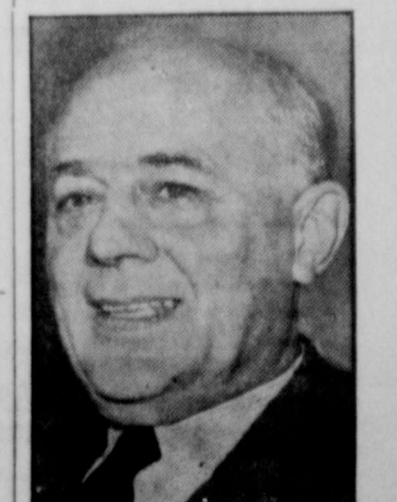

Tougher Americans

One phase of the national defense program which, perhaps more than any other, requires the co-operation of every citizen is the program to "toughen up America," being directed by John B. Kelly, of Philadelphia, former Olympic sculling champion.

Unlike so much of the defense program, this phase won't cost much. It requires only that every American give a little time and thought to keeping his body in the same tip-top condition in which the army keeps its military machines.

At the time of the World War draft, the country was startled to find how many citizens were unfit for service—how many had bad eyes or bad teeth or diseases which rendered them unfit for active duty. It was a startling lesson, but too many of us forgot it after the war.

This "toughening" program will call for more exercises for school children, more walking for adults, possibly adult classes in physical education and plant-sponsored athletics in industry. Instruction will probably be given in matters of diet and home first aid.

Although it is true that the human element is becoming less vital in war as fighting forces become mechanized, a sturdy soldiery is still highly necessary, as the dictator nations have long realized.

But a healthy nation is desirable not only in war. A program which would generally toughen up the average American is bound to have beneficial effects in time of peace as well. We have gone far in eliminating certain diseases and increasing the life span, but much remains to be done. Such common ailments as indigestion and headaches and the common cold take a great toll in the nation's efficiency.

That toll can best be reduced in city and country alike by any program which will actually produce tougher Americans.

The Perryton Rangers nose out the Tulia Hornets here on Ranger Field last Friday night 7-0 in a game that was on the border line throughout the entire play. The Hornets were battling on the Ranger 2-yard line as the final whistle sounded. While the Hornets threatened several times during the course of play and managed to take the lead on yards gained in scrimmage, 137 to 119, the line opposition put up by a determined Ranger eleven held them to a scoreless game.

The Rangers played a better grade of ball on the whole adding up eight first downs as compared with Tulia's five. Tulia made several long runs that brought their scrimmage gains above the more consistent Ranger advances.

The lone score of the game was made early in the first quarter when John Luthi brought the ball deep into enemy territory on a 25-yard run around right end and then followed up the play when he connected with a pass from Willis Neal Lilly from the 20-yard stripe across the goal line. Lilly made a successful conversion.

In the second quarter Perryton was seriously impeded in attempted penetration of the enemy lines when they drew two 15-yard penalties at crucial moments. An aerial attack with four attempts netted only two completions with Lilly connecting with Chellis Gidley for a 14-yard gain. On almost identically the same play Lilly completed another pass to Gidley for an additional 20-yards. This play, although perfectly executed was called back with both teams being offside. With Perryton threatening E. Cox intercepted.

White Deer Plays Friday

The Perryton Rangers will go into the home stretch here next Friday night when the White Deer Bucks invade Ranger Field for Perryton's second conference game of the season. The Rangers have dropped only one game this season when Canadian defeated them in the first conference tilt 20-6.

Coaches Boyd Payne and George Philbrick announce that while the Rangers are showing marked improvement with each week of practice and are rapidly gaining experience, they are entering into the toughest games of the season at this time. The remainder of the schedule is made up of four conference tilts, namely White Deer, Spearman, Phillips and Panhandle in the order named.

A glance at the White Deer Bucks' record finds them with only one loss thus far in the season. They were defeated by the Canadian Wildcats 27-12 last Friday night. The Wildcats have been taking the Great Plains area by storm with by far the best team in years. Other teams who fell before the Bucks are as follows: Tulia, 13-0; Hereford, 7-6; Canyon, 35-0; Spearman, 38-0.

While the Rangers are slated to go into the game here Friday night as the underdog, previous experience will indicate that either team may be the winner at the final whistle. The Bucks are conceded to have the edge on experience with almost the entire team back on the active list from last year.

