

Moody Economy Saves State Enough In Year To Pay Governor's Salary for 16 Months; \$5,390.15 Saved from Budget

Frugal Program of State's Chief Executive Is Practiced In Governor's Mansion Expenses

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Nov. 21. — By frugal practices, Gov. Dan Moody saved enough out of appropriations for expenses of the executive department during the year ending last August 31, to pay his salary for 16 months. A total of \$28,228 was appropriated for the executive department and of this amount \$22,838.55 was actually expended, according to the Board of Control budget just issued. The saving of \$5,390.15 in excess of the chief executive's annual salary of \$4,000.

While the legislature appropriated \$750 for the governor's traveling expenses, Governor Moody actually drew on this account during the year for only \$28.52 scarcely enough to pay railroad fare over 2,000 miles without seating accommodations. His friends claim that he has gone down into his own personal purse to pay many expenses.

Saves On Grounds Upkeep

The legislature allowed and voted \$2,500 for maintenance of the mansion and grounds during the year, but the governor and Mrs. Moody, who went there to live two years ago as an inexperienced newly-married couple, last year spent only \$1,600 of that amount. Of the \$2,000 appropriated for servants and employees at the mansion, Governor and Mrs. Moody saved the state \$75 drawing on this account for \$1,925.

They did still better, when it came to running up bills for fuel, lights, ice, telephones and water at the mansion paying out only \$1,170 of the \$2,000 appropriated by the state. Stationery Expenses Cut

Economy also characterized miscellaneous expenses in the chief executive's office. The budget shows that of \$1,000 voted by the legislature, for books and stationery, \$810 was actually spent. Of this \$500 allotted for contingent expenses only \$275.

The freight and postage bill was paid down to \$500 although \$950 was appropriated. The ice bill was cut, too. The legislature voted \$36 for ice in the governor's office but only \$28 was spent.

Fire Chief Again Issues Warning On Grass Fire Hazard

Because of the fact that it was necessary for the fire department to make a run to the 1600 block on Nineteenth street Wednesday afternoon, to put out a grass fire, Chief W. E. Twitty calls attention of the public to a manner in which they can assist in fire precaution. "If the citizens who desire to have dry grass burned from vacant lots will first take the precaution to call the fire department," Chief Twitty declared, "we will be only too glad to send some of the firemen out to assist them in the burning. It is much safer to use this method than to wait until the grass fires get beyond control of a few inexperienced fire fighters, and then sending in an alarm."

Lubbock Junior High Downs Plainview Bullpups, 12-0

City Basketball League Opens Season Monday Night With 2 Games Carded

Little Westerners Show Superior Teamwork to Outclass Visiting Eleven In Well Played Contest

Local Juniors Strut Their Wares Before Large Crowd At Tech Field Wednesday Afternoon

A Lubbock Junior High school football eleven that showed superior coaching and generalship won handsomely from the Plainview Bullpups 12 to 0 on the Tech gridiron Wednesday afternoon in a game featured by the heavy playing of both aggregations.

Although outweighed considerably by the Plainview griders, the local lightweights put an impressive exhibition of football strategy of the breaks to down the invaders with little difficulty.

The Little Westerners held the advantage over the Pups throughout the contest, playing most of the game in the enemy territory.

Ball Pups Threaten

Plainview took the offensive in the early minutes of play and after reeling off three first downs in succession seemed headed for a touchdown but a fumble on the 20 yard line dented them the coveted score. Lubbock immediately kicked and again recovered the ball on the Pups' 40 yard line.

Two passes mixed with end runs and line smashes carried the oval to the eight yard line as the first period ended. Lawrence Cook, Archie Corley and Frank Smith were leading the Westerner attack.

A stubborn Bull Pup line stopped the locals cold when the second period opened and the ball went over on the Plainview 5 yard line. Plainview kicked out to mid-field. Corley, three plays later, fumbled the ball. The Westerners were forced to punt. Blagg, Lubbock left end, was down under the punt and rebounded on the plain on the Plainview 35 yard line. A drive featuring Cook and Corley carried the oval to the 10 yard line. Finding the Plainview line holding within the shadow of their goal Corley, Lubbock quarter called a pass. "Horse" Douglas, right end, cut back through the Plainview secondary defenses and received the ball on the visitors' five yard line and raced across for the first counter of the game. Corley's kick from placement was blocked.

