Truck Exhaust Fumes Take Two Lives At Friona

TWO MEN ARE VICTIMS OF TRAGEDY

TOM T. HUNT AND CARL
PIERCE DIED MONDAY
IN QUEER MANNER

(By The Associated Press)
AMARILLO, Dec. 16.—Carbon monoxide fumes are believed to have caused the sudden deaths in Friona, Parmer county, Monday of Tom T. Hunt, 63 and Carl Pierce, 25, who were over- come while loading house- hold goods into a truck at the N. H. Sylvester home.

Both men were stricken at the same time and both were found unconscious. Hunt sprawled in an open kitchen doorway and Pierce slumped on the floor of the truck.

Motor Troubled Them
Engaged to move the Sylvester furniture, Hunt and Pierce were having trouble with the motor of their truck.

For more than forty minutes the engine was left running while the trucks exhaust pipe chugged its deadly fumes into the kitchen. After shutting off the motor both men entered the kitchen and closed the door. They disconnected a gas stove and capped the gas pipe. Soon after that both men toppled over victims of one of the most stealthily dangerous gases known. Because the motor of the truck was not running at the time that the men were found unconscious and because there were apparently no fumes in the kitchen the sudden deaths for a time remained a mystery.

REVISED BILL AGAIN UP TO SENATORS

AGREEMENT REACHED ON UNEMPLOYMENT APPROPRIATION

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—Conferees of the senate and house agreed today to the \$116,000,000 emergency employment appropriation in the form which drew opposition yesterday in the senate. The report will be returned to the senate later today.

The revised bill contains the provision giving President Hoover authority to use the funds as he sees fit if emergencies arise. This had been stricken from the bill by the senate.

Decision Assailed
This decision of the conferees reached tentatively Saturday was assailed in the senate yesterday by Democrats. Senator Robinson, the party leader, agreed to the restoration of this provision in the interests of hastening the legislation, however.

Chairman Jones, of the senate appropriations committee, will report the final agreement to the senate. He expressed doubt a vote would be reached today.

Amendments of Senators Black, Democrat, Alabama, and George, Democrat, Georgia, making available the unexpended balance of appropriations for road construction work in their states without the necessity of the states matching the funds, were stricken out.

Finney was released on his own recognizance.

In a statement at the inquest Finney said he was running at a green light at the intersection, and did not see the pedestrians, until too late. He said he served his car sharply but was unable to avoid hitting them. He then returned and helped take the injured girl to a hospital, where she died.

The accident occurred on Guadalupe street, better known as the "University Drag", which parallels the university and the business district which has grown up around the school.

Companions of the young flier stated this morning that Tjaden had often expressed a wish and had exacted a promise from them to the effect that if he were ever injured his parents were not to be notified unless it were absolutely certain that his injury would prove fatal.

But 22 years old Tjaden has been flying for two years and is a licensed pilot. His home is in Bismarck, North Dakota, and he is unmarried.

SEIZURE OF OVER MILLION DOLLARS WORTH OF NARCOTICS MADE AS BOAT DOCKS IN NEW YORK; IS FROM TURKEY

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—Huge quantities of narcotics, termed at the treasury the largest seizure ever made in this country, have been taken on the steamer Alesia in New York harbor.

Customs agents reported it totaled 1,090 pounds, and said the market value ran above \$1,000,000. Importers of the contraband were not captured.

The narcotics were shipped from Turkey, included in cases of furs that originated in Constantinople.

Announcement of the seizure was made by Assistant Secretary Lowman, who said it resulted from the joint work of the customs and narcotics bureau.

Spanish Regime Facing Test In General Strike

(By Associated Press)

MADRID, Dec. 16.—Through the heavy-handed censorship which clutched all Spain there seeped today reports which indicated that the revolutionary movement of the past week had developed into a general strike threatening food shortage in many of the kingdom's principal cities.

Martial law was in force from one end of the country to the other. Seventy-five thousand troops were reported to have been mobilized, and the leaders of yesterday's revolt of the aviators were interned at Lisbon, but civilian republicans were rebelling in a series of simultaneous strikes which indicated that this "peaceful" revolt had been well synchronized.

