Fire Damages Three Buildings Here Friday

Damaged estimated at \$20,000 was caused by fire which swept through three brick buildings on Dallas street early Friday afternoon.

The damaged buildings are known as the Hooten buildings, but had recently been purchased by Loo Randals and were occupied by Bills Cafe and Walker Battery and Electric Shop.

Eye witnesses to the fire, said the blaze started from chemicals in the middle building, which housed the battery and electric shop. The blaze was extinguished, then a bucket of gasoline was overturned and flames roared again.

Bill Waldrop, owner and operator of Bills Cafe, said he had no insurance and estimated his loss at between three and four thousand dollars.

If You Haven't Got Ration Book Yet, Just Wait

If the postman hasn't brought your War Ration Book 3 yet, don't be concerned about it, the Office of Price Administration advises citizens.

More than 6,000,000 books are yet to be mailed residents of Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma from the Dallas mailing center. The big mailing job won't be completed for several weeks.

"Please don't writ us if you haven't received your book," one harassed OPA official asked, "Just be patient, you'll get it in plenty of time."

However, OPA asked that books with incorrect names be returned to the Dallas OPA mailing center with a note giving the correct name. Any person who received duplicate books should mail the extra book to the Dallas mailing center.

To date 4,473,353 book have been mailed.

LATE WAR BULLETINS

WASHINGTON, July 3. — Three Japanese cruisers and four destroyers endeavoring to turn their big guns against American Rendova Island positions were driven off by the United States Naval units in sharp engagements early today, the Navy announced.

Size of the American force which met, and repulsed the Japanese force were not disclosed, and no details of the battle were received.

It was reported possible that the United State Warship could have pursued enemy from the immediate area and that the battle may still be underway.

CARIO, July 3 — Nearly 100 American Liberators Bombers attacked three Italian airfields in southern Italy yesterday in the biggest offensive action yet staged by Middle East Command Bombers, dropping over 400,000 pounds of bombs on bases at Lecce, Grottaglie, San Pancrazio. All the targets showed signs of being well covered with bursts. Swarms of German and Italian fighters rose to challenge the bombers. Twelve Axis planes were reported down and three American aircraft reported lost.

Northwest Africa Air Force Bombers made pre-dawn attacks on Palermo, Sicily; Cagliari, Sardinia, yesterday, which were followed by other bombers which blasted Castelvetrano airfield in western Sicily. No Allied bombers were lost according to dispatches.

LONDON, July 3 — A great convoy recently crossed the Atlantic under shore to shore cover of land, and carrier based planes, was officially announced. One submarine was destroyed and another probably sunk. This is said to constitute one of the latest victory in battle of Atlantic.

ALGIERS, July 3 — It is reported upon reliable sources that General Giraud is enroute to the United States.

STOCKHOLM, July 3 — The Goeteborg newspaper, "Handels-Och Sjoefartstidning," has quoted from reliable sources, that Reich Air Marshal, Goering is seriously ill.

July Tire Quotas Are Given For Area

Only slight variation from the June figures was shown by July tire quotas of the Lubbock 71-county OPA district which were announced Tuesday.

The grade 1 passenger car quota for July will be 11,528, while that for June was 9,591 and the grade 3 quota will be 3,207, while that for June was 4,858. The truck tire quota for July will be 5,722 and that for June was 5,740.

An amendment which will become effective Thursday will reduce the number of motorist eligible for grade 3, used and recapped, tire. Probably for 90 days only those "A" book holders who use their cars for occupational purposes will be eligible for tire certificates from county war price and rationing boards. The amendment was passed because of the shortage of supplies of used and recapped tires in serviceable condition. Under present regulations any driver with a mileage ration of 240 miles or less a month is eligible for a tire certificate, within county quotas.

Youths Invited To SPAAF Sunday

SOUTH PLAINS ARMY AIR FIELD, July 1. (Spl.) — West Texas youths of 17 and 18 years old will be guests of South Plains Army Air Field and Lubbock Army Air Field Sunday as Uncle Sam throws open the doors for a day to these young men.

According to plans announced by Army officials, the men will meet at the Hotel Lubbock at 1 p. m., where Army trucks will meet them and furnish transportation. All youths of that age are urged to attend the program. Groups attending should notify the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce by mail or phone in advance.

They will first be taken to LAAP where they will be shown over the field during the afternoon.

At 6 p. m., they will be taken across town to SPAAF to witness a program which will be climaxed that night with a big incendiary demonstration at 9 p. m.

The young men will be given an opportunity to visit on the flying line, watching routine training activities in the big gliders and two-engined towplanes. The program is being arranged with the co-operation of the West Texas Recruiting and Induction center.

