Federation of Labor Against The Selection

William Green, President of Federation, Wants Member of His Organization Chosen for Post, He Announces

President Replies

Hoover Says Principles of Open and Equal Opportunity and Freedom in Appointments Must Be Maintained

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—(P)—William N. Doak, McLean, Va., who has been opposed by the American Federation of Labor, today was named secretary of labor by President Hoover.

Doak is legislative representative of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, which is not affiliated with the federation. William Green, federation president, has announced he thought a federation member should be named to the post which James J. Davis will quit next Monday. President Hoover replied to Green in making the appointment.

Maintains Freedom
I have the highest respect for Mr. Green and the American Federation of Labor," Mr. Hoover said, "but Mr. Green's announcement that appointments must come from one organization in fact imposes upon me the duty to maintain the principle of open and equal opportunity and freedom in appointments to public offices."

Doak was suggested as secretary of labor when Mr. Hoover formed his cabinet two years ago but the federation was against the brotherhood representative, William B. Wilson, the first labor secretary, was a federation member, as was Davis and the federation took the attitude that those had set a precedent. The result of that controversy was the rejection of Davis but he was elected senator from Pennsylvania in November and a new labor secretary had to be found.

Must Be Confirmed
Doak will have to be confirmed by the senate but it was a question tonight whether the federation would continue active opposition to him. There has been no indication from any senate members that they were against Doak.

In naming Doak, the president said several score labor unions, including members of the labor federation, had endorsed the new cabinet member. He added he knew Doak would represent all labor while in office and that Green himself had said he had the highest personal regard for the new appointee.

REACHES AMARILLO

Ruth Nichols Ahead of Title Holder in Record Flight

AMARILLO, Nov. 28. (P)—Four hours ahead of the title holder, Ruth Nichols, society aviatrix attempting to lower the women's transcontinental flight record, held by Mrs. Keith Miller, landed here today to spend the night.

She said she would take off tomorrow on the last leg of her New York to Los Angeles flight. She brought her "New Cincinnati" plane down here when she encountered unfavorable flying conditions.

Miss Nichols flew from Wichita, Kan., in two hours and eight minutes. She reported her elapsed time from New York to Amarillo as 11 hours and one minute.

No Motive Is Discovered in Death of Four

Members of Family Stabbed to Death by Unknown Slayer; Lack of Evidence Hinders Investigation

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Nov. 28. (P)—The bodies of the four members of a family stabbed by an unknown slayer, were found in their Dutchess county farm house at Stanfordville, near here today.

Police found their investigation blocked by lack of a motive and material evidence. They merely could assume that James Husted Germond, member of the Grange and of the Stanfordville village church, his wife, daughter and son, had been killed in the early evening of Wednesday. The bodies remained undiscovered until today when a creamery employee found Germond and his ten year old son, Raymond, dead in a wagon house with the doors closed to conceal the bodies from the view of chance visitors. In the house he discovered the body of Mrs. Gregory Germond, facing down, near the kitchen door, leading to the farm yard.

Behind a table and in a corner to which she was apparently pursued by the slayer was the body of the daughter, Bernice, 18 years old. Each of the four had been stabbed through the heart with a knife, which, judging from the wound, had a blade about one inch broad.

Friends of the family said to their knowledge the Germonds had no enemies.

Death Claims Mrs. Bradley At Home Here

Resident of Lubbock Since 1908 Succumbs to Extended Illness Friday; Services to Be Conducted Today

Mrs. Hal P. Bradley, 42, a resident of Lubbock since 1908 and widely known here, died at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon at the family residence, 1006 Avenue M, following a long illness.

Seven weeks ago Mrs. Bradley's condition became serious. She had been ill since May. Death was attributed to cancer.

Held Funeral Today

Funeral services will be held at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon at the home. Rev. C. A. Bickley, presiding elder of the Lubbock Methodist Episcopal district, will officiate, assisted by Rev. J. O. Haymes, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church. Mrs. Bradley was a member of the First church.

Burial will be in Lubbock cemetery under direction of Bynum-Morgan funeral home.

The widower is manager of municipal airport here. He was associated with his father, J. M. Bradley, for many years in the Bradley Motor company. Mr. Bradley's father died January 2, 1930.

Husband Survives

Survivors of Mrs. Bradley include the widower; two sons, M. C. Bradley, 21, and Samuel D. Bradley, 17, both of Lubbock; two daughters, Maxine Bradley, 18, and Marie Bradley, 15, also of Lubbock, and a sister, Mrs. C. E. Vaughn, of Sentinel, Ariz.

All of the family were at Mrs. Bradley's bedside when death came to relieve suffering which had become more intense during the last hours of life.

To Award Lubbock Highway Contract

Contracts for grading and drainage of 17.7 miles of state highway No. 7 in Lubbock county at a cost of \$23,000 will be included in highway improvement contracts which will be let by the state highway commission at its combined November-December meeting at Austin today and Monday, according to an Associated Press dispatch.

Thirty-one contracts will be awarded for the improvement of a total of 272.2 miles of state highways at an estimated cost of \$2,326,000.

Use of local labor whenever possible has been specified in the contracts in an effort to relieve unemployment conditions as much as possible. Most of the work is of type which demands much manual labor. Few machines are used on grading and drainage structures.

Contracts will be let for 294.1 miles of grading and drainage at an estimated cost of \$1,708,000, and for 42.7 miles of paving and surface treatment at an aggregate cost of \$628,000. Contracts also will be awarded for four bridges at a cost of \$60,000.

America Made Land Of The Freeze On Friday

AMERICA yesterday was the land of the freeze.

From her snow-laden head in the chilly northwest to the tips of her usually warm toes in Florida, the nation shivered. Temperatures, save in the far west, generally were sub-freezing. In parts of the northwest they went below zero.

Two score deaths were attributed to the holiday cold, and half of them were in the middle west. New England reported 11 deaths, Ohio had seven, and there was one each in New York state and Maryland.

The New England cold with a low reading of eight above at Northfield Vt., swung down out of Canada, laying a slick coat of ice and snow on highways. This resulted in many collisions and motor car accidents for most of New England's death. Even colder weather was predicted for today.

The promise of warmer weather tomorrow was held out for middle America. The moderation, however, was expected to be accompanied in parts of the great lakes territory by more snow to add to the transportation hazards which already have made themselves felt.

The lowest temperature report to the weather bureau yesterday was 12 below in Duluth, Minn. Several points in North Dakota, Wisconsin, and upper Michigan also had below zero readings.

Although Miami said the Everglades escaped the severe cold, frost was reported early yesterday as far south as Bradenton. The damage to crops, however, was believed to have been slight.

The warmest readings yesterday were on the west and gulf coasts.

Goes On Trial

(P)—Less than three hours after Mrs. Pearl O'Loughlin, above, went on trial charged with the murder of Leona O'Loughlin, her 10-year-old stepdaughter, preliminary examination of the case was completed and testimony was expected to start tomorrow. Several weeks ago the child's body was found floating in City Park lake. Mrs. O'Loughlin, wife of Leo O'Loughlin, a city detective, and father of the child, was arrested several days later.

To Send World Court Problem Before Senate

Hoover to Go Against Advice of Own Party Leaders and Submit Protocol for American Adherence to Court

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28. (P)—Against the advice of his own party leaders, President Hoover today announced he would send to protocol for American adherence to the World court to the approaching session of the senate for ratification.

Mr. Hoover, urged, however, senate leaders reach some agreement for consideration of this controversial issue lest it add to probabilities of an extra session of the new congress in the spring which the administration wants to avoid.