Police Reinforced
From Barcelona came reports that the police had been reinforced by 6,000 civil guards. At San Sebastian the walls were plastered with proclamations abrogating all constitutional rights and the civil authorities had surrendered their powers to the military.

Strikes were in progress at Santander, at Bilbao where Alcala Zamora was proclaimed "president of the republic" yesterday, and at Saragossa, Lerida, Jaen, Valencia, Cacer, Seville, Huelva and Giron. Bilbao reported its bread supply was exhausted, no bakers were working, and all provision stores closed. The frontier town of Irun, whose communications were cut off by insurgents yesterday, reported by a circuitous route that a famine had begun. Supplies were being brought across the frontier from the French town of Hendaye.

Similar famines were feared in other parts of Spain as the strike movement grew. Throughout the kingdom these conditions maintained. Outwardly the populace was quiet, but actually it appeared to be living in the shadow of uncertainty. There were no reports of open rioting but the authorities were on the alert for any emergency.

LONDON, Dec. 16 (AP)—A Paris dispatch to the London Daily Mail today said that official quarters had received information that the Spanish insurgents were gaining the upper hand that King Alfonso might leave Madrid today.

MODERATE WEATHER
LAST NIGHT

Clouds intervened to save Lubbock and the South Plains from the "hard freeze" predicted for last night and the United States Weather Bureau's forecast indicated a continued unsteady condition would bring moderation in temperatures. Old Man Winter's approach to this area could be felt stronger this forenoon when thin flakes of snow, barely perceptible, began falling at frequent intervals.

F. E. Williamson of Chicago, president of the Burlington Railroad system, which includes the Ft. Worth & Denver, was the principal witness this morning in the hearing on the application of the Texas & Pacific to build 333 miles of road in the Plains section of Western Texas.

Williamson said when the public interest of this territory demanded more rail lines, the roads already operated here should be permitted to serve, and a new line should not be allowed to invade the territory.

The witness said the Burlington had not yet finished building in the Panhandle-Plains country. On the contrary, it is constantly on the lookout for rail development needs, he stated.

The territory to be traversed by the proposed Texas & Pacific Northern does not yet need added rail facilities, Williamson testified. When it does, the Burlington will be glad to furnish them, he indicated.

If the T. & P. N. is constructed the traffic volume of any railroad serving the caprock country will not be sufficient to support the high grade freight and passenger service to which the section is entitled, Williamson went on.

Is Adequately Served
"An agricultural country such as this is adequately served when no part of it is more than 15 miles from a railroad," he added. "There would be very little territory tributary to the new road which is more than 15 miles from an existing line."

DR. MYERS ASKS PREACHER TO AID PARENT PROBLEMS

MY DEAR MR. PREACHER: You get an abundance of free advice. Here comes more of it.

Please don't pray nor preach so long, particularly when children are present. We are happy when you introduce a little variety in your prayers, use language we can understand, and paint word pictures we find interesting. You know that we do not feel sleepy when in your sermon you talk about experiences which all of us have every day.

Be more specific, please, when you condemn our sins. Don't just scold and shame us; show us definitely how we can be better; how we can grow more tolerable among our fellows and more lovable in our homes.

Please don't forget that many of us are parents, that nearly all of us live in homes, and that all of us have loved ones and once were children.

Teach us parents how to get along with each other and how to become more worthy of our children's love. Tell us of the best books and magazines for helping us improve ourselves as parents.

Now you know that no matter how good our Sunday school may be, our children are in it only for a little while each week. Sometimes our children do not find their teachers in the Sunday school as interesting. I know you and your Sunday school superintendent have a hard time selecting good teachers but I wish you, as the leader of our church, would convince your membership of the importance of good teachers, to the end that they would be willing to salary such teachers, so that you can select the best.

If religious teaching is worth anything it ought to be as valuable to our children as their arithmetic, geography and spelling.

