## Party primaries held Saturday

Democratic and Republican primaries will be held this Saturday, May 1, with polls opening at 7 a.m. and closing at 7 p.m.

County Republicans will be voting on the local level for two Justice of the Peace candidates, a county chairman and all precinct chairmen. Also on the GOP ballot are candidates in the district, state and national-level races.

Democrats in Aransas County will vote for precinct chairmen, a county chairman, Justices of the Peace in all precincts, commissioners in two precincts, County Surveyor, Treasurer, Clerk and Judge, as well as District Clerk, and other district, state and national-level candidates.

All Republican precincts will vote in the north end of the Aransas County Courthouse. The Republican precinct conventions will be held in the District Courtroom on Saturday, beginning with Precinct 1-1A at 2 p.m.; Precinct 2 at 2:30 p.m.; Precinct 3 at 3 p.m.; Precinct 4 at 3:30 p.m. and 4A at 4 p.m.

Democrats in Precinct 1A will vote at the Aransas Pass polling station; in Precinct 1, at the VFW Hall in Rockport; Precinct 2 at the east lobby of the Aransas County Courthouse; 3 at the Faith Baptist Chapel in Fulton; 4 at the Lamar Fire Station.

The Democratic precinct conventions will be held at the precinct polling places at 7:15 p.m. Saturday.

The absentee turnout for the primaries has been low, according to county spokesmen. Voting absentee by personal appearance

were 73 Democrats and 20 Republicans, with absentee ballots mailed out to 10 Democrats and four Republicans.

Running in the primaries are the following candidates:

For County Judge, John D. Wendell (D), running unopposed for the office he now holds; Agnes A. "Tony" Harden (D) unopposed for District Clerk, the office she now occupies and Val Jean Eaton (D) for County Clerk, running unopposed. Eaton is chief deputy clerk presently for County Clerk Ruby Hart, who is not seeking re-election.

Also, Marvinne Davis Wix (D) and H.R. Bean (D) for the office of County Treasurer. Present county treasurer Etoil "Duck" Eller is not seeking re-election.

County Surveyor T.E. Griffith (D) is

running unopposed for the office he is now serving in.

For the office of County Commissioner, Precinct 2, present Commissioner Ray Longino (D) is running opposed by Gary T. Olson (D).

Dr. J.M. Spriegel (D), Commissioner for Precinct 4, has two opponents for his position in the primary: Mike J. Womack (D) and Judge St. Elmo Hodges (D).

Justice of the Peace for Precinct 1, Bonnie McCarty (D) is running unopposed, as is the candidate for Justice of the Peace in Precinct 2, David V. Boling (D). Democrat Phillip D. Baldwin is running for Justice of the Peace in Precinct 3. Incumbent William G. "Bill" Walston is running on the Republican ballot for that office.

Robert "Jake" Campbell is running against Eileen C. Jeffers (D) for the Precinct 4 Justice of the Peace post.

Harold L. Shirey is seeking re-election as Republican county chairman and Louise A. Wilken is running for Democratic county chairman.

Democratic precinct chairmen candidates are Willa Mae Elliot for 1-1A; Virginia Shivers for 2; Freddie A. Lingner for 3; Zora Belle Casterline for 4 and Genevieve J. Heldenfels for 4A.

Republican precinct chairman candidates are, for precinct 1-1A, Kerry Carruth; for 2, Margaret A. Gill; for 3, Lenora H. Beck; for 4, Jean Davis Jenkins and Jan McGlasson for 4A.

Republican Eleanor G. Buller is running for State Board of Education, 14th District, as are Democratic candidates John A. Morkovsky and Mary Ann Leveridge.

Running for State Representative in the 36th District is Republican Ken Riley. Also running, on the Democratic ticket, is W.O. "Bill" Harrison.

J. Everett Ware (R) and John Wilson (D) are candidates for the 18th District State Senatorial post.

Republican Ray Moses is running for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2, as are Democrats Chuck Miller, Andrew Jackson Shuval, Mel Bruder, Roy Rawls and Bill Black.

Seeking the nomination for Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1 are Democrats Ted Robertson and John M. Barron. Their Republican counterpart is John L. Bates.

For Railroad Commissioner, Democrats Ralph Pacheco and James E. "Jim" Nugent are running, as is Republican John Thomas Henderson.

## Beck named to city council

Rockport pharmacist Richard Beck has been named to fill a vacancy on the city council created when former Alderman Burt Mills resigned to become city mayor.

Beck's appointment, by a 3-0 vote of the council, came during Monday night's, April 26, council meeting.

Four names, including Beck's, were placed before the council following a vote of the city's governing body to appoint, rather than elect, a successor to fill Mill's former post as Ward 2 alderman.

Alderwoman Betty Jean Ward moved to name Beck to the post. The motion to appoint a new council member was made by Alderman Murray McMillan and seconded by Alderman W.B. Allen. In order to fill the unexpired term by election, a special election would have had to be called and the earliest it could have been held was August, according to Mills.

Council members also gave 3-0 approval to a series of proposed amendments to the city zoning ordinance following a joint public hearing at 7 p.m. with the City Planning and Zoning Commission.

Among the zoning changes is an amendment that will allow fences in the front of a building providing certain conditions are met. The amendments also set density, setback and parking space requirements for hotel and motel construction in the city and establish a

new "Residential Townhouse District."

In a series of appointments Monday night, S. Reese Rozzell was re-appointed judge and Olive Holmes re-appointed alternate judge of Rockport's municipal court. Elva Mullinax was again named fire marshal and Herman Johnson re-named city administrator.

All of these appointive positions are for a two-year period coinciding with the mayor's term of office.

Also appointed Monday night was an emergency management coordinator for the emergency management program in which the cities of Fulton and Rockport are joint participants with Aransas County.

Upon being told that the county had named Mitch Ammons as its coordinator, McMillan moved that Ammons be named the city's coordinator as well. "It is more efficient for the city to have the same person as the county," he said.

Ward seconded the motion.

In other action, the council voted to replace former Mayor Walter S. Falk Jr. as the city's representative to the Coastal Bend Council of Governments and elected Mills representative

## Petitioners seek post office

LAMAR/HOLIDAY BEACH - Some 400 residents of Lamar and Holiday Beach are petitioning the U.S. Postmaster General and writing their congressmen and senators seeking a post office substation to serve their area.

Residents of the two communities north of the Copano Causeway presently get their mail through the Rockport Post Office. Rockport Postmaster Pat Tedder said delivery to residents in those communities is not to the door but to mailboxes that are located in clusters along the highway "just like rural routes across the nation."

"We don't go into Holiday Beach at all," said Tedder. There, the mailboxes are located along Highway 35. In Lamar, boxes are clustered along Park Road 13 and on Bois d'Arc.

The petition to be presented to the Postmaster General was mailed to Tedder who forwarded it. In addition to the petition, a letter and list of signatures of the people who signed it was sent to U.S. Congressman Bill Patman and Texas senators Lloyd Bentsen and John Tower.

Members of the Lamar Women's Club, spearheading the drive for a substation to serve the area, are urging Lamar and Holiday Beach residents to write additional letters to Patman and the two senators. Jean McVay said she has the addresses of these representatives if anyone needs them.

Citing the need for a substation, Mrs. McVay said, "There are 58 homes in Holiday Beach with the same mailbox number. There are sometimes six people using the same box."

In the letter to the U.S. congressman and senators, the Women's Club noted, "Our mailboxes are numbered in a most confusing manner. For example: we have box 117, box 117A, box 117B, box 117A1 through 9, to even box 117AB to AZ. Is it any wonder our mail is placed in the wrong

boxes, returned to sender or lost."

Lamar and Holiday Beach residents are also upset by the fact that, if they have a package that is too big to be delivered to their boxes, they must drive to Rockport to pick it up.

The petition notes, "There are approximately 700 families living in the Lamar-Holiday Beach area, and it is 10 miles from Lamar and nearly 15 miles from Holiday Beach to the Rockport Post Office." This

## Loyalty Day ceremonies set

## Rockport police 'crack down' on drunk drivers

Police are going to "crack down" on drunk drivers in Rockport.

That's the word from Rockport Police Chief Joe Hinojosa who announced this week the city now has four certified intoxilyzer officers - and plans to toughen enforcement of the laws against driving while intoxicated (DWI).

The newly-certified officers are Sgt. James Tanner, Lt. Steve Trevino and officers Chris Brock and Sam Zapata. Chief Hinojosa said the crack-down is prompted by national statistics that show one person killed every 23 minutes by a drunk driver - and local statistics that show about 20 percent of accidents investigated just in Rockport involve alcohol.

Hinojosa said the local statistics are based on his personal check of roughly 200 of the 400 accidents Rockport police investigated last year. "In about 20 percent of those accidents," the chief said, "the investigating officer reported alcohol was involved."

He emphasized that not all of these involved a driver legally classifiable as DWI.

In Texas, a person is not considered

"legally drunk" (and cannot be filed on for DWI) unless there is 0.10 percent alcohol in the bloodstream.

