

THEIR LEADERS TELL HOW TO DO IT

These Small Towns Court Tourists - With Gusto!

So, you think this tourist business thing is something else the big cities have and little towns like ours can't do anything about it. Well, have a talk with Bernie Ayers or Gene Abbott or Forrest Armstrong.

Bernie Ayers is a preacher in Iran, a town of 1,200 people in deep West Texas, 14 miles from the nearest cross-country highway.

And all he has done is to organize his town's Chamber of Commerce; sell his community on the idea of tourism and, in the first few

months of his special appeal, attracted travelers from 156 cities in 22 states.

Gene Abbott is the manager for Lone Star Gas in Cisco, east on Interstate 20 about 115 miles.

His town is about like Colorado City, but 300 of its citizens have formed a task force for claiming tourists, small conventions, family reunions and weekenders by utilizing their lake, city property, country club and other assets.

Armstrong comes from a town larger than our com-

munity, but not much more and one also in the shadow of Fort Worth.

But the citizens of Weatherford, where Armstrong is a busy Chamber of Commerce manager, have organized a committee for tourism and gone to work first by educating 7,000 of their own citizens to the tourist attractions in their own yard.

Those three gents were among the 250 persons in Colorado City for First Annual Tourist Development Conference of West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

They spoke at the general session Friday morning in Civic House. Infact, they were the "hit" of the meeting, because they didn't talk in theories or generalities or ifs.

Instead, they reported the plain facts of how their towns are going out to get their share of the fastest growing industry in Texas.

"You've got to sell the sizzle," declared Ayers, who admits his hometown's best scenery is usually grassburs and goatheads.

How, then, is Iran, pull-

ing tourists into their town from main highway which are 14 and 30 miles away, when they don't have natural lakes or mountains or special historical points?

They are selling Ally Oop the comic strip character because Ally Oop's originator, once lived in Iran. It was all the idea of Ayers, the minister, and he sold it as the town's sizzle in a manner that his community accepted it enthusiastically, planned for it, then worked for it with optimism - not pessimism.

Now, children persuade their parents to stop at Iran to see a huge man-made 65-by-15-foot dinosaur. There is an Ally Oop top hat, too, big and tall with a slide down through the center for the kids.

The town throws in free swimming in the municipal pool and visits to its museum with localized artifacts.

"We figure if you get the children," Ayers told the crowd from the far stretches of West Texas, "then you get the adults," and the tourist money.

It is somewhat a different story at Cisco, according to Abbott, except for these two things - tourism and cooperative effort to go after the business.

Cisco, as anybody knows, has had its ups and downs economically speaking. But it was in the tourist business as long ago as 1921 when it used some of its oil boom money to finance bonds for building of Lake Cisco.

Through the years, though, the emphasis for tourism dwindled away.

until recently.

Three hundred of their citizens organized Lake Cisco Recreation Association and the association is leasing city-owned lake cabins, country club facilities, an old church and building on the lake, the town's huge outdoor swimming pool just below the lake and other properties.

They are going after the tourist business in every manner possible.

It is a realistic approach.

A lean muscular middleweight Duroc gilt, shown by 17-year-old Johnny Hines of Westbrook, won the grand championship Mitchell County 4-H & FFA Livestock Show's swine division.

Another middleweight, a Hampshire and shown by Junior Oden, 15, also of Westbrook, was judged reserve champion.

CHAMPIONSHIP awards in Friday afternoon judging at the county's 30th annual show was a repeat of

the Westbrook 4-H & FFA Show Monday when the two Westbrooks, High youths finished in the same one-two order.

Judge L. M. Hargrave of Texas Tech, who has been selecting the champions here for years, described the entire swine show as outstanding.

"THIS GRAND champion is certainly a creditable one," he told the show audience hiding in Mitchell County Agriculture Build-

ings from the worst sand storm in years.

"I don't like to pick a gilt for the championship," Hargrave continued, "but I just have to do it today."

"This is an outstanding pig and it will hang out the highest cut-out."

HINES, SON of Westbrook FFA teacher and Mrs. Pete Hines, won the middleweight blue ribbon with his gilt before claiming the grand championship.

The pig was bred by Herman Lorenz of Lubbock. Breeder for the reserve champion, shown by Oden, was A. A. Early of Coahoma.

Oden, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Oden and a 10th grade student at Westbrook High, also showed the blue ribbon heavyweight.

GEORGE SWEATT also of Westbrook, exhibited the blue ribbon light heavyweight pig, and Robert Jackson, another Westbrook student, showed the blue ribbon lightweight.

Dwayne Harris, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Harris and a 4-H competitor, was awarded the showmanship prize.

Best swine bred in Mitchell County was a Duroc shown by George Sweatt and bred by Pete Hines.

The Hines brothers hogged honors in the pin of three class with Johnny receiving the blue ribbon and Steve winning the reserve championship.

