Marines Coming To Lamesa Next Monday Morning

Seeking Enlistments From Men And Boys Of Dawson And Adjoining Counties

Sgt. Leon S. Waters will be in Lamesa Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, the 21st, 22nd, and 23rd, of July, 1941, to accept applications for enlistment in the U. S. Marine Corps.

The requirements for enlistment in the U. S. Marine Corps are as follows: Single without dependents; between the ages of 17 and 30; between 64 inches and 74 inches in height; and able to pass the physical requirements.

Applicants are given their choice of either enlisting in the Regular Marine Corps for four years, or enlisting in the Marine Corps Reserves for the duration of the National Emergency not to exceed four years. Men enlisting in the Marine Corps Reserves have the same opportunity as men enlisting in the Regular Marine Corps for advancement.

American Legion Elects Officers For Coming Year At Meeting Monday Night

The Allen-Houston Post of the American Legion elected 1941-1942 officers last Monday night at the regular July meeting, as well as transacting other important business.

The new commander is D. O. Blackmon who has served for two years as Adjutant. Vice Commander is Ray Hollingshead who has served as Finance officer for a year.

Finance Officer Hollingshead reported on Post finances with all obligations excepting pavement paid and there is enough balance on hand to meet current needs on pavement costs and Post officers were authorized to sign notes for the balance due.

Thirty flags have been sold recently, twelve of which have been delivered and 18 are yet to be delivered. Prickly Pear, Mesquite And Cedar Being Removed From Texas Ranch Ranges

Elimination of prickly pear, mesquite and cedar led the field on a basis of acreage affected under the 1940 Range Conservation Program, M. C. Puckett, State AAA committee man and ranchman from Fort Stockton has announced.

These practices, which include the eradication of light, medium and heavy infestations, the AAA official said, were carried out on a total of 2,453,203 acres with ranchmen clearing 1,697,136 acres of prickly pear, 133,433 acres of mesquite and 622,634 acres of cedar.

The elimination of lechuguilla was carried out on 67,107 acres.

Eradication practices carried out in connection with deferred grazing included elimination of noxious weeds, brush, bitter weeds and rodents on 273,955 acres.

Approximately 63 per cent of the 22,173 ranches cooperating under the range program earned payments of \$300 or less, Puckett pointed out. "Of this amount, 77 per cent were paid \$200 or less."

Other range-building payments distributed to the remaining 3,719

ranches in Texas were from \$300 to \$10,000, the maximum payment allowed under the conservation program.

A resume of the range program indicates ranchers signed 79,076,380 acres with a grazing capacity of 4,878,132 animal units and a range building allowance of \$6,480,913 under the 1940 program. The total of range payments earned by Texas ranchers was \$5,275,120 with \$172,766 representing increases in payments to 16,908 ranches. Under the AAA program, payments of less than \$200 are increased according to a graduated scale.

A total of 589,179,190 linear feet of listing, furrowing and chiseling included furrows containing 60 square inch cross sections with dams and furrows with 60 square inch cross sections without dams. The remaining furrows were smaller with 32 square inch cross section. Contour ridges of 5,816,501 linear feet were used on 136 ranches.

Other widely-used practices were the construction of 9,116 earthen dams or reservoirs in which 15,308,011 cubic yards of dirt were moved and 558 spreader dams containing 1,833,764 cubic yards of dirt. Ranchmen also built approximately 2,000 miles of fireguards and 1,350 miles of spreader terraces.

For the purpose of giving a more even distribution of range water, 2,127 wells were drilled to a total depth of 562,390 feet. Of this number, 1,981 wells containing 590,073 linear feet had casings of 4 inches or more in diameter. The remaining 146 wells had casings of less than 4 inches in diameter.

Natural reseeding of rangeland by deferred grazing was carried out on 5,323,873 acres and 3,889 ranches while artificial reseeding and sodding were done on 1,892 ranches and 151,749 acres. On the 1,781 ranches carrying out artificial reseeding 974,478 pounds of various grass seeds were used.

Other practices carried out for payments were: the construction of 20,947 cubic yards of concrete or rubble masonry dafs for 241 structures; 27 natural watering places in soil or gravel, 8,694 cubic feet; 24 watering places in rock in which 5,291 cubic feet of rock were moved; the planting of 940 acres of trees on 12 ranches; and mowing 330,648 acres of noxious plants on 1,089 ranches.

