## CITY STRESSES PAVING WORK

**TWENTY-THREE BLOCKS ARE LAID IN 1930; TOTAL IS SHOWN**

With completion of the south Avenue H paving project in Lubbock valuation of city paving will total near the one and three-quarter million mark, according to estimates revealed by city officials this morning.

During 1930 some twenty-three blocks, or 38,400 square yards of paving have been laid in the city at a cost of \$118,000. This figure does not include any work of two mammoth underpasses, one located on Broadway and the other on Avenue H. An addition of some \$400,000 for these two projects would make the 1930 program in excess of \$1,200,000. This figure is a trifle more than was expended in 1929, the banner paving year since 1920.

Other work not included in the above figure also does not include the widening of three blocks on Avenue H and the paving of one block on Avenue O, plans for which are being drawn at this time for immediate construction.

First paving in the City of Lubbock was laid in 1920 when 20 blocks or 55,600 square yards were constructed. Total cost at that time was \$194,767.18. A great majority of the paving in that first year was of course laid around the court house square. The project included six

## REPUBLICANS PLEA FOR TEXAS UNITY

FORT WORTH, Oct. 21. (P)—A plea for unity in an effort to elect a Republican governor of Texas was before Republicans of the state today after a meeting of party workers here.

Captain J. F. Lacey of Dallas, campaign manager for Colonel W. E. Talbot of Dallas, gubernatorial candidate, told the meeting yesterday a Republican governor could be elected by the expenditure of \$60,000 in legitimate campaign. Capt. Lacey asserted President Hoover was faced with more determined opposition than any other president except those of war periods and called upon Republicans to stand firmly behind him. ### ONE MAN DEAD, ANOTHER IS INJURED

OFFICERS QUESTIONING TWO FOLLOWING CAR ACCIDENTS HERE

Whether or not charges will be filed against Robert Logan, 23-year-old Sweetwater youth, in connection with the accidental death of R. E. Branscum, 55, of Hamlin, on the highway between Lubbock and Slaton Monday night, had not been determined by county officials at noon today. Questioning of witnesses and of Logan was going forward today and County Attorney Vaughn E. Wilson stated that some action probably will be taken in the early afternoon.

Attendants at the West Texas hospital stated this morning that there is slight chance that he is resting only "fairly well."

Branscum died a few minutes after being brought to a local sanitarium last night. His body was prepared for burial by Byrum-Merrag funeral home and sent overland this morning to Hamlin where funeral services will be conducted Wednesday afternoon.

The fatal accident occurred nine miles south of Lubbock shortly after 7 o'clock last night, after Branscum had stopped his truck. He was heading toward Lubbock, at request of two highway patrolmen, Jack Reeves and J. L. Croft, who had noted the truck and.

## 'BUGS' MORAN IS ARRESTED

FORMER GANG LEADER HELD IN WAUKEGAN, ILLINOIS, TODAY

WAUKEGAN, Ill., Oct. 21.—George (Bugs) Moran, former North Side gang leader and rival of Al Capone, was arrested today at Cassidy's Roadhouse, 15 miles west of here. Moran, also known as a constable and five private operatives surprised him, offered no resistance.

Moran was hustled to Waukegan where he was held in \$50,000 bonds on a vagrancy charge. Col. A. V. Smith, state's attorney for Lake county, said that a charge of carrying concealed weapons would also be lodged against Moran. TRIP OVER SECTION TO BE MADE ON WAY TO SAN ANGELO

Preparatory to starting a tour of South Plains counties early Wednesday with subsequent arrival at San Angelo Thursday for a turkey grading school being held in that city this week, twenty-five county agents of district No. 2, together with three specialists from Texas A. and M. college will gather in Lubbock tonight, according to announcement this morning by Sterling C. Evans, district agent.

Wednesday night will be spent in Sweetwater with last lap of the trip being made Thursday morning.

In addition to the specialists and agents who will make the trip, W. B. Lee of Amarillo, district key banker of the Texas Bankers' association, also will be included in the group.

