Lone Wolf Re-elects Directors & Officers

In a business session following the program celebrating Lone Wolf's Silver Anniversary, officers were re-elected. Martin Murphy of Roscoe, president; Gwan Stange of Westbrook is secretary.

Other directors with unexpired terms on the board are Roscoe Hudgins of Loraine; Ed Roach, Colorado City; Linden Solomon of Ira; Sam Williams of Snyder. John Worrell is attorney for Lone Wolf Electric Co-operative, Inc. Raymond Perdue is manager.

Fifteen hundred people gathered in the cooperatorium at 6 p. m. for the Tuesday celebration and business meeting.

Highlights of the anniversary entertainment were registration and door prizes.

Western music by the Rhythm Ramblers and the drawing for numerous prizes given away.

Bob Murphy, attorney-humorist from Nacogdoches, was master of ceremony for the program and guest speaker for the evening.

Reports given included the president's message, "A Milestone Reached," and the report of the manager, Perdue, "Monopoly—the Worst Enemy of Free Enterprise."

"Electric cooperatives brought light where there was darkness," Perdue said. "Electric power cooperatives brought electric power where there was drudgery, prosperity where there was poverty and gave the rural housewife freedom from a life of endless toil."

"Electric cooperatives are truly of the people, by the people and for the people, an idea that every unselfish American should hold dear."

Lone Wolf Electric Co-operative Inc. serves more than 3,000 members in a six-county area embracing rural homes in Mitchell, Nolan, Fisher, Scurry, Borden and Howard counties.

Financial report for the anniversary year, the co-op's 25th year of existence, showed a total revenue of \$392,011.90, a total cost of electric service to its members, \$329,385.75 and a patronage capital and margins for 1963 of \$62,626.15.

Attending physician for Webb said Wednesday that the fall victim was improving. Webb has what his doctor described as a bad concussion and bruises over his body. He suffered no fractures of major bones in his body, the doctor said.

Webb is a well-known citizen of Colorado City. He formerly worked as a television salesman and serviceman for Ira Utz and as manager for a local gin.

Pool Life Guards Save 9-Year-Old

Bruce Hill, nine-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Hill Jr. of the China Grove Community, was rescued from Ruddick Park swimming pool here Saturday evening at 7:30 p. m.

L. E. Robison, manager of the pool, looked up to see the boy floundering in deep water and then go under. Tommy Humphreys and Mike Kilpatrick, life guards at the pool, and Robison pulled Bruce

from the deep water. Immediate artificial respiration was administered by the life guards and a doctor was called to the scene. The alarm from Robison and quick action by Humphreys and Kilpatrick were credited with saving young Hill's life. Pool-side treatment by the doctor to relieve him of excess water was successful.

New rules were put into effect by lifeguards following the near tragedy. It is now required that any swimmer must be able to swim across the pool and back before he can be permitted in the deep end of the pool or allowed to dive. Parents are requested to help see that the new safety rules are enforced.

The Hill lad is able to swim but had exhausted his strength. Because of over-exertion he was unable to swim back the distance to safety.

Webb Hurt In Fall From Step Ladder

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Johnson's Speech Gets Praised on Homefront

Colorado City citizens are strongly in favor President Lyndon B. Johnson's Tuesday night speech and his orders in Viet Nam for air action against gun boats which have attacked U. S. destroyers twice in the Gulf of Tonkin.

Citizens here were asked to express approval or disapproval of President Johnson's stand on "alert defense and positive reply" to acts of violence by North Viet Nam.

In a quick survey of local opinion a reporter polled a preacher, a doctor, two lawyers, two women and several business men. None voiced disapproval. All did speak warm praise for the President's speech and action.

Dr. Ralph Graham, pastor of first Christian Church, said at once: "It was exactly the thing we should have done. I am 100 percent behind the president. One of the great problems of our prestige in the world is that we have taken to much. We must stand ready to use our resources of power to keep the peace. I think Mr. Johnson displayed admirable courage in his move to maintain peace."

Dr. John H. Chinn, practicing physician who is mayor of Colorado City, said "I am heartily in favor of it. It amounts to a defense and is a logical defensive move."

Perry Barber, attorney and father of two sons of "fighting age" said "I feel like it's the only thing we can do. It's either defend ourselves or pull out. We have no reasonable alternative. We can't just crawl off in a hole and pull down the lid. All our prestige as a nation and the millions of dollars already spent are involved along with our world leadership."

Willie Landon, World War II veteran and now owner of a downtown store, said "I was really impressed with the president's speech last night. I am glad to see him take the stand as fast as he did. I think he is absolutely doing the right thing."

Mrs. Curtis Latimer, mother of a college age son and another about to be 18, said, "The speech was in no way partisan. It was in good taste, played not the least bit toward extremism. Can think of nothing controversial he said. As for Viet Nam, his move is the only move that our Americanism could possibly support."

Mrs. O. C. Palmer, a bookkeeper and homemaker, said simply "There was just nothing else we could do."

