## Board Hires 6, Slate Complete

Hart Independent School District is ready for school with the remaining openings filled at the regular school board meeting Thursday night. Four new teachers, a teacher's aide and a school nurse were employed.

Latest personnel to be hired includes Mrs. Mary Bechtol as school nurse; Mrs. Jan Hagler, home economics teacher; Vance Bradford, fifth and sixth grade math; Mrs. Dennis Humphreys, first grade teacher; Dennis Humphreys, science and math in junior high and Mrs. Dianne Gleghorn, physical education teacher's aide for elementary school.

Tax rate for the 1971-72 school year was set at \$1.90 per \$100 valuation, the present rate. The board of equalization, upon recommendation of the school, also lowered the valuation of cattle for the coming school year.

Board members also voted to include the sixth grade in the band program for the 1971-72 school year. Band books for junior high and high school were adopted.

Summer recreation program for students in Hart schools will be ending Friday, July 22.

Boys and girls from the first grade through high school are invited to participate in the remaining opportunities.

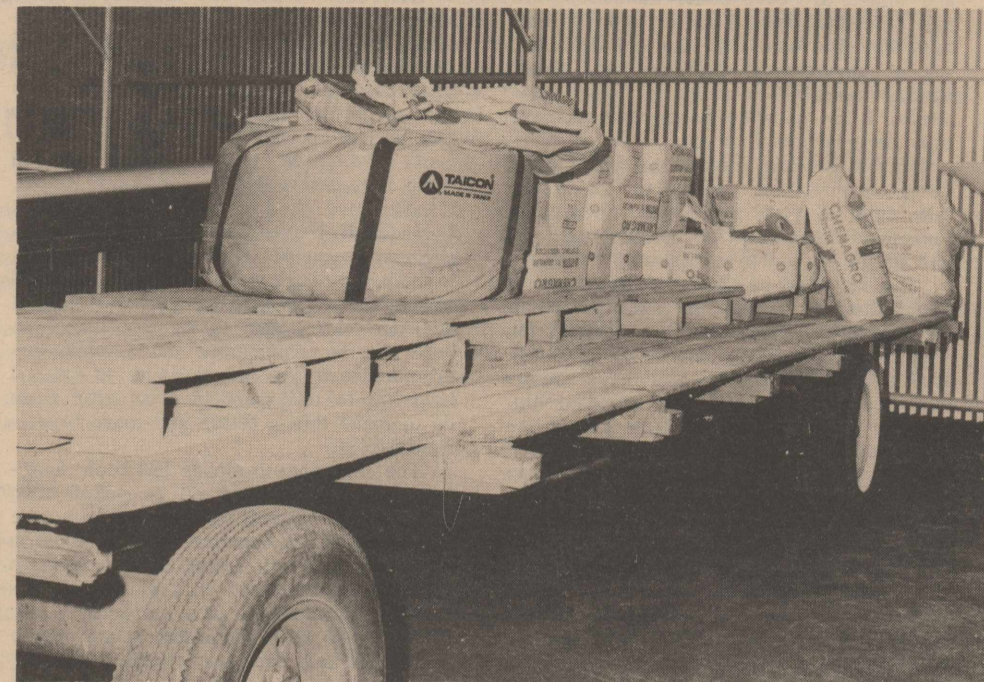
## Funeral Services Held For Hubert Glen Maples

## Texans May Be Fined \$200 For Leaving Keys In Car

Texans will be observing some new "rules of the road" come Aug. 29 -- or facing the prospect of sizeable fines for non-compliance.

The 1971 legislature passed a number of new rules designed to put Texas in line with the Federal Uniform Vehicle Code, a step required for continued Federal Highway Construction Aid.

"Don't help a good boy go bad" was the oft-used slogan

used to urge drivers to remove ignition keys when they leave their cars.

No longer a request but rather a rule, drivers can be fined up to \$200 for leaving the ignition keys in an unattended car.

Another action of the 1971 legislature, aimed at making driving safer, adds tire inspection to the present inspection requirements. Cars may not receive a safety inspection sticker if any tire has broken fabric or lacks at least one-sixteenth of an inch of tread at two distant points.

Yet another inspection requirement added to become effective Aug. 29 is one requiring the investigating policeman to remove the inspection sticker from any vehicle damaged in an accident to the degree that it would apparently need repair before passing state inspection. Owners would receive a dated receipt for the sticker and would have to get the vehicle reinspected within 30 days.