However, police emphasize, a person does not have to be "legally drunk" in order for his or her driving to be impaired enough to cause an accident.

"You can have one drink," Chief Hinojosa said, "and that one drink alone can impair your driving by 10 or 15 percent. You have an eight times greater chance of having an accident after only one drink than if you don't drink at all," he continued.

Sgt. Tanner and Brock related experiments they witnessed in intoxilyzer school in which officers drank under controlled conditions and their reactions were checked.

"Guys were blowing .02 and .04 (well below the 'legally drunk' level)," Tanner said, "and they were smashed."

"And," Tanner continued, "the first part of the brain to be affected by alcohol is the judgement portion."

Brock added that in most European countries, the level of legal intoxication is .05 - half of the level in Texas. "The impairment level for most people is around .04," he said.

"If you blow a 10 (.10)," Tanner put in, "you are corked." Adding to the dressant effect of alcohol on the judgement ability, he continued, is the fact that "when you're under the influence, you have tunnel vision. That's what causes DWI drivers to weave: you have no peripheral vision - and you tend to overcompensate because you lose the ability to compensate automatically."

"You're driving along (when under the influence)," he continued, "and the first thing you know, you're over here on this side of the road. So you give the wheel a turn, overcompensate and you're on the other side. And you keep doing this."

Punishment for DWI in Texas "is pretty stiff," Chief Hinojosa said. A first offense DWI is a class "A" misdemeanor punishable by up to 10 years in the penitentiary, up to \$10,000 fine or both.

Aided by the intoxilyzer - which gives immediate readings on blood alcohol and is automatic, removing the potential for human error - Rockport police are going to "strictly enforce" the DWI laws in the city, the Chief repeated.

"My primary goal right now," he said, "is to get everybody certified on the intoxilyzer."

Times certainly have changed. Just ask former Yankees great Joe DiMaggio. In 1941, the Yankee Clipper batted .357, hit 30 homers, 43 doubles, drove in 125 runs and scored 122 runs. All of which paled in comparison to that 56-game hitting streak he had that same season. But then it came time for contract negotiations with Yankees owner Ed Barrow. "Barrow owned the Yankees then and asked me to take a \$5,000 cut" for the next season. DiMaggio recalled. "I did some heavy negotiating and managed to come out of it with a \$5,000 raise."  
Gene Autry has pumped dollar after dollar into the California Angels trying to make his team a powerhouse, ironic in view of the fact that the former singing cowboy originally bought the team as a business venture, not as an ego trip. Autry put in the bid for an American League expansion franchise in 1961 after

his Los Angeles radio station, KMPC, lost the rights to Dodgers broadcasts to another station. "We billed ourselves as Los Angeles' No. 1 sports station," Autry said. "We did UCLA football and basketball and other sports, but it would have been difficult to keep the sports connection without a schedule of baseball games. So we put in a bid to the American League and wound up with the team." Former Red Sox outfielder turned sportscaster Jimmy Piersall, best known for his struggle to overcome mental illness, says in an interview published in the April issue of OUI magazine that he has no use for psychiatrists. While he contends that visiting a psychiatrist "was the best thing to ever happen" to him, making him play harder, he contends that "I don't believe in psychiatrists. They are a crutch. You might as well talk to a wall. They take your money. If you are mentally ill, you have to cure yourself." Piersall adds, "You can't feel sorry for yourself. You have to build strength and say 'I'd better get going to survive. You have to do it yourself.'" Now a sportscaster who covers the Chicago White Sox, Piersall says that mental illness "never leaves you." He explains that (baseball) "management has to be careful. Once you're mentally ill, there is always a fear of what will happen."

Riverside, Calif., is under investigation. Sgt. Steven M. Hadley of the Riverside County Sheriff's Department said deputies seized 206 betting tickets and \$1,905 in cash. "We had an undercover officer in the area monitoring the activities," he said. Gene McCauliff, project director for Mission Hills Country Club, confirmed that announcements of the pari-

mutal betting was carried over the public address system. Bill Fuzagy of New York, an official of the All-American Collegiate Golf Foundation Inc., said the foundation earned \$300 last year from the pari-mutual betting and that he didn't know it was illegal. Cosell said, "I have never seen or heard of any gambling at that tournament, nor do I have any

knowledge of gambling at that tournament." He expressed irritation at being contacted about the matter and called the allegations "absurd." "Stupid" and "absurd" were the words Chicago Bulls owner Arthur Wirtz used to describe Al McGuire's idea of working as a consultant for the National Basketball Association franchise.

## Game Thief committee pays rewards

AUSTIN — Texas new Operation Game Thief Committee has awarded \$2,200 to persons whose tips lead to apprehension and conviction of violators of the state's game and fish laws. all, 14 persons will receive cash rewards for their tips. Committee Chairman Harry Tension of Fort Worth was elated at the progress made during Operation Game Thief's first six months. "I think we proved that we are off and running, and I believe people across the state are becoming aware of the problem of poaching and what they can do about it," Tension said. Tension said he was encouraged by the tremendous response from individuals, sportsmen's organizations and landowners who have donated

reward funds to Operation Game Thief. "I want to emphasize that this rewards program is operated solely from donation and not with state funds. So far we have received more than \$24,000 in tax-deductible donations," he added. Texas officials originally patterned the Game Thief operation after that of New Mexico, which has operated a similar program successfully for five years. "We already are ahead of New Mexico's pace after just the first six months," Tension said. Since the committee's first six months of opera-

tion were during the hunting season, all the rewards involved hunting violations, although officials anticipate fishing law violations probably will draw some rewards during the coming six months. The largest case involved the arrest of 13 persons possessing 1,327 mourning doves. Game Wardens issued 65 citations, and fines totaled \$13,390 — the largest amount ever assessed a group of bird hunters in the state. Other violations include hunting deer at night, possession of deer in closed season, improperly tagged deer, criminal trespass, hunting deer with dogs and hunting wild animals from a vehicle on a road. During the six month period beginning last October, the Game Thief office received 220 calls. Of these, 77 were investigated and 18 resulted in convictions, for a 23 percent conviction rate. New Mexico officials had indicated their conviction rate from Game Thief calls averages 20 percent. The Operation Game Thief telephone line (1-800-792-GAME) is open 24 hours a day, and callers may remain anonymous if so desired.

## Rockport student helps design Mini-Baja vehicle

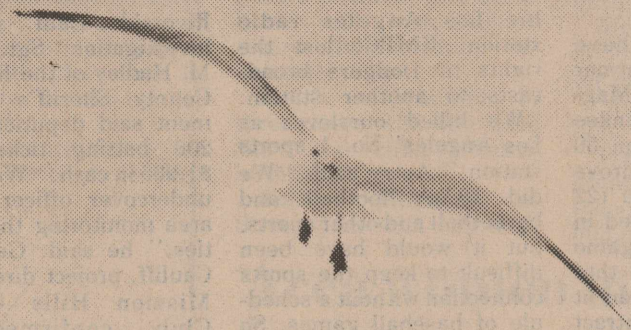

## Walter Mengden advocates election of federal judges

AUSTIN — Senator Walter Mengden, a conservative Republican running for the U.S. Senate, in a speech in Sugarland before the Fort Bend County Republican Women's Club, has advocated the election of all federal district judges.

"Federal district judges are currently appointed for life," Mengden said. "For many, the only necessary qualification is to have been a contributor in a president's campaign. these judges to finally be held accountable for their actions."

Mengden said that the election of federal district judges is a key part of his conservative agenda for the federal government. "We cannot continue to allow federal judges to have free reign over the lives of the American people."

## Group says Watt scorns principles

The National Wildlife Federation has accused Interior Secretary James G. Watt of showing "basic disrespect for the principles of open, democratic government" by attempting to change regulations of the U.S. Water Resources Council without convening the Council.

In a letter to Watt, who is chairman of the Council, Dr. Jay D. Hair, executive vice president of the NWF, reminded him that the Council's rules require him

to convene a meeting of that group whenever a proposed rule change affects other federal agencies. Watt has instead moved to repeal by an "action memorandum" the interagency rules governing the planning and evaluation of federal water projects. Repeal of these rules, the Council's "Principles and Standards," would "by definition" affect other federal agencies, according to the NWF.

"Secretary Watt's refusal to convene the council, which

he once tried to abolish, for a matter with such broad economic and environmental consequences, is another example of secretive and arbitrary action by the secretary," Hair charged.

The Water Resources Council was created as an independent federal agency in 1965 to encourage the wise development and conservation of the nation's water resources. When Watt proposed abolition of the Council last year Congress overruled him and kept the agency alive.