An exhibition of sub-machine-guns and other weapons on the range will precede the display of incendiaries. The display will include artillery shells and tracers, the British "calling cards," the "incendiary pencil," used by the Germans in the first World War, thermite grenades and white phosphorus bursts.

Major David L. Hopkins, air inspector, will be in charge of the program at SPAAF. Music will be furnished by the field band under the direction of Warrant Officer Harry Dunham.

HOME - CANNED FRUIT JUICES WILL ADD VARIETY TO DIET

For variety—and to save food coupons next winter—home economists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture are suggesting home-canned fruit juices. Those softer fruits which the homemaker must discard in whole fruit canning will give excellent juice provided they are free from bruises and decay and not overripe.

You may use rhubarb, berries, cherries, currants, plums, cranberries, or grapes, preferably locally grown since freshness is important. To preserve the fruity taste, juice for beverages should be extracted from the raw or slightly heated fruit. Apples and peaches do not give up their juices readily when raw or slightly heated and are not recommended. Citrus juices are hard to put up at home and take a good deal of sugar.

To can fruit juice for beverages wash fruit but do not soak it. Remove any pits and crush the fruit. Heat it gently to 170 degrees F. (below simmering) until soft. Strain it through a cloth bag, and if you wish, add sugar. One-half to one cup of sugar per gallon of juice is sufficient, but sugar is not necessary for the preservation of juice. Heat the strained juice to 170 degrees F and then pour into hot jars or bottles, leaving 1-8 inch head space. Completely seal at once crown cap bottles or jar closures

with rubber "made on." Process in a boiling water bath for five minutes.

Here's a quick review of home food preservation "musts":

1. Be sure jars or bottles have no nicks or cracks.

2. Be sure caps for jars or bottles will provide an airtight seal. Crown caps with shiny brown paper facing, sealed with a capping device, are recommended.

3. Boil bottles or jars, and jar caps without rubber, to sterilize them. Dip bottle caps and jar caps with rubber "made on" into boiling water quickly just before using.

4. Be sure fruit is not overripe. Remember, one spot of rot can spoil the whole batch.

5. Do not hold fruit too long before canning. Keep it cool and well ventilated until you begin preparation. Wash the fruit well but don't soak it.

6. To pack freshness and hold onto nutritive values, canning must be done quickly. Prepare fruit in small batches to reduce canning time.

7. Observe directions, times, and temperatures in canning procedure.

8. Fill jars quickly, seal tightly, cool in air.

9. Store in cool, dry place away from light. Temperatures above freezing but not over 60 degrees F. are important to the preservation of food.

Withholding Tax Comes Out Of Pay Starting July 1

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—After tonight, Uncle Sam will take a personal interest in your pay check. A chunk of it you'll never see comes out at the source for incomes taxes.

Under the new system devised by Congress to keep people as nearly abreast of their annual taxes as possible, officials estimated that employers will deduct about \$500,000,000 a month from the pay envelopes of their employees.

Exemption Are Given

The check off will be at the rate of 20 per cent of all earnings over personal exemptions, which are \$12 a week for single persons, \$24 a week for married persons and \$6 additional per week for dependents.

The tax starts with the first payroll period after today, however, millions of wage earners will not be affected until later this month. For instance, persons paid by the calendar week, won't start missing the withholding tax until next week because the current week started before July 1 — effective date of the pay-as-you-go legislation.

Victory Tax Included

The new system includes both victory and income taxes.

Official regulations released today authorizes employers, in fig-

uring the deduction, to disregard the odd cents on paychecks. Thus, a \$35.27 check can be counted as \$35.20 for convenience in applying the deduction formula.

The treasury also told bosses to skip the withholding angles on expense account payments to employees, but advised them to count in any pay other than money which customarily is part of the remuneration. Thus, if an employe is paid \$25 a week and furnished meals, the meals are also subject to the tax.

Bonuses Subject To Act

Vacation pay, pensions, as well as bonuses, also are subject to the act. Exempted from the withholding system are servicemen, domestic servants, clergymen, and farm labor.

On Sept. 15 every single person earning at the rate of \$2,700 a year or married person paid at the rate of \$3,500 a year, will have to file a "declaration" — something like an annual income tax return. He will figure out whether his paycheck deductions are keeping him up to date with the treasury. If not, he'll have to pay the difference on a quarterly basis. A similar declaration, together with an annual return, will have to be filed on March 15 of next year and every year thereafter.

Point Values On Foods Increased

WASHINGTON, July 2. (AP) — Rationing news was nearly all bad today. Higher point values were announced for beef, some cuts of veal, lamb and mutton, canned fish, catsup chile-sauce, four vegetables and five fruits.

The few reductions that were made included canned green beans, tomato paste, small sizes of juices, margarine and cream cheese.

The changes are effective Sunday.

Increases of 1 to 2 points were ordered for all beef cuts including hamburger, veal and lamb chops and veal and lamb legs.