## Schacht Says Germany's Trade Needs Aid Or She Must Forego Payments

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, former president of the Reichsbank in an address before the Foreign Policy Association last night said unless other countries help Germany to extend her foreign trade she will be forced to proclaim a moratorium on reparations payments.

He predicted the time would come when Germany's creditors would realize that the collection of reparations payments was less profitable than Germany's commercial competition and then would be ready to open the entire question. He asserted that under present circumstances Germany cannot continue to pay reparations.

SCHACHT STATEMENT IS UNDER PROBE WASHINGTON, Oct. 21. (P)—The statement by Dr. Hjalmar Schacht in New York that Germany would be forced to declare a moratorium on reparations payments unless other countries helped extension of her foreign trade was examined from various viewpoints today in Washington.

The former president of the Reichsbank, whose comment was made last night before the Foreign Policy association, had been in touch with President Hoover, Secretary Mellon and Secretary Stimson during the day. White House officials said the visit with the president was a formal call only and no German-American problems were discussed. His talk with Mr. Mellon also lasted but a few minutes, and was said at the treasury to have been purely personal. The same was said of the talk with Mr. Stimson.

Another feature of the evening will be an old fashioned sing-song viewed by Henry W. Morgan, of Plainville. An old-fashioned contest also will be held.

## HUNDRED MAY BE DEAD IN GERMANY

THIRTY INJURED, 100 TRAPPED IN SHAFT BY EXPLOSION

(By The Associated Press) BERLIN, Oct. 21.—Possibility that 100 or even more miners had lost their lives in a dynamite explosion in the Anna coal mine at Aldorf was admitted by the management of the mine this evening after fifty dead had been brought out of the wrecked shaft. Thirty were injured.

BERLIN, Oct. 21. (P)—Threatful Prussian government press bureau announced tonight that approximately 100 men perished in the disaster which occurred today in the Anna coal mine at Aldorf. Bodies recovered numbered 33 at the time the statement was issued.

At that hour there were approximately 60 dead underground and 76 injured in a hospital. The deaths of four of these this afternoon brought the total to 100.

and over 100 trapped in the mine. The victims were buried in the wreckage spread by the blast through two levels 1,200 and 1,500 feet below the surface. Among the victims were two office workers killed when buildings above ground collapsed.

Reports Disputed The Prussian trade ministry this afternoon dispelled earlier reports of much more serious losses with the explanation that when the workers who escaped fled from the mine they dashed straight for their

## JEWS PROTEST BRITISH ACT

POLICY ON HOLY LAND MAY CAUSE U. S. TO GET ZIONIST SEAT

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Oct. 21.—Zionist Jewry the world over today voiced protests at conditions in the new statement of British policy in Palestine which they consider will impede their purpose of making the Holy Land a national home for Jews.

Dr. Chaim Weizmann, resigning his position as president of the World Zionist organization and the Jewish agency, to emphasize his opposition to the policy, intimated that because of its inauguration it might be necessary to transfer the seat of Zionist activity from London to the United States.

Meeting Called He called a meeting of the political commission of the Zionist organization in London for November 3 to discuss the entire matter.

## ESCAPED TEXAS CONVICT IS ASKING FOR CLEMENCY AFTER TWELVE YEARS OF FREEDOM; WIFE ENTERS HIS PLEA

(By The Associated Press) AUSTIN, Oct. 21.—His twelve years of freedom ended, James L. Doolan, convicted of perjury in Fort Worth in 1918 and sentenced to five years imprisonment, today was a petitioner for executive clemency.

The petition was sent the governor by Doolan's wife, to whom he was married ten months ago, failing to tell her that he was a fugitive from justice.

Doolan escaped from the central prison farm after nine months imprisonment, roamed over the southern and eastern part of the nation, tried to enlist for the World war, worked in a munitions factory and finally returned to Houston and was married ten months ago.

After his return to Texas he made two trips to Austin to ask Governor Moody for clemency for a brother.

