ROAD BACKERS GET SUPPORT FROM COUNTY

Proponents of the road designated as an extension of Highway 1 from DeLeon north to Desdemona and then to intersecting highways 1 and 89 to a point near Eastland had assurance Saturday of aid of Eastland county in securing right-of-way.

The commissioners' court, seen Friday morning by a delegation of Desdemona, Ranger and Strawtown, in the afternoon passed an order advising the state highway commission that right-of-way will be secured.

The passing of the order makes way for the authorization of a survey and location of the road by the state highway department. The county has been assured by the proponents in Eastland and also Pinto counties that they will secure the right-of-way for the road and that fences will be built right-of-way of a minimum of 100 feet is required.

Distance from DeLeon to Desdemona of the proposed route is approximately eight miles. From Desdemona to the intersection of the highways 89 and 1 is about 16 miles, it has been explained.

Commissioners' court in Comanche county has already promised right-of-way in the part of the road which is affected between DeLeon and Desdemona, outside its county.

TIENTSIN IS TURNED INTO INFERNO AS JAPS BOMBARD CITY TODAY

LEON IS DUE SURVEY UNDER ARMY ENGINEER

TIENTSIN, China, July 31.—Tientsin was turned, suddenly, into an inferno of hate, fear and jangled nerves today at a moment when it seemed the brief, tragic war between China and Japan had ended.

Japanese artillery men kept pounding shells into the smoking ruins of the Rockefeller Library. Next they opened up without warning in a terrible bombardment of the native city.

For the days of fighting when their men had made a hopeless stand against the Japanese, the Chinese people had remained unmoved, but the bombardment caught them weakened. In a few moments panic broke.

Women dragging children with them began running toward the harbor where and sandbag barricades of the foreign settlement. As they ran there burst on the city one of the most severe thunderstorms in memory. There were scenes of madness.

The terrorized Chinese turned away from the foreign concession and went to the river, where they thronged the banks, trampled the bodies there, mules and human beings being trampled together.

Police, soldiers and armed volunteers of the British concession began herding the refugees as gently as they could toward the former German concession.

As these events occurred a potentially serious clash occurred between the French and the Japanese. The French consul charged the Japanese had cut communication between the French concessions and the French Army Garrison, and that during the fighting Thursday Japanese troops machine gunned a French detachment.

The Leon River Flood Control District, composed of Eastland and Callahan counties, is in a list of projects for which flood control surveys of Texas waterways have been authorized by the War Department in Washington, it was learned Saturday.

The Leon project, as with others, was due a survey because of its inclusion in an act passed last year by Congress.

Brigadier General George B. Pillsbury, assistant chief of engineers, has stated in Washington dispatches the Texas waterways surveys would be made in order of their importance and as money is made available.

The work, it is understood, will be made by the army district engineer in Galveston.

The Leon River district has undergone a preliminary survey conducted with funds of the legislature through direction of the district director which is chairmaned by Frank Sparks of Eastland. A topographic survey of the proposed damsite and lake site near Eastland is in progress. The Texas Reclamation Department is conducting the work.

Postal Receipts In June Have a Drop

AUSTIN, Texas — Postal receipts in Texas during June declined slightly from the preceding month but increased moderately over the corresponding month last year, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research has reported. Thirty-five representative Texas cities recorded total receipts of \$1,202,346, a decrease of 0.3 per cent from May but an increase of 4.5 per cent over June last year.

During the first six months of the year aggregate postal receipts for these cities were \$7,246,874, an increase of 9.2 per cent over the corresponding period a year ago.

SENATE PASSES WAGES AND HOURS ACT AND SENDS IT TO THE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, July 31.—The Senate today passed and sent to the House a wages and hours bill encompassing a broad attack by the Federal Government on low wages and long hours.

Final passage of the measure, which would set up a labor standards board, empowered to regulate wages to minimums not exceeding 40 cents an hour and hours not lower than 40 a week, came up to a dramatic battle by southern Democrats and Republicans to recommit the bill to committee.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—Administration forces today defeated an effort to kill the wages and hours bill by sending it back to Senate committee. The test vote presaged passage of the measure.

The administration pressed the bill toward a "showdown" vote after beating an amendment affecting Secretary of State Cordell Hull's good neighbor tariff policy.

The bill, a key sector in President Roosevelt's pre-adjournment program, headed for a final decision with neither side very confident of victory.

