### OLD PACT STANDS

MERITS OF MERCHANT  
CRUISERS SUBJECT  
OF ARGUMENT

(By The Associated Press)  
GENEVA, Switzerland, June 22.—The Tripartite naval conference believed to have gone far enough to indicate that the Americans expect no insuperable difficulties in establishing a reasonable proportionate cruiser strength as between the United States and Japan. The Japanese positively shrink from talking in terms of a ratio which in Washington was fixed for battleships as five for the United States and three for Japan. Japan is expected to accept cruiser tonnage, however, which would place her in only slightly better position, than five-three, namely five for the United States and three for Japan.

**Private Conference**  
This probability has emerged from the discussions which Hugh S. Gibson, head of the American delegation, had with Admiral Saito of the Japanese delegation today, according to the statistics which were prepared, based on the Japanese interpretation of the effects of the operation of a proposed ratio to the conference.

In the meantime there is a chapter in the possible solution of the second grave problem of the conference, the great Japanese desire to re-open the fundamental provision of the Washington naval treaty including the use of battleships, cruisers and aircraft carriers.

**Won't Affect Old Treaty**  
As a measure of confidence in the American position will propose the adoption of any agreement reached at Geneva will not prejudice the hands of the second Washington conference.

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### Rio Grande On Rampage Offers A Serious Threat To The Valley Region

(By The Associated Press)

RIO GRANDE CITY, June 22.—Reports here tonight from the Mexican side of the Rio Grande were that a 45 foot rise on the San Juan river is expected tonight. The river at Camargo, four miles from the Rio Grande in Tamaulipas, was said to have been inundated and residents were moving into the hills. A 30 foot stage of the Rio Grande was expected here tomorrow.

### Lowlands Threatened

EDINBURG, Tex., June 22.—Heavy rains in the lower Rio Grande valley and reported cloud-bursts in Mexico have caused a sharp rise in the Rio Grande and a threat to the lowlands along this side of the international stream from floods. Late Wednesday afternoon the river at the Hidalgo-Hidalgo bridge was 12 feet higher and rising about one foot every hour.

Rains throughout the valley were reported here. Edinburg received about three inches in less than three hours. The result was a considerable damage to vegetation which is now reaching maturity. Growers declare that the effect on the crop will not be apparent for several days but little seed is expected to follow the rains.

Edinburg's paved streets were turned into canals and in one section of the business district property was worked hard to keep back water from flooding their stores. The electrical display that accompanied the storm, however, did not cause the submergence of the Central Power and Light company here and the town was without power for more than an hour. Continuous rain made repair work hazardous.

North of Edinburg on the Fairbairn highway, other heavy rains made travel dangerous and almost impossible. Cars were warned not to try the stretch between Hidalgo county's payment and Fairbairn. Dry land farms which have been suffering for some time were covered into lakes and the sections of Hidalgo county will receive material improvement in a few days of rain.

**Central Gates Set**  
Along the Rio Grande workmen were busy putting flood control gates into place in order to prevent the lower sections of Hidalgo county. Wire and call communication with Hidalgo ceased shortly after 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Trucks of the Missouri Pacific branch line that came from McAllen to Hidalgo were taken up and the sea between the huge dykes closed.

CLEVER RUSE WORKED  
TO HIDE NOISE OF

HUNTSVILLE, Texas, June 22.—A tired, mud-stained posse returned here tonight with eight of the 35 convicts who escaped Tuesday night from the Ferguson prison farm at Midway. Scores of prison guards and citizens led by Warden N. L. Moore are following several packs of bloodhounds through wet, soggy gumbo mud of the Trinity river bottoms in an effort to retake all of the fugitives before morning. With three recaptured shortly after the escape of 35, it is again believed the prison walls. Those captured are:

### Third Member Of Crew Swam Way To Safety

(By The Associated Press)

SAN DIEGO, CALIF., June 22.—Lieutenant Commander William S. Hactor, operations officer of the North Island naval air station, and Charles K. Robbins, aviation chief machinist mate are believed to have lost their lives by drowning, while Lieutenant Thomas Fisher saved his life by swimming nine hours following the crash of a naval torpedo plane four miles off Laguna beach Tuesday night. Details of the crash became known here today on Fisher's arrival in San Diego.

