Irrigation Gas Gets Surprise FPC Boost

A SURPRISE move in a controversial Federal Power Commission rule involving agriculture developed Thursday when the staff counsel of the FPC recommended in Washington that natural gas for irrigation be given a No. 2 priority.

Attorneys for General Motors Corp. made a similar recommendation in the opening round of closing arguments at lengthy hearings being conducted by the FPC on natural gas priorities.

The No. 2 priority has been sought by agricultural groups, many of whom testified at field hearings last month at Lubbock, Phoenix and Albuquerque.

"We feel like we really have made a mile today," John Aikin of Hereford, attorney representing the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association, said after lawyers for the FPC and General Motors filed their recommendations.

Chances Increased

Aikin said chances have been "materially increased" to have irrigation gas classified as a "process gas" and therefore have it placed in

commercial priority No. 2 rather than in industrial priority No. 3.

U.S. Rep. George Mahon of Lubbock, who testified earlier this week at the Washington hearings and had contended that curtailment of natural gas for irrigation would "have a devastating impact" on irrigated agriculture, said after Thursday's developments:

"I am highly pleased over the progress which has been made to date. It looks like things are moving in our direction and I hope they keep going that way. We must preserve this priority for natural gas for irrigation. Otherwise, we are in serious jeopardy."

Lowered Last Year

The FPC last December issued a ruling which lowered the use of natural

gas by farmer-customers of El Paso Natural Gas Co. from second to third priority. The order was viewed by agricultural groups as a possible precedent with implications extending beyond the El Paso case.

Mahon had said that, as a practical matter, there are no other fuels or fuel distribution systems available to run the 50,000 gas-powered irrigation wells on the High Plains.

Without a dependable supply of natural gas, Mahon argued before the commission again this week, there would be a "widespread reversion" to dry-land farming.

The FPC earlier this month postponed the rule change, previously scheduled to go into effect in

September, until mid-June of 1976. This, among other things, presumably was to assure farmers that they would have a dependable supply of fuel for irrigation pumps through the growing season for the next winter wheat crop.

Aikin said San Diego Gas and Electric Co. now is the only group opposing the placement of irrigation gas in the No. 2 priority.

The hearings are expected to be concluded today. Attorneys will have until July 14 to submit briefs and trial judge Curtis L. Wagner Jr. will have until July 27 to render his opinion.

Then there will be a 30-day period for the filing of any appeals. Aikin said he believes the commission's decision now will not be appealed if the final ruling follows the recommendation filed by the staff counsel.

