THE JUNIOR CHAUTAUQUA

Fun for our boys and girls is promised by the program Mr. W. Calloway has just received from the White & Myers Chautauqua System. In addition to enjoying the big Chautauqua, the young people are to have a Junior Chautauqua with a program all their own and a tent of their own, which boys set up while the girls over-see the job.

For five days before the big Chautauqua begins, the young women in charge of advance work will be bringing the boys and girls to a regular khaki affair, with poles and with a canvas fence and it precisely like the one the tent has, only not so high. Very early in the evening, perhaps, it will be set up. Every boy and every girl will be invited. A notice stating the exact time will be printed in this paper. Then, until the big Chautauqua begins and even during the big Chautauqua, this smaller tent will be used by the Junior Chautauqua. The Juniors will need Chautauqua hats for admission to the Junior Chautauqua and to the big tent.

From the day the Junior tent goes up, there will be a program in it at 4 every afternoon. When the big tent has opened, there will be a program every morning at the big tent, as well as other entertainments in the big tent in the afternoon and evening.

One of the very interesting features of our Chautauqua this season will be the special course for boys and girls in musical appreciation. The director in charge of our Chautauqua will carry a Victrola and a full set of playing records, and the boys and girls will be able to enjoy music by a very effective method that is coming into vogue. Many of the musical numbers which are to be given later on the regular Chautauqua program will be played before the Juniors. Thus the Juniors will be familiar with them, because they have learned to understand the music and to know the various instruments used, get great deal more benefit and enjoyment than they otherwise could. It is not an experiment. It is simply adapting to children a method by which audiences in the large auditoriums are prepared for hearing symphony concerts and grand operas.

These learning-to-enjoy music lessons with the Victrola will be given every afternoon for several days before the regular Chautauqua opens, as well as throughout the Chautauqua and all the boys and girls are invited to get their season tickets now and be ready for the first program learning to enjoy music.

Moreover, the Victrola will be used in playing most of the games. As you know, the games will be, the social boys and girls' edition of the Chautauqua program, with pictures, and that it will soon reach the youngsters. However, this can be told now. Great care is being taken to avoid the amusement that wear children out. Parents will not have cross boys and girls on their hands, or tired boys and girls, or nervous boys and girls. Let's plan for big times for the children from the day the Junior tent arrives.

Get all the data possible as to exact cost, future requirement of city, and last but not least just what it will cost the taxpayer on every dollar of valuation. We believe the time is getting close at hand when Perryton will require a sewer system, at least it will harm no one to give the matter a thorough investigation.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MET MONDAY NIGHT

The time is near when the numerous candidates for the various county, district and state offices will know more about their fates at the hands of the voters. All of the candidates for the county offices have been busy during the past week. One hears very few prophecies on the outcome of the various races in this county. Sheriff Talley has opposition for re-election in the person of Contractor Clyde Cofer, County Clerk David D. Shanks, present County Judge J. M. Grigsby is opposed by J. M. Bull while A. C. Nies aspires to office of Tax Assessor to which Assessor J. W. Wright is seeking re-election. In the commissioners race the only contest is in the northwest precinct in which L. H. Lance and J. W. AUGUST FREDERICK STARK

This entire community was shocked to hear of the sudden death of August Frederick Stark which occurred on Sunday afternoon. Mr. Stark was born at Kiel, Germany on September 29, 1869 and at the time of his death was 52 years, 9 months and 19 days of age. At the age of sixteen he came to America, settling at Stockton, California, where he made his home until he moved to Ochiltree County in 1913. Death was caused by blood poisoning which resulted from a small scratch on the end of the index finger of the left hand which he obtained while working with a combine. COUNTY COMMISSIONERS SHOULD PUBLISH REPORTS

The Wheeler county board of county commissioners published in the Wheeler News-Review and the Texan at Shamrock last week an annual exhibit of the county's finances showing each voucher written during the year, to whom paid and the amount. No man in Wheeler county need guess about where the county money goes to for the published report tells him. County commissioners make a mistake when they try to keep the official business of the county out of the papers, because it costs a few dollars to publish them. Each session of the commissioners court should be published, giving a brief statement of the business transacted, the money paid out and to whom. Other states do this. The cost to the county is small; the publicity given cannot be computed in dollars and cents. It is a service to the people of the county that they want.—Canadian Record.