Sen. Pat McCarran of Nevada offered an amendment, later defeated, which would have barred importation of products made abroad under so-called "sub-standard" labor conditions.

Debate was interrupted when a white-haired gallery spectator rose and demanded that he be heard as a representative of millions of unemployed.

The man was ejected from the gallery after he demanded that a petition he carried be read from the desk. He tossed the petition over the gallery railing.

The man was identified as W. A. Maxwell of Chicago, representative of the American Federation of the Unemployed and the Aged.

Melody Lane Star Gets \$15,000 Check

FORT WORTH, July 31.—A check for \$15,000 received by Joe Howard, composer of "Wonder Who's Kissing Her Now," caused excitement this week among the old-time song-hit writers of Melody Lane, one of the chief attractions of the Fort Worth Frontier Fiesta.

The check was in payment of screen rights for "Stubborn Ciderella," a musical show which ran a year on Broadway. The deal had been pending so long—almost two years—that Howard had forgotten the matter.

Desdemona Test In Ellenburger 421 Feet As Bit Strikes 3,825

Four hundred twenty-one in the Ellenburger lime, Gallagher-Lawson et al No. 1 Mrs. B. I. Terry at last report was drilling at 3,825 feet.

The test, projected as a 5,500 foot operation, at the present depth has 10-inch pipe. The Ellenburger was topped at 3,404 feet.

The deep test is making approximately 36 or 40 feet daily. Only show thus far, it was stated, has been at 2,997 feet with a small amount of gas.

Only her remarkable vitality enabled her to live through the night, doctors said.

United States Testing China's Salesmanship

Agreement between the United States and China to expand their co-operative monetary program with a plan for bartering gold and silver is interesting news for those who like to keep tab on "how the wind blows" in our foreign relations, and also, incidentally, for people who have some loose money they would like to put away in foreign investments.

The new understanding announced jointly by Treasury Secretary Morgenthau and H. H. Kung, Chinese finance minister, provides simply that the Chinese government will purchase gold from the United States, payment for the gold to be made from the large silver reserves of the Central Bank of China.

This follows up the agreement of May, 1936, by which the United States agreed to purchase "substantial" amounts of silver from the Central Bank of China, and to make dollar exchange available to that bank for stabilization purposes.

As far as the American public is concerned, the immediate effect will amount merely to an increase in the issuance of silver certificates.

But something just a little more tangible than that is expected by the astute Chinese. Significantly, Dr. Kung, when he visited the United States to negotiate the new pact this summer, suggested frankly that American citizens would find China a good place for investments.

His attitude was that China, a "united, fast-moving and progressive" nation, having demonstrated its good faith in seeking a respected place in the world, has fulfilled the requirements of a reputable borrower.

No one doubts Dr. Kung's sincerity. China may be the unconquerable land of untold riches, and its government may be responsible for all its obligations, insofar as circumstances permit. But it's just those "circumstances" that may bring the embarrassing pause as Dr. Kung braces himself for the rush of investors.

For instance, among those "circumstances" might easily be another of the incessant border clashes or bandit raids; another of the serious skirmishes with one or more of the roving Chinese Red armies. There may be more unannounced invasions by Japan, new insurrection among the powerful Cantonese, or even another of those "courageous" kidnappings, of which President Chiang Kai-Shek himself was a victim not long ago.

If the United States government can, under conditions which safeguard its own interest, be of any assistance to struggling China, no one can honestly begrudge that much help.

But individual investments are another thing to a people who remember how "smart" they were when they played their bankrolls on the "responsible" governments of Europe. As a result, the proverbial Chinese patience may be tested to the limit before its salesmanship bears fruit.