May Be Lowered

While changes in ration values are usually announced at the end of the month, a spectacular increase in the meat supply might permit lowered points before August, OPA men said.

Pork supplies while down also are almost double those of beef

Farmers Have Assistance of FDA In Marketing

Assurance that the Texas farmers will have assistance in marketing their production of vital crops was seen in an announcement today by E. L. Upshaw, State Marketing Supervisor for the USDA War Board.

When a commodity cannot be readily disposed of without assistance, the State USDA War Board in cooperation with the Food Distribution Administration will make

and the OPA is "encouraging consumption" by raising the point "prices" of other meats.

Point values of canned fish were boosted 50 per cent. The jump is necessary, OPA said, because demand has been so high that supplies are being used up too rapidly.

Here are the major changes over last month's ration tables:

Beef—Up 1 point in all cuts except standing 7-inch and 10-inch blade ribs which are up 2 points.

Veal — Up 1 point in loin, rib chops, and leg roasts; round steak up 2 points.

Lamb and mutton — Up 1 point in loin chops, leg chops, and steaks, leg and sirloin roasts.

Pork — Unchanged except fat meats used as a substitute for lard which are down 1 point.

Lard and margarine — Down 1 point.

Processed butter — (A new item sold mainly in the south) set at 4 points a pound.

Cheese — Group I and group II, such as cream cheese, swiss, edam, cottage, etc — down 1 point. Cheddar remains unchanged.

Canned fish — Up 4 points a pound, including tuna, sardines, salmon, shrimp. Oysters up 2 points.

Vegetables

Vegetables — (No. 2 can) lima beans, up 1 point; whole kernel corn, up 1 point, other corn, up 2 points; peas, and tomatoes, up 2 points; tomato catsup and chili sauce (pint size), up 7 points. Down are fresh shelled beans (8 points), green and wax beans (3 points) and certain of tomato paste, puree and sauces.

(Fruits — (No. 2 cans) apples, up 2; apricots, and fruit cocktail, up 4; peaches and pears (No. 2 1-2 can) up 2.

Vegetable and fruit juices in the 7-10 ounce sizes were cut in half to 1 point a can. Pineapple juice is excepted.

every effort to help move the commodity into regular channels at a fair price, Upshaw assured growers and grower groups. Failing in this, the commodity will then be assembled by the County USDA War Boards and purchased by the Food Distribution Administration.

As an example of the way this program will work, Upshaw cited several recent instances in the state in which it has been necessary to assist farmers in moving their crops.

Green beans have been diverted to processors, carrots have been purchased and dehydrated for Lend-Lease shipment and future use, and potatoes have been moved into regular commercial channels. These commodities came off at a time when regular local marketing channels were glutted, and the War Boards cooperating with the Food

Distribution Administration had to assist the farmers in finding additional outlets.

L. J. Cappleman, regional administrator of FDA, has assured the War Board that purchases will be made when and where necessary to assure farmers a fair return for their production. Assurance also was given that food will not be wasted. Some will be diverted into processing channels and the remainder used by state institutions or directed through various outlets available to the FDA.

In outlining this program, Cappleman emphasized the part to be played by the County War Boards. Their responsibility is keeping a close watch on marketing conditions and making advance surveys to determine the necessity for the program. In case it becomes necessary for FDA to make purchases,

WASHINGTON (AP) — War traffic demands have led the Canadian National Railroad to add "coffee shop" cars. The kitchen and pantry are in the middle of the car, with space for 20 diners at east end.

Vegetables are cooked with steam from the locomotive. The cars, described in the Commerce Department's publication "Foreign Commerce," are said to serve patrons faster than regular dining cars.