Furthermore, we should like to have our children learn some self-control at Sunday school and not act up there as hoodlums. We wish it were possible to have teachers with whom children at Sunday school would learn a sense of order and respect, and others. One wonders how they can acquire reverence in a class where there is bedlam.

I am sure you will agree with me that the lack of order and discipline in the average Sunday school of today would not be tolerated in the public schools, and that the average teacher in the Sunday school would soon be discharged by a superintendent of day schools.

Of course you are very busy and badly underpaid, but without working any harder I believe you could do more for parents and build your church up much faster if you were to organize study groups for parents. Begin with the parents of young children. Call in a trained psychologist with religious sympathy to lead them, showing these parents how to train their children to grow up happily, to enjoy their home life, to respect their parents. Show these parents then how to cultivate simple, reverent and religious attitudes at home.

Such parents with religious interests, living good lives, will find their children imitating their habits and ideals. Naturally they will tend to join their parents' church.

No greater opportunity for the church today to enlarge its usefulness than through a practical program of parent education.

REVIEW OF FOREIGN NEWS OF WEEK

(By The Associated Press)

The fever of revolt, after attacking various portions of Spanish America in acute form for a year, finally crossed the ocean and broke out in the land of the mother tongue.

For nearly a year, or practically since the end of the stern Primo Rivera dictatorship, Spain has been troubled by strikes, republican agitation and general discord.

Comes to Head

This came to a head last week with an actual military revolt in the town of Jaca, a garrison point in the mountainous region just below the border of France. Artillerymen quartered in the town, soon joined by other military units and reinforcements of civilians, took over the local government and started a march to Huesca, capital of the province.

Loyal forces immediately were started northward from the latter city and the two contingents met near Ariebe. There government troops turned 75-millimeter field pieces pointblank at the rebels, inflicting numerous casualties and broke the rebellion temporarily. Two of the leaders were before firing squads shortly afterward.

Others Not Quiet

Meantime, Spanish-American communities in the new world were not without their events.

Cuba, the island republic just off Florida, again was placed under virtual martial law as student disorders increased and oppositionists clamored for a change of administration. President Machado has power to maintain military control for 60 days under authority similar to that in which he suspended constitutional guarantees last month in Havana for 30 days.

Chile Has Unrest

In Chile, where an attempted revolt was quashed at the city of Concepcion Sept. 21, fourteen men, students, professors, merchants and lawyers, arranged to bomb the railroad train returning President Carlos Ibanez and a group of high officials from the southern part of the country to Santiago. They were killed because the fifteenth man in their plot was a government secret service operative.

France went through a cabinet crisis of nine days before a minority finally was assembled under leadership of Theodore Steeg. After the government of Andre Tardieu was overthrown in the senate, three others were offered the job of establishing a cabinet. Raymond Poincaré, former premier, declined on the ground of weak health. Pierre Laval and Louis Barthou attempted the task but were unable to succeed because of the opposition of various groups of leaders, whom both desired in a cabinet post. Steeg, a radical-socialist, eventually chose a list, but politicians believed it doubtful if he could hold on in the chamber of deputies.

Breussing Holds On

But in Germany Chancellor Heinrich Brüning, backed in his stringent financial program by President Paul von Hindenburg, held on despite heavy attacks by the opposition—Pascals, Communists and Nationalists—and adjourned parliament until February.

With the certainty now of remaining in office for a time, Dr. Brüning can put into action his long-tangled financial program.

Young fascists at the same time won a victory over the motion picture "All Quiet on the Western Front," which was made from a German book by a German-American in Hollywood and chronicled the life of the German private in the World war.

The fascists protested on the ground that the film preached pacifism and distorted the character of the German soldier. After a series of demonstrations the film board banned further showing of the picture.

