\$1.75 Million School Bond Issue Set Sept. 25

The Colorado Independent School District Board of Trustees Monday night set Sept. 25 as the day for a \$1.75 million bond issue to build a new high school and renovate existing school facilities.

The election will be held in the school tax office, 256 Walnut, with Dick Wistrand as election judge, assisted by R. B. Baker.

Absentee voting judge will be J. S. Craddock Jr., assisted by Catharine Morris. Absentee voting will be conducted from 8 a.m. to noon and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday from Sept. 5-21.

The bond issue will finance what has been called "A Program To Achieve Greater Educational Excellence In The Years Ahead."

The school board has purchased some 30 acres to go with about 8 acres already owned by the school on the east side of the city along E. 17th Street. The property is near Highway 208 and E. 10th Street.

The school board has been working constantly in developing the bond issue since they received a report back from an educational study team last spring on the needs of Colorado City.

Since that time, the board has interviewed architects and fiscal agents. Their pay is contingent on the passage of the bond issue.

School board members will be meeting with as many groups and organizations as possible between now and Sept. 25 to ex-

plain the bond issue and answer any questions that anyone may have.

Also fact sheets and brochures have been made up explaining the bond issue and plans for the school districts future.

The Chamber of Commerce educational committee held a meeting last night to get organized on seeking support for the bond issue and the committee and school board will meet next Tuesday to discuss the bond issue.

In addition to the many meetings attended by the school board members and the homework they have had to do in preparation for the bond issue, they have also travelled to a number of different cities to look at school facilities to determine what would be best for the local school.

Should the bond issue be approved by voters, it will mean a tax increase of about 22¢

or 23¢ per \$100 valuation based on See BOND Page 7

Now that school has started again, Colorado City and Mitchell County motorists are reminded to stop for school buses until the flashing lights go off or until the bus moves on.

Fire Department Has Modern Equipment

With the addition of the new fire truck, Colorado City has a fire department that outranks those of most cities its size.

The new truck has several features that will enable it to put out a large fire quickly.

It has a pump capable of pumping 750 gallons of water per minute.

Three 2 1/2 in. hoses can be hooked up to the truck.

Hoses are pre-connected to save time and nozzles are of the fog type to be more efficient.

Hoses carried by the new truck include 300 feet of 1 1/2 inch line; 200 feet of 1 1/2 inch "spaghetti" line (meaning 2 hoses and 2 nozzles from one line); 1500 feet of 2 1/2 inch line.

The new truck cost the city taxpayers about \$22,000.

"The Fire Department now has equipment equal to and even overshadowing that of most fire departments," said James Spott, fire marshal.

A list of the fire-fighting equipment used in Colorado City and Mitchell County shows:

--1. The new 750 gallon per minute Ford carries 400 gallons in its tank.

--2. The 750 gallon Seagraves carries 250 gallons.

--3. The 500 gallon per minute Chevrolet carries 200 gallons.

--4. A rural truck capable of 300 gallons per minute has an auxiliary pump and carries 500 gallons.

--5. A GMC rural water truck carries 1400 gallons and has a 2 inch centrifugal pump.

--6. A 6x6 army surplus truck with a high lift pump, carries about 1200 gallons.

The Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department consists of 28 members at present. It is limited to 30 members, so when two are added, an applicant would have to wait for someone to drop out or move away.

To join the Volunteer Fire Department, application must be made to a member. It must be voted on and passed.

Hightower Appointed To Council

Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby has announced the reappointment of Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon to the Texas Legislative Council.

Hightower represents Mitchell County.

The Legislative Council conducts research and drafts bills for members of the Texas Legislature.

The Lieutenant Governor is chairman of the council, which consists of ten representatives and a permanent staff. Also named were Senators William (Bill) Patman of Ganado, Max Sherman of Amarillo, Jim Wallace of Houston and Grant Jones of Abilene.

Senators Hightower, Patman and Sherman are re-appointments to the council.

Hospital Vote Underway

Absentee voting is now underway at the Mitchell County Clerk's office for the Sept. 15 election on the proposition for Precinct 4 (Lorraine) to join the local hospital district.

Since voting opened Monday, only one vote has been cast. Absentee voting will end Sept. 10. Anyone wishing to vote may do so at the clerk's office from 8 a.m. to noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The election Sept. 15 will be held in the Lorraine City Hall and at the County Courthouse. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. on that day.

Precinct 4 voters must vote in favor of joining the district and Precinct 1, 2, and 3 residents must vote in favor of expanding the district in order for Precinct 4 to become part of the district.

The election was called following a hearing in July in Lorraine to determine the need for having the election. A bill was passed by the last legislature authorizing the election after such a bill was sought by Lorraine voters who petitioned the hospital district to call the election.

There has been a great deal of

concern that Lorraine and Precinct 4 could be incorporated into another hospital district outside the county and that Lorraine voters would have little voice in the matter.

Should Lorraine voters decide to join the hospital district, taxes will not be levied until the 1975 tax year. That tax amounts to 75¢ per \$100 valuation based on 25 per cent of the market value.

Farm Tour Set Today

The annual Mitchell County Farm Tour will be held today, starting at 9 a.m. from the Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative.