The 17-year-old Colorado High junior, exhibiting under the 4-H Club banner, earned both grand championship honors in the lamb division.

His top winners were a pair of Hampshires bred by Floyd Knight of Oklahoma.

In addition, Smith showed the best of three lambs in Class 3 - for Hampshires, Southdowns and others.

Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Smith of China Grove area, exhibited his champs as crisp, cold but clear weather greeted the show's second day after Friday's opening in severe sandstorm.

Judging in all classes of the lamb division required two hours 30 minutes of keen appraisal by L. M. Hargrave of Texas Tech.

Jeanne Smith, Loraine 4-H Club member, exhibited the first place lamb in the fine wool class while Mike Walker, Loraine Future Farmer, showed the No. 1 animal in the crossbred class.

Walker added to his honors when he was named top showman for the lamb exhibitors.

FIVE PERSONS ARE INJURED

6 Cars Pile Up In Smoke

QUICK ACTION by two drivers - a woman and an injured man - probably kept a highway pile-up in heavy smoke from becoming a tragedy Friday.

The smash-up of six vehicles two miles south of Colorado City's south city limits hospitalized four persons and sent another to emergency treatment.

TWO AMBULANCES, two fire trucks, five police cars and three wreckers rushed to the scene on State Highway 208 (to Robert Lee) to carry the injured and unscramble the wreckage.

Fire in cotton burs placed on farm land west of the

highway produced heavy smoke that blacked out the highway for 440 yards and caused the multiple collisions.

STATE HIGHWAY Patrolman Buddy Hertenberger said the pile up might have become even worse without additional cars and trucks

smashing into the wreckage except for Mrs. Nina De Lara and Arlen Ellis, who left their vehicles and ran through the rolling smoke to stop approaching traffic.

HERTENBERGER said the heavy smoke rolled over the highway, trapping the motorists in blackness.

Smoke was so thick that Hertenberger, after speeding to the wreck, attempted to drive into the smoke to the smashed cars, but had to back out.

"All I could see was my rear view mirror," the patrolman said.

Deputy Sheriff Forrest Smith ran through the smoke to be sure traffic was stopped on the south side. He was almost overcome, however, and barely made it into the open.

DRIVERS Saturday were not sure just how they all piled into each other, although patrolmen were checking paths on the vehicles to ascertain definitely the order of the crash.

However, the Thomason 1966 Ford was a total loss - wrecked by collisions front and back. The Thomason 1961 Mercury also was a total loss.

About \$200 was caused to the 1964 Chevrolet station wagon, parked by Mrs. De La Rosa and then hit by another vehicle.

Hines' 1965 Ford pickups had about \$300 damage and the 1966 GMC pickup driven by Ellis was a total loss as it was sideswiped. About \$300 damage resulted to the 1966 Rambler driven by Minyard.

MRS. DE LA ROSA and a woman companion ran through the smoke to the north side and began stopping traffic. The injured Ellis made it through the smoke to the south to stop a butane truck he knew would be approaching the wreck.

All vehicles in the smash-up were traveling north toward Colorado City, Hertenberger said.

