

Rivercrest Rebels Are District 17-AA Champs

The Rivercrest Rebels defeated the Ore City Rebels for the 17-AA district championship in Pittsburg on Monday night. The Rivercrest boys will travel to Sulphur Springs Thursday night to face Quitman for the bi-district title. Game time will be 7:30 p.m. Rivercrest totally out-

played Ore City. They led at every quarter end. Scott Branch and Anthony Brown shared scoring honors with 16 points each. Kelly Jeffery popped the net for 14 and James Anderson for 11. The Rebs scored 14 points in the first period to Ore City's 5. Their opponent came up with 10 points in the second quarter but River-

crest answered with 12 for a halftime score of 26-15. Rivercrest blew the contest wide open with 22 points in the third stanza while holding Ore City to 8. Anthony Brown scored 12 of his 16 points in this period. The Ore City Rebels tried to get close with 26 in the final period but the

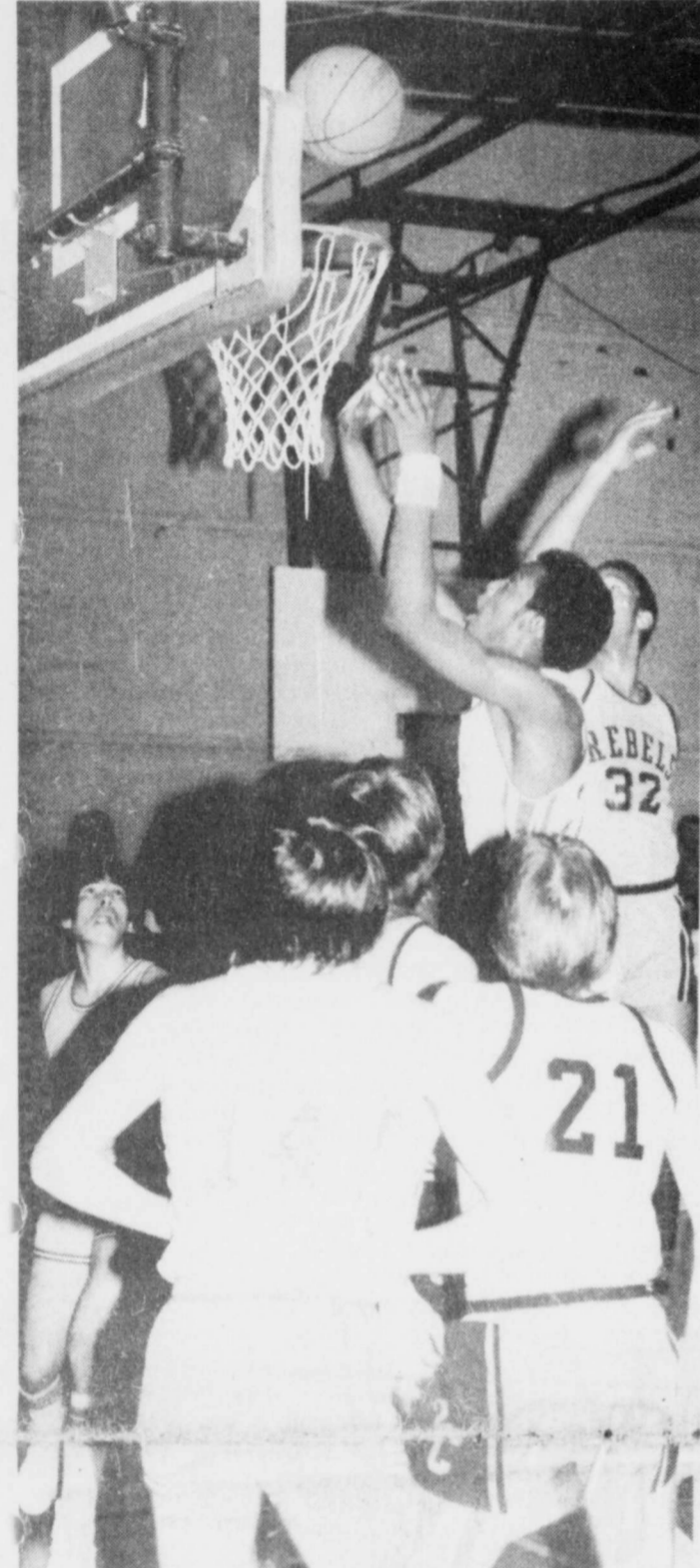
Rivercrest Rebels never let up with 14 points of their own. The game belonged to Rivercrest all the way. The final tally was 62-49. Scoring for the Rebels were Scott Branch and Anthony Brown with 16 each, Kelly Jeffery with 14, James Anderson with 11, Tony Jasso with 3 and