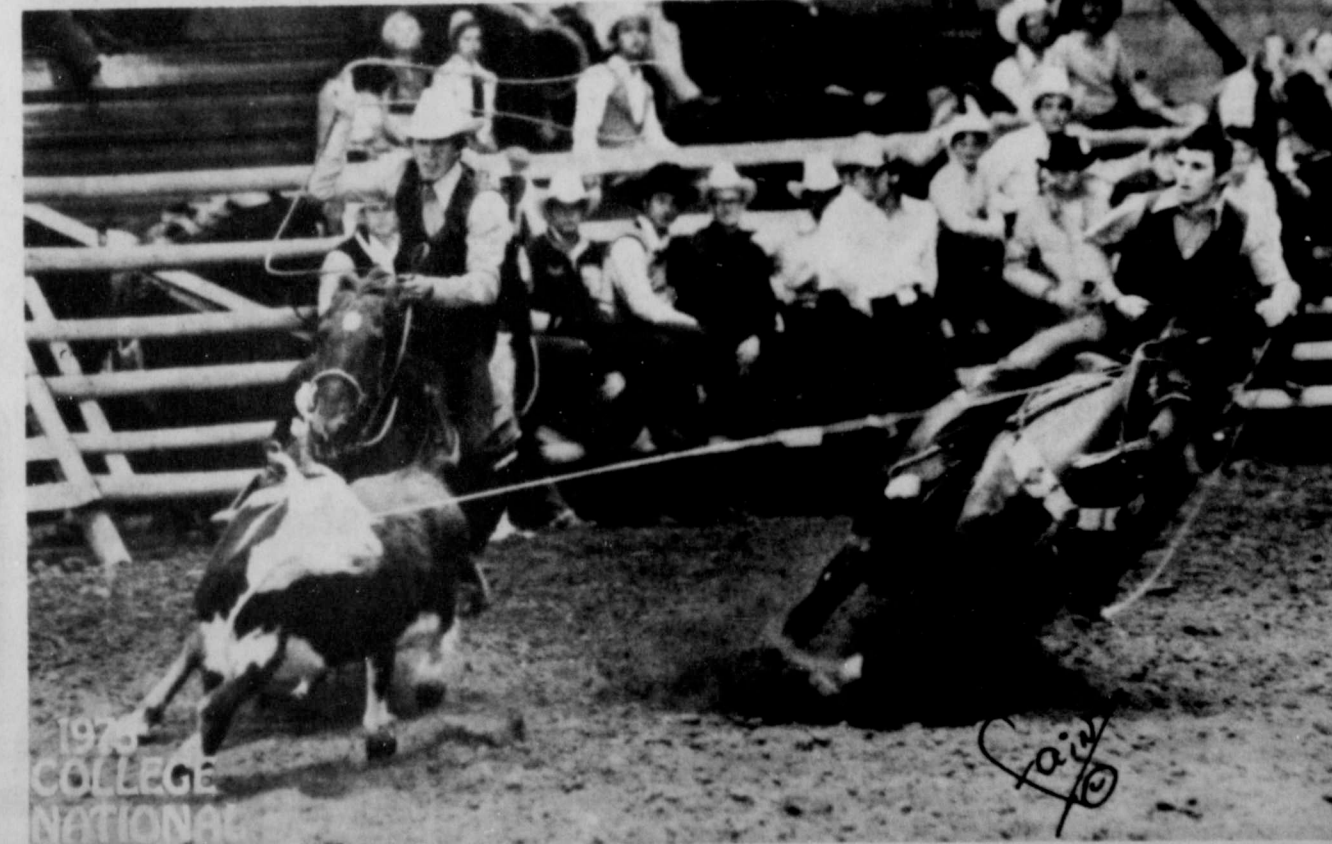

Only Three Approved Sunflower Insecticides

Reports from the Texas A&M Extension Center indicate that Floyd farmers may be in for a battle with the Sunflower Head Moth. Dr. James Supak emphasized that if a producer has a field that is blooming, he should be in that field every day checking for the moth or young worms (larvae).

The adult moth is about 1/2 to 3/4 inch long — light buff to silver color and easily detected when resting or depositing eggs on the yellow flowers. The young worms are about 1/8 inch long and yellowish in color — older worms are up to 3/4 inch long, yellowish-green in color with light and dark stripes on its back.

In checking fields, growers should check about 25 plants at several locations throughout the field. If the adult moth or young worms

are found . . . insecticide should be applied in about 3 days. Repeat applications, if necessary, should be applied at 5 day intervals. Two to three applications may be necessary as it usually requires 12-15 days for hybrid sunflowers to bloom completely.

As of today, there are only 3 insecticides that have an approved label for use on sunflowers . . . Methyl Parathion . . . Thiodan . . . and Supercide. Every producer should be cautioned to use only those insecticides that have an approved label. Otherwise, he may find himself with no market for his seed . . . the field could be condemned by the food and drug people . . . and any storage bin containing seed with residue of a non-approved insecticide may have the entire lot condemned.

Cloud Seeding Book

AUSTIN — Many High Plains farmers have watched aircraft seed clouds briefly overhead and wondered about the outcome. Those farmers that organized together to pay for the cloud seeding may also have asked themselves, how well does it work? Some partial answers are contained in a new research report released by the Texas Water Development Board.

Report 193, "An Evaluation of Weather Modification Activities in the Texas High Plains," was prepared by a team of six scientists of Texas A&M University working under contract for the Board. Project leader was Dr. James R. Seiggins, Associate Dean for Research in the University's College of Geosciences.

