

Fourth War Loan Drive Announced

Fourth war loan drive, with a goal of \$14,000,000, will be in progress until January 15, Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau announced. The previous drives have raised \$50,000,000 and \$50,000,000.

The Treasury said state war loan committees have been organized and expanded, and that volunteer salesmen will be sent to every home and plant throughout the nation.

Emphasis will be placed on the \$5,000,000 quota for January 10 to February 1. Sales to individuals will be encouraged. Sales to non-banking investors will be encouraged in the reports beginning February 1.

Morgenthau explained that this drive will not preclude the sale of subscriptions from banking investors at any time. Series 3, F and G Savings Bonds, 2 1/2 per cent, 1943-44, 2 1/2 per cent, 1944-45, and 2 1/2 per cent, 1945-46, and seven per cent certificates of indebtedness.

Commercial banks will be allowed to make a limited investment of time deposits in the 2 1/4 to 2 1/2 per cent bonds. A plan will be announced later. Banks were not permitted to subscribe in the last drive, although they participated in the first two. The first war loan drive in December, 1942, with a goal of \$9,000,000 raised \$12,947,000. The second, in April, 1943, with a goal of \$10,000,000, raised \$18,555,000. The third, in September, 1943, with a goal of \$15,000,000, raised \$18,943,000.

One Inch Of Rain Reported Over County Friday

Approximately one inch of moisture fell over the county in snow and rain last Thursday and Friday, according to Jack Martin, Soil Conservation Service Technician, assisting the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District. The rain gauge at Bud Stevens, near Graham Chapel, registered .98 of an inch. The one at Sam Lewis' near Pleasant Valley registered 1.15 inches. The gauge at C. P. Witt's near Calgary registered .85 of an inch and Lee Reed at Justiceburg reported that his gauge registered 1.20 inches. The Double U gauge here at Post registered 1.68 inches. At the time of writing no report had been received from the gauge at Bill Normans, six miles north and west of Post.

Since the soil was very dry and the snow and rain fell very slow, practically all of the moisture was absorbed by the soil where it fell, and there was little or no runoff. This moisture will go toward making a "bottom season" for next year if it can be held in the soil.

"The idea now is to prevent the loss of this moisture through evaporation," said Jack Martin. "Bedding the land now will increase evaporation by exposing a third more soil surface to the wind and sun. A good cover of stubble, left on the surface of the ground is the cheapest and most practical method of reducing evaporation."

Quotas On Farm Machinery Set For This County

Julius C. Fumagalli, Chairman of the Garza County Farm Rationing Committee announces the 1944 quotas on some types of machinery, as listed below:

20 tractors with planter attachments; 2 grain drills, 1 manure spreader; 7 combines (all sizes); 13 corn blenders; 4 mowers, (all types); 2 rakes, side delivery; 43 tractors, wheel type.

These quotas were effective December 1, 1943 and any certificate for purchase of any of the above types of machinery cannot be renewed.

Some types of machinery have been released at it is not necessary to secure a purchase certificate. Any farmer needing new equipment is requested to contact the dealers before requesting purchase certificates.

Ration Points To Be Given For Salvage Fats

Housewives will be given two meat ration points for every pound of waste kitchen fats turned in to the Salvage Fat collection centers, according to a measure authorized by the Office of Price Administration. This measure is being inaugurated in an attempt to double the collection of kitchen fats.

The system will go into effect on December 13.

Brown stamps collected by retailers from War Ration Book 3 will be used initially in the exchange. Later, ration tokens will be employed.

Service Buttons Are Being Distributed By War Department

Plastic gold-coated lapel buttons for wear on civilian clothing, to signify honorable military service on and after the declaration of a period of national emergency, September 8, 1939, are being distributed to issuing agencies throughout the country, the War Department has reported. The insignia on the button is an eagle with a circle, the wings extending beyond the circle's edge. Persons whose army service has been terminated under honorable discharge will be permitted to wear the insignia.

Cottonseed Cake And Meal Now Being Rationed

A telegram was received Monday by the ACA office according to James A. Boyd, AAA Secretary, which is quoted in part as follows:

"Effective immediately no person in your county shall deliver cottonseed meal or cake to any other person except on certificate provided for in Food Production Order Number 9. Such certificate to be approved by County Committee and certificate to indicate quantity of cottonseed meal or cake to be delivered. The endorsement and specification of the amount of cotton seed meal or cake on the certificate does not constitute a commitment by the County Committee that the meal or cake will be available. The responsibility of locating the meal or cake rests solely with the applicant."