But such an agreement was not in sight tonight. Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee who is personally opposed to American entry into the court announced he would put it before the committee promptly. This would bring the issue before the short session. The committee may sidetrack it but a demand to discharge the committee would be in order.

Senator Swanson, of Virginia, the ranking Democrat on the foreign relations committee, an advocate of the court, endorsed the President's move and suggested an agreement to take it up in the session of the senate which meets a year hence. But Senator Walsh of Montana, the assistant Democratic leader, urged that it be taken up now or in a special session.

Senator Watson, of Indiana, the Republican leader, who strongly advised against injecting the World court issue into this session at a conference earlier in the day with the president, was fearful tonight the controversy would lead to an extra session.

There were indications Mr. Hoover and his party chieftain in the senate had quarreled sharply over the president's determination.

Garner Voices Opposition to Extra Session

House Minority Leader Says Continuation of One Per Cent Income Tax Reduction Unlikely; No Boost Seen

Compromise Seen

Texas Representative States Democrats Will Cooperate with Hoover on All Sound Measures to Aid Country

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Representative Garner of Texas, the house minority leader, said tonight he was opposed to an extra session of congress unless absolutely necessary and predicted there would be no continuation of the one per cent income tax reduction.

Returning to the capital from his home Garner predicted there would be no increase in taxes at the coming session. He added he felt the government could operate on the same amount of revenue as was collected in 1929 before the one per cent reduction became effective.

Demos To Cooperate
Garner said the Democrats would cooperate with the president and the administration on all sound measures of benefit to the country, but would continue to oppose legislation for special interests.

Discussing organization of the house in the seventy-second congress, the Texas said that with twelve months intervening before the next regular session, there was sufficient time in which to consider the matter.

Garner predicted that if the compromise measure proposed to the senate and house, Muscle Shoals conference by Senator Norris of Nebraska were submitted to a vote in the house it would be approved.

To Confer on Rail Project

John Donnelly of Washington Law Firm to Arrive in Lubbock Monday to Meet with T. P., C. C. Committees

John C. Donnelly, of the law firm, Oliver & Donnelly, of Washington, D. C., will arrive here early Monday to confer with the Texas & Pacific railway committee of the chamber of commerce and leaders from other communities interested in the T. & P. proposal to build a 332-mile line in West Texas.

The Washington firm has been retained as counsel for the Interstate Commerce commission hearing which will be held here December 8 on the Texas & Pacific Northern railway's application.

Representatives of all towns on the proposed line will assemble here Tuesday for a final conference with Donnelly before opening of the hearing.

Fred N. Oliver, other member of the law firm, will arrive in Lubbock the latter part of next week.

G. O. Bateman, counsel for the Texas & Pacific, also will meet with the T. & P. committee of the chamber of commerce here Monday.

A contract for the T. & P. to enter Lubbock will be submitted by Mr. Bateman and after details of the agreement have been settled it will be submitted to the directors of the chamber and to a general meeting of interested citizens for their approval.

Aviatrix Missing

Aviatrix Lost In High Winds And Rough Sea

Fear Felt for Safety of Mrs. J. M. Keith-Miller, Flier from Australia, on Flight from Havana to Miami

HAVANA, Nov. 28.—Reports of a high wind and a rough sea tonight caused Pan-American Airways and Curtiss airport officials to fear for the safety of Mrs. J. M. Keith-Miller, Australian flier who left this morning for Miami and was hours overdue late this afternoon.

Two planes, one a tri-motored transport ship and the other a single-engine amphibian, left this afternoon for a search of the water ways, equipped with life crafts and emergency kits, but the roughness of the seas caused doubts that Mrs. Keith-Miller's plane could survive long had it landed on the gulf.

Raft On Plane

She carried a raft when she left this morning, but expressed doubt she would be able to use it in case of a landing on the water, since it was a rubber affair and would have to be pumped up. Her little two-place cabin machine was not equipped either with radio or with instruments for flying blind.

Mrs. Keith-Miller took off this morning in the face of unfavorable weather despite warnings by veteran fliers, but she already had waited in Havana three days and was eager to return to Pittsburgh. She was advised to go yesterday and follow in the wake of a Pan-American passenger plane flying the regular course, but refused because she preferred to start early of a morning and thus avoid an overnight stop in Miami.

Another thing that caused concern was the fact before the take-off Mrs. Miller admitted she was worried and "nervous" for the "hazard" in case she were forced down at sea. Her worry was because she had no instruments for blind flying, radio or bank dial, and was uncertain of her ability to use the rubber raft.

Hefner Denies He Killed Crabtree

PAMPA, Nov. 28. (P)—Carl Hefner, on trial here charged with murder in connection with the slaying of Homer Crabtree November 5, denied on the witness stand this afternoon that he had anything to do with the slaying of Crabtree.

The defendant asserted that Emmett Thompson, jointly indicted with Hefner for the killing, struck Crabtree with an iron rod. He said he was 250 yards away at the time and that Crabtree and Thompson were struggling for possession of Thompson's gun.

Arguments were set to begin in the morning. Both defense and the state rested this afternoon. Judge W. R. Ewing began preparation of his charge, to include a paragraph as to a suspended sentence.

Poison Box Found

Financial Troubles and Illness Blamed for Action in Farewell Letter to Friend; Suicide Verdict Returned

SAN ANGELO, Nov. 28.—Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Brown formerly of El Paso and Ada, Okla., were found dead in a hotel here tonight. A box of deadly poison was found on a table near by. A verdict of suicide was returned in both cases by Justice of the Peace B. E. Gray. They had come here from El Paso a month ago.

A letter to an intimate friend here gave instructions for the disposition of their personal belongings and indicated careful planning of the pact. Brown formerly was a well-to-do hardware merchant of Ada but explained in his letter that he "had no money to leave."

Both were in ill health, the letter said, and "had no chance to recover." He was about 53 and his wife about 40.

Searchers Fail To Find Body of Girl

PORT MORGAN, Colo., Nov. 28. (P)—Hundreds of searchers today failed to find the body of Miss Enid Marriott, 28, Wiggins, Colo., school teacher in an ice-incrusted irrigation ditch where officers believed the young woman's body was placed by abductors.

A nail file, suitcase, pencil, a button and a string of beads, all identified as property of the teacher, were found in the ditch a few miles east of here today.

The file, identified as Miss Marriott's by one of her pupils, was found on a ledge beneath the bridge crossing the ditch on the Port Morgan-Creeley highway. The suitcase, a combination affair that served also as a hatbox, was battered.

LAMESA, Nov. 28. (P)—Deputy Sheriff A. N. Bennett today interested himself in the search for Enid Marriott, missing school teacher of Port Morgan, Colo., and wired the sheriff's office there to ask if a reward had been posted for information leading to her whereabouts.

Bennett said he had a clue which might lead to solving the mystery but refused to discuss it, claiming publicity would jeopardize his search.

He was advised that a reward of \$100 had been offered.

The Woman's Angle

"The teacher is the most important individual in the community in the conservation of vision," according to a statement that was made recently by Dr. B. Franklin Royer, medical director of the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

He says that the teacher appreciates the child's needs and that he may largely determine whether or not the child's needs can be met. He thinks, too, that the teacher has an influence with parents of children in getting necessities for the latter.

We are reminded, too, of the influence of teachers in many other ways. Most children will adore a teacher if he gives them a chance. Children are primitive and like to do the things that their elders do and teachers can so easily be heroes to be followed.

We hear a lot about the unconscious influence that we exert and have been told many times that we must make our behavior follow certain lines because we do not know who is watching us.

