Bobby Blue Bland Will Perform Here

The sensational blues stylist Bobby 'Blue' Bland will be at the Palm Room Friday night, February 16th. Show time is 9:30 p.m. until 1:30 a.m. Tickets are \$12.00 presale; \$14.00 at-the-door. Tickets are on sale at Caviel's Pharmacy, 1719 Avenue A, Bi-Low's Unisex Salon, 1801 East Broadway and Golden Comb Unisex Salon, 1720 East 4th Street. BOYB -- refreshments will be sold.

Too many fans, including his fellow singers, Bobby 'Blue' Bland is one of America's preeminent vocalists in any style of music. By his own definition, he specializes in "blues ballads." On an upbeat, happy song like "Turn On Your Love Light," there is a tear behind the smile.

Robert Calvin Bland was born in a small town in Rosemark, Tennessee on January 27, 1930. He began singing and playing the guitar as a youngster. He was first influenced by such country bluesman as Blind Lemon Jefferson.

Bobby worked as a valet for B. B. King and later his first record was produced by Ike Turner.

Bobby Bland is best known for "Stormy Monday

Blues," "I Pity The Fool," "Turn On Your Love Light," "That's The Way Love Is," "Members Only," "Save Your Love For Me," and his first to reach the chart, "Farther Up The Road" in 1957.

His new album, "You've Got Me Loving You" is a strong continuation of the Bland tradition. The songs are strong and the arrangement are not gimmicky with a delivery that cuts through to the very bone.

Produced by Monk Higgins and Al Bell, the album includes six songs composed by the producers, plus the Brook Benton classic "Looking Back," "Too Bad" by the blues-rock band Point Blank, and a seasonal ballad, "You Are My Christmas," by Renee Marks and Pete Cosie.

Bobby "Blue" Bland has been called and is best known as the originator of the 'blues ballad.' He communicates with his songs and as one of the living legends of the blues tradition. Bland states: "I've been blessed with the ability to deliver this kind of music better than just about anybody else, so this is where I'm going to stay."

"LISD Sets Deadline" Student Transfers On Tap Here

All requests for students transfers and assignments in the Lubbock Independent School District for next school year, 1990-1991, must be made during the period of February 1 - March 15, 1990.

Transfer requests on the appropriate forms provided by the schools will be considered. Decisions will be made in writing.

Any transfer requests to be considered must be filed within the period of February 1 - March 15. All types of transfer requests are included.

The majority to minority transfers are included in the February 1 - March 15 application period. Students who attend schools where their ethnic classification is in the majority may transfer to schools where their

ethnic classification is in the minority. For purposes of majority to minority transfer policy, minority students are Hispanic and Black, and majority students are Anglo and ethnic groups other than Hispanics and Black. A "majority" school is largely Anglo and would receive minority transfer students. A "minority" school is largely Hispanic and/or Black and

would receive majority transfer students. Enrollment at the close of the first semester, January 18, determines the classification of schools for this type of transfer.

Additional information regarding transfer requests for 1990-91 may be requested from the Office of Student Service, 766-1972, or school principal.