## SPECIAL MEET IS ASKED BY DELEGATION

WEST TEXANS DECLARE 400 CITIZENS TO BACK UP PLEA

(By The Associated Press) AUSTIN, Oct. 21.—A delegation of about twenty-five West Texas bankers and business men, characterized as the advance guard of a possible army of 400 substantial citizens, called upon Governor Dan Moody today to ask a special session of the legislature to appropriate relief funds for drouth-stricken West Texas counties.

Guy Dabney, president of the Eastland County Bankers association, said if this delegation failed to sway the governor, he would muster citizens from fifty or sixty West Texas counties and bring a delegation of 400 to 500.

Small Is Along Senator Clint Small of Wellington, although not a member of the committee, was here to accompany the committee in its call on the governor. Dabney had a telegram from Senator Pink Parrish, Lubbock, declaring he was "100 per cent behind" the committee, and that the state was the only source of relief.

The committee asked the governor for an immediate session. Dabney and his associates declared conditions had placed the farmers on the verge of disaster. He exhibited a Texas letter which he sent Saturday to banks in 34 counties reading excerpts from it as follows:

"At the desk and in the lobby of every country bank in the area there stands today a long waiting and patient line of John Does (desperate farmers), hopeful yet discouraged, trying to determine how they can carry on."

"Shall the bankers of this unfortunate section, hoping to get relief from congress, sit idly by un-

CO-OP OFFICIAL PAYS VISIT TO LEVELLAND OFFICE TODAY

Lawrence Westbrook, of Dallas representative of the American Cotton Cooperative association in Texas, arrived in Lubbock this morning, but left almost immediately for Levelland from which place he will visit other offices of the Texas Cotton Cooperative association in the Lubbock district.

According to Charles M. Davis, manager of the Lubbock office of the association, Mr. Westbrook is planning a visit to practically all branch offices in this section.

More than 25,000 bales of cotton had been handled by Texas Cotton Cooperative association of offices in this district when the stations closed last Saturday night, Mr. Davis said. Total bales received at the Lubbock office this season totaled about 7,200 at the end of the week.

Mr. Davis advises that farmers should keep plowing out of the fields until the cotton is thoroughly dry. Most of them have done so, he indicated, but a few have attempted to pick cotton still damp as a result of rains, which caused much of the cotton to stain and made picking difficult. Picking before the cotton is thoroughly dry inevitably results in a loss of \$5 to \$10 an each bale, Mr. Davis said.

## CONSUMPTION OF MILK IN LUBBOCK IS ABOVE AVERAGE

Consumption of milk in the city of Lubbock is 23 per cent more daily than that of the average Texas city, according to a statement this morning by H. E. Hargis, district sanitary engineer who last week conducted an inspection of Lubbock dairies for the purpose of grading the plants.