Randy Galloway with two. In last week's action, the Rebels defeated Como-Pickton and Redwater. The Como-Pickton game was a runaway victory 79-35. Scott Branch was top scorer with 20, followed by James Anderson with 19 and Anthony Brown with 17. Others scoring for River-

crest were Kelly Jeffery with 8, Randy Galloway and Charles Glass each with four, Tony Jasso with three and Kyle Hatley and Ricky Kennedy each with two. Rivercrest dominated the Redwater Dragons last Friday night with a 78-40 victory. The Rebels scored 26 in the first period to

Redwater's eight. The second period was much the same with 21 more for Rivercrest. The halftime score was 47-19. The Rebels hit for nine and 22 in the remaining quarters for a final score of 78-40. Scoring for the Rebels were Scott Branch with 22,

James Anderson with 15, Kelly Jeffery with 14, Tony Jasso with 11, Anthony Brown with 6, Randy Galloway with four. The Rebels play Sulphur Springs Thursday night at 7:30 as they meet Quitman for their bid for the bi-district championship title.

Cooper came back to take the lead at the end of the third, 43-39. It was nip and tuck through the final stanza with the Rebelettes taking the victory 54-53 despite last second efforts by Cooper.

Coach Frank Stubblefield commented, "We were just lucky. They (Cooper) had their chances." Others scoring for Rivercrest were Donna Sessums with six, Jackie Via with four and Pam

Ward, Kim Reeder and Delores Simpson, each with two. The Rebelettes played a practice game with 4-A Mt. Pleasant. They were defeated 66-63 in a close match. Mt. Pleasant was also the district champion.

The Rebelettes were unsuccessful in their try for the area championship. They met Troup in Mineola Tuesday night and were defeated 60-48.

The Reb fems scored 14 points in the first quarter. Mary Jane Savage was responsible for eight of these. They marked up 18 in the second period to take a halftime lead of 32-30.

Rivercrest added 10 and 6 in the remaining quarters but came up short, 60-48. Missed shots and rebounds hurt the Rebelette game. Mary Jane Savage led the scoring with 18, followed by

Staci Griffin with 10, Becky Brooks and Kim Reeder each with six, Pam Ward with four, and Kristi Foxworth and Donna Sessums each with two.

Talco-Bogata School Board Extends Contracts

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session on Tuesday, February 14, 1984 at 7:00 p.m. at Rivercrest.

In major action taken, the contracts of principals, Tillman Hale, Gerald Stegall and Billy Joe Pickett were extended for an additional year. In other matters related to personnel, the resignation of Verda Duncan, long time Talco teacher was accepted. Mrs. Duncan is retiring after having taught in the Talco School for the past 30 years. Superintendent Talmadge Morgan stated that Mrs. Duncan's years of service and her contributions to the school, young people, and community are sincerely appreciated and that she will be missed by the school system.

A trustee election was officially called for Saturday, April 7 for the purpose of electing three school trustees. The terms of Jerry Russell, Lyndon Reed and Dr. E.E. Brooks are expiring. As of this writing, only two candidates have filed to have their names listed on the ballots, Mildred Eudy of Bogata, and Jerry Russell of Talco. Others desiring to have their names placed on the ballots must sign up at the superintendent's office by March 7. Cornelia Dickey, tax assessor, met with the board to briefly review the operations of the local tax office and some of the problems and additional work load that has been created due to the new

Statewide Appraisal System. In other matters, the administration was authorized to take the necessary steps so that the Lavada School property could be advertised for another mineral lease. The various financial reports

were approved and minor amendments were made to the 1983-84 school budget. The next regular meeting of the Board will be a week earlier and is set for Tuesday, March 6 at 7:00 p.m. at Rivercrest with the general public cordially invited to attend.