Drivers who attempt to get away from a police car are committing a misdemeanor under the new legislation and may be charged with a maximum penalty of six months in jail

## Firm Hit Hard By Burglary

Investigations are being made into the pre-dawn burglary of Hart Aerial Sprayers Wednesday morning.

Three to four thousand pounds of granular Di-Syston, valued at some \$6000, were taken in the burglary. Entry to the firm was made by prying open the hanger door. Apparently a pickup was backed into the hanger and the sacks of Di-Syston unloaded from the trailer on which they were stored.

The theft is believed to have occurred after 1 a. m. Deryl Clevenger, who lives nearby, told Deputy Granville Martin that he had been awake until 1

o'clock and had heard no disturbance at the firm.

Other thefts have also been reported in the Hart area. Hubert McLain estimated that some \$200 worth of tools were taken from a tool box in his pickup. The theft occurred while the pickup was parked at the McLain home.

J. C. Miller also had tools stolen but the extent of his loss was not known at press time.

## Library Board Discusses Needs

Castro County Library Board met July 7 in a business meeting attended by Jack Miller, chairman; Mrs. Ray Riley, Mrs. E. R. Little and Miss Hazel Merritt. Mrs. Mary Edna Hendrix, librarian, also attended.

Board members discussed possible means for raising funds to secure a library site and the need for one or more open meetings whereby all citizens might hear reports of consultants on recommendation of general areas for a proposed site.

Mrs. Hendrix explained that 218 persons who had not used the library before it was moved to its present location are now using its services. That fact, the Board believes, supports the library consultants view that a site is needed near the main business district.

## Pesticides Create Danger

Words of caution are already being issued concerning corn and other vegetables which may have been sprayed and will therefore be unsafe for human - or animal - consumption.

Most corn patches have been sprayed with Di-syston or Thimet and both pesticides render the food and fodder unsafe for a period of 40 days which will extend past the mature stage.

Vegetable patches near milo fields may also be affected by the settling sprays.

West Texas hospitality has long included a custom of "help yourself to a mess of corn, etc." but that practice is now dangerous. Persons are cautioned to "know" the corn or garden patch they raid.

Hill climbing increased appetites for the hot dogs, chips and drinks.

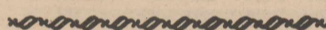
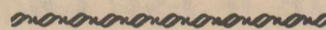

Wanda, a talented homemaker, is a working mother being employed at Hart of the Plains Gin. She still finds time to do many attractive items for her home in the craft line and to sew for the public. Her family favorite recipes are shared today.

## MEXICAN CORNBREAD

1 c. corn meal  
1 can cream style corn  
3/4 c. milk  
1 can chile peppers  
1/2 tsp. soda  
1/3 c. shortening  
2 eggs  
1/2 c. cheddar cheese  
1 can spam

Mix all ingredients except cheese, peppers and spam. Grease pan, put layer of corn meal mixture, then cheese, then peppers, and then spam. Put rest of corn meal mixture on top. Bake at 400 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes.

## APRICOT POUND CAKE

1 box yellow cake mix  
1/2 c. oil  
4 eggs  
1 c. apricot nectar

Mix well. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes in a tube pan. Glaze while hot with 2 teaspoons butter, 1 1/2 cup powdered sugar, 1/2 c. apricot nectar.

## SPECIAL K COOKIES

Boil 1 cup white Karo syrup, 1 cup sugar, for one minute. Add

1 tsp. vanilla before pouring over the following ingredients:  
4 c. Special K Cereal  
1 c. crunchy peanut butter  
1 1/2 c. coconut

Mix and drop on waxed paper and let set.

## JELLO PINEAPPLE SALAD

Bring to boil:  
1 # 2 can crushed pineapple  
1/2 c. sugar  
2 T. lemon juice

Dissolve 1 package lime Jello in above mixture. Cool. Add:  
1 c. grated cheese  
1 c. chopped nuts  
1 c. whipped cream

## BROWNIES

1/3 c. shortening  
1/3 c. butter  
2 sqs. unsweetened chocolate  
1 c. sugar  
2 eggs  
3/4 c. flour  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. baking powder  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1/2 c. nuts

Melt shortening and chocolate, gradually add sugar to egg, mix well. Beat until grains disappear. Add rest of ingredients, bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

## Financial Facts

What was the earliest form of coins?  
Approximately 700 B.C. the earliest form of struck

coins was a bean-shaped piece of metal of gold or silver punched on one side with a number of squares. No die cutting was necessary. As designs became more elaborate the art of striking coins developed engraved dies that punched designs on both sides.