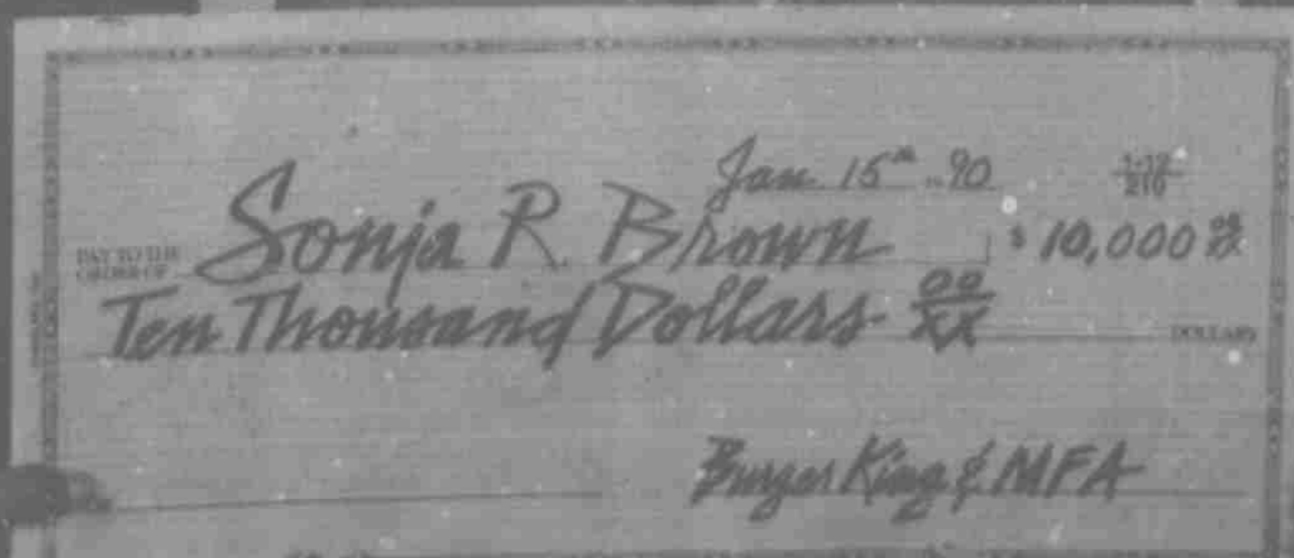

Health Spas: Exercise Your Options

This is the time of year that most of us make our New Year's resolutions. One item that is usually on everyone's list is to improve one's physical condition through exercise, weight control, and other treatments. To achieve these results, you may be considering joining a health spa.

There are several types of health spas, including those that specialize in aerobics, weights, and sports medicine. The type of health spa you choose will depend largely on your interest and your budget; but whatever your needs, you may avoid disappointment if you check out the club's fees, contractual requirements and facilities before you join.

INSPECT THE FACILITY

Visit the health spa during the hours you would normally use the club to see if it is overcrowded during this period. Notice the appearance of the facility and the condition of the equipment: is it clean and well-maintained? You may also want to ask these questions:

- "Is there a trial period in which you can sample services free of charge?" Most spas provide guest passes for this purpose.
- "How many members do you have and is there a limit to the number of people who can join?" While the spa may not be busy during your visit, the condition may change, so be sure to find out what days and times are usually the peak periods. This will determine how much time your workout will require.
- "Is there a qualified trainer or instructor available to teach the operations or functions of the equipment?" Proper training may decrease injuries.
- "What hours will I be able to use the spa and what activities or programs require additional charges?" Some spas require you to pay additional fees for the use of pools, racquet ball courts and saunas.

KNOW THE LAW

Some health spas use high pressure sales tactics to get you to join

right away. You might be offered special time-limited rates as an incentive. But if you wait a few days, you may make a better decision. Take the contract home and read it carefully before you sign it.

You may even want to obtain a copy of the Texas Health Spa Act, which became law September 1, 1985, to help you better understand what health spas can and can not do. This act was designed to correct many of the problems consumers have experienced with this rapidly expanding industry. Here are just a few provisions that are regulated by the Health Spa Act.

RIGHT TO CANCEL - Anyone can cancel a membership contract within three business days without a penalty and no reason required.

IF THE SPA CLOSURES OR MOVES - If the spa closes out of business or relocates more than 10 miles away from the facility that you joined, and you have paid for more than the services you have already received, you are eligible for a refund.