Any feeder needing cottonseed cake or meal should call at the AAA office and apply for the above described certificate.

November 1 Cotton Report Over This Area Released

Garza county ginnings prior to November 1 stood at 6,779 bales, according to a report released through the Bureau of Census, Department of Commerce. Ginnings on November 4 as reported from seven gins in the county were 7,168. This figure has been well surpassed at this date however and an official estimate by ginnings will run into the 10,000 figures.

Funeral rites for one of the county's most loved pioneer women, Mrs. Elizabeth Belle Maxey, were held Wednesday afternoon from the Graham Church of Christ at 3:00 o'clock with hundreds of friends in attendance to pay tribute. Mrs. Maxey, wife of J. F. Maxey, died at her home in that community about 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, November 30. She had been in ill health and suffered a stroke early last week and her condition had been critical since that time.

Fred Custis, former minister of the Church of Christ of Post, and now of Santa Fe, New Mexico, preached the sermon. He was assisted by Guy Woods of Lubbock, S. D. Lofton of Graham and Ford Shropshire of the Post church. Special vocal numbers were given during the service.

Mrs. Maxey was born on Jan. 13, 1866 at Titus, Texas. She was married in 1889 and lived in Jack county until 1900, going from there to Greer, Oklahoma, before coming to Garza county in 1903. The Maxeys settled on Moares Draw and later farmed the C. W. Justice land where the second postoffice of the county was established. From there the family moved to their present home in Graham community. They had lived in this county for forty years and have played a prominent part in the development of churches, schools and other organizations that have made for the betterment of the county.

Interwoven with the name of Mrs. Maxey is a vivid picture of the history of this county. The pioneer woman was a wonderful helpmate. Embodied in her life were all the characteristics of the true pioneer woman. Her home was always the center of activities in the community and she was called "friend" by everyone. She and her husband organized the first church of the Graham community and also assisted in the organization of the church in Post.

Eleven children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Maxey, two of whom died in infancy. Surviving children are: Mrs. Pearl Graham, Mrs. Gladys Floyd, Bryan Maxey, Mrs. Ruth Holland and Quannah Maxey all of Post, Mrs. Ona Berdine of Weatherford, J. Frost Maxey of Fort Worth, Mrs. Minnie Overton of Thorpe Springs, and Mrs. Tex Olds Howard of Midland.

Twenty-five grandchildren, four adopted grandchildren, and six great grandchildren and four sisters also survive. Honorary pall bearers were all the old timers. PREVIEW

During the past few months, the forces of inflation have given a preview of the way American freedom can be destroyed from within. Rising prices led to inexorable pressure from organized labor for higher wages in coal industry. The coal industry, as a private enterprise, could not meet the demands of the miners even if it had wished to. It was bound by the same government "hold the line" orders that bound the miners. But the miners defied government orders by striking, and compelled government seizure of the properties of the coal mine owners, after which it was forced to accede to the miners' wage demands. Thus, at a stroke, property rights, and the authority of representative government, both of which are essential to liberty, were trampled underfoot before the flood of inflation.

The object lesson is inescapable.

One thing the matter with the country is that we have so many Democratic Senators and Republican Senators and so few United States Senators.

Only a heel would cheat at the wheel—observe the war-time speed limit.

Scurry County Times— If you talk to any county ranchman or livestock owner, you will be thoroughly convinced that Scurry County must have a considerable amount of protein feed shipments here through the winter if livestock owners keep their stock until next spring.

Scurry and a number of counties in this area, have rightfully been placed in the state's feed shortage area in order that shipments of protein feeds can be made to the county. Unless relief of some type for the acute feed shortage is provided soon, you will see many more thin and underfed livestock shipped out to market centers—livestock that should be kept right here within the county's borders. Once we oversell livestock, buying back and getting back to normal herd ownership will be painful and slow, as veteran livestock men can well testify.

Slaton Slatonite— Mrs. J. H. Brewer gave me a clipping last week about a newspaper man who advertised for a printer and offered free lunch, no heavy lifting and two blondes to serve the lunch. The advertiser received only two replies. What I would like to know is where the publisher hoped to find the two blondes, with the war industries, public service companies and meat markets hiring every woman who has strength enough to lift a powder puff to her nose.

Lynn County News— The people of Lynn County have many things for which to be thankful at this thanksgiving time, although the world is torn with strife and war and nearly every home has some one or more members away from home with the Armed Forces.