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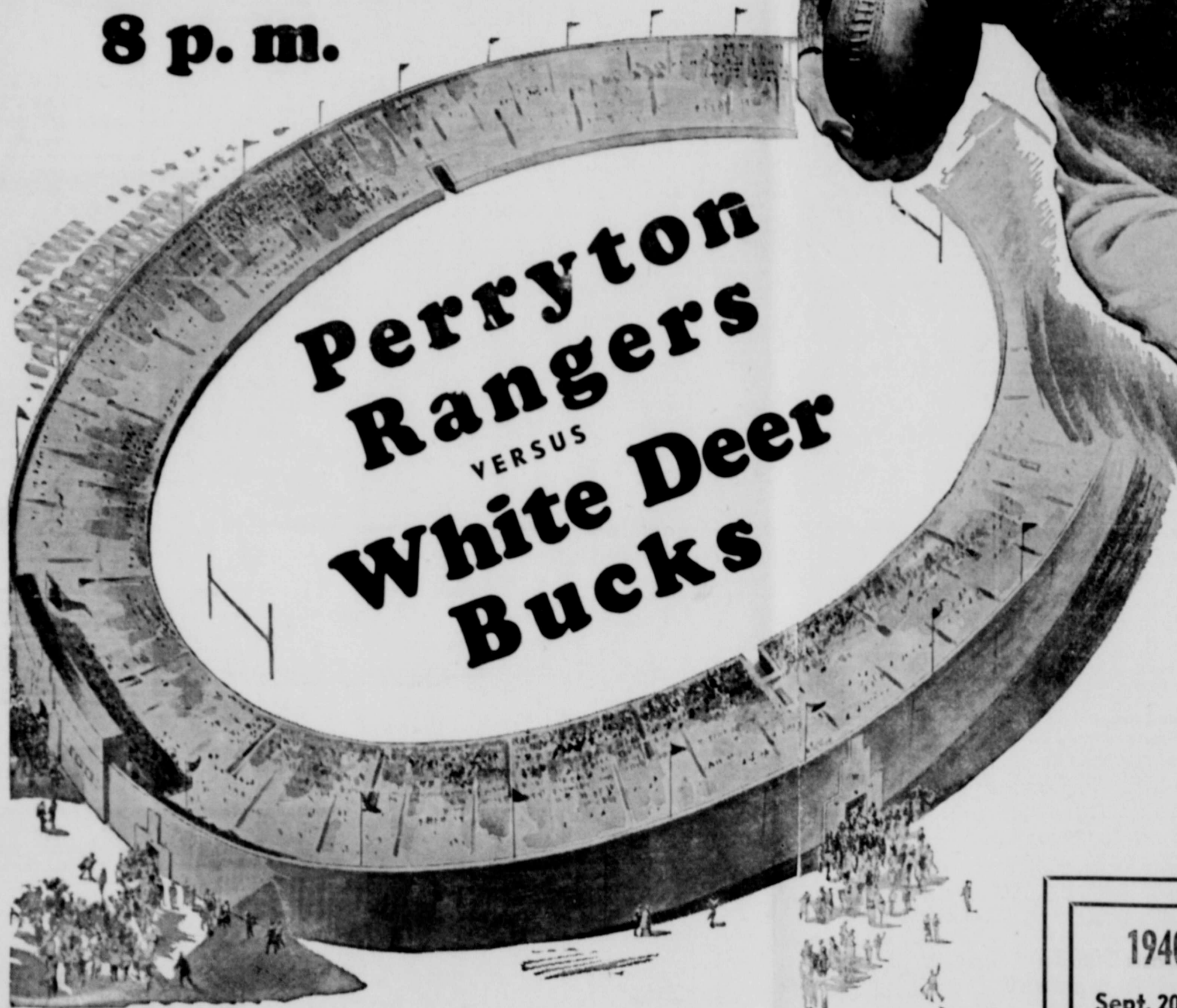

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

The Motive of Moral Discipline

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Oct. 27
Text: Luke 1:13-16; 2:40; 4:4; 6:21, 25, 43-45

THIS fourth lesson on temperance is assigned for National Temperance Sunday. There are various motives for abstaining from the use of intoxicating liquor, but the motive in this lesson—moral discipline—is the highest motive of all.

Various motives have influenced those who have followed abstinence without this motive in mind. There has been the motive of economy, the motive of good health, the unwillingness to take into the body anything that is harmful in its effects, the motive of self-respect and avoidance of evil consequences, and the motive of common sense which has enabled many to see that indulgence in alcohol is a needless and useless, if not an actually harmful, thing.

No one ever suffered from temperance and total abstinence. But thousands—millions, in fact—have suffered from intemperance.

THE motive of moral discipline, or, as it is put in the title of the lesson, "The Christian Motive for Abstinence," finds its exemplification in the lives of individuals who have been conspicuous for the purity of their lives and their devotion to the highest ideals.

The example of this in our lesson is John, the Baptist, who was not a "Christian" in the technical sense, but who was the forerunner of the Christ who brought in the Christian era. But John is only one example in

the Scripture of this moral discipline in abstinence from intoxicants on the part of those who were called to religious service and leadership. There were the Rechabites, and others, who imposed upon themselves this rule of abstinence.

Our lesson fortunately suggests that abstinence is a larger matter than non-indulgence in alcohol. Temperance and abstinence are essentially related to the whole discipline of a well-ordered life. In a time like today, the courses of foolishness and evil that are open to the individual are greatly multiplied. We are tempted almost every day to indulgences, often harmless enough in themselves, that tend nevertheless to weaken the body and break down morale.

A PART altogether from what we ordinarily call "intoxicants," there are intoxicating aspects of the whole environment of life, and discriminating judgment is important if one would preserve even his physical health, not to speak of the more important things of moral and spiritual health.

A scientific age in the midst of this dissipating environment is teaching us a great deal concerning food, diet, and what constitutes normal and healthful living.
Happy is the man who, in the midst of these conflicting forces, can find for himself the highest and the best way. In the discovery of that way there is nothing that will prove so helpful as the great examples of those who have kept their lives clean and strong, and full of helpfulness toward their fellow men.