The obverse of a coin bears the most important design. The die for this side was usually an engraving of royal portrait. Since these early coins were so thick they were usually struck while they were still hot. Today coins are struck cold.

However, not all coins were made by striking. The Roman republic of the fourth century B.C. poured molten bronze into a mold. This method was un-

satisfactory in that sharp detail was impossible to reproduce.

Coins were struck by hand in England until 1561, when the first cutting machinery drawn by horses was introduced.

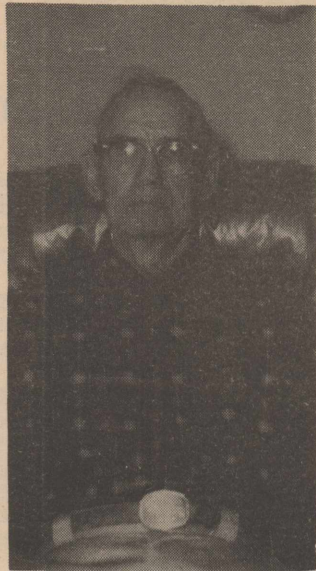

## Melon, Cucumber Stands Improved With Rotary Hoe

Timely use of a rotary hoe can improve a poor stand of melons or cucumbers by giving partially buried plants a new breath of life.

This practice can also save the cost of replanting, points out Dr. Roland Roberts, area vegetable specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Some replanting is now underway because recent rains, hail storms and blowing sand have partially covered some plantings and have also caused crusting of the soil. This operation may be unnecessary in some cases, contends the specialist.

Roberts cites a situation in Hale County where a stand of cucumbers was about one plant per five feet of row and other plants were partially buried. Emerged seedlings were still in the cotyledon (first leaf)

stage. A rotary hoe set to penetrate about one-half inch of soil was used, exposing at least one formerly buried plant per foot of row. Only an occasional plant was damaged by the rotary hoe.

