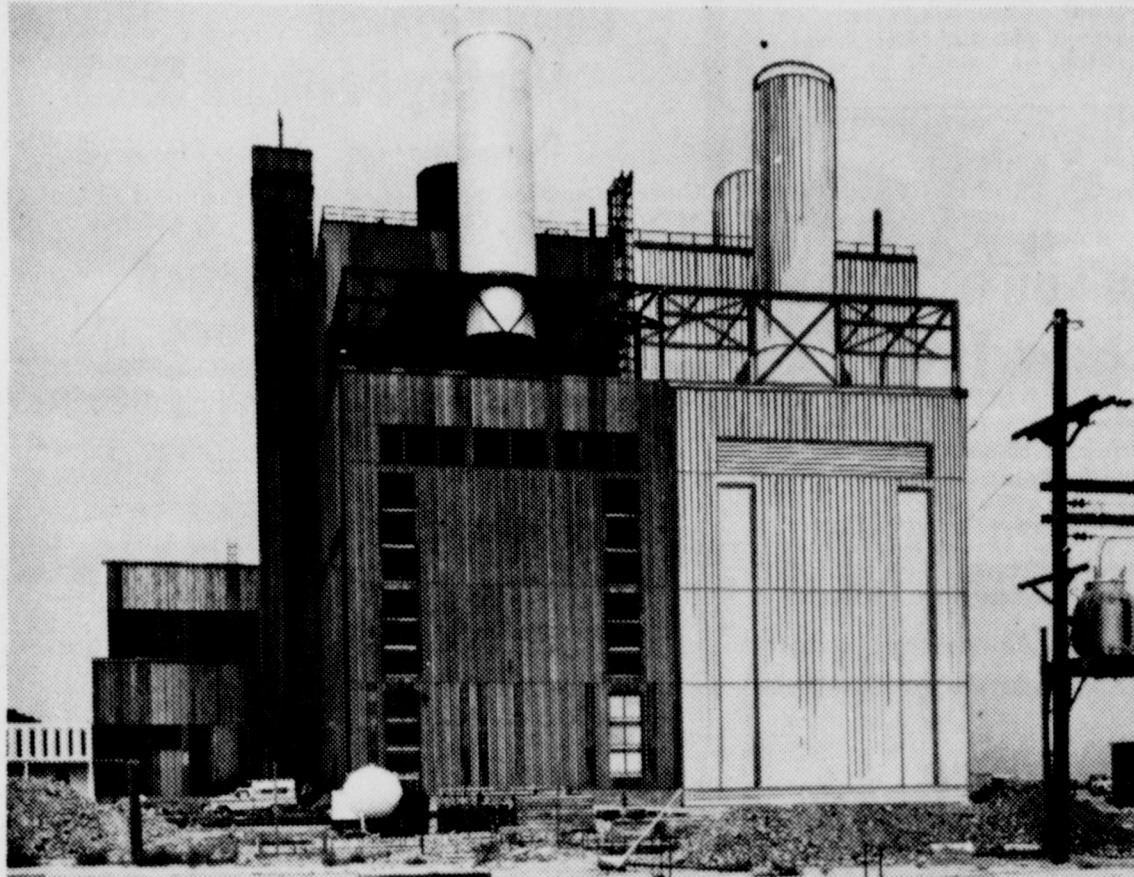

Improvements Announced By SWPS

More electric power for 1971 and 1972 is portrayed by this combination construction picture-artist's rendering of Southwest Public Service Company's Jones Station, southeast of Lubbock. The left half of the picture shows recent construction of the 1971 addition which will add 250,000 kilowatts to Southwest's generating capability in mid-year. That means we'll have 14% more electric power available next year than we had this year, when the region had a more than adequate supply. The 1972 addition, sketched in on the right, will double the capability of Jones Station and make it the largest of the company's 11 power plants. The 1971 plant addition is part of the electric company's Golden Anniversary Year construction program which calls for an investment of nearly \$20,000,000 for new plant and equipment throughout the company's 45,000 square mile service area.

A 14% addition to the area's electric generating capability in mid-1971 will come about when the first unit goes into service at Jones Station, located southeast of Lubbock. The 250,000 kilowatt generator will be the largest single unit on the company's system and will put the company's total power-producing capability at nearly 2,000,000 kilowatts. That's more than twice what it was 10 years ago.

Tolk also revealed plans for the second 250,000 kilowatt machine at the new facility. A twin of the one which will go into 1971 service, the new unit has been ordered from Westinghouse Corporation. Ground will be broken for the second unit in 1972.

"We don't propose to get into any kind of insofar as adequate power supply to serve our customers is concerned. It takes longer to get electric generating equipment these days, so we've put our order into adequately meet our requirements. We are noting an increase in number of customers throughout our service area, an indication that we are returning to a growth pattern, and we want to have the electric power supply that will stimulate that growth," Tolk said in making the plant expansion announcement.

Jones Station is named for Clifford B. Jones, president-elect of Texas Tech University, and a director of Southwest Public Service Company since 1945.

When the two units are in service, Jones Station alone could serve a city three times as large as Lubbock or Amarillo and it is just one of eleven generating facilities on Southwest's interconnected system.

There has been no power shortage problem in Southwest's service area. In 1970, for example, when some sections of the area were plagued with brownouts and voltage reductions, Southwest's customers were able to continue to use electric power without restriction and the company passed through its summer peak

Farmers Given Wider Choice In Production

"Farmers are entering a new era with the programs announced for 1971-crop wheat, feed grain and cotton," according to E. J. Pope Jr., chairman of the Hale County ASCS Committee.

"The Agricultural Act of 1970 provides the way to break with the past by enabling farmers to employ their land and capital resources in planting the crops they can best produce. At the same time, the Act continues the protection of farm income through payments and loans," Pope said.

"A major departure from current programs frees farmers from rigid planting restrictions applied to each crop on the basis of production patterns reaching back several years. The 1971 programs give farmers a much wider choice in using their acreages without losing program benefits."

"While loans will continue to protect against depressed prices, the new provisions place greater emphasis on market needs as the guide for producers' planting decisions. The acreage provisions announced today are designed primarily to keep the overall excess of productive capacity in check to prevent a return of surpluses."

"Corn of the feed grain group offers a difficult decision for farmers in 1971. However, each individual can better relate his particular operation to the market than can the government. Under the new program, a broader use of acreage for corn or other crops is now possible without a farmer being forced out of the program. Wheat and

ask period with reserves that exceed the peak demand by more than 20%. The 1971 Jones Station addition is designed to provide adequate power reserves during the three year period until the 1974 unit is completed.

1971 will be Southwest Public Service Company's Golden Anniversary Year. The company was incorporated at Roswell, New Mexico in 1921 as the Roswell Public Service Company. Its service area now covers 45,000 square miles in parts of four states and it serves 225,000 customers. It has an investment in plant and equipment that is now approaching 500-million dollars and it has been adding to that investment at an annual average rate of 20 million dollars for the last ten years.

A social worker makes a study of the home before children are placed. Foster families are paid a board rate of \$70 a month. There is a great need for families willing to share their homes and their lives with children who will otherwise never know what it's like to have a family.

O. A. Tooker Is Shot At His Home