Most of us feel that we can't be anything but of influence, if we are not teaching youngsters or working directly with them, and yet there are few of us who do not have some child for a favorite, who may be using us as a model for manners, for behavior and for thought.

We can't know the extent of our influence for good or bad and the best we can hope for is to live a worthwhile life; to do the things which we want others to do and the things which we will be proud to have others adopt after they have seen us do them.

THE NEW SCARF
VELVET scarves are newer than any colored scarves for evening wear. The brilliant colors, ruby, emerald, turquoise are prime favorites for wear with white dresses. Heads of fur at the ends of the scarf furnish weight to keep it from slipping out of place and add to its decorative value, according to a note from Paris.

ON BATHING
RECENTLY, I read the eleven rules for bathing that some man had published. In it he gave advice on temperature of water, the length of time to spend in the bath and other rules. The advice sounds very well, but like so many other things, a lot of us would have some difficulty in following it.

There is the little matter of time. If one has little else to do, there is nothing like a prolonged bath. But so few of us have the nothing else to do.

As a manager, I probably need some help from some efficiency experts because I never get through with one day's work before it is time to start on another. If I go places in the evening, I can't spend long in a bath or I will be late. If I stay at home, there is always so much reading to do that I can't waste all evening taking a bath.

I'm not alone. Virtually everyone I know is always rushing some place, working against time week after week and never catching up. People in the old South don't hurry this way, we are always reminded, and I know they don't hurry as we do about things, yet their lives are apparently just as full as ours.

The time that experts suggest for the bath serves only as a reminder to me of the time one is supposed to spend on other things—the quest for beauty, reading the classics and current literature and doing a thousand and one things which are obviously worthy of some of our attention.

FOR THE SCRAP

NOW that we are down to the turkey's chassis, here is a recipe which uses the bits that can be scraped from the bones. It is turkey au gratin and is as follows:

Two tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 cup milk, 1 cup turkey in small pieces, 1/2 cup diced celery, 1-1/2 cup coarse buttered crumbs.

Melt butter, stir in flour and cook and stir over fire until bubbly. Add celery and cook, covered, over a low fire for five minutes. Slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Bring to the boiling point and let boil five minutes, stirring to prevent sticking and burning. Add turkey, salt and pepper, and turn into a buttered baking dish. Cover with buttered crumbs and bake in a hot oven until crumbs are brown.

Some few years ago, I realized the importance of the choice of the right jewelry to set off a dress, and from that time I sought the collaboration of a jeweler. Such sets, I think, are epitomes of discreet luxury and refinement. This is the only possible way at any rate, in which a number of pieces of jewelry can be worn with effect.

A neck adornment is usually the most important piece of jewelry. Often earrings and bracelet complete a harmonious set of costume jewelry. Again, it is a happier solution to use a lovely belt buckle and forgo others of the pieces.

Of the necklaces, the collar necklace, made of rows of gems set in flexible links of platinum are the perfect adornment for certain necklines. They are especially youthful. Against the dull surface of a black crepe evening gown, for instance, a collar necklace of rubies is perfect, with a gem set in a radiogram. Such a necklace is a small diamond dotting the chain. A bracelet of the same stones, and pendant earrings set in rubies, add their glamorous touch.

A new and altogether pleasing use of emeralds comes in a red chiffon evening dress that uses emeralds as its contrasting adornment. There is a handsome long necklace and a bracelet set in baguette diamonds and emeralds.

The woman who possesses such a precious set of jewelry can well dress in one, two or even three pieces. According to the style of the gown she is wearing and the function she is to attend.

Rubies and emeralds are enjoying an ever-increasing vogue for these sumptuous sets, composed of necklace, earrings, bracelet, pin and ring. But let a woman first study very closely her coloring and personality before making her final decision. If she chooses wisely, she can exercise her good taste and achieve the most original combinations with her gowns and jewels.

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The Unfortunate

THE poor ye always have with you" was a plain statement of fact two thousand years ago. It was also a prophecy. The poor we still have with us and shall have whatever our social, economic or political systems and however limited poverty may come to be.

There will always be some who, by reason of long sickness, untimely infirmity, some sudden and overwhelming disaster, infidelity of others, youthful improvidence or failure in the world of human endeavor, find themselves in need and must be helped by neighbors, friends or the public.

Longfellow in his account of the simple life of the seafaring does, to be sure, describe an idyllic state where the "richest were the poor and the poor lived in abundance," but even to those folk among whom there were no neediest or even needy there came a time when

Friendless, homeless, hopeless they wandered from city to city;

—and many despairing, heart-broken

Asked of earth, but a grave and no longer a friend

or a fireside.

So it is always, even in the midst of plenty and of prosperity however extensive. There are ever those in extreme need—"friendless, homeless, hopeless."

And this is the season when the fortunate give a thought to the plight of the unfortunate. Lubbock, at Christmas, has never forgotten its poor and will not forget them this year. Here Christmas cheer is limited to no class or station in life.

MULTIPLYING WEALTH

Before 1930 abdications in favor of 1931 life insurance in force in the United States will have reached the staggering volume of \$100,000,000, according to a survey just prepared. This vast total is eloquent of American forethought for old age and dependence. It also shows that our prosperity is not being entirely consumed in the enjoyment of the so-called material things.

Fifteen years ago the total amount of life insurance in force in the United States was \$20,500,000, which then appeared to be a tremendous total. Within sixteen years, if present estimates hold, the people will have multiplied their investment in this direction five times.

But this is not the only direction in which the American people are showing their thrift, providence and prosperity.

Savings deposits have risen this year to the staggering total of \$28,400,000,000. The increase over 1927 was \$2,900,000,000 which bankers say is the greatest gain in savings in any twelve months on record.

The fact that savings deposits increased this year in forty-five of the forty-eight states indicates the most widespread prosperity since the depression of 1920. And the three states showing a decrease may have merely switched their savings into other investments, making it appear on the surface that they had less money to save, whereas they may have had more.

A nation whose savings have increased 1933 per cent in sixteen years and 113.5 per cent in ten years has little to fear economically.

Practical Health Problems

ABSORPTION OF FAT REDUCED BY DIGESTIVE

In the intestines, digestion goes on to modify the food so that it will be absorbed and used by the body for growth and repair. Proteins are broken up into their constituents, the sugars are rapidly absorbed in the form in which they are taken into the body, starch is modified into sugars, and fats are changed by the action of the bile.

In the presence of digestive disturbance, the absorption of fat is likely to be greatly diminished. By an examination of the material excreted from the body, the physician is able to determine the extent of digestion and also whether or not there has been over-feeding, failure of absorption, or too much bacterial action.

The normal infant fed at the breast is likely to have actions of the bowels from two to four times a day. However, some infants have apparently only one action daily, whereas others may have six and still be in excellent health.

Obviously, the consistency and nature of the excretion depends on the type of feeding to a large extent. The infant that is fed on cow's milk usually has less action than one that is fed at the breast, but the material excreted is likely to be greater in amount and contain more solid material in such a case. In the presence of infection or excess nervous action, there may be much more activity of the bowels than in the normal case.

The expert can tell much from the color of the excretions. The amount of bile may cause a varying from yellow to brown or green, or even black, depending on the nature of the digestion and the type of food, and whether or not there is bleeding. It depends particularly on the amount of bile and what happens to the bile in the process of digestion. A small amount of mucus is not infrequent. The solid material, in the case of the infant, is usually curds containing soaps and calcium salt, whereas the presence of considerable amount of undigested starch may cause a slimy consistency.

