EL PASO PRESBYTERY SENDS 55 CAMPERS TO LAKE CISCO PARK

Under the direction of Rev. Flynn Long, Presbyterian pastor of Midland, about 55 El Paso Presbytery campers arrived at the Lake Cisco camp Tuesday at noon.

From one of the campers, we learned that Swim Director Young served in the Air Force. He is a trained Red Cross water safety instructor, and also a reserve officer in the U. S. Air Force.

AL LANGFORD TAKES COACHING POST WITH DE LEON SCHOOLS

Al Langford, assistant football coach and head basketball coach at Cisco High School during the 1953-54 school year, resigned his position Tuesday to accept the head coaching job at De Leon High School, it was announced by Superintendent Arlin Birt.

Langford had been re-elected for the coming year by the Cisco schools. In his new position he will head the coaching staff of De Leon High School and will handle the football and basketball duties. Langford, a graduate of Howard Payne College in Brownwood, joined the Cisco coaching staff at the beginning of the 1953 season following his discharge from the Marine Corps. He handled the football assistant job and coached the Lobo basketball team. His cage team made a good record during the past season.

The resignation of Langford left two vacancies in the coaching staff at Cisco High School. Earlier Carroll Tatum, employed as "B" team coach, had resigned to accept the assistant coaching post at Wink High School. Superintendent Birt said that he was interviewing prospects to fill both positions.

Texas Scientists Given Large Fund For Polio Work

AUSTIN, Aug. 3. — Texas scientists have received a total of \$560,261.53 in March of Dimes financed research grants for the fight against polio, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis announced.

The grants have financed virus research, studies into the after effects of polio, studies in medical care of polio patients and education of professional personnel needed to care for the polio patient. Research work in polio in Texas has been carried on by the University of Texas units at Galveston and Dallas, Crippled Children's Hospital at Marlin, Texas, Scott's Rite Hospital for Crippled Children at Dallas, Baylor University at Houston, Jefferson Davis Hospital at Houston and Southwestern Polio-myelitis Respiratory Center at Houston.

"Texas scientists have played an important role in the nationwide fight against polio," a Foundation spokesman declared.

County Chapters of the National Foundation throughout the State were busy this week with plans for conducting an Emergency March of Dimes August 16 through 31st.

The Foundation entered 1954 with a need of \$75,000,000 to carry on the programs of aid to polio patients, research and education, and the new front of polio prevention. The March of Dimes last January, although the greatest in history, fell some \$20,000,000 short of the need. The deficit poses a severe threat to the program of providing financial aid to polio patients, and therefore the serious status of the polio program will be presented to the people in an Emergency Campaign.

March of Dimes research grants in Texas have been made over a 15-year period. Of the \$560,261.53 total, more than \$160,000 covers research projects still under way.

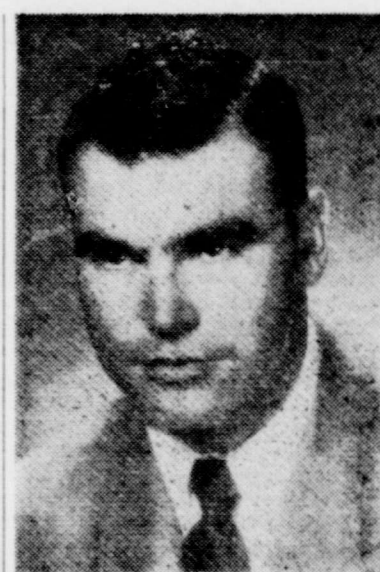

Ceremonies Held By County Board

Four registered Jersey heifer calves were awarded to four 4-H Club members in ceremonies Thursday morning in downtown Cisco as the Eastland County Youth Dairy Committee made the presentation to continue the three year old program.

Chairman T. D. Wheat of the Youth Dairy Program executive committee was in charge of the ceremonies. Heifer calves, some of them third generation calves in the county program, went to Miss Carolyn Berry, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Berry, Cisco; Robert Bell, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Townsend, Nimrod; Jimmy Sandlin, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. D. Sandlin, Carbon, and Roland Earp, Jr., Rising Star.