Smith Grafs Pass

Frank Smith scored the second touchdown for the Lubbock juniors less than a minute after the first had been chalked up. A substitution had brought instructions from Homer Roper, Plainview coach, to try the aerial route. They did, and Smith picked out one to his liking and raced 40 yards for the second touchdown. A bad pass from center gummed up the second attempt to gain an extra point.

Catch Roper's Bull Pups came back in the second half with words of fight. The header Bull Pup line men were banking through on almost every play. Hamilton blocked a Lubbock punt on the Westerners' 20 yard line and from there the Plainview griders crashed through to the 4 yard line only to lose the ball on downs. Davis, Kendrick and Miliken shares honors for the visitors, totting the leather Alexander, lanky Plainview right guard, was a tower of strength in the visitors' line.

Both Teams Fats

The fourth period found both teams tacking to the overhead game on offense. Neither was able to get their passing attack going. The final minutes of play found coaches from both elevens making frequent substitutions.

It was the second time this season that the two teams have met. In the first encounter played at Plainview, the game ended in a scoreless tie. A large crowd of high school students witnessed the game yesterday.

What a mess the Interscholastic League race has turned out to be. Protests, investigations, rulings and counter-rulings have caused football fans the state over to scratch their heads in dismay and wonder what it's all about. Conflicting reports coming in daily, disputes centering around the eligibility of players (usually the outstanding men) and wholesale refutation of these rumors has thrown the high school football race into an unprecedented chaos.

Down in the Oil Belt district the officials seem to be in a quandary as to which team is leading. First it was Abilene, then Ranger, Cisco and Ranger again after various and sundry reports had made the league officials dizzy trying to figure it all out. Blondy Cross, press agent for the "game little Bobcats" of San Angelo, feels that the San Angelo entry has suffered more than any other team in the state. All the other teams which San Angelo must meet in the district are dubbed "Elephants," "Juggernauts" and other expressions denoting crushing power.

After it appeared certain that the San Angelo Bobcats were out of the running, the "Standard" sports scribe began searching for some title which he might pin on the "brave little Bobcats." With no hopes of winning the district championship, he has called the Bobcat eleven the "gamest" team in the district and now comes out with the assertion that it is the "hardest luck" team in that section.

It does seem a shame for the great, big, overgrown teams in the Oil Belt to pick on the poor, helpless San Angelo midgets. They haven't won many games, but it has always been either because they were outwitted, played on a muddy field, were suffering injuries, couldn't get started, had the stars from their backfield missing or were unable to score as many points as the opposition. One can't blame Blondy for taking up for the Bobcats. That's his business. But by now he should realize that there are several other towns in his district that have football teams which are probably as formidable as the "fighting Bobcat eleven."

Blondy started quite a commotion in Amarillo when he accused the Panhandle city of having "the highest paid team in the state." He says he was merely quoting a citizen of the city who was in San Angelo boosting for the Sandies. The statement has caused the Amarillo papers to devote several columns during the past week concerning the Sandies—their salaries, eligibility, etc. Amarillo's sport sheets have responded nobly to the cause of anti-protests in the Interscholastic League. With an assurance that Amarillo did not fear any protests on any member of the Sandist eleven, the sport department of the News has entered the fight against late season protests with all the vigor at its command.

We quote from the Amarillo paper:

"It fills us considerably to see a fast, interesting state football race thrown into chaos by the hard losers. We hate to see football games decided in committee rooms. We believe the Sandies are going far in the state race—perhaps even into the finals. But we would rather see the Sandies licked in the bi-district game by a team that has climbed to the top through football prowess, than to walk into the state championship by defeating schools