A squadron of seaplanes and the destroyers MacDonough and Corry today searched the area where the torpedo plane disappeared.

Lieutenant Fisher, who assumes all the blame for the fatal crash said: "We left Crescent City, Calif., at 1:15 p. m. Tuesday for San Diego in the Boeing torpedo plane. At about 8:30 p. m. while four miles off Laguna beach the plane suddenly struck the surface of the sea. The plane sank in less than five minutes."

"The two pontoons came off and floated away. Hactor, Robbins and myself took off our parachutes and tore away the fuselage to find the life preservers which were stowed in a compartment aft."

"All three of us managed to cling to one of the pontoons, but this sank within five minutes as the bottom must have been badly damaged by the landing. The other pontoon floated away."

**Tried Swimming**  
"Hibbins struck out for the shore first, closely followed by Hactor. I could not swim as fast and took more leisurely. I could hear Hactor and Robbins encouraging each other. They seemed to be getting along well. At about 10:30 o'clock I failed to hear their voices. I never saw or heard them after that."

"At about 1:30 o'clock I struck the beach near Laguna, but was too weak to get up and walk. I lay there fully 20 minutes before I could regain sufficient strength to walk to the deputy sheriff's office where the officer there built a fire and gave me some dry clothes. At 7:30 o'clock the naval air station was alerted and reported what had happened."

Commander Hactor was 35 years old. He was born in Nebraska and was appointed to the naval academy from Missouri in 1911.

DUNCAN, Okla., June 22.—Arch Gilbreath, father of complaining witness in a criminal assault case, shot and killed R. F. Cox, in the district court room here today.

Cox was on trial charged with assaulting three young women April 14, near Duncan. He also was wanted on similar charges at Lawton and Ardmore, Okla. Questioning by the jury was about to begin, and Judge Richardson had announced that as the testimony would be shocking in character, some persons might wish to leave the room, when Gilbreath raised his revolver and fired. Cox dropped to the court room floor dead.

## KITCHEN CONTEST WINNERS POSTED

MUCH GOOD RESULTS FROM HOME IMPROVEMENT, IT IS DISCOVERED

COLLEGE STATION, June 22.—District winners in the 1927 Improved Kitchen contest, conducted by the Semi-Weekly Farm News, Dallas, and the Extension Service, A. and M. College, have been announced by Miss Mildred Horton, state home demonstration agent of the Extension Service.

Mrs. Bernice Taylor, home improvement specialist of the Extension Service, is now visiting the various district winners. After inspection of all the district first prize winning kitchens, the state winners of the entire contest will be announced.

### Total Of 634 Entered

A total of 634 women took part in the improved kitchen contest this year, held for the sixth time. The contest is divided into two classes, Class I includes entries for which the expenditure for improvement does not exceed \$25. Class II is for entries where expense for improvement are above \$25. The state is divided into nine districts for the purposes of the contest, which gives eighteen first place winners, one in each of the two classes for the nine districts.

During the six years of the contest nearly 4500 Texas housewives have entered the competition and improved their kitchens Miss Horton reports. In addition many housewives although not competing have been spurred on by the contest to improve their kitchens.

### Added Family Life

"We have found," said Miss Horton in commenting on the effects of the contest, "that with the family working on the kitchen in a spirit of common interest, the contest has meant in many cases a closer feeling among the members of the family and in most instances better understanding, more happiness, and a fuller life."

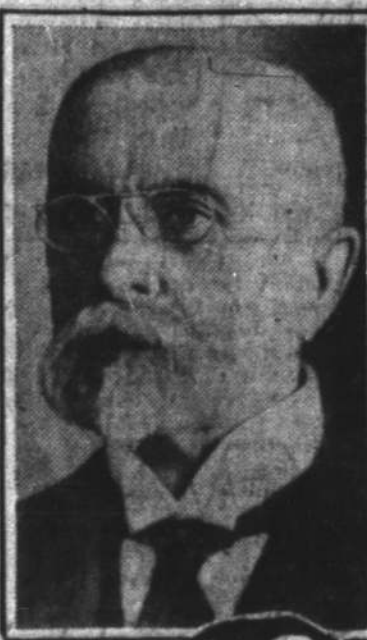
### G. I. A. TO SUGGEST ITS ENTERTAINMENT PROGRAM

## Czech Peasant Now In Palace Where Bohemian Kings Ruled

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, June 22.—The recent election of Thomas Garrigue Masaryk to the presidency of Czechoslovakia adds one more reel to the most striking romance in modern European history. It is the romance of a man who conceived a dream-state and built it, making an oppressed people into a strong nation—a romance that equals anything Hollywood has to offer.

