Fire Destroys Mobile Home, Leaving Family Out in Cold

A heater explosion and a devastating fire which swept through the mobile home of Greg and Heidi Phillips on Monday evening, destroying everything, has left the family homeless, with only the clothes they were wearing at the time of the fire.

Greg and Heidi Phillips and their three daughters, Tiffany, Heather and Brooke were not at home when a heater blew up the girls' bedrooms and triggered a fire

which leveled the mobile home, taking with it everything the family owned - home, furniture, appliances, kitchen utensils, clothes, shoes, food, even Christmas presents that had been bought and carefully hidden.

By early Tuesday morning, the people of Post were already responding to the needs of the Phillips family. Several calls were received at the Dispatch regarding what was being done and we re-

ceived reports that two beds had been donated and a special account set up at Sentry Savings.

There is an immediate need for clothes: the three girls wear sizes 5 to 8 and children's size 10, 11 and 12 shoes.

Heidi's clothes are size 3 and one-half to 5 and size 8 and one-half to 9 shoes.

Greg wears size 15 shirts, 29-24 pants and 9 or 9 and one-half shoes.

Items to be donated can be left at Southside Barber Shop, 110 N. Broadway. If you have items that need to be picked up, call Joy Greer at 495-3204.

Any clothing, household items, etc., you can donate are needed and will be appreciated as will deposits to the special Phillips family account at Sentry Savings.

Local Sales Tax Rebates Increase

The increase in local retail sales was reflected in the recent tax rebate check, in the amount of \$19,843.82, mailed to the city of Post by the State Comptroller's office.

The November check represents an increase in Post's rebate of 16.98 percent over the \$16,963.98 for the same period last year.

1988 tax rebate payments to the city total \$160,269.11 to date, an increase of 23.96 percent over the same period in 1987 when payments totaled \$129,293.16.

Area cities also show increase in sales tax rebates. Slaton collected \$22,925.14 an 11.31 percent increase over 1987's \$20,595.72. Slaton's total 1988 payments to date are \$198,794.35, an increase

of 32.53 percent over 1987's \$149,995.88.

Tahoka collected \$8,549.68, an increase of 2.42 percent over 1987's \$8,347.44. Tahoka's total 1988 payments to date are \$60,731.07, a 10 percent increase over 1987's \$55,209.36.

Spur collected \$6,105.56, a 2.92 percent increase over 1987's \$5,932.24. Spur's total 1988 payments to date are \$48,182.82, a 15.16 percent increase over 1987's \$41,838.28.

Crosbyton collected \$6,609.18, a decrease of .95 percent from 1987's \$6,672.78. Crosbyton's total 1988 payments to date are \$53,537.90, an increase of 31.15 percent over 1987's \$40,683.41.

Ralls collected \$6,659.59, an

increase of 15.11 percent over 1987's \$5,785.39. Ralls' total 1988 payments to date are \$52,310.59, an increase of 26.65 percent over 1987's \$41,303.91.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said, "The payments to cities and counties continue to improve and the state's economic recovery continues to pick up steam."

Bullock's office sent checks totaling \$118.4 million to 1,045 cities. Statewide, the 1988 year-to-date payments to cities are up 12.4 percent over last year.

November's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in September.

GTE Announces Line Charge to Increase 60¢

In accordance with recent Federal Communication Commission action, all single line business and residential telephone customers across the nation, including those served by GTE Southwest, will be subject to an increase in their interstate Subscriber Line Charge from the current \$2.60 per month to \$3.20 per month.

The 60 cent increase in the interstate subscriber line charge is effective December 1 and is the third phase of a federally mandated process that is intended to gradually eliminate the practice of charging customers more for long-distance service in order to keep local rates artificially low.