IS DEBT HARMLESS?

A leading exponent of the public-debt-without-limit philosophy reiterates that, "If the national debt is all internal, as ours is, the nation can hardly go bankrupt."

This philosophy will require more and more explaining as time goes on. People whose earnings and savings are reeling under the double impact of taxes and inflation are going to ask some questions that will be hard to answer. Not being accomplished economists, they will inquire why, if the size of the debt is unimportant, should they be asked to pay heavier taxes as the debt increases? And why, if it is merely a matter of owing the debt to ourselves, should the tax collector be so merciless in collecting to the last penny?

The "owe ourselves" theorists have always claimed that as the debt grew, the affairs of the country could be so arranged that the debt would actually be beneficial. They call it a managed economy. Today we have a huge and growing debt plus a managed economy more complete than the believers in harmless debt ever dared hope for. We also have confederate taxation, uncontrolled strikes, rising prices, and shortages of everything from shoe laces to locomotives. The people are nearly convinced that the managed economy is a flop, and they are beginning to wonder just how harmless is debt. At any rate, they are demanding that government economize wherever possible; that is something tangible which they can understand.

The people in their collective wisdom may save the nation.

New Gas Coupons To Simplify Ration Plan For Garza Motorists

Effective yesterday, December 1, a simplified rationing program for Garza and all other counties will result in B and C gasoline coupons being worth five gallons each, instead of the current two gallons.

So announce the district Office of Price Administration, Lubbock, which points out simplification of coupons will mean fewer coupons for each county motorist.

Also beginning on December 1 new supplemental gasoline ration coupons of five gallons value will be issued with the designation B-2, C-2, and as present B, C, D-1 and C-1 coupons expire they will be replaced by the higher unit value stamps.

While the change will not mean more gasoline for Garza county motorists, it will mean rations will be received in much more convenient form. Consumers will have fewer coupons to endorse and purchase of five-gallon lots will mean fewer stops at service stations.

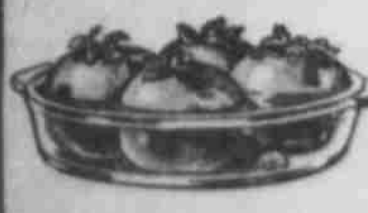

We have good quarters, good food and the finest clothing in the world. The only fly in the ointment is our mail. It is getting to us slower and slower and will be that way all winter. I haven't heard from you in many days now."

Merl is a Master Sergeant with the ground forces of the Army Air Corps and was stationed at Pyote Field before going to Alaska. The parents have not heard from him for sometime until they received these two letters.

Arrives Safely In England

S/Sgt. John M. Graham has sent word to his mother, Mrs. Nellie Rodgers, and his wife, Mrs. Alma Rose Graham, that he has arrived safely in England. He says that England is more beautiful than he ever dreamed but there is nothing like the "Good Old U. S." Improved Uniform International LESSON

THE SIN OF COVETOUSNESS

LESSON TEXT—Exodus 20:17; Luke 12:15-21.
GOLDEN TEXT—Thou shalt not covet . . . anything that is thy neighbor's.—Exodus 20:17.

The Ten Commandments (the last one of which we study today) are characterized by their brevity, their comprehensive touch with all of life, and fidelity to the right. But they are also unique and different from all other laws in that they reach into the inner recesses of a man's heart, a realm where only God can judge and act.

This last commandment (against covetousness) emphasizes that point, for it does not expressly require or forbid any act, but deals with the motive of man's action. Man can judge another man's acts, but he cannot judge his motives, desires, or thoughts. God must do that.

But man can, by the grace of God, control his motives; and hence we have this commandment and its interpretation.

I. The Sin—Covetousness (Ex. 20:17).

It may be a surprise to many to learn that coveting—or desiring what belongs to another—is a sin. It has become one of the "respectable sins" accepted in the best circles and practiced by many church people.

As a matter of fact, this sin underlies all the other sins against which the commandments speak. He who has a love for money and an evil desire to have his neighbor's possessions will hate, lie, steal, cheat, kill, in fact, as Dr. Morgan says, "The whole realm of human interrelations is disorganized and broken up by the dishonoring of the tenth commandment."

If you have become a lover of money, or one who longs to have what your friends own, beware. You are in real danger.