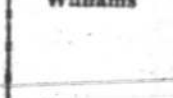

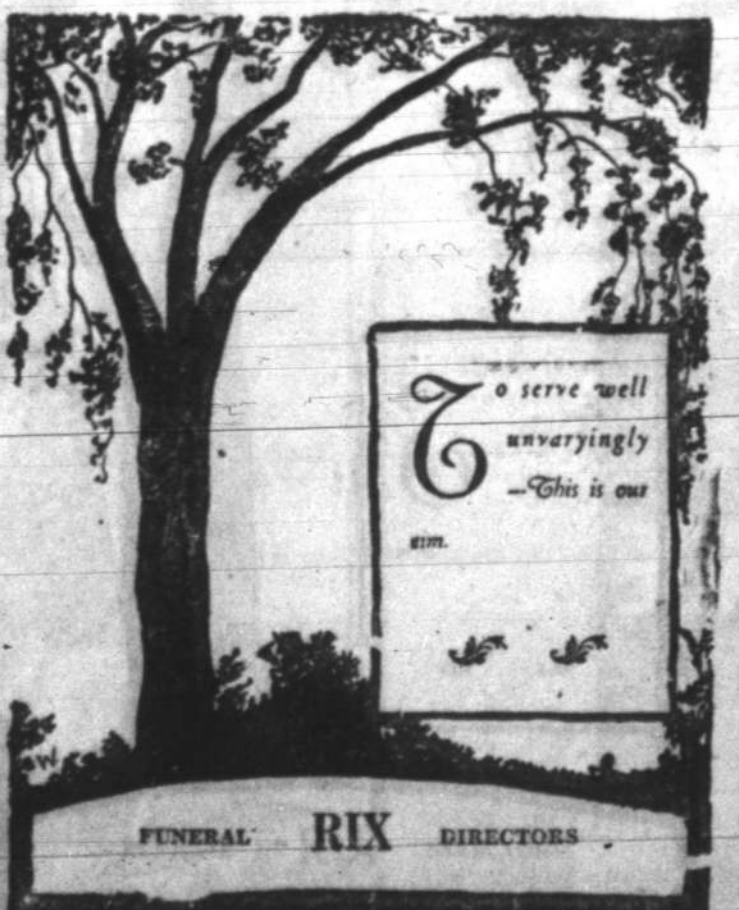

SPARING THE ROD AND SPOILING THE CHILD

We could never approve of being as severe as some parents have been known in the rearing of their children. We have never thought that it was ever intended that any father had the right to beat a child unmercifully in an effort to control them. However, we do believe that possibly the parents of today have gone to the other extreme, and are allowing too much laxness in the training of the child in the home. It would seem that the present generation is proving this. We do not mean by that, that our young people are exceedingly bad, but they are just simply indulged by all manner of means, and without much interference. Under this condition we believe that the boys and girls of today are not as mean as the boys and girls of the days when we were in that class would have been under the same training. We think though, that we are too indulgent with our children, and do not seem to have the control over them that parents of 50 years ago had. They do not insist that the family go to church and remain for the preaching services, whether they remembered a word of sermon or not, but they did then, and possibly it has been a valuable habit that boys and girls of that day and time formed that have stayed with them to this day.

Leaders in juvenile work are the ones that realize possibly that great need of better home training more than possibly any other class of people, and Mrs. Ida L. Cain, of Wichita Falls, who is state chairman of the juvenile protection division of the Texas Parent-Teachers association in a recent address says:

"Controlled and directed child power is imperative of boys and girls of today will come into destruction by their own force. Delinquency or criminality is nothing but misguided child power and the lack of proper home discipline is responsible chiefly for the delinquency of today." Mrs. Cain said in an address before the state association.

It looks like a reasonable theory. A child, if healthy, is never still in body or mind. If his activity is properly directed it will be productive of something good as he grows up. If it is not properly directed, it may be influenced by all manner of evil that is to be found in the present day society, and if so influenced it is certain to be productive of something bad. Obviously, the best place to give adequate direction to the mental and physical—to say nothing of the spiritual—activity of the child is in the home, for it is here that parents are persons responsible for giving that direction and the atmosphere is created for making it effective.

The prison records prove Mrs. Cain's theory. An overwhelming majority of our criminals came out of homes in which they were not disciplined during their youth.

