## RECORD ATTENDANCE AT BASEBALL MEET

### Plans Now Underway For Dawson County Free Fair HORSE SHOE PITCHING CONTEST PLANNED FOR NEXT TRADES DAY

#### WINNERS WILL BE AWARDED MONEY AND OTHER PRIZES

The next Trades Day at Lamesa will be September the Fifth. Merchants are getting ready to announce bargain day prices on this date and the Courier is planning another one of its popular contests for women that will result in entertainment and valuable prizes and money in gold for the winners.

It will be an old time horse shoe pitching contest for all women who come to the Trades day and enter this event. Judges will be on hand to conduct the contest and all women who enter will be asked to register at the Courier office before appearing to pitch.

Ladies get ready and practice up a bit. Horse shoes will be furnished by the Courier for the event, but they will be regulation horse shoes so any lady who desires to practice may obtain any regulation horse shoe and begin practicing at once. Two metal stobs will be placed in the ground fifteen feet apart and six in, above the top of the ground. The lady will stand back of one stob and pitch two regulation horse shoes at the other stob. A ringer counts five points. One shoe on the other kills the pitch.

The closest shoe counts one point. Pitching will be in groups the winner of each group being allowed to contest the winner on other groups as so directed by the judges.

#### G. OF C. DIRECTORS IN MONTHLY MEETING

The Lamesa Chamber of Commerce directors and officers met in regular monthly session for breakfast in the Westland Hotel Wednesday morning seven o'clock, this week. The following officers and directors were present:

J. W. Bryant, president; Dr. W. H. Bennett, W. B. Collins, J. R. Flanniken, J. R. Lowrie, Mon D. Thaxton, Louis B. Reed, Ed Haynes, and Wm. A. Wilson, manager.

Routine business, including minutes, financial reports, passing of bills, etc., claimed attention of the board. Reports of departmental heads, including Merchants, C. Baldwin, chairman, on Good-Will trips, Civic J. R. Lowrie chairman, on Clean-Up Campaign and Yard Contests; Membership, Louis B. Reed, chairman; were heard and approved. These chairmen reported the activities of their departments during the past month.

Special commendation of the directors was recognized for the work of C. Baldwin, chairman of the Merchants Department, in putting on the three Good-Will trips during the last of July; and for Judge J. R. Lowrie, chairman of the Civic Department, in the excellent results obtained from the Clean-Up Campaign during July, and which is now still in progress.

The body voted to co-operate with the Luncheon Club, the Lions Club, both local newspapers, and a representative from each rural community in Dawson county in the matter of putting on a county fair this year.

Owen C. Taylor, chairman of the Agricultural Department, was authorized by the body to proceed with these representatives to set up a fair organization which will assume the responsibility for a county fair.

#### STOPPING HITCH-HIKING

Virginia now has a law against hitch-hiking. A man convicted of trying to thumb his way along the highways is liable to a fine of \$30 and a sojourn of 50 days in jail. It may be a solution—and, again, maybe not. There is no question as to this widespread practice of soliciting free rides being a nuisance; nor can there be any debate on the desirability of putting an end to it, but whether "there ought to be a law" on the subject is open to discussion. We are too prone, perhaps, to try to cure things by passing laws. That seems to be an easy way to relieve the average citizen of responsibility, but in this case autoists are largely responsible for the prevalence of the nuisance from which they suffer. If they would only establish a general practice of refusing to pick up would-be free riders—who are beggars at best, and possibly something worse—they would soon no longer be molested. It would thus be settled without a law—and therefore better settled. After all, a stranger has no more right or excuse to ask to share your automobile than to ask to share your home or your meals.

The organization was completed with Vernon Alexander acting as temporary chairman, H. H. Barron was elected permanent chairman and Vernon Alexander elected permanent secretary with a general arrangement committee of five to arrange for a general South Plains rally for Mrs. Ferguson for Governor, for the near future, the date to be decided upon in time to announce right away, probably in this issue, in a different space.