Immunization Clinic To Be At Talco

The Texas Department of Health, Public Region 7 office announced plans for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations. The clinic will be conducted at the Talco Elementary School on March 1 from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

Future clinic dates will be announced. The health department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all children,

preschool and school, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations to be offered include mumps, measles, rubella, oral polio, diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis and tetanus-diphtheria. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record if it is available.

The tetanus-diphtheria vaccine is also available to adults.

Footprints From The Past

 This is the time of year to get ready for the coming spring work, as I remember. There was the plows to get ready and to patch the harness that we used on the mules and horses and then there was the home garden to break and plant before you got too busy in the field.

We always had to plant the potatoes on the 14th of February without fail, as Dad was a firm believer that they had to be planted then. Then there was cabbage and onions to set out and we always set out about fifty or seventy-five cabbage plants and around two hundred onion plants.

To get the fields ready to plant, we would hook four mules together and then we would hook them up to what we called a bedder, which was a plow that would make a bed so we could plant the cotton or corn, which was about all that was planted in those days. After we had the fields bedded, we would let them lay for two to four

weeks then we would get our seed ready. Having the planter ready, we would hook two mules to the planter to plant the cotton. If you have never seen an old time planter, it worked just like the modern ones, except that it was pulled by mules or horses instead of a tractor. When the cotton was planted, we would hook up one mule to what we called a cotton roller, which was a long log that we cut out of some tree and got all the bark off it, then we would drive a steel peg in each end so we could put a couple of chains on then we would hook the animal to the roller and roll two rows of cotton at one time.

Before we planted our cotton, we would plant our corn and the way we planted corn was we had a walking planter that worked by going in the middle or in the low part and not on the top of the bed. The corn planter had only one wheel and it only took one mule to pull it. When the corn was tall enough, we would go in the

field and burst open the bed and that was the way we got the corn to be on top of the bed and not down in the middle and the reason for this was that you got more soil around the corn and it was not likely to fall over as it got higher.

When the cotton came up and was big enough we would plow it with a cultivator, then we would chop the cotton or in other words we would thin it out and after we had chopped the cotton, we would plow it so we would have some dirt up around it. After a while we would have to go back and hoe all the weeds and grass out of the cotton and corn as we did not have any poison to kill the weeds and sometimes you had to hoe the cotton two or three times.

That is just some of the things that we did to get our crops planted and started to grow and it was all done by horse or mule power and not a tractor.

Spring Fever Hits Area

 Oh Hum! And, so its another day. Have you noticed people this past weekend moving along very, very slowly--almost sluggishly or sitting slumped in a chair staring with glazed eyes through winter-graded windows.

Its that disease that occurs every spring, usually after a long hard winter with a few warm balmy days and zip, spring fever strikes. Sometimes spring fever will strike masses of people and occasionally a few victims at a time will succumb to the fever.

Symptoms to check for: the individual cannot hear you as you speak to him or her. The individual sits paralyzed before an open window staring at the green grass growing or the tree buds budding.

There are two treatments for spring fever. According to Moody's Home Receipts, a large spoonful of sulphur and black strap molasses around the first of March to thin one's blood, is one remedy.

The second treatment plan is called work. Fresh air, sunshine, wind and work are super for spring fever victims.

Why not allow the spring fever victim to clear last year's vegetation from your garden plot and turn the soil over with a shovel or a tiller.

Whatever size garden you have, you need three additional basic requirements besides a plot: sunlight, water and plants. All vegetables need some sun and you must have all sun for high vegetable yields.

The soil should be fertile and easy to till preferably a

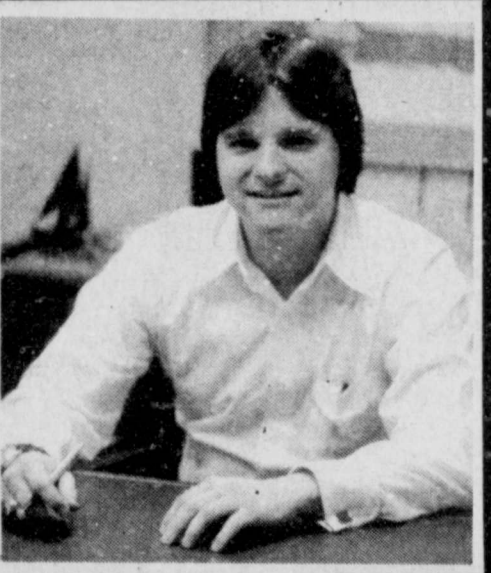
loose, well drained loamy soil. Consider the availability of water. Locate the garden near a sprigot or at least where it can be reached with a garden hose.