Inflation May Come Is Warning Of W. E. Morgan

Enough controls are available to check inflation in this country during development of the armament program, but the vigor of their application will be limited within the boundaries set by public opinion, according to W. E. Morgan, economist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

Inflation means a rise in the general price level. If enough of the increased consumer buying power, entailed by expanding employment and rising wages, could be siphoned off so that the amount left for spending stays in line with the supply of consumer goods, there would be no reason for prices to get out of hand. To do this the government could take the surplus buying power in the form of taxes, or it could be saved and loaned to the government. Alternate methods are direct price controls and rationing of consumption.

"While public opinion now seems to favor government action to prevent inflation," Morgan explains, such action will require individual sacrifices which many persons have not considered. When some of the more stringent controls are applied, with consequent reduction in consumer buying power, many persons will prefer to take chances with inflation rather than undergo the immediate cost of preventing it."

It is not likely people of this country would adjust themselves easily to the burden of diverting one half or more of the national income, as in Britain and Germany, to the war effort, Morgan says. To the public's unwillingness to assume the full burden of maintaining an elaborate military machine without a few years to think it over add the fact that it is humanly impossible to foresee all the changes in fiscal policy which future events will prove to have been desirable.

"This leads to the conclusion that a certain amount of price inflation in the United States is inevitable, but it should not be too difficult to hold it far below the limits to which it went in the first world war. If the current defense effort can be managed in such a way as to hold the price level fairly close to its present position the dislocations in economic activity which will occur in any event, will be greatly minimized."

Milk Goats Are Cheaper To Keep Than Milk Cows

Six to eight milk goats can be kept upon the feed required for one cow.

G. G. Gibson, assistant extension dairyman, says that the goat, often characterized as the poor man's cow, will supply sufficient milk for the average family and can be kept where it would be impossible to keep a cow.

But to produce, the goat must be fed properly and when does are in milk they should be allowed all the roughage, such as alfalfa, clover, or mixed hay and fodder, they will consume. Also they should receive a liberal quantity of succulent feed, such as silage or root crops. The Bureau of Dairy Industry has found, Gibson says, that 12 pounds of grain are required to produce a quart of goat milk. Some of the grain feeds best suited for the ration of goats are corn, oats, bran, barley, and linseed, or cottonseed, meal.

A ration that has been used in the Bureau's herd consists of two pounds of alfalfa or clover hay, one and one-half pounds of silage or roots, and from one to two pounds of grain. The grain ration consists of a mixture of 100 pounds of corn, 100 pounds of oats, 50 pounds of bran and 25 pounds of linseed meal.

When the does are on pasture they receive from one to one and a half pounds of this mixture daily.

In spring, summer and fall when goats have plenty of browse and pasture, no grain is necessary. With no browse and short pasture, it is best to give them a little grain. In winter they should be fed about one pound of grain, one and a half pounds of silage or roots and all the hay and fodder they will consume. They should have a shed for shelter, and should be kept dry and out of the cold wind. All feed offered should be clean. Plenty of rock salt should be kept before the goats and a quantity of fine salt mixed occasionally with the grain. Goats should not be compelled to drink from pools where the water has been standing.

While statistics are not available, C. T. Gibson says, it is evident that the number of milk goats in Texas is increasing steadily. Most of the large herds are located around cities.

