Dawson County's Voting Strength Is Near 4,000

Big Rush For Poll Tax Receipts Monday Final Date

County Tax Assessor-Collector R. W. (Buster) Herndon, reports an unusually big demand for 1938 tax receipts following a check-up after the last-minute rush Monday of this week which was the final date to secure certificates.

A tabulation of qualified voters could not be determined completely as those over sixty are not required to secure certificates. Early reports showed an actual number of 3,551 paid receipts with those issued to young voters who will be 21 years of age or were before or on the election date. It was considered likely a few would come into the office by mail after the tabulation was made early Tuesday.

Estimates of 500 or more exemptions seemed to be a fair estimate by those familiar with the local political situation and is said to be about the largest number of any previous year in this county.

Mr. Herndon stated his office was opened shortly after 6 a. m. Monday and was closed a few minutes before midnight in order that tax payers could be accommodated and the Court House Hall was crowded with property owners standing in line for the majority of the day.

Dawson county's political pot is already beginning to boil and as the dead line for the campaign will draw near it is expected there will be several new office seekers, whose names will appear on the Democratic Primary on July 23. There is also a great deal of interest being shown in the state elections and farmers and stockmen will likely hear plenty regarding politics this election year, although a majority of the present office holders are serving a first term and are entitled to second year-periods.

BUSINESS MEN'S LUNCHEON CLUB WEEKLY SESSION

Judge W. M. Yates, president of the Business Men's Luncheon club, presided over their regular weekly session at the Plaza hotel Tuesday at noon when one of the most enthusiastic discussions of recent weeks was recorded. Mr. Yates complimented the club for their loyal support in putting over a number of civic projects this organization is sponsoring.

Superintendent of school V. Z. Rogers, was in charge of the program consisting mostly of achievement reports by the various committee chairmen. Mr. Rogers gave an account of the recent trip to Austin that was made by Carl Rountree, O. H. Morris, Sam Richardson and himself, who acted as a committee representing Dawson county in the interest of the proposed highway to Brownfield from this county seat. He stated the request was granted and plans are being formulated to grade and drain the thoroughfare as agreed by the Commissioner's Court.

Achievement reports on other projects sponsored by this organization included the Stanton highway paving project, at present underway, nine miles south of Lamesa, the project to harden the Sparenberg road south-east of town, beautification of the proposed State roadside park at the intersection of highways 9 and 15. The designated park site will be the largest in Texas and the committee reported success in securing sign agreements. Contracts for the latter two projects are expected to be let on February 21 according to Judge Yates.

Interscholastic League Cage Tournament Slated Here Feb. 12

The Boys Interscholastic League Basketball Elimination, held for the purpose of determining the county representative to the district tournament will be conducted in the Lamesa gymnasium during the week ending, February 12.

A meeting has been called at the county court room at 11:00 o'clock Saturday, February 5, for the purpose of determining the plans for the contests. Each coach who holds a registration certificate from the State Office, and who plans to compete for the championship is urged to attend the meeting.

It is expected that competition will be exceptionally keen and some close contests are expected. Key, Klondike, Union, Achary, Fairview and Lamesa are as possible favorites.

SERVICE STATION ROBBERIES HERE SUNDAY NIGHT

Members of the police department are seeking a clue into burglary Sunday night of Gus Ragsdale's Conoco Station and Grocery, located at 1011 North First Street, and also Jim Medlin's Gulf Station, four blocks east. Both places were entered Sunday night but nothing was discovered missing from the latter station.

Thieves made their escape with a loot amounting to about \$50 from Ragsdale's when cigarettes, eggs, butter, bacon and candy were listed stolen in merchandise and \$10 in currency was taken from the cash register.

Entrance to both buildings were gained through windows. In the first robbery several iron bars were sawed off to permit raising the window.

A member of the sheriff's department stated in his opinion the robberies were staged by amateurs, basing his theory on the nature of the articles taken. No arrests have been made in connection with the cases however.

LLOYD FOREMAN HURT SERIOUSLY AS RIFLE ACCIDENTALLY FALLS

Local Young Man Injured Seriously; Couple Hurt

Peewee Foreman, well-known in Lamesa, is in the local sanitarium at the end of South Austin where he was taken Tuesday afternoon in serious condition as the result of an accidental rifle wound. The slug entered his left breast just above the heart and ranged upward toward the shoulder.

