### Agent stabbed

EL PASO — A man shot and killed by a Border Patrol agent had threatened his ex-wife and been involved in two hit-and-run accidents before he stabbed the agent with a butcher knife, police said. George Bollen, 38, of Bernalillo, N.M., died in the 9:30 p.m. CDT shooting Thursday with agent Juan Gutierrez. Gutierrez underwent surgery for a stab wound to the left side of his abdomen and was in serious but stable condition Friday. /8A

### Lightning strike

WASHINGTON — A teen-ager was killed and 10 other individuals injured Friday when lightning struck in a crowd of students on the grounds of fashionable St. Albans prep school in the nation's capital. "I saw this big red fireball, somebody fell over, and I just ran," said a fifth-grader after the incident. /8A

### How's that go?

LINCOLN, Neb. — Nebraska will celebrate its 125th birthday bash next year, but many people already are in a quandary over how to pronounce "quasiquincentennial." People might mangle the word, but they rarely forget it, said Clark Kolterman of Seward, an organizer for the birthday party. Quasiquincentennial means a 125th anniversary. Kolterman pronounces it "kwas-kwa-centennial," but the Random House Dictionary of the English Language places a long "e" sound on the second syllable — "kwas-kwi-centennial." It's expected that most people will use a shorter version of the word — Q125 — to refer to the yearlong celebration.

### Back to Iraq

NEW YORK — Newsmen Bob Simon, who was captured and held by Iraq during the Persian Gulf War, will return to Baghdad on Monday to spend a week reporting for a July 4 special on the aftermath of the war, CBS said Friday. Simon, 49, also plans to visit Kuwait City to report on postwar life there. He'll be accompanied by CBS reporter Bob McKeown, one of the first TV correspondents to broadcast from the city after occupying Iraqi forces fled the city on Feb. 26.

## Riot breaks out in prison

■ Battle between drug smugglers in Mexican prison leaves at least 13 people dead.

MATAMOROS, Mexico — The Mexican Army was deployed around a state jail where at least 15 inmates were killed Friday night in a turf battle between drug smugglers, a south Texas sheriff said.

The army "surrounded the perimeter of the jail," Cameron County sheriff Alex Perez said across the border in Brownsville, Texas. "Mexican police say everything's calm. They have not gone inside the jail yet."

The Excelsior news agency in Mexico said at least 13 people were killed in what it described as a shootout between two gangs of prisoners armed with everything from machine guns to knives.

It said bodies littered the entrance to the Tamaulipas state jail, called El Cerro, after the riot that started around 7:30 p.m. EDT.

Raul Olmedo, a group captain with the state judicial police in Mexico City, confirmed that it was a battle between inmates provoked by an assassination attempt.

One section of the prison had been burned but the fire was out, Olmedo said.

## More U.S. troops to go to Kuwait

■ 3,700 fresh troops from the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment are preparing to replace departing soldiers.

WASHINGTON — Defense Secretary Dick Cheney has ordered 3,700 fresh U.S. troops to Kuwait to replace departing

Americans as part of a "continued military presence" there, the Pentagon said Friday.

Meanwhile, President Bush told Congress that thousands of U.S. troops must remain in northern Iraq for now to aid and protect the Kurdish minority from Saddam Hussein's forces.

Both Bush and Cheney said anew that the U.S. government wants to bring American soldiers home from the Persian Gulf region as quickly as possible

and has no intention of keeping a permanent postwar ground force in the area.

But Bush said Saddam's "brutal repression of internal opposition" made it necessary to keep U.S. troops in northern Iraq, at least until the United Nations assumes full responsibility for the relief effort.

And Cheney said the deployment of replacement troops to Iraq's liberated

## Pampered jellyfish to squirm on shuttle

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — In a NASA laboratory eight miles from the launch pad, biologist Dorothy Spangenberg dotes on 2,478 tiny jellyfish bound for space next week aboard the shuttle Columbia.

That's her prime crew. About 22,000 others are on standby.

Spangenberg needs a fresh batch of jellyfish, at just the right stage of development, for every launch attempt. She has enough for eight tries, the first is Wednesday morning when Columbia is scheduled for liftoff.

The young creatures, transported from her own laboratory in Norfolk, Va., fill covered casserole dishes that are

## Sierra Club sues to restrict withdrawal of aquifer water

Citing the Endangered Species Act, the Sierra Club filed a lawsuit Friday in federal court in Midland seeking to restrict water withdrawal from central Texas' Edwards Aquifer.

Club officials claim that the U.S. Interior Department under Secretary Manuel Lujan Jr. — the defendant in the lawsuit — has failed to adequately regulate use of Edwards Aquifer water. Continued unrestricted withdrawals from the aquifer will result in the destruction of some species of plants and animals, the Sierra Club claims.

The endangered wildlife includes the San Marcos gambusia, a type of minnow; the fountain darter; the San Marcos salamander; and the Texas blind salamander, according to the lawsuit. Texas wild rice also is threatened, the lawsuit states.

## Protesters greet queen

MIAMI (AP) — Florida rolled out the red carpet Friday for Queen Elizabeth II, who visited an inner-city school, met with a 101-year-old environmentalist and is to bestow a knighthood on Gulf War hero Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf.

The 65-year-old British monarch planned a weekend cruise around the state, ending with a visit Monday to Tampa to award the honorary knighthood to the man who led the allied rout of Iraqi forces from Kuwait.

Recipients of the highest honor for non-Britons do not receive the title "Sir."

The queen, who is traveling with her husband, Prince Philip, flew in from Washington aboard a privately chartered Concorde. The entourage was greeted by Gov. Lawton Chiles and then whisked by limousine to Booker T. Washington Middle School in Miami's predominantly black Overtown neighborhood.

It is her third state visit to the United States and first tour of Florida. She was in for a different kind of welcome in a multicultural city that is no stranger to controversy.

The tour brought out supporters of a Miami convention boycott protesting the city's snub of anti-apartheid leader Nelson Mandela last June.

Cuban-born Mayor Xavier Suarez refused to meet with Mandela because of his ties with Cuban leader Fidel Castro. In December, Suarez said he regretted the way city officials handled the visit, but boycott leaders were not appeased.

Voters in five north and west Midland precincts head to the polls today to decide the District 6 school board runoff election.

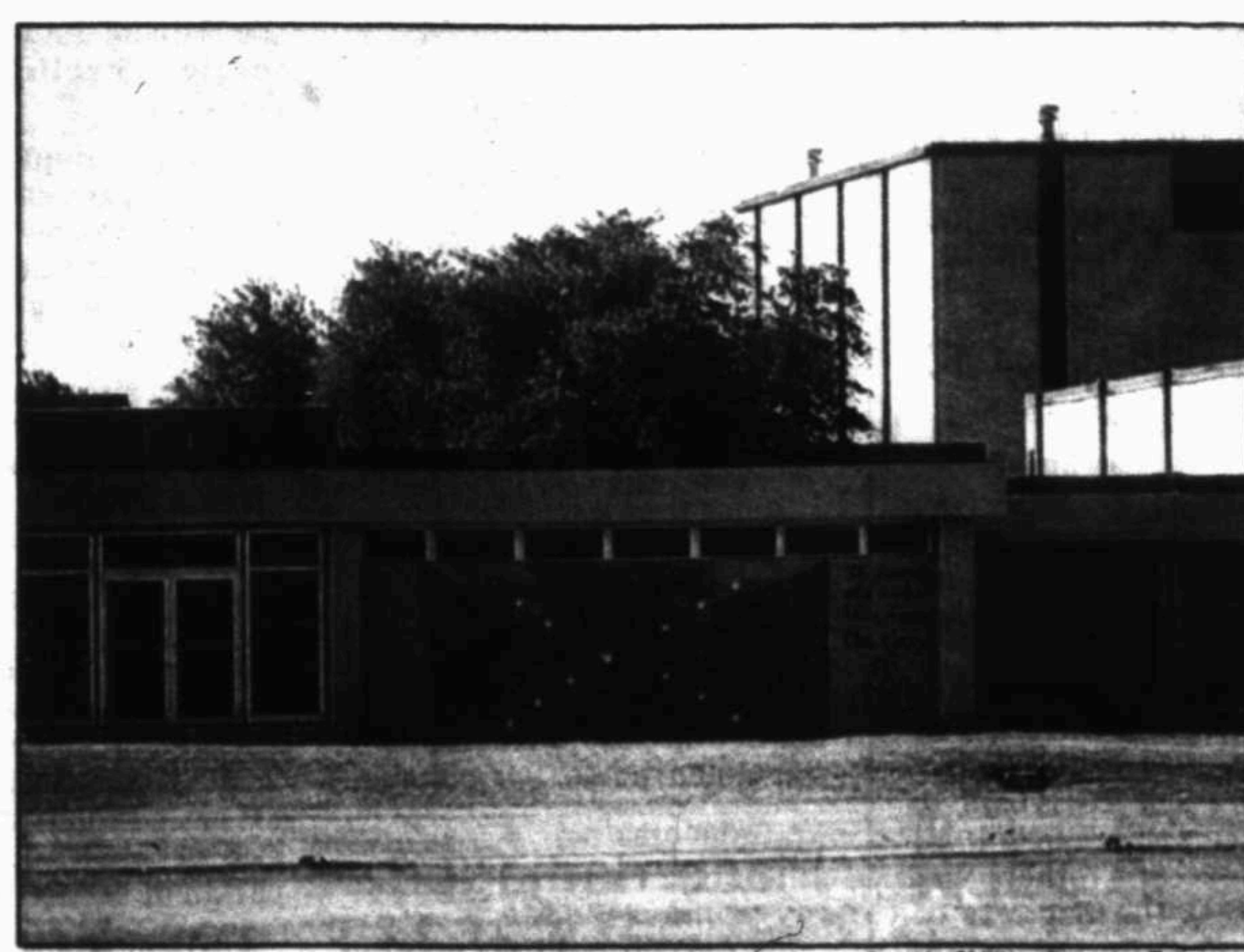
Balloting between Gary Willis and Jerry Weant, will run from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at two polling places.

Willis and Weant were the top performers in the District 6 election May 5, taking 46.8 percent and 33 percent of the vote, respectively. Lex Crawford came in third with 20.2 percent.

Some 2,440 people out of about 8,000 registered voters in District 6 cast ballots in the May 5 election.

A runoff election between the top two vote-getters is necessary because none of the candidates garnered 50 percent of the vote.

The National Weather Service forecast for today calls for mostly fair skies, with a high in the low 90s. Winds will be from the south at 15 to 20 mph and gusty. Tonight is expected to be partly cloudy, with a low in the low 60s.

**STATE**

West Texas was mostly sunny Friday, but cloudy skies continued across the rest of the state with rain showers and a few isolated thunderstorms scattered over Northeast Texas and Southeast Texas.

A flash flood watch was also issued for Northeast and North Texas, including Waco, Dallas-Fort Worth, Palestine, Nacogdoches, Marshall and Athens.

The forecast was for continued cloudiness and a chance of thunderstorms across much of Texas on Saturday. High temperatures in the 80s and 90s.

**NATION**

Thunderstorms swarmed over the Mississippi Valley and the lower Great Lakes region Friday as a slow-moving cold front extending from New England to Texas met warm, moist air in its path.

A flash flood watch was posted for northeastern Missouri and west-central Illinois, where previous heavy rains have saturated the ground. Showers and thunderstorms were widely scattered from east Texas to the Atlantic Coast states. Rain also fell in South Dakota, Nebraska and Wisconsin. Strong northeasterly winds accompanied cool, wet weather in the Dakotas.

Temperatures contrasted sharply on either side of the front, with highs in the 80s and lower 90s from Texas, across the Mississippi Valley area and to the Atlantic Coast, while readings in the upper Great Lakes reached the 40s and 50s.

Temperatures were in the lower 50s in the Chicago area early Friday afternoon while readings across the southern half of Illinois were in the 80s.

**FLORIDA: Queen visits Miami school**

About two dozen black demonstrators in downtown Miami and another dozen at Booker middle school held boycott signs, and some wore "Remember Mandela" T-shirts.

"(We) want to remind the world that while Miami rolls out the red carpet for the queen, the black community in Miami gets the royal snub and we're not genuflecting," said boycott leader H.T. Smith, an attorney.

The Irish American Unity Conference said it planned a Friday night demonstration at Bayfront Park, near where the queen's 412-foot yacht Britannia is docked.

That's where a black-tie dinner was held for a select group of guests, among them former Presi-

dent Reagan and his wife Nancy, and former President Ford, and his wife, Betty.

As the guests boarded the yacht for dinner, crew members loaded Florida citrus on the yacht for the trip around the Keys.

At Booker T. Washington, students entertained the queen with a 15-minute pageant on the city's history followed by a performance from the school's marching band. In addition to "Rule Britannia," the band performed some soul and rap scores, including the pop favorite "Gonna Make You Sweat."

The queen, wearing a thin blue and white frock with a blue boater, smiled and clapped politely. She did not seem bothered by the 88-degree heat.

"She's really kind of down to

earth," said Principal John Williams. "She's easy to talk to. We talked about the play and how well it went."

At Vizcaya, an antique-filled, 70-room Italian Renaissance mansion on Biscayne Bay where Pope John Paul II met with then-President Reagan, the queen met with Marjory Stoneman Douglas, the 101-year-old Everglades preservation pioneer.

At a garden party, she mingled briefly with community leaders and regular folks. Party fare in the statue-studded Vizcaya gardens offered hors d'oeuvres with a Florida flair, including stone crab in a pastry boat and marinated frog legs in phyllo dough.

The queen was handed a clear plastic umbrella for her outdoor mingling with guests as it began to

drizzle. Assistant County Manager Tony Ojeda had a ticket to the Vizcaya party where the guest list reflected the city's ethnic diversity. "I'm a Cuban who's an Anglophile, imagine that," he said.

Security was tight at the mansion, with Secret Service agents prowling and two Florida Marine Patrol boats cruising the waters. Before the queen arrived, a man in a small, yellow kayak paddling toward Vizcaya was turned away by patrolling officers.

On Thursday, the queen became the first British monarch to address a joint session of Congress. She also attended her first baseball game — a Baltimore-Oakland matchup at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium.

**Trade deficit shrinks to \$4.05 billion**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. trade deficit narrowed sharply to \$4.05 billion in March, the lowest level in nearly eight years, as the recession cut further into import demand while hefty increases in aircraft and computer sales kept exports at near-record levels, the government said Friday.

The Commerce Department said the deficit shrank by 26.5 percent from an already low February level of \$5.5 billion. Imports fell 2.7 percent to a two-year low of \$38.04 billion while exports edged up 1.2 percent to \$33.99 billion, the third highest level on record.

The Bush administration said the new trade report bolstered its view that overseas demand for American products will help lift the country out of the recession.