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal of Cisco spoke briefly to open the program. He noted that "the original 18 heifers have now increased to 43 heifers in our county's program to increase interest in dairying." The mayor complimented the farm program leaders for the "fine interest you are stimulating among our young people."

Mr. Wheat told the young people that the heifers would be their permanent property as soon as they returned a registered heifer calf to the committee for reassignment. The four calves were brought in and turned over to the committee by Rosemary Berry, Carbon; Neal Tankersley, Eastland; Clyde Moore, Eastland, and Jerry Winfrey, Rising Star.

The youth dairy group, including J. D. Lauderale and Mr. Rosenthal of Cisco, meets regularly to review the program. County Agent J. M. Cooper and agricultural teachers of the various schools in the county supervise the program and inspect the animals regularly.

Mr. Cooper pointed out that registered Jersey calves are still selling for about \$200 each, despite the fact that the price of cattle has gone down considerably since the program began.

Use Extra Salt To Help Beat The Heat Of Summer

AUSTIN, Aug. 5. — There is little doubt that summer is here. If you don't think so, take a quick look at your thermometer or feel your shirt or blouse — chances are that it will be wet and salty with sweat.

Excessive sweating means the loss of body salt, and Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, advises the use of salt in drinking water as a means of avoiding heat cramps.

"Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat," says Dr. Holle. "On days when the thermometer goes to 90 degrees or above, as it has recently, the body may lose as much as fifty grams of salt. Laborers, farmers, and even white-collar workers should be especially watchful of heat cramps."

Heat cramps are characterized by pains in the stomach, headaches, and sometimes nausea and vomiting. The danger comes because the loss of the salt may occur without the knowledge of the individual until the deficiency causes cramps or heat fog.

Salt tablets may be purchased commercially. If they are not available, a pinch of table salt will serve the same purpose. "Since milk contains more salt than water, drinking milk is an excellent method of replacing body salt lost through perspiration," Dr. Holle says.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A man whom I thought to be wise once said, "As long as we keep and use the open Bible and the secret Ballot, our freedom is secure."

The subject of this column on February 4th of this year was the decision of the Supreme Court involving the Phillips Petroleum Company.

The Court held that the sale of gas which the Phillips Petroleum Company makes for shipment from one State to another is subject to Federal regulation by the Federal Power Commission.

The decision of the Supreme Court was made final on June 7th. The decision is broad in scope. It is subject to the interpretation that it applies to all producers of gas, large or small, independent or otherwise, who sell into interstate commerce or whose gas eventually moves into interstate commerce.

This decision affects every segment of the oil and gas industry. On February 4th a warning was given to everyone interested in oil and gas that this decision would affect oil production as well as gas, because the two cannot be reasonably separated from the application of the decision. The regulation of one will involve the regulation, to some extent, of the other.

When the Congress passed the Natural Gas Act it had no idea such a decision would be rendered by the Courts. Even the Federal Trade Commission has denied having the authority granted it by the Court and has clearly stated it did not seek to administer regulation over natural gas.

It is my belief that under our philosophy of government the oil and gas industry should properly be regulated by competition. It is not a public utility and should not be subject to regulation by an agency of the Federal Government.

Legislation will be necessary to change the decision of the Supreme Court. If the Federal Power Commission regulates the production and sale, the exploration for gas will be retarded. Supply will be reduced and it is almost certain that consumers will pay more for that which is available.

The 47th Infantry Division and the First Armored Division will start special maneuvers this fall in Texas, with the ultimate aim of developing an atomic age army. The Army is not yet certain what the new divisional organization will look like, but the maneuvers will be conducted with an eye to shaping virtually the whole Army into a radically different structure.

