County Commissioners Discuss Jail Contracts With Cities Monday

Most of the Eastland County Commissioners Court meeting Monday was spent in discussion with officials from local towns and on new jail contracts for housing city prisoners.

The main different in opinion between some of the Commissioners and the cities was over billings for persons arrested by city police and held for in interim time before being formally charged. Some of these prisoners turn out to be wanted on felonies or other county, state or federal charges.

As the Court convened Sheriff Dee Hogan gave the Commissioners, news media and city representatives copies of his policy under the current contract. He said, in part, "The County becomes the responsible entity upon receipt of a warrant issued for (1) a felony, (2) a class A misdemeanor, or (3) a Class B misdemeanor. (An exception to this would be a D.W.I. charge). To deviate from this standard would be a form of subsidy for the cities."

Mayor Gordon Baze and Police Chief Cecil Funderburk represented the City of Gorman. They discussed various details of a new contract, including billings they did not believe to be correct and the clarification of who was to be regarded as city and county prisoner.

They asked what the charges for housing city prisoners would be under a new contract, and were told that these billings would remain at \$15 per day.

As details were ironed out Baze and Funderburk appeared satisfied with the contract. The County Commissioners gave approval to the new agreement.

The Commissioners also approved payments for the month of Nov. and Dec. 1988 to the City of Gorman for rural firefighting. County Judge Scott Bailey told the Court that key people in the city became seriously ill during those months and were not able to get in the required reports.

Cisco Chief of Police Billy Rains then spoke to the Commissioners about the proposed new contract with the City of Cisco on housing jail prisoners.

He said the City of Cisco had agreed with the contract up to one point, and that was payment while a prisoner was

being held until an appropriate charge could be filed.

There were special problems on getting a speedy chemical analysis on suspected drugs, the Police Chief said.

District Attorney Emory Walton said an officer should make an immediate trip "up there" to the crime lab and get a tentative analysis by a chemist.

Rains said he had asked for a "preliminary" on marijuana and the crime lab did not give it. He indicated that he felt the county should provide interim services for prisoners arrested on serious offenses.

Sheriff Dee Hogan said that charges should be filed within 72 hrs. after an individual is arrested.

Judge Bailey said the contract with Cisco would need

to be placed on the next agenda, for April 10, and a decision would be made on billings at that time.

As Billy Rains concluded his discussion Eastland City Manager Paul Catoe, Mayor C.W. Hoffmann and Attorney Mike Siebert entered the courtroom.

Paul Catoe said it appeared that the City of Eastland had the same problem as Rains on the billing of prisoners.

He said the City had paid for those in Jan. and Feb. "We felt were city prisoners," but one of the problems was with state prisoners arrested inside the city limits. One case involved an Eastland man arrested Jan. 7 by Police Chief Lyndall Underwood for violating a Family Protective Order. The prisoner became ill the next day, and was carried by ambulance to Eastland Memorial Hospital. He was not charged with his offense

until Jan. 10. The County was asked to reimburse the City of Eastland \$134.75, which is part of the prisoner's medical bill.

Commissioner Richard Robinson of Pct. 1 made the motion that the money be reimbursed, stating that the individual "violated the State Family Protective order, so was not a City prisoner." It was brought out that the order was signed by District Judge Jim Wright.

Norman Christian, Comm. of Pct. 2, gave a second to Robinson's motion to reimburse the medical bill. When the vote was called, Comm. Billy Bacon, Pct. 4, and L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, voted against it, creating a tie.

Judge Bailey declared the motion dead for lack of a majority.

Robinson said that his feeling after a vote like that was that city lawmen should be told not to arrest anybody for violating a Family Protective Order, since the city would have to pay for everything until a person was charged.

District Attorney Emory Walton replied that an officer in the city or county has a duty to arrest anyone break the law.

During the comments Paul Catoe said: Lyndall (Underwood) will do his job. But it's in our interest to get it (various details of the contract) resolved.

He told the Commissioners that the City had tried to be fair to the County. He said the \$134 mentioned today was not the issue, but that the contract needed to be clarified.

L.T. Owen replied that the county had also been fair to

the city. He mentioned that the cities have not paid the county for a number of years on housing prisoners. Apparently there had been no billing from the former Sheriff's office.

Owen asked District Attorney Emory Walton if the county was living up to the terms of the present jail contract.

"So far as I know, we are," Walton said. "The cities are accountable until at such time the prisoner is billed."

Eastland officials asked him to review the present contract, and Walton said he would do so.

In other jail matters, Billy Bacon reported that 18 prisoners were in the County Jail. This included one prisoner for the Texas Department of Corrections, and two for out-of-county.

Judge Bailey said that he drove to Comanche recently, to the site of a new jail being constructed there. This was being built a new method using concrete modules. These were brought from Mobile, Alabama and put in place with a large crane.

The Judge said that Bob Viterna, recently retired as head of the State Jail Standards Commission, was now a consultant for the firm doing the work.

This method appeared to be a more economical way of building jails than the traditional methods of the past, Bailey said.

The Judge also said that Bob Viterna was to meet with the County Commissioners at the Eastland County Jail around 10 a.m. the next day (Tuesday), to discuss any possible use of modules here.