Jeff Taylor, manager of Rockwell Brothers lumber company here, said "I am very much in favor of it. I think it is high time and a little late."

Don Butler, lawyer and chairman of Mitchell County Republicans, said "I am happy that we are finally taking a more firm position—and might add that it is long overdue. I feel it could be the result of some of that constructive criticism from the Republican Party."

Regardless of political stripe," Butler added, "this is a time that calls for unity. We are all including Mr. Goldwater, behind the President."

Trevor Crawford, Cosden Oil & Chemical Co. and former mayor of Colorado City, told the reporter "I certainly think we ought to do what the President said we are doing."

Henry Bilberry, pharmacist and drug store owner, said quickly, "I think we ought to shoot the works! I am very much in favor of doing exactly what the President said—everything he said."

Raymond Fuller, grocer and cavalry veteran of World War II, said "The thing is that he (the President) should know what he is doing. I firmly believe he does know."

Mitchell County News Publisher Sells Paper

Veteran newspaper man J. W. King Sr. has sold The Mitchell County News, Loraine's only newspaper, to L. C. Burchfield of Mason.

Burchfield, in the newspaper field himself for 23 years, will take over the plant and publication of the Mitchell County News August 17. The new owner-publisher is married and the father of four daughters.

King, widely known throughout Mitchell County, has been in the newspaper business since 1920 when he first purchased the Roscoe Times. He sold that paper in 1925, then leased it from the new owner and ran it again until 1931.

In Oct. 1931 King bought The Mitchell County News at Loraine. As publisher and editor for almost 33 years he has specialized in news of local interest to Loraine families, Loraine business, church, farm and school news.

He has authored each week a front page column "On the Bean." Mitchell County News is published each Thursday.

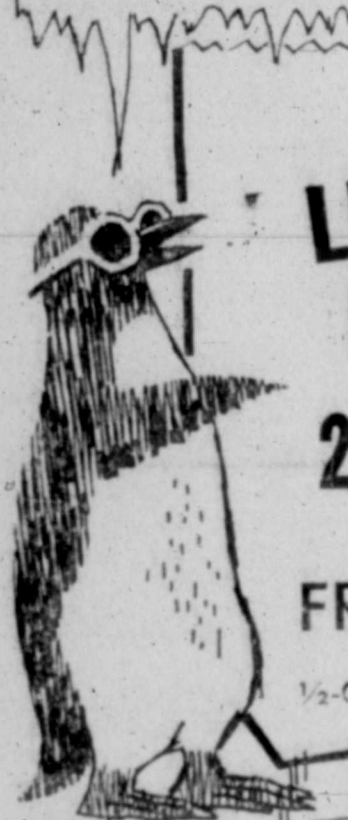

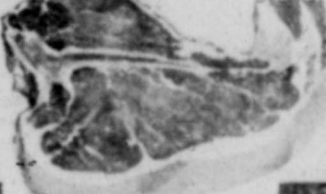

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITU-
TIONAL AMENDMENT
TO BE VOTED ON AT AN
ELECTION TO BE HELD
ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLU-
TION NO. 10 proposing an
Amendment to Section 51a of
Article III of the Constitution
of the State of Texas by add-
ing a new Subsection to be
known as 51a-2; giving the
Legislature the power to pro-
vide, under such limitations
and restrictions as may be
deemed by the Legislature ex-
pedient, for direct or vendor
payments for medical care on
behalf of individuals sixty-five
(65) years of age or over who
are not recipients of Old Age
Assistance and who are unable
to pay for needed medical
services; providing for the ac-
ceptance of financial aid from
the Government of the United
States for such medical pay-
ments; providing that the
amounts paid out of state
funds shall never exceed the
amount that is matchable
out of Federal funds for such
purposes; providing that cer-
tain means relating to the cor-
rection or remedying of abnor-
malities of vision shall be in-
cluded within such medical
care service or assistance;
providing for the necessary
election, form of ballot, pro-
clamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE
STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a
of Article III of the Consti-
tution of the State of Texas
be amended by adding thereto
a new Subsection to be known
as Subsection 51a-2, which
shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51a-2. The Leg-
islature shall have the power
to provide by General Laws
and to make payment for
same, under such limitations
and restrictions as may be
deemed by the Legislature ex-
pedient, for direct or vendor
payments for medical care on
behalf of needy individuals
sixty-five (65) years of age
or over who are not recipients
of Old Age Assistance, and
who are unable to pay for

needed medical services. The
payments for such medical as-
sistance on behalf of such
needy individuals shall be in
such amounts as provided by
the Legislature; provided, how-
ever, that the amounts paid
out of state funds for such
purposes shall never exceed
the amount that is matchable
out of Federal funds for such
purposes; provided further,
however, that such medical
care, services or assistance
shall also include the employ-
ment of objective or subjec-
tive means, without the use of
drugs, for the purpose of as-
certaining and measuring the
powers of vision of the human
eye, and fitting lenses or
prisms to correct or remedy
any defect or abnormal con-
dition of vision.