Borah Is True To The GOP

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Senator William E. Borah's idea of a tactical regard for other folk's sensibilities is as peculiar as his ideas of party regularity, which is as peculiar as any political peculiarity in existence.

How the senator gets away with it is a mystery.

Nevertheless, he does: the White House, the "old guard" leaders, the whole Hamiltonian organization, all recognize him as an orthodox Republican in good standing. Yet his Republican heresies are enough to make a G. O. P. fundamentalist's flesh creep.

For example, during the recent campaign, while himself running, as a 100 per cent regular, for his fifth senatorial term, what did he do but:

1. Bow out the administration's farm policy for fair, and—

2. Lend every bit of aid in his power to re-elect Senator Thomas J. Walsh of Montana, a bitterly anti-Hoover Democrat, who, for awhile, was reported in some danger of defeat by Justice Albert Gallen, an enthusiastically pro-Hoover Republican.

If such conduct be orthodox, what should one do to win a rating among the heretics?

BE THAT as it may, having piled up his customary big majority out in Idaho, the Boise statesman started back for Washington, only to be waylaid in Chicago by a gang of reporters who wanted to hear what he thought of ex-Senator Jim Han Lewis' victory over Mrs. Ruth Hanna McCormick.

According to the newspapers, however, Bill begged to be excused from answering this question.

In the first place, he explained, "Mrs. McCormick is a very dear friend of mine." In the second place, "What I may say on the subject would be unpleasant reading for the administration."

Thus far, okay.

As to Mrs. McCormick, "Speak no ill of the politically dead," is a charitable motto certainly. As to the administration, the senator's delicacy was equally understandable—if he is Republicanly orthodox as he is supposed to be.

BUT HOW, then, account for the statement he issued 24 hours later—on arriving in Washington and learning full particulars of President Hoover's activities to avoid, if possible, an extra session of the national lawmaking body next spring?

"Cooked-up effort to stampede congress," was about the mildest expression the Idaho solon employed to describe the presidential negotiations.

"Superlative impudence," was nearer the average. Pleasant reading for the administration?

Putting two and two together, what he said in Chicago plus what he subsequently said in Washington, it is difficult to draw any conclusion other than that Senator Borah thinks it is.

Which rarely furnishes ground for the contention that his idea of tact is as peculiar as his idea of party regularity.

OF COURSE there is no news in the above recital of facts. It all has been chronicled before. I'm aware of that.

I have tried merely to assemble the facts in such fashion as to illustrate how careful the Idaho senator is not unnecessarily to harrow up his fellow politicians' feelings, and how reliable an "organization man" he is.

The extraordinary part of it is that no one disputes him.

When senators like "Uncle" George Norris, "Young Bob" La Follette, Lynn J. Frazier, Thomas D. Schall, William H. McMaster and W. B. Pine come up for re-election, the regulars fight them openly, charging that they are what Senator Pess calls "pseudo Republicans" and Senator Mores refers to as "sons of the wild jackass." Indeed, Senators McMaster and Pine were beaten in the last election on the G. O. P. theory that, even Democrats are preferable to Republicans of their unmanageability.

But Senator Borah's Republican genuineness never is questioned.

REAPPORTIONMENT

For a number of reasons there will be a fight over reapportionment of representation in the house of congress when it meets next month, amid great public interest in the several phases of that fight. Because much politics will be played, the outcome of the debate is still uncertain.

Control of congress in 1932 may be decided by the results of the reapportionment, and the next president may owe his election to the shifting of votes in the electoral college.

All of the states making large gains, except Texas, are Republican. Reapportionment is expected to give the Republican party a net gain of seven seats in congress and the Democratic party a net loss of nine seats. There lies the groundwork for a good old-fashioned fight between these historic enemies.

Drys are expected to strike a strategic blow by asking that the reapportionment be on a basis of native and naturalized citizens, excluding from the population for reapportionment purposes all aliens, who are most populous in the wet states. If for that, the wets will demand the exclusion in the dry states of the disfranchised negroes, which would reduce the representation of those states by half or more.

Probably the only certainty in the whole discussion is further delay for reapportionment which a meeting congress has already postponed 10 years in defiance of a constitutional mandate.

HELP THE POSTMAN

With the Christmas mail season at hand, the postman has a right to ask the co-operation of the public. Not only is the postman a faithful public servant, who though he may bring, bills, also brings checks, but co-operation with him, especially at Christmas time, is the sure way of getting service.

"Nothing seems more dismal than a Yuletide gift or greeting that comes even a day late. When this happens it is frequently the result of failure of the public to play the game,—to mail early, to address fully, to place parcels securely, to fail to give a return address, to forget to stamp and other omissions which slow up mail distribution.

It is an easy enough thing to help the postman. His is a tremendous job this time of year. Even with the public pulling with him, his task is mountainous. Co-operation with him is not only decent but wise. It helps deliver Christmas mail on time.

Law Precedent Is Drawn from Maple's Case

Execution of Houston Slayer Shows Attorney Unable to Sign Affidavit Testifying That Client Is Insane

AUSTIN, Nov. 28. (AP)—From the execution of Jess J. Maple, Houston slayer, a legal precedent was drawn today by a friend of the court of criminal appeals, for future guidance of Texas trial judges.

It was this: A condemned man's attorney may not personally sign an affidavit testifying his belief that his client is insane, requiring an insanity hearing on that affidavit.

The law provides that a sanity hearing must be held before a jury "any time after conviction" if the defendant's alleged insanity is brought to the attention of the trial court in an affidavit signed by a respectable person.

Signed Affidavit

F. O. Fuller, attorney for Maple, signed the last affidavit attesting Maple's insanity. The district judge refused to consider it. The criminal court, in refusing a writ of habeas corpus yesterday, upheld Judge Whit Boyd's action entirely ruling that a "respectable" person must be interested in the person, and ruling by inference that an attorney cannot be "disinterested."

The ruling provisions of the opinion yesterday, overlooked by Maple's attorneys when they filed a rehearing petition, were: "A respectable person is defined in the law books as synonymous with a 'credible, disinterested witness.' From the record it must be assumed that it had not been known to the trial court that Maple had become insane by the affidavit of a respectable person, as defined by the statute, and the judgment of the trial court, under such circumstances, refusing to conduct an insanity inquiry, is conclusive upon this court."

Judge O. S. Lattimore of the court of criminal appeals said today the court did not consider the application for a rehearing because under the law Maple's attorneys had no right to ask a rehearing upon any matter passed upon in chambers, as was the original application for habeas corpus.

\$1,000,000 Is Given College

Fund Left 50 Years Ago by Dr. William Curran for the Education of Females Is Awarded to Beaver College

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 28. (AP)—A \$1,000,000 fund left as a "foundation" for the education of females in or adjacent to Philadelphia by Dr. William Curran, who died 50 years ago, has been awarded to Beaver college, in Jenkintown, near here.

Two other institutions had filed applications for the award. Wilson college, Chambersburg, Pa., and the Philadelphia school for Christian workers.

Award Disclosed

Francis B. Biddle, auditor appointed by the orphan's court to take testimony, studied the facilities of the applying schools for months. The award to Beaver college was disclosed in his report to the court, made public today.

The money represents the accumulation of principal and income on \$50,000 which Dr. Curran left in trust when he died in 1880. The will stipulated that the fund should be used to establish a foundation for a college such as the testament described, when the annual income should amount to \$33,000.

Under terms of the foundation Beaver college must give \$5,000 to LaFayette college, and 6 per cent interest on this gift from February 2, 1928, to the date of the award. Mr. Biddle recommended that the award be made conditional to Beaver college demanding its charter and by laws to eliminate its present status as a stock corporation.

