

### Elmer V. East For District Attorney

"It is my belief that a District Attorney should be fair and just in the consideration of all criminal matters before him, and that he should be competent, aggressive and energetic in the prosecution of all criminal cases before the District Court.

"It appears to me that in considering the official to be elected to a public office, the Citizens will desire to be guided in their choice by the same standards which are usually employed by any other employer in engaging the services of a prospective employee. When a business man employs a clerk or a farmer engages the services of a workman, the employer is interested in knowing if the employee is qualified to do the work and if he is energetic enough to perform the services satisfactorily.

"Based upon this belief, I am applying for the office of District Attorney to the Citizens of this district and wish to submit with all humility the following facts and circumstances as to my qualifications for this office:

"I was born and reared in Childress county and lived there continuously until I moved to Lubbock five years ago. I have practiced law nine years, four of which were in Childress. During that time I have served as county attorney of Childress county and always either represented the state in criminal cases or have been engaged in the practice of civil law. I have only represented the defendant in one criminal case.

"As to my honesty and integrity, I refer the voters and citizens of this district to my clients, friends and neighbors. As to my legal ability, I earnestly request that the citizens of this district make inquiry from the lawyers with whom I have practiced. I believe that any lawyer in the district, regardless of whether or not he will vote for me, will honestly and fairly give his opinion of my legal ability and experience.

"During these times of emergency and of rationing, we must all curtail to some degree our business activities and our personal pleasures, and I believe that politics should be limited to some extent; for this reason it is probable that I will be unable to make a thorough canvass of the district; however, it is my conviction that the citizens will be no less keenly interested in the officials which are to serve them during the next two years and more especially their representatives in law enforcement offices.

"I shall deeply appreciate, therefore, the earnest consideration of my desire to serve this district as District Attorney by the citizens. I sincerely invite the thoughtful consideration of the citizens of this district and covet your vote and influence. I not only desire the consideration and confidence of the citizens during this campaign, but, if elected to this office, I most earnestly desire the continued advice, counsel and guidance of the citizens of the District, and I assure you that I shall endeavor to represent the best interests of the citizens at all times keeping in mind that the office is a trust from the people and should be administered for the well-being of the citizenship of the District.

## ABERNATHY'S QUOTA — 300 TONS! Drive To Collect Scrap Metal Opens Here Next Week

Abernathy's quota in the scrap metal drive is 300 tons — 50 tons have been sold here — 250 tons MUST BE COLLECTED NEXT WEEK!

H. Schulz, member of the community War Board and head of the local scrap metal collection, announced an intensive drive in this area next week to collect the remaining 250 tons of scrap needed to fill our quota. Farmers are urged to scour their places and sell every piece of metal they can possibly spare. If you find only a few pieces, not enough to sell — and want to donate it to the Red Cross, bring it to the collection pile on the east side of the city park.

In order for Abernathy to get full credit on its quota, the metal must be sold here. Bill's Wrecking Yard and J. U. Peel Blacksmith shop are paying top prices for scrap. About 50 tons of scrap metal have been sold through these firms in the last few weeks.

Abernathy Farmers Co-op gin has offered its facilities for weighing in the metal. Although they have not been contacted, the other local gins, the elevators and Maupin Feed Store & Mill will likely co-operate in weighing in the scrap.

The metal is needed to keep steel mills operating to produce materials for war. Enlist the scrap around your place in the scrap to slap the Japs!

Major Dickens was graduated from Lake City high school in 1931 with first honors, and attended Marysville College in Marysville, Tenn., in 1931 and 1932, studying chemical engineering. He entered U. S. Military academy at West Point in 1932. He was commissioned a second lieutenant of the infantry in the U. S. Army June 12, 1936.

His first post was in Fort Screven, Ga., near Savannah, where he was in the 8th Infantry, and from there was sent to Hawaii in 1937 to the 35th Infantry, Schofield barracks. Upon return to the states, he was sent to the 29th inf., at Ft. Benning, Ga. In August of 1940 he was transferred to the 2nd Infantry at Ft. Suster in Michigan.

## Clean-Up Drive Ends Friday

Clean-up Week drive in Abernathy is to end Friday when trucks, pickups and trailers will drive over town to haul cans, trash, etc., to the dump grounds east of town.

Rev. Frank Beauchamp, Methodist pastor, is chairman of the drive and his assistants are the following zone leaders: Andy Reid, business zone; Mrs. C. O. Anderson, northeast residential zone; Mrs. W. V. Cunningham, southeast zone; Mrs. Dan Z. Ward, southwest zone; Mrs. N. C. Hix, northwest zone.

Following is a comment from the zone leaders:

Everyone is to clean up his own premises, burning all trash that can be burned, and either sacking or putting in boxes all trash that can not be burned, such as tin cans, etc. If there is any scrap iron or usable metal such as the defense work calls for, it is to be put in a separate pile.

Trucks and trailers will be around Friday morning after 8:00 o'clock to pick up all trash, so please have it out in view near the street to hasten the work of the men who haul it off. Everyone who can is asked to carry their own and neighbors rubbish to the junk yard out about a mile east of town.