"Exports are the engine of growth for the American economy," Commerce Secretary Robert Mosbacher told a trade conference in San Jose, Calif., one stop on a 30-city tour to encourage U.S. companies to trade more internationally.

"While economic growth overseas has slowed, American indus-

try clearly is building market share abroad through renewed commitment to quality and to the expansion of international markets," Mosbacher commented on the trade statistics.

Some private economists were less optimistic, noting that while exports are staying near the record level reached in October, they have essentially been flat for the last six months.

"You are not going to get strong export growth when the economies of your major trading partners are winding down," said David Resler, chief economist of Nomura Securities in New York.

"The administration is wrong in its views on export growth," Economists worried that the February and March increases in the dollar, by making U.S. goods more expensive, would hurt American sales at the very time demand is shrinking because of recessions in such major U.S. markets as Canada and Britain.

Even the administration has expressed concerns. Michael Boskin, chairman of the president's Council of Economic Advisers, specifi-

cally listed weakness in Europe and Japan as a risk to the administration's forecast that the U.S. economy will begin growing again after mid-year.

President Bush and Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady tried to convince key U.S. allies last month to agree to a round of coordinated worldwide interest rate cuts to boost global demand, but Japan and Germany rejected the idea, citing inflationary risks in their countries.

The March deficit was the smallest monthly imbalance since a \$3.96 billion trade gap in June 1983.

So far this year, the deficit has been running at an annual rate of \$67.7 billion, far below last year's \$101.8 billion deficit. The administration released a new outlook Thursday projecting that this year's deficit will fall to around \$90 billion. If that happens, it would be the first time the deficit has been below the \$100-billion mark since 1983.

Some analysts said the administration's projection may prove too optimistic if export demand re-

mains flat or even weakens while U.S. demand for imports picks up in the second half of this year.

"To keep the trade deficit narrow as the economy emerges from recession, we shall need even stronger export growth. Imports have nowhere to go but up," said Barry Rogstad, an economist and head of the American Business Council.

The March drop in imports came despite the fact that America's foreign oil bill rose 1.6 percent to \$3.76 billion. The volume of oil shipments was up a sharp 9.8 percent but this was partially offset by a drop in the price, which fell to \$17.15 per barrel, down \$1.43 from the February average.

The small rise in U.S. exports was attributed to a big \$700 million jump in aircraft sales, which rose to nearly \$2 billion. Computer exports rose by nearly one-third to \$2.6 billion, with sales of semiconductors and industrial machinery up as well.

As usual, the largest deficit was with Japan, a \$3.6 billion imbalance that accounted for 89 percent of the total.

**EDWARDS: Sierra Club sues to restrict water**

The entire known world population of these species lives underground in the aquifer or in bodies of water fed by the aquifer, according to the lawsuit.

The gambusia, the fountain darter, the blind salamander and Texas wild rice are on the federal Endangered Species List, according to the lawsuit, while the San Marcos salamander is listed as a threatened species.

Use of aquifer water also places several rare species of beetle and catfish at risk, according to the lawsuit.

"If water levels of the Edwards continue to recede, the natural

spring flow will cease, destroying the critical habitats at the springs and the unique flora and fauna that reside there, and damaging the underground ecosystem in the Edwards itself," the lawsuit states.

The aquifer, which provides drinking and irrigation water to San Antonio and Austin, discharges into the Guadalupe River Basin at Comal Springs in New Braunfels and San Marcos Springs in San Marcos.

The aquifer is a 175-mile underground reservoir that underlies eight counties in central Texas: Atascosa, Bexar, Comal, Guadalupe, Hays, Kinney, Medina and Uvalde.

According to the lawsuit, there are about 800 major wells tapping

into the Edwards — wells that drained about 176 billion gallons from the aquifer in 1988.

In the lawsuit, the Sierra Club — a nationwide environmental group that claims 22,000 Texas members — requests that the courts:

■ Declare that a minimum spring flow of 350 cubic feet per second at Comal Springs is necessary to protect the gambusia, the fountain darter, the wild rice and the San Marcos salamander.

■ Order the Interior Department to enforce the Endangered Species Act where the threatened Edwards Aquifer wildlife is concerned.

■ Order the Interior Depart-

ment to implement recovery plans to ensure the flow of water to San Marcos Springs.

■ Order the Interior Department to implement plans to preserve the blind salamander, the San Marcos salamander and the endangered and threatened species at Comal Springs.

■ Award attorney's fees and court costs to the Sierra Club. Texas Sierra Club Director Ken Kramer refused to comment on the lawsuit Friday, but he said his organization would issue a news release Monday.

Interior Department officials and city officials in Austin and San Antonio could not be reached for comment late Friday afternoon.

In Texas, Cameron County officials stationed police on both international bridges to keep possible escapees from entering the United States, said sheriff's Lt. S.R. Garcia.

"The federal judicial commander has been in touch with us and so far they've got about 15 to 17 dead inmates," Garcia said. Mexican judicial police had removed some of the bodies from the prison, he said.

The Mexican Judicial Police had called in an elite anti-terrorist group known as the Zorros (Foxes) to quell the disturbance, Garcia

said. He said the group of 40 federal officers were preparing to storm the jail late Friday.

Police said the violence began when a gunman shot and wounded alleged Colombian drug lord Oliverio Chavez Araujo. In retaliation, the gunman, identified as German Botero, was shot dead and his body slung from a pole in the prison courtyard.

"Mexican federal police are trying to get medical attention to him," Garcia said of Chavez. "They have not secured the area where he was being detained. His bodyguards are armed with automatic weapons inside the jail."

**Panel OKs Midlander's appointment**

AUSTIN — The Senate Nominations Committee has approved the appointment of Tom Ingram of Midland to the five-member Texas Low-Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Authority, and the Senate is expected to OK the appointment in a routine vote Monday.

Ingram, a graduate of the University of Texas law school and

vice president of Lone Star Abstract and Title, was nominated to the board by former Gov. Bill Clements to succeed James P. Smothermon. His term will expire Feb. 1, 1992.

The board is in charge of the regulation and disposal site selection of low-level radioactive materials, such as X-rays and hospital equipment and clothing that come in contact with low-level radiation.

One had been caught or disciplined in connection with the graffiti.

"The police don't have any suspects," Miller said. "There is no way to know whether it was ... students. Whether or not it was a 1990 alumnus, we don't know."

Midland Police Department reports concerning the LHS vandalism were not available by Friday evening. Calls to LHS Principal Jack Fryar were not returned.

Miller said MISD work crews were sandblasting to remove the flag Friday afternoon. He estimated MISD's cost to clean up the

graffiti at about \$305.

"All acts of vandalism are the same," Miller said. "They are wasteful, unfortunate incidents in which we end up spending time and money on things other than instruction."

The MISD board of trustees voted March 26 to phase out the Confederate battle flag, with its characteristic stars and cross-bars, as an official Lee spirit symbol. Minority students and others had complained that the flag was offensive because it represented the racism of the Confederacy and the Old South.

A new maroon and gray spirit symbol for the school was adopted at this week's trustees' meeting.

stacked in incubators. The Pyrex dishes are clear so Spangenberg can keep an eye on the action inside.

"The jellyfish just love them," she said. "I check them every day to make sure they're happy and in good shape."

How does she know they're happy?

"After 30 years, you know," she said, laughing. "It's like knowing your child."

Spangenberg beamed as she showed off her menagerie Friday.

"They're the best little jellyfish in the world. You can't find any better jellyfish," she said. "I went to a conference and I didn't find anyone who pays more attention to their jellyfish than I do."

Spangenberg's pampered brood will be the first jellyfish to fly in space.

The Eastern Virginia Medical School researcher wants to see how Aurelia aurita, or moon jellies, develop in weightlessness. They mature into a free-swimming form in five to six days on Earth when iodine is added to their water, making them ideal candidates for Columbia's nine-day flight.

The first group of 2,478 jellyfish will be loaded into Columbia on Tuesday, 17 hours before scheduled liftoff, in plastic bags and bottles. They will be moved from a middeck locker into Spacelab — a laboratory module in the cargo bay — once the shuttle reaches orbit.

Also on board will be 30 rats and seven astronauts.

Most of the flying jellies — 2,028 — will be polyps, an early form attached to underwater surfaces. They are about the size of the lead tip of a pencil.

The 450 others will be the more mature, pulsating ephyrae, which have gravity receptors to maintain direction and balance. Spangenberg will examine them after the

flight to see how much calcium is lost in the receptors, contributing to scientists' knowledge of human calcium loss in space.

It takes four to six months for ephyrae to reach the final developmental stage, the familiar blobby form known as medusa.

Astronaut Tamara Jernigan will inject iodine into the water of less than a third of the polyps in orbit and videotape their behavior.

"They're cute. I'll admit it," Jernigan said. "It's fun to watch them. You find yourself sort of mesmerized."

Spangenberg started stockpiling polyps in 1989 for the Spacelab mission, then scheduled for mid-1990. She didn't dare stop breeding when fuel leaks grounded Columbia last summer and delayed the flight; an epidemic could have wiped her out.

Polyps begat polyps that begat polyps, and on it went and on it goes, at least until Columbia gets off the ground. It's the most jellyfish Spangenberg has ever had and more than she imagined she would need.

order of President Hosni Mubarak. Abdel-Wahab wrote about 1,800 songs.

Aicha was the eldest of Abdel-Wahab's five children by his first wife, who died a few years ago. He named Aicha after his mother, and family members said she was his favorite child.

On the eve of her fatal heart attack, they said, Miss Abdel-Wahab wept as she watched a television production of one of the seven movies in which Abdel-Wahab starred.

Aicha is survived by two daughters by two marriages that ended in divorce.

neighbor "recognizes the need for a continued U.S. military presence in Kuwait, given the current situation in the gulf and the need for the government of Kuwait to reconstitute its forces."

Bush also signed a bill Friday authorizing \$425 million to replenish refugee and disaster aid accounts for the Kurds in northern Iraq.

The measure is a companion to a \$556 million appropriations bill that would actually spend the money but which has not yet passed Congress. The appropriations bill, now before a House-Senate conference committee, has a higher price tag because it also includes funds to reimburse the military for relief-effort related costs.

The Pentagon said in its statement that the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment, headquartered in Fulda, Germany, will send elements of three squadrons to Kuwait in order to permit U.S. forces there to return to their home units.

The new troops are to be in place by mid-June and will remain there until Sept. 1. Their arrival will allow some 3,700 members of the 3rd Armored Division, along with some 1,300 combat support personnel, to leave.

"We have agreed as a temporary measure to leave forces there for now. But it is our objective to get U.S. forces out as quickly as possible. And the president has made it clear that we don't want a permanent ground presence in the Gulf," the statement quoted Cheney as saying.

Instead, Cheney has said, the administration wants to keep a strengthened naval presence in the gulf, be permitted to store enough supplies for a heavy armored division, and conduct repeated military exercises with the forces of the gulf states.

In his separate status report to Congress, Bush said "the Iraqi repression of the Kurdish people has necessitated a limited introduction of U.S. forces into northern Iraq for emergency relief purposes."

There are about 8,000 U.S. troops in northern Iraq and in Turkey assigned to relief projects. "This effort is not intended as a permanent solution to the plight of the Iraqi Kurds. It is a humanitarian measure designed to save lives. ... It is also not an attempt to intervene militarily into the internal affairs of Iraq or to impair its territorial integrity," Bush told Congress.