Foreman, who was formerly employed at Bill's Cafe, on North First Street was at the Dorahoo Shooting Gallery when he accidentally dropped one of the gallery's rifles that was discharged according to his statement. He was alone in the place at the time and no one witnessed the tragedy.

After receiving emergency treatment a preliminary medical examination revealed the left arm is paralyzed. It could not be determined immediately whether the affliction will be permanent. The bullet had not been removed Thursday afternoon as it was located in a dangerous spot and attendants plan to wait a few days until his condition has improved.

Foreman resides at Mrs. Charles Houser's rooming house on North First Street. It is expected he will recover but will be confined to the hospital for several days.

Dawson Fuller and a local young lady whose name was not available, were treated for minor injuries at the Lovelless hospital Thursday night on South Second Street. Reports were to the effect the couple experienced an automobile accident on the Big Spring highway, south of town during the early part of the night.

BIRTHDAY AFFAIRS PROVE SUCCESS IN PARALYSIS FIGHT

Guy Weekes, general chairman for the President's Birthday celebration, here last Friday night, has received a telegram of praise for the splendid work on the part of the committee in preparing the birthday dances, which were staged in behalf of the National Foundation for use in combating infantile paralysis.

The communication from Washington was signed by Jesse H. Jones, chairman of the Texas Committee. Mr. Jones expressed congratulations for the achievement and generous patriotic support of this worthy cause.

Mrs. Weekes stated it was one of the most successful occasions ever held here and the entire proceeds will be sent to the Warm Springs Foundation. In the past seventy per cent of the net proceeds were retained locally to help fight paralysis, and there is on deposit now \$122.68.

Shows Big Increase Over Previous Years

R. S. Stanfield, cotton statistician for Dawson county, reports there were 106,324 bales of cotton ginned in this county from the crop of 1937 prior to January 16, as compared with 46,297 bales for the crop of 1936. The report was issued to the Courier through the Department of Commerce in Washington, and represents an actual count ginned in the county for that period.

Those familiar with the cotton crop report a conservative estimate is near 125,000 bales in view of the fact much of the yield was ginned in neighboring counties on the north, east and south when producers near the county line took some of their cotton to out-of-county gins. It is considered likely 6,000 bales produced around the O'Donnell area was taken into Lynn county. On the east much of the crop was taken into Scurry county and ginned at Snyder while on the south, Martin county ginned several hundred bales of the Dawson county output, according to estimates. On the other hand Dawson gained a few hundred bales from neighboring counties.

The local crop was harvested a little later than in eastern localities and the price was down some, but farmers realized a nice sum for their cotton ranging as high as ten cents in some instances.

TWO CANDIDATES ANNOUNCE FOR LOCAL OFFICES

Only two candidates made formal announcement of their candidacy for county offices during the past week as compared with six for the preceding seven-day period. Mrs. J. A. McMahan, a new candidate for the County Treasurer's office, and Sam B. Hodge, who is seeking re-election to the Commissioner's post of precinct 2, were the only two listed in the Courier's political announcement column.

HARDIN-SIMMONS COWBOY BAND HERE MONDAY

The Hardin-Simmons University Cowboy band, from Abilene, Texas, famed musical organization that is coming to Lamesa, on Monday night, February 7, for a program at 8 o'clock at the high school, is one of the best known and widely travelled collegiate bands in the nation today.

The Lamesa high school is sponsoring the program, and the proceeds of the concert will be devoted to school projects. Superintendent V. Z. Rogers said today. The public is invited to the colorful program offered by the band, and only a small admission price is asked.

"The Hardin-Simmons Cowboy band has covered almost 300,000 miles the past fifteen years," said Band Director

Conway King, who knows the organization well. "It has toured Europe, played for royalty, and has been in demand for conventions, concerts and exhibitions."

The H-S U. Cowboy band, playing under the baton of Marion B. McClure, its director, was the official band for the Texas Centennial and the Pan-American Exposition, at Dallas, in 1936 and 1937. It has been featured in Madison Square Garden, New York; Ziegfeld Theatre, and the London Palladium.

The late Will Rogers was its first honorary member and a benefactor, and the musicians returned from a tour of the Republic of Mexico last fall to play at the dedication of the Will Rogers Memorial Shrine at Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Its concert at Lamesa is being given to a major engagement at the World's Championship Rodeo at Phoenix, Arizona.