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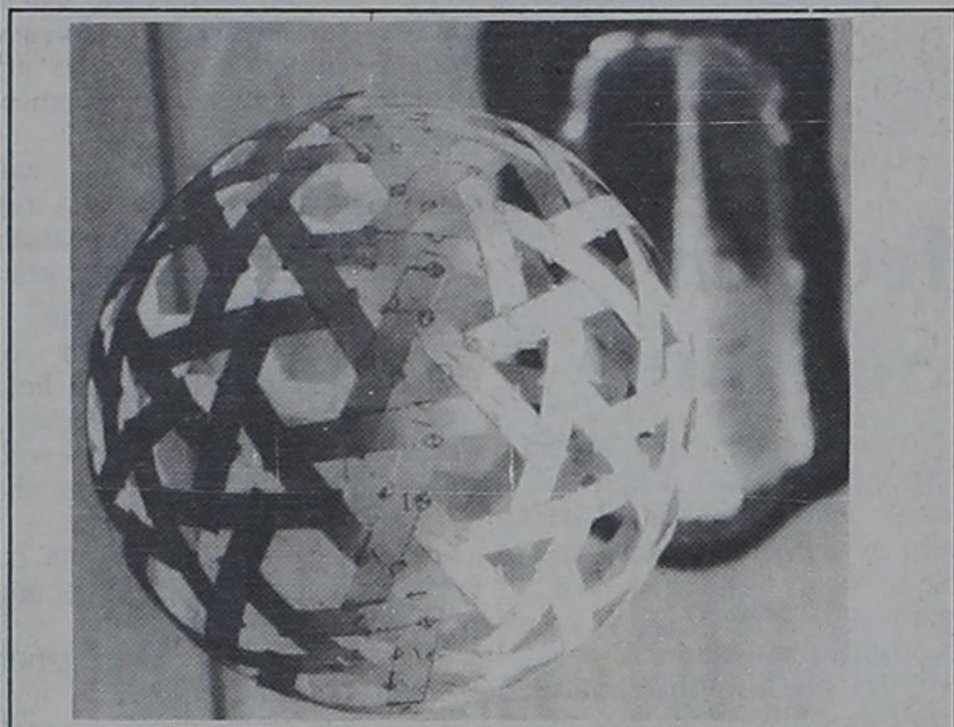
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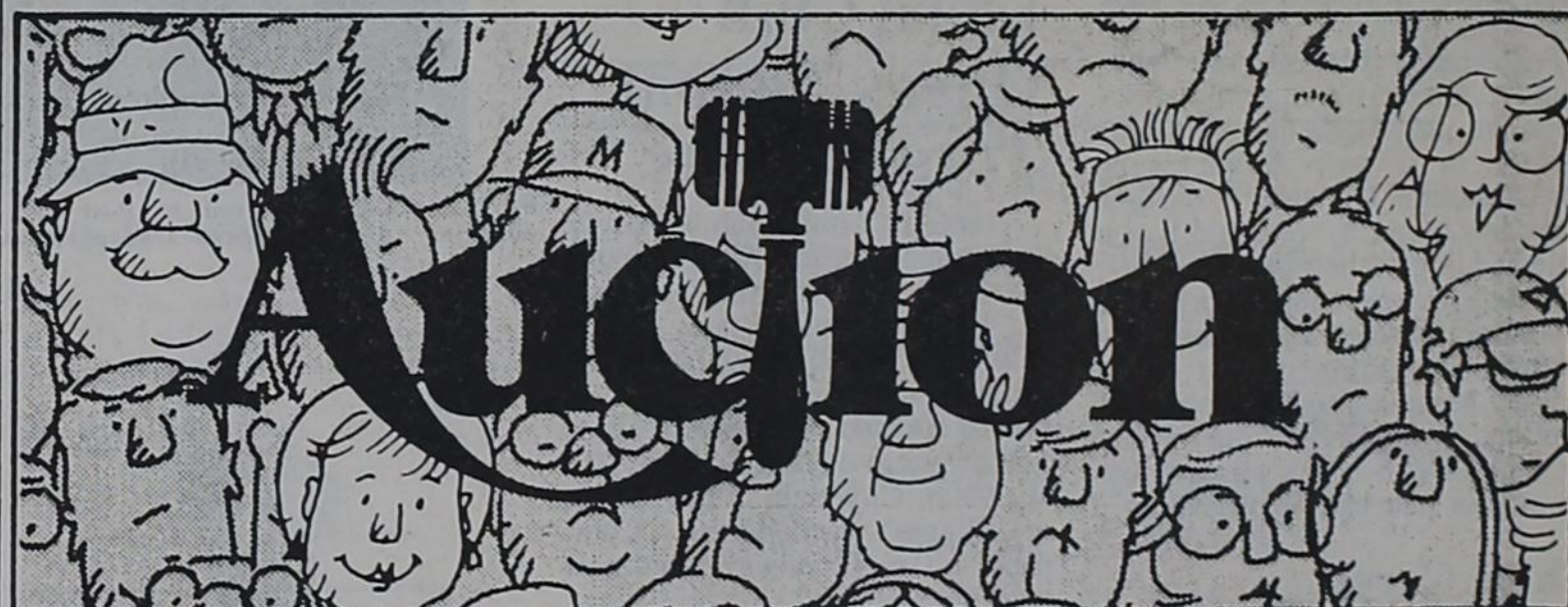