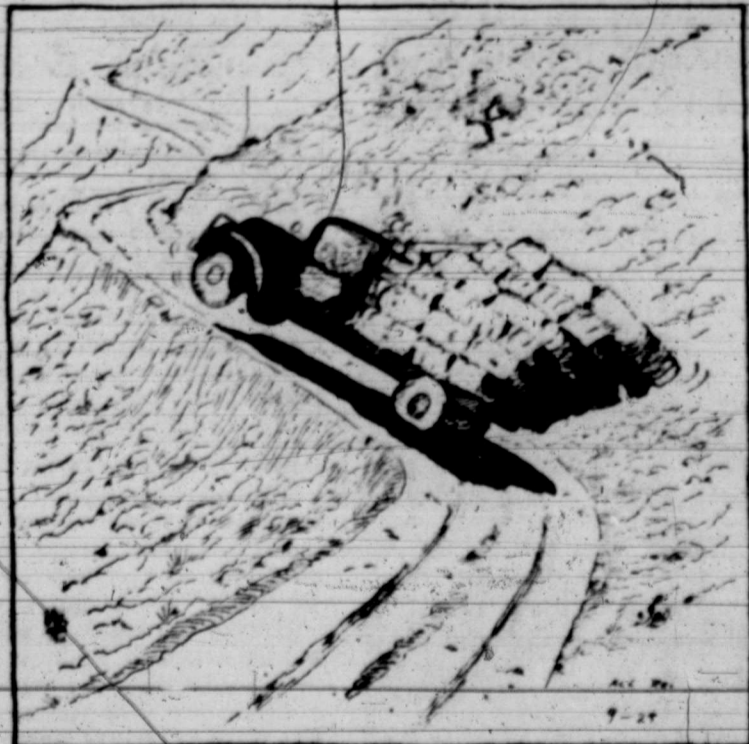

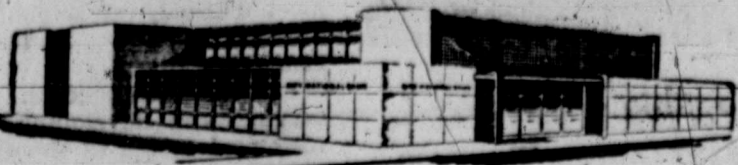

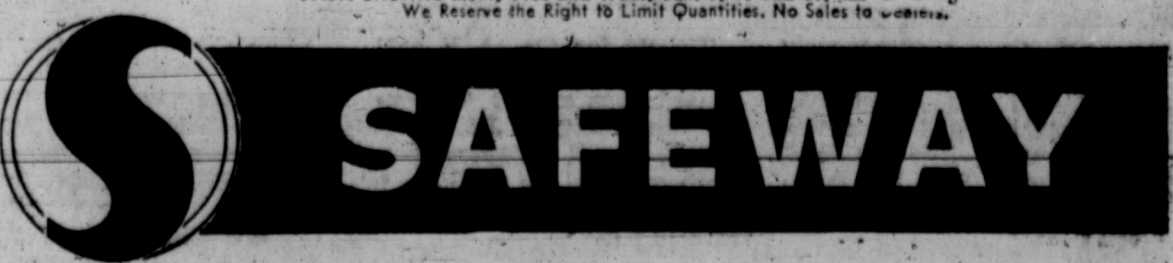

though, as Abbott pointed out here Friday. For instance, the association is after the family reunion business and last year 100 of these events, the large size, were booked by the association.

"We are bidding for small conventions and we are after the weekend trade, with package deals for lake recreation, golf and all the rest," Abbott said.

"We are going after our area high schools in the spring for their trips and outings to our park areas."

"And I'll tell you this, for sure — the citizens of our town are sold on tourism as a business."

Armstrong, the Weatherford chamber manager, flicked an electric switch to demonstrate with color slides how his community is in action to stop tourists and bank their dollars.

The big step forward, Armstrong said, was with the organizing of an aggressive tourist committee three years ago.

First step for the committee was to educate the community to its own attractions. And thus was born a story in color slides shown to more than 7,000 Parker County citizens to convince them they had assets other people would like to stop and see.

Right behind came 20,000 tourist guide maps placed in businesses all over town to show out-towners the easy routes to tourist attractions.

Attractions? Armstrong said Weatherford is pointing to its railroad museum, Chandler Gardens, a huge pean tree, rock museum, a house built 83 years ago and now restored, a toy and doll museum, a market for fruits and vegetables, annual rodeo and musical star Mary Martin's home.

Not too much out of the ordinary for any town, except the Chandler Gardens, which were developed by the late artist Douglas Chandler and now maintained as a civic enterprise. But even the gardens cover what originally was nothing more than the top of a bald caliche hill.

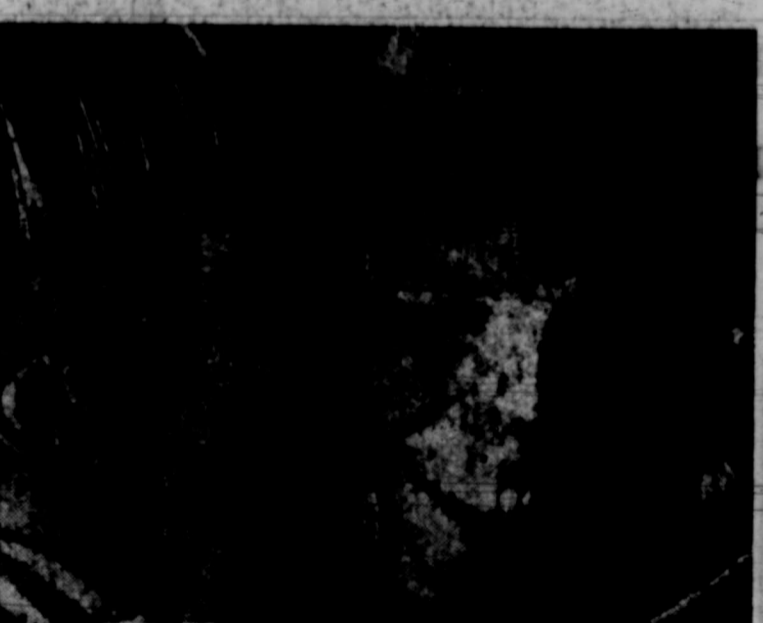

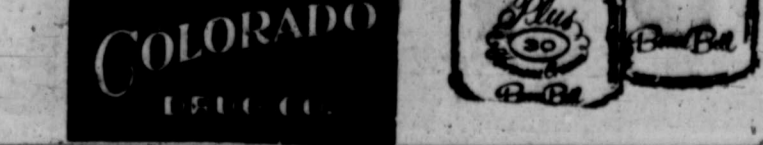