Cloud-seeding to reduce hail began in the region surrounding Littlefield and Plainview in 1970, and has continued there during each spring-summer-fall season to the present. Sponsoring the operations are two organizations of farmers concerned with the high risk of hail damage to cotton and other crops — Better Weather, Incorporated, of Littlefield, and the Plains Weather Improvement Association, of Plainview. Clouds are "seeded" in these operations by releasing very fine particles of silver iodide into the updraft area at cloud bases, using aircraft equipped with flares that dispense the silver iodide. Hopefully, countless small ice crystals then form in the cloud rather than large hail.

To evaluate results, Dr. Seiggins' team analyzed by computer the available rainfall data in a block of 14 High Plains counties, and numerous statistics on crop damages from hail in this area for 1970-73 provided by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, and the Crop-Hail Actuarial Association.

The investigators found remarkably little effect on either rain or hail from these cloud-seeding operations, a sharp contrast with results reported in some states which have different cloud types and weather systems.

The report, for example, notes that threefold to fivefold increases in rainfall from seeding isolated clouds has been reported in South Florida and Arizona, and a 25-percent increase in snowfall from seeding clouds in mountains of some of the Western States.

In the Littlefield Plainview region the effect of cloud-seeding has been so small that, in the authors' words, "based on the

available data, no effect could be discerned." The research team emphasizes that this does not prove lack of any effect, particularly in view of the extreme variability of natural rain and hailfall, as official rain gauges are sparse, and only four years of hail data were available.

To help make the new report conveniently available to interested parties, the Water Development Board has furnished copies of Report 193 to County Agents in the 14 counties that were studied, Deaf Smith, Randall, Parmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Floyd, Hale, Bailey, Lamb, Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, and Crosby.

It is now official. Total production and per acre yields of the 1974 cotton crop in the 25 counties represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., were the lowest in over 20 years.

Texas Crop & Livestock Reporting Service figures given to PCG by telephone show total production from the area at 1,193,100 bales of 480 pounds net weight. Yield per harvested acre came to only 263.5 pounds.

The last time the Plains produced such a low volume was in 1950 when area output was only 850,480 bales. And 1974 marked the first time since the 200 pound per acre yield of 1952 that the Plains had seen an average yield below 300 pounds.

The TCRS publication "Texas Cotton Statistics," which gives production and yield figures by county for the entire State, is at the printers and will soon be available from Austin on request.

Lubbock County, after being edged out two years in a row by Dawson County, swung back into the area's top producer spot, despite a drop from 310,000 bales in 1973 to 174,800 bales in 1974. Dawson County, where 315,000 bales were ginned the previous year, was almost completely "droughted out" in 1974 and plummeted to a meager 38,800 bales. Total area production in 1973 was a record 2,888,600 bales, and the per acre yield of 498 pounds was the second highest on record.

The chart below gives 1974 planted and harvested acres, per acre yields, and total production for the 25 counties in PCG territory.