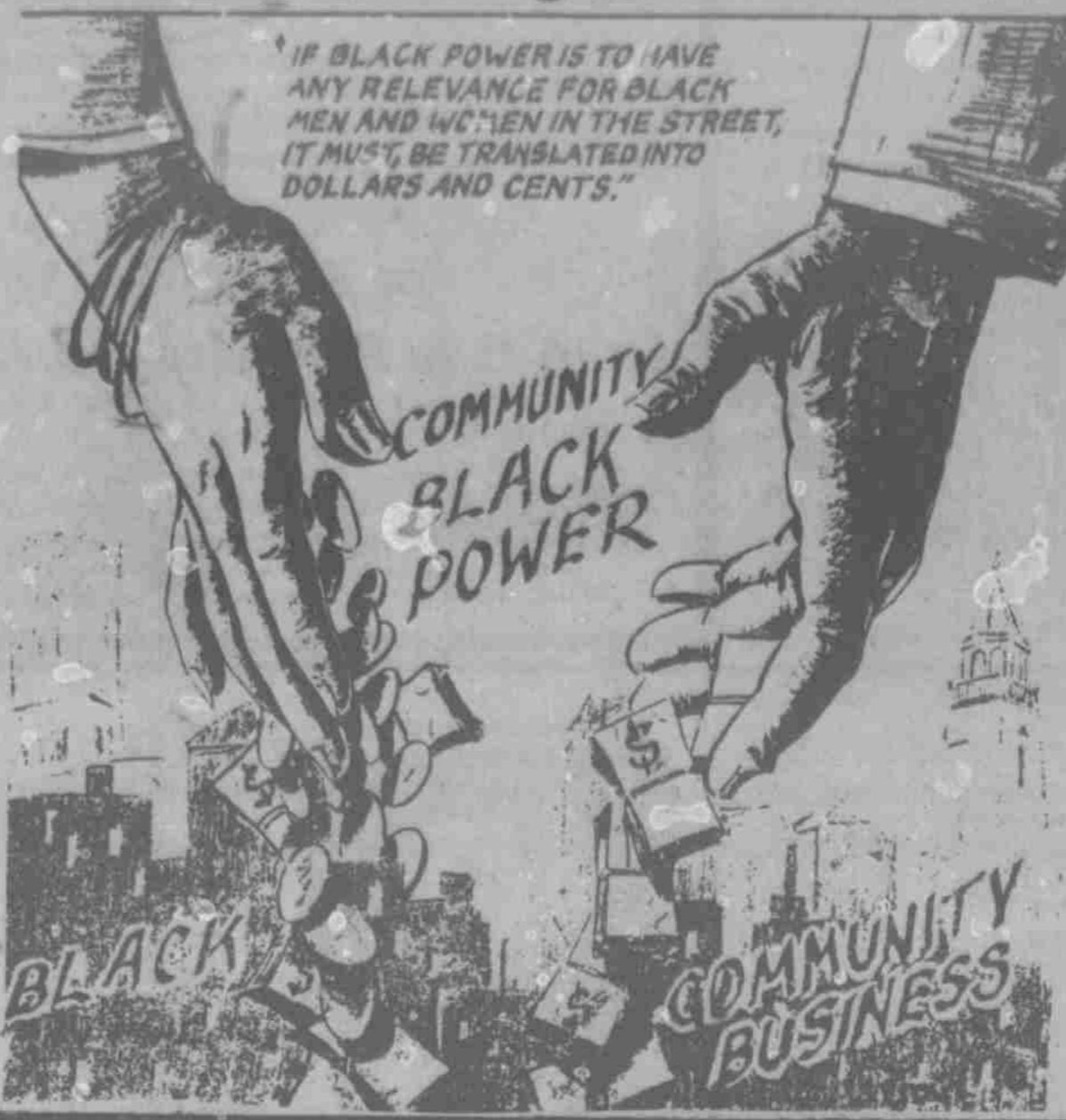
CONTRACT TERMS - Lifetime memberships are illegal. If the spa has been in business in this state for less than two years the member may enter into a contract for no more than two years. If the spa has been in business more than two years the member may finance a contract for five years.

Remember that any contract that fails to comply with the Health Spa Act is void and unenforceable. Also, any contract entered into as a result of false or misleading information by the health spa owner or operator is void and unenforceable. Any violation of the Health Spa Act is a violation of the Consumer Protection Deceptive Trade Practice Act as well.

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE NATIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATION

A National Dialogue

The Cold War is over. For my generation, and all those who came after, the balance of fear based on a world divided into two hostile camps—each with more than enough weapons to annihilate the entire population of our planet—is the only geopolitical system we've known.

But there's no sadness in our farewell. We have the opportunity to build a world more peaceful, less threatening—and less threatened. We can make the resources available by using some of the money so long committed to military defense.

The potential "peace dividend" is enormous. America's military budget—currently over \$300 billion a year—has been consuming half our federal tax dollars. That money that hasn't been available for education, for social programs, for rebuilding our aging infrastructure, and for research aimed at keeping America economically competitive.

Last month former Defense Secretary Robert McNamara and other experts told Congress that U.S. military spending could—and should—be cut in half over the next 10 years.

The debate over how to use this peace dividend has already begun. To what extent should the savings be used to directly reduce the federal deficit? To what extent should they be invested in education, social programs, the infrastructure, and research to help America regain its preeminence in the global economic community?

This debate will determine the kind of nation we become in the 21st century. Many important issues—which I plan to address in the months ahead—

are raised by this critical national dialogue. Today I'd like to call attention to just one, often overlooked, potential of the peace dividend: a change in the research climate in our nation's colleges and universities.