Call Surprise Witnesses in Soviet Trials

Most Feared Prosecutor in All Soviet Russia Takes an Unexpected Move in the Trial of Eight Men

MOSCOW, Nov. 28. (AP)—N. B. Krilenko, the most feared prosecutor in all Soviet Russia, today called unexpected witnesses in the dramatic trial of eight men charged with plotting to overthrow the Soviet government.

He was not expected to do this. Thousands of communists who have been listening to this trial over the radio thought that when the last of the defendants confessed and repeated yesterday, the four judges would move immediately to pass sentence.

But Krilenko, who has slashed his way through trials like this before, required the presence of several notable soviet figures to bring out more incriminating facts against the accused and the "industrial party" through which they are alleged to have plotted with foreign "capitalist" powers.

He called P. S. Osadchii, a member of the central executive committee and vice-president of the state planning commission; L. N. Urotsky, former member of the finance committee, and several other past and present government officials.

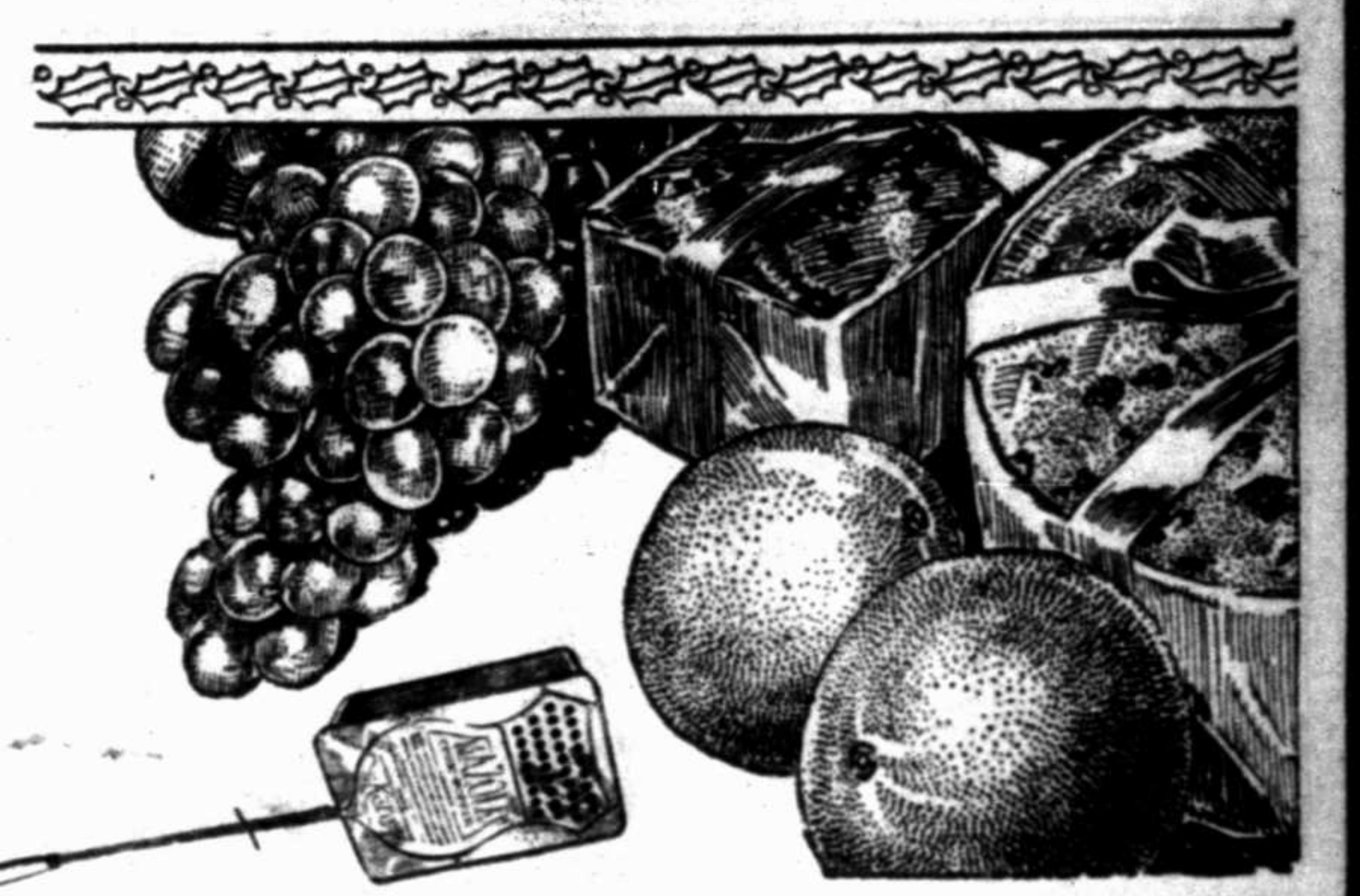
The message stipulated that the city would take action to halt the nuisance if there was not sufficient cooperation to eliminate the practice.

Baylor and S. M. U. Favored to Win Today; Will Be in Tie for Second Place; Rivalry Peps Games

The distinction, such as it is, of finishing second in the 1930 grid scramble will be at stake in the two contests scheduled, with three teams in the running. Both Southern Methodist and Texas Christian, who clash in their thirteenth annual duel here, will be gunning for runner-up honors, and the Baylor Bears can assure themselves no worse than a tie for second by defeating the Rice Owls at Waco.

Red Hot Rivalry to Prevail Although Texas' decisive victory removed any last, lingering hopes entertained by the most colorful gridder in the state, the Baylor Bears and Mustangs assure plenty of fireworks in the game here, while the young Rice eleven figures to give the veteran Baylor Bears a hard skirmish at Waco.

Close Season Today With the exception of Rice's post-season engagement with Iowa State next week at Houston, tomorrow's contests will close the conference books. The Longhorns and Aggies already have turned in their work clothes, as have also the Arkansas Razorbacks, who closed an unsuccessful season in losing to the Centenary Gentlemen, 7 to 0, Thursday. The porkers won only three out of nine games played, but two of those were within the conference.

One of the southwest's outstanding athletes will close his football career in the game here. Cy Leland, recognized as the fastest back in the country, will don the mole skins for the last time to quarterback the Christian eleven against the Mustangs. While Cy has not done as well as last season, when his deeds of valor played a big part in winning the championship for T. C. U., he still is a colorful gridder. Other members of the Frogs eleven who will call it quits after tomorrow are Robinson, end; Griffith, fullback; Butler, guard; Cox, tackle and Eury, guard.

Several Ponies Quit Several valuable cogs in the Mustang team that takes the field tomorrow will be absent next fall. They include Louis Long, great end; Ira Hopper, fullback; Malcolm Powell, center; Bill Skeeters, tackle; Butler, tackle and Tarrance, guard. Beaten out of last year's title when they were held to a 7-7 tie by the Horned Frogs, these Pony veterans hope to finish with a victory over their old rivals.

Graduation Wrecks Baylor The struggle at Waco will see the last of the present Baylor machine. Graduation will wreck it, taking the entire backfield and most of the line. Captain Bochey Koch, Wilson, Paradeaux, Witche, Morris, Kathart, McElreath, Lewter and Furl are among the regulars who will leave Baylor after the game. The Rice squad, on the other hand, will be back almost intact. Captain Bill Morgan, guard, and McGeeble, center, are the only serious losses.