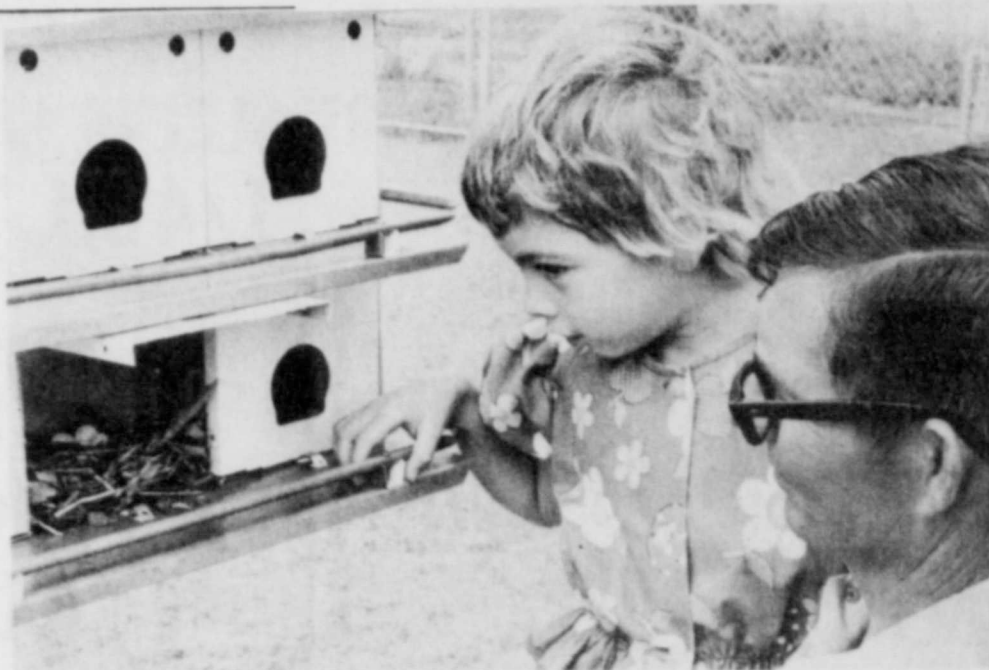

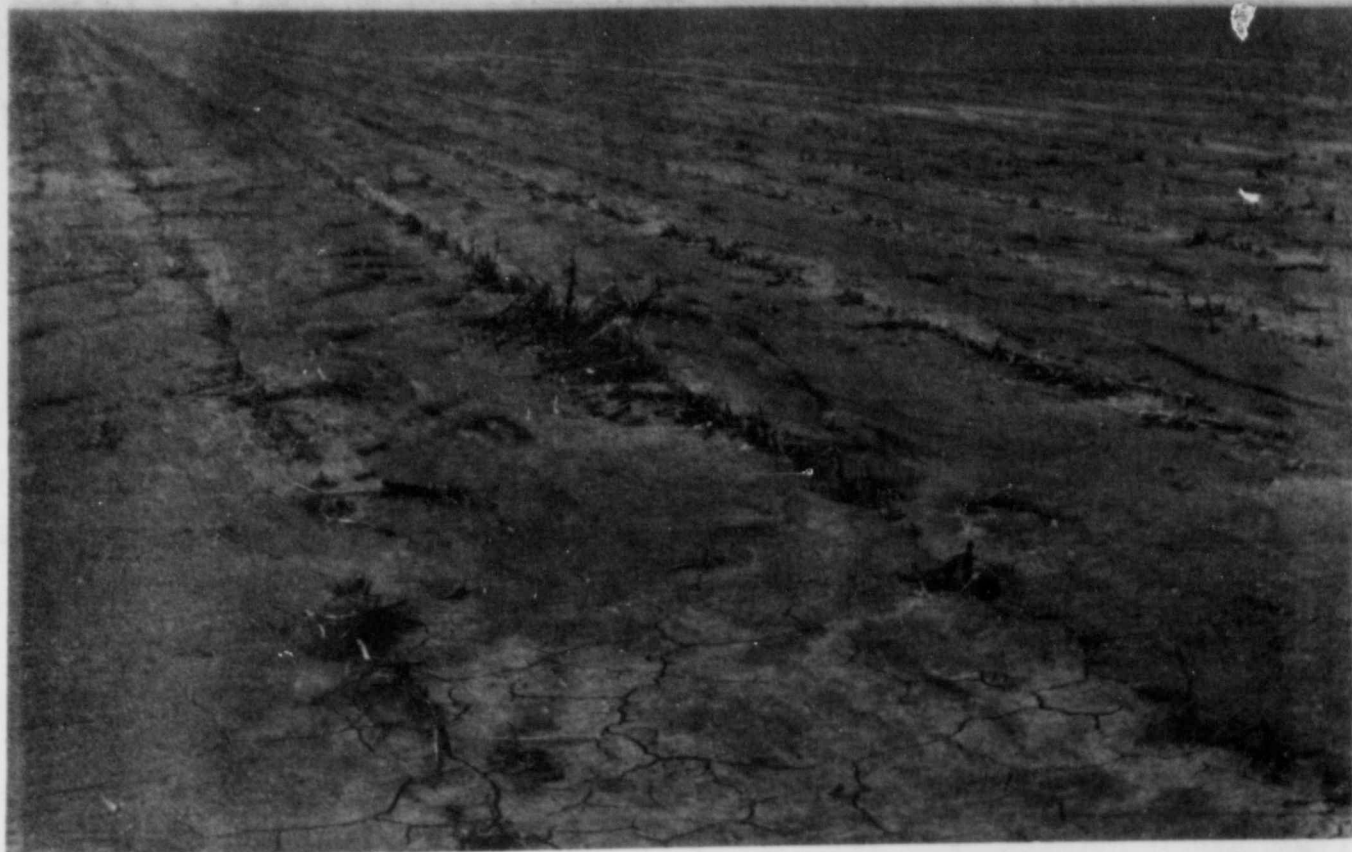

People Moving To Rural Areas

WASHINGTON, June 23 — Population grew faster in nonmetro than in metro counties from 1970 to 1973, reflecting a shift of people from cities to smaller communities, according to a report by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The report, "The Economic and Social Condition of Nonmetropolitan America in the 1970's," was prepared by the Department's Economic Research Service and published by the U.S. Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry.

The study also reported that nonmetro employment increased twice as fast as metro employment between 1970 and 1973, explaining in part the change in population trends toward nonmetro areas.

While per capita personal income in the United States increased at an annual average rate of more than 8 percent in both metro and nonmetro areas from 1965 to 1972, the dollar amount of increase in metro counties (\$1,807) was greater than in nonmetro counties (\$1,474).

Per capita personal income in metro areas in 1972 was \$4,825, compared with \$3,586 in nonmetro areas.

Health care was better in metro than nonmetro areas, but education attainment levels were about equal. The number of substandard housing units declined faster in nonmetro than metro areas, and new construction was accelerating in both areas in the early 1970's.

54 Texans May Die Over Holiday