The tour is being sponsored by the Agriculture Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, the Farmers Home Administration, Soil Conservation Service, Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Highlights of the tour will be stops at 3 cotton variety demonstrations as well as viewing a representative sample of Mitchell County's 53,000 acres of See TOUR Page 7

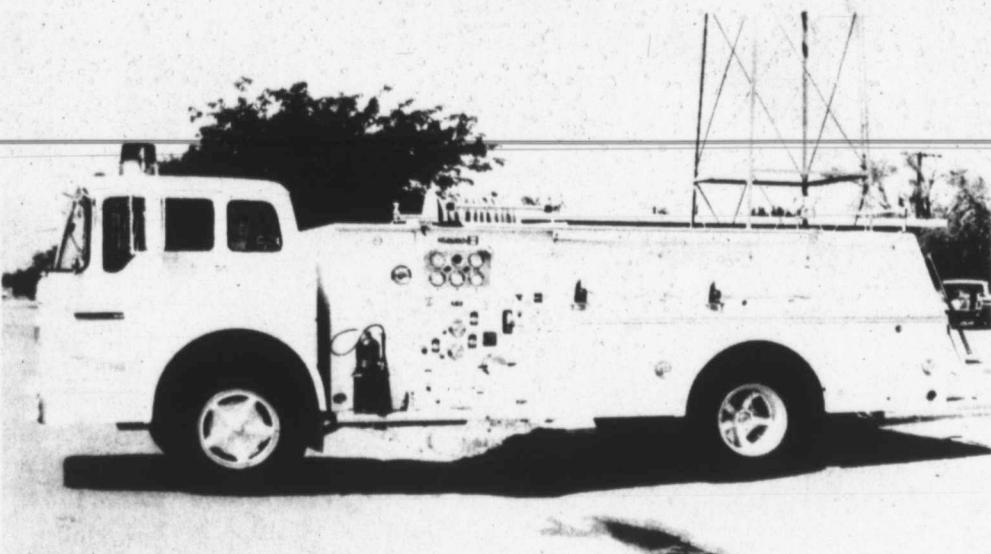
However, someone else had already brought food and water for the canine.

New Traffic Light Law

The State law passed this year permitting a right turn on a red light after stopping went into effect Monday.

Colorado City motorists are advised to watch for pedestrians at intersections, especially children.

The state law permits cities to qualify the right turn if there is much pedestrian use of an intersection, if there is much parking near an intersection, or if there is a large volume of traffic.

If a city decides not to permit the right turn on red after stop because of possible danger, then a sign should be put up that would prohibit it.

J. A. Sadler, Jr., city manager, in talking about how the new law would affect Colorado City said:

"After the new traffic light equipment is installed and an evaluation can be made, then the city council will decide whether or not to permit the right turn."

He also indicated that the new law might be more advisable for big city traffic than for Colorado City, since there is a possible danger to pedestrians See LAW Page 7

Air conditioning engineers recommend that thermostats be set at 76 to 78 degrees for comfort and economy. Every degree below this requires units to work harder and use more electricity.

However, if you plan to be away all day, you can economize by raising the setting five degrees. Turn off the unit when you go on vacation, unless there are items that might be damaged by the heat. If so, leave the unit on, but raise the setting at least five degrees.

Enjoy cleaner air and lower costs by keeping the filters clean. A dirty filter causes the unit to work harder. Check them at least once a month. If it's a permanent-type filter, clean it according to the manufacturer's directions. Disposable filters should be replaced at least every 90 days, or earlier if necessary.

Also, keep out direct sunlight with awnings, blinds or draperies. Weather-strip doors and windows, and properly insulate walls and ceilings. Be sure the fireplace damper is closed. And, when possible, bathe, cook and do the laundry during cooler parts of the day to prevent heat buildup.

on 55 per cent of that valuation. That would mean only about \$12,10 a year to the owner of a \$10,000 home.

However, the tax payers would not realize the full increase as the tax rate is now \$1.69 and by the time the bond issue is passed and the bonds sold and time for repayment begins, the tax rate would only be about \$1.86 or at the most \$1.88, said Superintendent Lloyd McKee.

The maximum figure, the \$1.88, is only a 19¢ tax increase. It has been computed that bonds now being paid on will be paid down to the point where the amount of taxes used to pay off bonds will be less and part of the money now collected for the payment on old bonds can be applied to the payment on new bonds.

Under the bond issue proposed, the following changes would be made:

--A new high school would be built. The new high school would incorporate all the latest facilities in order to offer modern educational facilities to youngsters. The new high school would consist of four buildings, a main building that would house the classrooms, cafeteria, offices, auditorium; a vocational building which could be declared an area vocational school and the school would be reimbursed 55 per cent of the cost of building it by the state; a gymnasium facility for conducting physical educational classes, and a building that would house the band, home economics, typing and related classes that create noise.

--Kelley Elementary would be renovated, air conditioned and a physical education facility would be added.

--Hutchinson Elementary would be renovated, air conditioned, lighting would be improved and a new lunchroom would be built to replace the one built in 1909.

--Wallace school will be abandoned as it is unsuitable for modern educational purposes, it is too costly to operate and closing it would mean a savings of about \$50,000 a year; its location is dangerous to the

children because of the 55 m.p.h. speed zone. It is hoped that the building can be sold for commercial purposes.

--Junior High School because of its structure is unsuitable for today's education program needs and insurance costs are high because of its structure. It cannot be expanded because of its site and will be made into administrative headquarters, a warehouse and later made into an early childhood learning facility when it becomes necessary to send 4-year-olds to school.

--High school will be renovated and air conditioned and made into a middle school for sixth, seventh and eighth graders. While the high school is inadequate as a high school, it is a perfect facility for sixth, seventh and eighth graders. This is how much education has changed in recent years as junior high students are now taking what used to be taught only in high school. This includes subjects such as laboratory sciences, home economics and vocational classes. Facilities for these type classes are not available at the existing junior high.

The new high school and the renovation of the buildings will provide for increased enrollment. In addition, the new high school facilities will be built so that they can be easily expanded.