II. The Result—A Ruined Life (Luke 12:13-21).

To have such a spirit makes a man greedy (v. 13), callous and selfish (vv. 17-19), and foolish (v. 20), both regarding this life and that which is to come.

The yardstick of success in the world—for an individual, an organization, or a nation; yes, even for many a church—is the possession of wealth, or property, or other "things." Write it in large letters on the hearts and minds of our boys and girls. "A man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth" (v. 13).

The one who was known to his friends (and to himself) as "a rich man" (v. 16), but whom God knew as a "fool" (v. 20), had more than he could use for himself. He had to build new and bigger barns, and could not see the "barns" that were already prepared, for, as Ambrose says, "Thou hast barns—the bosoms of the needy, the houses of widows, the mouths of orphans and infants."

He was a fool who loved money for himself. One wonders what he had to say for himself when that very night he was called into the presence of God to give an account of his stewardship (v. 20). If you are similarly situated and have the same attitude, what will you say in that day?

An important point which we must note is that Jesus expressly repudiated the connecting of His name with the so-called "social gospel" in His reply (v. 14).

III. The Cure—Trust in God (Luke 12:22-25).

Because covetousness destroys the best in life, we ought to shun it like poison. The best antidote (or cure) if we have been poisoned by it is to go all-out in our trust and confidence in God.

We who are children of God are to take no anxious thought for the morrow. This does not forbid proper preparation and forethought, but it does rule out fretful anxiety. The reasons are very clear and cogent.

First of all, while food and clothing are important, they are not of first importance. The vital thing is that one have life. Otherwise things are useless (v. 23). We must keep our sense of proportion, of relative values.

Then too, God is the One who must care for every one of us. And He does care for us! Why not trust Him? He cares for all creation; can He not care for you? If then you trust the all-powerful One, what occasion is there for worry, or covetousness?

And finally comes the devastating argument. Worry never accomplished anything. Anxiety does not help anyone, anytime, anywhere. So why be anxious?

It is clear then that a desire for that which belongs to others is a sin which destroys man's happiness and usefulness. It is needless—as is all anxiety—because only God can provide, and He will provide if we trust Him.

Life becomes simple, pleasant, useful, confident, yes, really Christian, when we get our eyes off things and on the Lord.

THE SIN OF COVETOUSNESS

LESSON TEXT—Exodus 20:17; Luke 12:15.
GOLDEN TEXT—Thou shalt not covet anything that is thy neighbor's.—Exodus 20:17.

The Ten Commandments (the last one of which we study today) are characterized by their brevity, their comprehensive touch with all of life, and fidelity to the right. But they are also unique and different from all other laws in that they reach into the inner recesses of a man's heart, a realm where only God can judge and act.

This last commandment (against covetousness) emphasizes that point, for it does not expressly require or forbid any act, but deals with the motive of man's action. Man can judge another man's acts, but he cannot judge his motives, desires, or thoughts. God must do that.

But man can, by the grace of God, control his motives; and hence we have this commandment and its interpretation.

I. The Sin—Covetousness (Ex. 20:17).

It may be a surprise to many to learn that coveting—or desiring what belongs to another—is a sin. It has become one of the "respectable sins" accepted in the best circles and practiced by many church people.

As a matter of fact, this sin underlies all the other sins against which the commandments speak. He who has a love for money and an evil desire to have his neighbor's possessions will hate, lie, steal, cheat, kill, in fact, as Dr. Morgan says, "The whole realm of human interrelations is disorganized and broken up by the dishonoring of the tenth commandment."

If you have become a lover of money, or one who longs to have what your friends own, beware. You are in real danger.

II. The Result — A Ruined Life (Luke 12:13-21).

To have such a spirit makes a man greedy (v. 13), callous and selfish (vv. 17-19), and foolish (v. 20), both regarding this life and that which is to come.

The yardstick of success in the world—for an individual, an organization, or a nation; yes, even for many a church—is the possession of wealth, or property, or other "things." Write it in large letters on the hearts and minds of our boys and girls, "A man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth" (v. 13).

The one who was known to his friends (and to himself) as "a rich man" (v. 16), but whom God knew as a "fool" (v. 20), had more than he could use for himself. He had to build new and bigger barns, and could not see the "barns" that were already prepared, for, as Ambrose says, "Thou hast barns—the bosoms of the needy, the houses of widows, the mouths of orphans and infants."

He was a fool who loved money for himself. One wonders what he had to say for himself when that very night he was called into the presence of God to give an account of his stewardship (v. 20). If you are similarly situated and have the same attitude, what will you say in that day?