Now you are ready for planning stage. Select vegetables you want to grow and that you like to eat. Avoid those that your family doesn't purchase at the grocery store.

After you select your vegetables, make a rough diagram of your garden. Indicate the number of rows and different vegetables you wish to grow. Show the desired location of each crop, the number of plants or feet of rows you want to plant and the best time to plant. The planting guide will help you determine what you need to buy and organize your gardening activities.

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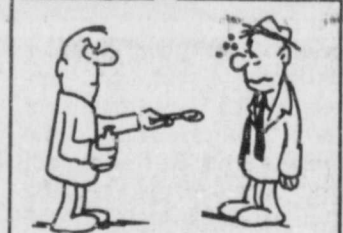

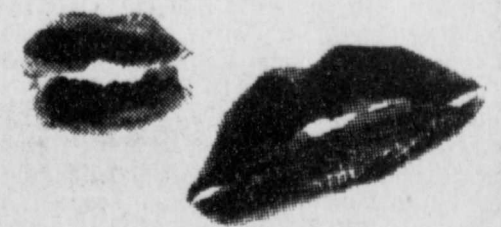

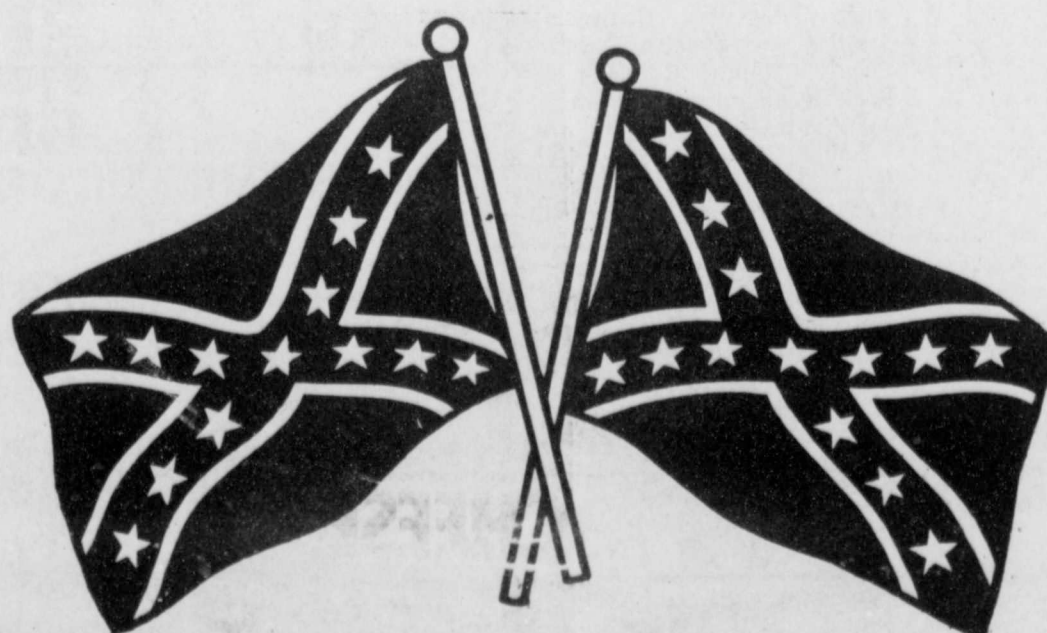
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Nell Rhodes Named Haven Employee Of The Month