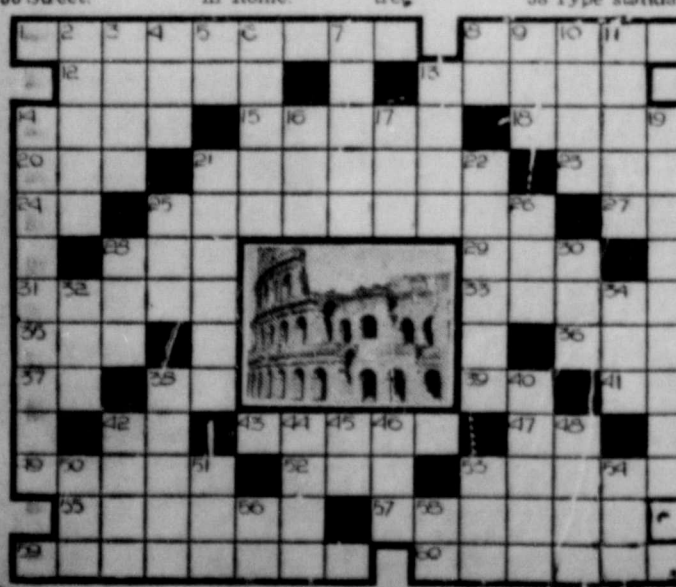

Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON — There simply isn't any such thing as an Emily Post who could draw the line between courteous propriety and shrewd hypocrisy when it comes to the White House attitude toward election of a Senate majority leader to succeed Joe Robinson.

Other questions of good taste and hypocrisy arising since the death of the late Joe are easier to solve. For instance, the issue as to which side in the court fight first got busy behind the scenes to capitalize on the new situation. The answer there is that each side got busy as soon as it heard the news. The court plan opposition leaped into the backstage maneuvers no more quickly than administration forces. One side plotted attack and the other counter-attack.

THEN, take the question of which side has been most gauche and hypocritical in its public maneuverings. For hours after Robinson's body was found, certain administration strategists—who feared developments would rout their Senate strength—itched and hoped for some assertion from the opposition that Robinson's death signified divine intervention in the court fight. Senator Burt Wheeler of Montana, opposition leader, then dropped his guard by beseeching Roosevelt to forget the court plan "lest he be defying God." And out cracked the President's letter to Senator Barkley with its shrewd multiple effort to denounce those who lacked "decent respect" for Robinson's memory, endorse Senator Barkley by implication for the Senate leadership, stiffen Roosevelt's own ranks and check the opposition's attempt to have Congress adjourned at once.

But then the President astounded Senator Pat Harrison of Mississippi that he was taking no sides in the fight between Harrison and Barkley for the leadership. This came at a time when Roosevelt agents were nearly killing themselves in Washington's preposterous summer heat, seeking to put Barkley over.

It is fantastic to assume that Roosevelt had not told these men he wanted Barkley and wanted him badly. His closest intimates pounded home the argument to senators that this leadership selection would decide the future of the New Deal and of the Democratic party.

THE Democratic opposition had no illusions. It lined up against Barkley almost to a man, spreading the word that victory for Harrison would mean the end of the court bill. Everywhere this fight became to be regarded as the greatest test of the Roosevelt administration to date, and especially a real test for those senators who had kept insisting they were liberals but couldn't stomach the court plan. (Harrison always has been considered conservative, and Barkley more than mildly liberal.) And yet, in the face of all this, Roosevelt and Farley professed to take a neutral position! On the other hand, of course, certain Republican senators were bringing pressure on certain Democratic senatorial friends in behalf of Harrison. You may be sure that these gentlemen were taking an attitude of "strict neutrality." It's funny how many politicians there are in politics.

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

HOW much does a can hold? So many readers have asked that question that a few specific facts about cans should be repeated here for their information. If your recipe calls for 1 cup of canned food, ask the grocer for an 8 oz. can; if you want 1-1/4 cups exactly, buy a picnic size can; for half cup measurements, use Baby Foods size, but for 2 cups use a No. 1 can. Two and one-half cups comes in a No. 2 can, 3 1-2 cups in a No. 2-1/2 size can, 4 cups in a No. 3. The large size, No. 10 holds between 12 and 13 cups.

Another question often asked is "just what is evaporated milk?" In warm weather, homes without good refrigeration are safer using evaporated milk because it is less likely to sour or become infected with germs. When traveling with young children evaporated milk is safer, too, unless you are sure of a pure milk supply. Of course, where there is adequate ice or automatic refrigeration, canned milk is no safer or better than fresh milk from the dairy.

60 Per Cent of Water Removed
According to one nationally known manufacturer of evaporated milk, this is just what that product is: whole cow's milk with about 60 per cent of the water removed before it is hermetically sealed in cans.