### Reel One

Masaryk's father was a game-keeper on one of the imperial estates in Moravia.

Once a year in the autumn shooting season the game-keeper's little boy saw the Austrian emperor and all the oppressors of the Czech people come to Moravia to shoot game.

They were resplendent in rich furs. In one night they spent enough money on champagne to keep the Masaryk family in comfort for a whole year.

The little boy conceived an inextinguishable hatred of the monarchy. He conceived his dream—that of a nation resurrected after three hundred years of oppression.

### Reel Two

A clergyman gave the little working boy his first lessons. Then the lad went to a German school at Hustopech. By superhuman efforts, by making all kinds of sacrifices, the lad went to Prague University, then later to the University of Vienna and Leipzig. At the latter he met a young girl from Brooklyn. They became sweethearts. They married and lived in perfect union until her death in 1923.

### Reel Three

His schooling finished in 1882, the young scholar, now prepared for his life's work, was called to a professorship in the University of Prague, where he taught history and philosophy. He encouraged them to write and speak their own tongue. He was elected to the Austrian Parliament where he became one of the most savage critics of the manner in which Austria treated the Slav peoples within her empire.

### Reel Four

In 1914 the war broke out. The university professor and parliamentary critic of Austrian misrule became a marked man. He fled from the empire and came to London, where he was made a professor of Slavic studies in the University of London.

### Reel Five

Back to Europe in 1918, triumphant. The allies recognized the Czech provisional government as a belligerent. The Czech flag flew over Czech divisions fighting on the fronts in Italy and France.

### Reel Six

The war over and the treaty signed, Czechoslovakia Parliament elected Masaryk president for a term of seven years.

The republican dreamer sits now in the ancient castle of Hradcany on the heights of Prague where once Bohemian kings ruled.

## PROSPERITY NOW EXISTING IN THE VICINITY OF SWEETWATER LEADS TO HUGE AMOUNT OF BUILDING ACTIVITY

SWEETWATER, June 22.—Once more Sweetwater took the offensive in its climb to rank of a real West Texas city, and this week saw the start of a drive that will end in a seven-story hotel, \$10,000 addition to the department office building, \$40,000 addition to the court house, the sale of the old county jail and lot for \$25,000 on which will be erected a modern office building, the final passage and granting of a gas franchise, and opening of the drilling and development of nine water wells that will adequately augment the present water supply to care for all domestic and industrial purposes.

Rains aggregating two and one-half inches fell in this section during the past two weeks and the result effect was an stimulating to business as was its impetus to the crops. Approximately seventy percent of the land was in cultivation, and the remaining part was being rapidly planted. Already the cotton, Indian corn, grain sorghum, and other row crops are in an excellent condition, and the farmers are jubilant over the prospects.

**Everyone Busy**  
With the country in good shape, the business and commercial interests are working harder than ever before to make Sweetwater the distributing center of West Texas.

H. B. Allen, owner of the new seven-story Allen Hotel this week awarded the general contract for the construction of this hotel to E. L. Morgan, El Paso contractor for \$156,000. The excavation, plumbing, electrical contracts, painting, interior decorating and the lot brings this figure to over \$246,000, according to Mr. Allen. The building will be of Spanish type architecture finished on the outside in light ornamental brick, and cut stone and on the inside in polychrome plaster, and natural oak.

It will have seven stories including a huge rose garden and will have 120 rooms, a large lobby, ladies parlor, coffee shop, a dining room and banquet hall, and every other modern convenience that can be put in a hotel. Work has already begun on the excavation, and the general contract will start within the next ten days. The ground floor will be 100 by 130 feet.