ASCS News

The 1989 Wheat, Feed Grain and Upland Cotton Program will continue through April 14, 1989. During the sign-up, producers of wheat or feed grain may request 40 percent advance and upland cotton 30 percent advance of the estimated deficiency payment. All advance payments will be made in cash.

Projected 1989 Deficiency Rates are as follows: Wheat - 50 cents per bushel; Corn - 89 cents per bushel; Sorghum - 90 cents per bushel; Barley - 23 cents per bushel; Oats - 0; Upland Cotton - .214 cents per pound.

Program crops intended for grain which have failed due to weather or other conditions beyond the operator's control must not be disposed of by grazing, plowing, etc., unless a request for disaster credit has been made on form ASCS-574 and a field inspection has been made by ASCS. Program benefits will be lost on small grain disposed of prior to May 1, unless failed acreage has been requested and approved.

Final date to file a disaster application is March 31, 1989. Sign-up for the Emergency Feed Program ends March 31, 1989. Eligible producers must be actively engaged in farming and/or ranching. To be considered actively engaged, 10 percent of the applicant's annual gross income must be derived from the production of grain or livestock. All producers who sign-up are subject to spot check of your feed application and also of your income. If spot checked, you may be required to furnish a copy of your latest income tax return for review.

The national average support level for the 1989 quota peanuts is \$615.87 per ton, compared with \$615.27 for the 1988 crop. The national average support level for additional peanuts is \$149.75, unchanged from the 1988 crop.

The 1989 peanut transfer requests will not be accepted until the second undermarketing notice is received and quota notices are issued.

We ask that you please accept our apology and accept this as your personal invitation to speak before the board at the next board meeting scheduled April 10, 1989. We welcome citizen input, but at the same time we strive to be in accordance with School Law and School

4-H NEWS

Today's 4-H program is noted for its flexibility, a feature that makes it the largest youth serving organization in the country. 4-H is flexible because it is organized in different ways, for different needs, in different places.

Organization may take the form of community or neighborhood clubs, project clubs, special interest groups, and special activities. Young people take part in 4-H through any or all of these.

The community or neighborhood 4-H Club is associated with an area known to local people, such as a small community or a town. The number of 4-H members in a 4-H club may range from five or six to more than 100. This type of 4-H Club continues from year to year. Usually both boys and girls belong to the club, enrolling in projects according to their interests.

There are also groups known as "project clubs". In Eastland County we have project clubs including—Horse and Shooting Sports (underway).

Special educational activities often supplement 4-H programs. These include tours; 4-H junior and teen leader training workshops; achievement programs; camps, state conferences; seminars; recreational leadership training; exhibitions; fairs and shows; project training meetings; and career exploration.

There are many special state and national events held for 4-H members each year. The largest national event is National 4-H Congress, held in late fall in Chicago, to recognize about 2,000 state, sectional and national winners. National 4-H Conference, held each spring at the National 4-H Center in Washington, D.C., involves 250 4-

H'ers in developing national 4-H programs.

Groups and individual 4-H'ers take part in special activities as they gain experience and can benefit from them. Which ever methods suits youngsters best, 4-H has a way for them to learn and to have fun in an exciting youth program. Why not join in the fun and learning by joining a local 4-H club.

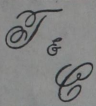

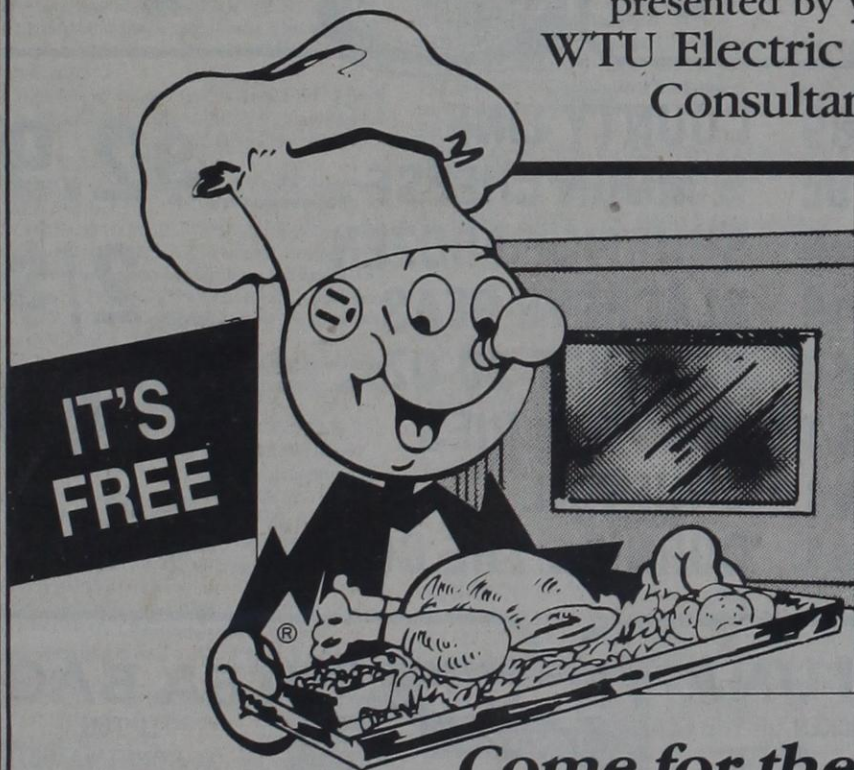