An important point which we must note is that Jesus expressly repudiated the connecting of His name with the so-called "social gospel" in His reply (v. 14).

III. The Cure—Trust in God (Luke 12:22-25).

Because covetousness destroys the best in life, we ought to shun it like poison. The best antidote (or cure) if we have been poisoned by it is to go all-out in our trust and confidence in God.

We who are children of God are to take no anxious thought for the morrow. This does not forbid proper preparation and forethought, but it does rule out fretful anxiety. The reasons are very clear and cogent.

First of all, while food and clothing are important, they are not of first importance. The vital thing is that one have life. Otherwise things are useless (v. 23). We must keep our sense of proportion, of relative values.

Then too, God is the One who must care for every one of us. And He does care for us! Why not trust Him? He cares for all creation; can He not care for you? If then you trust the all-powerful One, what occasion is there for worry, or covetousness?

And finally comes the devastating argument. Worry never accomplished anything. Anxiety does not help anyone, anytime, anywhere. So why be anxious?

It is clear then that a desire for that which belongs to others is a sin which destroys man's happiness and usefulness. It is needless—as is all anxiety—because only God can provide, and He will provide if we trust Him.

Life becomes simple, pleasant, useful, confident, yes, really Christian, when we get our eyes off things and on the Lord.

For several years the trend has been toward liberal education with too little emphasis on the fundamentals. Now the pendulum is again swinging toward the '3-R's'."

Quoting an army officer, Mr. Robinson said that mathematics especially should be stressed more in the curriculum. The child attending our school of the future will be taught more of the things he actually needs in every day living.

Mr. Robinson's highly instructive talk was much appreciated and the general discussion in which Mr. Robinson answered questions was very interesting. It is hoped we may hear this able speaker again on current school problems.

Owner Of Garza Theatre Dies In California Nov. 24

Funeral services for R. E. Griffith, owner of the Garza theatre, and other theatres in Texas, New Mexico and Arizona were held in Oklahoma City on Monday afternoon. Griffith died at his Beverly Hills hotel on last Wednesday from a second heart attack suffered within a week. He was 50 years old.

Griffith was staying in Beverly Hills while supervising the remodeling of Ciro's swanky supper club which he purchased recently and planned to reopen during the Christmas holidays. His younger brother, H. J. Griffith of Kansas City, was with him at the time of his death.

R. E. Griffith was known to thousands of friends, had rallied from the first attack and on Tuesday was joking with a group of film executives from New York who had gone to California to go hunting with him. His death came suddenly.

Eldest of three aggressive brothers, all of whom have already made their mark in the theatre business, R. E. Griffith and another brother, L. C. of Oklahoma City, were film salesmen in the Dallas trade territory some three decades ago. They opened their first theatres in San Marcos, Texas, and from that small beginning grew a vast theatrical enterprise of some 300 theatres in the south-west and middle-west. Some years ago the brothers split up their operations into three groups. R. E. Stayed in Dallas; L. C. in Oklahoma City, and H. J. in Kansas City.

Of late years Griffith interested himself in resort hotels in the far west. His investment in the El Rancho at Gallup, New Mexico and the Last Frontier at Las Vegas, Nevada, both of which he erected, ran into the millions.

He was a benefactor of many worthy causes and had many civic interests in Texas.

All theatres throughout the circuit closed in respect for the beloved man.

Jungle Fighting

(WNU Feature—Through special arrangement with Collier's Weekly)

We could have taken Munda airport in a single day by frontal assault, as we had taken Henderson Field on Guadalcanal. The Japs would have scattered into the jungle. But that would have meant another Guadalcanal, another six months of jungle fighting. So we came in behind the Japs to herd them down onto the open airfield and finish them there swiftly, in a blitz.

The beginning was jungle. The jungle of New Georgia is so thick it seems like an animal crouched silently against the earth waiting to kill you.

It is very quiet inside the jungle. Not many animals live in it. They can't see to kill or to run away from being killed and they choose more open woods.

But it is a place of death all the same. The plants are locked in silent struggle with each other. They suck each other's blood and strangle each other with fleshless strength. Life is being smothered everywhere there, all the time.

Silence of Death.

The silence of the jungle is the silence of death. The Japs there were silent, too, when we landed. There were 5,000 or 7,000 of them, living the last days of their lives and they were very quiet, like men praying to themselves.