MRS. C. C. RIFENBERG INJURED IN AUTO SPILL

It seems as though Perryton citizens are getting more than their share of auto accidents here of late. Word was received the fore part of this week by C. C. Rifenberg that his wife and daughter, Mrs. E. H. Caley and grand-daughter, Miss Aileen Clay, were all injured in a spill near Oxford, Nebraska. The party were enroute from Colorado, where they had been for the summer, to Glenwood, Iowa. From the report received by Mr. Rifenberg, it seems that the accident was caused by a head on collision in which the Rifenberg car was overturned and pretty badly wrecked. Mrs. Rifenberg was the most seriously injured, she receiving several severe cuts. The party abandoned the car and proceeded on their way via the rail route.

A VALUABLE BOOK ON HORTICULTURE

"The lack of rational methods in the cultivation of trees, whether for fruit or other purposes, is especially in Texas farming, even though great proficiency has been attained through the accumulated experience of several generations in the care and cultivation of certain staple crops, such as cotton and corn. The beauty of the trees is a feature of great importance, not only from a sentimental point of view, but also from the actual enhancement in value, which it gives to the whole farm; yet the appreciation of the home-like comfort and hospitable appearance, which a little judicious planting will give to a farmstead, is frequently ignored by the rural population of our State. Considering the obvious advantages of fruit on the farm, it is amazing that the cultivation of any kind of fruits is so little practiced in our State that a great many farmers, and even whole communities, know neither the advantages of the enjoyment of fruit, nor the disadvantages of the lack of it; nor is it certain that the interest in fruit culture in Texas is on the increase."

With these pungent observations concerning a well-known shortcoming in Texas farming, Professor Helge Ness, Chief of the Division of Horticulture, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, A. and M. College, has enlisted bulletin No. 293, entitled "Cultivation and Care of Trees on Texas Farms," which is now ready for free distribution to those requesting it.

For the past thirty-five years, Professor Ness has been making a thorough study of every phase of Texas horticulture on the Experimental grounds at College Station and at the outlying stations and on Texas farms, and there is doubtless no other scientist with such an intimate knowledge of the possibilities for profitable and successful arboriculture and fruit culture in Texas and certainly none is so familiar with the many besetting problems presented in certain soils not well adapted to fruits. He gives in his bulletin in condensed form complete instructions for the successful planting and care of trees and fruits in each of the varied regions of the State. The chapters on Propagation, Planting, and Pruning contain such exact and specific directions that the average farmer should have no difficulty in achieving reasonable success by simply following these terse instructions. Varieties found through research and long observation to be suitable, are noted and proper cultural treatment is prescribed for the various species. The outstanding forest trees, their value and adaptation to the several regions are discussed, as are the sundry ornamental trees; the causes of the decline in fruit culture in Texas; the present status of fruit culture on the Texas farm; cover crops for orchards; the situation of an orchard; woodlots for shelter, and planting of levees and river banks. In short, this is considered the completest and most valuable contribution to the horticultural needs of Texas farmers yet achieved by the Texas Experiment Station.

"POLLY OF THE CIRCUS"

"Polly of the Circus," the New York play that is coming to the Perryton Chautauqua starting Monday August 7th and closing Friday August 11, tells a charming story. Polly's mother, it appears, was the greatest circus rider in the world and Polly is now queen of the ring. An accident befalls, Polly is thrown from her horse and injured. They carry her to the house nearest the circus grounds. It happens to be the parsonage. And the preacher is single.

Because of the accident, Polly cannot leave with the circus, and great is the dismay of Toby, the clown, and Big Jim the boss canvas man, for they promised her mother that they would look after Polly as long as they lived. However, as time, tide and the circus wait for no man, they bow to the inevitables. With their consent, Polly stays at the parsonage in the care of Mandy the Negro servant.

There she gets her first glimpse of home life, and her first lessons in the Bible and becomes a regular attendant at the church. As her convalescence progresses, she makes the preacher's yard a playground for the children round about.

