George Mahon Speaks At Old Timers Rally

Congressman George H. Mahon, himself an early day settler of Loraine, was the speaker at the gathering of old timers during the Golden Jubilee here Saturday morning.

Mr. Mahon spoke at the Lorex Theatre to almost a full house following the registration of old timers in the Lions Club building which began at 10 a. m.

Congressman Mahon was also celebrating his 56th birthday and told how happy he was to come back to his old home town to celebrate his birthday as well as to help celebrate Loraine's Golden Jubilee.

In talking of the Jubilee dresses worn by the women, Mr. Mahon said he was tempted to suggest to Secretary Benson that he declare long dresses in style which would immediately do away with the cotton surplus.

In his talk Mr. Mahon paid tribute to Loraine school, churches and homes as a means of molding the character of young people of the community.

The only hope of the world, Mr. Mahon said, is honesty and Christianity.

In comparing times of fifty years ago with today, Mr. Mahon stated that we must be masters of our gadgets and not let them master us. He was referring to the hard work pioneers did to carve a community that had become modern and cautioned that we must continue hard work if we are to maintain our present standard of living.

Mr. Mahon was lavish in his praise of the Golden Jubilee celebration, especially of the parade and the Jubilee program.

Old Settlers Honored In Parade Opening Golden Jubilee Celebration

Fifteen cars of old settlers held the place of honor in the Loraine Golden Jubilee parade Friday afternoon. In spite of a terrific sand and windstorm, the parade went off without trouble.

The largest crowd assembled in Loraine in many years watched the parade as it moved down Main Street from the high school campus where it was formed.

Mayor Vance Dickinson mounted on a beautiful brown horse and carrying the U. S. flag, led the parade. Hue Narrell and R. L. May formed the color guard. They were followed by two automobiles bearing two important exponents of Loraine's welfare through the years; J. W. King, originator and promoter of the Golden Jubilee and editor and publisher of The Mitchell County News; J. C. Hall, past mayor for many years and long time president of the First State Bank.

Next came the Webb Air Force Band under the direction of Warrant Officer A. F. Sanders. After this came the feature unit of the parade, fifteen cars of old settlers, people who have lived consistently in the Loraine community for over fifty years and contributed to its growth and welfare during those years.

Leading this group were the Bennett brothers, Tom, Joe, James and Alva, who came to Loraine in 1906. Next came Loraine's oldest couple, Mr. and Mrs. D. E. Gunn, 1905; then perhaps the couple who have lived here the longest, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Cranfill, 1898. They were followed by Mrs. Hattie Sowan who got here first, 1884. Mrs. H. B. Wilson, 1906. Mrs. A. C. Taylor, 1907. Mrs. J. S. Muns, 1901. Mrs. Lee Walker, 1901. Mrs. S. H. Hart, 1902. Mary Wallace Jackson, 1889. Mrs. W. H. Findley, 1907. Mrs. T. J. Coffee, 1901. Mrs. J. E. Spikes, 1906, were unable to participate. Others were Mr. and Mrs. Henry Cook, 1906. Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Lucas, 1904. Mr. and Mrs. Charles Lee, 1906. Mr. and Mrs. Frank Brame, 1906. Mr. and Mrs. Henry Riden, 1900. Mr. and Mrs. O. P. Blair, 1906. Mr. Jess Lee, 1897, and Mr. John Richburg, 1906. One car carried Mr. and Mrs. John Johnson, 1902, and Mr. and Mrs. Jim Johnson, 1903.

R. L. May mounted on his favorite horse, was ahead in the parade. Mr. Thomas Riden, 1900, served as parade marshal and rode at the end of the parade.

Horses in Parade

Horses played a very important part in the parade. Parade marshal Thomas Riden, estimated over 70 horses taking part. Many riders came from surrounding towns. Colorado City, Roscoe, Snyder, Maryneal, Jack, Walker, dressed as an Indian, rode Tex, a famous horse from the Wallace ranch. Also from the Wallace ranch was the original ranch chuck box mounted on a wagon driven by Sam Brown.

An outstanding group of horsemen was the Bruce Byrne family, Mr. and Mrs. Byrne and their three children. Also was a trailer displaying historic saddles.

With a string band playing old hymns and the congregation singing under the brush arbor.

The Lions Club featured Sarah Pratt and Vicki Baird on a very attractive purple and gold float.

The North Loraine Home Demonstration Club took first prize with their float showing an early days scene. The 1906 scene showed "wash day" with the old fashioned tub, board, wash pot and clothes line. The 1906 scene showed the modern electric washer and dryer.

