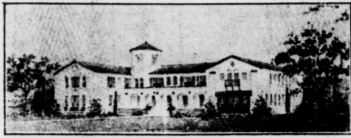

TWO MEN ARRESTED AND JAILED MONDAY.

Two men, living north of London in Menard County, Everett Hubble, about 26, and Mathew Morel, about 62, were arrested Monday by Sheriff Dee Gibbs and Deputy Emesley, about five miles out of Junction on the London road.

They were placed in jail. Hubble made bond Tuesday in the amount of \$500.00, while the other man was still in jail Wednesday in default of a bond for the same amount.

A gallon of liquor and two empty quart bottles were found by the Sheriff about fifty feet from the road, just beyond the M. N. Harrison residence, alleged to have been in possession of the two men before they had come to Junction, they were returning when apprehended.

SEVERAL NEW BUILDINGS ABOUT COMPLETED.

The two concrete buildings west of the State Bank, erected by Messrs. Riley, Holekamp and Denman, will be completed this week and Mr. Denman will occupy the one next to the bank, using it for his insurance and radio business. During the time "Hez" has been assistant cashier of the State Bank he has not been able to devote much time to the radio business which is his hobby, but expects now to change it from a spare time proposition into a real business and the new office is especially equipped with all necessary conveniences and connections and a large aerial over the building. New solid mahogany furniture arrived last week and will be placed at once.

A. L. Bartley's building, just east of the Cavaness Garage, will be ready for occupancy next week. This structure is in three compartments. The one on the west will be occupied by the owner and sometime within the next few days he expects to open a first class barber shop. The fixtures have arrived and are being installed. A large mirror, about 8x10 feet will be along the west wall, behind the chairs. Each chair will have a lavatory of the most modern type. In the rear of the shop will be two bath rooms—one tub bath and one shower bath, and next to these a water toilet. Hot and cold water will be provided for the shop and for the office in the center of the building, which will be occupied by Dr. H. E. Leuhrs. This office will be divided into a lobby and a consultation room. Adjoining the consultation room is a small laboratory and supply room. In this and in the consultation room, hot water will be supplied from the barber shop heating plant.

The compartment on the east will be rented, but no definite arrangements have been made for leasing it yet.

Joe Ramsey, who has the contract for the Frank Wilson building, stated Tuesday morning that he would complete his part of the contract this week, and within a short time the three compartments of this building will be ready for occupancy.

UTILITIES VICE-PRES. IDENT BUYS LARGE DEMONSTRATION FARM

A deal that has been pending for some weeks was closed last week and Mr. George W. Fry, Vice-President and General Manager of the West Texas Utilities Co., which company is now building a high line from Menard to Junction, becomes the owner of the 400-acre farm, known as the G. C. Taylor place one mile east of town, formerly belonging to W. P. Riley.

Since the purchase of the local light plant by his company, Mr. Fry has spent considerable time in inspecting different farms near Junction with a view to establishing a demonstration farm. His selection was the W. P. Riley farm on account of its nearness to town, its location on both the river and the highway, and the particularly desirable soil.

In co-operation with the West Texas Utilities, Mr. Fry plans to establish a demonstration farm that will be a great asset to this entire section of the country, and particularly to Junction and Kimble County.

An electric line will be built to the farm and water for irrigation will be pumped by electricity. In addition to testing and experimenting with all kinds of farm crops, to learn what can and cannot be grown here successfully, what fruits are adapted to this country, etc. Mr. Fry expects to raise some thoroughbred sheep, goats, cattle and polo ponies.

It is likely that the house on west side of the road, in which J. J. McWright is now living, will be moved to a point near the river and that Mr. Fry will build a nice residence near the south side of the farm, at the foot of the hills, and spend a considerable part of his time here. He will have private telephone connections with the many towns in which the company operates utilities and can carry on intimate business relations with his superintendents and managers.