Family Focus

The Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays can be a source of joy -- and of stress -- for single-parent and step-families.

The divorce and remarriage statistics tell us that there are a high percentage of non-traditional families in every community.

Thirteen percent of all children under 18 now live in a stepfamily; 17 percent live in single-parent families.

Even on television sit-coms, non-traditional families are now the norm. Yet parents and children in these families often feel "different," especially around the holidays.

One reason is that most of us have strong, idealized images of the holidays, with mom roasting the turkey, dad fixing a fire and the whole family happily gathered together at grandmother's house.

These images have been reinforced through decades of advertisements, songs, movies and television.

Children in step-families or single parent families may see this as sharp contrast to their own situation.

Children should not feel like they are alone or the only person experiencing this stress.

One of the best antidotes is simply to talk about it.

For younger children, check the library for books about non-traditional families that you can read together.

This will give you a common ground for discussing feelings.

Well in advance of the holidays, decide where and how children and stepchildren will spend their time without placing them in the middle of disagreements among ex-spouses, parents and step-parents.

Remember that the bonds in step-families often grow to be very strong.

As a result, a child may miss step-brothers or step-sisters and feel sad about missing the family celebration when he or she spends the holidays with the noncustodial parent.

Parents and step-parents may need to talk with children and help them deal with these feelings.

Sometimes, the noncustodial parent will recognize that children want to be at home over the holiday itself, and will make arrangements for a visit before or after their child's stepfamily celebration.

If necessary, remind relatives that children and stepchildren should be treated similarly.

These courtesies should extend to gift-giving, family celebrations and ceremonies, family pictures on Christmas cards and other activities.

All illumination has color temperature. A flashcube has 4950 degrees and a mired value of 202. A 100 watt general service light bulb has 2900 degrees and a mired value of 345; so, you would need a bluish conversion filter to get an acceptable picture.

This is an oversimplification,

but the purpose of the program was to teach us how to use the right filter for correction.

Business customers with more than one line have been paying \$6 interstate subscriber line charge since May 1984.

This interstate subscriber line charge for business customers will not change.

Under the Federal Communications Commission plan for implementation of the interstate subscriber line charges, the total revenues of the local telephone companies will not increase since the FCC in turn will reduce by an equivalent amount charges to long-distance carriers for use of local facilities and equipment.

It is the intent of the FCC that this decrease in long-distance carriers' expense will be passed through to consumers in the form of reduced interstate long-distance rates.

GTE officials said the interstate subscriber line charges are designed

to shift from long-distance users to local customers, a larger portion of the actual costs of providing the line from their residence or business to the telephone switching equipment.

Depending on the amount of interstate long-distance calling, the reductions for interstate rates could offset the \$3.20 interstate fee for many customers, especially high volume users.

The \$3.20 interstate subscriber line charge applies to all residential and single line business customers of all exchange telephone companies providing local exchange service.

Cotton Talks

from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Long-awaited subfreezing temperatures November 16 and 17 sent the last remaining boll weevils on the east Plains scampering for cover and brought to a halt the 25th year of the High Plains Boll Weevil Control Program conducted by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. of Lubbock.

The program format each year calls for aerial insecticide applications at 10 to 14 day intervals from late September until the year's first freeze destroys the weevils' food supply.

The objective is to kill the maximum percentage of weevils along the Caprock that rims the eastern edge of the Plains before they enter hibernation sites, thus keeping to a minimum the number that emerge and reproduce to attack fruiting plants the following spring.

This strategy, adopted by PCG in 1964 at the behest of entomologists and concerned producers, for 25 years has prevented the spread of the dreaded pest into concentrated cotton acreage west of the Caprock.