THE EVILS OF BETTING

The American people seem to be a sporty bunch anyway. They seem to have a streak of daring in their veins. They want to back up their judgment by putting up money, or its equivalent against the judgment and equal some of money or property or different thing of value. Many men, women, and we presume women, will bet their last dollar on something, that really does not specially concern them or affect them in any way, and if they lose are ill able to afford it. Times have been, we dare say, when men have gambled in that way to the extent that their wife and their children have gone without the necessary amount of clothing and food, because of their foolishness in betting on something that they were not familiar with to know anything about. Many thousands of dollars were lost in the general election on the presidential race, and many people suffered as a result of it. Some men were foolish enough to make truck bets, and while they were possibly of no financial importance, that have been extremely embarrassing, not only to them but to their friends and relatives.

Bill Williams of Rio Hondo, is a good democrat, but he displayed bad judgment when he made a freak bet on the recent election. Now he is engaged in the unpleasant task of rolling a peanut a mile a day for a period of 11 days, and using his nose for a propeller as the goober is pushed along the highway. The 11 miles from Harlingen to Rio Hondo will seem as long to him as the distance from Dan to Beersheba, or from hell of Haw river, as the case may be; and while most of us will sympathize with Bill, there is nothing any of us can do about it.

Your Health

The human body is a complicated collection of muscles, bones, nerves, blood vessels and organs composed of living cells.

These tissues act upon fuel taken into the body and through the circulating medium, known as the blood, develop secretions from glands and activities of individual structures.

Hence it is impossible to consider an individual from the standpoint of any single organ, tissue, or system alone. He must be considered instead as the sum of all of these parts constantly acting and reacting upon each other and to their environment.

Manner of Reacting.
This state of affairs for any individual constitutes what is known as his constitution. Because of his makeup he will tend to react toward certain situations in a definite way. This tendency is known as the individual disposition.

The character of the person is also largely determined not only by his physical state but by her son is of the greatest importance to the physician and environment. The constitution of the person in determining the manner in which the individual will react to disease or to various occurrences in human life.

Many authorities on the human constitution have tried to outline special types based on the manner of reaction to physical and environmental conditions. Thus they classify what is known as arthritic type, a person who tends to suffer with rheumatism and related diseases; tubercular type, glandular types, with special tendencies to overactivity or underactivity of each of the glands of internal secretion; psychopathic types and cancerous types.

In studying the likelihood of any individual toward the manifestations of various diseases, it is of the utmost importance to know whether or not he inclines toward any one of these special groups. Few persons realize how definitely activity of various glands may mark the human body. Persons with excessive action of the thyroid gland may have abundant development of the hair of the body; hyper-pigmentation of the skin; brilliant, constantly moving eyes which in many instances are collected to excess perspiration; not infrequently a rapid heart, and a high basal metabolism, indicating overactivity of chemical factors in the body.

Thyroid Deficiency.
On the contrary, one who is deficient in thyroid tends to be stolid, somewhat thick set and short; he tends to deposit excess amounts of fat on the body; the head is usually large; the neck short and thick; the hands short and stubby; the eyes small and not usually vivacious; the hair poorly developed about the body.

Such persons have a skin which is thick and fat and with little perspiration. Other glands of the body are associated through underactivity or overactivity with special appearances of the body form. This brief consideration is but an indication of an extensive field that modern medical science is entering.