The federal government is a major source of funding for academic research. As military R&D rose to over two-thirds of all federal research and development funding during the 1980s, American academic research increasingly became military research. And Defense

Department priorities came to play an ever greater role in determining the nature of higher education research.

The end of the Cold War frees America to act more like our major economic competitors, where research and development overwhelmingly focus on civilian needs. Japan invests just 1 percent of R&D in its military. In West Germany the figure is 4 percent. But the U.S. military gets 35 to 40 percent of our total R&D—public and private.

Many of the best minds in American science and technology work under contract to the Defense Department. That means they haven't been doing the kind of research America needs to keep our industry competitive, our infrastructure secure, our environment safe, and our children prepared for the economic and social challenges that await them.

The results come as no surprise. American military technology is unsurpassed—but our economy is in decline and our society is plagued by a myriad of social ills.

The peace dividend provides the opportunity to refocus American research where it can do the most social and economic good. Our new R&D priorities must reflect the new geopolitical realities.

This is no time for the federal government to back away from funding university-based research. It is time for our government to foster research that will enable America to solve problems too long neglected. This support for our higher education community is essential if America is to meet the human needs and economic imperatives of the post-Cold War world.

Health Editorial:

Trench Mouth

Trench mouth, which is also sometimes called either acute ulcerative gingivitis or Vincent's disease, is a painful infection and ulcerations of the gums, usually between the teeth. The infection is caused by bacteria, and results from a combination of factors that include failure to clean your teeth and gums properly, throat infections, and smoking. Trench mouth is rare. It usually occurs in young adults. Lack of rest, stress, and poor nutrition help bring on trench mouth. It is not thought to be contagious and is not a dangerous condition, but can cause considerable discomfort.

The symptoms of trench mouth are: red, swollen gums which are too painful to allow you to eat. You may have a metallic taste in your mouth and bad breath. Sometimes a fever develops. If you have these symptoms, it is important that you see your dentist as soon as possible. In treating trench mouth the use of hydrogen peroxide mouthwash usually relieves the

pain and the inflammation of the gums. After a few days your dentist will be able to clean your teeth and gums. A prescription for an antibiotic may be given to clean up the infection. Regular follow up visits about every two weeks may be necessary. When the disease has been cured, minor surgery may be needed to trim your gums to a smooth shape. This will also minimize the areas in your mouth in which another infection may develop.

February is Children's Dental Health Month. The local dental society, South Plains District Dental Society, is holding a Dental Health Fair Saturday, February 17, 1990, from

10:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. at the South Plains Mall, across from the McDonald's restaurant. There will be oral health education, demonstrations, puppet shows, drawings for prizes, and food coupons for McDonald's.

Parents, this writer encourages you to bring your child to the South Plains Mall, and let them bring their old toothbrushes to swap for a free new one.

Last year's dental health fair was a success and we are looking forward to this year's fair being even a bigger success.

MAJORITY TO MINORITY TRANSFERS Lubbock Independent School District

Parents who desire to request "majority to minority" transfers for their children for the coming school year of 1990-91 should make the request during the period of February 1 - March 15, 1990.

A "majority" school is largely Anglo and would receive minority transfer students. A "minority" school is largely Hispanic and/or Black and would receive majority transfer students. For purposes of the majority to minority transfer policy, minority students are Hispanic and Black, and majority students are Anglo and ethnic groups other than Hispanic and Black.

Schools will be classified as "majority" or "minority" based on the ethnic makeup at the close of the first semester, January 15. Under the majority to minority transfer policy, four elementary schools are not available to receive such transfers because they are involved in magnet school assignments: Iles, Ramirez, Tubbs, and Wilson.

Students who attend schools where their ethnic classification is in the majority may transfer to schools where their ethnic classification is in the minority.

Transfer request forms may be picked up and returned to principals of the schools where students are presently enrolled.

Additional information regarding the majority to minority transfer procedures may be secured by calling school principals or the Office of Student Services, 766-1972.

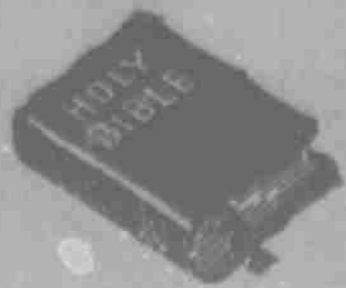

PARSON D. A. SMITH

The story is told of a man who started out as a social drinker and ended up as an alcoholic. He had three small boys at home, and they grew up and followed his footsteps. One day this man took a good look at himself and decided that he wouldn't waste whatever time he had left. He gave his life to God, became a member of the church and soon had the respect of many people. He went to his sons and talked to them about Christ -- telling them of His love for sinful men and how He would reach down and take hold of and lift up the vilest person. The father was hoping that he could persuade them to become Christians. The boys laughed at their father. They refuse to listen. With a feeling of much regret the old man said: "I went too far, stayed too long, and came back too late. My boys followed me into the far country, but they didn't follow me back home."