**Office Building Planned**  
Levy Bros owners of a large department store have received bids on an addition to their present building which will include offices, rooms and additional space for the present store. The plans prepared by Page Bros, architects, of Austin, were used, and the low bidder, Myers and Johnson, Sweetwater contractor, were retained and after making some additional changes in the specifications were awarded the general contract, \$71,000. Work will start next week.

and will cost, when completed about, \$50,000.

### New Jail Planned

Decision was made several weeks ago by the Ninth county commissioners court to remove the present jail which is located on the square to the fourth floor of the court house, and Tuesday the contract totaling \$39,214.60 was let. This was awarded as follows: General contract, Myers and Johnson, Sweetwater, \$18,000; jail equipment, Pauley Jail company, Dallas, \$10,985; elevator, American Elevator company, Dallas, \$3,689; plumbing and heating, J. R. Schneider, Dallas, \$4,681.55; electrical fixtures, White Electrical company, Lubbock, \$396.75; pitches, Pauley Jail company, Dallas, \$842. In addition to constructing a new jail in the court house the present county offices on the fourth floor will be removed to the first floor and this will require the reconstruction of the large county auditorium.

### Old Jail Sold

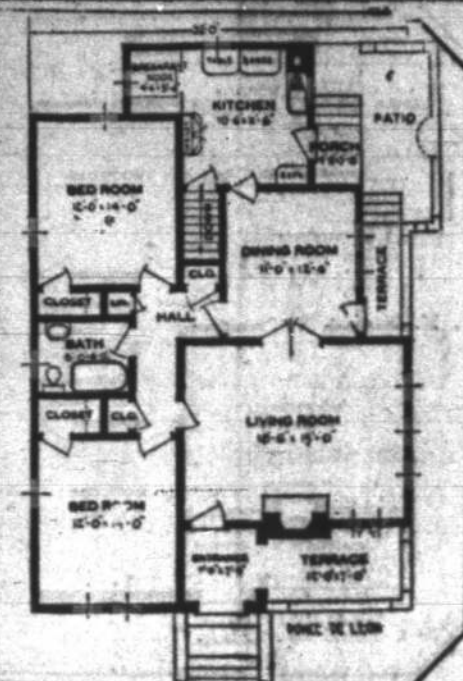
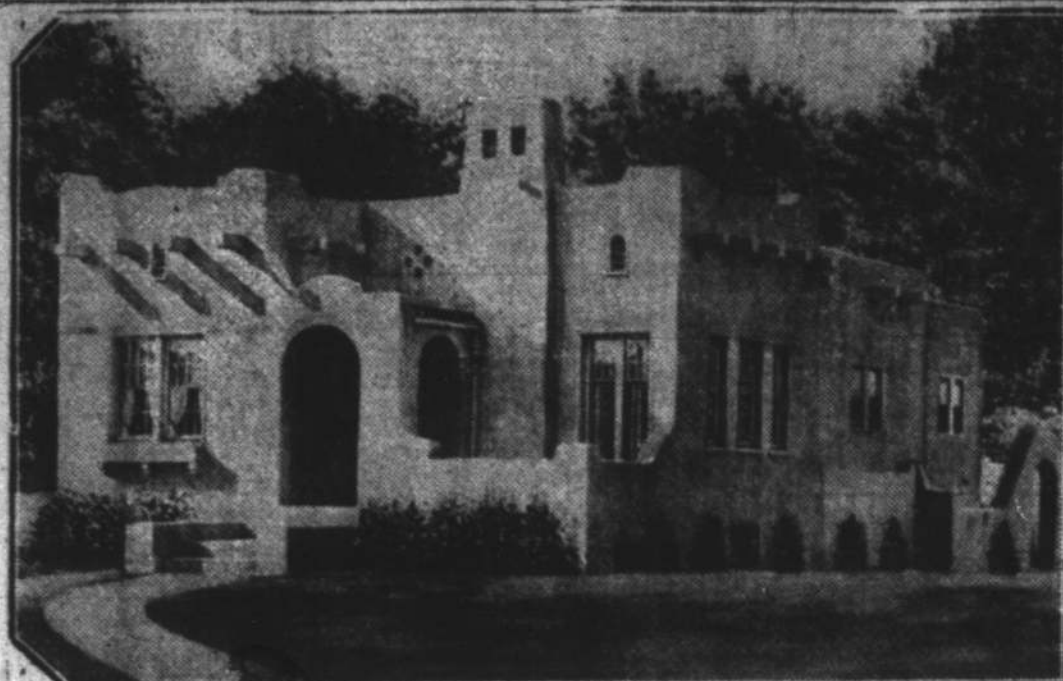
The present jail and lot on the square was sold at auction Tuesday to J. H. Dooscher and company, Inc., cotton brokers of Sweetwater, for \$25,250, as soon as the new jail is completed. Dooscher will raise the old building and erect a modern structure. He stated that he had not decided just what size building will be erected but with this location being across the street from the proposed federal post office building, it is thought that he will put a four or five story building, and his firm will occupy a portion of it.