After being given every scientific test for purity and fat content, the milk is pumped into preheated cans, heated to near boiling point. It is then drawn into glass-lined enclosed vessels. From the wells, the milk is drawn into vacuum pans where about 60 per cent of the water is removed by evaporation by allowing the milk to pass over coils through which exhaust steam sends heat. There is actually little, if any, change in the milk. From the vacuum pans the warm milk is pumped into homogenizers. Homogenization consists of forcing the milk through a small aperture at tremendous pressure of 2,000 pounds per square inch. The size of the fat globule is reduced to one-sixth its original diameter. Immediately upon leaving the homogenizers the milk is pumped into glass-lined insulated storage tanks. After that it is analyzed by a chemist and then pumped into the cans which are entirely closed except for a small vent hole in the top. Sterilization of the hermetically sealed cans is effected by heating under steam pressure at a rigidly controlled temperature for an exact period of time.

Fruit Filling for Two-Layer Cake
Three-quarter cup evaporated milk, 1-1/4 cup water, 3-4 cup sugar, 1-2 cup dates, chopped, 1-2 cup raisins, chopped, 1-2 cup nut meats, chopped, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Mix evaporated milk and water in double boiler. Add sugar. Stir until sugar is dissolved, then add fruit. Cook until thick. Cool. Add nuts and vanilla. Spread between layers of cake.

Hot, Dry Weather Causes Water To Be Unpalatable

NEW YORK.—This is the season of the year when the water supplies of many cities throughout the country are taking on unpalatable tastes and odors, according to Henry Laughlin, research chemist of Tyrone, Pa., who has been commissioned to make a survey of the palatability of water in several hundred cities.

"Undesirable tastes and odors in water are caused in two ways, (1) from tiny, microscopic plants, about one-thousandth of an inch in size, which generate oily, musty odors, and (2) pollution by foreign matters, as industrial wastes.

"Since all plants flourish in the sunlight, the tiny plants, called algae, which infect rivers, lakes and reservoirs, grow rapidly during the warm days of summer," says Mr. Laughlin. "That means that at this season of the year the tiny weeds exude a maximum of odorous substances.

"Coupled with the rapid growth of algae in warm weather is the fact that the rivers and other sources of water are low during the summer. That tends to concentrate the unpalatable substances. Another factor in the summer

situation is the greater use of water to bathe, water lawns, etc. This may cause overloading of waterworks above their rated capacities and unless adequate precautions are taken water of very poor quality may be delivered to the taxpaying public.

"Besides the tiny weeds, industrial wastes often cause unpalatable tastes in waters taken from rivers and lakes. Some chemicals, especially coal-tar derivatives, seriously affect the taste of water. Even an ounce of some substances will render the entire water supply of a city unpalatable. When such pollution is present, it is exaggerated under the summer conditions."