"Prodigal Parents," the 1938 book of Sinclair Lewis, is noteworthy not only because it is an interesting story but because it gives a clear picture of the growth of Sinclair Lewis himself. When one climbs a mountain the view seems to change because of the changing position of the climber and so it is with Sinclair Lewis. When he wrote Babbitt he presented the average man as the member of the great Middle Class as a ridiculous and immature person. In Prodigal Parents he presented Babbitt with the same reality, all his faults and virtues are apparent but Lewis' appreciation of him has increased until he sees his weaknesses in a different light. Also, he feels a concern for solid growth out of our national problems, based on experience rather than the enthusiasm of leaders of vague movements of youth.

Mrs. Wolff secured her A. M. degree from Columbia University in 1934. For some years she was dean of women at Friends University in Wichita, Kansas. As the wife of a geologist she has travelled widely in this country and abroad.

Tickets for the review of "Prodigal Parents" which Mrs. Wolff will give at the Country club for the benefit of the Girls Scouts will be on sale at all drug stores at a price of 50 cents each. Tea will be served and a reception will follow the review. The public is cordially invited to assist with this project.

Farmers Short Course To Be Held In Two Sections

College Station, Feb. 1.—The Farmers' Short Course will be held in two sections in 1938, one of the 4-H club members and one for adults, according to an announcement made by H. H. Williamson, director of the Extension Service.

The section for 4-H club boys and girls will meet on July 6, 7, 8, and the adult section on July 12, 13, 14, Williamson said.

Heretofore the club members and adults have always met as one group for the annual get-together on the campus of Texas A. and M. College. "The decision to hold the Short Course in two sections was prompted by our desire to permit more farm people to attend," Williamson said. "In recent years our accommodations have been so limited that we have been forced to restrict the attendance."

The attendance at the Short Course has been on the increase for a number of years. Some 5,000 people have been present at recent sessions. The college has been able to furnish rooms and meals for only 3,800 to 4,000. Around a thousand people, mostly from neighboring sections, have "commuted" daily between the college and their homes.

Williamson estimated that under the new arrangement accommodations could be provided for approximately 8,000 farm people and club members. With less demand on the time of teachers and lecturers, an increase in the quality of the program is also expected.

Texas Agricultural Scope Will Expand To Cover Entire State

College Station, Tex., Feb. 1.—The range conservation feature of the 1938 Agricultural Conservation program will be statewide in application instead of applying only to 173 counties in the western section of the state, as was the case in 1937. Geo. Slaughter, Wharton, chairman of the Texas Agricultural Conservation committee, has announced.

The announcement was made after word to that effect came to the committee in session at Texas A. and M. College, from I. W. Duggan, acting director of the Southern Region of the Triple A.

Participation in the range program is limited to those ranchmen who carry out practices set forth in the program in areas where these practices are approved as of value. Slaughter said. He indicated that the 1938 practices would probably be similar to those of 1937, which included construction of water reservoirs, spreader dams and spreader terraces, terraces and contour furrows.

ing and elimination of certain range destroying plants.

Ranchmen in some sections of the state such as the Gulf Coast prairies will probably find the provisions governing non-crop open pasture land under the farm part of the program more practical and attractive than the practices provided under the range feature," Slaughter pointed out.

"Owner of small acreages will probably not find it practical to enter the range program," he continued, "as the range allowance are relatively low and administrative expenses would use up most of the payments."

The range conservation feature has been one of the most popular and successful AAA programs. The Texas AAA office has received applications covering the participation of 18,306 ranches totaling more than 62 million acres, or over 75 per cent of all the range land in the 173 counties affected by the 1937 program.

Single Dish Meals

SINGLE-DISH MEALS

Single-dish meals are time-saving meals. It is well to remember that the amount of time spent in the preparation of a meal is not proportional to the food value received from that meal. One can spend hours in preparing a dinner including roast pork, fried chicken, sweet potatoes, Irish potatoes, hot biscuits, peas, beans, a very decorative salad, pie, cake and ice cream. This is a menu that was typical of not so many years ago. Even today for harvesters or for company the table fairly groans with the load which is placed upon it. Such a meal is not only poorly balanced but takes far too much of the homemaker's time in preparation. Here it is easily seen that the amount of time spent in preparing such a meal is not proportional to the food value received.

The advantage of serving one-dish meals are that they:

1. Save time.
2. Save labor—there are fewer dishes to wash.
3. Save fuel: This will depend somewhat on the type of fuel, but how about a single-dish meal on wash day?
4. Conserve flavor of foods.
5. Conserve vitamins and minerals.
6. Provide more care-free hours for the homemaker.