Natural gas was finally and definitely assured the people of Sweetwater on Friday when the city commission approved the final reading of a gas franchise with the Lone Star Gas company, and passed an ordinance giving this company the right to sell and distribute gas in this city for twenty years. The net rates will be 67 1-2 cents for domestic consumption down to as low as 17 cents for industrial uses. This company agrees to reach the city limits by October 1, 1927 and will have gas all over this city by the last of December. This news is being joyfully received by the citizenship as it will mean a great step forward in civic and industrial development.

### Much Building Done

Other buildings under construction and nearing completion are: The municipal auditorium, costing \$200,000; the new \$155,000 high school, the south side ward school building, \$40,000, the G. H. Johnson office building has been started and will cost \$75,000 when completed. The Wright hotel is spending approximately \$15,000 on improvements and their some 17 residences and smaller mercantile buildings which will total \$100,000 now under way.

conference to be held in 1931. This, by the very terms of the Washington treaty itself, must convene to determine whether the developments of science justify any modification of the decision relative to the size of battleships, cruisers and aircraft carriers.

In this connection it is pointed out that the recent trans-Atlantic flights of Lindbergh and Chamberlain have raised the question whether aircraft carriers should not be increased in size and number to meet the rapidly developing speed of inter-continental air communication.

### Won't Reconsider

The American delegation is clearly opposed to any direct reconsideration of the Washington agreements with France and Italy. The two signatories not parties to the present parley, but may attempt to meet British ambitions half way by suggesting such a resolution as the foregoing with the idea that a building program on which no immediate speed was necessary could be held in abeyance until the second Washington conference.

Another primal difficulty raised by the British plan has yet found no likely solution, that is British repugnance to establishing total tonnage for auxiliary war craft. The British merely wishing to fix the size of individual warships and their total number.

**Juggling Required**  
If the Japanese plan were completed it would give Great Britain a considerably higher percentage of war craft than the United States, and some way must be found in juggling all three plans to establish parity on paper at least between the two Anglo-Saxon nations, leaving the American people to decide whether they wish to build up to the treaty declared parity.

If the danger seems to have been momentarily averted concerning the fixation of a fairly satisfactory cruiser ratio as between the United States and Japan, great difficulties remain concerning the concluding part of the Japanese project, acceptance of which would permit Japan to construct all submarines without limit as well as aircraft carriers under 10,000 tons and surface ships having a speed of less than twenty knots, and a displacement of not more than 600 tons.

**Merchantmen Discussed**  
Meanwhile the merry battle of words continues between the British and American delegations concerning the fighting value of converted merchant men. Rear Admiral Hilary P. Jones absolutely declines to accept the British contention as suggested by W. C. Bridgeman, first lord of the British admiralty, that an armed Mauretania would be merely an egg shell target.

Alluding to the British proposal to reduce cruisers to 1,500 tons, Admiral Jones told the newspapermen that the more one reduces the size of cruisers the more the cruisers become egg shells. The American admiral declared that some fast converted liners mounting six inch guns could be as dangerous as some cruisers and even more dangerous because they can mount more guns than the cruiser.

"You can shoot any number of holes through big liners," he explained, "without damaging them, because their machinery is below the water line and because their plating is often thicker than that of some cruisers."

### U. S. May Refuse

WASHINGTON, June 22. (AP)—The American proposal to Great Britain and Japan at Geneva for limitation of naval auxiliary craft was described today by the state department as representing the minimum naval needs of the United States and as not susceptible to radical change.