The jungle here grew out of a swamp. The mud began abruptly at the edge of the sand. Over the mud was a network of vines and brush. A shoe made the mud open like a mouth and, when the shoe was pulled out, the mud sucked like a mouth.

Suck, scrape, squash. That was the blitz marching. The first shots came unexpectedly and from all around, from ground we had just walked over, too. The enemy was in front of us and on the side of us and shooting us through the wall we had our backs against.

The shooting came in spatters and angry little tears as if the Japs knew what they were shooting at. They were shooting at our area, but I don't think they could see, any more than we could, anything to shoot at.

When the troops dug in for their first night on New Georgia, it was still raining. The darkness blackened until it was so black that you could not see your hand in front of your face. You felt blinded. The effect of the blackness was so stunning that you couldn't tell whether your eyes were open unless you gaped them wide enough to hurt.

I gaped my eyes and made them hurt. I wanted to be sure they would see what could be seen. There were curious birds scattered through the area where we were. They welcomed the night with yelping little barks. Some were close at hand and some were quite far off. They sounded like puppy dogs, but not exactly; more like men imitating puppy dogs.

Slept in Water.

The water was several inches deep in our foxhole. I was using my jungle pack as a pillow, but in a little while the water crept up about it and got into my ears. I took off my poncho and wadded it up and placed it under my head. But the rain kept falling and after another while I took off my helmet and rested my head on that to keep the water out of my ears. I lay that way until dawn with the warm, sticky, yellow water puddling and swirling across my chest and up to my chin.

Time does not pass on a night like this. It inches through the mind like a black snake. When the dawn came, I stood up in the foxhole. Muddy water dripped off me and there were streaks and clumps of thick mud all over me.

It rained all that day without stopping. The men again fought a will-o'-the-wisp enemy who was never seen and who, when charged, was not there—except for a few dead. At nightfall, it was still raining. The men dug into the mud and lay there in holes that were open to the rain and to the night and to the Japs.

This fantastic rear-guard action kept up for 15 days and 15 nights. It got to seem like a horror play. The men slept in patches and bits and in the daylight rose, fatigued, to advance.

From a military point of view, there was no orthodox sense to all this. The objective of a rear guard is to slow the enemy and kill as many of him as possible before he reaches the point where you have to stand and fight. Jap rear guards would have killed a lot more Americans if, instead of knifing into the foxholes they found, they had thrown grenades into them. They would have had a lot more time for killing if they had not wasted so much time retrieving their dead and wounded and cleaning up the evidence after each fight.

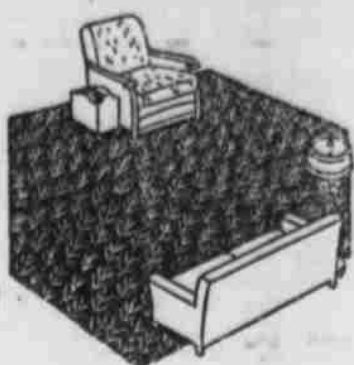

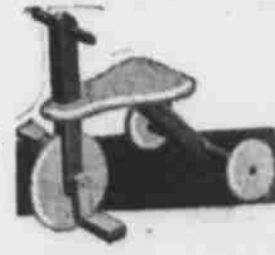

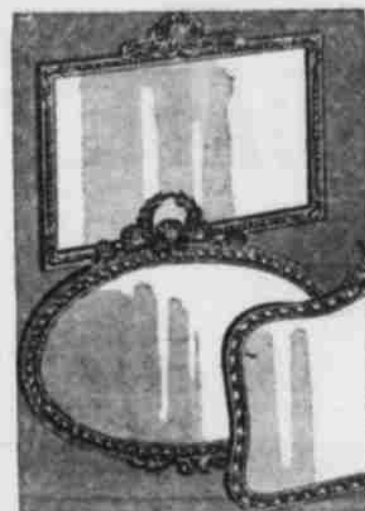

Then remove all of the internal organs and spread the sides of the body cavity wide open with a stick. If possible hang the carcass up to cool off before it is moved. If the carcass cannot be hung up, roll it on two poles or rocks with the belly down.

Should it be necessary to load a hot carcass into a truck or onto a car, be sure to place the belly toward the floor of the truck or side of the car. Unless this is done the warm meat may sour. At the first opportunity hang the carcass by the hind legs. Skin out and hang in cooler for aging as soon as possible after returning home. If it is necessary to remove particles of dirt from the carcass, wipe with a damp cloth rather than washing it.