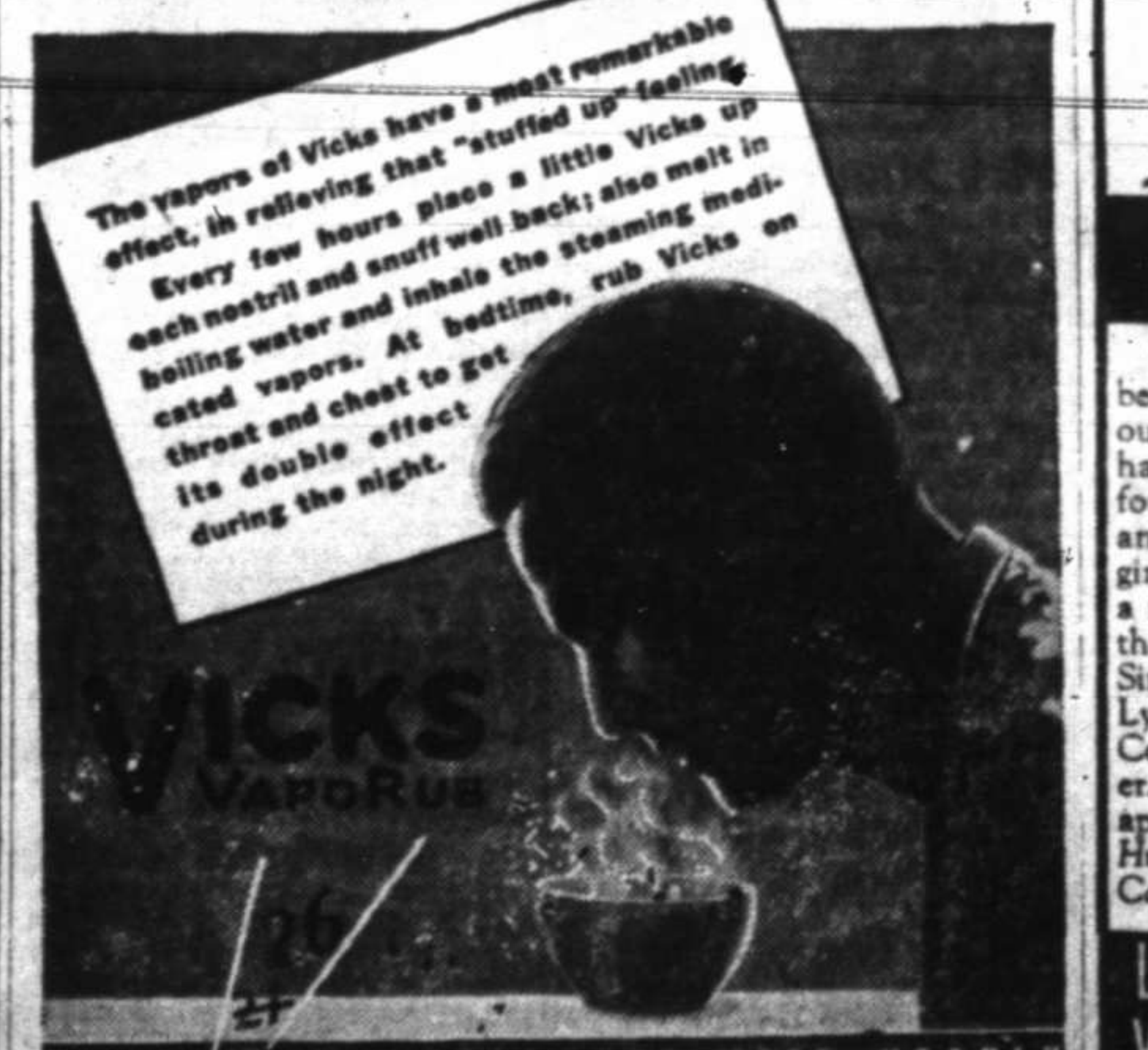
Mr. Hargis attributed the greater consumption here to the fact that Lubbock has a large number of extra good raw milk dairies, all serving a large citizenship.

Thirty dairies were inspected by the engineer last week in company with Dr. Y. J. Aiken of the city health department. Each of these visited are in excellent condition according to the report.

Actual consumption of milk in the city is 1,800 gallons daily or 8 of a pint per capita. Average for other Texas cities has been set at .65 of a pint. The survey also revealed that this amount was coming from 292 cows.

## JAKE FLEAGLE'S SWEETHEART SOUGHT TO SAVE HIS LIFE BY GETTING HIM TO SURRENDER ON FEDERAL CHARGES

(By The Associated Press)  
DENVER, Oct. 21. — A woman sought to save Jake Fleagle's life, a woman whom he met in Grand Junction, Colo., several years ago. She failed at the moment she was extending her efforts to bring him to justice in the hope that he would be sentenced to life imprisonment, postal authorities said today.

She is Beatrice Holden, Fleagle's sweetheart. From her he took one of his several aliases—William Holden—and the two were together intermittently from 1924, until she talked over with federal authorities this year the possibility of getting him to surrender to the United States district attorney at San Francisco.

Postal authorities represented her

as feeling that if Fleagle would be induced to "take the rap" in the form of a penitentiary sentence for violation of the postal laws, he could escape the noose in Colorado for participating in the bloody Lamar bank robbery. They made her no promises, they said, but told her the federal government would have first claim on Fleagle if he surrendered.

Another Spectacular War Over Electric Power Expected  
When Congress Reconvenes, Correspondent Dutcher Says

BY RODNEY DUTCHER

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—The  
war over electric power, to which  
the general public pays little atten-  
tion but which is almost constantly  
in progress here, is a spectacular  
affair after congress reconvenes  
in December. It always does.



