

C-C PUSHES FAIR PLANS

CITY TO BUILD CALICHE ROAD TO OIL MILL

WORK UNDERWAY ON ROAD NORTH RAILROAD TRACK

Grading and Drainage To Be Followed By Caliche Base

According to Mayor L. R. Crockett, work will start Thursday on the road running from Oklahoma avenue, near the Peyton Packing plant, on the north side of Santa Fe railroad, extending alongside the present pumping plant, and the West Texas Cotton Oil mill, now under construction, to the north and south highway.

Grade and drainage work will be followed by the laying of a caliche base.

The expense of this improvement is being borne by the county and city, with some assistance from the WPA.

Mayor Crockett also stated that "something like 140 trucks daily would be loading in and out from the oil mill, and the operating of heavily loaded trucks on this road necessitated laying the caliche base. "This is the only concession given to the oil mill."

"This road will also be a great benefit to the travelling public, especially the farmers. It will save the farmers in crossing the railroad track twice in some cases."

R. W. DENT LOSES TIRES AND WHEELS THROUGH THEFT

FIRST BALE OF 1936 COTTON IS GINNED HERE

Brought To Littlefield By C. E. Pendergrass of Whitharral

The first bale of this year's cotton to be received in Littlefield was ginned Wednesday at the Lowmore and Irvin gin, and later sold at auction on Phelps avenue.

The bale was grown by C. E. Pendergrass on his farm one-half mile east of Whitharral, was classed as strict middling, weight 430 pounds, and was purchased in the auction sale at 12 cents per pound by Leonard Irvin of the Lowmore and Irvin gin. L. E. Key was the auctioneer.

A special committee of the Chamber of Commerce will consider the matter of gathering funds for the payments of a premium to Mr. Pendergrass.

The Pendergrass cotton is believed to be the first ginned in Lamb county this year.

Three bales produced in the Whitharral area this year, have been ginned. The first two were brought to the Gage Brothers gin, Whitharral, by Paul Larue, who lives two and one-half miles west of Whitharral.

Lamb County Is Claimed To Have Deposits Of Potash

AUSTIN, Sept. 2.—(Special to the Leader.)—The greatest treasure hunt in the history of Texas is underway from the Gulf to the Red river and from Louisiana to New Mexico.

Back of this unique search is the mineral resources committee, a unit of the Texas Panhandle board, which is seeking the location and character of every mineral deposit in the state.

Preliminary work reveals Texas to be exceedingly rich in minerals. Mineralogists in the employ of the committee have located and classified most of these minerals but in Lamb county there are deposits of potash which haven't been fully located.

Residents of Lamb county who know anything about these deposits can render a great service to the state by sending full information to the Texas Planning Board, Austin, Texas.

At a meeting of the fair committees of the various communities in Lamb county held at the office of Don Turner, county agent at Amherst, Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, it was decided to hold the county fair Thursday, Friday and Saturday, October 8, 9 and 10.

The fair will be held in the Union Compress warehouse buildings this year, consent being obtained Wednesday from Archie Underwood to use same.

WORLD CONSUMPTION OF COTTON REACHES AN ALL-TIME HIGH

In spite of upset conditions in world affairs and the fact that the world is not out of the depression, world consumption of all cotton reached a new all-time high of about 27,000,000 bales for the year ending July 31, 1936, Dr. A. B. Cox, director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research and widely known authority on cotton marketing, has pointed out.

"The United States furnished about 12,500,000 bales of the 27,000,000 and foreign countries 14,500,000 bales," he explained. "During the five pre-depression years the world consumed an average of 25,109,000 bales of all cotton. The United States furnished an average of 14,651,000 bales of that or 58.3 per cent, whereas foreign countries furnished only 10,458,000 bales."

COURT ORDER IS PASSED SETTING OUT PRECINCTS

Present Locations of Voting Boxes Approved Or Re-established

At the commissioners' meeting Monday, the court order was passed reestablishing the commissioners and Justice precincts in Lamb county.

The present locations of voting boxes of the county were either approved, or reestablished. All residents living north of Oklahoma avenue, passing up No. 7 highway and West First street will vote at Grammar school building; all south of that line at the city hall. The Bainier box will be discontinued. All Sudan will vote in South Sudan box. Spade, Hart's Camp and Fieldton boxes will remain with some changes in the lines.

AMOUNT CASH PAID FARMERS HIGHEST SINCE YEAR 1929

A cash income to farmers of \$735,000,000 in July, the largest recorded for any month since 1929, was reported by the department of agriculture.

The total included \$24,000,000 in government rental and benefit payments, but the \$711,000,000 of sales were well above the \$582,000,000 listed for June this year and the \$451,000,000 in July a year ago.