Worked out in detail long in advance, with careful consideration given by President Coolidge and state and navy department officials, the plan for extending to cruisers, destroyers and submarines the 5-5-3 ratio was held to embody virtually the only basis of which the United States is willing to negotiate a treaty. It was described by officials as elastic only to a degree but to what extent Ambassador Hugh Gibson, leading the American delegation and president of the three power conference, is authorized to revise it, has not been disclosed.

## GERMAN SEEKS LARGE ESTATE HELD BY OTHERS FOR 160-YEAR PERIOD

POTSDAM, Germany, (AP)—Lands, buildings and mines worth \$37,000,000 after 160 years would pass from one group of heirs to another if Arno von Frederdorff, descendant of Frederick the Great's confidant, Michael Gabriel von Frederdorff's proves his case.

Frederdorff contends that more than a century and a half ago a sweetheart of Frederick the Great, Marie Elisabeth Damm, poisoned the elder Frederdorff, alleged herself to be his wife and heiress, and falsified church and public records. Legal, chemical, historical, genealogical and geographical experts are being engaged in the case.

Frederdorff has searched records in Potsdam, Berlin and Zernikow in Mecklenburg, and has amassed facsimiles of documents withered and writ with age. According to Frederdorff, his forbear had rendered Frederick the Great so many services of a confidential nature that the latter made him his privy chamberlain and those of his naval advisers regarding the British and Japanese counter proposals, spokesmen for the administration would express only general opinions of the proposals of the conference. They remained hopeful that the fifth plan would be written into any final agreement.

With state department officials believing that it would not be in order to bring up the Washington treaty so long as France and Italy are not participating in the present conference, the British proposal to revise capital ship factors is considered to have almost eliminated itself as a talking point.

ran raining Tuesday afternoon the men were taken into the barracks where they danced, sang and played phonographs.

While the noise was at its height by a prearranged plan several of the convicts slipped away to the rear end of the barracks and quietly sawed a hole through the wooden flooring, the convicts said. The hole was only cut large enough to allow a man's body to pass through.

**Signal Drives**  
One of those subtle prison signals, which penetrates from the gates to the solitary confinement cells within the space of a few minutes, was being given. The other eight fugitives were taken within a radius of five miles. All of those retaken were in separate parts of the swamp, indicating that all of the fugitives separated immediately after their escape. This theory also was borne out by the dogs when they ran hither and thither on hot trails.

Prison officials credited the leadership to Ed Crowder, Alvin Ireland, Price Washier and John Reid. They were all under long sentences, Ireland figured in a desperate escape 11 months ago when a guard was killed by two men who drove to the prisoners barracks, shot the guard, unlocked the door, called Ireland and three other prisoners and drove away.

The escape Tuesday was the second large one in Texas in ten days, as 24 Mexican convicts broke away from another prison farm June 13, and most of them are still at large.

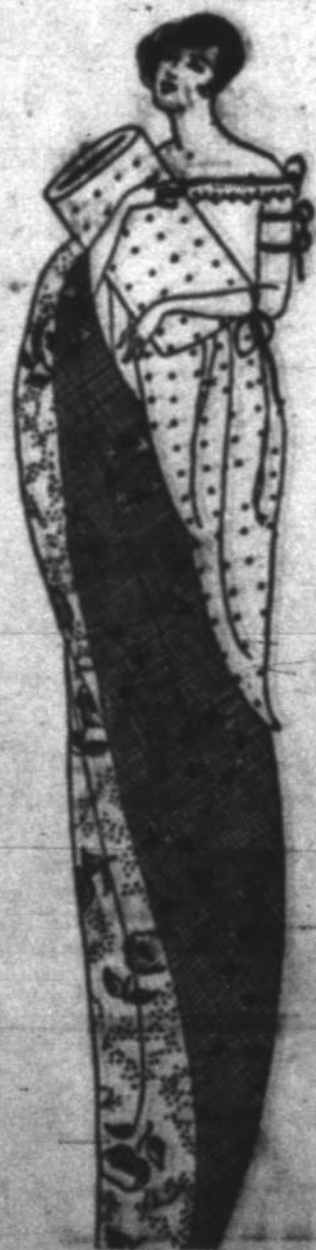