Left-overs can become "made-overs" and a most appetizing recipe for single-dish meals will result, however, one should be careful in combining foods because flavors in food clash just as much as do colors.

- The following suggestions may be of help in planning a single-dish meal:
1. White sauce, tomato sauce or meat stock makes a good base for many baked dishes.
 2. Use only one starchy food in each dish.
 3. Avoid too many strong flavors. Use one and blend the other flavor with it.
 4. See that the dish has interesting

color. Include peas, carrots or tomatoes or possibly green pepper or pimiento.

5. Crisp bacon, onion juice, chopped parsley, or herbs, always give individuality and zest.
6. Buttered crumbs add much to the attractiveness of a baked dish.
7. The "meal" should be of such a consistency that it can be eaten with a fork but moist enough to be palatable.

RECIPE — ROMAN HOLIDAY

1. Chipped onion.
- 1-4 Cup fat.
- 1 lb. ground meat.
- 2 C. Cooked spaghetti (cocked dried beans may be substituted.)
- 1 Tablespoon salt.
- 1-8 Tablespoon pepper.
- 1-2 Cups canned tomato.
- 3-4 cups grated cheese.
- Fry onion in fat. Add meat and seasonings and cook 5 minutes. Put a layer of spaghetti in a baking dish. Add meat-mixture and its drippings; the add another layer of spaghetti, and pour in tomatoes. Sprinkle with grated cheese, cover the dish and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees Fahrenheit for 35 minutes). Remove cover. Bake 10 minutes longer.

Menu: Roman Holiday, brown bread and butter, baked apples.

Scalloped Salmon and Peas

Put alternate layers of cracker or bread crumbs, salmon flaked with a fork, and canned peas in a baking dish. Pour over all, hot milk seasoned with butter, salt and pepper, to which mixture one beaten egg is added. Bake until brown and firmly set.

Menu: Scalloped Salmon and Peas

celery, biscuits, marmalade.

A perfect meal is nutritious because it includes regulating, body-building and energy-furnishing foods. Simple because long hours for preparation are needless. Palatable because it is not only good for you but good in itself. Appealing because it is attractively served. Inexpensive because quality foods were bought wisely.

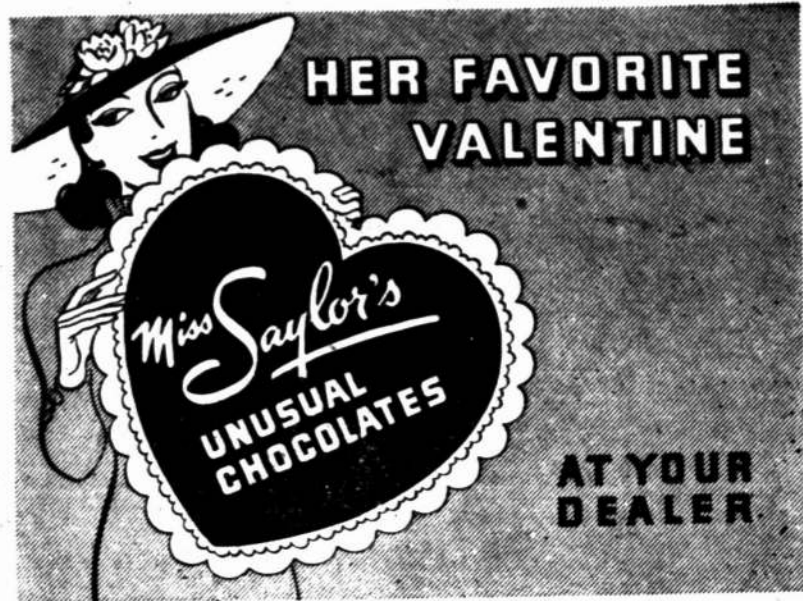

WORK OF PAVING HOUSTON STREET STARTED TUES.

The Houston Street paving project for which contract was awarded W. S. Thompson, on Tuesday, January 24 got underway Tuesday with the pouring of concrete for curb and gutter. The work started north of South First Street and will extend four blocks up Houston. Good progress was made and towards the weekend the first block of curb and gutter was virtually completed.