Chairman Beauchamp gives the following comment:

"Friday is the day — the hours, from early dawn until night time. If you have not collected your trash, cans, metal, etc., and burned what you can, then will you please do it NOW! As the committee on transportation is having a bit of difficulty finding ways to haul off trash, if you possibly can, take your own lot of trash off. Our new streets and highway, with our new buildings, newly decorated houses and premises need to be shown to the best advantage. Help make our town one of the cleanest in the state. If you have the time, help clean up a vacant lot near you. That will not only beautify, but rid us of mosquitoes, flies and disease hot beds.

"A committee of inspection will be appointed to choose which of the five zones is the cleanest. Help your leader to have the cleanest zone."

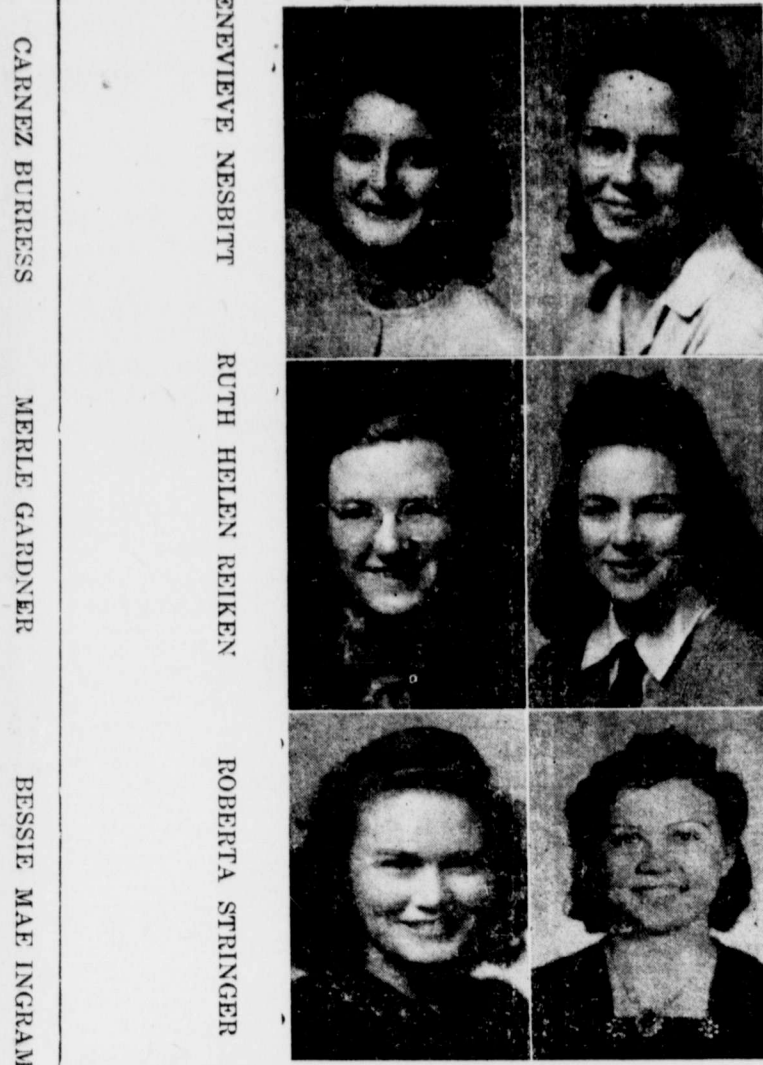

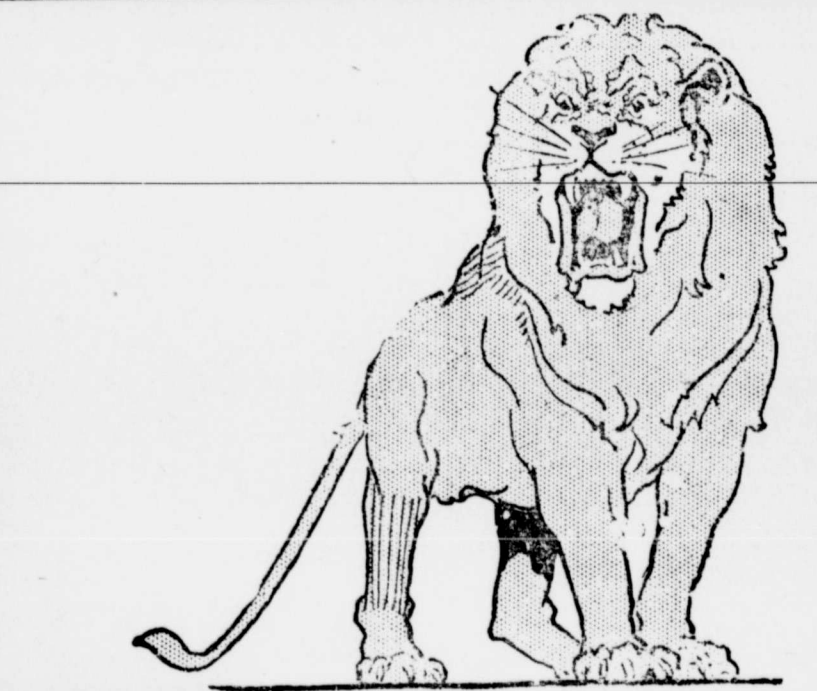