The principal features distinguishing the new type of division from the old are: (1) smaller divisions but more of them, each independent of the other; and (2) a new mobility to be achieved with helicopter and convertiplanes, which is a plane which rises like a helicopter but flies close to the speed of an ordinary aircraft.

The decline in exports of key agricultural products constantly points to the need for expanded trade.

Wheat exports in 1933 were down 40% from 1932. Cotton exports also declined by approximately 40%, and meat products exports were down 17% from 1932. Unless our foreign markets for agricultural products are improved, there is good chance for a further decline in farm prices. At the same time, there is no indication that the manufactured products which the farmer must buy will come down in price.

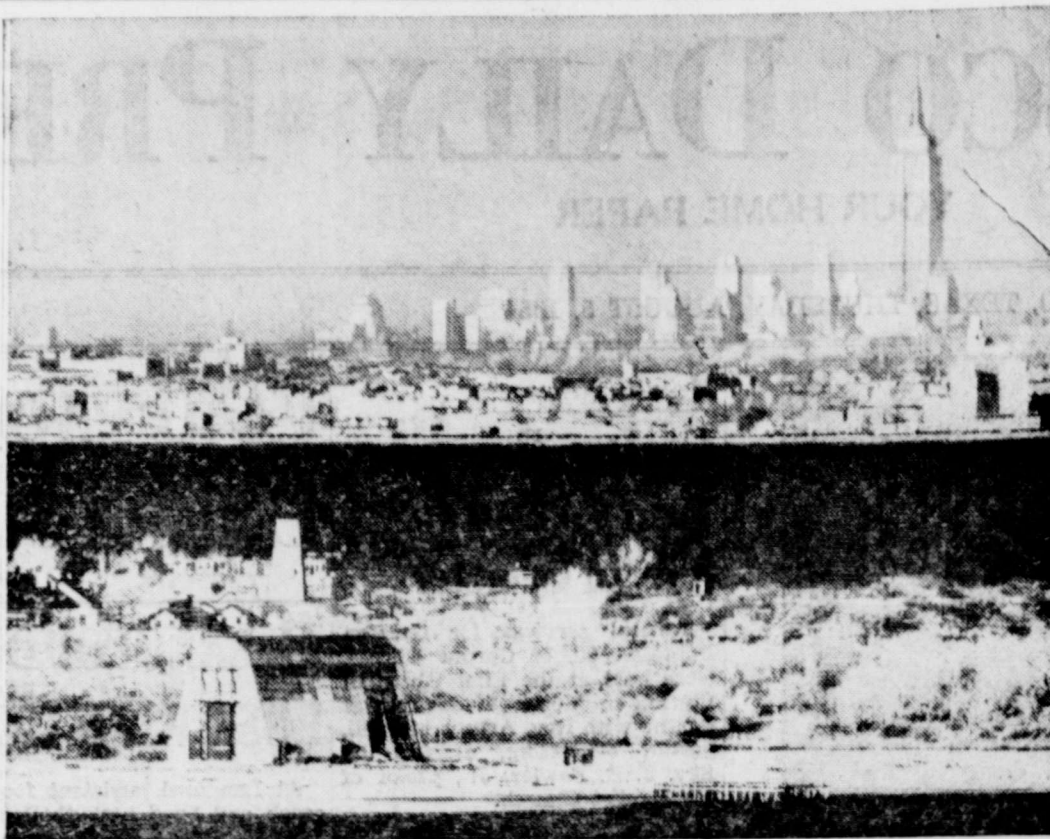

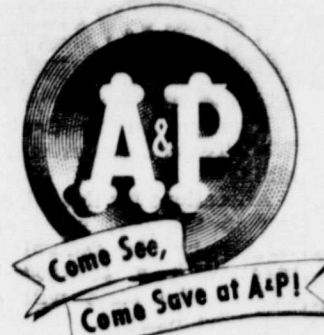

State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN — State candidates in the runoff races are now on the firing line, blasting away.

In the gubernatorial race, Governor Allan Shivers and Judge Ralph Yarborough have re-formed their lines and are in a showdown battle for the state's top job.