About fifteen local men are employed in this work that is being conducted through city funds and at expense of property owners who are paying for pavement which extends parallel with property lines. The intersections are financed by the city. S. C. Dougherty, Big Spring engineer, employed to see that plans and specifications are carried out, stated contract was awarded at approximately \$800 per block.

As curb, gutter and drainage is completed the paving will follow until each block is finished. Contract call for a hard base on the clay shale variety for the thoroughfare to be covered with a three-course crushed rock and asphalt topping. The roadbed on the first block was being prepared for paving Thursday with grading on the south half.

A movement has been instituted to open the south section for paving and civic leaders who have advocated this project express an optimistic air that it will go through in the near future. The Houston Street will soon be made one of the city's busiest streets with the new Federal building, that will house the Lamesa Postoffice and county agent's office, nearing completion, and is a big step toward civic development.

LAMESA SCHOOLS GROWING WITH NEW ENTRIES

One hundred thirty pupils have enrolled in the Lamesa Public schools since January 1, 1938. The elementary school enrollment has reached 1049. The high school enrollment has reached 533 making the total 1182 for the white schools of this community. The high school has been elevated to Conference A standing in school ratings of ensuing years and has been tentatively assigned to one of the largest football districts in Texas in point of area and in the competition to be met.

The space in the high school building which has been occupied for some time by primary pupils, five rooms, is now needed for the additional pupils in high school grades and it is reported that the present elementary school has no outlet for room space. Additional seating equipment has been required for each of the last several years. Eighty-five desks have been made necessary for this year alone, and the problem becomes one of the placement of the storage and book room in the high school building. Miss Ethel Barron's class of primary pupils is housed there until more suitable arrangements can be made.

The enrollment of pupils now in Lamesa high school is exceeded in the Conference A football district by only those of Pampa, Amarillo and Lubbock.

Eight new pupils were present Monday for enrollment in the elementary grades so the need for additional housing space increases rather than decreases.

Golden Tornadoes Go To Ralls Friday Night For Cager Play-Off

Lamesa high travels to Ralls for the first game of the district finals for the class B championship tonight (Friday). These two schools won in their respective sub-districts and will play a three game series for the district honors. The second game will be in Lamesa high gymnasium on Tuesday night, February 8. The Golden Tornadoes have won all games in the south half of the district while Ralls was strongly contested by Brownfield and Littlefield. The series of games will be interesting to those who follow the game.

The Lamesa Girls team won the tournament honors at Post last week and brought to the high school trophy case the large silver trophy awarded the winning school. The presentation was made at Monday's assembly by Maurine Johnson who represented the girls' team for the occasion.

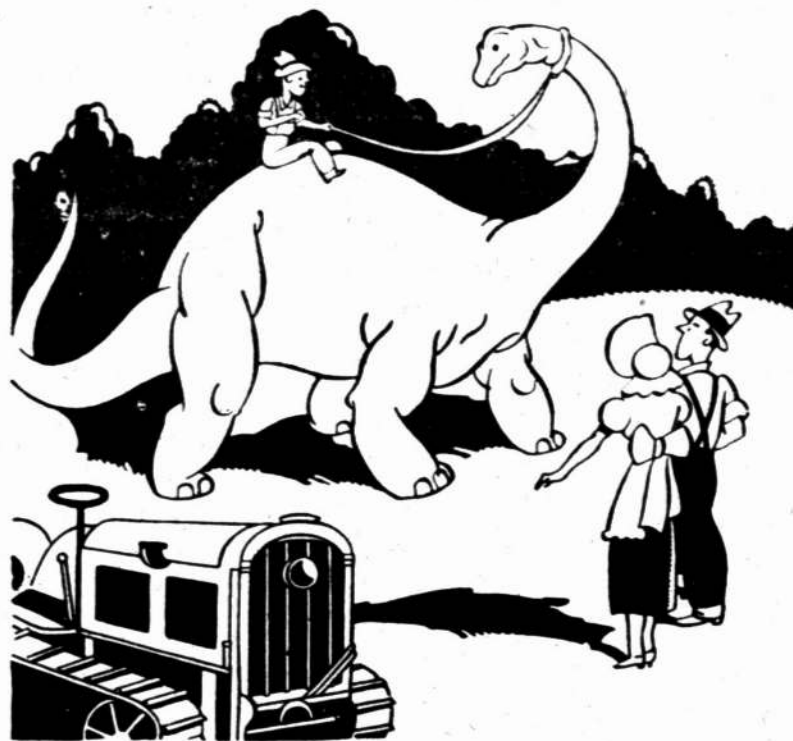

But he is getting chicks that will produce enough eggs to give him a fair margin of profit about their upkeep. Again, John gets by for the best bargain.