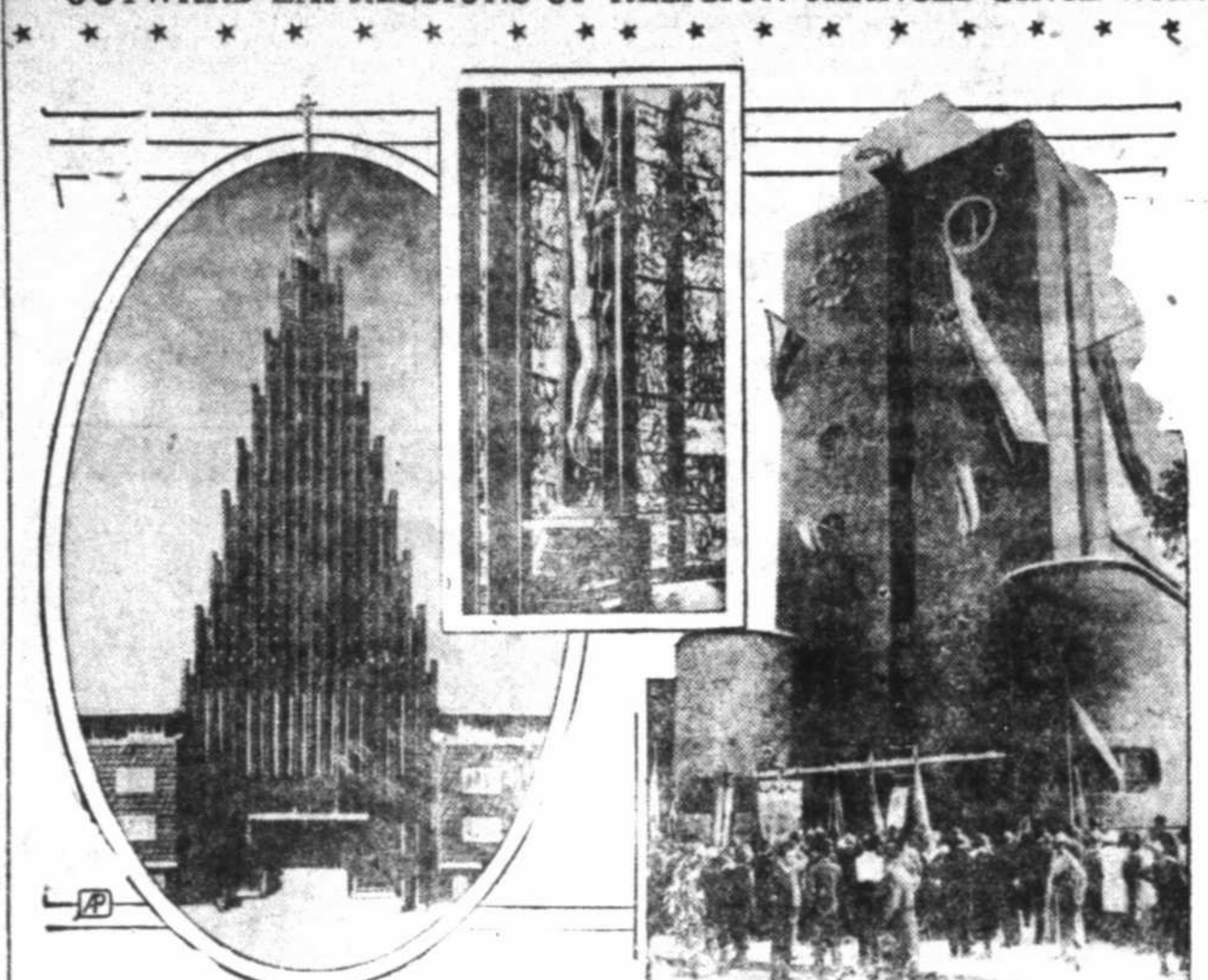

GERMANY'S CHURCH DESIGNERS MODERNISTIC IN BUILDINGS; OUTWARD EXPRESSIONS OF RELIGION CHANGED SINCE WAR

COLOGNE, Ger., Dec. 12.—Germany, modernistically minded in politics, has likewise become modernistic in outward expressions of religion since the 1918 overthrow of the empire.