Foes of the  
"power trust" are  
intensely excited  
over a recent ruling  
by Attorney General  
Mitchell which they believe  
virtually nullifies  
the effect of the  
federal water  
power act under  
which the government exercises  
certain control over water power  
sites on navigable streams, which  
are under federal jurisdiction.

This opinion, rendered to Presi-  
dent Hoover after it had originally  
been sought by Executive Secretary  
F. E. Bonner of the Federal Power  
Commission, held that the com-  
mission had the right to issue  
"minor project" licenses for power  
sites on the New River in Virginia  
to the Appalachian Power Com-  
pany of New York, a subsidiary of  
Electric Bond & Share.

The commission could do this by  
declaring the New River to be non-  
navigable. It has always been con-  
sidered navigable. With a license  
for a "minor project" the power  
company would escape inspections  
of accounts and other provisions of  
the water power act which were de-  
signed to safeguard the interests of  
the public when power sites were  
turned over to private interests.

Fear Result  
It is charged that if the power  
commission now sets such a pre-  
cedent in the New River case, federal  
control over about 90 per cent of  
the people's power sites will be de-  
stroyed, including nearly all large  
projects in the east.

termining the capitalization of  
each power development, which is

## Diet and Health

DR. CLENDENING WRITES  
OF MOTHER'S FOOD NEEDS  
Nature has provided for the in-  
creased nutritional needs of the ex-  
pectant mother. Although we do not  
understand the exact processes, it  
seems undoubtedly true that  
more of the food  
is utilized by the  
mother's body  
than under nor-  
mal circum-  
stances. This is  
especially known  
to be true of the  
pregnant state.

If an insufficient amount of food  
is eaten the babies are born normal  
in weight, and the mothers lose  
weight, showing that the child tends to be  
protected at the expense of the  
mother's tissues.

If the mother eats an unne-  
cessarily large amount of food, both  
the baby and the mother are over-  
weight. There is no doubt that with-  
in certain limits the size of the  
baby is dependent on the amount of  
food eaten. Dr. J. Morris Simons  
notes: "It is said that children born  
in times of famine are frequently  
delivered prematurely, or if mature  
they are small and puny."

The "within certain limits," men-  
tioned above, however, has a definite  
meaning. The general size and  
form of the child are going to be de-  
termined by factors that are inher-  
ent in its germinal cells—by heredi-  
tary, the size and weight of the par-  
ents, and possibly by the condition  
of the ductless glands of the moth-  
er. Certain conditions of the duct-  
less glands of the body also may  
influence weight, especially pre-  
disposing to overweight babies.

Details of dietary adjustment will  
be considered tomorrow.

Brookhart Up In Arms  
Senator Brookhart of Iowa has  
written the power commission,  
warning it to "go slow." An \$5,000,  
horsepower development is no  
minor project, he says; especially  
when—as in the Appalachian case—  
it would create a navigable lake  
30 miles long.

"This is a tremendously im-  
portant proposition," Brookhart  
says. "I am sure that Congress  
will want to amend the law and  
stop this matter of minor permits  
in all such cases."

There are about 20 acts of Con-  
gress treating the New River as  
navigable. Appropriations have  
been made and money spent time  
and again to "improve its naviga-  
bility."

The National Popular Govern-  
ment League has sent out a broad-  
side to its members over the coun-  
try, attempting to stir up protests  
to the power commission against  
any decision to declare the New  
River non-navigable. It under-  
stands that Secretary of the In-  
terior Ray Lyman Wilbur, chair-  
man of the commission, is ready to  
go ahead and do that. Secretary of  
War Hurley and Secretary of Agri-  
cultural Hygiene, the other two mem-  
bers, have not made their attitude  
known, although Hyde is thought to  
be opposed.

