Rivercrest Teams Sweep Twin Bill

Rivercrest Rebels and Rebel-ettes closed out their regular season Thursday night with a doubleheader victory over the Cooper Bulldogs and Bulldogettes.

The Rivercrest boys' team downed the Bulldogs, 85-37, and the Rebel-ettes took a 69-41 victory.

The Rivercrest girls took their 28th straight victory and the sixth conference win in a row, to win their third straight title in three years of competition in 15-AA.

Five members of the Rivercrest boys' team ended in the double figures. Amos Brown had 18 points, Levine Norman 17, Gary Savage 15, Freddy Savage 14 and Connie Minter 12.

In the girls' game, Glenna Grayson scored 23 points for the Rebel-ettes, Lana Sloan had 18 points and Gail Hardy hit for 16.

Rivercrest Rebel-ettes will go against either Brownsboro or Chapel Hill in its bi-district encounter. Brownsboro is currently leading the 16-AA girls standings and Chapel Hill is a game behind.

Work Begins On New Church For First Baptist

Construction was begun on a new, ultra-modern building for the First Baptist Church of Talco Monday morning. The contract was let Wednesday, Feb. 7, to contractor, Ray Joyner of Edgewood. The building will take form on the site where the old church building burned in November.

The new structure will be buff brick veneer with a steeple atop and will include air-conditioning and central heat. There will be approximately 3400 square feet in the floor space and the auditorium will seat 180 people. This will include an auditorium, pastor's study, restrooms and eight classrooms. The interior of the auditorium will include ash panning and sheet rock with a cathedral ceiling. From the inside, stain glass windows can be seen on either side of the auditorium and behind the baptistry.

The building will be completed by the first Sunday in June, if the weather permits. The church is meeting in the Talco Elementary School until this time.

Austin. — Eleven Democratic and three Republican candidates for governor squared off for an action-packed May 4 primary election as filing deadline closed last week.

Most of the interest centers in the gubernatorial contest. Only one Democratic incumbent in statewide office, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert, has primary opposition. The lieutenant governor's office and two Supreme Court places being vacated by incumbents are contested by Democrats.

While Republicans provided candidates for all statewide offices except judicial, only in the governor's column is there a GOP primary race. The rest are unopposed.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin, Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, Agriculture Commissioner John White, Treasurer Jesse James, Railroad Commissioner Jim Langdon, Supreme Court Associate Justice Zollie Steakley, Court of Criminal Appeals Judge W. A. Morrison and Leon Douglas, a candidate for the Court of Criminal Appeals have no Democratic opposition.

Republican candidates with no primary opposition are: Lieutenant Governor — Douglas DeCluitt of Waco; Attorney General Sprosser Wynn of Fort Worth; Treasurer — Manuel Sanchez of Brownsville; Comptroller — John Bennett, San Antonio; Agriculture Commissioner — E. H. Schuhart of Dalhart; Land Commissioner — Millard Neptune of New Ulm; and Railroad Commissioner — Jim Segrest of San Antonio.

DRINK BATTLE RENEWED — Gov. John Connally told a press conference that he may renew his effort to strengthen state liquor laws and legalize and tax liquor by the drink at the special session of the Legislature he must call this year.

Connally said the liquor proposal he made in 1967, which was killed by the Legislature, may well be a part of his program for raising the \$150,000,000 to \$190,000,000 which will be needed to

operate state government next year.

He renewed his attack on the "subterfuge" of the private club, and said that his efforts in 1967 to tighten up the liquor law were opposed by some who now profess to be shocked at the shortcomings of the liquor laws.

But Connally said he has not yet decided when to call the Legislature back to Austin. Speculation is that the session will be in June, after the primaries.

He suggested that if the liquor issue is not handled by the first special session, he might call another session to work on it. He also announced that he wants a strong conflict of interest law to prohibit any member of the Legislature from practicing before any state agency.

ATTORNEY GEN. RULES — Attorney General Martin has held that the state comptroller cannot make payments on state building contracts which exceed appropriated funds and must certify sufficient money is available to cover project.