While it is generally recognized that the coming of the West Texas Utilities was a great boon to Junction, it is

BAKERY AND BOOT SHOP TO CHANGE LOCATIONS.

Messrs. J. O. Wright, owner of the local bakery, and E. O. Lowgren, owner of the boot and shoe shop, are soon to move into the Masonic building, being vacated this week by the furniture business here.

The bakery will occupy the west side of the building and the shoe shop the east side. Walter Buck, jeweler and watch maker, who has had his office in the front of the building, will have office space in front of the east side.

While they will have possession of the building from the first of the month, Mr. Wright stated Tuesday that they would not move for two or three weeks. Some changes are to be made on the inside of the building and an up-to-date oven large enough to take care of the rapidly growing bakery business, will be constructed at the rear of the building.

also recognized that this farm, developed as Mr. Fry now plans to do, will mean even more to the town and to the country at large. Not only will it be an economic factor in the Hill Country's development, but will become a show place for visitors and home people alike.

BANDERA WAREHOUSE DIRECTORS RE-ELECTED.

Bandera.—The annual meeting of the Bandera Ranchmen & Farmers' Association was held at the association's warehouse Saturday. More than 50 members were present. Fred Sholman, manager, gave a report of the association's business, after which the following directors were re-elected: W. E. Mansfield, A. D. Kutzers, F. E. Wisenhunt, R. D. Garrison, R. N. Padgett, W. R. Thomason, and Fred Thalman, manager.

The secretary's report shows the association having a surplus of cash on hand of about \$3,000. A 10 per cent dividend was declared the first of the year. During 1925, the association handled 195,000 pounds of mohair and 250,000 pounds of wool. The combined clips of wool and mohair represented a distribution to the growers of about \$200,000 during the past year.

The above article brings to mind the fact that the business men, farmers and ranchmen of Bandera County have been operating a successful wool and mohair selling organization in Bandera for several years.

For several years, occasionally, and recently very frequently, ranchmen have mentioned to The Eagle management, the desirability of a large warehouse at Junction for storing wool and mohair clips. Merchants have also mentioned this matter, and it seems that there are many good reasons why a warehouse here would benefit the producer and we can see no reason why it should not be done. Rocksprings also has one or two such warehouses, and apparently are getting satisfactory results.

Why shouldn't Kimble County concentrate its wool and mohair at home, sell it at home, deposit the money in home banks, and enjoy just as satisfactory selling facilities as can be secured elsewhere?

We would like to know the opinions of representative ranchmen over the county on this question. Tell us what you think of it.

If you are for it, tell us why, and tell us if you would be willing to help finance a warehouse—as others have stated they would.

If you are against it, tell us why. Maybe it might save a step in the wrong direction.

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT IN IRRIGATION POSSIBILITIES.

With the town and county undergoing an unprecedented rate of development, there must necessarily be many who are looking into the future and it must occur to them that there are possibilities far beyond the expectations of the casual observer, when our great water resources are taken into consideration.

With thousands of springs and two large rivers, the irrigation possibilities are only limited to the amount of land that can be reached by water. The volume of the flood waters of the two rivers is enormous. While no information is available as to the amount of acreage that this flood water would irrigate, if provision was made for storing it, until needed, those who have had much experience with irrigation projects state that it would supply more than the land that lies in the valleys on which water could be supplied by gravity.

Irrigation is at once among the oldest and the youngest of our industries. There are evidences that crops were raised by applying water to the land by irrigation as far back as 2,000 B. C., in Assyria, Mesopotamia, Persia, India and China, while remnants of irrigation works are found in Peru, Mexico, Arizona and New Mexico.

Diversion of water was first done by farmers as individuals, however, this plan proved unsatisfactory and expensive, with the result that later co-operative irrigation associations were formed, which later developed into the present quasi-public irrigation districts now so commonly existing in California.