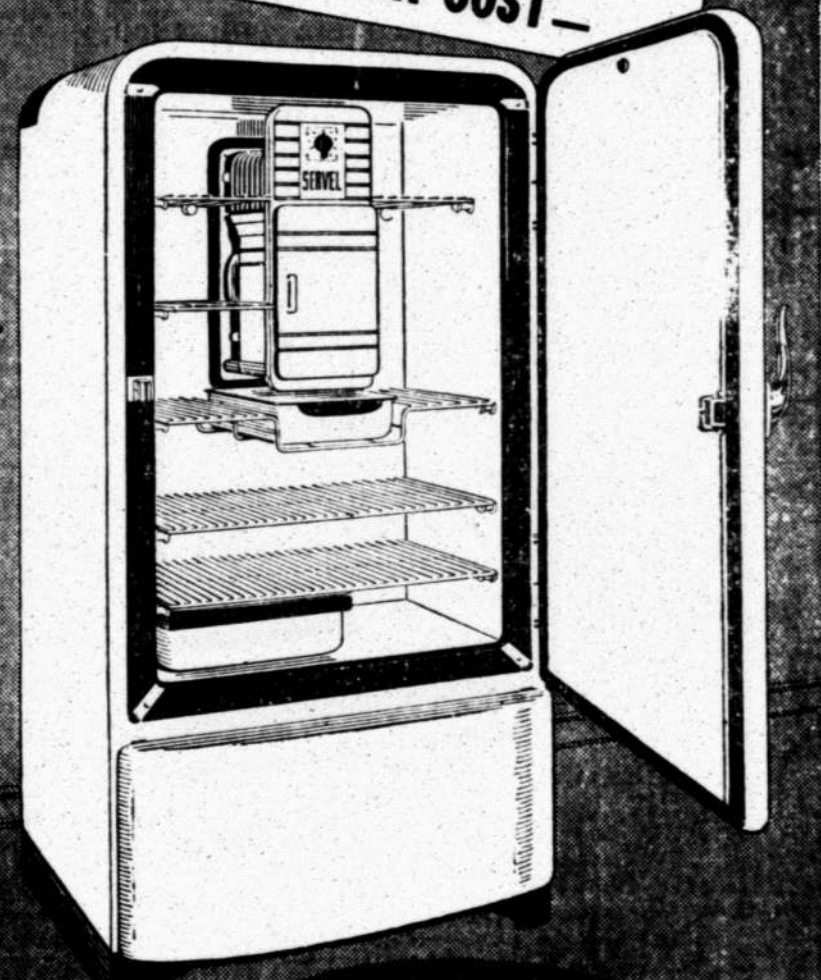

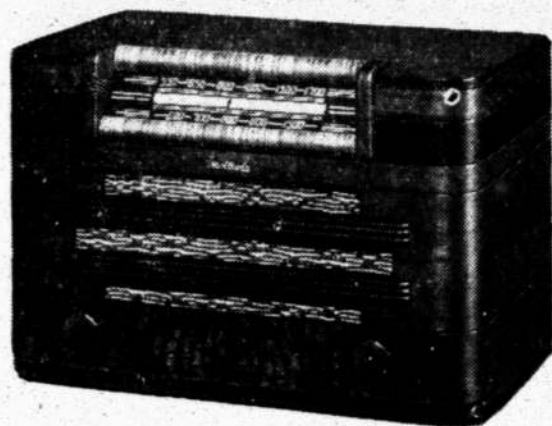

Guarding Of Tire 'Health' Would Save Rubber

Thousands of tons of rubber could be saved yearly and tires would deliver greater mileage and service if America's motorists would guard the "health" of their tires, according to Jack McLaughlin, manager of the Lamesa Tire & Battery Co.

Commenting on the rubber situation in the light of the government's recent action to curtail consumption of the nation's most vital import, Mr. McLaughlin said greater care in the use of tires would conserve an astounding amount of rubber.

U. S. Back-Tracks Leif Ericson In Going To Iceland

AP Feature Service

The United States is retracing the route by which Leif Ericson reached the western hemisphere nearly 1,000 years ago.

Establishment of a defence outpost in Iceland carries the U. S. Defense lines as far eastward as the home of Leif, the first white man credited with reaching the continent on which this nation eventually was founded.

Even when Leif set sail (about 1000 A. D.) on his trip to Greenland and North America, Iceland was the home of a prosperous republic developing a distinctive culture. Already in operation was its parliamentary form of government, a system that continued to function down through the centuries, surviving

of tire wear, for each pound of underinflation increases tread wear 12 1/2 per cent. And high speed is a vicious enemy of tires for speed means heat and heat deteriorates rubber," McLaughlin said, adding that tread wear is twice as rapid at 70 miles an hour as at 45.

The observance of the following rules on "tire health" is of timely importance because of concern over our rubber supply, in the opinion of McLaughlin. These rules are:

1. Maintain recommended air pressure at all times.
2. Whenever a tire is changed, check the air pressure after a few miles service.
3. Do not run a tire constantly on the same wheel. Instead shift your tires from wheel to wheel every 5,000 miles to insure uniform wear.
4. Keep safe tires on all wheels—a blowout destroys a complete tire.
5. Don't take corners at high speed, that wears tires faster than anything else.
6. Never slam on your brakes—except to prevent an accident.
7. Have your wheel alignment, front and rear, checked regularly.
8. Give your tires your personal inspection from time to time.
9. Don't drive too fast on hot, dry roads for high speed heats up tires and hastens deterioration and wear.
10. Start up gently, do not spin your wheels and grab off rubber.
11. Do not bump into curbs—no tire will withstand such abuse.
12. If your car begins to steer queerly, slow down, pull off the road and inspect your tires carefully and a failure may be prevented.

ing anything ever set up in Europe. Though the King of Denmark was also the King of Iceland, the island was technically independent from 1918 until May, 1941. Then the Icelandic government cancelled its union with Denmark and proclaimed independence.

Iceland's 40,000 square miles make it about the size of Ohio. Its population of 118,000 is near that of Wichita, Kansas, Fort Wayne, Ind., or Knoxville, Tennessee.