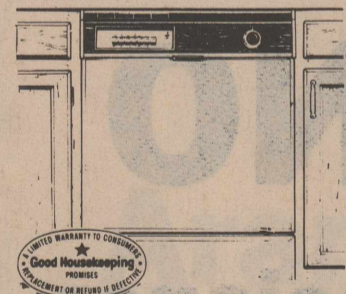

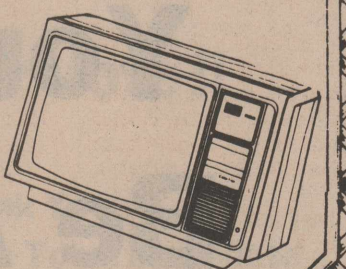
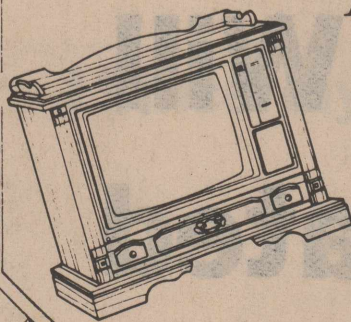

# EPA releases report on blood lead samples

DALLAS — The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) released a report on April 16 evaluating a voluntary program of blood lead samples taken by the city of Dallas in an effort to determine the significance of elevated concentrations of lead in soil near three Dallas lead smelters.

The medical portion of the report, prepared by the U.S. Public Health Service's Centers for Disease Control (CDC), said that "Although the data were not collected in a manner to eliminate bias, there appears to be a higher prevalence of increased lead absorption among preschool children living within a half mile of the smelter sites than among those living at greater distances."

Dr. Vernon Houk, Acting Director of the Center for Environmental Health, CDC, said that "The lack of needed environmental data does not allow any conclusions about the identity of the point source." The most likely sources are a combination, though in unknown contributions, of lead from the smelter and lead from the combustion of gasoline in motor vehicles, he said.

The report recommended followup investigations to determine the source of the elevated levels of lead and, if indicated, the appropriate remedial actions.

A special study group was appointed last October to evaluate the health significance of elevated concentrations of lead in soil near the three Dallas smelters: NL Industries, Dixie Metals Corporation and the RSR Company. The high soil levels were found in a regional EPA study reported last June. At the request of the City, the study group's charge was expanded to include evaluation of the blood lead data.

Dick Whittington, EPA Regional Administrator for Region 6, said it was important to remember that no one was found with clinical symptoms of lead poisoning and that Dr. Houk's report noted that the blood lead levels found were not high enough to make this likely.

In addition, the apparent problem is confined to preschool children living within one-half mile of the smelters, he said.

Whittington said that within the last few days, "We have discussed generally

## Agency applies for renewal

KINGSVILLE — The South Texas Health Systems Agency (STHSA), a private nonprofit corporation which covers the counties of Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, McMullan, Nueces, Refugio and San Patricio, intends to apply for renewal of full designation to the Department of Health and Human Services.

Because of this, the STHSA Board of Directors has voted to schedule a Public Comment Period on the agency application, from now until May 4. A public hearing has been scheduled at 7 p.m. May 4 at the STHSA Office, Seale Hall, Texas A&I University Campus in Kingsville.

The STHSA application states the Agency proposal to serve the 1,288,033 residents of the 26 counties of South Texas. The scope of Agency activity includes agency management, plan development and implementation, project review, data and research management, public involvement and education and coordination of activities with other entities. The grant period begins Sept. 1, and the STHSA is requesting \$206,757.

The application is available for public inspection in the STHSA office on weekdays from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Requests for copies can be mailed to STHSA, Station 1, P.O. Box 2378, Texas A&I University, Kingsville, Texas 78363.

Written comments on the application will be accepted until 5 p.m. May 4 and can be mailed to the above address.

The STHSA Board of Directors has been working for six years to improve the health care of South Texas. these matters with city officials and with various Texas state environmental agencies — the State Health Department, the Texas Department of Water Resources and the Texas Air Control Board — and pointed out the need for additional study.

"All of these entities are committed to an early completion of the required studies and are willing to work jointly to bring this about," he said. The studies should be completed by next September, he added.

Dr. Marilyn Bracken, EPA Associate Assistant Administrator for Toxics Integration and chairperson of the EPA study group, and Dr. Houk said that as requested by the city, EPA and CDC will provide assistance in conducting the followup studies.

She said the report included review of the blood lead data obtained in the city's voluntary program as well as available data from separate studies of soil, dust and water in the smelter areas conducted by the city and EPA.

The data was received by the EPA study group, CDC and a panel of nationally recognized experts on lead.

Dr. Houk said that because certain preschool children have shown elevated blood lead levels, parents may wish to take some precautions to reduce exposure to lead. They can help protect their children by taking these simple, inexpensive steps:

- 1) Don't let the child play in loose dirt or near heavily traveled roadways.
- 2) Grassy areas are less likely to be contaminated

with lead dust. Outside play areas should be seeded.

3) Areas inside the house where small children play should be vacuumed or wet-mopped frequently to remove fine dust.

4) Any peeling or flaking paint should be scraped off and the chips thoroughly removed.

5) Wash the child's hands often — and always before meals.

6) Pay attention to where the child is and what he or she is putting in his or her mouth.

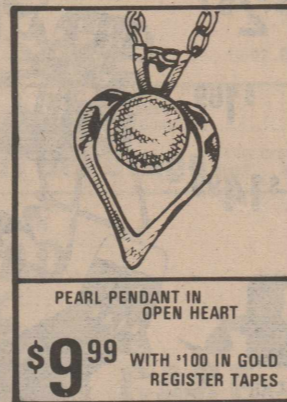
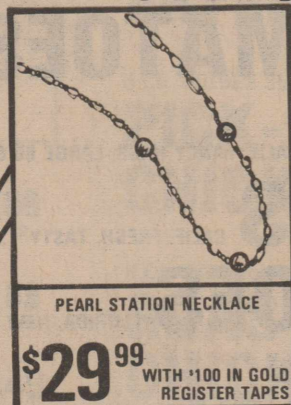

COLLEGE STATION — Interest rates will be extremely high in 1982 but not in the way most people see them," says Steven C. Griffin, a Texas A&M University agricultural economist.

The prime lending rate is currently hovering around 17 percent. While this is lower than the 21.5 percent that started 1981 and the 20 percent paid last summer, it's a lot higher in terms of profitability, says Griffin, who is with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Interest rates are composed of two different components," explains the economist. First there's an inflation premium, the amount of interest it takes to compensate savers for the expected decrease in purchasing power of their savings over the loan period. The premium is based primarily on inflationary expectations.

The second component is what may be termed as the real return to capital. This is the amount of interest savers require for deferring current consumption until later when the loan is paid off, explains Griffin.

Since the mid-60s up until fairly recently, the actual inflation rate has been under-anticipated by savers and lenders, says Griffin. Thus, the market rate of interest paid by borrowers, less the actual inflation rate, equaled a real return for capital that was extremely low and sometimes even negative. The lower the real cost of capital, the more profitable

were capital investments, particularly those which also appreciated with inflation, such as farmland and housing.

"As long as one could make the downpayment and cash flow requirements, one could look quite smart while inflation multiplied net worth and current income soon exceeded cash requirements," notes the economist.

With the current restrictive monetary stance of the Federal Reserve and huge projected budget deficits, the calculated real return

(cost) to capital has increased substantially. In fact, it's tripled to more than 10 percent, points out Griffin.

The Federal Reserve is currently resolved not to accommodate budget deficits by expanding the money supply for fear of reigniting inflation. Thus the U.S. government "crowds out" private demands for debt capital by paying a higher price than potential private borrowers can afford, notes the economist.

# Interest rates to remain high

to fall or remain at current, relatively low levels, the inflation premium in interest rates will fall also," says Griffin. "But increases in the real return to capital component may be more than offsetting so that overall market interest rates may be unchanged to higher."

Important to borrowers is that a 17 percent market rate of interest is different when the underlying rate of inflation is seven percent compared to 15 percent. The difference is not in the amount of interest paid but

how much the investment will have to earn on its own versus how much it's likely to appreciate with inflation. Land, for example, has averaged a current return of three to four percent and appreciated at or slightly more than the general inflation rate over the last few decades. Obviously, land has been a good buy with real interest rates at zero to two percent. But the same cannot be said now, notes the economist.

"Properly managing financial affairs will be of paramount importance to

agricultural producers this year," says Griffin. "While farm credit is available to qualified farmers, maintaining access to this credit may be difficult for some who have seen the last two years of drought and low prices and a dismal outlook ahead diminish some of their credit worthiness."

How far a lender will go with a financially weakened producer may depend on how well prepared that producer is in presenting his financial needs, adds Griffin. Does he have cash flow projections? When the

market provides the opportunity for profit, will he recognize it and bank some of it with cash sales and forward contracts? Is he considering all-risk crop insurance and government program participation? Has he approached his landlords about charging share-rent arrangements in view of rising input costs?