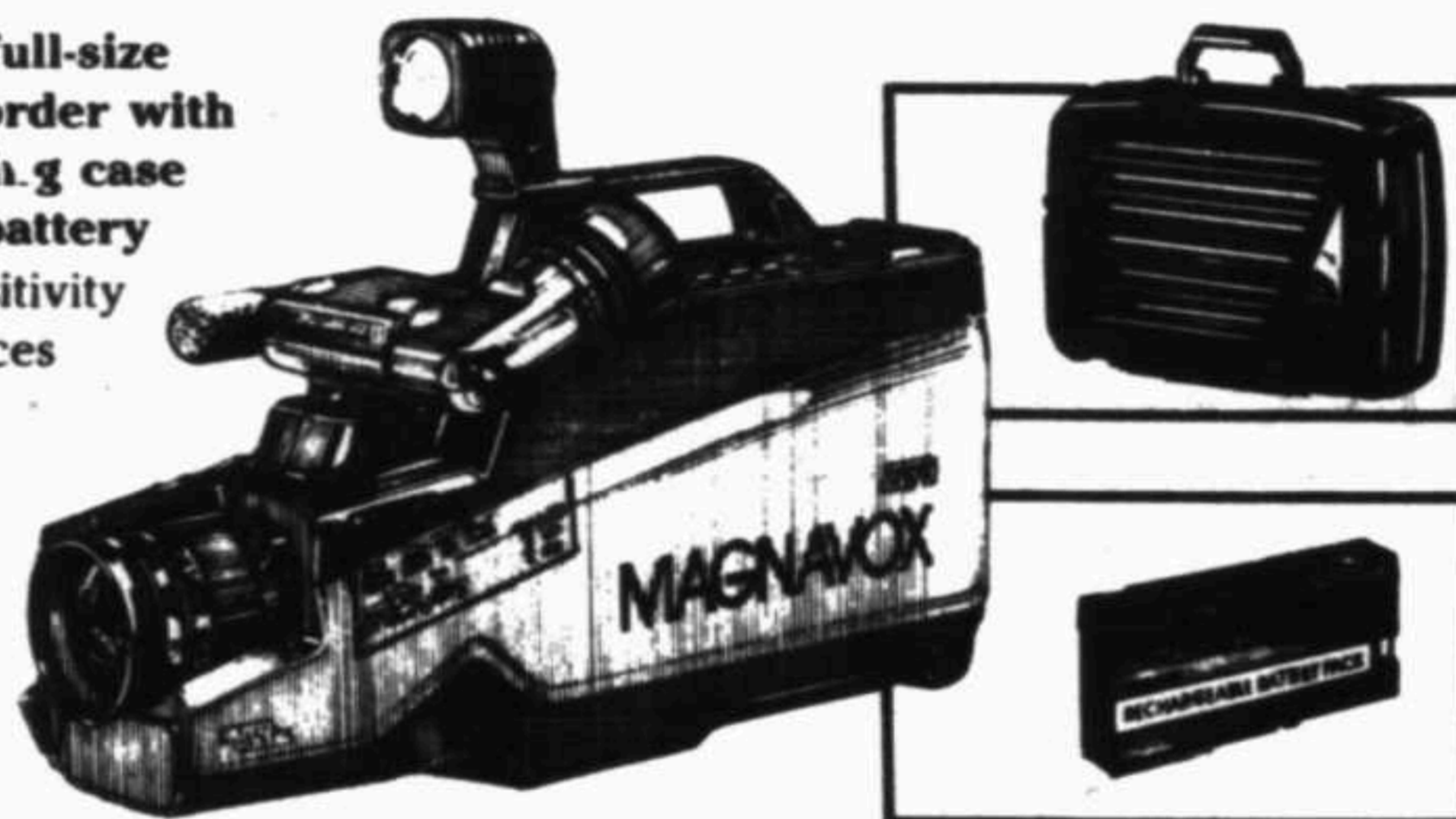

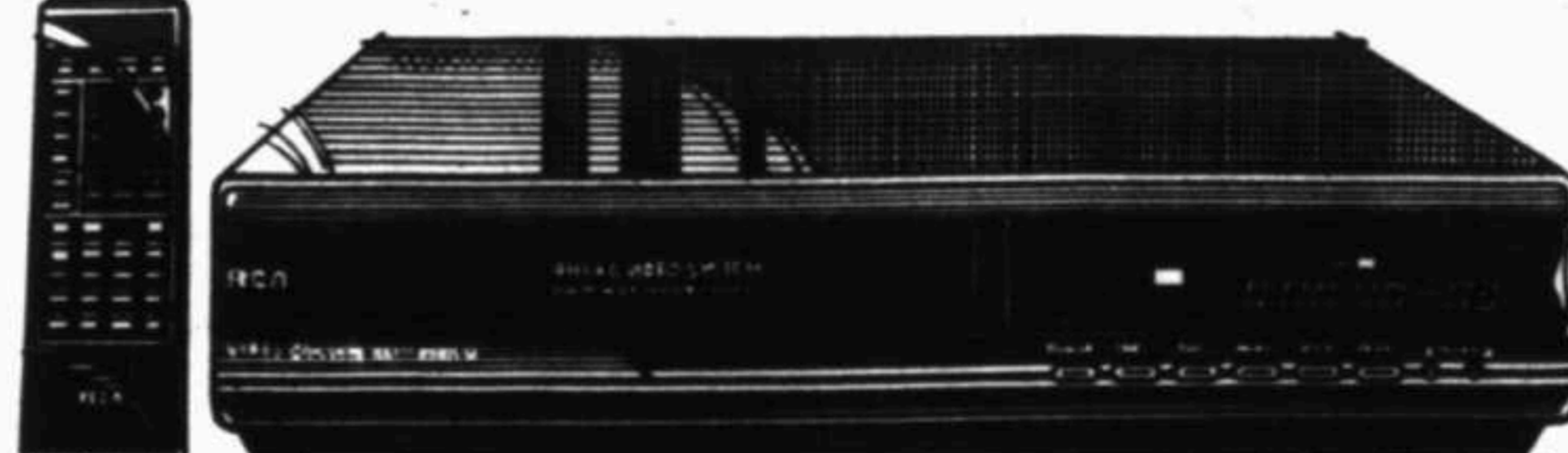

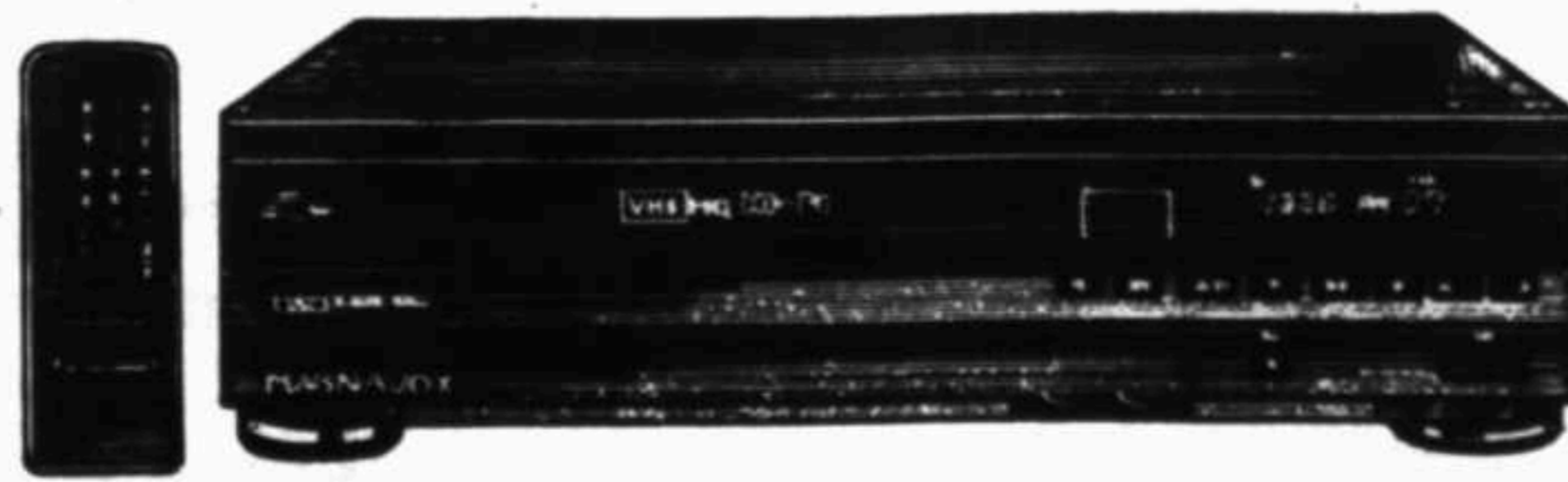

# Kurdish leader reports agreement on key points

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — A top Kurdish leader said Friday he has agreed with Saddam Hussein's government on key points of a plan for Kurdish autonomy and democracy throughout Iraq. He urged Kurds to return to their homes.

Massoud Barzani, whose Kurdish Democratic Party is the largest guerrilla faction in the coalition against Saddam, also suggested the Kurds have dropped their demand for international guarantees for the accord.

Barzani, who has been discussing autonomy and reforms with the government for two weeks, gave no details of the agreement, saying they would be outlined at a news conference on Saturday.

The Kurdish leader also urged refugees who fled the fighting to return to northern Iraq. Tens of thousands of Kurds fled to the mountains to escape government retribution after their failed uprising in the wake of the Persian Gulf War.

Up to 100,000 of those refugees are on their way home, and allied officials said Friday they intend to build several more camps near Zakho in northern Iraq. The officials said in a statement issued in Turkey that they plan up to five new temporary tent villages, each housing 20,000 refugees.

Barzani told an impromptu newsconference at a Baghdad hotel that he was optimistic an agreement with Saddam's government would be signed soon.

"We didn't reach full agreement, but we passed a very important step," Barzani said. "We agreed with the government about the main points of the democracy."

A key demand of the Kurdish rebels has been wider participation of the Kurds in legislative and executive decisions. They have also called for democracy throughout Iraq.

They want full autonomy in three northern provinces where most of the 3.5 million Iraqi Kurds live, and a share of the revenue from lucrative oil fields located in the Kurdish region.

The Kurds accuse Saddam of not honoring a 1970 agreement on autonomy. But asked whether the Kurdish people could trust Saddam now without international guarantees, Barzani said: "Why not?"

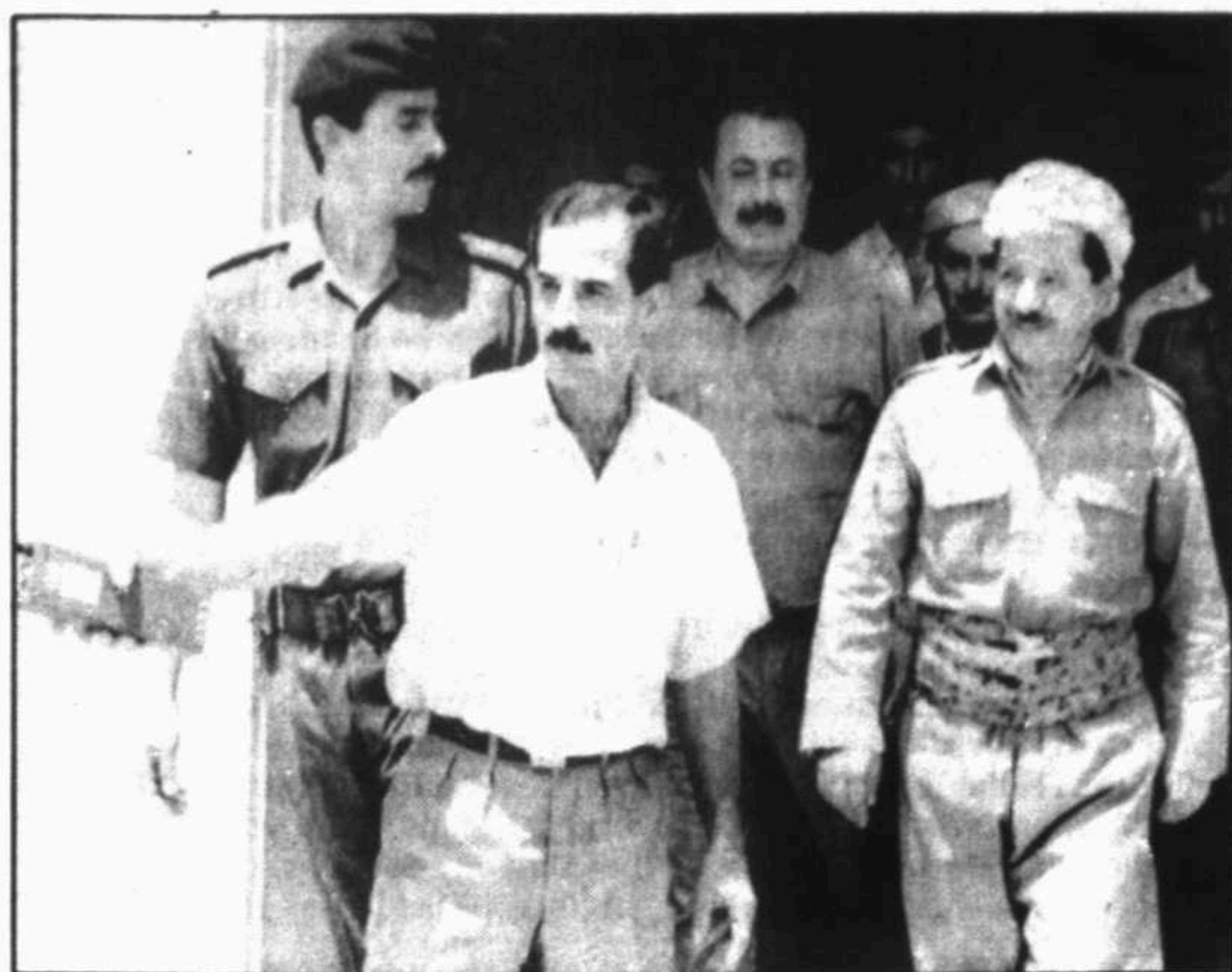
He added: "I think the democracy and the trust between each other are the biggest guarantees."

His comments suggested that the Kurds had dropped their de-

mand that the five permanent members of the U.N. Security Council guarantee any accord with the government. The members are the United States, the Soviet Union, Britain, France and China.

Barzani said the two sides had not discussed the presence of Western troops in northern Iraq. But when asked whether he was ready to have these troops pull out, Barzani said: "I think now at the moment we have to reach agreement."

The U.S.-led coalition forces have established what they call "safety havens" in northern Iraq

for Kurdish refugees who fled their villages and towns in March after Saddam's troops began cracking down on the rebels.

About 2 million Kurds have been displaced. More than 1 million went to Iran and the rest either stayed in the buffer created by the allies or went to camps in Turkey.

Jalal Talabani, leader of the Patriotic Union of Kurdistan, headed the first round of talks with Saddam last month and said at the time that for the first time in 24 years of dealing with Baghdad, he felt an agreement was possible.

# Agent kills man who stabbed him

EL PASO (AP) — A man shot and killed by a Border Patrol agent had threatened his ex-wife and been involved in two hit-and-run accidents before he stabbed the agent with a butcher knife, police said.

George Bollen, 38, of Bernalillo, N.M., died in the 9:30 p.m. CDT shooting Thursday. He was the second person to be shot by a Border Patrol agent in El Paso in the past week. On May 10, an agent shot and killed a Mexican man near the border. The Border Patrol said the agent was attacked by three men.

The agent injured Thursday, Juan Gutierrez, underwent surgery for a stab wound to the left side of his abdomen. He was in serious but stable condition Friday.

Gutierrez observed Bollen's car swerving in traffic on Border Highway, which parallels the Rio Grande in south El Paso, and saw his car leave the road, said Police Lt. Eddie Ortega.

FBI spokesman Terry Kincaid said Gutierrez was attacked by Bollen, who got out of his car screaming and wielding a knife with a 7-inch to 8-inch blade.

"Despite repeated admonishments to drop the weapon, the subject lunged at the agent stabbing him," said Border Patrol

spokesman Doug Mosier. Mosier said another motorist who had stopped to help Bollen also was threatened with the knife. Gutierrez's partner hustled the witness away when Gutierrez was stabbed.

The agent then shot Bollen twice in the chest with his .357 Magnum service revolver. An autopsy was being performed Friday. The agent and his partner were not wearing uniforms but were on duty. They were riding in an unmarked vehicle patrolling for smugglers of undocumented immigrants.

"If the agent hadn't shot the guy, he might have come after him again," Mosier said.

Ortega said Bollen had been on a rampage that began about half an hour before he was killed.

"He went to his ex-wife's house, rammed his vehicle into the residence, (verbally) threatened the ex-wife and took off," Ortega said. He had two hit-and-run accidents as he sped and swerved through traffic, he said.

The agent remained at Thomas Hospital on Friday.

"We think everything is OK at this time. The agent is going to make it fine," said Jerry Armstrong, assistant El Paso Border Patrol chief.

The shooting could possibly intensify a stormy mood across the border, set off last week by the slaying of a Mexican man by another agent.

The agent, who has not been identified, fatally shot Ruben Navarrete Tarin, 24, after a struggle along a Rio Grande levee. Border Patrol officials said Navarrete had a long criminal history and was a member of a violent gang.

But since the May 10, newspapers in Ciudad Juarez, Mexico, have run daily reports critical of the Border Patrol. On Wednesday, members of a Marxist group, the Popular Defense Committee or CDP, demonstrated outside the

U.S. consul in Juarez chanting anti-American and anti-Border Patrol slogans.

# Man expected to be charged with first-degree murder in wife's death

DALLAS (AP) — A 34-year-old Dallas nursery consultant was arrested on an investigative charge of murder Friday in connection with the January poisoning death of his estranged wife.

Bond was set at \$2 million for Richard Lyon because law officers believe he is a flight risk, said Dallas Deputy Police Chief Ray Hawkins.

Defense attorneys requested a bond reduction hearing, which was granted for next week. Hawkins said a formal charge of first-degree murder would be filed

against Lyon after that hearing. Hawkins said a four-month investigation led police to believe Lyon was responsible for the Jan. 14 death of Nancy Dillard Lyon, a former partner at Trammell Crow Co., who died of arsenic poisoning.