In other recent opinions, Martin held that:

● State depository board may accept both guaranteed "preliminary loan notes issued by public housing authorities" and "participation certificates" of Federal National Mortgage Association as collateral for state deposits.

● Second or alternate retirement program may be established for state-supported college and university employees.

FILLED MILK SUIT FILED — Wholesome Dairy Inc. of El Paso filed suit in the 53rd District Court against the State of Texas in an attempt to keep the State Health Department from blocking the sale of "Farmer's Daughter High Protein Drink," a mixture of dry and powdered milk, vegetable oils and other materials.

State law prohibits the manufacture or sale of "filled milk," any milk or milk product mixed with fat or oil other than milk fat.

L.C.B. MAKES NEW RULES — Texas Liquor Control Board issued new rules for its agents, including a bar against LCB agents bidding for purchase of confiscated cars or trucks. A Dallas LCB agent's purchase of a confiscated truck was one of the incidents that kicked off the Board's current self-examination.

New rules warn agents against revealing any details of investigations, and tighten accounting procedures for keeping track of illicit alcohol that has been seized.

Outlook For 1968

With the risk of accelerating inflation the key concern for 1968, investors should focus on those industries that are less vulnerable to rising wage costs.

Another key guideline should be selectivity. While this word has become rather trite, I think 1968 is not the year in which investors should disregard selectivity as just another Wall Street cliché.



Within the context of rising wage costs, the first—and perhaps most obvious investment area is computers and their labor-saving applications. However, with most computer stocks selling at very high price/earnings multiples, I would advise investors with longer-term objectives to be alert to possibilities of a technical correction or consolidation.

Three industries warrant consideration on the basis of a demonstrated pattern of relatively low labor costs to total costs—utilities, oils, and drugs. Among the utilities, I favor Florida Power & Light, Texas Utilities, Pacific Gas & Electric, Hawaiian Electric, Tennessee, New Jersey Natural Gas, Southwest Gas Corp., and United Utilities.

Among the oils, I favor Atlantic Richfield, Mobil, Shell, Sinclair, Standard of New Jersey, Standard of Ohio, Texaco, and Union. In the electronics group, I think Texas Instruments, the leader in semi-con-

ductors, has appeal for long-term growth; Motorola for diversification, and Tektronix for its participation in the instrumentation area. Also, I recommend for their broad electronic lines Litton, RCA, and Raytheon.

Looking at the general economic picture for 1968, I see a good year for business and the investor, but I would want to caution that politics will play the most important role in determining the course of the economy. Unless there are meaningful cutbacks in non-essential Federal spending and a tax increase to curb inflation, the Federal Reserve Board may again have to assume the responsibility for restraining our economic exuberance.

My bullishness on the economic outlook is based on anticipated increases in government spending on all levels, as well as higher capital spending, and consumer outlays. I estimate an increase of \$55 billion in Gross National Product, up 7% from 1967, with half the gain in real growth, the remainder reflecting price increases.

I believe the consumer sector will provide the greatest increase in demand, with consumer spending rising more than \$35 billion, compared with an increase of only \$26 billion in 1967.

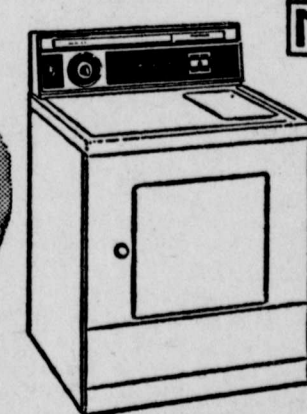

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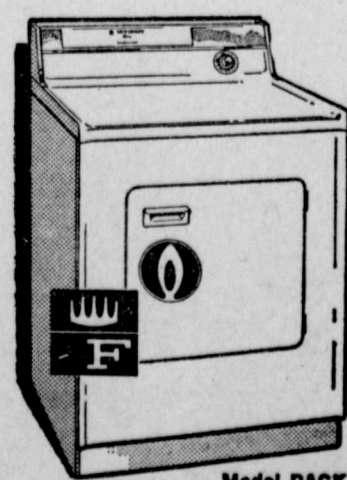