Actually the broad changes in religious belief in America since 1880 have been just as revolutionary as anything of the kind in Germany but here the break with the old church architecture as well as in time tenets has been expressed in pulpits utterances.

German ecclesiastical organizations view with complacency what many American churchmen would regard as first-degree architectural heresy. The German idea appears to be that neither medieval nor nineteenth century church architecture was literally inspired, and that the architect designing a church in 1900 may depart radically from precedent without convicting himself or his ecclesiastical clients of irreverence.

Nothing could be more radically different from the mosaics and stained glass windows of old familiar churches, for instance than the modernistic murals of Cologne's Mechternkirche.

In the rebuilt Mechternkirche are murals by Peter Hecker in which conventionally winged angels jostle cogwheels of modern industry. In them too, the familiar figures of Biblical history mingle with post-war sidewalk crowds, the women walking on high heels and men wearing wing collars and hard hats.

A little farther down the Rhine the steel of modern industry is even more evident in ecclesiastical architecture. In Essen, famous wartime munitions center, there was dedicated recently a new Evangelical church all glass and steel with pulpits of wrought metal, and a metal crucifix that has been called "Christ Among the Girders."

And in Dortmund, which is also in the heart of industrial Germany, the new Petri-Nikolaus-Kirche is of steel and concrete with a tall, angular tower symbolic of the steel-and-concrete age.

Berlin, too, has its modernistic churches also Leipzig and other German cities. In Leipzig for example is the church of St. Boniface, built in memory of members of the union of Catholic merchant employees, who fell in the war.

Not everyone will admit that the modernistic churches of Germany are beautiful, and perhaps some of the congregations themselves are grown tired of them in time. But out of them may grow a new and significant architectural form. If not, it won't be because the German architects failed to try.