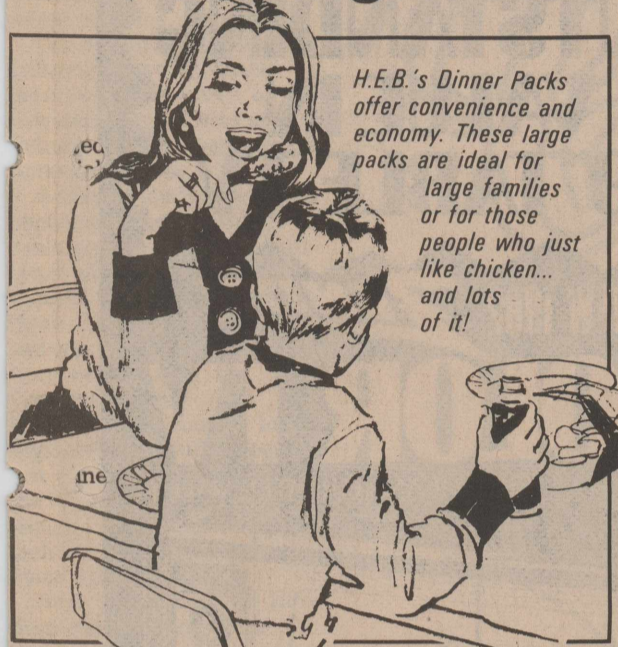

Dr. Lutz is a former instructor of diseases of dogs and cats in the college of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M University.

The eating behavior of the dog has an interesting history. The ancestor of the dog was the wolf, and a study of the wolf's inges-

tive behaviors will provide insights into those of the dog.

Wolves spend a great deal of time each day hunting for food. Since the prey are herd animals such as sheep, goats, calves, deer, etc., the wolf found it advantageous to hunt in packs. When one tired in the chase, another would take over. Once the prey

was killed, the entire pack feasted.

The smaller the prey, such as rabbits — the fewer wolves got to eat, with dominance rank prevailing. Basically then, the wolf lived on a feast or famine schedule. One day of plentiful food, followed by several days of nothing.

Several generations lat-

er, the dog still responds to this same basic urge.

"Eat when food is plentiful because the next meal may be a long time off." For a large percentage of dogs, this instinctive drive is stronger than the learning process — and the regularity of a feeding schedule is overpowered by a power of species preservation.

This is why some dogs become obese. The person doing the feeding puts too much feed in the dog's food bowl. Neighbors feeding your dog their table scraps is a "no-no." Not only is

the dog overfed, but if it is sick, it is difficult for the veterinarian to diagnose the cause of the illness.

## Rockport third graders visit refuge

The third graders of Rockport Elementary School enjoyed a field trip to the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge this week.

They were impressed with the film shown on the conservation of wild life. As Greg Day said, "I liked the film the best, because it makes me realize what man

is doing."

The museum, the alligator pond and the observation tower were all focal points, with one of the highlights being an alligator who posed on the bank of the pond, moving just enough to make them realize that he was indeed real, and very much alive!

It was a very meaningful experience for the students of Mattie Keith, Deborah Stout and Ellen Fuller. The students will probably be urging their parents to take them back for another visit, say the teachers. It is a very interesting and fascinating place, both for children and adults.

## Society aims to cut deaths

AUSTIN—The American Cancer Society announced recently that it plans to reduce by one-third the majority of cancer deaths in the state by helping Texans determine their own risks in getting cancer.

The Texas Division of the American Cancer Society has developed a personal self-test for individuals to assess their own risks of cancer with questions based on heredity, lifestyle, age and environment. Each question relates to one of the five major cancer sites — lung, breast, colon and rectum, uterus and skin — which represent 52 percent of all cancer deaths.

"Targeting our efforts at these common cancers is the most logical approach," said R. Michael Schultz, M.D. of Brownwood, chairman of the Division's Public Education Committee which originated the self-test. "And by identifying certain risk factors for each, we are helping individuals learn about how they can protect themselves. It is our hope that when people find they are at high risk, they'll talk to their physicians and take appropriate health action."

The self-test takes approximately five minutes

(slightly longer for women) and is now available for use on home computers. Both forms of the test have been endorsed by the Texas Medical Association and the Texas Hospital Association. Leading health officials, including Texas Commissioner of Health Robert Bernstein, M.D., have termed it "an innovation in cancer education."

In helping to reduce those cancer deaths, an abbreviated form of the self-test is being distributed statewide this month by ACS volunteers as part of the Society's annual educational and fund-raising Crusade.

"We've traditionally emphasized the educational aspect of our drive," said Schultz. "I think this year's Crusade will be the most educational of all. The test is action-oriented and the volunteers have been shown how to discuss it at each door."

After piloting the self-test in various parts of the state last year, overwhelming acceptance of both the pamphlet and computerized versions have prompted translations into Spanish. Volunteer officials report increasing concerns over testicular and prostate cancer have initiated studies to include questions on these sites as well.

Although the risk assessment concept of cancer education has thus far been limited to Texas, Society officials expect the program to expand nationwide. A national ACS study involving 10,000 employees from Dallas-based industries taking the self-test is currently being conducted for evaluative purposes. If interest and participation is

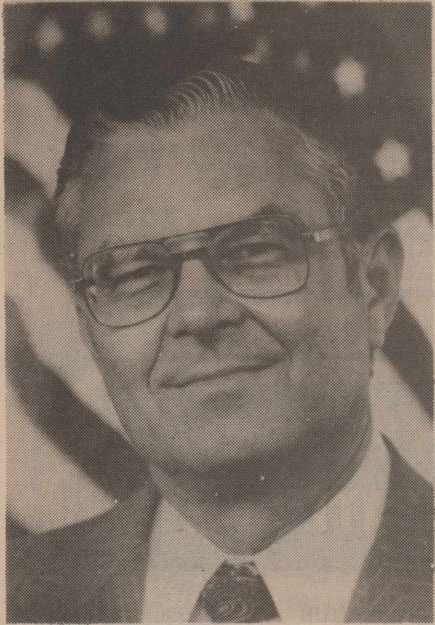

# Dr. Jim Prewitt says conserving is back in fashion

Conserving is an idea which has come back into

fashion. If that is a valid premise, then Dr. Jim Prewitt of Kingsville can be dubbed one of the fashion leaders of the Coastal Bend. An engineer, in-

ventor, educator, he enjoys living in a way that conserves resources, energy, all substance.

At this time, he is building a house with a

geodesic dome, because that is the most efficient method of building, surface to volume. He is building of reclaimed materials. The overall cost of building will be one-third to one-half the price of the conventional residence, or even less.

Two-thirds of the house will be below ground, and the earth will be heaped over the rest of it. This serves many purposes. It returns this plot of land to its function in life's chain as a garden and trees can be planted atop it and continue to make their contributions to the atmosphere. It eliminates most of the necessity for heating and cooling, as in this part of the country, the temperature under ground will remain about 72 degrees. If you ask him whether he won't miss windows and the ability to see out, Dr. Prewitt says that when a person asks him this, he or she is usually in a room with no windows or one in which the curtains are drawn so that no one can see in or out.

All waste in the house will be recycled. Some of the water, as a part of the cycle, will filter through planter boxes, watering them at the same time it is purified. There will be wind-generated power.

The size of the house will be minimum, less to maintain, cool and heat. "Gluttony" is the term he thinks of when he considers the waste space in many homes and the proliferation of things which clutter them. After all, he will remind you, much of this world lives in something the size of an igloo or teepee, with sufficient space for a sleeping rug and a cooking pot.

His home will not be so stark. But it will have a minimum of gadgets. It is incredible to him that we have come to a time when one man won't do to prepare hamburgers and hot dogs, there must be a specialized utensil for each.

It's a part of looking at alternatives and choosing those you want in your own life instead of building, furnishing and buying ac-

ording to the accepted norm for the person in your particular economic or social slot.

He looks upon us all as environmentalists and says more of us are now willing to assert ourselves. As an example, non-smokers who once kept quiet, speak up today. If asked, "Do you mind if I smoke?" they reply, "It will take 400 days off my life, I certainly do."

In controlling life, you are getting in a position where you are not bombarded by bills and things you can do nothing about. Removing stresses promises better physical as well as mental health.

Dr. Prewitt designs his own functional furniture. Educational toys are among the other objects of his interest. A small child can't handle spaces.

## Child vision screening stressed

HOUSTON — The importance of early childhood vision screening is being highlighted during April, Prevent Blindness Month. The message being stressed by the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness is that all children should have an eye test by the age of four. "One child in 20 has an eye problem that can be best corrected if detected in the preschool years," says R.E. Margo, M.D., State Medical Chairman of the Society. "If the child's problem is amblyopia or 'lazy eye' it must be corrected by the age of six or the child may lose all functional sight in that eye. "Unfortunately parents can't detect a problem just by looking at the child. Unless a child has a condition

such as crossed eyes, there is seldom an external sign to indicate that an eye problem exists."

Dr. Margo explained further that a child has no way of knowing if he is seeing poorly. If a child sees a tree down the street as a green blur, he thinks trees look like that to everyone.

"This underscores the need for an eye test," he said. Even the simplest one can help detect vision problems such as amblyopia or refractive errors.