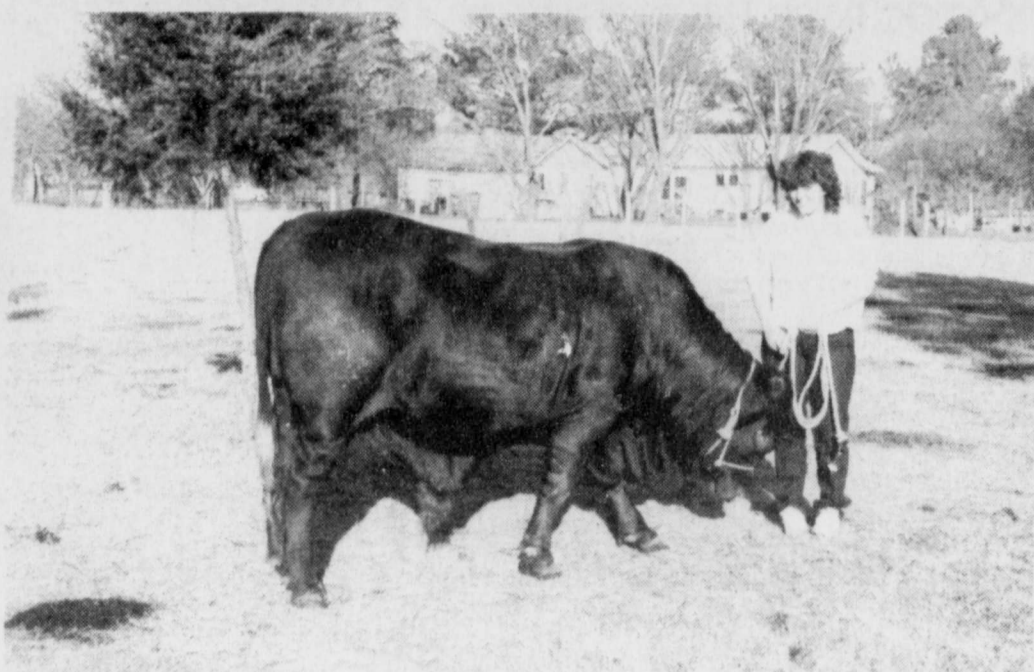

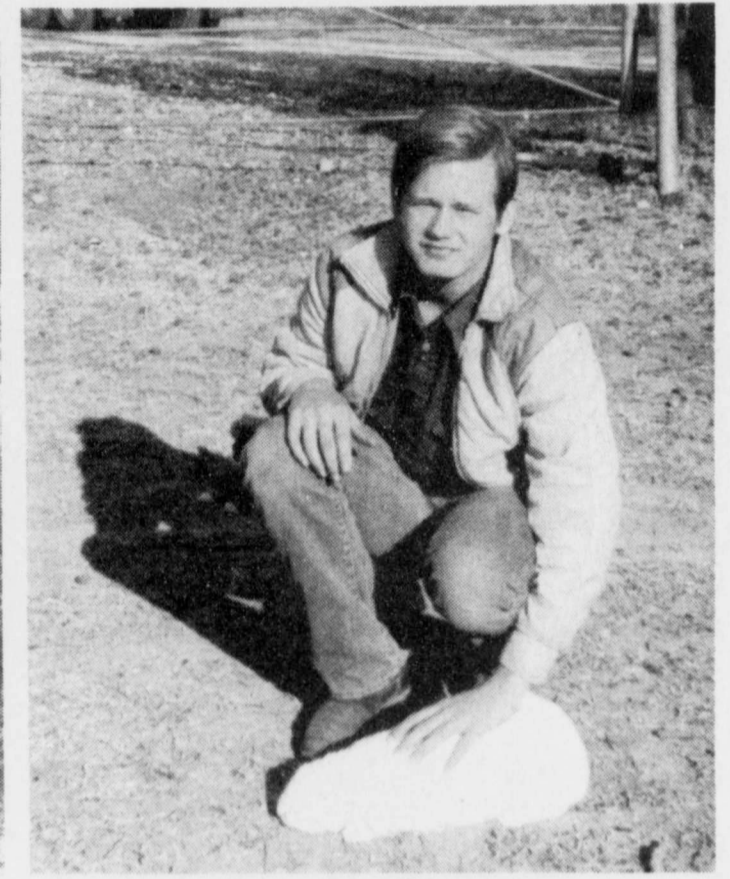

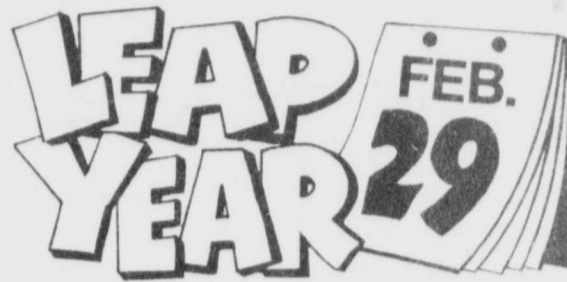