AUSTIN — The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today estimated that traffic accidents in the state over the July 4th holiday weekend will claim 54 lives.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir said his department expects travel will be heavy in Texas over the holiday period "particularly in and around recreational areas" such as lakes and beaches.

He added that the estimate covers a 78-hour period starting on Thursday at 6 p.m. and counting until midnight Sunday. Last year during a 102-hour Independence Day celebration, 46 persons were killed in traffic mishaps in Texas.

Speir also pointed out that highway traffic deaths are about 25 per cent over the total at this time one year ago. "This is due to increased travel and somewhat higher speeds," he added.

In a concerted effort to help keep deaths down, the DPS and local law enforcement agencies will be cooperating in the all-out effort to make the streets and highways as safe as possible. All available DPS troopers will be on duty, Speir said, and they will be especially watchful for drinking drivers, speeders and persons driving in a reckless manner.

In addition, the DPS will be working with the news media in a special public education program termed "Operation Motorcade" which focuses public attention on where and why fatal accidents are occurring during the holiday.

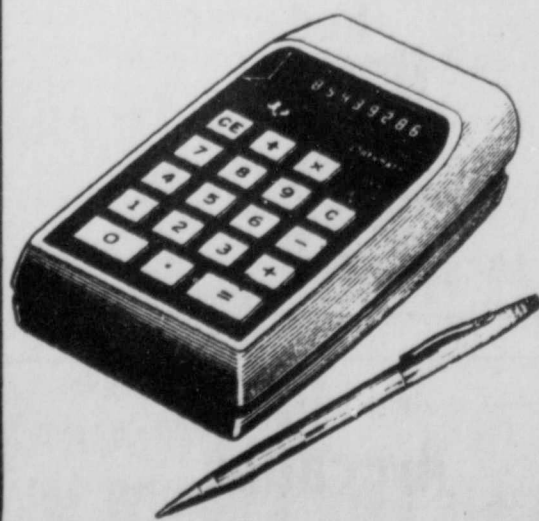
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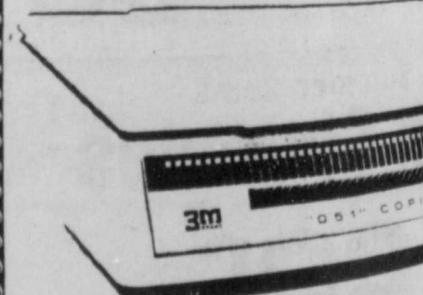