The preacher enjoys this immensely. But Deacon Strong objects and so does Miss Perkins. The Deacon has decidedly narrow views as to the amount of pleasure folks should have in this world. Life, he believes, should be very serious. When he sees Polly and the youngsters playing in the parsonage yard he immediately sets about having her sent away and the preacher returned to his serious thoughts.

But the preacher has caught a new vision from little Polly and the children playing in his yard—a vision that delights him. He sees what he has missed by giving all his time to study and grave pursuits.

Miss Perkins, whose devotion to the church has been quickened by her interest in the unmarried parson, is jealous when she finds Polly awakening him to the sweetness of life—a thing she herself has not been able to accomplish. She too, concludes that Polly should not be there.

The climax comes when the circus returns to that neighborhood and Deacon Strong sees a chance to take matters into his own hands

and force Polly to go away.

But the preacher has learned his lesson well. He can't say goodbye to Polly, for she has taught him that life, without losing any of its earnestness can at the same time be joyous. So he and little Polly are married, and all are happy except the Deacon and Miss Perkins.

It is a beautiful play. While it is only a play, and therefore allows itself to be more romantic and tender and thrilling than real life ordinarily is, it nevertheless rings true. You might call it a pretty fable. The moral is, never suppose that religion forbids joyousness, and if it seems preposterous that a circus rider should be a sweet and lovely girl then someone has a wrong idea of the circus. Those who know tell us that it's moral atmosphere is above reproach.

The part of Polly will be played by Miss Eileen Cosgroff of New York, who two seasons ago pleased so greatly as "Peg" of My Heart. Harry Huguenot and Joseph Laval-liere, the stars of last season's "Friendly Enemies" are members of the company which is said to be one of the best that ever played on the Chautauqua.

WHAT SHALL WE EAT?

This is season of the year when every
member of the family will enjoy an:

English Plum Pudding.—Soak one-half pound of stale bread crumbs in scalded milk, using one cupful. When cool add one-fourth of a pound of brown sugar, the well-beaten yolks of five eggs. Drudge lightly with flour, add one-half pound of raisins, one-fourth pound each of currants and candied cherries finely cut, two ounces of citron cut in thin shreds. Add one-half pound of sweet finely chopped and creamed, one-half of a grated nutmeg, one and one-half teaspoonfuls of nutmeg, the same of salt, one-third of a cupful of orange juice; mix well and fold in the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs. Turn into a buttered tube mold and steam six to eight hours. Serve with:

Lemon Sauce.—Mix carefully one tablespoonful of cornstarch and one cupful of fine granulated sugar, a little salt, and one cupful of boiling water, while beating constantly. Cook five to six minutes, add two table-
spoonfuls of lemon juice and a grating of the rind, two tablespoonfuls of butter and a generous grating of nutmeg.

Steamed Brown Betty.—Mix two cupfuls of brown bread crumbs with two cupfuls of chopped apple, add two-thirds of a cupful of brown sugar, one cupful of seeded raisins mixed with two tablespoonfuls of flour and one-half teaspoonful of salt; add one cupful of milk to which one beaten egg has been added and beat thoroughly. Steam in buttered molds two hours. Serve with lemon or vanilla sauce.

Angel Food Pudding.—Bake an angel food in a large sheet. When cool cut in rounds or oblongs, dip in melted fondant and cool until firm. Serve with any bright-colored sauce such as strawberry or raspberry sauce. This may be made of the crushed fresh fruit or canned juice, thickened after straining from the seeds.

LATE MOLTERS ARE GOOD LAYERS

How to judge the poultry flock to save the layers and dispose of the poor ones without resorting to the tedious process of trap-nesting, is a very live question just now. The Agricultural Experiment Station is constantly besieged with questions like these: Has hen with yellow beak and shanks laid many eggs? Is the late molting hen a good layer? How do the public bones in the layer differ from those of the poor layer?