The following resolution was offered and adopted with out a dissenting vote, to-wit:

"In a mass meeting assembled this the 6th day of August, A. D. 1932, we the citizens and voters of this county (Dawson) go on record as endorsing the platform of Mrs. Miriam Ferguson, and further endorse her for governor.

#### LAMESA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL BOARD TO HOLD PUBLIC HEARING AUGUST 15

The Board of Trustees of the Lamesa Independent School District has given notice that the board would have a public hearing on its budget for the coming year at the down town office of the board on Monday night August 15th at 8:00 o'clock.

It is not only the legal right of any taxpayer to appear before the board at this hearing, but it is their duty if they have information or could be helpful in the interest of taxpayers.

The law requires the board to furnish any taxpayer all of the information it has, and also requires due consideration of the taxpayers' suggestions.

Our committee composed of Messrs. S. L. Forrest, Ed Haynes, E. C. Nix, and J. N. Lowmore have reported that the valuations have been reduced 20 per cent from last year.

Further reductions can be secured only by a reduction in the rate and the importance of this hearing is that an opportunity is offered the taxpayers to supply the board with data justifying a rate reduction.

It is to be hoped that every taxpayer who can be of assistance will appear and co-operate with the board and when they have done that there is no question but that the board will do its duty conscientiously and no further complaint should be made. If taxpayers do not interest themselves, then it is unjust for them to complain later.

Mr. Arthur P. Duggan, a member of the Littlefield School Board advises that by careful study they were able to reduce their school taxes 40 per cent this year without impairing their school.

It will require a 20 per cent reduction in our rate if we match Littlefield in this economy.

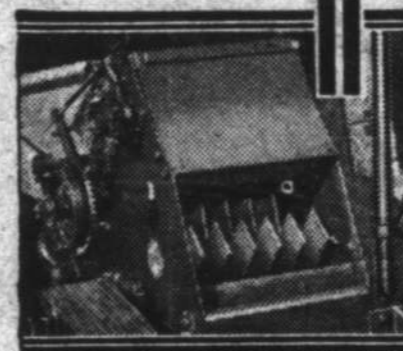

## THE COMMERCIAL USE OF TEXAS HIGHWAYS IS A PRIVILEGE, NOT A RIGHT

● The highways of Texas are the property of its citizens. They constitute a system of nearly 200,000 miles of road of which 20,000 miles are designated as State highways and the remainder are county roads. All types of road are represented in this system, less than 5% have so-called "permanent" surface.

The total cost of these highways is unknown but it amounts to many hundred million dollars. From 1917 to 1930, inclusive, counties and road districts of the State issued \$243,592,834 in bonds for the construction and improvement of roads and bridges. In the two-year period ending August 31, 1930, the State Highway Commission expended \$89,032,825, of which \$22,488,426 was for maintenance of the State highways.

In view of these tremendous costs the preservation of our highways from rapid wear and destruction is a matter of very vital interest to their owners, viz., the public. It is especially important that they be made to outlast the life of the bonds, which run from 20 to 30 years.

The use of the public highways for commercial purposes is not a right but a privilege which may be withheld or granted subject to such restrictions, regulations and charges as the Legislature may see fit to impose. Such regulations are intended to promote safety, preserve the highways and safeguard the interests of the public.

Texas Railroads, which pay the entire cost of construction and maintenance of their own roadbeds and, in addition, make substantial contributions to the cost of Texas highways, are thoroughly regulated with respect to their services, rates, methods and practices. There is no good reason why commercial users of the highways, built and maintained at the expense of the public, should not likewise be regulated to such extent as the public interest requires and pay such charges as will represent proper compensation for the privileges granted them.

● The statutes governing highway transportation as enacted by the Forty-second Legislature represent the wishes of the citizens of this State and express their desire to give equal rights to all and special privileges to none. These statutes should be given a fair trial and their value ascertained. Unless this is done, a chaotic condition in transportation as a whole will surely ensue.