Influenza Epidemic Can Often Be Checked By Right Precaution

Austin, Tex. Feb. 1.—Influenza, while not of such prevalence as last year, is still occurring frequently enough to cause alarm, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

In its present form, its symptoms may range from a common cold to high fever, headache and prostration. However, pneumonia as a complication represents the real hazard. And, as is well known, pneumonia is an exceedingly dangerous foe. The remedy is bed on first appearance of a cold, and remaining there until advised by the physician that one can safely get out of it.

Everyone should realize that in its mildest form influenza can easily become a very serious matter. Of course prevention is better than cure. While influenza seems to be no respecter of persons, the careful observance of a few common sense rules will materially strengthen one's resistance to an attack. Some of these rules:

Insofar as possible, avoid intimate contact with members of the family who have colds or influenza. Keep the feet dry. Wash the hands thoroughly before meals. And if you do develop influenza, see your doctor at once.

**Farm Agent Williams
Advises This Area
On 1938 Setup**

In accordance with instructions from the AAA office the county agent is making out 1937 worksheets for the farms which were not included in the sign-up last year. The information contained on the worksheets will be used as a basis for payment of the 1937 cotton price adjustment and in connection with the quotas for the county under the 1938 program.

The state office has advised the local office that county goals cannot be established for the county until a worksheet has been executed covering all the cultivated land in the county land which produced a crop for the first time in 1937 is also included.

Every farm operator or owner should call at the agent's office as soon as possible and fill out a worksheet or if he has already done so, then he should record. Wherever possible the gin list his 1937 cotton production for tickets should be presented or a list of the bale weights from the gins delivered to the county office. If the operator will be prepared to give this information listed below he will materially reduce the time required to record his information.

Where the 1938 operator is different from the 1937 operator, the name and address of the latter owner and operator will be required.

On all farms which have not signed up since 1936 the acreage and yield for cotton for the years 1933, 1934, 1935 and 1937 must be given.

On farms signed up in 1934 and 1935 and which have not signed up since 1936, the acreage and yield for cotton for the years 1933, 1934, 1935 and 1937 must be given.

For farms in 1936 and not in 1937 it will be necessary to have 1933, 1934 and 1935 cotton acreage and yield.

For farms which have never signed in any of the programs it will be necessary to have the cotton acreage and yield for each of the years from 1928 through 1937.

The information requested for the various years is not in the county office and must be had from the operators and owners of the farms.

For farms on which wheat has been produced in any of the years, 1930 through 1937, inclusive, it will be necessary to have the acreage and yield for each of the years in which wheat was produced. Where a farm was placed in cultivation in 1937 and cotton was produced on it for the first time it will be necessary to have the cotton acreage and yield for 1937.

The State office has requested that the work of signing up all farms which are not already under worksheets as quickly as possible. It appears that information concerning the 1937 Dawson county cotton crop records will be needed much sooner than was anticipated when the plan for a crop survey was announced in the Courier January 20. The accuracy and completeness of the history submitted by the farmers of the county will have a direct bearing on the quotas or goals which will be set for this county in 1938.

Brought to Light . . .

With the current issue of Thursday, February 3 begins the first of a series of items that will appear regularly. The object will be strictly to build "good will" with Courier readers in Dawson County and Lamesa trade territory. Then too, we trust our readers will write in occasionally expressing their views on such matters in which we should all be interested—for the up-building of this lively trade center.

As a matter of introduction the writer hails from East Texas, like Editor and Publisher, Mr. Alexander, who a few years ago turned his attention to the Western Plains of Texas, came to Lamesa and dwelled among you, who have established a wide reputation for showing the true "Western Hospitality." It is our sincere plea to be accepted as one of you. In East Texas folks who venture into "this God's Own Country" are referred to as those who have gone to a young man's country, and truly few return.

To begin with the conductor was born in a small log cabin on the North and west section of Titus county, April 23, 1912. The log cabin, a comfortable home in a fertile farming section, was something my parents were neither ashamed or boasted. Likewise, I am neither proud or ashamed that I was born under the shelter of this cabin home. It was a comfortable dwelling in those days, established several miles west of their former homes in the old states of Georgia and Alabama.

(Bill) Huse, and possibly others whose names are less familiar.