Several days before she died, Mrs. Lyon was rushed to Presbyterian Hospital of Dallas with stomach cramps and nausea. She was treated for toxic shock syndrome but was unresponsive.

On March 13, the case was ruled a homicide after investigators said

Mrs. Lyon had apparently been poisoned with arsenic over a period of time.

Mrs. Lyon, a Harvard-educated land planner and one of only two women to achieve the position of partner at Trammell Crow, had resigned her full-time job last year to spend more time with her daughters, ages 2 and 4.

She was planning to move in February to Washington, D.C., where she was helping to set up the National Tree Trust, a new federal program dedicated to planting trees nationwide.

# Senators OK death penalty bill

AUSTIN (AP) — A bill allowing jurors to consider a defendant's circumstances when deciding the death penalty was sent to Gov. Ann Richards on Friday after the Senate approved the measure.

The bill is designed to address a U.S. Supreme Court ruling in the case of Johnny Paul Penry, a Texas man convicted in the 1980 rape and fatal stabbing of Pamela Moseley Carpenter in Livingston.

In 1986, Penry came within hours of execution before receiving a stay from the court. The court later ruled that jurors at his first trial should have been told they could consider testimony about Penry's mental competence as evidence mitigating against his death sentence.

Penry, a mentally retarded former laborer, was retried and convicted in 1990. He has said he was abused by his parents and never attended regular school beyond a few days in the first grade.

Sen. John Montford, D-Lubbock, said the bill was needed to get Texas' death penalty law in compliance with the court's decision in the Penry case.

By adopting the measure, the Senate also agreed with the House to remove an amendment by Sen. Ted Lyon, D-Rockwall, that would have allowed a jury to sentence capital murder defendants to life in prison without parole.

But the life without parole issue, which has grabbed headlines because of the recent paroling of convicted murderers, is likely to remain before the Legislature in the closing days of the session, which expires May 27.

The House has passed a bill requiring a person to serve 30 years of a life sentence before being considered for parole. The current length is 15 years.

That bill has been changed by Lyon in his committee back to life without parole. He said some crimes are so heinous that they should be punished with life without parole.

# Ex-lawmaker buried in Anson

ANSON (AP) — This tiny West Texas farming town virtually shut down Friday in remembrance of its most famous citizen.

City Hall closed promptly at 3 p.m., flags flew at half mast and the wind whistled across the cotton fields just as it did when Omar Burleson was born in a makeshift hospital here in 1906.

Burleson, who served as a Democratic representative in Congress for 32 years, spanning seven presidential terms, was buried during an afternoon memorial service.

The handsome, mustachioed congressman from the 17th District, which includes some of West Texas' premier ranches and oil deposits, was remembered by friends and relatives for his country charm and fairness.

"Omar Burleson stood for the kinder, gentler nation that America talks about today," said U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm, who assumed Burleson's seat in Congress when he stepped down in 1979.


Burleson died Tuesday night of what doctors termed natural causes after being hospitalized for two months. He was 85.

Stenholm and Abilene Christian University Chancellor John C. Stevens eulogized Burleson in front of hundreds of mourners who filled the Church of Christ on Anson's dusty main street.

"Omar was supposed to be occupied with farming cotton, but he was distracted by the dome of Anson's city building," Stenholm said. "Little did he know he would be spending most of his adult life under another dome far from Anson."

During Burleson's terms in Congress beginning in 1946, he was able to mobilize voting strength among conservatives from both parties.

He is survived by several nieces and nephews.

■ Town's police chief fired

FLOWER MOUND — The town's police chief was fired this week after officials accused him of planting electronic bugs to snoop on town employees. Town Manager Van James fired Dennis Hazelwood on Wednesday and announced the move Thursday. James said five employees gave sworn statements that the chief had monitored employees' telephone conversations and had shown one person "the loca-

tion of bugs in the walls and ceiling tiles of the former town hall." Results of James' investigation will be turned over to the Denton County district attorney's office for review, the town manager said.

■ Mrs. Quayle receives award

HOUSTON — Marilyn Quayle received a public service recognition award Friday from the American Association of Cancer Researchers, saying that

efforts to find cancer cures "are the true legacy of intellectual freedom." Mrs. Quayle, wife of Vice President Dan Quayle, has been trying to increase public awareness of the need for early detection of breast cancer and to raise funds for private research efforts.

■ Museum to break ground

DALLAS — The Dallas Museum will break ground next week on the \$30 million Jake and Nancy Ha-

mon Building.

Nancy Hamon donated \$20 million for the building in 1988, but the museum has struggled to raise the additional \$10 million needed for construction and \$25 million for an operating endowment.

The addition will give the art museum more temporary exhibition space than any museum in the United States.

UIL won't bar suspects from playoffs

ARLINGTON (AP) — The University Interscholastic League said it won't bar from the playoffs two high school baseball players who are suspected of credit card fraud.

UIL Athletic Director Bill Farney said the UIL, which regulates high school sports in Texas, doesn't bar students charged with criminal offenses from participating in sports or other extracurricular activities.

"We just hope the school would use common sense in this area," Farney said. "A certain code of conduct is expected, not only from students, but from district personnel."

Martin High School left fielder Steven Johnson and second baseman Christopher Erik Warner were arrested this week along with a former Martin student on suspicion of credit card fraud.

Johnson and Warner practiced with the team Thursday. Martin coach Terry King and principal Steve Jacoby said disciplinary action had been taken against Johnson and Warner.

School officials declined to say whether the two would be allowed to play Friday night against Grand Prairie High School in the opening game of a series to determine the area Class 5A champion.

Police contend the pair, along with former Martin student Darren Little, were involved in a scam in which the 18-year-old suspects used credit cards lost by patrons at an Arlington movie theater to buy compact discs, video games and other merchandise.

Johnson was arrested at school Thursday and Warner was pulled off the team's practice field Wednesday afternoon by police and arrested. Little was arrested at his job at a car detailing shop.

Police said the investigation began in February when a teacher tipped police to rumors circulating at the school. More arrests are possible, police said.

All three suspects posted bond. Little told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram he has made restitution for the merchandise he charged. He is suspected of buying \$957 in goods, according to police documents.

Warner is suspected of four counts of fraud in connection with the February use of credit cards to purchase about \$630 worth of merchandise from several stores in Arlington.

Johnson is suspected of using a lost credit card to purchase \$320.65 in merchandise.

Store robber changes mind

AMARILLO (AP) — The manager of an Amarillo convenience store says he was dumbfounded after a gunman who robbed his store asked for a beer, then gave back the money and told him to call the police.

"If he wanted a beer that bad, hell, I would have bought him one," said Bob Stringfellow, manager of the Toot'n Totum store for the past 24 years.

Stringfellow said the man entered the store Thursday afternoon and said, "This is a robbery, give me all your money."

The manager said he thought the man was kidding at first. But the suspect shoved a sawed-off shotgun in his face.

After collecting about \$43, the bandit told Stringfellow, "I think I'll have a beer."

After a couple of swigs, the suspect decided to give the money back and then demanded Stringfellow call the police.

"I was so confused I didn't know what to do," Stringfellow said. "But he was serious, so I called the police and sure enough he gave me the money back, walked out with his beer in his hand and surrendered to police."

Stringfellow said he has no idea what changed the suspect's mind. "Maybe he was more thirsty than he thought," he said.

"I was about to tell him it was against the law to drink a beer inside the store," Stringfellow said. "But then I saw that shotgun and realized he was gonna do whatever he wanted."

Helen Smith, a spokeswoman for the Amarillo Police Department, said the man would be arraigned Monday on a charge of armed robbery.

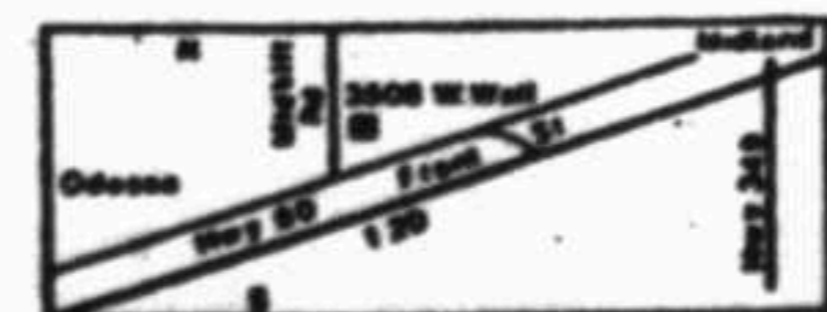

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A local historian has been given the job of explaining the history of the Alamo to Queen Elizabeth II and her husband, Prince Phillip, during their visit next week.

The only catch is historian Henry Guerra has no more than five minutes to complete the task. Guerra will give the royal couple a rapid tour of the Shrine of Texas Liberty next Tuesday.

"I've got five minutes to do it all, and they haven't told me how much ground they want me to cover," said Guerra, chairman of the Bexar County Historical Commission. "So, I'll just give her the essentials of the story of the

Alamo without too much embellishment because we just don't have time."

Guerra said he had planned to mention the 29 British subjects who fought at the Alamo, but he won't have time for an in-depth history lesson.

The historic building is the couple's first stop on a 1-hour 45-minute tour of San Antonio that also will include a river barge ride and a quick visit to the Institute of Texan Cultures.

The queen's son, Prince Charles, also visited the Alamo during a trip to San Antonio and laid a wreath in front of the historic shrine.

with a hopper to Madrid, who turned to make the throw to second with Greth covering.

Madrid's toss was a bit high, and with Ortiz crashing into Greth's legs trying to break up a doable play, Greth lost the handle on the ball and both runners were safe. That brought up Gonzalez, whose grounder to Greth was booted into left field, allowing Ortiz to score and Carrillo to take third.

But then Jerry Valdez hit a line drive to Greth, who snagged the rope then got a double play at first by catching courtesy runner Tony Molina off the bag.

Joe Dumars led Detroit with 32 points, 25 in the first half, as the Pistons ousted the Celtics in six games of the best-of-7 series. Kevin McHale scored 34 points off the bench for the Celtics who overcame a 17-point third-quarter deficit, despite playing without center Robert Parish, who sat out with an ankle injury.

The Pistons, attempting to become only the third team in history to win three straight NBA championships, will start the conference finals in Chicago on Sunday.

The game was tied 105-105 after regulation and Boston took a quick 109-105 lead on baskets by Reggie Lewis and Ed Pinckney.

But the Pistons chipped away. Thomas hit a bank 3-pointer as the shot clock ran out, then a short jumper with 1:41 remaining to put the Pistons ahead for good at 112-111.

Bill Laimbeer's basket gave Detroit a 114-111 lead, then Boston rookie Dee Brown was called for traveling. Moments later, Thomas hit a jumper over Brown from the left side for a five-point lead.

McHale scored Boston's last basket with 16 seconds remaining and Thomas, fouled by Brown, made a free throw with 14 seconds remaining for the final margin.

The other two three-peaters were the Minneapolis Lakers (1952-54) and the Celtics (1959-66).

Brown scored five points and Lewis capped a 7-2 burst that saw Boston cut Detroit's lead to 84-82 with 10:58 to play.

Two dunks by John Salley helped the Pistons push the lead back to 92-84 with 8:13 left, but the Celtics on several occasions closed within three.

Two free throws by Larry Bird gave the Celtics their first lead, 100-99, with 2:13 left in the fourth quarter.

The lead changed hands twice more, then Dumars tied it 103-103 with a basket with 1:22 left and James Edwards hit two free throws with 43 seconds left for a 105-103 Detroit lead.

Dumars, an 89 percent free throw shooter in the regular season, missed two with 21 seconds remaining. Lewis, who had 11 of his 23 points in the period, then tied it 105-105 on his own rebound with 7.8 seconds remaining.

Thomas' desperation turnaround from the free throw line at the regulation buzzer was short.

The Pistons led the entire first half. Boston missed its first six shots and trailed 7-0 before Brian Shaw finally scored 2-48 in.

Meanwhile, Dumars had the hot hand and the Pistons kept feeding him. Dumars, who made only 14-3-pointers in the regular season, made two in a row while scoring 10 consecutive points at one

## It's time again for major gold strike

Strike the Gold owns the Kentucky Derby, but now has to take a second step toward the Triple Crown today in the Preakness Stakes.

BALTIMORE — With one-third of racing's Triple Crown won, Nick Zito waved the flag Friday for Strike the Gold, predicted that he would win another third in the Preakness and said: "He's a professional horse, a wonderful horse, and he's on top of his game."

"There is only one Kentucky Derby champion," the colt's trainer said with even more fervor than usual. "They were in that race — Best Pal, Corporate Report, Hansel, Mane Minister. They are all wonderful horses. But they had their

shot to win the Derby."

They will have another shot to outrun Strike the Gold in the 116th Preakness today, a mile and three-sixteenths around two tight turns with a field of eight competing for first prize of \$432,770 from a purse of \$665,800. Today's weather forecast calls for early drizzle followed by sunshine and temperature in the 70s.

Zito worked his horse lightly Friday morning for a quarter of a mile in 24 seconds down the stretch at Pimlico Race Course, and said he still sensed a lack of respect for his colt. But he received a vote of confidence from the enemy camp. Ron McAnally, the trainer of Olympio, who did not run in the Derby and who was second choice in the early track line.

Asked which horse he would like to have if he didn't have Olympio, McAnally replied: "The Derby winner. There is no question he is the horse to beat. The way I have observed them all week, he looks like he has taken the Derby as well

as any of the others."

The presence of Olympio, rested and poised since winning the Arkansas Derby one month ago, made it unlikely that the three top finishers in the Kentucky Derby would simply stage a return match in the Preakness.

After a mile and a quarter at Churchill Downs, it was Strike the Gold by a length and three-quarters over Best Pal, the star colt from California, who had another length and three-quarters on Mane Minister, an outsider from California who went off at 87 to 1. For the Preakness, however, Mane Minister is a more prosaic 12 to 1 in the early odds.

On the other hand, sitting out the Kentucky Derby might have been restful but not particularly productive. Only four horses in the last 28 years have skipped the Derby and won the Preakness, none since Deputed Testamony in 1983.

Olympio also worked a quarter-mile Friday morning, and was timed in 23 3/5 seconds. Best Pal, meanwhile galloped an easy mile and then his trainer, Ian

Jory of England, also cast a vote for Nick Zito's horse.

"If I didn't have Best Pal?" he said. "Strike the Gold, I guess. He's the best colt in the field."

But dissenting votes were cast for Best Pal, who ran in the money 10 times in 11 races and even ran second in the Derby after starting from the No. 15 post position. Paco Gonzalez, the trainer of Mane Minister, watched his colt gallop a mile and a half Friday morning, and said:

"I'd rather have Best Pal if I didn't have mine. Why? Because I have watched him run, and the horse tries hard every time. He's run only one bad race."