Many parents think a child's vision can't be tested until the child is old enough to read the letters on the eye chart, Dr. Margo went on. That is erroneous. Doctors can readily test a baby's sight and Prevent Blindness looks forward to the day when every child's eyes will be examined by a professional at birth and during the preschool years.

"That, however, is still the impossible dream," he said, "so special eye charts have been devised for screening young children." In the Prevent Blindness and Texas school programs a "Tumbling E" chart is used. The 'E's are faced in four different directions on the chart and the child is asked to indicate which way the 'E's are pointing.

It's a simple test, often played as a game with the children, yet it can detect major problems. Failure to pass the test has also led to such diagnoses as traumatic cataracts and retinal detachments.

"If a child has not had a professional eye examination

or been tested in a vision screening program, Prevent Blindness encourages the parent to write for the Society's free Home Eye Test for pre-schoolers. This test will give the parent an opportunity to play this important 'game' at home," Dr. Margo said.

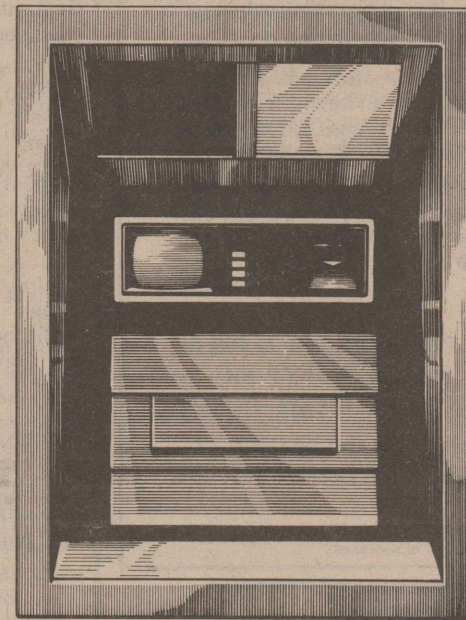

Take regular rest breaks if you spend time at a video display terminal. The National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health recommends at least 15 minutes in every two hours to avoid eye strain and neck and back muscle fatigue.

New ulcer fighter — sucral-fate has been approved by the FDA. New drug protects lining of the duodenum from pepsin and bile acids.

To repair acne scars and other skin depressions, doctors may use zyderm injected into the skin or subcutaneous tissues, where body's cells and blood vessels will keep it in place. Highly purified form of collagen has been okayed by the FDA.

Photoradiation therapy is a new experimental tool against cancer. Chief advantage of the method, devised at Roswell Park Memorial Institute, Buffalo, N.Y., is that only cancer cells are destroyed, not normal tissue. It's fast and inexpensive to use, too.

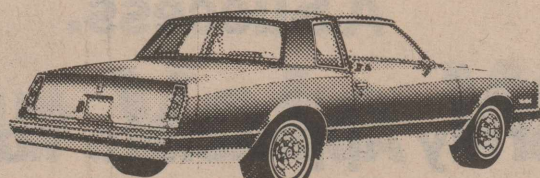

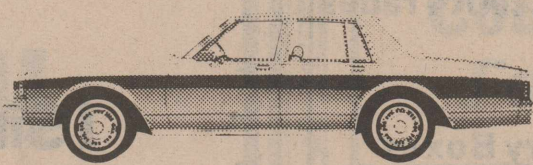

# Pre-registration for Aransas County kindergarten, first grade scheduled May 3-7

Pre-registration for kindergarten and first grade for the 1982-83 school year will be held at Fulton Elementary, Live Oak Elementary, and Rockport Elementary School office May 3-7.

Any child who is six years old on or before September 1, 1982, is eligible to enroll in first grade. Any child who is five years old on or before September 1, 1982, is eligible to enroll in kindergarten.

If the child was enrolled in kindergarten at Rockport Elementary at the close of the 1981-82 school year, it will not be necessary to pre-register him or her for first grade. Parents must bring, at

the time of registration, the child's certified birth certificate and immunization record. Immunization requirements are:  
 D.P.T. — Minimum of three doses with one dose since the child's fourth birthday.  
 Polio — Minimum of three doses with one dose

since the child's fourth birthday.  
 Measles and Rubella — Immunization (received after the first birthday).  
 Mumps — Immunization.  
 Pre-registration for these grades is very important, school officials say. The number of children enrolled

in kindergarten and first grade is used to determine the number of teachers and text books needed for these grades.  
 Records will be sent to the schools based upon residential addresses on census cards. If the residential address has changed since the begin-

ning of school this year and the parent has not notified the school he or she is asked to please do so immediately.

## Area women invited to help in breast cancer prevention program

Coastal Bend Hospital in Aransas Pass is inviting area women to take part in a preventative program on breast cancer.

That particular cancer claims more lives than any other and hospital officials feel that it's in the best interest of public health to introduce the program.

Over a four-week period, questionnaire cards will be mailed to women between the ages of 20 and 60 plus. The information returned on the cards will be held in the strictest confidence and

will help the hospital conduct its program.

If you receive one of the cards, your full cooperation is respectfully requested. Hospital officials say that public response is vital to the program's success. You are asked to note your age in the upper lefthand corner of the card.

Meanwhile, a new technique makes possible the diagnosis and treatment of breast cancer in its earliest stages.

The technique, called zero-mammography, will

be used by local doctors who are also taking part in the preventative program.

Breast cancer strikes one out of 11 women. In 1981, there were an estimated 110,000 cases and 36,800 deaths.

Studies show that 27 percent of all cancer in women is breast cancer, more than twice the incidence of uterine cancer (13 percent).

Breast cancer is the leading cause of death among women 40-44.

## Tips for non-breakfast eater

Q. I have a recipe which calls for one cup of instant powdered milk. I prefer to use the NON-instant powdered milk that I get at the health food store. How much should I use?

A. That's easy! When using a recipe which calls for instant powdered milk, use 1/2 as much NON-instant powdered milk. So — use 1/2 cup.

Q. My little girl never wants breakfast. I offer her cereal, pancakes, eggs, etc., but they just don't appeal to her. I have to practically force her to eat every morning, and this, of course, causes unpleasant feelings all around. Sometimes she'll drink some milk, but that's about it. Do you have any suggestions?

A. There ARE some things you could try. First, you might revise your ideas of what is appropriate for breakfast. Break away from the conventional foods and

try serving her some of last night's leftovers — OR make her a grilled cheese sandwich (on whole grain bread, of course), or tuna on toast. Use your imagination: just go heavy on the high-quality protein and light on the "junk."

A high-protein drink might appeal to her since she apparently does like milk. Put four to eight ounces whole milk into the blender; add two or three tablespoons of a good-tasting, high-quality protein powder, vanilla extract and honey to taste. If she likes bananas or other fruit, throw in a piece of that — it'll be really delicious! (Call it a milkshake, for her sake.) This drink alone will probably provide as many, or MORE, nutrients than a conventional breakfast!