FFA Takes New Name

The National FFA Organization is the new name for the high school group previously known as Future Farmers of America.

"I view this action as a progressive move that needed to be made," said Jay Hays, president of the Student Body at Texas A&M University.

Hays, a former Texas FFA vice president, said delegates to the recent national meeting of the youth organization in Kansas City voted to take the word "farmers" out of the name because it was hurting recruiting.

Hays said that although FFA remains in the organization's title, it no longer reflects farming as a career.

"One might compare the FFA name change with that several years ago of Texas A&M, which no longer stands for 'agricultural and mechanical college' of Texas," Hays said.

"We are now the National FFA Organization, or FFA organization of each state, as a result of action by delegates to the 61st annual conference of the youth group," he said.

Hays is an A&M senior from Wolfe City majoring in agricultural education.

Hays said FFA officers and U.S. Education Department advisors to the organization recommended the name change to help reduce a 23 percent decline in membership since the mid-1970s.

Hays said the FFA has about 416,000 active members nationwide, with about 54,000 of them residing in Texas.

PCG's 25 counties contribute to the control effort, paying 70 percent of the cost against 30 percent funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The 1988 program began September 20 and ended with an unusual sixth application of insecticide to a small acreage November 16 and 17.

In between, aerial applicator planes sprayed an aggregate of 663,311 cotton acres with 62,166 gallons of ultra low volume malathion.

Those figures compare to 615,008 acres and 57,639 gallons in 1987.

Base acres treated totaled about 225,000 located in some 3,500 cotton fields stretching from Briscoe County's Silverton on the north to Vealmore in Borden County on the south.

Other counties in which all or part of the cotton acreage received treatment included Motley, Dickens, Kent, Garza, Crosby, Floyd, Borden, Lynn, Dawson and Lubbock.

A total of 14 planes were used, operating from airports at Spur, Roaring Springs, Lamesa, Post,