It stands to reason there is foresight in moving to this section on the strength of the current report that Dawson County was the third ranking cotton county in Texas for "top" production and the Department of Commerce report furnished the Courier by R. S. Standfield, special agent for the Bureau of Census, substantiates this with his report of 106,324 bales ginned here prior to January 16 as compared with 46,297 bales for the crop of 1936. The question that pops up, however, is: Can we eat it?

From all indications, Lamesa is heading into a permanent "boom town." A brief survey throughout the town reveals an acute shortage of housing facilities. A factor in the shortage may be traced directly to the fact that geologic crews are "shooting" this county for showings of oil. The research work seems to be slated for the county in general and it would not be surprising if a little later newspapers in this section will herald this as another of the large West Texas oil producing counties. Oil is already being produced here and there is evidence that 1938 will see plenty of leasing activity.

That more bright and shiny new automobiles are traveling Lamesa streets and Dawson highways than ever is evident with Tax Assessor-Collector R. W. (Buster) Herndon's recent report on all vehicle registrations being 2,017 more of all types than in 1936.

FAMILY WORKS WITH BOTH COUNTY AGENTS TO IMPROVE WHOLE FARM AND HOMESTEAD

Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Duff of the Klondike community are cooperating with both the county agricultural and the county home demonstration agents to establish a whole farm demonstration. Mr. Duff and the boys will work with Joe C. Williams in terracing of the land and feeding of the live stock while Mrs. Duff and Marie and the boys and Mr. Duff will work with Miss Mattie Phenix in improving the house on the inside and the yard. Painting and papering of the house is already being done and the entire grounds around the house will be landscaped.

CLUB MEMBERS CARRY OUT AIM OF HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUBS

To raise the standard of living among the rural families through kitchen improvement, is one of the aims of the home demonstration clubs of Dawson county, and is being carried out by Mrs. R. S. Stanfield, president, and kitchen demonstrator in the Shumake club. Laying of new linoleum, building of a base cabinet, which will include repapering the walls and ceiling, are the improvements she plans to make. Since she already has a cabinet and two units of storage, the base cabinet which is to be built will provide plenty of working surface and storage for larger equipment. The kitchen is oblong and the working units will be parallel, thus saving many steps.

COMMISSIONER S. B. HODGE PLANS HOME BEAUTIFICATION

Mr. S. B. Hodge, commissioner of precinct No. 2, plans to beautify his home and at the same time provide protection from the sand and wind. One hundred feet from the house on the north, he will plant a windbreak consisting of three rows of elm trees. Since his house faces west, and the road is close, one row of trees will be transplanted across the road. A space of 87 feet on the south will be bordered with elm trees, evergreen and deciduous trees. Trees and shrubs will be grouped on the east, thus providing a frame for the house. The drive, which will be on the north, will be curved and planting of evergreen shrubs to obstruct the view of garage. The foundation planting for the house will be made chiefly of evergreen shrubs. The front area will be left open and all who pass by will share the beauty of this farm homestead.

GOOD NEIGHBOR PROGRAM IS BEING PRACTISED

The "Good Neighbor" program of the Texas Home Demonstration Association is being practiced as club members divide flower seed trees and cuttings. Mrs. Nolan Jayroe, member of the Welch home demonstration stated that she has transplanted 50 trees which she secured from her neighbors. These trees were seedling or had come up from the roots of trees. They were transplanted around her house to add beauty and for protection from the wind and sand.

"THE REST OF THE RECORD"

By James V. Allred

Testimony before the Senate investigating committee this week shows without dispute that Land Commissioner McDonald has issued hundreds of leases on submerged coast lands for which he refused big cash offers bearing the usual 1-16th royalty. Instead he accepted small cash offers, usually one dollar per acre, with an agreement for an overriding, or sliding royalty if and when oil is produced. In some instances the evidence shows Mr. McDonald has turned down over one thousand dollars per acre cash while accepting one dollar per acre with an overriding royalty.

With the exception of a few leases there was no obligation for immediate drilling; and, although some of these leases have been executed for more than a year, only one well has been commenced on state lands in all of the counties and on all of the thousands

acres leased. Not a drop of oil and not a penny of additional money has been received by the state from any of these leases, although the Land Commissioner has turned down more than a million dollars in cash for them. Now Mr. McDonald testified that, in his opinion, the overriding royalties retained by him for the state would ultimately make a hundred million dollars for Texas. Of course, he admits this is a gamble; but even if it should turn out to be true then what he gave to a little coterie of bidders for one dollar an acre will yield them somewhere from two hundred million dollars to a billion dollars.