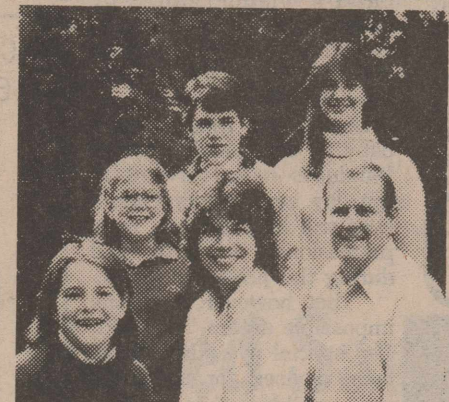

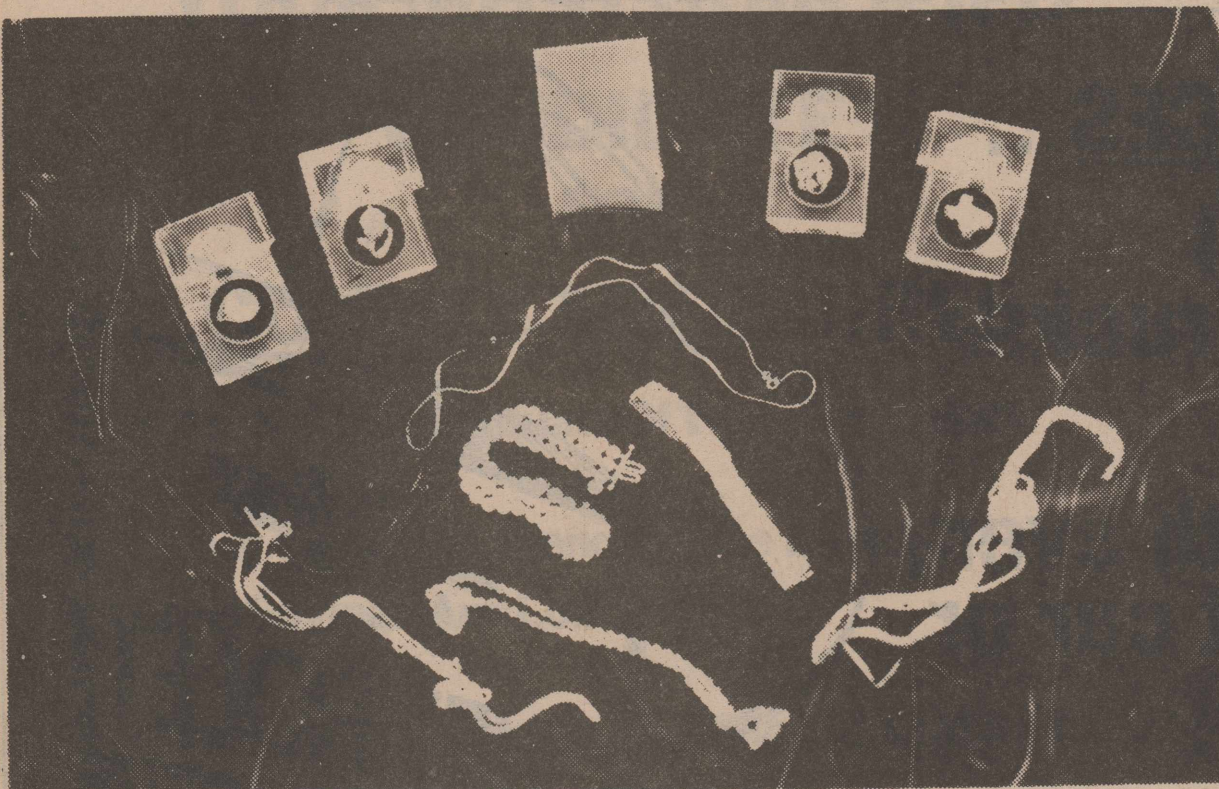

Students in Marketing and Distributive Education classes at Rockport-Fulton High School have been busy the last three weeks studying how to start and conduct a small business.

According to Bob Crawford, coordinator for the MDE Program, the students have had to go through the motions of deciding on an idea for a business and then proceed with the necessary steps of developing the small business.

Depending on the type of business the student selected, students had to learn about securing a state sales tax permit. Then they had to go about getting any special licenses or permits which they might need. Learning about the legalities of setting up a business brought about some interesting reactions from students, especially when they learned about partnerships and corporations, said Crawford.

Crawford said students have gained a considerable amount of respect for the employers and owners for whom they work in the MDE program.

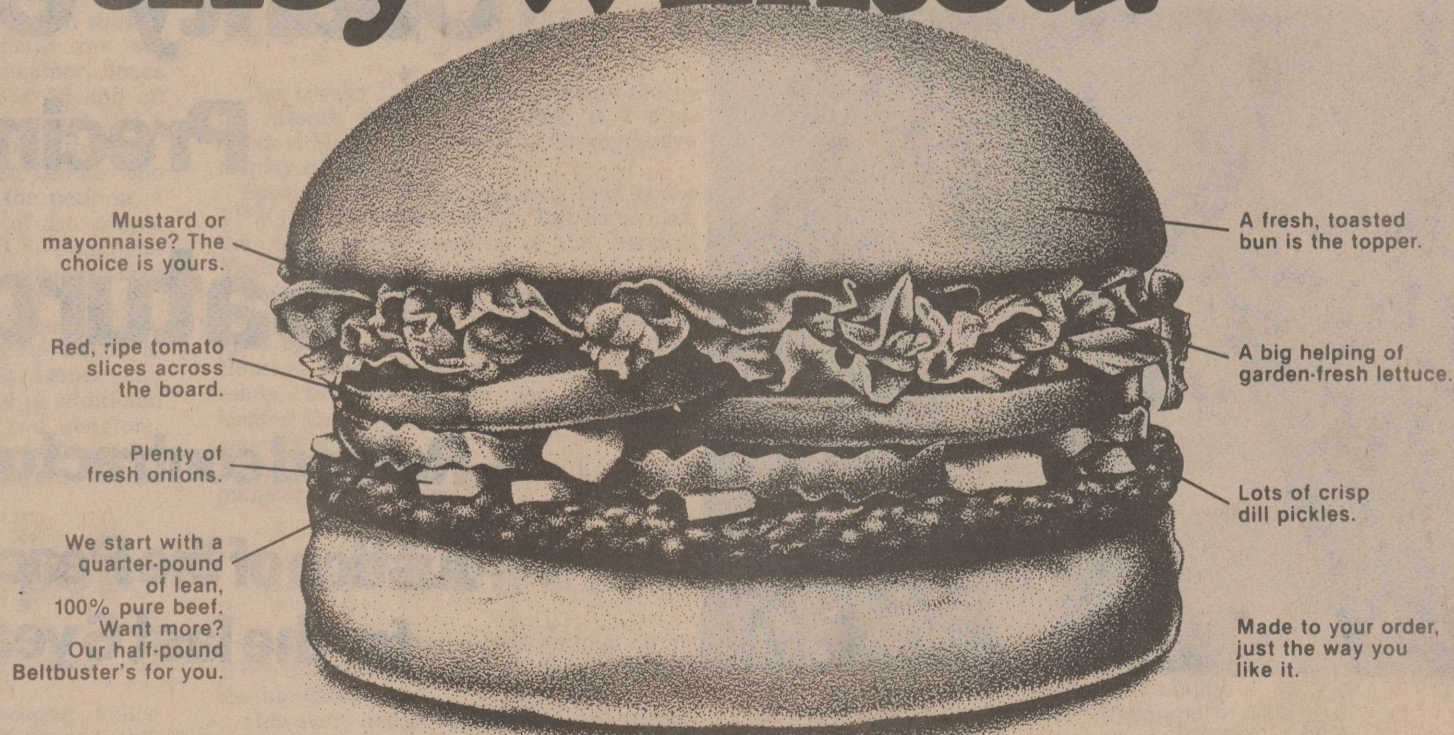

Mills read a letter from the Aransas Pass mayor and city council requesting a meeting with Rockport city officials in the near future to discuss service boundary lines between the two cities.

City officials agreed the only possible area of conflict between the two cities at this time is water and sanitary sewer service and because this is the responsibility, for all of Aransas County, of the Aransas County Conservation & Reclamation District, the letter was referred to the ACCRD.

ACCRD board member John Behee, present at the council meeting, said the matter would be discussed by the ACCRD at its May 3 meeting.

Johnson recommended a meeting with Aransas Pass city officials after the ACCRD has had an opportunity to review the letter.

Council members approved a request for a \$100 per month salary increase for City Inspector Mike Henry who will have responsibility of enforcing the city's new building code when it goes into effect May 1.

The council received a report on resolution of a protest by property owners in Harbor Oaks Subdivision against the developers of a condominium project, The Villas, in the subdivision.

Calvin Scholz, president of the Property Owners Association, appeared before the council earlier this month to protest that proposed access-ways into the condominium project would create a traffic hazard.

Johnson told the council Monday two crossovers would be cut through the median on Harbor Drive and an access near the entrance to Harbor Oaks will be made one-way into the condo project.

**Lack of power blamed for hunger**

FORT WORTH — World hunger cannot be blamed on overpopulation but on lack of power, the executive director of Oxfam-America said recently at Texas Christian University.

Dr. Joseph Short, a TCU graduate whose Boston-based organization advocates self-help in underdeveloped nations, returned to his alma mater as keynote speaker for TCU's annual observance of Hunger Week.

Some of the world's most densely populated nations — China and Taiwan, for example — have pretty well mastered their food problem, he pointed out. "Most of the hungry people today are in the developing countries of the third world, nations in Africa, Asia and Latin America."

"If you ask who the hungry are, they are the poor of the world," Dr. Short said.

"Poor people lack economic and political power. Eradicating poverty is based fundamentally upon empowering people economically and politically."

He believes a prevailing American image is that the world's hungry need the most direct avenue — food aid. Food aid is often needed in case of emergency, but it is often over-used and abused. "It becomes a substitute for taking necessary action to help other people help themselves."

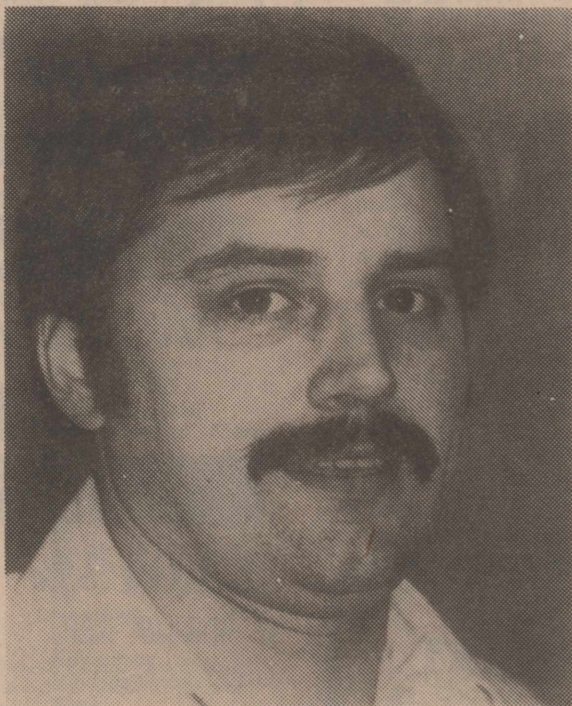
"The power structure I am talking about occurs if you take a broad range of actions and help put hungry people in control of their direct resources," Dr. Short explained.