Both candidates for governor had reasons for failing to score a victory in the first primary.

Shivers said that his supporters were too confident and led not turned out at the polls in the expected numbers. He encouraged them to exercise their right to vote in the coming election.

Yarborough said that he would have won the first primary except for Texas Republicans who neglected their own primary to vote against him.

Three Factors Decide

Capable of determining the August election were 400,000 Texans, eligible to vote, who stayed away from the polls July 24.

A smaller factor was the 36,000 who cast their votes for Davis and Holmes.

Also to be considered were the Republicans who voted in their own party primaries in July, but who are free to cast their ballots in the Democratic second primary. Most of these votes, it was generally conceded, would go for Shivers.

Scott in Court Runoff

Austin Attorney Alfred Scott will be in the runoff with Judge Few Brewster, for Place 1 on the Supreme Court.

This race will gain more than a little attention, as will the campaign for Judges Alan Hailey and Lloyd Davidson for the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Fires Hit Area

Hardly had the embers of the political fires cooled when forest fires broke out both east and west of Austin.

Thousands of acres of woodlands, and three homes, now lie scorched, burned and bared as the result of fires around Volente (Dodd City) on Lake Travis west of Austin.

On the opposite side of the capital city, the eastern portion of Bastrop State Park lost 7,000 acres of pine and live oak as the result of an eight-day brush and timber fire... squelched finally by sudden showers.

Drought Aid Arrives

Just as the hot sun has made flammable the forests in the area, so has the temperature and lack of rain taken its toll of the ranchlands.

Governor Shivers and Agricultural Commissioner John White have combined their efforts to obtain drought relief in the form of a federal and state-backed hay program.

Ranchers in 23 Central and West Texas counties will be eligible.

Allocations for the aid, amounting to \$600,000, were provided largely by the federal government with a \$500,000 helping hand. The state will counter with the balance.

Titled "Operation Haylift," the program is the third since 1952 for state ranchers who now are weathering the worst drought in their history. The program will be almost identical to the other two and will allow ranchers to benefit from reduced transportation charges on hay.

Nine other state counties also are being considered for recommendation to the U. S. Agriculture Department.

Counties now receiving aid are Bastrop, Bell, Bexar, Blanco, Bosque, Brown, Burnet, Comal, Comanche, Coryell, Erath, Hamilton, Hays, Kendall, Lampasas, Lee, Llano, McCulloch, Mason, Mills, San Saba, Travis and Williamson.

Governor Shivers, commenting on the program, said he felt it would ease the present situation, but that, "This drought could get so bad we might have to call a special session to provide funds."

Judge Re-rules

Operation of the Commercial Security Insurance Company of Houston, already once halted and continued, has been stopped again by District Judge J. Harris Gardner.

Gardner, who issued a previous order restraining the firm from business and a later one allowing it to continue, issued the latest ruling on grounds that the company had gone into business on borrowed capital, thus violating state law.

State action charging fraudulent organization against the \$250,000 fire and casualty firm was initiated July 15 by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd. He said he had the temporary restraining order at the request of the State Board of Insurance Commissioners.

The order was modified a few days later to allow continuance of the firm's business.

J. D. Wheeler, liquidator for the insurance board, has been named by the court as receiver to supervise all affairs of the company. Ben B. High, company president, said shareholders would receive no loss if the receivership is handled properly.

Business Perks Up

Good news to Texas businessmen that the state's recession-plagued business situation will soon perk up has been issued by the University of Texas Business Research Bureau.

An upswing in business should be noted after a few weeks of stabilization as the present recession has hit its bottom, the bureau reported.

A survey of 2,865 retailers over the states showed June sales equalling those for May but four percent down from last June. For the first half of 1954, sales were seven per cent below 1953 showings.

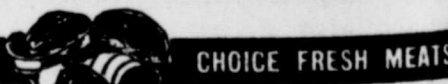
