Thomas O'Neil, 56, jumped out and a fight ensued between him and Atkins.
 The driver, Dennis David Wallace, 32, was arrested by Majors and Browne.
 Wallace was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Ruby Claxton Friday morning. The charges and the amount of bond set include driving while intoxicated, \$1,000; carrying unlawful weapon, \$1,000; possession of a controlled substance, \$1,500; evading arrest, \$1,000; and aggravated assault with a motor vehicle, \$5,000.

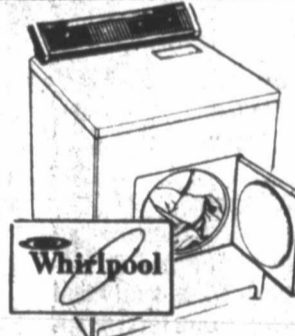

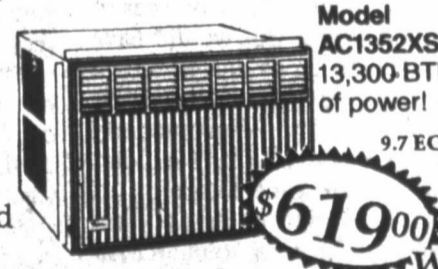

Q. Does an authorized health inspector inspect conditions at our local restaurants? If so, how often, and how do we know they pass the inspections?

A. Inspections of local restaurants are conducted by sanitarians with the State Department of Health, Abilene. Mike Lannen of the Abilene Office told *The Record* that they try to inspect restaurants twice a year or on complaint. If any violations are found, the management must correct them and the health officials return for a follow-up inspection. Management is given a citation listing any violations, but they are not normally posted. If you want to know if restaurants pass the inspection you will have to ask them. They are public records.

The way Sandy tells it, she and her daughter Rita had scooped up Dean, left their husbands at home in Manhattan, Kansas and embarked on a mission to Texas.

It was somewhere around Oklahoma that the swarm of fleas attacked Dean. They had been presumed dead ever since last fall when they dipped the German Shepherd. But fleas are stubborn, and far from expiring, they had simply laid low and waited for another victim.

They probably should have dipped Dean, too, but Sandy says they spray-bombed the Bronco instead, soaked Dean in the tub, and had no more trouble.

With fleas, at least.

Sandy made it to her dad's house in Central Texas. But when they got ready for the second leg of their trip, the Bronco wouldn't start.

Dean's great grandpop thought it must be the battery, so he bought a new one.

Still, the Bronco wouldn't go.

They checked for fleas in the carburetor, things like that, but found nothing.

The Ford dealer sent out a wrecker, and naturally the Bronco started just fine for him. They took it in for observation, nonetheless, and got it back \$200 later.

Dean was attacked again on Thursday - this time by tiny ants. Sandy stripped him on the spot and poured drinking water on him. The ants then swam to safety while Sandy picked off the remaining stowaways from Dean's pants.

She says Dean was less than stoic about all of this.

Things got better that afternoon and the family went to the Aquarena in San Marcos, Texas. Everybody was enjoying themselves and eating supper at the park. Unfortunately, less than a hundred feet away the Bronco was surrendering Sandy's purse to three bold thieves.

The mother and daughter, accompanied by Dean, went to the police station immediately to report the crime. Officers did manage to catch the three bandits and Sandy says she recovered most of what was in her purse.

By Saturday they were driving near Denton in north Texas on a six-lane highway. That's when a pickup truck pulling a travel trailer lost a hubcap while everyone was sailing along comfortably at 65 miles-per-hour.

Naturally, the hubcap headed for the Bronco like a heat-seeking missile. Contact with the intended target - the left rear tire - was perfect, slicing it to smithereens.

Still, not finished, the hubcap bounced against the door, hit the window and left a scratch from the handle to the rear-view mirror.

The guy pulling the trailer was apparently oblivious to all this, but Sandy gives high marks to others for what she calls good Texas hospitality.

After getting the Bronco stopped a few inches from death and next to an exit in front of a gas station, she says the attendants changed the tire, free of charge. A vegetable peddler also came along and gave them some bananas to eat while they waited.

On the last night of the long vacation, Sandy's mother-in-law gave the family seven dozen eggs to take home. She gave three dozen of those to her daughter Rita when she let her and Dean off at their home back in Kansas.

With less than two miles to drive to complete her mission, Sandy turned too sharply at a corner, dumping the remaining four dozen eggs all over the back of the Bronco.

She says she began cleaning the egged Bronco as soon as she hit the driveway of her house. As of last week though, she still hadn't gotten rid of the egg smell and was planning on writing Heloise for emergency instructions.

Needless to say, Sandy's husband Doyle, and Rita's husband, Troy, aren't the least bit surprised by any of this.

Doyle's just thankful he got his smelly Bronco back in one piece.
