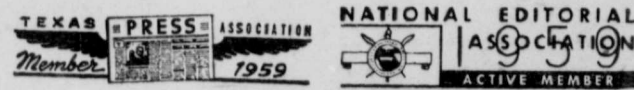

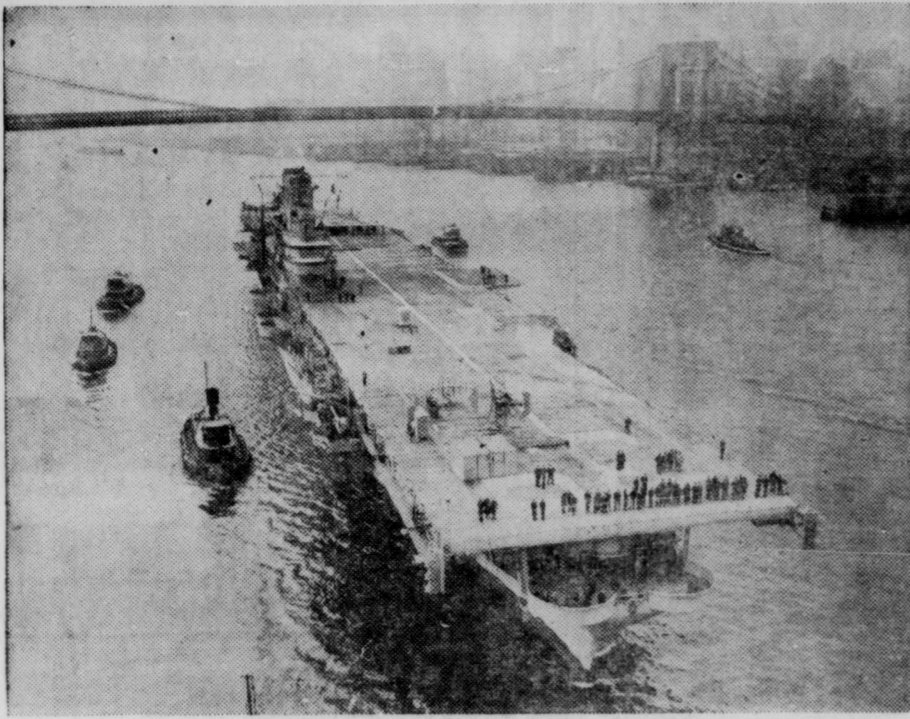

### Traffic Accidents Costly In Texas

Austin Texas traffic accidents last year not only took a total of 2,342 lives an average of almost 200 each month but also resulted in an economic loss of \$347,311,000.

Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, pointed out this week that most of the worst accidents occur in rural areas. "The tragic loss of life by far overshadows any monetary consideration, but staggering amount of property damage brought on the streets and highways of our State should not be overlooked," he said.

Considering the fact that so many of these accidents happen in areas where farmers and ranchers live, Garrison used an acre of land to illustrate one way to look at the "high cost of traffic accidents."

"An acre of land measures 43,560 square feet," he said, "and United States currency measures about two and five-eighths inches by six and one-eighth inches. "If an acre of farm or ranch land were completely covered with one dollar bills, then a layer of two dollar bills, then a layer of hundreds and five-hundreds and this topped with 231 tons of silver dollars, then this would represent the economic loss from traffic accidents in Texas during 1958."

Garrison, drawing upon the Department's Statistical Services Division, noted that \$347,311, would buy 5,000 farms or ranches at \$40,000 each, 5,000 refrigerator-freezers at \$800 each, 5,000 color TV sets at \$700 each, 5,000 living room suits at \$1,400 each, 5,000 air conditioning units at \$1,400, 5,000 pickup trucks at \$3,000, 5,000 tractors at \$3,000, and 5,000 registered bulls at \$600.

"And there would still be enough money to furnish the head of each of these 5,000 farms or ranches with a bank account of \$17,862.20," he said.

### Social Security Questions, Answers

Q. How do I report my earnings as a minister once I have elected coverage under social security?

A. All self-employed ministers report their earnings annually when they file their income tax returns. Schedule C of Internal Revenue Form 1040 show all income including salaries, fees, travel allowances, and the fair value of housing furnished by the minister's church. In addition all expenses directly connected with the ministerial work should be itemized. The total income over and above expenses is the correct amount to report. This applies to all taxable years ending after December 31, 1957.

Q. How much tax must I pay on my income as a minister?

A. For 1958 the self-employed minister should pay 3-3/8% self-employment tax on the first \$4,200.00 of his net earnings. For the year 1959 he should pay 3-3/4% on the first \$4,800.00 of his net earnings.

Q. When should I pay social security tax on my income as a minister for the year 1958?

A. Most ministers use the calendar year method of reporting their income for both income tax and social security purposes. This means that all income received and all expenses paid between January 1, 1958, and December 31, 1958, should be reported between January 1, 1959, and April 15, 1959.