Best Pal also got votes from Michael Whittingham, trainer of Whadjathink, and from Rodney Rash, trainer of Honor Grades. They are the longshots in the Preakness, but they have celebrity connections: Whittingham is the son of the venerable California trainer, Charlie Whittingham.

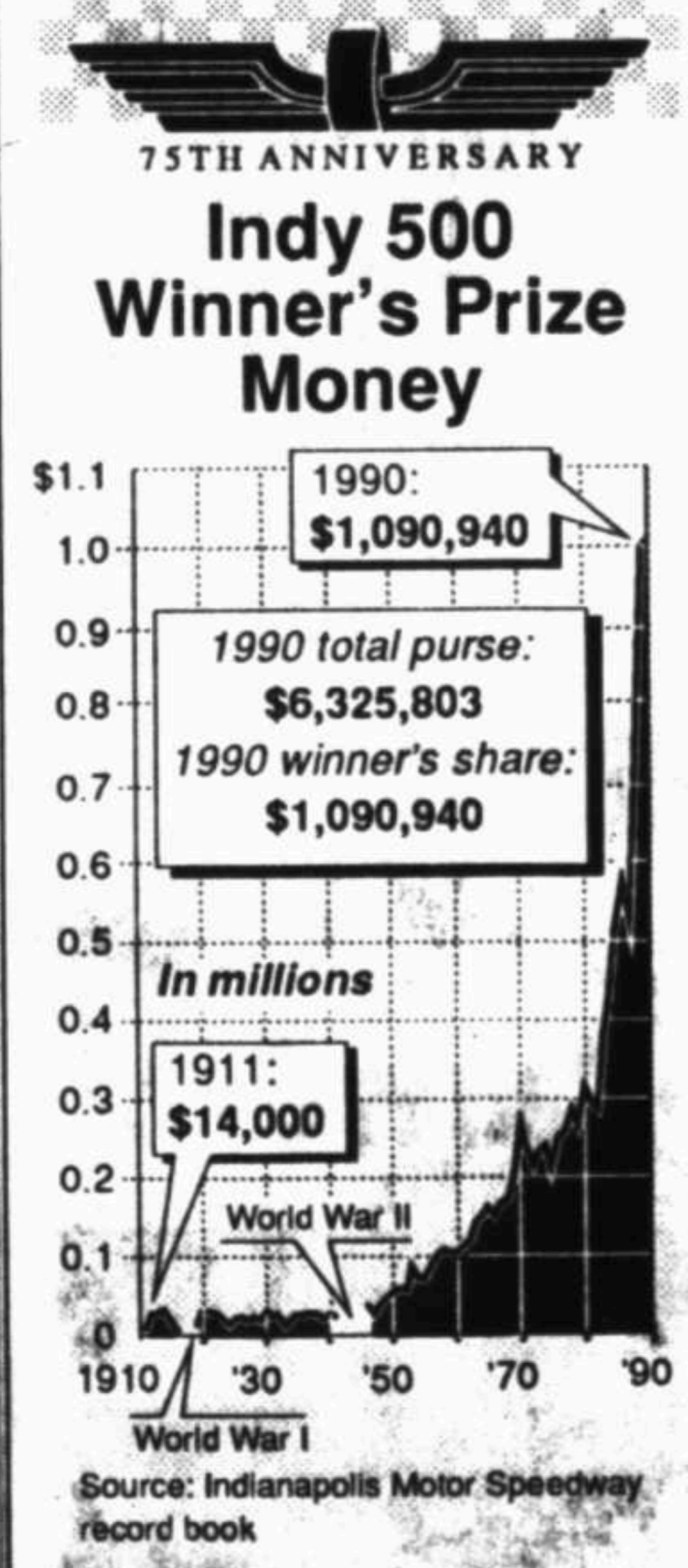

# Mariners take over first place

NEW YORK — The streaky Seattle Mariners moved into first place Friday night when Randy Johnson and Bill Swift shut out the New York Yankees 1-0 for their 11th victory in 12 games.

This is the latest in any season the Mariners have held first place in the American League West. Seattle, which has never had a winning season since beginning play in 1977, also moved seven games over .500 for just the second time in its history.

The Mariners started the day one-half game behind Oakland. The Athletics lost 11-6 to Cleveland, and Seattle took advantage by winning its fifth consecutive game.

Pete O'Brien singled home the only run in the second inning off Tim Lary (2-3). Lary lost despite allowing just three hits in 8 1/2 innings.

Johnson (3-3) gave up three hits in seven innings, striking out 10 and walking three. He left with stiffness in his lower back and Swift finished with one-hit relief for his fifth save. Johnson and Swift extended the Yankees' scoreless streak to 24 innings.

Ken Griffey Sr. drew a leadoff walk in the second and scored on singles by Edgar Martinez and O'Brien. Lary retired the next 17 batters before walking O'Brien to start the eighth.

Johnson struck out 10 batters for the second time this season and the 10th time in his career. He fanned the side in the seventh before being relieved by Swift.

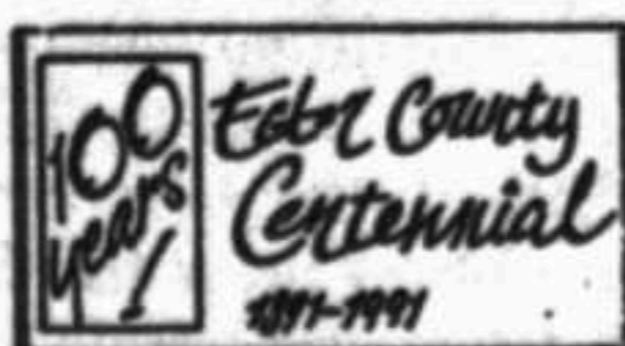

# Indy 500 still trying to fill 11 racing positions

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Under normal circumstances, the drama of filling an Indianapolis 500 starting field on the final weekend of qualifications is limited to how many drivers will be bumped from the lineup by faster cars.

This year may be different. Heading into the final weekend of time trials for the May 26 race, there are still 11 positions open in the 33-car lineup and far more questions than answers remaining.

Rain has limited practice for everyone since the end of the first weekend of qualifications, and blown engines and late-coming driving assignments have further limited the preparations of others.

The first 22 qualifiers averaged 219.993 mph, with Geoff Brabham the slow man so far at 214.859. But no one seems to know what the bottom line will be for the slowest four-lap, 10-mile qualifications run to make the 75th Indy 500 lineup.

"Maybe it will just take four laps," said Didier

Theys of Belgium, who finished 11th last year in his second Indy start. "But I think I will take 214. I think the back of the field could be a lot slower than that, but I want to start in the middle of the field, so for me I must take at least 214."

There seem to be plenty of entries to fill the field, with 17 non-qualified drivers having run practice laps this week. Among the fastest — and most likely to make the field — have been veterans Theys, Tero Palmroth, Scott Pruett, Roberto Guerrero, John Paul Jr. and Dean Hall, as well as rookies Hiro Matsushita and Willy T. Ribbs.

Among those, Pruett and Ribbs have had serious engine problems that could hamper their qualifying bids.

"We've had five blown engines since the track opened, and it's just as frustrating as anything," Pruett said. "But I think the guys (on the crew) will have everything right for me to qualify."

Ribbs, the first black driver to run at Indy, has

broken his only two engines and will try to qualify with the one that has been rebuilt.

"It's our race engine, and that could be a problem," Ribbs said. "But you've got to make the race before you can run in it, anyway."

Others who have at least run some practice laps since the track opened May 4 include two-time winner Gordon Johncock, Pancho Carter, Johnny Parsons, Randy Lewis, Salt Walther, Dominic Dobson and rookies Guido Dacco, Ted Prappas and Buddy Lazier.

Dobson and Prappas both crashed last Sunday and have been waiting for their teams to either repair the damaged cars or prepare new ones.

At least 33 cars have started this race every year since 1947, when there were only 30 starters. Should qualifications close Sunday with fewer than 33 cars in the field, the entry blank states that the Indianapolis Motor Speedway has the right to fill the field as it sees fit.

That could mean naming provisional starters from among the drivers who have at least practiced on the 2½-mile oval this month, or even an extra qualifying session where non-qualified entries would get one more opportunity to make the field.

The latter took place in 1979 when a controversy erupted over the valve controlling the turbocharger wastegate. The rules were changed by the sanctioning U.S. Auto Club part way through the second qualifying weekend — ostensibly to stop alleged cheating — and hearings were held and lawsuits threatened.

Eleven drivers who had been bumped from the field during regular qualifying were each given one opportunity the day before the race to get back in the field by completing a qualifying run at a speed faster than the slowest of the first 33 qualifiers. Bill Vukovich Jr. and George Snider made it and 35 cars started the race.

## Andretti busting laps of 200 m.p.h.

INDIANAPOLIS — John Andretti, driving the the Midland-based Pennzoil Special, once again flirted with the lead in the speed parade for the 75th Indianapolis 500 during practice runs Thursday.

During one endurance run of 25 laps, Andretti ripped off a series of 220 m.p.h. plus laps, the fastest being 229.853. The only driver faster among the 21 drivers who practiced either for the race or this weekend's final qualifications was Emerson Fittipaldi at 221.380.

Observers continue to be amazed by the progress of the young Andretti and his Hall/VDS team, which is co-owned by Midlanders Jim Hall, Jim Hall Jr., Franz Weis and Count Rudy van der Straten.

Andretti routinely turns in practice laps during the hot hours of the day — to simulate actual conditions expected during the race — faster than he qualified last Saturday at 219.059 m.p.h.

Andretti is also building endurance for the 500 miles. Since the track opened on May 4, he has re-

corded 539 practice laps, the equivalent of two 500-mile races, plus 347.5 miles of a third race in preparation for the big one on May 26.

Only John's cousin, Jeff Andretti, has recorded more laps on the track, 542 or an additional 7.5 miles.

Both qualifying and practice sessions will be held today and Sunday before the track shuts down until the final practice session Thursday. That session is misnamed Carburetion Day since these cars haven't used carburetors for a generation.

## Sneva finally lands Indy ride

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Tom Sneva has been the Indianapolis Motor Speedway's "Gas Man," the guy who could always be counted on for speed.

He was the first driver to officially run a lap over 200 m.p.h., and he has been the fastest qualifier here four times, the last in 1984.

This month, though, his top speed was only as fast as a golf cart could carry him through the garage area, and Sneva seemed to be out of gas on the 2½-mile oval until ride finally materialized Friday. Sneva, who couldn't even practice until Saturday, was expecting to qualify for the race this weekend.

"If we can remember how to get back on the bicycle in a few laps, we'll be OK," he said.

Sneva, 43 on June 1, has not had a regular ride since 1987 and had been unable to come up with anything for next Sunday's Indianapolis 500, an event he won in 1983 and has run in 17 times.

The ex-school teacher and administrator is one of several former winners here who have had to walk around, helmet in hand, trying to find jobs after the best seats are filled.

Two-time winner Gordon Johncock also found

a ride earlier this week, like Sneva, in a team's third car, and was scheduled to make a qualifying attempt this weekend.

Sneva will drive a Buick-powered 1989 Lola for John Menard, who already has entries driven by Gary Bettenhausen and Kevin Cogan qualified for the race.

But among the drivers still without rides were four-time winner Al Unser and three-time winner Johnny Rutherford.

Sneva says spiraling costs of the sport and the inability of smaller teams to buy state-of-the-art equipment is the reason that there are barely enough car-driver combinations to fill the 33-car field.

"They (the car owners) made the rules and now they can't afford their own game," Sneva said. "They'll get enough junk out there to get a full field, but what's going on out here won't help the sport grow."

"You have the Chevy engines that only go to a limited number of teams. And you have the Buick engines that are only good at the speedway because the rules don't allow them to be competitive anywhere else, and that doesn't help anybody run a full season effort."

## Guerrero heads Indy's non-qualifiers

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Roberto Guerrero led the way among non-qualified drivers Friday in the final full day of practice for the 75th Indianapolis 500.

Guerrero, who found his ride in Danny Sullivan's backup car earlier this week, got the Alfa Romeo-powered Lola up to 216.941 mph on Friday before rain cut short the session by nearly one hour.

The first weekend of qualifications produced 22 qualifiers, leaving 11 positions to fill in the 33-car starting lineup Saturday and Sunday.

Guerrero was in good shape to lead the field and put it in the lead, Guerrero said. "Mostly, I was working on a race set-up and worrying about that more than qualifying."

"I think we basically achieved everything we wanted to today. We'll just go out there and qualify (Saturday) and get ready for the race."

Others weren't as confident, including two-time Indy winner Gordon Johncock, who also got into a car earlier this week. His best lap in the 1990 Lola-Cosworth is just over 204.

"We need at least another 10 or 12 miles an hour," Johncock said. "It's really not that hard to get back in it and go fast, especially on a track this smooth. The car's not bad, but I'd be a lot happier right now if I were running 214 or 215."

Sixteen drivers hoping to qualify this weekend were on the track Friday, along with 13 others in cars they have already qualified or in their backup machines.



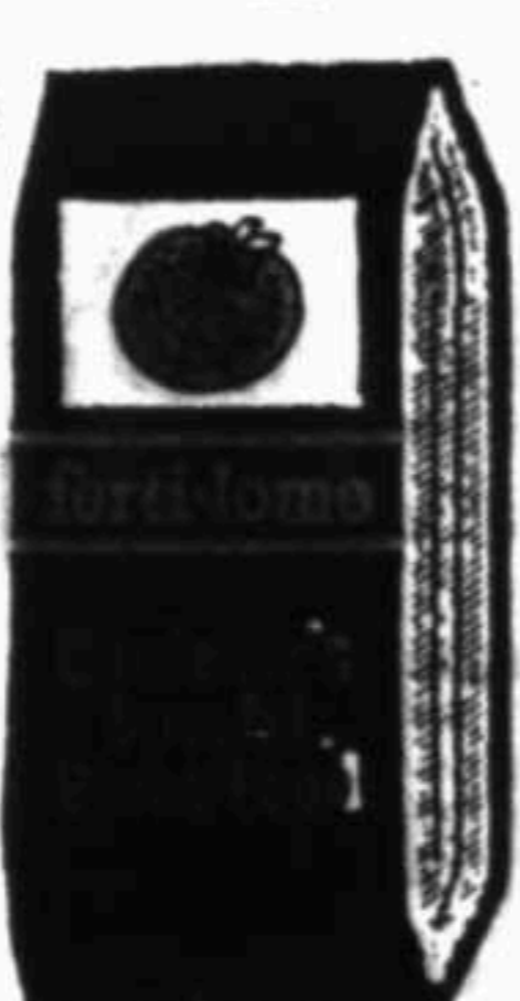

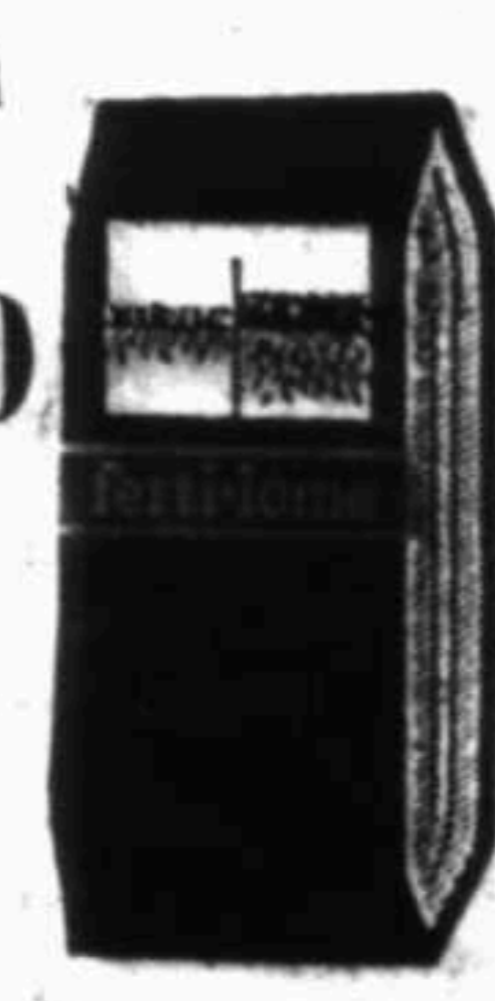

## In search of a saint

■ Since John Paul II has been pope, the Roman Catholic Church has elevated 260 people to sainthood, but canonization is a long and complex process and not without controversy.

