Political Season Opens

Commissioner Cawthron Will Not Seek Re-Election

A number of Mitchell County office holders this week announced they will seek re-election, a number of others are as yet undecided and one, Precinct 2 Commissioner Drue Cawthron of Westbrook has announced he will not seek re-election.

Offices up for election this year include the district judge, district clerk, county judge, commissioners for Precincts 2 and 4, all justices of the peace, the county school superintendent, county clerk, county treasurer.

Cawthron in a statement to the Record, said, "I would like to express my appreciation to all the people in Precinct 2 and Mitchell County for the support you have given me the last three terms as your commissioner.

"I regret to say that due to business interest, I will not be a candidate for this office in 1975. It has been a privilege and an honor to serve you," Cawthron concluded.

Those who will be seeking re-election include County Clerk Marie Bassham; County treasurer Mildred Boyd; District Clerk, Bill Erwin; Peace Justices Leonard Henderson, Mary Lee Moore and George Sweatt, Westbrook J.P.

Those who are as yet undecided if they will seek re-election include County Judge Bill

Carter, Loraine (Precinct 4) Commissioner Moody Richardson, County School Superinten-

dent Roy Davis Coles and Loraine Justice of the Peace, S. H. Hart.

The filing deadline for county and district offices are expected to be announced soon as

well as the date for the Democratic primary.

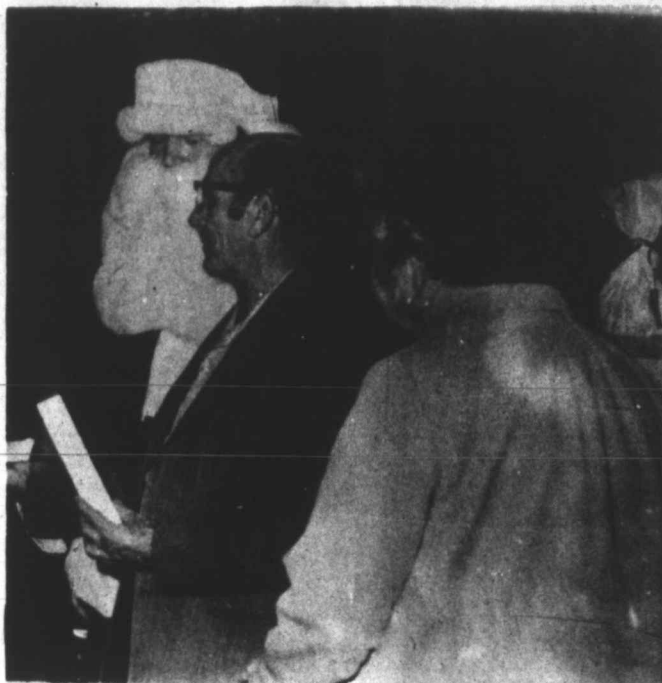

An open letter from Lone Star Gas

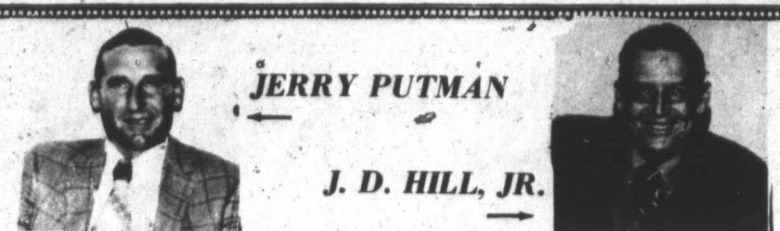

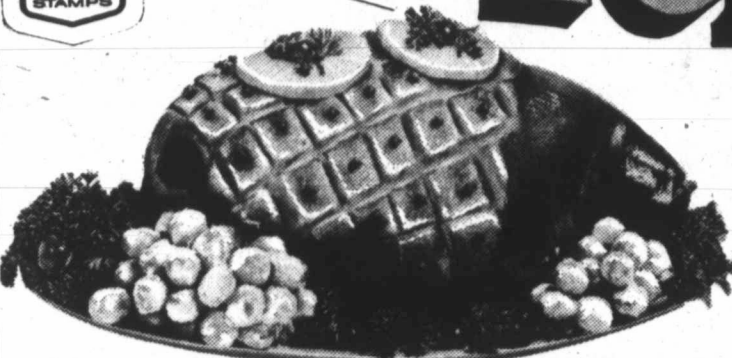

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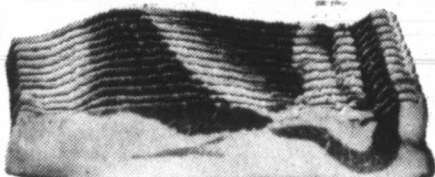