In Texas the principal development of irrigation projects has been in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, around El Paso, in West Texas in Ward, Pecos and Reeves Counties, at Wichita Falls and more recently in Tarrant County, Dallas County and La Salle County.

The purpose of organizing these irrigation projects has been three-fold, viz: irrigation, flood prevention and reclamation. Some of the districts embody more of these elements than others, depending upon physical conditions. There has been wide-spread interest in the last three years in the subject of water conservation, and in 1923, the Legislature appropriated \$600,000 to be used over a period of three years permitting typographical studies of the possibilities of water conservation and irrigation on the streams of Texas. Much valuable information and data has been secured and as a result some of the largest and most important water conservation projects have been initiated, viz: the La Salle County, Tarrant County and Dallas County projects.

Throughout many years the occasional, but torrential rains at the head reaches of Texas streams have gone down and

caused untold losses in the destruction of crops and property at the lower extremes of the Texas streams. This tremendous volume of water serves no useful purpose on the upper reaches of the streams because it flows too rapidly and at the same time has done considerable damage on the lower reaches.

The purpose of water conservation is to build retaining dams at the head reaches of the larger Texas streams and there-in impound for irrigation purposes these storm waters, and thereby irrigate hundreds of thousands of acres otherwise subject to arid or semi-arid climatic conditions.

Here at Junction we have two splendid forks of the Llano River, and a wonderfully fertile valley which could be irrigated by the construction of a dam on the North fork as well as one on the South fork. Water could be released and distributed over the productive valley lands by gravity flow, and would enable the farmer to eliminate from his calculations that factor over which he has no control, viz: water at the proper time. We think our farmers and citizens could well afford to give some thought to this suggestion.

LEE P. PIERSON OUT FOR JUDGESHIP.

Severely criticizing the system of reversing of cases by the higher courts because of technicalities, and taking as his campaign slogan "Swifter Justice and Fewer Technicalities," Lee P. Pierson, of Dallas, one of the leading lawyers of the state has announced his candidacy for a position on the Court of Criminal Appeals, subject to the Democratic primary in 1926. Mr. Pierson, in his statement, said:

"Crime and lawlessness are rampant in our State; life is cheap and property is subject to the highjacker and thief on our highways to such an extent that one hesitates to peaceably drive over them. Delays in meting out justice by constant reversal of cases adds encouragement to the lawless element. I favor swifter justice and fewer technicalities in our administration of the laws of the State and when I am elected Judge of the Criminal Court of Appeals of Texas will lend my services to the State of Texas to the end that life will be safer and property rights rigidly guarded. For example: I will not reverse a case every time the District Attorney sneezes at the defendant at the trial of a highjacker; neither will I reverse a case on the trial of a murderer because the deceased was killed with a 'sucker rod' and hold that the State did not prove that a sucker rod is a deadly weapon. The intent and not the instrument used is only material. The defendant should be given a fair trial, but the citizenship of Texas should be protected from the promiscuous turning loose of criminals on the general public through the technicality route.

"I have always been opposed to the Ku Klux Klan attempting to control the policies of this State. When Democracy was endangered in Texas I was one who came to her assistance and fought for the preservation of a free and untrammelled Democracy. If occasion demands I will do it again."—Dallas News.

INFORMATION ON PECAN DISEASE MADE PUBLIC.

Washington, D. C.—Experiments extending over several years conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture of the rosette of pecan trees have definitely shown that lack of moisture and a deficiency of soil nutriment play an important part in the development of the disease, it was announced, and Texas and Oklahoma are the leading pecan growing states.

The rosette of pecan trees, which in its earliest stages is indicated by wrinkled, yellow-mottled leaves bunched at the end of the branches, more often attacks trees growing on soils deficient in nitrogen and organic matter than those growing under favorable soil conditions, the department said. In orchards affected with rosette the turning under of leguminous crops has proved a highly successful remedy. It is attended by an increased organic-matter content of the soil, which not only furnishes a steady and gradual supply of nitrogen for the trees but improves the physical condition of the soil and increases its moisture holding capacity.