VATICAN CITY — The road to sainthood is never sure and simple. For some, heaven can wait.

During his papacy, Pope John Paul II has given priority to recognizing saints, raising men and women of heroic virtue to the highest altar for emulation by the faithful.

But the process can be long, controversial, tricky and filled with delicate political issues — especially when the saintly candidate touches a sensitive nerve in public opinion.

Such was true, for example, with the petition on behalf of Queen Isabella I of Spain, which enraged some groups who associate her with the Inquisition and the expulsion of Jews and Muslims from Spain. The Vatican in early April announced that it had delayed action on the proposal but denied that the protests were the cause.

Here are other cases, too, that illustrate the difficult judgments involved in deciding who is worthy of veneration, why and whether the time is ripe.

The Rev. Maximilian Kolbe, a Polish priest, gave his life in 1941 to save another prisoner at the Auschwitz death camp.

Archbishop Oscar Romero, an outspoken critic of government repression in El Salvador, was shot through the heart while saying Mass in 1980.

For his act, Kolbe was declared a martyr and saint of the Roman Catholic Church. Will the same honor go to Romero? Or is his case too politically sensitive?

All will depend on the long and complex process of proclaiming saints, a procedure that can be as revealing for who isn't chosen for veneration as for who is.

"The purpose is to put before the eyes of people today someone who is an inspiring example," says the Rev. Paolo Molinari, who as

postulator-general of the Jesuits has been pursuing the causes of saints for more than 30 years.

"This brings about the question of the opportuneness of presenting or not presenting some cases. It takes a kind of wisdom and prudence."

There are no official figures for the total number of saints recognized by the church over the centuries, but the pace of beatifications and canonizations has increased under Pope John Paul II.

So far during his 12-year pontificate, 377 people have been beatified, meaning they are declared "blessed" and can be venerated by the faithful at the local level.

An additional 260 have been canonized, or elevated to sainthood and held up for public prayers by the universal church. Of these, 237 were among groups of martyrs from Vietnam, Korea and the Philippines.

Monsignor Robert Sarno, an American official on the Vatican's Congregation for the Causes of Saints, estimates there are some 1,500 active cases under consideration.

The pope is scheduled to beatify seven more people this year. The Rev. Joseph Kalinowski, a Polish Carmelite priest who died in 1907, is the next saint to be canonized in November.

There is currently a stress on finding lay saints. For years the process seemed to favor founders of religious orders, which had the means and manpower to promote a cause.

"More than ever we need candidates," Sarno says. "We need men and women who, living in various sectors of life, show forth the holiness of the church."

Understanding the world of saints requires knowledge of some basic rules:

—Beatification and canonization are strictly posthumous honors; the church does not recognize "living saints."

—Anyone is eligible, from popes to queens to farmers.

—Candidates must have a reputation of holiness and heroic virtue and/or died a martyr's death.

—Beatification requires proof of one posthumous miracle attributed to the candidate's intercession; a second miracle is needed for canonization. Martyrs automatically qualify for beatification, but need one miracle for sainthood.

—A cause cannot be initiated until at least five years after the candidate's death. This, says Sarno, is "to allow the hype to die,

the dust to settle and the substance to come out."

Churchmen involved in studying, promoting and deciding the causes of saints say nothing disturbs them more than the common description of their work as "saint-making."

"The church doesn't make saints," Sarno says. "It's God who makes saints. The church recognizes saints. It recognizes the finger of God at work in the world."

A cause for sainthood begins under the direction of the local bishop in the diocese where the candidate died. All historical and biographical material, plus any accounts from living witnesses, are gathered and forwarded to Rome.

Here, the Congregation for the Causes of Saints takes over. The congregation has a full-time staff of 26 to study the case, which must clear the scrutiny of a committee of historical, theological and medical experts.

Then the cause goes to a panel of cardinals and bishops, who make their recommendation to the pope. "This is one of the most democratic, if not the most democratic, processes in the church," Sarno says.

The pope may sometimes ask how a certain case is progressing but does not impose his will on the congregation, Sarno says.

John Paul certainly took a special interest in the cause of Kolbe, a fellow Pole and Franciscan priest who was put to death by an injection of carbolic acid at Auschwitz on Aug. 14, 1941.

Kolbe had volunteered to take the place of another prisoner, the father of two sons, when the camp commandant selected 10 men to die following a prison break.

Kolbe was canonized on Oct. 10, 1982, before more than 200,000 faithful in St. Peter's Square. Invoking his apostolic authority and acting on the request of Polish and German bishops, the pope declared that Kolbe was a martyr.

Some have suggested that, for all his heroism, Kolbe may not have fit the church's strict definition of a martyr — someone killed out of hatred of the Catholic faith.

But Sarno says no one was better qualified to judge the case than John Paul, who lived through the Nazi occupation and has a special understanding of Kolbe's "Polish experience."

If Kolbe died a martyr's death, then what about Romero?

The Salvadoran bishop was gunned down at the altar while saying Mass at a small chapel on March 24, 1980. Evidence has

pointed to a far-rightist plot, but no one has been arrested or tried for the slaying.

Romero's cause is complicated by political factors. As a champion of the poor, he made enemies among extreme right-wing groups. His sermons were regarded by some as sympathetic to left-wing

rebels.

There is speculation that Romero's cause has been put on hold for now to prevent his canonization from being used for political purposes. Sarno says the Salvadoran church has not yet formally taken up Romero's case with the Vatican.

Another sensitive case for the Vatican was the proposed sainthood for Queen Isabella I of Spain.

"The church's task has to be the seeking of the truth," Sarno says. "At the same time it has to be sensitive to the feelings and the needs of people."

Circuit-rider able to teach, preach

Considered the last of the circuit-riding preachers, Robert E. Harris says of his sorrel mount, Sundance, "We're co-laborers. The impact would be nil if the horse wasn't there."

Harris, garbed in Western boots, black frock coat, string tie and a black 10-gallon Stetson, allowed that his getup also catches attention.

Both "the horse and the outfit are the come-on," he said. "In this day and time to see a man dressed like this on a horse is like seeing a man from Mars. They don't know what to expect."

But he still credits his horse. "The horse is the drawing card. Everybody loves a horse. I love horses, too."

Harris, 67, of Asheville, N.C., wanting to keep alive some lore of America's past and also spread the Christian message, for 11 years has been doing both, mostly of late at a rest area along Interstate 40 west of Asheville.

"It's an opportunity to teach some American history and also give a Gospel message," he said in an interview. "I meet all kinds of people from all over the world that travel this highway."

"It's a real good feeling to get talking with them." Although Harris also pastors a small Asheville Baptist church, The Chapel, and conducts morning drive-in services at a shopping mall, he's out each weekday on horseback at the I-40 rest area, 10 miles from the Tennessee state line.

"This year, I've particularly worked this place," he said. "People tell their friends at home, and they sort of look for me. I become part of the landscape."

In that setting, he said, "I don't do any preaching, I just answer their questions," and pass out a brochure with his picture on it, some history of circuit riders, and a fancied appeal by Christ to accept his love.

"I am a witness," Harris said. "It's a seed-sowing ministry. I get a good bit of feedback. I think it opens doors and generates a different method of reaching people."

He emphasized that he solicits no contributions, and that sometimes people tend to shy away until they realize there are no gimmicks or collections.

"Once they learn that, it's a different atmosphere altogether," he said. "People who had been cold become very warm and genial. They open up and relax as if they'd been let out of a cage. They're human beings just like me."

However, he draws a variety of questions, and conjectures. Some assume he's running for office, or delivering mail; and to such speculation, Harris says:

"I'm campaigning for the Lord, and my candidate is bound to win." Or: "Yes, I'm delivering mail of a kind. I have a message of good news."

When youngsters overdo petting of his horse, he advises they ought not do it anymore for a reason. But why? "If you keep it up, he'll follow you all the way home." That sets them puzzling.

Previously, Harris had a quarter horse named Two-Eyed Redeemer, but he became sick on some feed and died. For three months afterward, Harris looked for a replacement.

Finally in Sun Bright, Tenn., he spotted two Tennessee walking horses that appealed to him, the 11-year-old Sunduster, and his offspring, 3-year-old Sundance, both sorrel, blaze-faced and white-stockinged.

"I was like the old mule tied between two bales of hay," Harris recounted. "The mule could reach either bale, but he starved to death trying to decide which one. What I did, I bought both horses."

He alternates with them in his daily highway ministering. "I'm no longer a one-horse preacher," he said.

Although a Baptist, Harris downplays denominationalism. "I just go out as a Christian," he said. "I say it's not what we belong to, but who we belong to that's important."