Methodist, Baptist Favored Southern Methodist and Baylor will be the favored duo in the grand finale. The Mustangs have gone great guns in their last two bouts, crushing Navy and Rice with comparative ease, while the Christians have suffered disastrous losses to Texas and Baylor. The Baylor eleven looked like a world-beater in trouncing the Christians, 35 to 14, a week ago. If both Southern Methodist and Baylor win, they will tie for second place. Texas Christian's only hope for the position lies in its ability to lick the Mustangs while Rice stops Baylor.

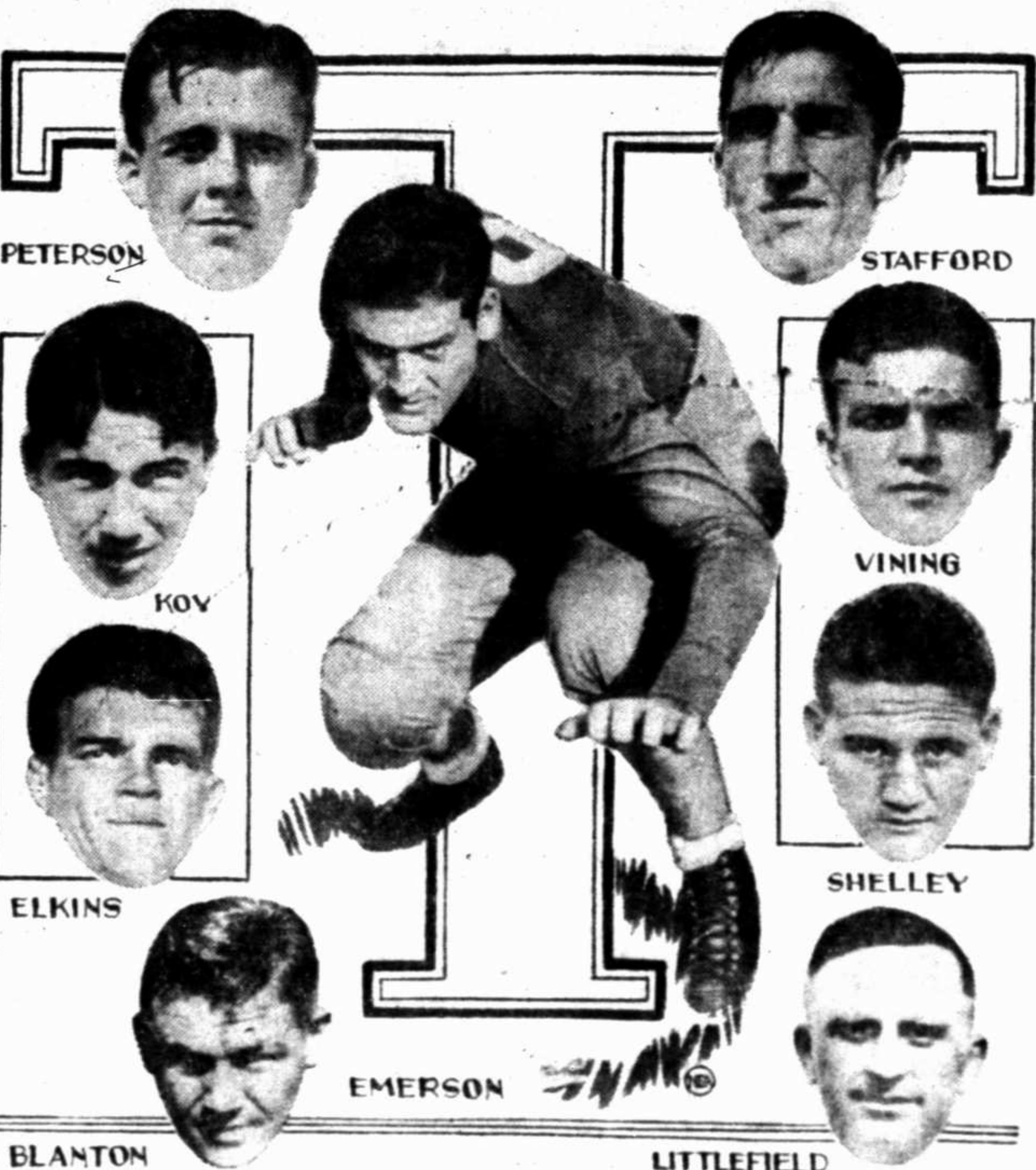
INVESTIGATE DEATH

Notre Dame's Rough Riders Gallop To Soldier Field To Joust Against Army; Both Teams Undefeated Today

By PAUL MICKELSON (Associated Press Sports Writer) CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—The rough riders from Notre Dame riding the tide of seventeen straight conquests, tomorrow will attempt to tame the unbroke Army mule before perhaps the largest assemblage to witness a football game in America.

One hundred and twenty-five thousand spectators—2,000 more than the record crowd established at the Notre Dame-University of Southern California game a year ago—were expected to crowd into Chicago's gigantic Lake Front stadium, Soldier Field, to witness the battle between the two undefeated teams.

Seventeenth Meeting It will be the seventeenth gridiron battle in 18 years between the two rivals, but more than football tradition will be behind it. The victor will remain in the waning struggle for mythical championship honors for 1930; the lower will experience the first blot of the campaign on its record and join the ranks of the defeated.

As the zero hour for the struggles approached, both teams anxiously studied the weather man's bulletins, the Army hoping for almost any kind of weather except a perfect football day and Notre Dame hoping for at least a hard field.

May Have Snowfall The last prediction of the day, however, promised a day about 30 degrees above zero and at least a light snowfall. If the prediction is correct, the teams will fight it out on a muddy field as the turf for the past two days has been frozen with the near zero weather. Such a playing condition would favor the heavy Army line and the heavy, ploughing cadet backs and handicap the fast charging Notre Dame ball carriers on whose speed Coach Knute Rockne depends.

From past performances and the type of opponents the two teams have met so far this season, Notre Dame rightfully ranked as the favorite.

Both teams went through spirited, final workouts today. Down at South Bend, Rockne drilled his squad indoors on signals, blocking, passing and kicking. All the regulars reported they were in good physical condition again and ready to go. The Cadets went through a secret drill on Soldier Field, brushing up on the games fundamentals.

Part Of Carcass Of Huge Lizard-Like Creature Found In Glacier Island Ice

CORDOVA, Alaska, Nov. 28 (AP)—Part of the carcass of the lizard-like creature found in the ice of Glacier Island, near here November 10, was preserved in Cordova today for scientific examination.

A description of the creature, believed by residents to have lived in prehistoric times and to have been preserved in the glacier for thousands of years, was given by W. J. McDonald, superintendent Chugach National forest, who headed an investigating party and returned with the portion of the carcass.

McDonald said only about six feet of flesh remained on the skeleton, which measured 24 feet 1 inch long. He said it had a snout similar to the beak of a pelican, with a head shaped much like that of an elephant.

The vertebrae immediately behind the head, said McDonald, were interlocked with flippers on each side. The vertebrae, he asserted, were

three-bladed and the flippers were made up of five "fingers." Each "finger" had three joints or possibly more. No teeth were found.

Weight of the skeleton was estimated by McDonald at 1,000 pounds. The length of the snout was given as 20 inches from its bend to the middle of the forehead. It was 11 inches wide at the midsection and 29 inches in circumference. The bone marrow in the snout was three inches in diameter.

The over-all length of the head was reported as 55 inches. From the back of the head to the end of the ribs the creature measured 74 inches. The length of the top blade of the vertebrae was reported to be 14 inches and the side blade 12 inches. McDonald said there also was a perpendicular blade.