Another remedy prescribed for the disease is the application of large quantities of stable manure which the department advises as giving the quickest results. The natural growth of grass and weeds allowed to decompose on the ground would likely help somewhat. The application of ordinary commercial fertilizers alone apparently does not serve as a remedy for the rosette pecans.

These remedies are applicable also to rosette of apples, the department said.

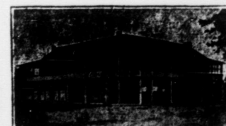

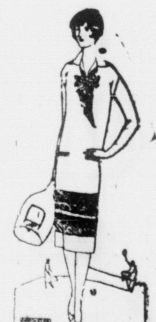

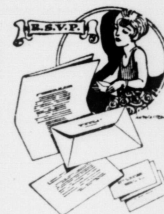

"BIG BUSINESS" AND POLITICS

The time has been when the practical politician who kept on hand a maximum of policy and a minimum of principle found the surest way to get votes was to bait and berate big business.

To be an enemy and denouncer of corporations was sure to get favorable reaction at the ballot box, but that day has passed.

The time is at hand when successful business (having in mind big production), means big business, because competition has made combinations and consolidation necessary, because of reduction of overhead expenses and the ability to sell lower and buy cheaper in large quantities.

Railroad consolidations are the order of the day, and that means not only big business, but the very biggest kind of business.

The constantly increasing number of corporations is due to the fact that the production of those articles and substances which have become necessary to meet the ever increasing needs of a complex civilization requires an amount of capital that individuals cannot command and a measure of risk they cannot afford to take.

The sale of most of the articles in daily use is made by incorporated stores, and the multitude of small stores has given way to a few big stores which carry a variety of articles which in days gone by it took several stores to carry, yet the people are better served.

Such commercial and economic change are not arbitrary nor are they meant to create monopolies. They are responsive to needs which have arisen under changed conditions brought about by the normal yet remarkable progress of what is to all intent and purposes a new country.

Without big business, the seemingly inexhaustible deposits of oil under the soil of Texas would never have been developed, and it would be difficult to compute how much money has been brought into Texas by oil, and how many thousands of her people are supported by that industry.

Suppose Texas had sought to prevent combination of capital in the form of corporations engaged in big business. What would have been the results? The very thought invokes visions of economic disaster.

The sentiment developed against corporations a little more than a century ago arrested railroad building in Texas and except in a small way, it has not been resumed, but indications are now that it will soon be.

The cry "railroad corporations are enemies of the people" is no longer potent to confound with. The newspapers, telephone, the radio, the schoolhouse have robbed it of its power.

The people know that but for railroads vast areas of Texas which are now the abiding places of an energetic, progressive, prosperous citizenship would be feeding grounds for buffalo and longhorns.

They know that railroads can be built only by corporations, and that the banks which supply the money with which their produce is bought are corporations, and the bigger their business, the better people like them, and the more they trust them.

They see no harm in fifty, a hundred, and a hundred and fifty million dollar oil companies, because they have seen them convert thousands of barren spots into fountains of oil and golden wealth, and had their business not been "big" they could not have done what they have.

If they have laid hold on the natural resources of the state, it has been done only to develop and utilize them and make them a blessing and source of prosperity not only to those who own them, but to thousands and millions of individuals.

Every "big business" organization is under the control of the law. No lawful monopolistic combinations will be permitted which would be able to corner production and practice extortion on the public.

The people know that all these things are true and any man who seeks public station through the medium of the popular vote who does not know it, is lagging behind the progressive thought of the day.

"Big business" has far more friends than enemies and if any man appeal to public prejudice against it, his words will return unto him void, and no dancer will respond to that kind of a political piper.—Houston Chronicle.

**SAYING IT IN PLAIN
ENGLISH.**

Total indebtedness of state
and local governments at the
beginning of 1926, amounted to
\$11,630,000,000, an increase of
34 per cent in the past three
years.