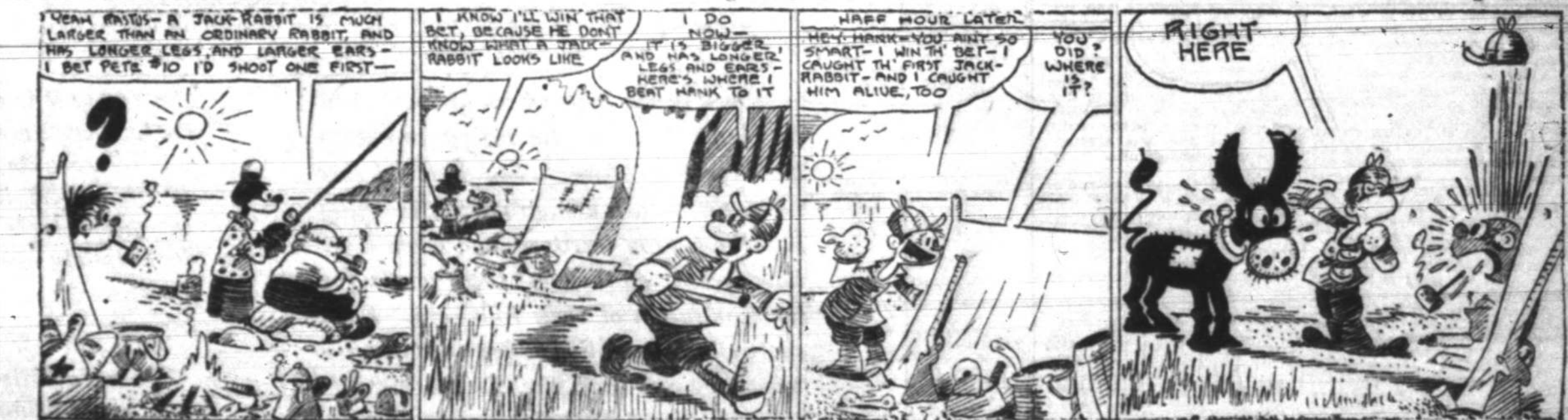

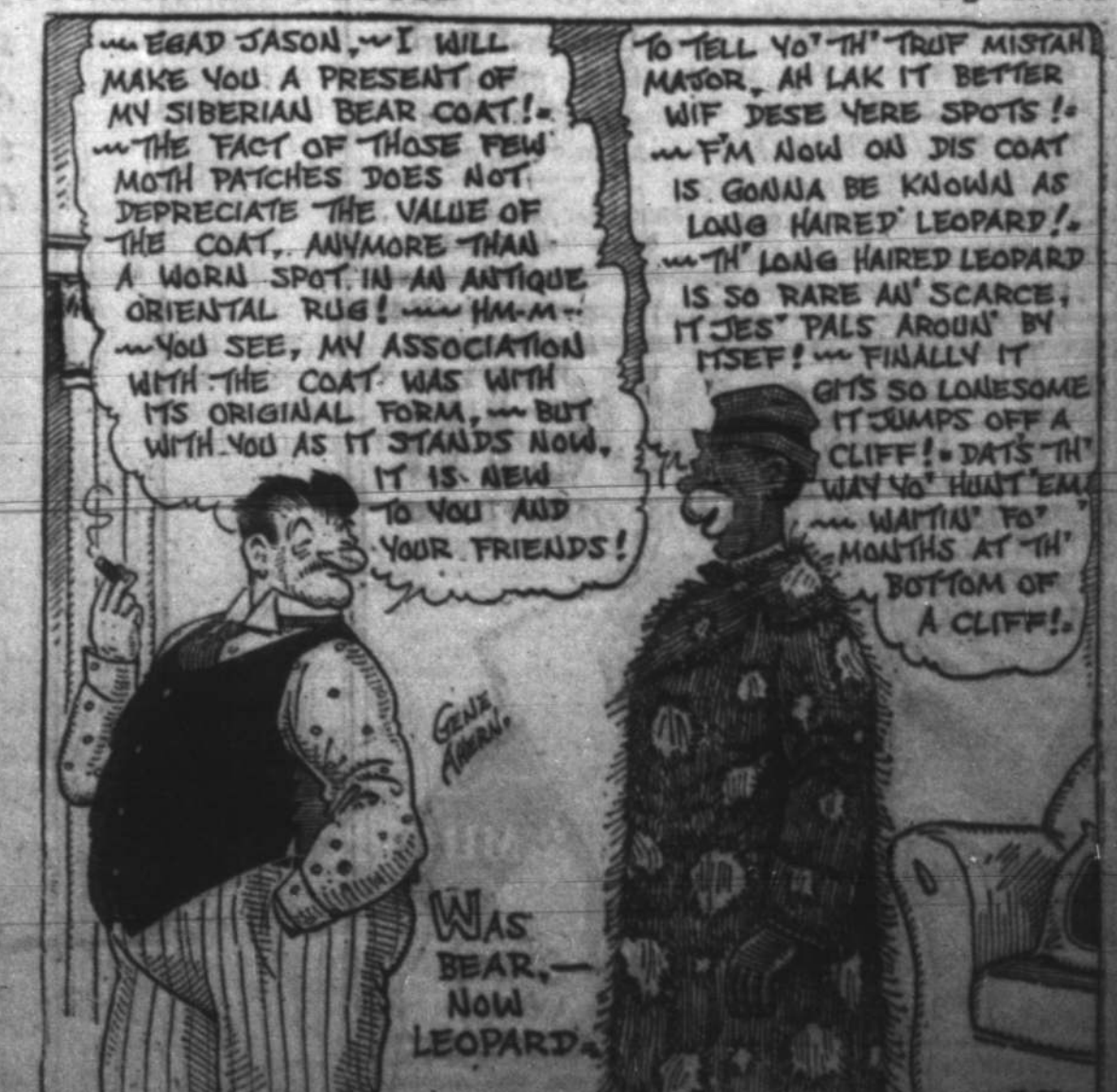

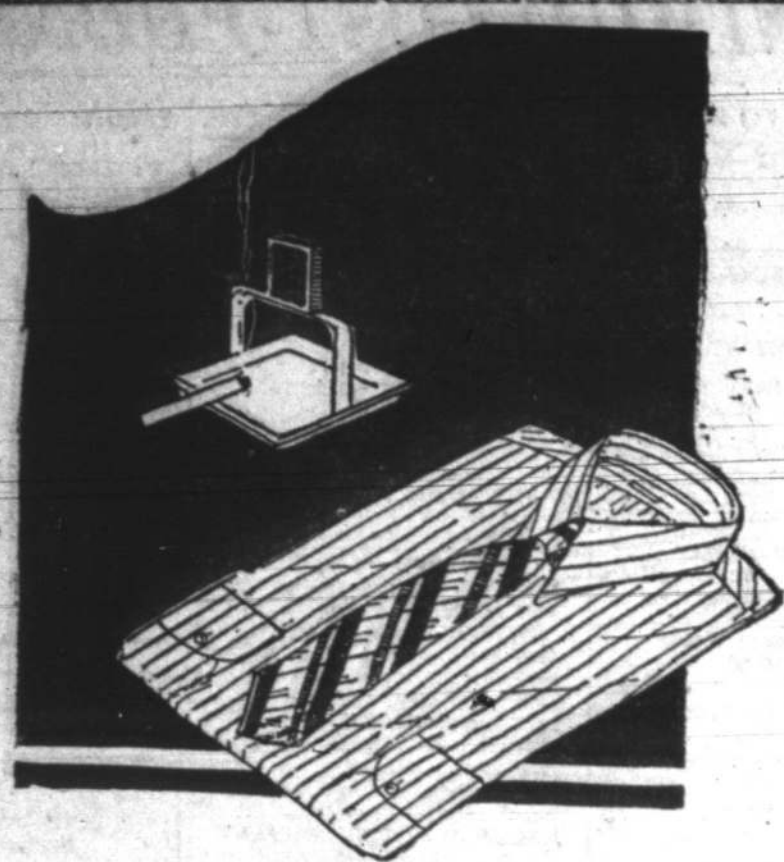

completed. He referred to other roads in other sections of the state as lasting not more than five or six years.

"I would like to see Lubbock county build good concrete highways or brick state and federal highways," he said. "That would be a good investment. But if we spend approximately one million dollars on county roads, I believe it is money thrown away."

Believes Leaders At Fault

E. B. Speck said he was glad for the privilege of living in a progressive city and county; that he never had voted against any good roads move before, but that he believes the men who are proponents of this bond issue, while sincere, are at fault in putting on too large a proposition.

"This is the most serious proposition ever coming before Lubbock county," said P. F. Brown. "The debt of \$2,000,000 is too big. Interest on these bonds over a period of years will be much greater than the principal paid. Every dollar of the bond issue goes away from this county never to return, and it will double the amount of state and county taxes we are now paying."