First reports said the creature had been fur-covered. Investigators did not mention whether this was the case. Photographs of the creature were taken and sent to the United States.

Nation Turns To Big Bouts On Gridirons

Outstanding Teams of United States Tangle in Closing Games of Season Today; Cold Weather May Feature

BY ALAN GOULD (Associated Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—A rough and rugged brace of tackles, John J. Blizard and Herman H. Zero, have decided to participate in the finishing flourish of the college football season. They may be the "weekend" factors, doing as much damage as the opposition in the few big games to be played in the frigid zone tomorrow.

Notre Dame and Army, the headline engagement of the day at Soldier Field, Chicago, have had enough experience with handling frozen footballs on icy surfaces to make the best of conditions along the lake front. They battled last year at the Yankee Stadium in a temperature of 15 degrees above zero, the Irish romping off to a one touchdown victory over Jack Elder, 88-yard gallop with an intercepted pass.

Notre Dame Army in Light The Notre Dame-Army affair, annually one of the most colorful games on the gridiron list, shares the intersectional spotlight Saturday with two widely separated tilts. The new champions of the Pacific Coast, Washington State, have come across country to play Villanova at Philadelphia, while the east has commissioned Dartmouth to seek some sectional revenge against Stanford's Indians at Palo Alto, Calif.

Other Intersectionals Other intersectional games involve Iowa State and Loyola at New Orleans, Temple and Drake at Philadelphia, Georgetown and DePaul at Detroit, in addition to which the old standbys, such as hard annuals as Holy Cross-Boston college at Fenway Park Boston, and Southern Methodist-Texas Christian at Dallas.

The east has two chances to break the spell of far western team supremacy, sustained pretty decisively for the past few years by Stanford, Oregon State, California, and St. Mary's, but there is not much more than an outside chance of anything being done about it tomorrow.

Dartmouth, unbeaten and tied only by Yale, figures to have a better chance against Stanford than Villanova against Washington State's Cougars.

Interest in S. W. Conference University of Texas has clinched the southwest conference title but there are two arguments to be decided, nevertheless. Baylor plays Rice at Waco in addition to the Southern Methodist-Texas Christian fray. The only Southern Conference game brings Vanderbilt and Maryland together at Nashville.

The only eastern eleven to receive more than one bid to the Invitational game were Pennsylvania and Pittsburgh with two invitations each. They lost these games to the west.

Bears Ready For Rice Owls Today

WACO, Nov. 28.—An array of gridiron stars, as any one who has seen the Bear colors in the past waited early tonight for their game against Rice Institute, here tomorrow.

That the University of Texas won the conference pennant did not cool the spirit of the Jemina men, as shown by the way in which they went through a peppy practice period this afternoon under a heavy sky which threatened rain.

Jake Wilson, Baylor's great back, Bochey Koch, guard and Captain; Albert Lewter, plugging fullback; Charles Morris, Kirt Kathart; Ralph Winton, Dutch Furl, Earnest McElreath, Louis Paradeaux, and S. L. Witche will be led by graduation, and with the exception of Furl, who is suffering an injury will be in the game tomorrow.

Head coach, Jack McGehee of Rice, said tonight he would have a "fighting eleven" against the Bears.

SINGSING PLANNED

Alabama Plays In Tournament Of the Roses

Crimson Tide to Journey to Pasadena for Grid Classic with Washington State on New Year's Day

(By The Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Nov. 28.—Alabama's Crimson Tide established itself today as one of the most popular football aggregations east of the Rockies when for the third time in a half dozen years it was invited west for the annual Tournament of Roses gridiron classic at Pasadena.

Telegraphic wires relayed the invitation and acceptance, and the contract was drawn by the Washington State college athletic officials.

The undefeated co-champions of the Southern Conference will come for the sixteenth renewal of inter-sectional football New Year's Day here.

It was the fourth time in the last six years a team from the south has been selected. Alabama defeated the University of Washington in 1926, 20 to 19, and returned the next season to tie with Stanford, seven all. Georgia Tech answered the call in 1929 defeating California, 8 to 7.

Washington State's Cougars are unbeaten and champions of the Pacific Coast conference, but they still have a game tomorrow with Villanova at Philadelphia.

It was Washington State which inaugurated the annual classic in 1915 by defeating Brown, 14-0. Since then the west has held the upper hand in games won, with a deciding advantage over eastern teams. The invasion from the south has been a different story.

Only two other institutions have been honored with the tournament selection three times. These were western representatives, Stanford and California. Neither team was able to win more than once.