The Bauman Home Demonstration Club used Aunt Dinah Quilling Party as their theme. This showed Aunt Dinah and her friends working on a beautiful patch work quilt.

The T. J. Green Grocery float was the first prize winner in the commercial division. It was a pink rose covered affair with Juanell Finley, queen, riding atop.

The Loraine Drug entry was a horse and buggy with the passengers and queen Barbara Combs, dressed in 1905 costume. The Mitchell County News entry showed an old fashioned printing press being operated by queen Sue Cox.

The First State Bank used a patriotic theme of red, white and blue. Frances Ann Griffin, queen, dressed as Uncle Sam, rode at the front. At the rear was a painted check for a "Million Good Wishes" made payable to the Loraine people. At the rear also was the bank's Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. Seal.

Fay's Beauty Shop took 3rd with a lovely white float that featured its junior queen, Susan Terry.

Beauty Grocery had red and white as its colors. The float was drawn by a red and white auto. The float was a bright red old fashioned dress, and carrying a red parasol.

The Johnson Hospital float showed a typical hospital room scene with the hospital queen, Beverly Johnson, in nurses uniform giving a transfusion to a patient.

The Loraine Telephone Company float showed the progress made in the types of telephones. The float was covered in white paper ruffles. Rita Templeton, dressed in white old fashioned costume was using the old wall type phone and Janie Templeton was using a modern phone.

Thornhill-Preston depicted a tea party which was a popular diversion in the 1906 period. Queen Jackie Richey and Joyce Lynn Furlow rode on this float.

Wanda Wells, queen, in a rose covered swing, was on the grey and fuchsia colored float of H. E. Thomas Grocery.

Walker Motor Company Coon Hunt scene won second prize in the commercial division. There was a live coon in a tree with the hunters and their barking hounds.

Loraine Furniture and Hardware showed the newest in television. The gold colored float carried an assortment of sets which were shown by Kennie Sue Butler, queen.

All in all we can say that the Golden Jubilee was a great success from beginning to end.

The crowd that saw the parade has been estimated at 3000 people. People were here from all over the country, including many old timers who journeyed a long way to come back for the big celebration. They all had a big time and left with nothing but praise for a small town that put on such a wonderful show.

Winners of the beard contest were awarded prizes of \$10, \$7.50 and \$5.

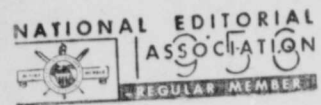

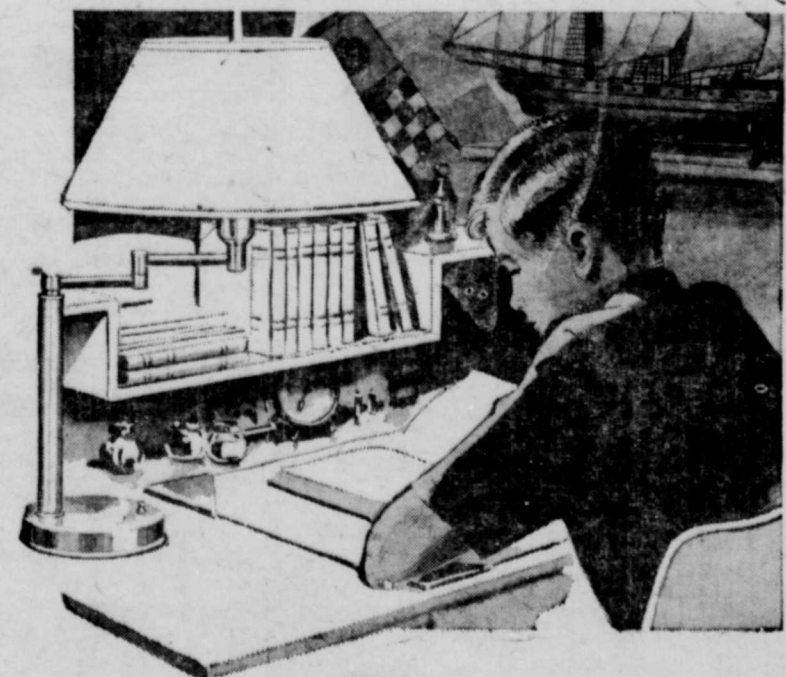

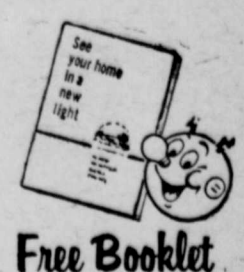