Sudan Man Suffers Injury When Truck Leaves Highway

W. T. Brown of Sudan suffered a slight concussion of the brain Friday morning about 9 o'clock, when the truck he was driving turned over into the ditch near Sudan. He was believed to have fainted when at the wheel, and lost control of the truck. He was found unconscious, and taken to the Littlefield hospital. He recovered following treatment, and returned home Friday night.

COUNTY FAIR IS DISCUSSED AT C. OF C. MEETING

Mayor Crockett Reports Passing Of Itinerant City Ordinance

The main topic of the monthly luncheon meeting of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce Tuesday noon was the Fall Fair, including a place in which to hold the event, most suitable date, and ways and means of raising the necessary funds to put the affair over.

Various dates were mentioned and suitable locations to hold the fair were suggested as the school bus sheds and Union Compress buildings. It was also suggested that tents be rented for this purpose.

Ed. McIver, manager of the Union Compress, was asked to get in touch with Mr. Underwood by telephone Wednesday morning, to get his consent to using the compress building.

A meeting of the Littlefield Fair committee with the various other fair committees in the county was announced to take place at Amhurst at 2 p. m. Wednesday, in connection with the fair prizes and other matters.

It was also reported that an effort was being made to have the county furnish \$200 to assist with the fair prizes, Littlefield to put up \$500 for premiums.

It is the plan to build permanent fair buildings next summer.

The fair committee is composed of Ed. McIver, J. C. Elms, Mayor L. R. Crockett, T. Wade Potter (W. J. Aldridge taking Mr. Potter's place, during his absence from the city), and Pat Boone.

Dr. Ira Woods reported on the softball tournament held the past week in Littlefield, in which he stated two protests had been made. He said he believed the tournament had brought a large number of people to Littlefield, and that business establishments such as cafes, drug stores, etc., had benefitted, and that it was his understanding that the tournament had paid for itself.

W. J. Cunningham reported they had not received word from the federal government in regard to the request of Lamb county to be allowed to harvest the Sudan grass on

Lone Gunman Escapes In Ford Tudor With \$2200 In Cash

The First National Bank of Sudan was robbed of \$2,200 by an unmasked, clean-shaven gunman at 10:15 o'clock Thursday morning, who is said to have escaped in a 1934 Ford Tudor sedan registered in Navarro county.

The gunman carried with him \$1,300 in \$20 bills, \$500 in \$5 bills \$350 in \$10 bills and about 50 \$1's. He had forced Assistant Cashier L. L. Anthony to pack the money into a grocery handbag.

COOPERATION IN AMERICA

A great deal is being written and said these days about Consumer Cooperatives. People are hearing about the great success of the cooperative movement in Great Britain and on the European continent, and are asking why cooperation won't work in America.

The answer is that it does and it doesn't.

Farm cooperatives, marketing associations whose members pool their products for sale, have been measurably successful in this country, especially since the Federal government began to give them financial aid under the Farm Marketing Act of 1929 and the Farm Credit Acts of 1933 and 1935. Nearly a quarter of the cash income of American farmers for the crop year of 1935 came from sales made through cooperative marketing associations, which did about a billion and a half dollars' of business.

In spite of all the efforts to build up such organizations and keep them going, their death-rate is still high. Out of some 25,000 organized since the Grange began the cooperative movement in the 1870's, more than 16,000 have died.

Consumer Cooperatives have a similar history. There are about 1,500 of them in operation in this country now. More than half are cooperative oil and gasoline distributors, many are buying groups for the cooperative purchase of certain limited classes of commodities. Somewhat under 500 are cooperative retail stores, with or without their own wholesale distributors.

All told, these Consumer cooperatives did about \$100,000,000 of business last year, of which about half was in oil and gasoline. The total represents about one-fifth of one percent of the nation's total business' turnover for the year. In England, where Consumer Cooperative Societies have been developing for nearly a century, they do about 15 percent of all retail trade. In Sweden the proportion is still higher.

President Roosevelt recently sent a commission to Europe to investigate and report on the operations of Consumer Cooperatives over there. This indicates a revival of interest in the whole subject.

POST WINS TITLE BUT LOSES

Spur's Protest Action Is Upheld By State Commissioner

The South Plains district Softball tournament, knee-deep in protest and dazed from so many played-over games, finally reached the semi-finals Tuesday night, legitimately, after Post's Centennials had been crowned district champs only to be thrown out at the order of Harold B. White, state commissioner.

So after Spur's point blank protests, two in fact, against Paul Corley, the Centennial's southpaw hurler who had the entire tournament on his hip, the Post team, all in a huff and ready to protest the decision of the state commissioner, is out as the district champ.

Corley Whiffs 'Em

In the finals Monday night in which Post, Lubbock, and Abertathy played before a capacity crowd just for the fun of playing, the two fine pitched games turned in by Corley were thrown out Tuesday morning. To top it all off, Lubbock was declared ineligible for playing Lefty Solis, one time grid star, at Texas Tech, and now professional coach at Spur.