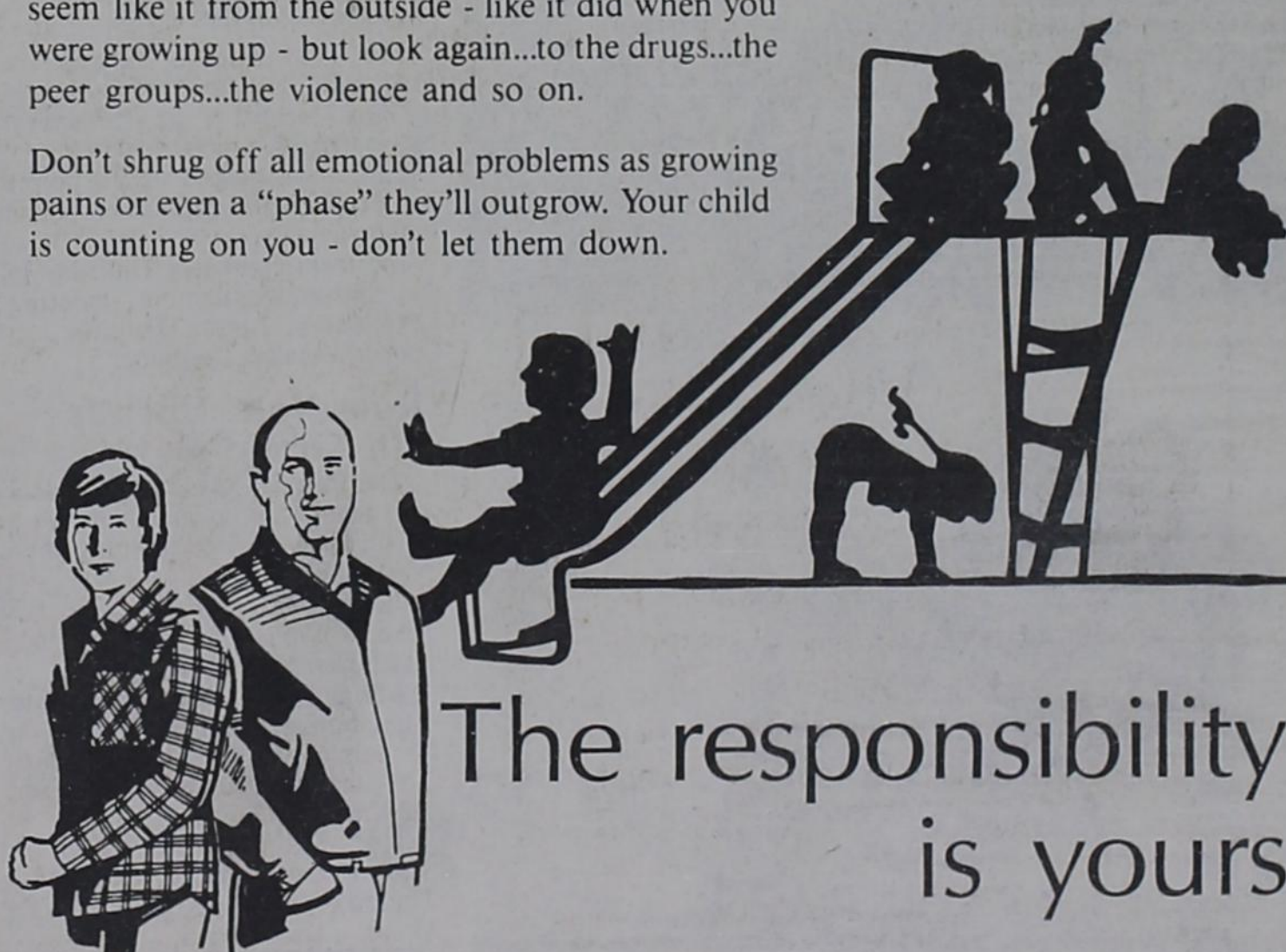

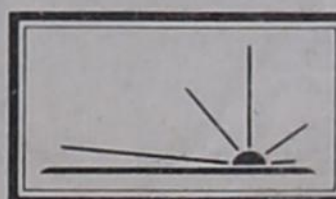

Post pulled within two after three periods, 39-37, but went cold in the fourth quarter only connecting for four points while Coahoma poured in 14 for the win.