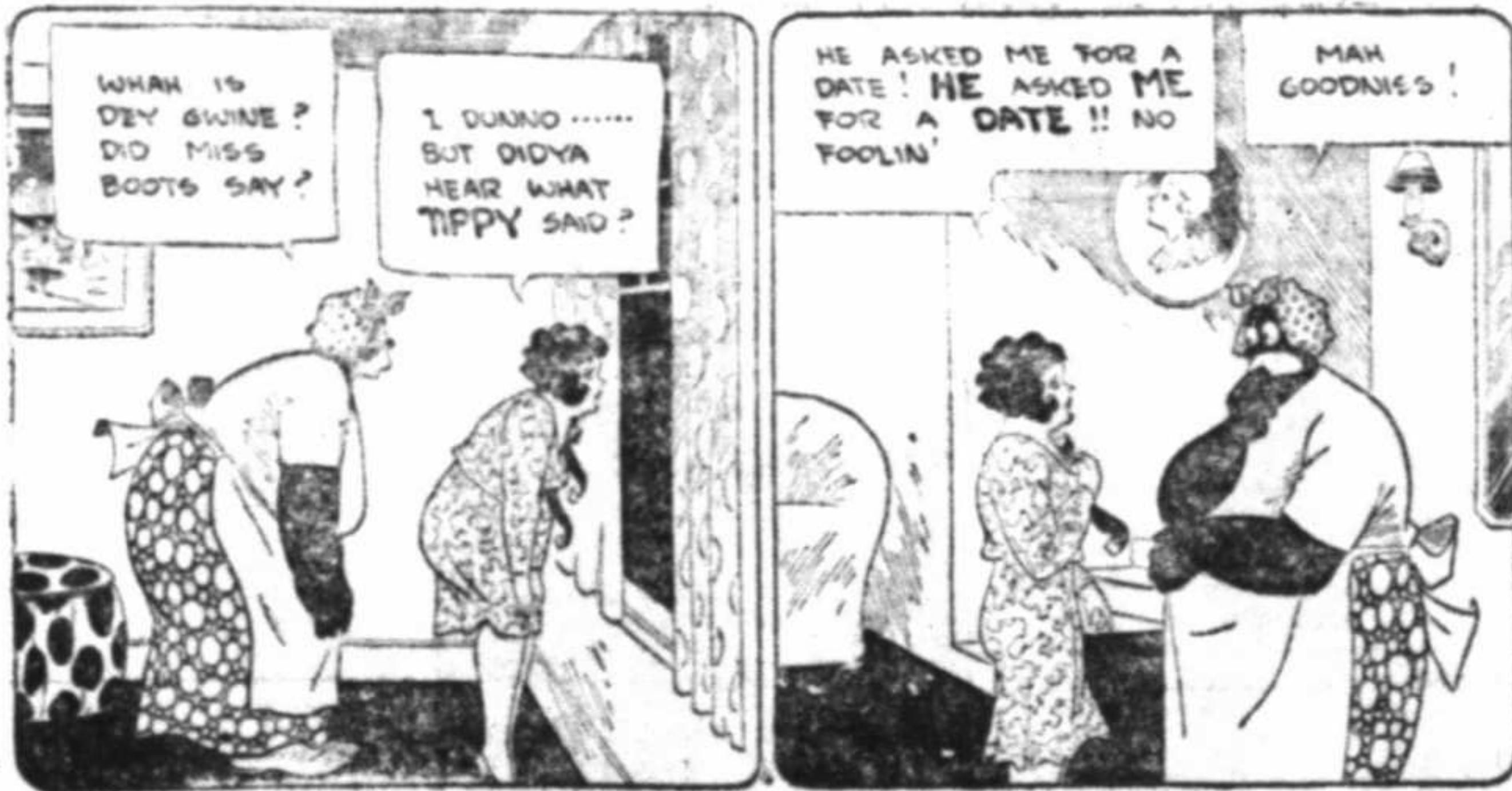

DEPORTATION OF TONY
'MOPS' VOLPE IS
CONSIDERED

CHICAGO, Dec. 16.—The government has stepped into the fight to rid Chicago of its gangster element. Tony 'Mops' Volpe, bodyguard of Alphonse Capone and ranked as second only to Capone as a public enemy, was the first subject of attack. His deportation to Italy as an undesirable alien was considered.

Volpe was taken to the detention bureau and held in \$10,000 bonds, despite his protest of American citizenship. Almost simultaneously a report became current that the activities of a score of alien gangsters were under surveillance of immigration authorities.

Volpe's conviction in 1923 in connection with a \$1,000,000 counterfeit war savings stamp plot was made the basis for the warrant. Volpe, who came to America when 15 years old, was naturalized a few years later, but the government charged he had made false statements in his application for citizenship.

Pershing made him a captain for his heroism and named him to serve in headquarters.

INCREASE ORDERED

HELSINGFORS, Finland, Dec. 16.—The Finnish diet had passed an amended bill to increase the percentage of alcohol in beer from 14, which is the limit under the present law, to 22.

In 23 days this season a Scotch fishing trawler caught in Greenland waters 28 tons of halibut and more than eight tons of cod, the catch being sold for \$7,780.

Two Back In Prison

Officials were recently successful in returning to prison George 'Red' Barker, alleged labor racketeer, and James 'Fur' Sammons for alleged offenses which occurred years ago. Agents of the immigration bureau predicted that within another month Volpe would be aboard a steamer bound for Italy.

CRUDE OUTPUT IN U. S. INCREASED

TULSA, Okla., Dec. 16.—(Special)—Daily average crude oil production in the United States increased 13,342 barrels in the week ended December 13, totaling 2,240,278 barrels, the Oil and Gas Journal estimates. It was the first increase in several weeks.

Oklahoma led in the upward movement with a gain of 17,819 barrels that placed the state's output at 409,335. The Oklahoma shift accounted for an increase of 3,613 barrels in the production of the midcontinent area, decreases being the rule in other sections of the area. The total midcontinent average, including light and heavy gravity oils, was 1,145,681 barrels. Texas Panhandle production was 71,865 barrels, a drop of 4,670. West Texas had a decline of 4,373 with 262,198 barrels, and Kansas production was down 1,500 barrels, an increase of 12,570.