Fishing is the principal means of livelihood and most people live near the coast. Nearly a third live in Reykjavik, the capital. Hay, potatoes and turnips are about the only crops. Vegetation is sparse and a tree is a giant if it is 15 feet high. Cattle and sheep graze on the rocky hills.

Iceland's climate really isn't as icy as might be supposed. Warmed

by the Gulf Stream, the island enjoys higher winter temperatures than many parts of the temperate zone. Underlying hot springs prevent inland lakes from freezing over and make them ideal sea-plane bases. July temperature ranges around 50 degrees.

Iceland is 2,600 miles from New York, 680 miles from Bergen, Norway, and about 500 miles from the northernmost tip of Scotland.

Admiral King Is
Man Who Guards
Route To Iceland

Back in 1901 when handsome, very serious Ernie King of Lorain, Ohio, was graduated from the Naval Academy, his Lucky Bag recording was:

"Temper? Don't fool with nitroglycerin."

Now rated the toughest sea dog among the Navy's high ranking officers, 62-year-old Admiral Ernest J. King commands the United States forces which guard the Atlantic all the way to Iceland.

The tall, slender, leather-faced King is no "apple polisher" for Navy brass hats. His assignment to the critical outpost caps a career of outstanding command performance, particularly in the aircraft and submarine services.

Qualifying as a naval aviator at the age of 48 and holding a succession of air commands, he is said to have done more in perfecting the tactical value of aircraft for the fleet than any other man in the Navy. He has stressed the use of the Navy's air force as a powerful offensive—rather than a defensive—weapon of the fleet.

Prior to his aeronautical service, brilliant supervision of the salvage of the sunken submarines S-51 and S-4 won him the Distinguished Service Medal with Gold Star.

Old Eagle-Eye Ernie, as they call him in the Navy, drives his men and himself at a hard pace. Many a junior officer has cursed him as an "unreasonable, hardbitten, son of a sea cook." Most of them admit, however, he would be a handy man to have around if trouble were brewing. A high ranking officer, who has had considerable service with him, says: "King's a pleasant gentleman ashore but a tough home-bred at sea. Determined and a very quick thinker in an emergency, he has what it takes to command a fleet in wartime."

As commander of the patrol force (the Atlantic fleet) he directs the operations of 180 warships. The exact makeup of the Atlantic fleet is now a strictly confidential matter. Some time ago it comprised three old battleships, a few cruisers, many destroyers and speedboats and some long-range bombing planes together with other aircraft.

Admiral King saw service in eastern Atlantic waters during the World War when he was assistant chief of staff for Admiral Henry T. Mayo, commander-in-chief of the United States fleet. For that service he was awarded the coveted Navy Cross.

Choose Peaches
Carefully For
Canning Use

In selecting peaches for canning don't let "a skin you love to touch" mislead you, cautions J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. The condition of the skin is not always a dependable guide in determining sweetness and good quality. The best tasting peaches ripen from the seed outward to the skin. Many varieties of poor quality ripen from the skin inward to the seed.

Tree-ripened peaches have a better flavor because the fruit enzymes have an opportunity to function normally in bringing about maximum sweetness. When the fruit is picked too green it may continue to ripen, but the "peachy" flavor is lost. Fruit harvested before it is well matured never becomes soft when canned.

Peaches of finest quality have a fresh appearance and when they are broken open are thoroughly ripe around the seed as well as under the skin. Care should be taken with ripe peaches as they deteriorate quickly and should be eaten or canned as soon as possible after picking. If they must be kept for several days, cold storage at 36 to 40 degrees Fahrenheit is the best method of holding them at the desired condition.

A standard bushel of peaches weighs about 48 pounds and should yield about 30 No. 2 cans, or pint jars, or 20 No. 3 cans or quart jars. One bushel of peaches, if a light syrup is used, will need about three pounds of sugar. For a light syrup, use one cup of sugar to each three cups of water.

To prevent darkening and loss of vitamin C in preparation for canning, drop the halves immediately into a solution of two tablespoons of salt and two tablespoons of vinegar dissolved in one gallon of water. Rinse the fruit with clear water.

Shelterbelt As
Air Conditioner
Found Effective

On hot, sunny days following rainy spells the interior of a green shelterbelt may vary as much as 20 degrees from a thermometer reading in the sun several hundred yards away, says W. E. Webb, state director of the Prairie States Forestry Project, whose headquarters are in Northwest Texas.

"When the thermometer reads 90 degrees in the sun, the green canopy often cools the temperature to 70 degrees under the trees," he explains. Many of the belts planted in 1936, 1937 and 1938 make ideal picnic spots. Cottonwoods and some Chinese elms are now 15 to 30 feet high and provide excellent shade, while the green protective walls of shrubs and field rows keep the hot wind out.