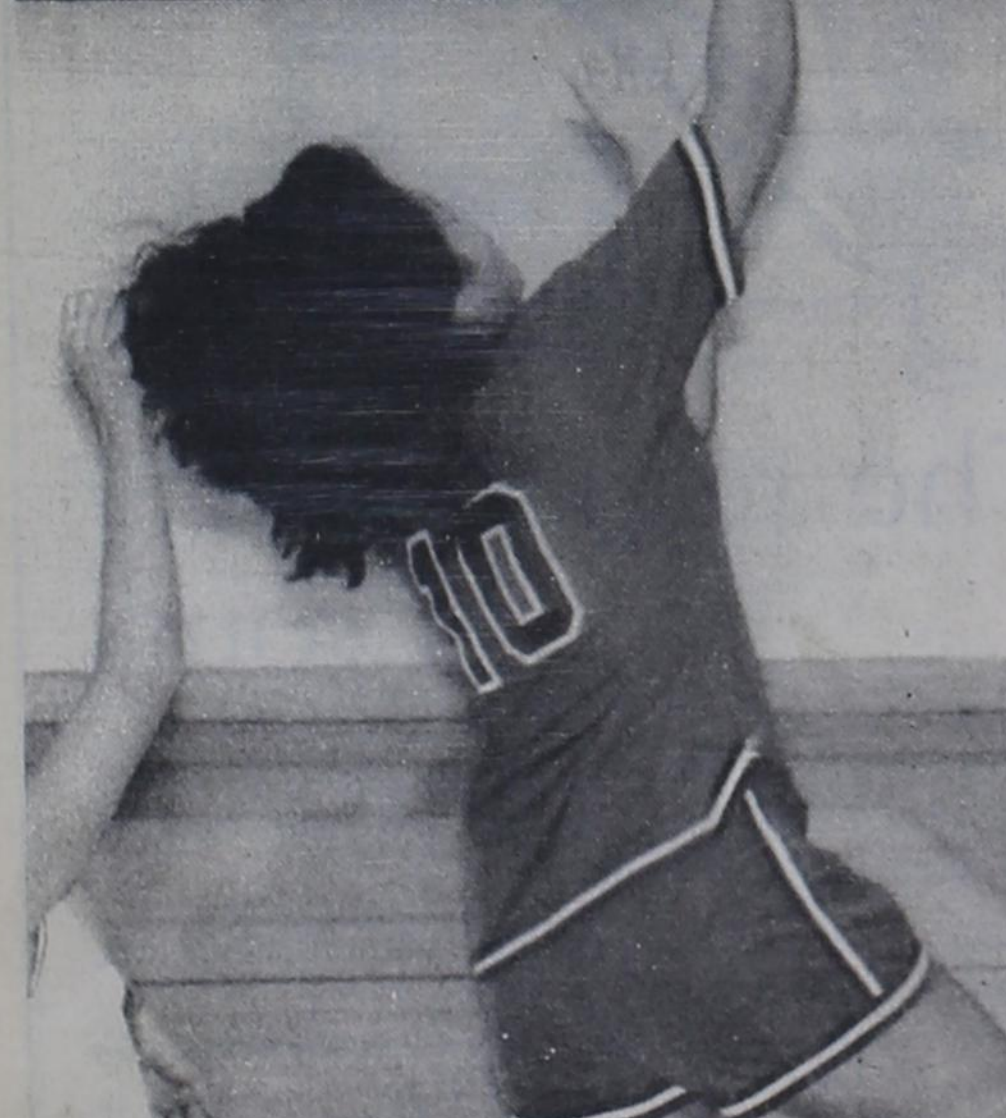
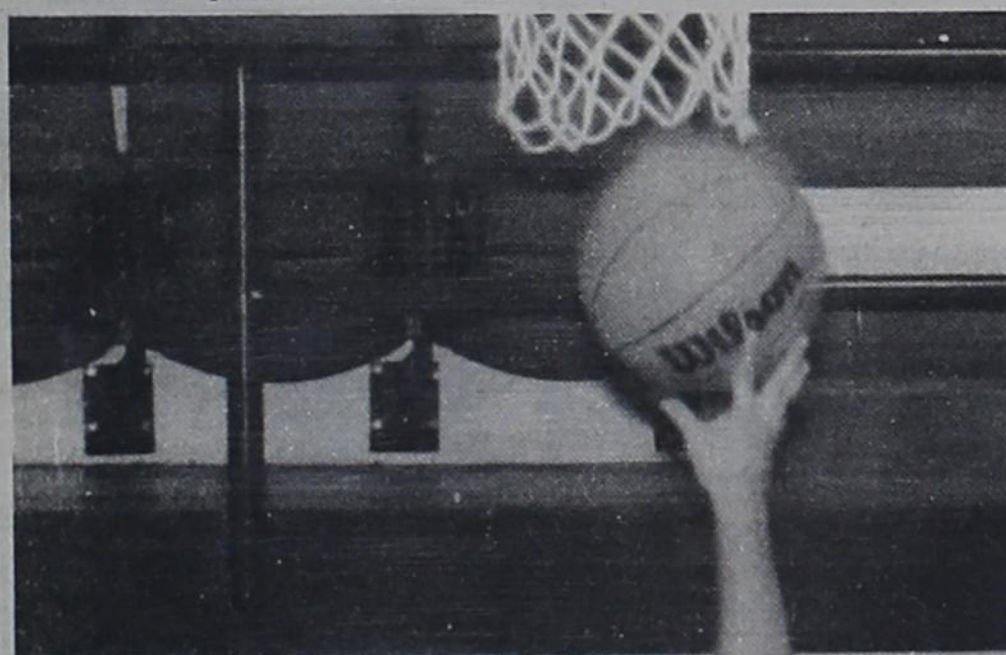

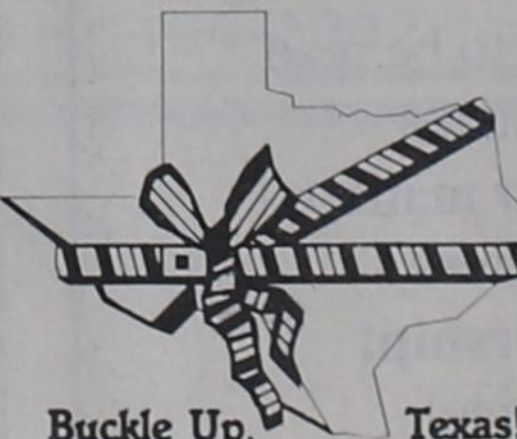