Dr. Short said Oxfam-America believes U.S. foreign aid should be moved out of the State Department.

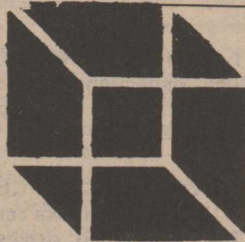

**Successful bass fisherman is guided by understanding**

OVERTON — The modern fisherman is bombarded by the gadgetry of fishing — boats, one-man tubes, two-man bass boats, high-powered bass boats with trolling motors, depth finders, live fish tanks, temperature recorder, oxygen meter. Once the fisherman has made these choices, he must still decide on other equipment, says Don Steinbach, fisheries specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. First is it going to be cane pole, casting rod and reel or spinning reel? Fiber-glass or graphite? Worm rod, doodle socking rod, ultralite? These are all the fun things of getting ready for fishing. Then comes the confusing part for many anglers. What kind of lures? The choices are numerous, including top water lures, floating bottom or deep water lures and sinking mid-water or in-between diving lures. The choice of lures should be guided by understanding the bass — where he lives — why he lives there — and what he is eating while he is there. The location of bass will determine what general kind of lure to use — examples are 1) when fish are on the shoreline or in shallow water you would use top-water or shallow-running baits, 2) deep water bass must be caught where they are with deep-diving or weighted lures than can get to the fish in bottom areas and 3) the suspended fish must be fished with mid-water lures. The fisherman must understand the habitat requirements of bass, food habits and the other water requirements such as temperature and oxygen, Steinbach points out.

Why do fish stay in certain places? They are cold-blooded so temperature of the water will determine where they are comfortable. Winter weather cools shallow water rapidly. Though cold, the deeper water remains more constant and slightly more constant and slightly Oxygen is usually high in cold water and fish do not require much food during cold temperatures. They will not move very far or fast for food. Therefore, the winter fisherman should fish deep lures — worms, are jigged — or jigs. These lures must be presented slowly to the fish. As water begins to warm in the spring, bass move close the shore — shallow water — and start to feed more mid-water. Fishermen should use swimming baits that duplicate shad, bluegill or other bass foods. Knowledge of the spawning habits of largemouth begins in shallows when the water temperature is 55-60 degrees F. The lure to use during this time is crank baits, spinners and top-water baits in shallow.

Many other variables such as color, size and sound must be considered. Color is usually related to food except for worms and then the book is thrown out the window with purples, black, blue, greens. Size of lure can be a factor on finicky fish and the ultralite artist can claim success when many other fishermen don't catch. The bass fisherman must study the fish and how he lives, then make some educated guesses as to which tackle choice will be presented to Mr. Bismouth.

**Germ warfare against insects is reality**

CORPUS CHRISTI — For thousands of years man has been searching for ways to keep insects and other pests from eating what he grows. During much of that time, man has had few weapons with which to fight pests. Chemical agents effective against insects were discovered early in this century. They were regarded by most people as the ultimate answer to controlling pest insects. They were not. In insect populations which were exposed to a certain chemical for several generations, only the most chemically resistant individuals survived to mate and reproduce. The result in most cases was resistant insect populations which required new insecticides or higher doses of old insecticides to control. The introduction of "Germ Warfare" to the fields and farms of America began about 1960, although man had known about diseases (in honeybees and other insects) for many years. The microbes which are being used do not infect man and often are effective against only a narrow range of insects. Various kinds of organisms have been considered for use as biological insecticides; however, the most effective biological insecticides, up to now, have been bacteria and viruses. Probably the most effective biological insecticide has been Bacillus thuringiensis or Bt. Most Bt strains primarily infect moth and butterfly caterpillars. Bt bacteria became active after being eaten by an insect. The micro-organism kills the insect by disrupting the gut and causing paralysis. Strains of Bt have been commercially produced and sold as biological insecticides for several years. Now, in addition to the original strains, improved strains have been developed. Several new strains have improved activity against caterpillars which feed on crops. In addition one new strain has been produced commercially which will infect and kill mosquito larvae, and another which kills wax worm larvae (a pest of honeybee combs) without harming the bees.

Viruses for control of certain insect pests have also been discovered and produced commercially. One virus infects only two closely related species of caterpillars which are very damaging to cotton, corn, grain, soybean and tomato crops. Another virus attacks a group of caterpillars which damage soybeans, cotton and cole crops (such as cabbage, lettuce, broccoli and others). A fungus which attacks a damaging mite pest of citrus is also available. Scientists are working continually to improve the effectiveness of microbes in controlling insect pests, in the hope that these organisms can be used to cheaply and effectively control crop pests without adversely affecting the environment.

**Turkey season brought good harvest**

JASPER — Local hardware and sporting goods stores here have sold out of turkey calls and camouflage paint for the first time in 40 years. Gary Spencer, Parks and Wildlife Department wildlife biologist at Jasper, said four large gobblers harvested in the northern part of Jasper County have made the rounds of the cafes in Jasper. The spring turkey gob-

ber season in six East Texas counties opened April 13 and continued through April 18. Dick Berry of Jasper brought in the first gobbler, a 20-pounder with an 11-inch beard. The bird was captured in 1978 on the Pearson Wildlife Management Area, Vernon Parish, La., and released on the Beef Creek area of Jasper County on Feb. 8, 1979. It still had two leg bands and a small radio transmitter attached. This four-year-old bird was called up and bagged by Berry on April 3. Arthur Kees harvested a 17-pound gobbler with a 10-inch beard. Joe Jerrin of Port Arthur harvested a 20-pound gobbler which had an 11-inch beard and was four years old. On Monday shortly after daylight Mike Ratcliff, also of Jasper, called up a 17½-pound gobbler with a 10½-

**VA disability benefits available**

HOUSTON — Veterans with National Service Life Insurance — who are totally disabled for six consecutive months prior to age 65 — should contact the Houston Veterans Administration Regional Office regarding a waiver of premiums. The waiver isn't automatic, notes Ted W. Myatt, Houston VA Regional Office Director. The veteran, or person acting in his or her behalf, then must file a claim for disability insurance benefits. The claims should be set in the VA Insurance Center — in either St. Paul, Minn., or Philadelphia, Pa. — where the veteran's insurance records are maintained. For further information, telephone the Houston VA Regional Office. Check your local telephone directory for the toll free number.

Q—I am a 67-year-old veteran with limited income applying for a nonservice-connected pension. Do I need to furnish medical evidence of disability? A—No. Permanent and total disability is presumed at age 65. Q—When I contact the VA to ask about my benefits, it seems my number is more important than my name. Why? A—There are more than 30 million names in the VA records system, many identical. Your claim number or Social Security number permits the VA to quickly and accurately identify your records and determine what benefits you are entitled to. Q—May I use my veterans educational entitlement in apprenticeship training? A—Eligible veterans may pursue full-time apprenticeship programs approved by a State Approving Agency. # Sibling relationships important to family harmony

## Growing Child

How your child gets along with her siblings can make the difference in whether your family life is orderly (relatively speaking) or chaotic. It can also influence whether you are able to enjoy your children or find them draining.

Your child's sibling relationships are important to her now and in the future. They will set many of her life patterns for how she will deal with others who are close to her — and they will strongly affect her feelings about herself.

Her interactions with her brothers and sisters can be stormy or calm, loving or angry, cooperative or competitive — and often all within a brief time period. The following are a few guidelines from Growing Child, the monthly child development newsletter, to help you help your growing child to get along as harmoniously as possible — as often as possible — with her siblings.

1) Try not to compare this child with your other children. They are different people. Each has his or her own ways of reacting to the things that happen. Each has special strengths and weaknesses. Each has his own rate of growth and his own pace of doing things. Each child is drawn to different activities, things and people.

It is natural to compare the times at which your first and second children walked, talked or were toilet trained. It's understandable to wonder why your third child is afraid of the water when your first two learned to swim when they were infants. But it's important to let each child be

herself.

Notice the things that make each of your children unique, and encourage them to develop their own special talents. Accept your children's differences and you will help them to accept themselves and each other.

2) Try to spend time each day alone with each of your children. If you can arrange it, it would be good to set aside at least 10 or 15 minutes a day that each child can look forward to and count on as his or her own special time with you.

For example, you might plan to spend 15 minutes each afternoon with your preschooler, while her little brother takes his nap. Or you might give your oldest 15 minutes in the evening after the younger ones are in bed. If you can't do this regularly each day, then try to find a regular schedule you can stick to at least once a week.