After allowing for decrease
in the purchasing power of the
dollar and increase in popula-
tion since 1913, the National In-
dustrial Conference Board finds
that the indebtedness incurred
per capita in the last five years,
is 40 per cent higher than in
1913.

Interest charges on new bonds
issued since 1913, amounted to
more than the average annual
borrowing during the decade
from 1904 to 1913.

"We continue reducing the
National debt," says Frederick
Palmer in the American Legion
Weekly, "and we are again re-
ducing the National taxes. But
extravagant borrowing contin-
ues to increase state, city and
town debts and taxes. When
they are short of money or
need to finance a new project
they float more bonds. Each
project is worth the cost only
if it gives back full value to
the public. Every dollar if in-
terest on any kind of a public

living. The landlord who has
to pay more taxes raises the
rent on your house and on the

All the economy cannot be prac-
ticed by the housewife and the
National government. Look
out for the waste between the
home unit and the national unit.
Make sure that you get value
delivered in the new bridges,
roads and streets, and that no
project is just an opportunity
to sell bonds."—The Manufac-
turer.

The Royal Pirate's Revenge

Ten far famed monumental tower
Records the achievements of the brave,
And Angria's triumphs and power
Who plunder'd on the eastern wave.

IT is a far cry from piracy in the
East Indies to a tower which stands
on Shooter's hill near Woolwich com-
mon in England, but this tower, of
which the poet sings, is the connecting
link in a thrilling pirate story.

After the famous pirate, Angria, sul-
tan of Timor, had been dethroned by
the English and had retired to the is-
land of Ceylon his brother, Angria,
took up the quarrel. He proclaimed
himself sultan of another island, Lit-
tle Timor, and luring recruits from
his brother a pirate, a fast boat with
an armament of 38 guns, set forth to
prey upon the British shipping.
Eighty miles out from Bombay the pi-
rate captured the Elphinstone, and put-
ting the crew of 48 men into one small
boat left them. Then the pirate and his
sun they set out for Bombay, but only
half of them arrived there alive.

Angria decided that any other prize
would do as well as an English ship,
and his next capture was two Chinese
junks, filled with spices and other
valuable. He plundered both and as
an excess of cruelty ordered the crew
bound back to back in pairs and
thrown into the ocean. One of the
Chinamen managed to get hand free
and, pulling out a concealed dagger,
stabbed Angria in the shoulder. The
punishment meted out to him was
such as only a fiend could devise.
Angria ordered the skin cut off the
man's back and then had him beaten
with canes. Then he was lashed to a
raft and thrown overboard for sun to
finish the work. Strange to say, the
Chinaman after three days was picked
up by a fishing boat and carried to
Bombay, where he lived to an old age.

For three years the sultan-pirate
continued his ravages on the eastern
seas, and during that time it is said
that he murdered no less than 500
Englishmen—surely a fulsome revenge
for the wrong—either real or fancied
—suffered by his brother. Then the
British decided that it was time to put
a stop to the activities of this ma-
ruder. Commander Jones of H. M. S.
Asia, a man-of-war carrying 64 guns,
was assigned the task. The Briton
laid siege to his capital city for 12
months, and Angria's subjects, despair-
ing of escape, begged him to surrender.
He refused, and one of a mob which
had gathered before his palace, shot
him as he stood upon a balcony han-
gulating them.

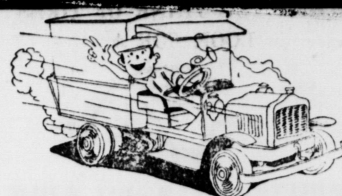
Jones was hailed as a hero upon his

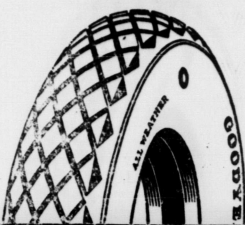