In the Old Testament, the life of Manasseh, king of Judah from 698-642 B. C., illustrates this truth of too long in the far country. Manasseh opposed the revival of religion which had marked his father's reign. He had the altars which his father, Hezekiah had torn down re-erected and rest red the debasing nature-worship associated with Baal. He built in the house of the Lord, altars for the worship of stars. Human sacrifice, including his son that was burned on an altar, became part of a religion of outward form and ceremony devoid of inward reality, and without spiritual or ethical conviction. Those who tried to preserve the prity of the worship of God were rewarded for their effort persecution and even death, for 'Manasseh shed very much innocent blood, till he had filled Jerusalem from one end to another' (II Kings 21:16). Manasseh repented from his wicked attitude before his death and humbled himself before the Lord, but his son, Amon who succeeded him as king showed no desire to reject the gross idolatry of his father. His reign of evil exceeded that of his father.

How careful then those of us who are fathers or those of us who are in position of leadership as it relates to a fatherly image ought to live. Our actions can leave our sons and daughters in a far country -- to our hurt.

Hostility Link To Heart Disease

Type "A" Behavior and heart disease suggests the real killer is outrageous anger, and not impatience. For many years experts believed aggressive, always-in-a-hurry people. The classic Type "A's" were working themselves toward heart attacks. However, new evidence is emerging that being distrustful and quick to reach the boiling point are very definitely the true culprits. "Being a workaholic, being in a hurry, interrupting people, are not necessarily

bad for the heart." "What is bad," is if you have high levels of hostility and anger, you don't bother to hide it dealing with other people." Always ready to explode. The Type "A" behavior has probably outlived its usefulness, and we should concentrate on understanding the poisonous effects of anger on the heart. Many of us had thought that the definition of Type "A" was too broad. Research has showed that being paranoid or neurotic or avoiding social contact were not associated with heart attacks.

Instead those at high risk tend to harbor a cynical mistrust of other people's motives. They get angry real often, and openly express their displeasure, rather than controlling it. Such people tend to get furious, for instance, in slow moving traffic, they talk themselves into getting their own blood pressure up. I don't mean anxiety, I mean plain mad. This behavior could be a big

problem for about 50 percent of our population, and have been there since birth. In behavior labs researchers have measured people's blood pressures while asking them to solve word puzzles. They found that angry people's pressures shoot up dramatically if they are deliberately harassed during the experiments while the blood pressures of people with

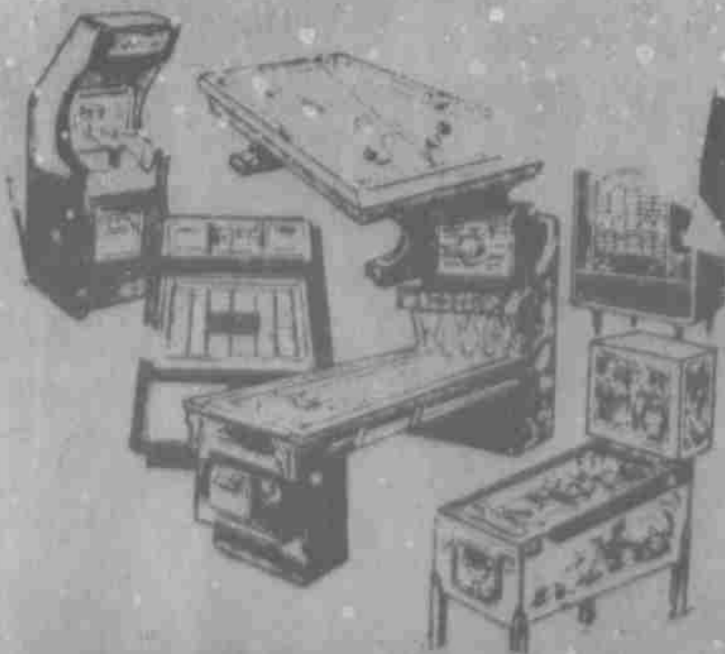