Post socked Abertathy 6 to 1 win with Corley whiffing 17 team batters, walking 12, and doing fine otherwise; then the big Lefty returned to stike out his twenty-six batter in the aftermath when he dubbed Lubbock with a 17 to 5 victory.

But Spur Win Protest

But on the grounds that Mr. Corley had participated in the district 5 tournament at Breckenridge some ten days previous to the South Plains tournament, the Post team was kicked out, lock, stock and barrel. Mr. White verified the decision when he personally investigated the matter at Breckenridge. The state commissioner then ordered that Lubbock was null and void on the basis that Breedlove, Hilliard and Thompson had taken part in the baseball tournament where money prizes were offered since July 10 of this year. He also announced that Solis was ineligible because he was an as-

Grassland had had announced that a player on their roster had participated in a small tournament. But district commissioner, Collier Parris, ruled that the Grassland team was eligible.

In the first game played, Tulla stopped the protesting Spur team once and for all, 5 to 4. Then Kinney-Dickens defeated Grassland, 11 to 2, with Dick Godeke, ace Kinney hurler allowing but two hits. In the final game Tuesday night Dickens completed a successful night by ejecting Olton from the tournament, 12 to 2.

Littlefield Loses

Both Littlefield teams, the Wildcat and All-Stars, were defeated in the early round games by eligible teams. The Wildcats lost to Dickens-Kinney, 6 to 4, and the All-Stars were shut out by Abertathy, 3 to 0.

Insurance Features Proving Of Value To Texas Farmers

COLLEGE STATION. — "Insurance features of the agricultural conservation program are proving of value to farmers in Texas because of unusual weather conditions in 1936," A. L. Smith, executive secretary of the state agricultural conservation committee, pointed out.

"Interest is being manifested in these features by many farmers of this region," he added, "so the recent statement of C. A. Cobb, director of the southern region of the AAA, is particularly appropriate at this time."

Cobb says, "Each producer who meets the requirements of the agricultural conservation program is sure of receiving some cash income even though his crops may be destroyed by drought or other causes."

"No program can prevent suffering and hardship if a farmer's labor and cash investment in crops are completely lost because of unfavorable weather conditions. The present program will partly relieve the distress of cooperating producers by making a cash payment to those who have used approved farming practices on their land."

"The soil-conserving crops, grown on land that would otherwise be planted to soil-depleting crops, protect the cooperating producer against losses of plant food and soil caused by leaching and erosion."

"Improved soils mean better stands, fewer crop failures, lower production cost to producers, and over period a more staple and less expensive supply of foods, feeds, and fibers for consumers than would be available if soils should continue to be wasted at the present rate."

COACH SANDERS HAS PLENTY OF LINEMEN

But Backfield Will Have To Be Rebuilt To Produce Winner

A spectators impression of the Littlefield high school Wildcats during their first few days of practice isn't convinced that Coach Bill Sanders charges will be the team to beat in the district 3-B race this fall, but there's no doubt that the Wildcats will be able to give favorites something to look forward to.

After the first half dozen days of work, Coach Sanders isn't making any prediction. The Wildcats have all it takes in experienced linemen, but backfield is the present problem. Only one squadman, Ray Smith, will be on hand for the first whistle of the opening game with Tahoka, September 18, but a veteran line will be in uniform.

Material Promising

But Coach Sanders has a pretty good idea that two veteran linemen, Loyd Neely and Charley James, may make the grade as backs. Along with Smith, Neely and James, there's the most promising recruit on the field, a mite little fellow, Clyde Lee, who does everything a back needs to do to make the starting line. On Lee's shoulders probably will fall the task of being the key man in the backfield, the ball carrier, punter, and, more than likely, the passer. If Coach Sanders can round this combination into shape, then the Wildcats "may be" the surprise team of the district race.

Then too, two inexperienced hands, Jesse New and Eddings, both backfield candidates, should give some hopes of reserve backfield prospects. At the present, reserve material, as well as first string starters, is another big question confronting the Wildcat mentor. There simply doesn't seem to be any.

The Line: A Corker

With co-captains Wilfred Moore and Hall Rowe leading the forwards and with six lettermen for help, the line shouldn't give the former Hardin-Simmons university quarterback a great deal of worry. From end to end the Wildcats will be fortified with experience, if any thing else. Plenty of beef and brawn is among this lot, although when the opening game is called the Wildcat starters, including backfield, won't average more than 150 pounds at the most.