"The Legislature shall have
the authority to accept from
the Government of the United
States, such financial aid in
the form of medical assistance
on behalf of the needy indi-
viduals sixty-five (65) years
of age or over who are not re-
cipients of Old Age Assis-
tance, and who are unable to
pay for needed medical ser-
vices, as such Government may
offer not inconsistent with re-
strictions herein set forth."

Section 2. The foregoing
Constitutional Amendment
shall be submitted to a vote
of the qualified electors of this
state at the General Election
to be held on the first Tues-
day after the first Monday in
November, 1964, at which elec-
tion all ballots shall have
printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to
the Constitution giving the
Legislature the power to
authorize vendor pay-
ments for medical care on
behalf of needy individu-
als sixty-five (65) years
of age and over who are
not recipients of Old Age
Assistance, and who are
unable to pay for needed
medical services; provid-
ing for the acceptance of
funds from the Federal
Government for the pur-
pose of paying such medi-
cal assistance; and pro-

viding that the amounts
paid out of state funds for
such purposes shall never
exceed the amount that is
matchable out of Federal
funds; provided further,
however, that such medi-
cal care, services or as-
sistance shall also include
the employment of objec-
tive or subjective means,
without the use of drugs,
for the purpose of ascer-
taining and measuring the
powers of vision of the
human eye, and fitting
lenses or prisms to cor-
rect or remedy any defect
or abnormal condition of
vision."

"AGAINST the Amend-
ment to the Constitution
giving the Legislature the
power to authorize vendor
payments for medical care
on behalf of needy individu-
als sixty-five (65) years
of age and over who are
not recipients of Old Age
Assistance, and who are
unable to pay for needed
medical services; provid-
ing for the acceptance of
funds from the Federal
Government for the pur-
pose of paying such medi-
cal assistance; and provid-
ing that the amounts paid
out of state funds for such
purposes shall never ex-
ceed the amount that is
matchable out of Federal
funds; provided further,
however, that such medi-
cal care, services or as-
sistance shall also include
the employment of objec-
tive or subjective means,
without the use of drugs,
for the purpose of ascer-
taining and measuring the
powers of vision of the
human eye, and fitting
lenses or prisms to cor-
rect or remedy any defect
or abnormal condition of
vision."

Section 3. The Governor of
the State of Texas is hereby
directed to issue the necessary
proclamation for said election
and have the same published
and held as required by the
Constitution and the laws of
the State of Texas.

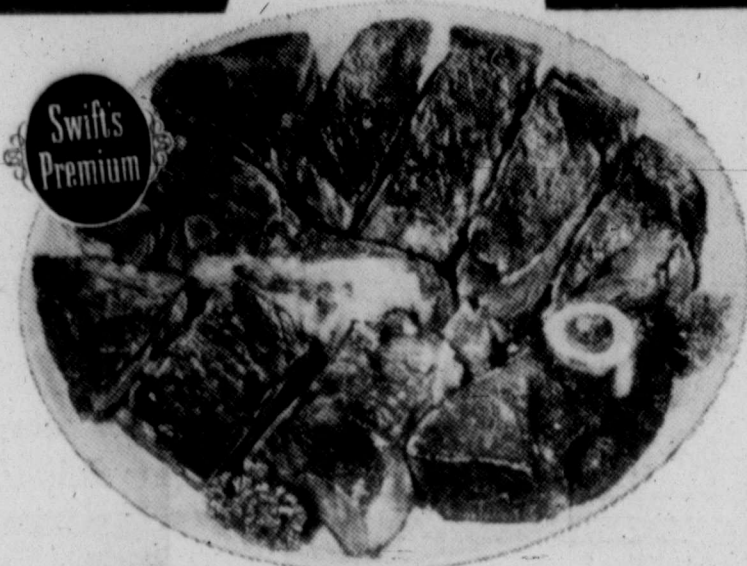

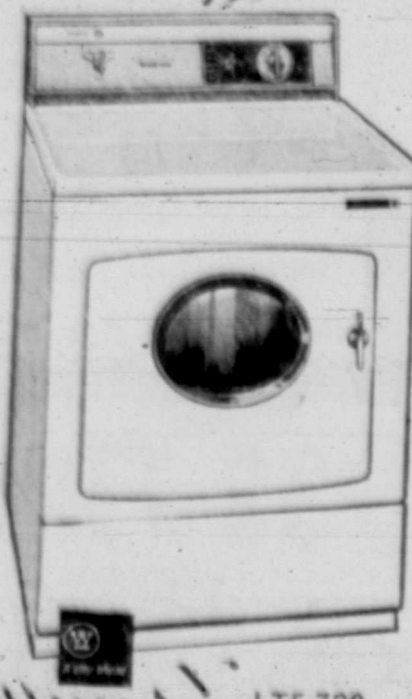