The Station has, for some time, been studying the relation between body characters and the number of eggs the hen has laid. In a study using S. C. White Leghorns, it has been found that color of beak and color of shanks are two of the most accurate indicators of egg production. The fowls with the yellow beak and shanks in September and October, had been the poorer layers. Late molter were the better layers. Counts were made of the number of primary wing feathers molted on October 1st. Those hens molting afterward, being termed late molters, laid as many eggs from October 1st to February 1st, as did the early molter. It is thus seen that the late molters, having continued longer in production the previous season, were not later in beginning the succeeding season's production. This was not found universally true in the fowls observed, but in general the conclusion seems justified.

A thin pliable skin, free from fatty deposits, and pliable public bones were indicators of high production. The width of the pelvic arch capacity, depth of body, and length of keel were found to be much less accurate indicators of

egg production than the other characters mentioned.

The characters that showed the greatest correlation with egg production were those which were probably fairly uniform when the pullets began to lay, but showed changes and differences as the laying season progressed. For instance, in cases where many eggs were laid, the yellow pigment was used in the egg yolks, and the shanks and beak became pale; fat went to the egg yolk rather than to the body; lime that in poor layers would have gone to the bones was utilized in the production of egg shell, and feather growth, which requires large quantities of food, was retarded while the hens were laying heavily. It was interesting, therefore, to note that the hens under observation which actually laid more eggs were the ones in which the yellow pigment faded completely from the beak and shanks as the season progressed; their skin was thin, free from fat and pliable; the public bones were pliable, and the hens usually molted late.

The hens must have laid for a number of months or a season before good layers can, with much certainty, be selected. Therefore, to avoid carrying too many poor layers until their performance can be found wanting, the successful poultry raiser should first secure stock from fowls of known high production, because egg production is inherited. He should give them proper feed and care to allow them to lay eggs according to their breeding. He should then cull, as described above, those that for some reason have not responded to the care and attention given them.

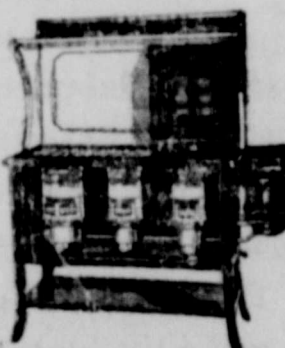

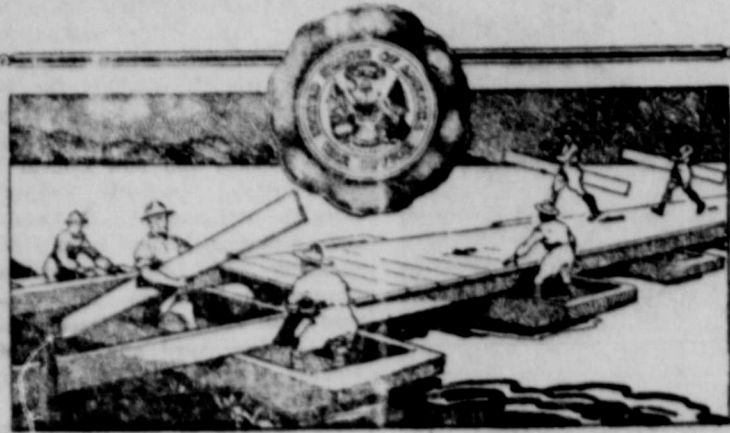

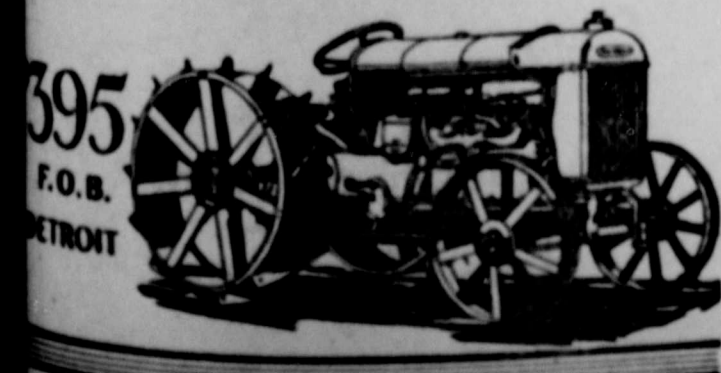