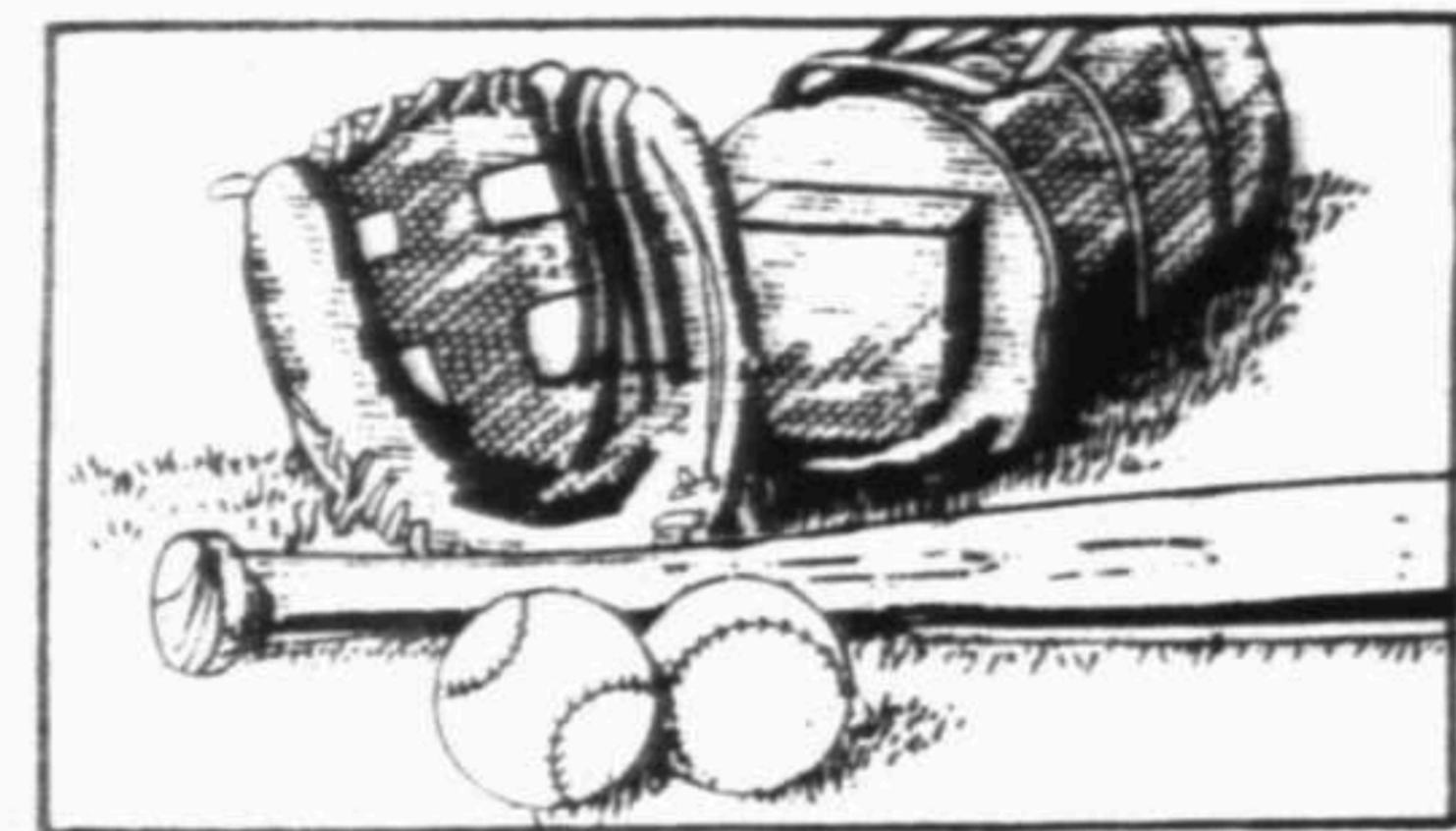

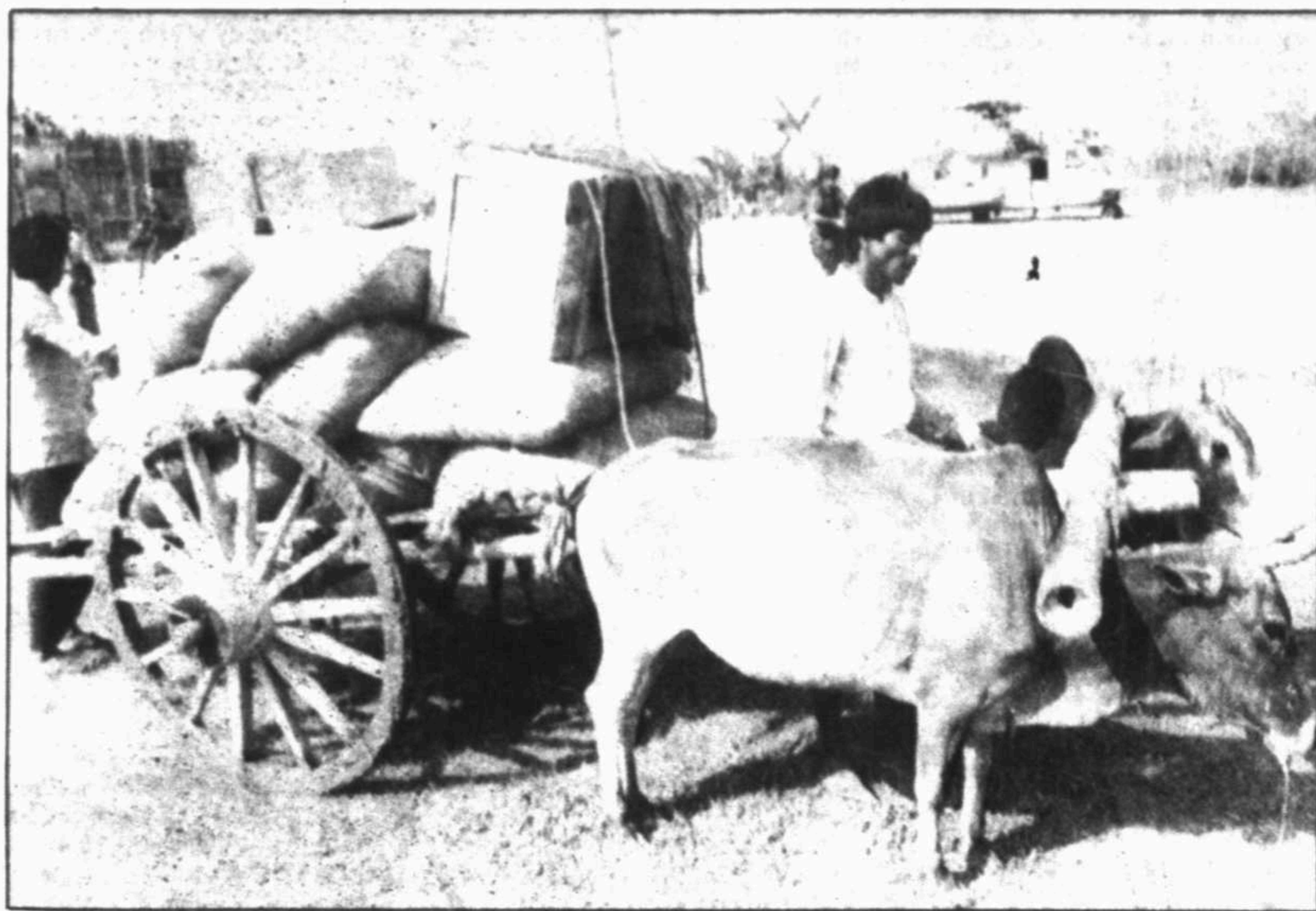

# Helicopters, hovercraft ferry food to Bangladesh

SANDWIP ISLAND, Bangladesh (AP) — U.S. helicopters and hovercraft on Friday ferried food and supplies to survivors of last month's killer cyclone, but the relief effort was still not running at full steam, a U.S. official said.

Meanwhile, officials said Friday that floods in the northeast — away from the cyclone-devastated area in the south — had killed at least 75 people.

The floods, which began Saturday, have swamped a major highway connecting the capital, Dhaka, with the northeastern district of Sylhet and submerged fields of crops.

At least 139,000 people were killed by the devastating cyclone of April 30, which hurled waves up to 20 feet high along a 250-mile coastal belt on the Bay of Bengal.

A giant U.S. Marine Sea Stallion helicopter brought the first bulk relief shipment Friday to the storm-ravaged Moghdara area of Sandwip Island, where the Bangladeshi military had constructed a landing pad near a local government building.


Local men, some in tattered shirts and sarongs which were the only clothes they owned, formed a human chain to unload 500 sacks of rice and were quickly joined by several American servicemen in-

cluding Navy Capt. John Downs, the task force's chief surgeon who was assessing medical needs.

"It's good, honest work," said Downs, a professor of surgery at Michigan State University and a Navy reservist who was called up

during the Persian Gulf War.

Mohammad Mustafa, a farmer whose house collapsed during the cyclone, killing his 2-year-old son, stood patiently on an embankment with several hundred local residents, hoping to get one of the sacks.

**WORLD IN BRIEF**

**Bomb hits offices**

MOSCOW — A bomb destroyed the headquarters of the Soviet Union's largest reform movement, which is conducting a drive to back Boris Yeltsin's candidacy for president of Russia.

The bombing at the offices of Democratic Russia was the "biggest act of political terrorism that has taken place in many decades," said Vladimir Bokser, the group's spokesman.

"It is highly probable that these people were pursuing this goal to paralyze the democratic movement, especially during the election campaign," he said.

Democratic Russia is supporting Yeltsin, president of the Russian parliament, and the re-election campaign of outspoken Moscow Mayor Gavriil Popov. It also backs a referendum on the June 12 ballot that calls for the transfer of Communist Party assets to the government.

The explosion around 10:30 p.m. Thursday destroyed the entrance, outer wall, basement and part of the roof on the single-story building. Russian Television reported that the equivalent of \$119,000 dollars in cash was destroyed.

The only person in the building at the time was not hurt, Bokser said.

Earlier reports said the blast destroyed tens of thousands of petition signatures the group had collected to put Yeltsin, Popov and the referendum on the ballot. But Bokser said copies of the petitions had been moved out of the building.

**Palestinian stabs 3**

JERUSALEM — A Palestinian wielding a double-bladed dagger stabbed three Israelis on a crowded downtown street in Jerusalem Friday before being captured and beaten by bystanders, police said.

Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir said he was sorry the Arab was caught alive.

"It is very grave, this vile deed which has occurred on the main streets of Jerusalem again. To my regret, the perpetrator was captured alive and this pains me greatly," Shamir said on Israel radio.

The stabbing victims, who included a 26-year-old woman and a Jewish seminary student, were not seriously injured, police said. All three were Jewish.

It was the seventh Arab stabbing attack in Israel this year. In six previous attacks, six Israelis have died and six have been injured. The wave of stabbings began in October after police dispersing rioters shot and killed 17 Palestinians on Jerusalem's Temple Mount.

Friday's attack came less than 24 hours after Secretary of State James A. Baker III left Israel following his latest efforts to prod Israel and its Arab neighbors into peace talks. Another stabbing attack occurred on the eve of Baker's first visit to Israel in March. Four women were killed in that attack.

**Japan won't pay more**

TOKYO — Japan does not intend to pay an extra \$470 million the United States is seeking to make up for currency fluctuations that devalued Japan's Persian Gulf War contribution, the government said Friday.

"We do not have a plan to pay additional money to the United States right now," said Chief Cabinet Secretary Misoji Sakamoto.

Japan and the United States have been bickering over the \$470 million since Prime Minister Toshiki Kaifu pledged \$9 billion to the war effort and the Japanese government budgeted the then-equivalent of 1.17 trillion yen.

By the time the money was paid, the yen had slipped from 130 yen to the dollar to 136-138 yen to the dollar. Instead of getting \$9 billion, the United States Treasury received about \$8.5 billion.

Japan's contribution was to be provided through tax hikes and spending cuts. Making up the deficit would require difficult negotiations with opposition parties and is considered unrealistic, said a senior government official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The money was a voluntary contribution, so "our perception is we should not be told what to do about it," said the official. "The nature of the contribution should be that what we give is what they get. It's as simple as that."

U.S. officials said Washington will continue to ask Japan for the additional payment.

**Tass reports gas field**

MOSCOW — A large natural gas deposit has been discovered in the Barents Sea, the official Tass news agency said Friday. Without giving its size, Tass said the deposit contained enough gas "to satisfy Soviet and Western demands for decades."

Development of the field off the northern city of Murmansk will be difficult because the natural gas deposit is 300 yards below sea level, Tass said.

"We turned to Norwegian, Finnish and other firms with experience in designing and building facilities for deep-sea gas extraction," V. Sukhov, chief engineer of the Arctic Sea, Oil and Gas Prospecting Co., told Tass.

# Lightning kills 1, injures 10

WASHINGTON (AP) — A teenager was killed and 10 other individuals injured Friday when lightning struck in a crowd of students on the grounds of fashionable St. Albans prep school in the nation's capital.

"I saw this big red fireball, somebody fell over, and I just ran," said a fifth-grader after the incident at a lacrosse match between St. Albans and Landon Boys School.

Noah Eig, 15, of suburban Bethesda, Md., was pronounced dead at Georgetown University Hospital and six other victims were being treated there, a spokeswoman said. One was treated and released.

Another teenager was listed in serious condition in George Washington University hospital.

A 17-year-old girl and a 42-year-old woman were listed in fair condition in Suburban Hospital in Bethesda.

Fire Department spokesman Ted Holmes said two paramedics and another person were injured when an ambulance en route to the school collided with a car.

# Bush decides against Japan trade sanctions over sea turtle products

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush told Congress Friday he had decided against imposing trade sanctions on Japan over its trade in turtle products because of a new Japanese promise to end the practice.

However, Bush said that he would review the decision within 30 days to see if Japan has made good on its word.

The Interior and Commerce departments on March 20 cited Japan for importing sea turtles, used for a variety of tortoise-shell products like eyeglass frames, combs and jewelry, in violation of the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species.

That action gave President Bush 60 days to inform Congress what sanctions, if any, he would order.

Over the past two months "my administration has held discussions with the government of Japan in an effort to end its trade in sea turtles," Bush said in his notice to Congress.

He suggested that he was satisfied that the result of the discussions was a Japanese promise to "bring to a conclusive end its trade" in turtles.

Japan has allowed its citizens to import two endangered species of sea turtles, hawksbill turtles and olive ridley turtles. Both are protected under the international convention.

It is illegal to sell tortoise-shell products in the United States. However, Japan has no such ban.

U.S. law authorizes Bush to limit imports of Japanese fish and other wildlife products such as cultured pearls to help protect an endangered species. However, the law has never resulted in such a U.S.

move. Bush, in his notice to Congress, said that Japan had responded to negotiations with his administration "by ending its trade in olive ridley sea turtles" and announcing "publicly a commitment to end all trade in hawksbill sea turtles by a date certain."

"Given these commitments, I have decided not to recommend specific measures to prohibit wildlife imports at this time pending an assessment within 30 days of Japan's actions," Bush said.

Bush said he would send an additional report to Congress after this 30 day review.

Sanctions could have involved a U.S. penalty duty or ban on Japanese wildlife or marine exports such as cultured pearls or canned shellfish.

The Cultured Pearl Association of America and other jewelry trade groups had protested that a ban on pearl imports could hurt Americans more than Japan, because \$105 million in annual imports generated \$600 million in business in finished jewelry.

U.S. environmental groups praised the Japanese action.

With the sea turtle ban, "Japan will have taken a giant leap toward becoming a responsible environmental citizen in the community of nations," said Robert Irwin, counsel for the National Wildlife Federation's fisheries and wildlife division.

"Today's decision marks a turning point for relations between Japan and the U.S. environmental community," said Marydale Donnelly, director of the Center for Marine Conservation's Sea Turtle Program.

The parents were charged with one count each of extortion and conspiracy to commit extortion. They did not enter pleas at their arraignment Thursday.

**Paralegic to climb Yosemite peak**

YOSEMITE NATIONAL PARK, Calif. — A paraplegic Park Service ranger who climbed a 3,200-foot rock face wants to scale another landmark Yosemite peak, but park officials are nervous about the climb getting too commercial.

Mark Wellman made his famous climb up El Capitan in 1989. Now he plans to scale 2,000-foot Half Dome.

"I think a lot of people get pumped up from what I do and that's great," Wellman said in an interview this week. "The last climb was the unknown. This time we've already done it."

Wellman, 31, faces a new federal ethics law in efforts to raise money for the planned September climb. The law bans outside income for government employees like Wellman, who is a park ranger.

Attorneys and park personnel determined that Wellman can avoid restrictions by acting as a private citizen, doing the climb and fund raising on his own time.

Park Superintendent Michael Finley said plans for the climb started out small and ended up huge — making him question how much commercialization might take place.

Finley has yet to approve a special use permit giving official park sanction to the climb.

**Mexico to get surplus corn, butteroil**

WASHINGTON — More than 200,000 metric tons of surplus U.S. corn and 2,500 tons of butteroil are being donated to help needy families in Mexico, the Agriculture Department said Friday.

F. Paul Dickerson, general sales manager of the department's Foreign Agricultural Service, said the 86,000 tons of the corn will go to the Mexican government to provide food assistance.

Dickerson said 39,000 tons of corn will go to the Cooperative for American Relief Everywhere (CARE); 41,000 tons to the International Partnership for Human Development; and about 41,000 tons of corn and the butteroil to World SHARE. All are private U.S. voluntary organizations.

The groups will sell the corn to the Mexican private sector and use the proceeds to provide food to the needy, improve health and nutrition programs and support program activities. The butteroil will be used for human consumption.

**State police report Robb probe**

RICHMOND, Va. — State police said Friday they are looking into allegations, raised in a television news report, of drug-related wrongdoing by U.S. Sen. Charles S. Robb in the 1980s while he was governor of Virginia.

After Gov. L. Douglas Wilder's office denied an investigation was under way, state police called their probe an "inquiry."

Robb, a Democrat, has been plagued by allegations he attended parties where drugs were used openly. In a book released Thursday, Virginia Beach private investigator Billy Franklin wrote that Robb repeatedly used cocaine when he was governor from 1982 to 1986.

The senator has denied any wrongdoing, and said Friday he welcomed any investigation because it would quash false accusations.

**Libyan guerillas relocate in U.S.**

WASHINGTON — About 350 Libyan guerrillas trained by the United States to fight dictator Moammar Gadhafi have been scattered in undisclosed locations in the United States to be resettled at government expense, officials said Friday.

The decision to accept the soldiers of the self-styled Libya National Army as refugees ended a six-month odyssey for the men who once served in Gadhafi's expeditionary force that invaded Chad, Libya's neighbor to the south, and later decided to attack their north African homeland.

On Thursday, the guerrillas were quietly flown from Kenya to New York.

**Prosecutor seeks death in slayings**

COALVILLE, Utah — A pair of prison parolees who admitted killing two women at a mountain cabin videotaped themselves opening the victims' family Christmas presents before the killings, a jury was shown Friday.

The 10-minute tape, mostly taken up with the two discussing a collection of sports trading cards, was shown to the 3rd District Court jury during the first day of a sentencing hearing for Von Lester Taylor.