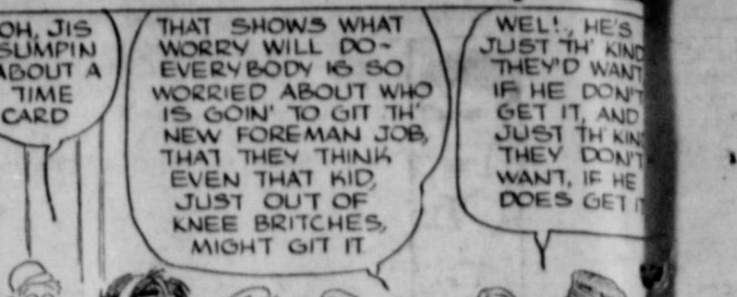

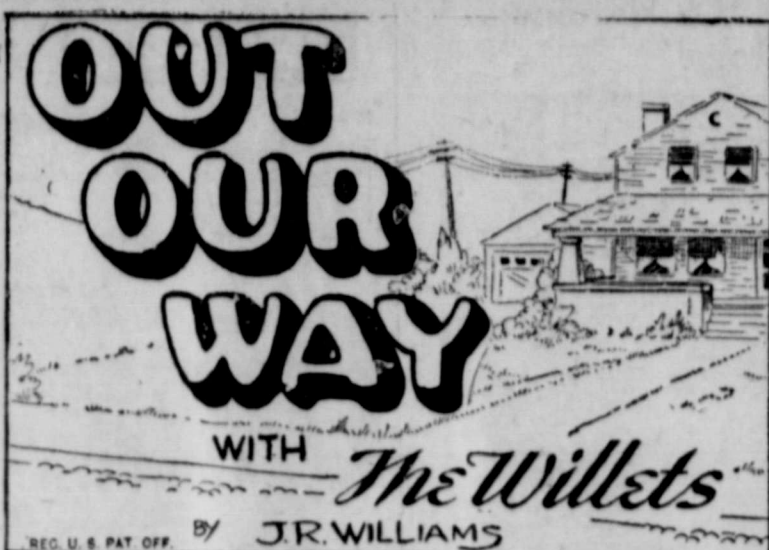

Doggone Good—

A black and white favorite it takes no time at all if you use the packaged devil's food mix based on the 200-year-old Washington family recipe for Black Cake. Just add water to the contents of the packaged mix and bake. Cut into squares while still hot from the oven and top with a scoop of vanilla ice cream. Sprinkle chopped nuts on top and serve.

One for the Refrigerator!

You're "one up" on Mother Hubbard if you know your staples! Keep canned fruits on the pantry shelf and a hand of bananas ripening in the fruit bowl and August dessert is a job for the refrigerator at a moment's notice!

Banana Apricot Mousse

3-4 cup apricot pulp, 1 cup mashed banana (2 to 3 ripe bananas), 3 tbsps. lemon juice, 1-3 cup apricot juice, 1-3 cup confectioner's sugar, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1 cup cream, whipped.

Press stewed or canned apricots through a sieve and add to mashed banana. Add lemon juice, apricot juice, sugar and salt and mix well. Fold in the whipped cream. Freeze in automatic refrigerator until firm, 10 to 12 servings.

Start Cool!

Perk up those August appetites at the beginning of the meal with a bitter-sweet cocktail.

Lime Punch Jelly

1 pkg. lime flavored gelatin, 1 cup warm water, 1-2 cup canned pineapple juice, 1-2 cup canned Florida grapefruit juice.

Dissolve gelatin in warm water. Add fruit juices and turn gelatin mixture into a shallow pan; chill until firm. Cut in cubes and pile in low cups or cocktail glasses. Garnish with segment of grapefruit and thin slice of fresh lime if desired. 12 cups in shallow bowls of ice to be "extra-cool" and attractive.

Put Some "Ginger" In It!

Put the ginger in your dessert, but take it easy yourself with this quick and easy-to-produce frozen fancy.

Pecan Ginger Pudding

3 tbsps. tapioca, 2 cups milk, scalded, 1-4 teas. salt, 6 tbsps. sugar, 3 tbsps. white corn syrup, 4 tbsps. ginger syrup (from preserved ginger), 2 egg whites, 1 cup heavy cream, whipped, 4 tbsps. pecan meats, 4 tbsps. finely diced preserved ginger.

Add tapioca to scalded milk and cook in double boiler over hot water for 15 minutes, or until tapioca is clear and mixture thickened.

Mix 4 tablespoons of the sugar, with syrup, salt and ginger syrup; stir until sugar is dissolved. When cool, add remaining 2 tablespoons sugar to egg whites and beat until stiff. Fold into cold tapioca mixture. Fold in whipped cream, nuts and ginger. Pour into trays of mechanical refrigerator and stir three times while freezing. Serves six.

Grapefruit-Raspberry Mold

1 pkg. lemon flavored gelatin; 1 cup warm water, 1 cup grapefruit juice and water, 1 grapefruit section free from membrane, and diced, 1 cup fresh raspberries.

Dissolve gelatin in warm water. Add grapefruit juice and water. Chill. When slightly thickened, fold in grapefruit and raspberries. Turn into ring mold. Chill until firm. Unmold on crisp lettuce, garnish with mayonnaise. Serves 6.

Indian Tribesmen to
Appease God's Anger

NISHU, N. D.—Stalwart Hidatsa braves have sworn in solemn tribal council to restore themselves to favor in the eyes of the rain god, Thunderbird, by recovering from the White Fathers the Sacred Skulls of the Two Eagles.

Chief Long Bull recounted how the white man carried off the Sacred Skulls and brought the great "never rain" upon the Hidatsa tribesmen and western North Dakota.

As he spoke, hot winds rattled corn leaves in nearby fields and whirled spirals of dust from the dry plains of the Fort Berthold Agency. Drought has withered this year's crops and the Hidatsas face another winter of privation. "Things were not always so," Long Bull told his councilors—not until 1909, when a faithless keeper sold the skulls to a white trader.