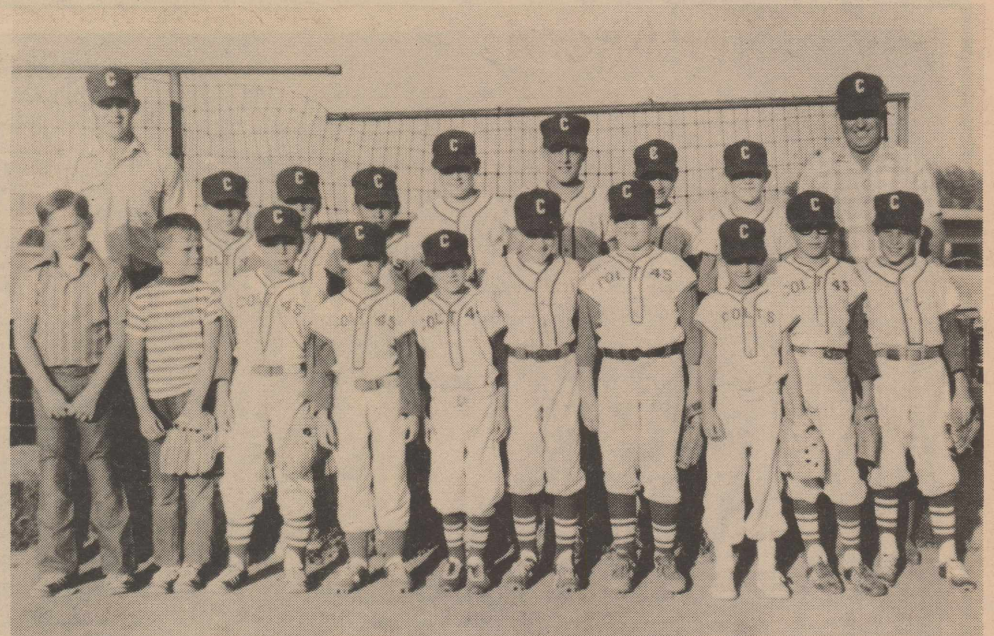

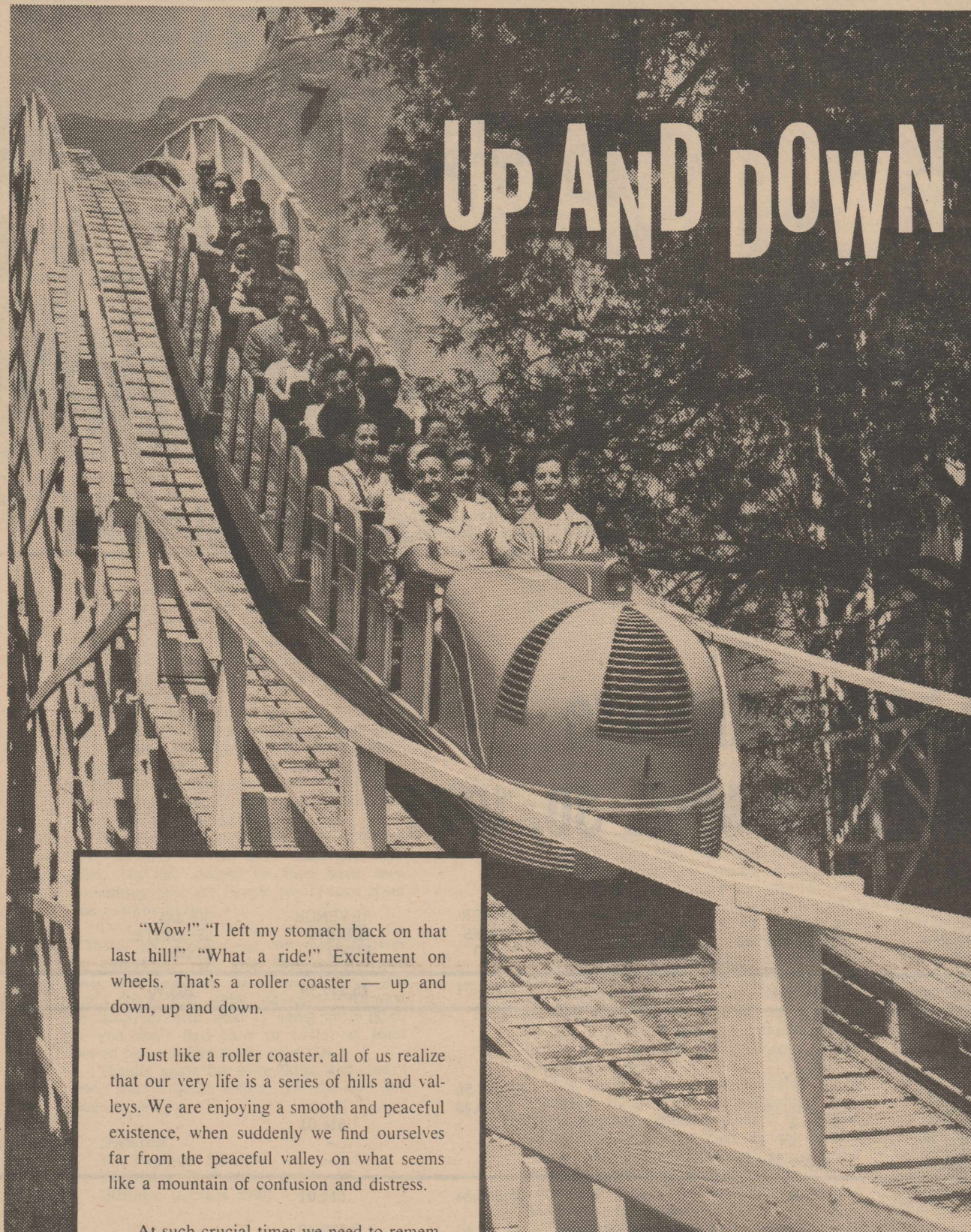

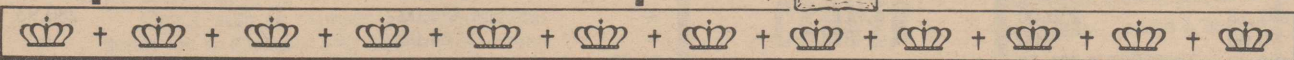