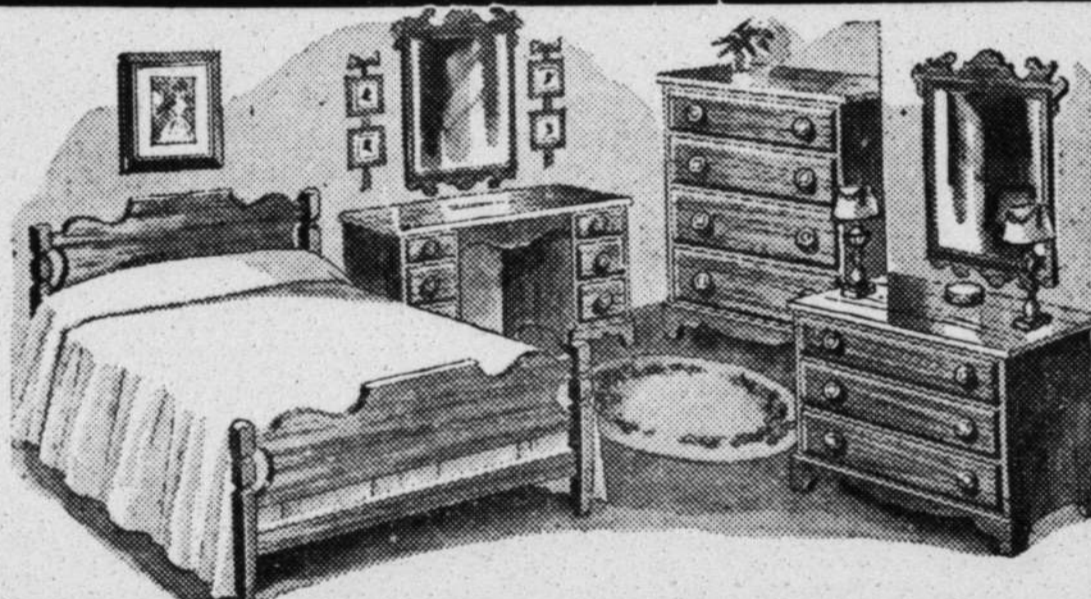

COLONEL SHOWS SIGNS OF HOSPITALITY

INDEPENDENCE, Kas. (AP) — What would you do if you were scheduled to head the receiving line at a formal military reception opening an officers' club and your voice suddenly disappeared, because of laryngitis? Col. Richard N. Montgomery, commanding officer at the Independence airfield, solved it neatly. He had some appropriate signs printed and when the guests arrived he was at the door with a smile. Around his neck were the signs, attached by strings, and he pointed to an appropriate one as each guest arrived. Said the signs: "My voice has gone A. W. O. L." "Good Evening." "Delighted." "Glad to see you." "Your slip is showing."

Regardless of whether the folks are well-liked in the community. This same type of assistance must be given to starved and impoverished nations at the end of the war, whether they are on "our side" or lined up with the Axis, believes Jennie Camp, specialist in home production planning for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

In a recent talk to several hundred home demonstration club women Miss Camp pictured the near-starvation existence of people in Axis-held territories. In April, 1942, the Society of Friends reported that the French rations allowed by the Germans totaled 116 calories per day. About 1250 calories per day are required for a man to exist over a protracted period, and 2500 to 3000 daily are required for a man to live at normal activity, she explains.

"Establishing an enlightened world policy with reference to food will mean that we will plan and produce the food needed for a good diet for everybody in the world," Miss Camp says. "If the United States is to overcome its dietary deficiencies, we will have to produce and consume 10 to 20 per cent more milk, 10 to 25 per cent more butter, 25 to 70 per cent more citrus and tomatoes, 100 per cent more green and yellow vegetables than were produced and consumed in the late 1930's."

She urged the club women to keep informed and help their neighbors keep informed on the food situation and the need for increased production, to abide patriotically by the rationing programs, to continue their efforts toward maximum production and save all they produce, to support sound legislation affecting food, and to promote educational activities on the intelligent use of food.

Peanuts Assured Ready Market

A ready market for peanuts when they are harvested was assured Texas farmers this week by the state USDA war board.

Facilities of the peanut shellers and crushers throughout the state will be utilized from the very beginning of the marketing season in order to move the maximum quantity of the peanut crop directly into food and feed channels, the board emphasized.

Under this year's agricultural production program, Texas farmers have pledged 1,297,935 acres as their share of the national peanut goal. Last year's production approximated 1,060,000 acres.

The normal channels of trade, which will operate under contract with Commodity Credit Corporation, are being asked to cooperate under the purchase program. Each company will purchase, store and sell for the account of the Corporation.

Purchases from producers will be made at uniform prices averaging \$140 per ton for Spanish No. 1 peanuts, with appropriate differentials for grades. This price, the war board pointed out, is approximately 17 per cent below the ceiling prices for farmers' stock peanuts but about 75 per cent above the value of peanuts when sold for crushing for oil and meal.

In addition to disposition of this year's crop into food and feed channels, producer cooperative associations, as agents for the Corporation, also will be authorized to establish receiving points and make available storage facilities for handling the portion of the crop which is not purchased directly by processors and to distribute peanuts for planting the 1944 crop.

Restrictions on purchases, sales and deliveries will not apply to farmers' stock peanuts which county AAA committees certify are to be

Indian And Chinese Are Friends In Khaki

CAMP POLK, La. (AP)—Among the most curious "khaki kinships" around here is that of a full-blooded American Indian and a native Chinese.

Corporal Fred Drapeau, South Dakota Sioux, and Private Hom Gim, born in Hong Kong, are steady buddies, members of the same eight-man team on a mobile artillery piece, and live in the same barracks.

Drapeau, whose home was in Greenwood, S. D., was formerly a ranch hand. His pal was a New Orleans laundryman, but now cleans nothing more fragile than cannon barrels.