This "special time" should be that child's time with you to use as she wishes. You can offer a story, a game or simply an understanding ear, but let her choose. These special times with you will help you get to know and enjoy each of your children more while you help them each to feel special to you. You may find that this gives you more time for yourself, too, as your children stop competing for your attention at other times.

3) Try to provide your children with opportunities for cooperating with each other in planned activities or daily routines. For example, when you go to the supermarket, you can have the youngster who is sitting in the grocery cart look for one

item you need in each aisle, and then have another child get it and hand it to the child in the cart.

Or you can ask your older child to teach your toddler how to use the toilet when he's ready. In addition, be sure to notice and compliment your children any time you see them working and playing together cooperatively: "Tommy, thank you for helping Michelle get dressed. You're really a help to me." "Angela and Ann, I'm so glad to see you're enjoying playing dress-up together."

4) Set limits that you think are fair for each of your children. Let your children know what the limits are and what the consequences of breaking them will be. Then try to stick to these rules as well as you can, changing them (with your children's knowledge) when they no longer seem appropriate.

This kind of planning ahead can avoid many fights and jealousies over such things as who goes to bed at what time and who gets to do what. You will probably still

get some protests of "It's not fair that I can't stay up as long as she does!" and so on.

But it is fair for children of different ages to have different limits, privileges and responsibilities. When they know what to expect, each child can look forward to growing into new ones.

5) Try to plan time for the family to meet together. It might be a good idea for family members to talk

together about things that are important to them personally, and as a family. You probably already do this informally, at mealtimes or at special family times you share on weekends.

Sometimes it's hard to get

everyone together at the same time, especially if you work odd hours or if your children are involved in many different activities. It's important to try to have some time together as a family, though — just to enjoy each other's company. Also, each family member has responsibilities to the family, as well as expectations and needs of it. These can be

worked out to mutual satisfaction when the family gathers together and tries to support and understand each other.

For example, if squabbles occur frequently between siblings over household duties, this might be discussed at a family meeting. Sometimes it helps to make up a chart listing each family member's duties for the week or month. Then household tasks nobody likes can be assigned on a rotating basis.

The attempts and perseverance in trying to resolve constructively and supportively in a family provide a good example for your growing child — a model of what a family can do for one another and how to foster this mutual understanding.

Allowances for the children is another common topic of discussion for a family meeting. This can sometimes be a source of rivalry between older and younger children. Again, you can help each child to understand why they get the amount they do. At the same time, you can explain a little

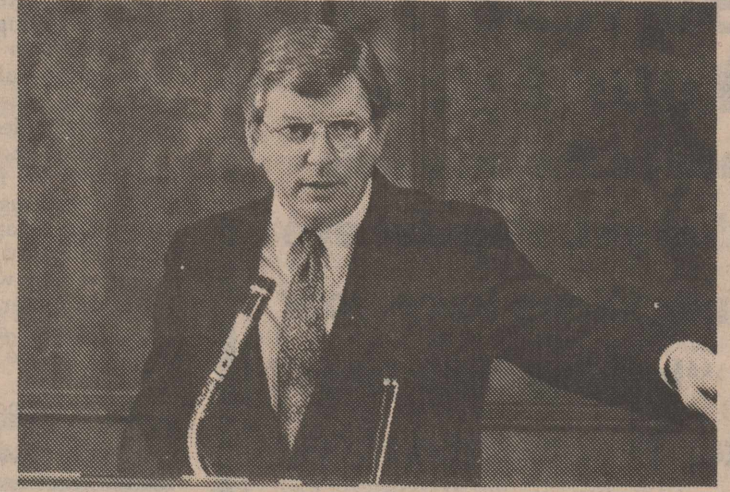
about what it costs you to run the household, including food, clothes and other things they need. This might help them understand the family's economic situation and their part in it — a helpful lesson for their future.

In addition to using the family meeting time to work out problems, you can use it to help your children understand and like each other better. Give each child, even the youngest, time to ex-

press himself or herself. Try to pay equal attention to each child, even the quietest. Show interest in what each child shares. Try to keep any one child from monopolizing the conversation; be kind and supportive but firm about the youngest time to express himself or herself. conversation; be kind and supportive but firm about giving each person an opportunity. The children will learn from your example (in time, if not right away) to respect each other as you respect each of them.

# Technology holds key to the future for blind children

Technology is opening up wondrous possibilities to children who are blind or visually impaired. Sonic eyeglasses can replace or supplement a cane or seeing eye dog. Different tones are heard by the child

and from them he can distinguish whether he is approaching a tree, a man, or a wall. He is aware of a car approaching, and by turning the glasses toward the ground, he judges the drop-off of a curb.

If the child is deaf as well as blind, unable to hear the

tones, there is a device to carry in his hand that gives him the same information by distinguishably different vibrations. Using these devices obviously takes long, intensive training. They are available to the children of the Coastal Bend through the Education Service Center, checked out to the children for a year or whatever period of time they are needed.

Sharon Richardson is the vision consultant for the Service Center in the region. Working with her are five itinerant teachers who go into schools and

homes of children from birth to 23 years old, working with them directly providing visual stimulation and training and working with their parents and teachers.

There are 276 children who are blind or have severe visual impairments receiving the teaching services. Only six of them read braille. A braille is available to produce materials that can be read by this touch method. But new technology is providing better ways. For those who have some limited vision, there is a camera mechanism with a video screen. Any book or piece of written material can be put under it and the letters appear from large to huge size on the screen. This opens up newspaper and all material instead of the limited amount available in braille.

The child who is totally blind places his finger in a slot and receives impulses that tell him what is said on the printed word and gives him an equally wide choice of reading material.

A talking calculator opens up for the blind and the near blind, mathematics. In the monotone of a robot, it tells you what number you have touched, whether you are adding, subtracting or solving a problem by some other means, and then tells you the total.

Computers are being installed by more and more of the schools of the region, and some of these are showing surprising results with children with all types of handicaps who are enrolled in special education courses. The microcomputer is bringing the price down to a point that even small districts find cost effective for administration and teaching.

In Kingsville schools, all instructional material for special education students is programmed into the computer. Give the computer the characteristics of a child and it will tell you what materials will meet his needs. Computers are spreading, George West, Premont, Mathis, Orange Grove.

John Elam, special education consultant at the Education Service Center, gives an example of instructional use of a computer. In a first session with a computer, the child answers questions that allows the computer to work up a lesson plan. In the second session, the computer calls the child by name and gives him a problem to work. If the solution is wrong, the computer gives a similar problem and helps the child work it. If the solution is right, it gives praise. This means the child is not repeating mistakes as he would studying alone. The teacher can plug in at any time and determine his progress.

Elam says working with computers interests children so much that there is no discipline problem. This is exciting to them in the

same way they find electronic games exciting.

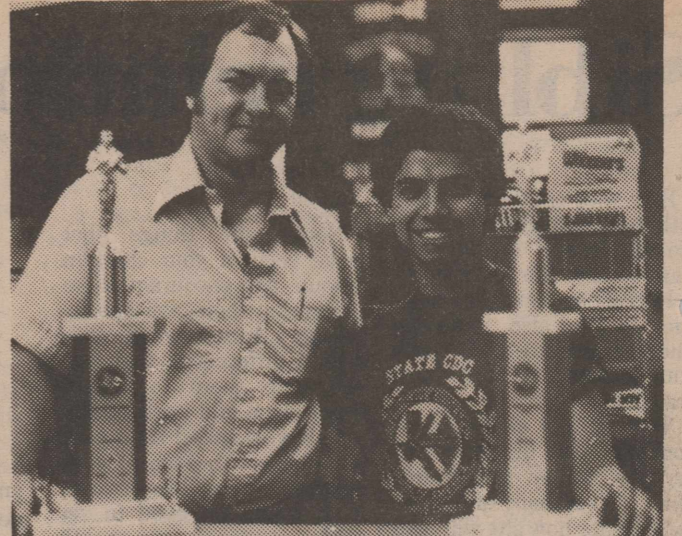
Over a four year period, a Child Find program has identified most of the school-age handicapped children in the region, 11,500 of them. Now they are reaching down to the infant, finding that a great deal can be accomplished in those first years and only in those first years. The program is called a Parent Network and is directed by Melissa Givens, an early childhood education consultant.

She works with parents and with teachers to give these small children the advantage of a good start. A library of books and toys has been developed for the program. In Beeville, library cards have already been issued and parents can check out what they need and receive instructions on how to make it

effective. The cards are soon to be issued to other school districts. There is a toll free number to call if you know of or have reason to think a child might need this special help. It is 1-800-242-3000.

Elam says the number of children requiring special education is increasing rapidly in the region, and especially those with multiple handicaps. Many of the children are coming in with families who are moving in because of the recession and the economic migration. Elam says the families are coming from parts of the country that have had special education programs

for these children much longer than they have existed here. They know what services they need and how to make the most of them.