In other words, before the Land Commissioner made these leases the state already had all that he retained and more! For this small circle of bidders a gamble with hardly any obligation on their part—a gamble from two to thirteen times as much as that of the state!

It is a gamble which cost these bidders a few hundred dollars out at cost to the state of over a million

dollars in cash which the state was forced by a bidder.

If the state were going to gamble on oil being under our land, I would prefer to gamble the whole thing and not have a few bidders for it for one dollar an acre.

Evidence before the Senate committee further shows that some of the men who were mixed up in the old highway contracts which were broken up by Dan Moody have moved back to Austin and are asking for favors in the land office.

The hearing may be moving along a bit slowly but the committee is making headway and the testimony is developing facts which should prove interesting to everyone.

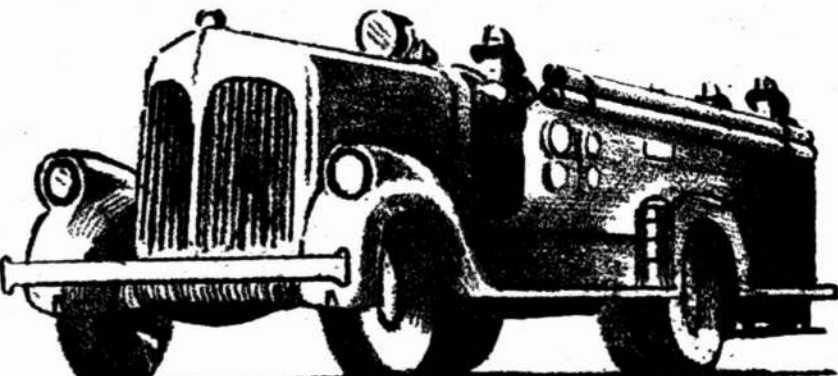

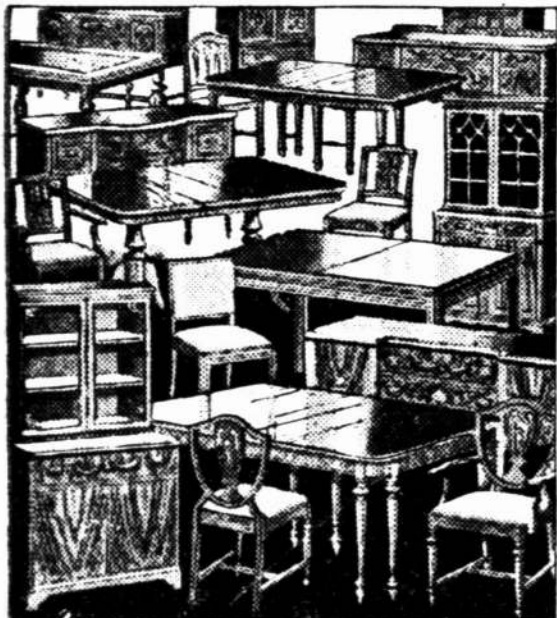

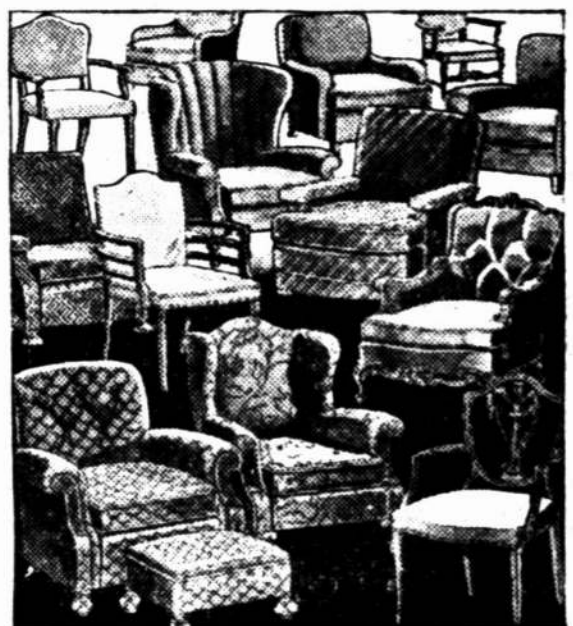