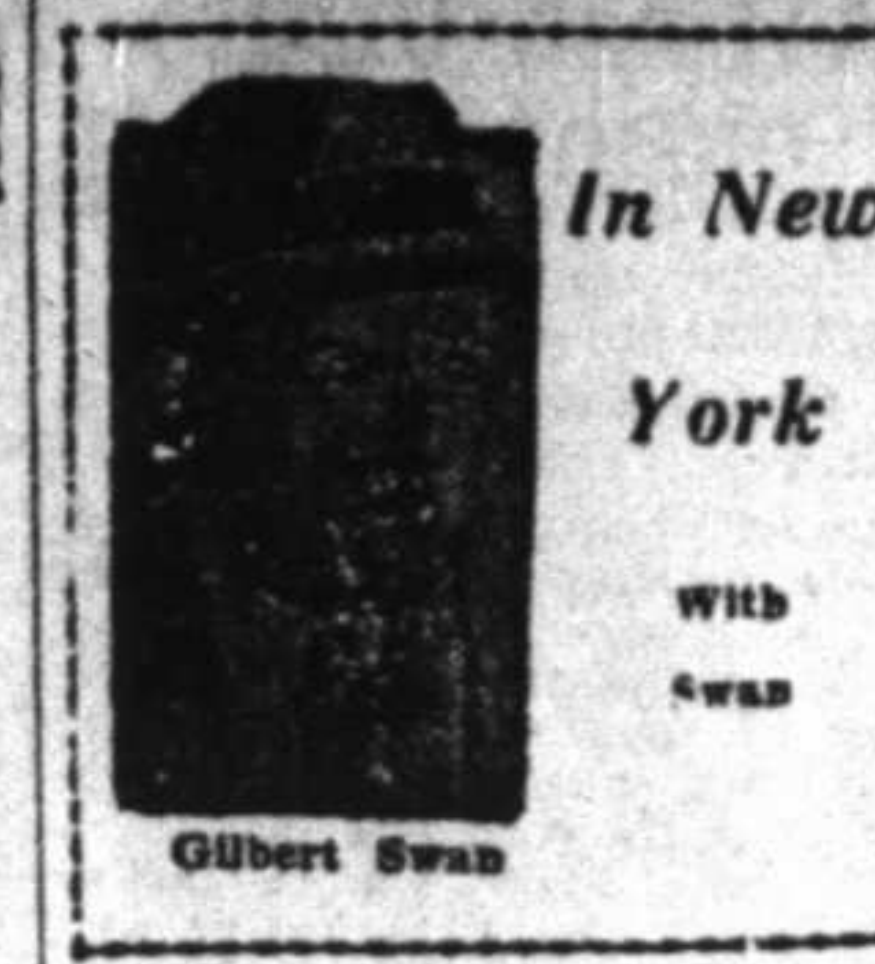

## LEGGE'S STATEMENT GETS RETORT

KANSAS LIVESTOCK SECRETARY HAS PROTEST  
ON CHAIRMAN LEGGE'S CRITICISM

TOPEKA, Oct. 21. (AP)—A recently published comment of Chairman Legge of the Federal Farm board that the average Kansas livestock man "would sooner see the cows die hungry than co-operate with anybody," today brought a retort from J. H. Mercer, secretary of the Kansas Livestock association.

Characterizing the remark made by Legge in a letter to M. A. Limbicker, Emporia, chairman of the Kansas drought relief committee, as "wholly unwarranted," Secretary Mercer in a letter addressed to the farm board chairman said he considered it "an affront upon the intelligence of Kansas farmers and livestock producers."

"Kansas stockmen are a patient and indulgent lot," Mr. Mercer's letter said. "They have rallied to the support of the Federal Farm Board since its beginning and have repeatedly taken the initiative in efforts to co-operate with the board. Instead of censure, they are justly entitled to your highest commendation."

The disposition of our farmers generally has been most generous in that they wished to extend every opportunity to the farm board to succeed. It is only reasonable after more than 15 months in operation that they should now expect some definite

results because the act itself is a splendid piece of legislation, which, if properly administered, will prove most beneficial to American agriculture, but as I contended with the law, was passed, it's success depends upon the personnel of the board."