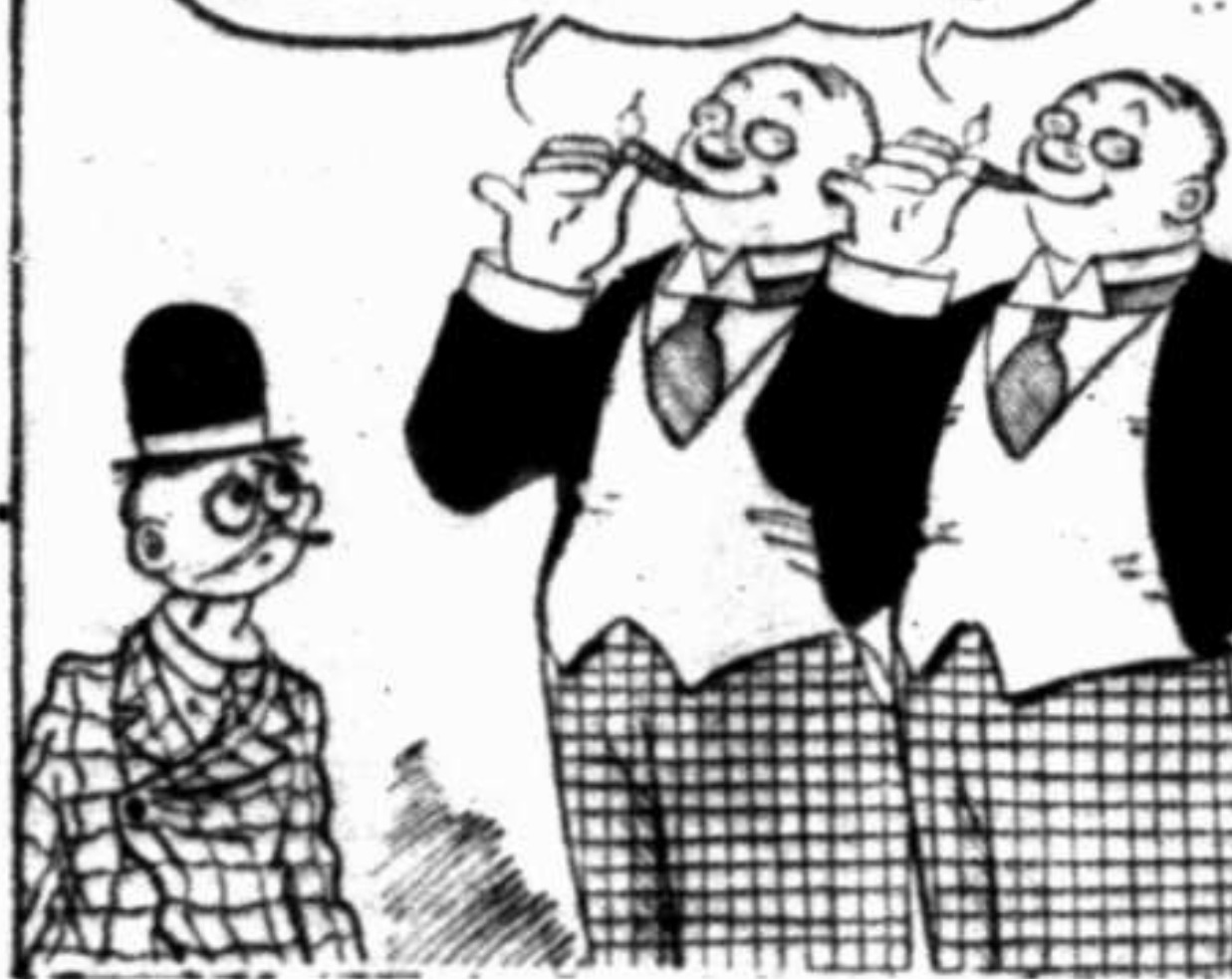

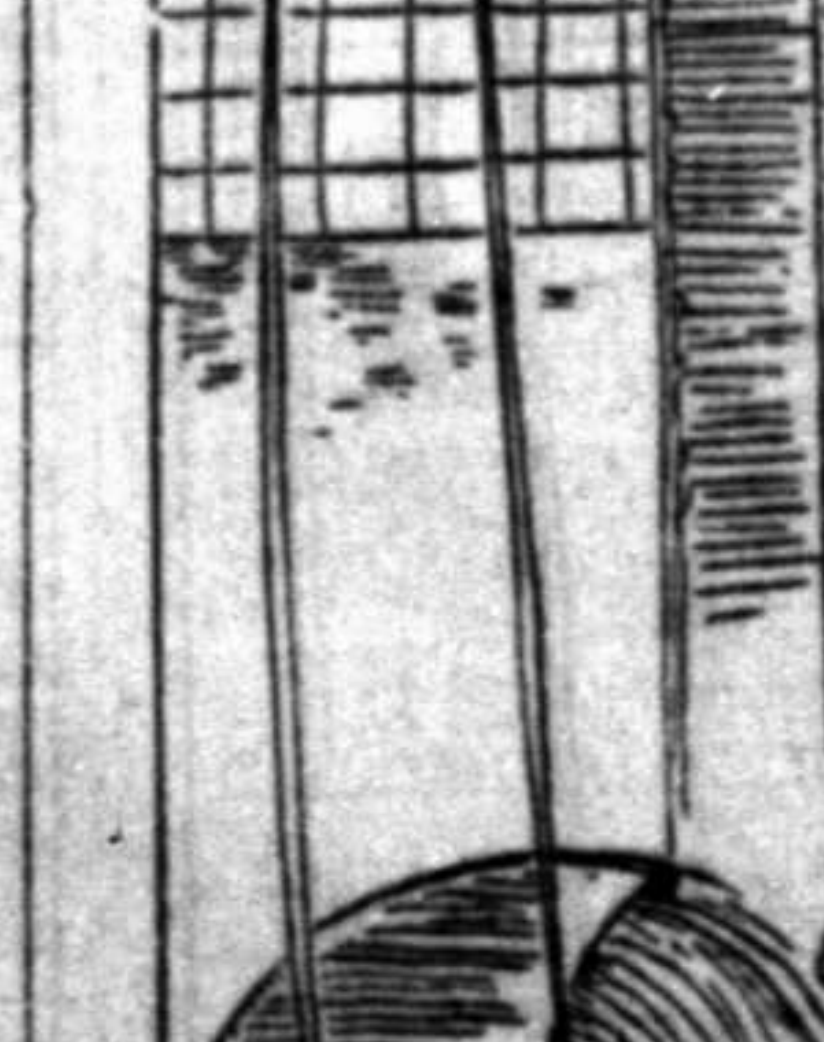

Solons Voice Positions on Controversies

Members Engaged in Consolidating Views on Troublesome Issues Facing Session of Congress in December

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28. (AP)—With the assembling day for congress almost here, members today were engaged in consolidating their position on troublesome issues.

Three prominent house members, active on as many points of conflict, gave out word calculated to gather support for their efforts.

Voices Cooperation
 The assistant Democratic leader, Representative McDuffie of Alabama, sought to reconcile dissatisfied members of his party to the cooperative position assumed right after election by seven outstanding Democrats.

The house-senate deadlock over private versus government operation of Muscle Shoals drew from Representative Reece, Republican, Tennessee, proponent of the first policy, an announcement he was preparing a compromise offer.

Representative Beck, Republican, Pennsylvania, issued a call to members from the industrial states to resist any effort to eliminate alien populations from the census count used in reapportioning the house.

Interested in Welfare
 McDuffie contended there was no suggestion of an "inclination to shirk duty" nor any hint of apology for Democratic victory in the pledge against legislative obstructionism, which former presidential candidates and active officers of the party had issued. He asserted, however, that "in this time of nationwide distress and trying conditions, of course the leadership of the Democratic party is more interested in the national welfare than in seeking party advantage."

Reece, chief house conferee on the Muscle Shoals question, said by modification of the house bill he hoped to obtain agreement. But without disclosing specific changes, Beck, anti-prohibitionist, specifically attacked the move of the Methodist Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals for elimination of aliens from the reapportionment count as an effort to retain dry strength in the representation from Agricultural states.

Disposition Seen
 Reduction of the growing power of industrial states; would bring about "further dissipation of public funds by socialistic measures." "When the faratical dry, lobbied the Eighteenth amendment into the constitution," he continued, "they destroyed the fundamental basis of our government, namely, a local self government. Now they propose to reapportion political power among the states, contrary to the express mandate of the constitution. It is lamentable that a representative body of citizens, in their effort to support the crumbling edifice of prohibition should be willing to destroy another basic principle of our form of government."

TO REDUCE SALARIES
 ROME, Nov. 28. (AP)—The chamber of deputies today decided to reduce the salaries of members by 12 per cent effective January 1, in accordance with the recently announced reduction of all government salaries.

OPENS MEETING
 WACO, Nov. 28. (AP)—The Texas academy of science opened a two-day meeting here today. Papers read before the meeting dealt with a variety of technical subjects, ranging from hydrogen rays in spectrum to an analysis of the Woodbine sands of east Texas. Prof. Clyde T. Reed, retiring president read a paper tonight on "the great quest or crucial problems of modern science."

BANK RAIDED
 MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 28. (AP)—A band of robbers raided the Layton Park State bank this afternoon obtaining about \$25,000 in currency, according to reports to police.

TO INSPECT HOSPITAL

AUSTIN, Nov. 28. (AP)—Inspection of the state hospital at Galveston, with a view of expanding facilities for the care of crippled children, will be made tomorrow by Adrian Pool, recently appointed to the board of control.

Advance Muscle Shoals Solution

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28. (AP)—A new path into the Muscle Shoals controversy has been blazed by Representative Reece of Tennessee, and he will attempt to lead the senate and house conferees to an agreement at the forthcoming meeting of the conference committee.

The Republican who has led in the arguments for private operation today made known that he had decided on certain modifications to the house bill which he would submit to the conferees.

The house bill for private operation was deadlocked in conference when the members of the two houses sought to reconcile it with the Norris plan for government operation.

Reece did not make known the specific terms of his contemplated alterations but maintained his stand against government operation. "It is important," Reece said, "that the conference committee make every effort at this session to adjust the disagreement between the senate and house on Muscle Shoals in a manner that will accomplish legislation."

TRIBUTE PAID MARKHAM

CHICAGO, Nov. 28. (AP)—Chiefs of commerce and industry paused today to pay tribute to Charles H. Markham, late chairman of the board of the Illinois central system at his funeral services in holy name cathedral. Private burial followed.

ON CASH BASIS