Outline of Program Recommended By Drouth Committee

Following a survey by the President's special drouth committee of the sub-scorched farms in the northern drouth plains, recommendations were made by this group as follows:

1. Arrest of soil erosion and efficient use of water resources through engineering, new agricultural practices, financing and a revision of policies of all public agencies concerned.
2. Permanent retirement of certain submarginal lands from commercial production.
3. Building of thousands of "small but substantial dams" to hold back runoff for use in dry spells.
4. Continued public acquisition of lands too seriously injured to warrant restoration by private parties.
5. Conservation of soil on arable lands by re-grassing, contour plowing, listing, terracing, strip-cropping and tree planting.
6. Discouragement of intra-regional migrations, although some regrouping of populations may help.
7. Exploration of crop insurance whereby part of the surplus would be stored in bumper years for repayment in kind in bad crop seasons.
8. Public credit to enable competent tenants to purchase and operate their own farms on the great plains.
9. Study to determine if new legislation is needed to promote transfer from crop to grass farming.
10. Integration of grazing and cropping.
11. Readjustment of water rights to prevent diversion of water to poor lands.
12. Extension of long term credit to farmers attempting to help themselves.
13. Leasing by federal government of land not too far depleted with stipulation that owners carry on an approved program of restoration to grass of forest.
14. Local action to protect land against harmful uses.
15. Stimulation of cooperative grazing associations.

were in the bank when it was robbed.

The gunman, who Anthony said was the bank's president, P. E. Boesen, was very nervous. First asked for informed that Mr. Boesen was not there, the bandit waited about 60 seconds before drawing a small-caliber revolver on Mr. Anthony.

"Be quiet and don't move, and it'll be all right," he said.

Shoving the handbag into Mr. Anthony's hands, the gunman instructed the assistant cashier, "Well, go up there and scoop it in."

Mr. Anthony complied.

Within three minutes from the time he entered the bank, Mr. Anthony estimated, the gunman was backing out the door, the gun in his right hand and the loot in his left. The bank door was locked.

Anthony said he ran to a window to watch the gunman flee. He obtained the license number, 791-746, which the automobile carried. Anthony said the car was tan-colored, with yellow wheels.

Twelve miles south of Sudan the gunman could have turned west to Portales, N. Mex., east toward Lubbock, or could have continued southward.

Anthony said the robber was very nervous. The man was wearing a hat, a light shirt open at the neck, dress trousers. He was described as about 24 years old, weighing about 150 or 160 pounds, and about 6 feet tall.

Bulk of the bank's currency, said Cashier W. H. Lyle, who was not present, was in an electrically-controlled time-locked vault. Opening of the vault would have required about 15 minutes.

Anthony said he believed the man carried a .32 calibre blue-steel revolver. He declined to take any silver with him.

Sheriff F. A. Loyd and Deputy Sheriff Sam Hutson, assisted by officers of many counties, have engaged in almost continuous search for the bandit since the robbery last Thursday. No arrests had been made up to a late hour last night.

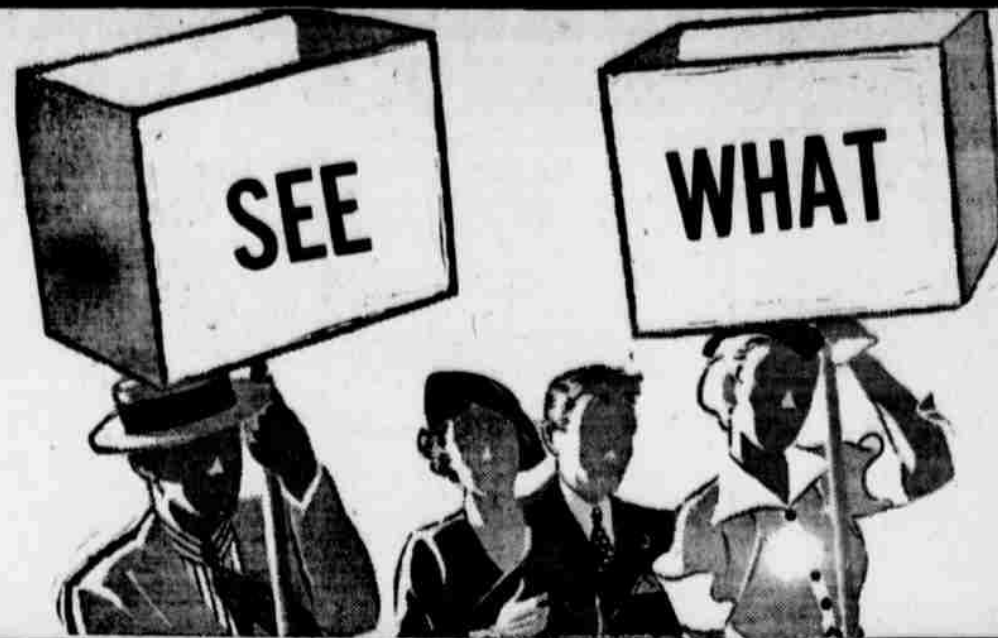