Employees To Lose  
But Retain Jobs

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 21. (AP)—Employees of the Kansas City Southern railroad will lose a day's pay a week so that all may retain their jobs. C. E. Johnston, president, announced the plan today. Johnston said he favored the idea in order that no employees may be laid off in the face of reduced freight tonnage. "That will be the rule for everyone in the organization, from the president down to the trackmen," he said. The employees would not be required to work on the payless day, the rail chief said.

New Tabloid Shows  
Up In Washington

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21. (AP)—A new tabloid newspaper appeared today in the capital. It bore the title "Washington" and described itself as a "journal of information and public opinion concerning the operations of our national government."

NEW YORK PLANS  
FOR EMPLOYMENT

NEW YORK, Oct. 21. (AP)—To provide 10,000 idle men with jobs during the winter, a number of financial and business leaders have pledged themselves to raise a \$150,000 payroll weekly.

Meeting at the offices of Steward Prosser, chairman of the board of the Bankers Trust company, the group formed an emergency employment committee to raise the money which will be distributed through the charity organization society and the association for improving the condition of the poor.

Miss Ann Kempehall, superintendent and assistant director of the charity organization society, said arrangements have already been made with the department of parks to supply 3,000 to 5,000 men for work in the parks of Manhattan, the Bronx and Brooklyn, and that other work would be found.

Park employees would be paid \$3 a day, she said, on a five-day week basis, giving each man \$15 a week, the lowest wage charity organizations consider possible for a family to live in New York.

## BAYLOR LOOMS AS THREAT FOR TITLE

### MASON MISSED SADLY IN WACO SATURDAY; WILSON IS STAR

DALLAS, Oct. 21 (AP)—It will be some time before the Southwest conference sees a "fighting exhibition" than that put on by the Baylor Bears Saturday, when they came from behind to score two touchdowns and the Southern Methodist's famed aerial circus, 14 to 14.

There might have been a "time" no later than last year, when the Bears were justified in questioning the Bruins' fighting spirit. To Mean A Lot The fact is likely to mean a lot before the current campaign is over. With their present fiery attitude, the Baptists are a very dangerous set of young men, capable of defeating any team that tackles them in the playful spirit the Mustangs did. It never seemed to occur to the pouncing Methodists that they were poking at a Hornets' hacienda until they were badly stung. But for several tough breaks, such as Pierce dropping a pass in his arms across the goal line, the Bears might have won by a decisive margin.

Wilson Still Greatest The game at Waco proved, among other things, that Wilson still is the southwest's greatest ball carrier in an open field, and that Southern Methodist has just another football team when "Speedy" Mason, halfback, and Malcolm Powell, center, are on the sidelines.

And unless Lubbock and Tech students and Tech faculty members do not change their methods of supporting their teams, they will soon be convinced that the coaches are no good.

What Tech needs is wholehearted support by her students. Lubbock business men and fans—a support that is with her win or lose, live or die—a college atmosphere that makes every coach who comes in contact with it hold up for the team and coaches. Tech will never have a great team until fans learn to stick behind the school when she is losing. And if so-called supporters will spend the same effort on the team that they spend cashing the sports editor, the team will be better off, and this applies to the fellow who wasted \$5 on the bet that you wouldn't publish his letter. ## CLASS A RACE FACES TEST

### LUBBOCK-AMARILLO LIKELY TO SETTLE AFFAIRS, NOV. 1

With the championship of Class A high school football of District 1 awaiting the outcome of the Lubbock-Amarillo game here November 1, the Lubbock High school Westerners rest at home this week after three weeks and three victories on the road. Neither will Amarillo engage in a conference battle this week, though a practice game with Central High of Fort Worth is in prospect for the Sandies.

Quannah's Indians, victors over Wichita Falls last week, are also idle this week with the other teams of the circuit engaging in conference games. Electra will meet the Bobcats at Childress, Wichita Falls tangles with its traditional foe, the Vernon Lions, and Plainview goes to Pampa for a game which should increase the Harvesters' standing average.