Judge Frank Noel permitted the tape to be shown over the objection of a defense attorney who called it "a ridiculous little tape."

Taylor, 26, pleaded guilty to two counts of capital homicide in the Dec. 22 murders. The 12-member jury empaneled Friday will decide whether he will face execution or life imprisonment.

Codefendant Edward S. Deli was convicted Tuesday of two counts of second-degree murder, punishable by life in prison, when his trial jury could not reach a unanimous verdict for first-degree homicide.

Deli is to be sentenced June 3.

**Patients receive infected transplants**

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — More than 50 transplant patients around the country received organs or tissues from an AIDS-infected donor six years ago and three have died of AIDS, health officials said Friday.

An elderly Colorado woman who received a hip joint has tested positive for the AIDS virus, said Doug Wilson, a spokesman for LifeNet Transplantation Services of Virginia Beach, which supplied the tissues to 30 hospitals around the country.

No other recipients have tested positive for AIDS, and most probably are not in danger because the tissues they received were sterilized, he said.

The donor, a 22-year-old Virginia man, was shot to death during a robbery. His heart, kidneys, and liver were transplanted at Southside Regional Medical Center in Petersburg, Wilson said.

The hospital declined to provide details about the patients' deaths.

Wilson said officials did not detect the donor's infection until this week because AIDS testing was less sophisticated when the donor died in 1985.

"It's tragic. It's unfortunate. Certainly we were not negligent. The science was simply not there," Wilson said. "The likelihood of this happening today is slim to zero."

The Atlanta Journal-Constitution reported the case Friday before LifeNet had a chance to announce its findings, Wilson said. He said the company had planned to wait until all the hospitals were contacted.

"We wanted to come forward with this. We have nothing to hide," he said.

He twice tested negative for the AIDS virus before his organs, corneas and various tissues were removed, Wilson said. He said the man may have been so recently infected that his body did not register any signs of the virus.

An AIDS antibody test can usually detect an infection within several months after it occurs.

Using improved testing that has been developed since 1985, LifeNet checked preserved cells from the donor and learned Thursday that he had been infected, Wilson said.

The testing was done because Colorado health officials reported that the elderly woman had tested positive for the AIDS virus, he said.

All 30 hospitals that received the tissues were notified of the AIDS risk by Thursday evening, Wilson said. But Jeff Nesbit, a spokesman

for the Food and Drug Administration in Washington, said one hospital still had to be notified. Neither spokesman would identify the hospitals in which the transplants took place.

Nesbit said the heart transplant patient died in August 1986 and the two kidney patients died in June 1988 and May 1990.

"They all died of AIDS-related conditions," Nesbit said. The liver transplant patient died in 1985 of complications after surgery, he said.

Bill Anderson, LifeNet's chief executive officer, said the pancreas was not used for transplantation.

Wilson said LifeNet retrieved 52 usable tissue grafts from the donor, including a thigh bone, hip joints, tendons and a knee ligament.

He said 44 of the 52 tissue grafts taken from the man were sterilized using alcohol or radiation and were unlikely to spread the AIDS virus.

The eight remaining grafts were not subjected to alcohol or radiation because they were either too large for such sterilization to be effective or could be damaged by such processes, he said. Among those eight was the hip joint given to the Colorado woman, he said.

While LifeNet did not handle the heart, kidneys, and liver, Scott Bottenfield, a LifeNet vice president, explained that they were not processed with alcohol or radiation because it would kill them.

The donor's two corneas also were removed by an eye bank but it is unlikely that they would transmit the AIDS virus, LifeNet said.

Nesbit said the estimated chance of contracting the AIDS virus from a blood transfusion is in the range of 1 in 40,000 to 1 in 153,000. The estimated risk from transplanted organ or tissue "is only somewhat higher than that."

"People should be aware that there is a slight risk," he said. "but it is a quite small risk."

**Transplant risk small, but real, surgeon reports**

ATLANTA (AP) — At any given moment, some 20,000 Americans are waiting for transplants to restore their health or save their lives. But the lucky ones, the ones whose transplants come through, still run the very small — but real — risk of getting AIDS.

"We're concerned enough with it that we absolutely insist that all our donor organs be tested in advance," said Dr. John Najarian, chief of surgery at the University of Minnesota Hospital in Minneapolis.

"The risk is a very remote risk," he said. "But the point is that it's always there and possible."

Before this week, just one of the nation's reported 174,893 AIDS patients got the disease through a transplant — an adult who received tissue infected with HIV, according to the federal Centers for Disease Control.

The CDC and the Food and Drug Administration are investigating three AIDS deaths among people who received heart or kidney

transplants from a Virginia man who was shot to death in 1985 and was infected with HIV, the AIDS virus.

"We think with the screening we do it's a minimal risk. And weighted against the benefit of a life-saving transplant, then the risk is very minimal," said Bobbi Beatty, an official with Lifelink of Georgia, which handles organ procurements and placements for Georgia transplant hospitals.

Transplant centers today can use almost any part of the body that survives undamaged, from the heart, liver and kidneys to skin, bone and parts of the eye. Even portions of the brain are occasionally used in treatments for Parkinson's disease, Najarian said.

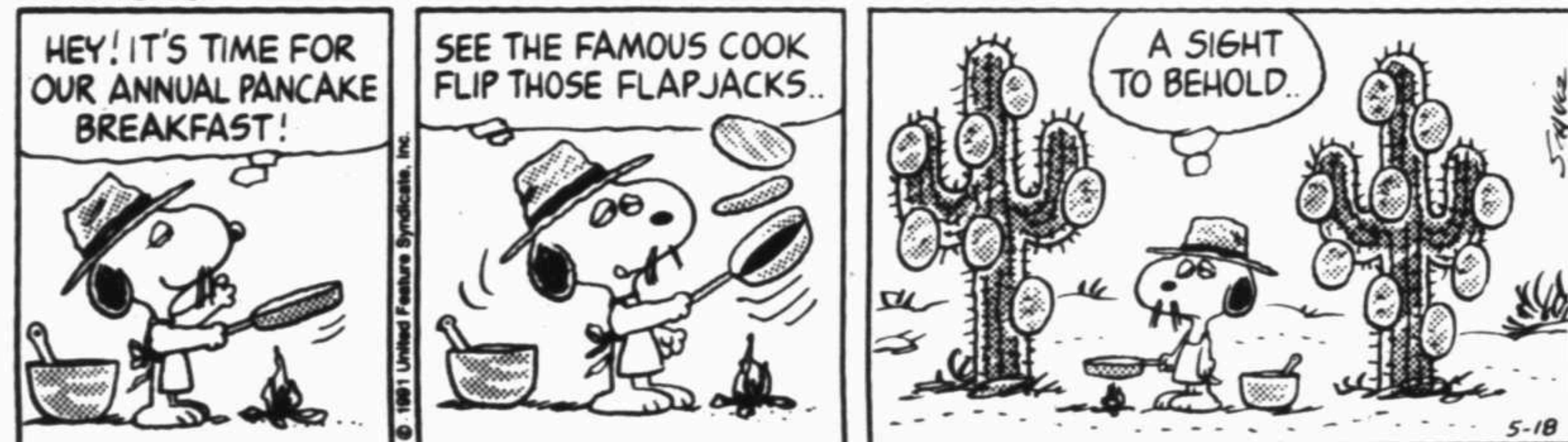

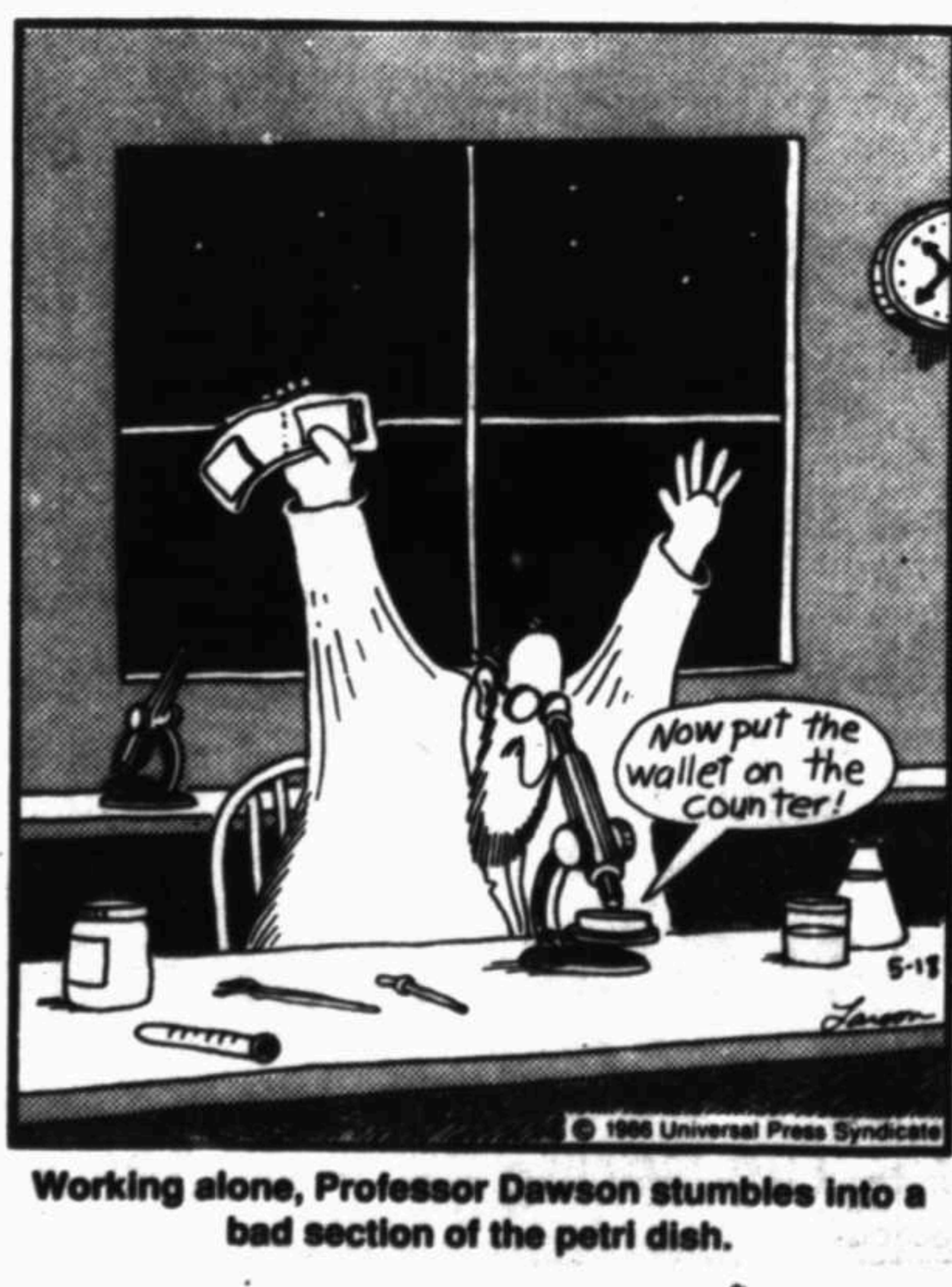

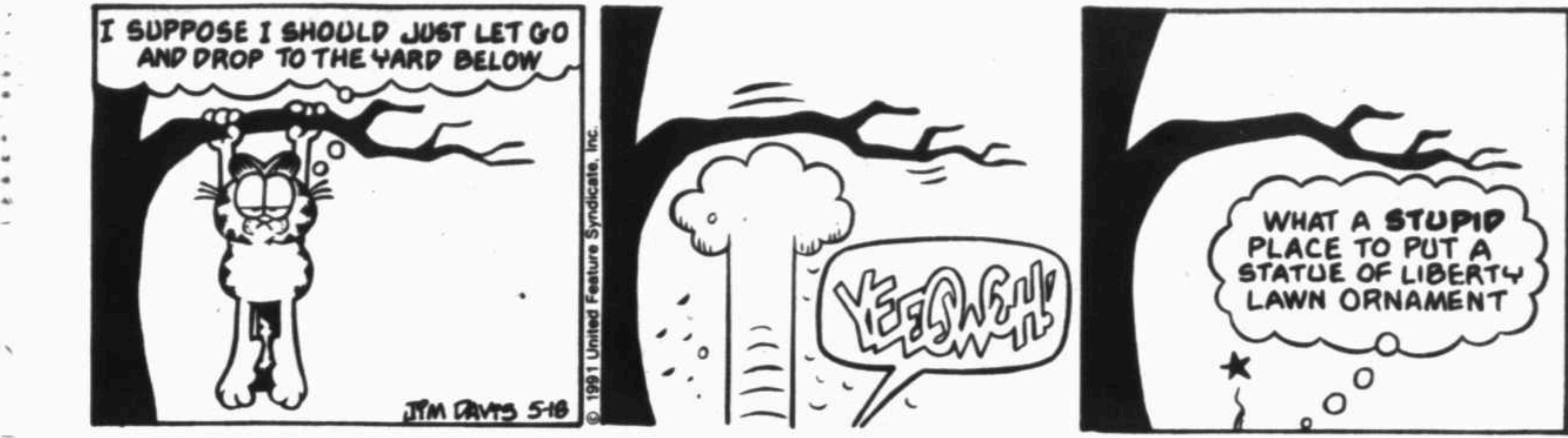

Robin Williams addresses Julliard's commencement

NEW YORK — Robin Williams live at Lincoln Center! It happened Friday, before a less than sold-out house at commencement ceremonies for The Julliard School's 220-member graduating class. The comedian, in cap and gown, brought down the house in an impromptu address that lampooned Jesse Helms and Dan Quayle. Williams, who received an honorary doctorate from the school he once attended, opened his five-minute spiel with a parody of an actor on an audition and closed it with a heartfelt thank you to the late John Houseman. "Hello. My name is Robin Williams, and I would like to do something from 'Hamlet' ... I just need a moment to prepare," the comedian said as the crowd in Alice Tully Hall roared. "To be or ... Wait! I know this!" Williams, who spent three years in Julliard's drama division, left the school in 1976 without his diploma. "I didn't graduate. I'm sorry," he said. But he made a point of saying thanks to Houseman, the venerable actor who was director of the drama division during Williams' stay. Earlier, when he received his degree, Williams used sign language as school president Joseph Polisi introduced him. He also feigned falling over when his doctoral hood was placed over his gown. "I feel like I'm auditioning for the Supreme Court," said Williams, lifting his outfit. Others receiving honorary degrees included Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., violinist Isaac Stern and choreographer Eliot Feld. Williams, who addressed the students instead of the traditional speech by Polisi, had the students rolling with a ribald impression of U.S. Sen. Jesse Helms examining Robert Mapplethorpe's photographs. He also provided his definition of "frightening times." "That would be, President Quayle, raise your right hand. No, your other right hand," said Williams.