Will Lose State Aid

M. G. Abernathy claimed that if the county roads were voted for this time, "we would lose the state and federal aid and the roads would wear out in five years. It means the loss of \$1,000,000 to the people of Lubbock county."

Claiming that taxes would be doubled, J. E. Vickers said he opposes the bonds as proposed, but favors designated highways to be paved with a bond issue, provided they are built with permanent paving.

W. W. Campbell said, "I don't like to pay a bonus to the other fellow, (Slaton) by giving them these later roads in the east part of the county, in order to get them to favor this project."

Against High-Priced Cheap Roads

J. D. Walker, formerly of Delta county, East Texas, spoke of road bonds voted there years ago on which roads were built that did not last the life of the bonds and said he was against high-priced cheap roads.

In closing, P. F. Brown charged that the proponents of this bond issue were using the public's money, organizing and making intimidation threats, urging all present to work to defeat the election and then begin work to carry a bond issue for building paved state and federal highways in the county.

president of the Burlington railway, pictured the South Plains extension as the growing child of a railway system containing more than 22,000 miles of track.

Ascending the platform amid a rousing ovation, Congressman Marvin Jones, of Amarillo, told the large audience that the city of Amarillo was glad to join in the celebration of this achievement of the South Plains. Fort Worth was represented by the speaking by R. E. Harding, president of the association of commerce of that city, and Congressman Hutton W. Summers, of Dallas, made the address for that city. He urged the cooperation of Texas cities in building an independent state by the development of home industries.

Committee Has Charge

The railroad committee of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, consisting of O. L. Slaton, C. E. Maedgen, J. O. Jones and Sam Arnett, and the joint-of-way committee, composed of Roger Q. Pierce, P. H. Sammons, E. B. Green, and Dr. I. E. Barr, who were largely responsible in bringing the new rail line here, were asked to stand.

B. Sherrod, president of the local Chamber of Commerce, presided at the meeting and introduced the speakers. Tribute was paid to the newspapermen of the visiting cities for their part in the fight for the rail extension.

Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of Texas Tech, made the final address of the program, pointing out the part played in the rail development of this section by directors of the board of directors of the college.

The Fort Worth special departed on its homeward trek at 9:45, the Dallas train at 10 o'clock and the Amarillo special at 11.

World Moves In Cycles

"This world moves in cycles; everything rises to peaks of perfection and falls again into lower levels and this same principle can be applied to the behavior of people. I cannot see that the world, as a whole will grow inferior," he explained.

"Men seek places in the ministry who are not strong enough to stay in their work and they withdraw, giving their places to others with the most beautiful spirit of self-sacrifice in the world in order that the church may live and grow," according to this official.

Preachers of the country mobilized during the recent presidential campaign because their field had been invaded and they were called upon to defend the principles of morality, he said in some discussion of the place of preachers in political campaigns.

Strife Is Forgotten

"These men did not enter politics. They defended their field which had been invaded by the politicians," he explained. "Now that that is all over, they will follow the even tenor of their ways as citizens and preachers, forgetting the strife."

This mild man continued, concluding his talk with expressions of pleasure in being in Lubbock and meeting with the men and women here at this time.

While he is in Lubbock, Bishop Moore is a guest in the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Maedgen, at 1823 Broadway and a sun parlor of this spacious residence has been converted into an office for this man during his stay here. It is in this chamber that his conferences are held daily.

Conferences Are Happy Events

These yearly gatherings of the preachers are happy occasions. It is the harvest men and are brought into the ranks and introduced as they make their plea for places among God's ministers; older saints are placed on the superannuate list, making room for these fresher preachers; it is an occasion of reunion.

Preachers are not the vineyard, ebullient creatures of some fancies but are a hearty lot, spicing their annual conferences with all the wholesome pranks and cheer of other gatherings of professional men together, according to this Bishop, whose demeanor bespeaks of just such a meeting. And yet, nothing could have been more earnest than the consultation over which he had just been presiding.

There are plenty of young men entering into the ministry, as many as the church can find places for, asserted this man. Standards of the profession are being raised because this is an age of experts and the preacher must be as well educated and trained as his contemporaries.

As to whether or not the young people of today are better or worse than the young people of another generation, Bishop Moore could not say.