Amarillo, at the top of the ladder and in undisputed possession of first place by virtue of four straight victories, is closely followed by Lubbock with three victories and one loss. Vernon rates third with two wins and a loss, and Electra, Childress and Pampa are technical tied for fourth position with one win and one loss, except for Childress which has lost two and won two.

Virtually, however, Lubbock and Pampa are considered in a tie for second place. Five-season dope is being followed rather consistently in each of the other seven districts of the state. Cloco, Ranger, Abilene, and Breckenridge are leading the Oil Belt division with perfect records, though the Big Four will kill each other off this week-end.

## "ETERNAL VIGILANCE" OF PROHIBITION QUESTION URGED BY SPEAKER BEFORE DISCIPLES OF CHRIST ANNUAL SESSION

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—Urging the churches to "eternal vigilance" on the prohibition question, Dr. Alva W. Taylor of Vanderbilt University today told the International Convention of Disciples of Christ that "if we nap at the gate, the enemy will take it."

Taylor, one of the two secretaries of the disciples' board of temperance and social welfare, also asserted that educated negroes "will not tolerate our Uncle Tom attitude," and that unless the race question is dealt with "there is serious trouble ahead."

To Miss Issues Discussing unemployment and world peace, he said, "if Christian conscience can not operate on these questions, it must miss the crucial issues of this civilization."

About 7,000 members of the convention cheered Taylor's speech. A printed report by the board, scheduled for action today, was held over by the committee.

It discussed prohibition among other things. "Most of the wet propaganda is from the same old sources," Taylor said. "Eternal vigilance is the price of righteousness as well as of liberty, and if we nap at the gate, the enemy will take it. We must rouse the church to this fact."

Negroes To Rise Up "The educated negro will not stand for our Jim Crowism," Taylor continued. "As greater numbers become educated, a suppressed flame is fed, and it may burst into explosion. They are printing their own papers and magazines and reading them—and the average among us does not know what is in them. But they read our newspapers, and they know what we think. This new negro is growing in self-respect. He will not tolerate our Uncle Tom attitude, and unless we appreciate this, understand and deal with it, there is serious trouble ahead."

## CAMPBELL ASKS AID FROM U. S.

MONTANA GROWER AND ADVISER FOR SOVIET HAS STATEMENT

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—Declaring there was only an "imaginary" surplus of wheat because of the huge shortage of other grains, Thomas D. Campbell, Montana wheat grower and adviser to the Soviet government in its five year economic program, appealed today for direct financial aid from the federal treasury to "correct this abnormal balance."

In a statement on the world wheat situation issued after conferences with President Hoover and Chairman Legge of the Federal Farm Board, Mr. Campbell denounced critics of the board, minimized the effect on prices of Russian exports and hedging on the Chicago market, and asked that "we reverse ourselves and think positively, not negatively, about general business conditions."

To See Increases "I expect to see a big increase in the price of farm commodities," he said, "when we begin looking at our own situation and are not blinded by what some other country is doing."

Mr. Campbell said he had traveled thousands of miles in Russia recently inspecting state and collectivized farms and discussing the situation with officials of the grain trust.

"They all know that it will take them several years to increase their production to equal their own growing requirements," he said, "but after three years every country in the world will feel the keen competition of Russian grain exports."

Meanwhile, our greatest competition is going to come from Canada, which exports from 250 to 300 million bushels per year.

Not 20,000,000 Campbell doubted Russian net exports this year would exceed 20,000,000 bushels, but said that even assuming it would be 60,000,000, it was "absurd to say that the present low price of wheat has been caused by this small addition to the world's exportable surplus of approximately 800,000,000 bushels and when the world produces, including Russia, almost four billion bushels of wheat."

"The decline in wheat started a year ago," he said, and "has been caused by many conditions, primarily by a world surplus of wheat with poor distribution and a determined and concentrated effort on the part of some organizations to discredit the Federal Farm Board and the Canadian wheat pool."

The world's production of wheat excluding Russia, averaged about three billion bushels, he said, with the average in the United States 50,000,000. The average turnover in the Chicago board of trade he placed at sixteen billion bushels a year and in all the grain markets of this country, eighteen billion bushels.

## Presbyterians For Fight Against Wets
