46th Annual Event

Coleman Rodeo Opens July 13

The 46th Annual Coleman PRCA Rodeo will begin next Wednesday, July 13, for a four-night run. Performances will be at 8:30 each evening at the dust-free arena at Coleman.

Neal Gay's Mesquite Championship Rodeo Co. will furnish stock for the rodeo that includes bareback and saddle bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling, bull riding, girls' barrel race and kids goat scramble.

Some of the top professional cowboys and cowgirls in the nation will be competing in the events with \$4,500 added prize money.

Rosanne Rhone, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don Rhone of Coleman, is the 1983 Coleman Rodeo Queen. An accomplished

horswoman, Rosanne has recently won an American Quarterhorse Association championship besides winning many honors in the 4-H Horse Club Circuit. She is a senior student at Coleman High School.

Allan Bing of St. Joseph, Missouri will provide background music throughout the rodeo as well as entertaining the crowd for about 30 minutes prior to each performance.

Clowns for the 1983 production are Quail Dobbs and Frank McIlvain. Tom Hadley of Mason will be the announcer.

Other special events will be parades in downtown Coleman on Wednesday and Saturday, and rodeo dances following each performance at the pavilion at the rodeo grounds. Music will be furnished by Firecreek of Austin.

Thursday night will be "family night" with general admission one-half price.

Reserved seat tickets will go on sale in Coleman next week, and are also available at the gate each evening. The Coleman Rodeo is a major event in our area and attended by many local people.

listed, and on June 6 the measurement was 1.00 inch. Other rain was reported on June 15 and 27.

Rainfall for the first six months of the year totals 16.85 inches, with the June measurement the largest monthly total.

Coleman Youth Sentenced For January Murder Charge

Brett Lee Ragsdale, 15, of Coleman has been sentenced to serve twenty (20) years in the Texas Department of Corrections for the murder of a school friend, David Ray Harrel, on Sunday, January 30, at a Coleman school playground. Ragsdale was certified to stand trial as an adult for the First Degree Felony offense after appearing in the 35th Judicial District Court in Coleman June 28, sitting as Juvenile Court for a hearing on the certification. The young man waived an examining trial as well as Grand Jury indictment and entered a guilty plea to the offense of murder following the certification hearing.

The alleged offense involved the shooting death of David Ray Harrel, 15, of Coleman, the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Wooton of Santa Anna. Various witnesses testified before the Court, including Wayne Knowles, a Coleman police officer who investigated the death. In addition, the Court heard testimony from Betty Phelps, Juvenile Probation Officer and psychologists from the MH-MR Center in Abilene and others. Also included was a statement from an eyewitness of the alleged offense.

According to the report from District Court, the two young men had been at church together prior to the shooting. Officers found the body of Harrel lying in a playground area near an elementary school with his hands still in his pockets. He had been shot three times with a .45 caliber handgun. An eyewitness detained Ragsdale until officers arrived at the scene.

Ragsdale had previously been hospitalized at the Wichita Falls Hospital but was found to be competent to stand trial and was not, in the opinion of the experts, insane at the time of the offense.

21 grandchildren; 55 great-grandchildren; and 31 great-great-grandchildren.

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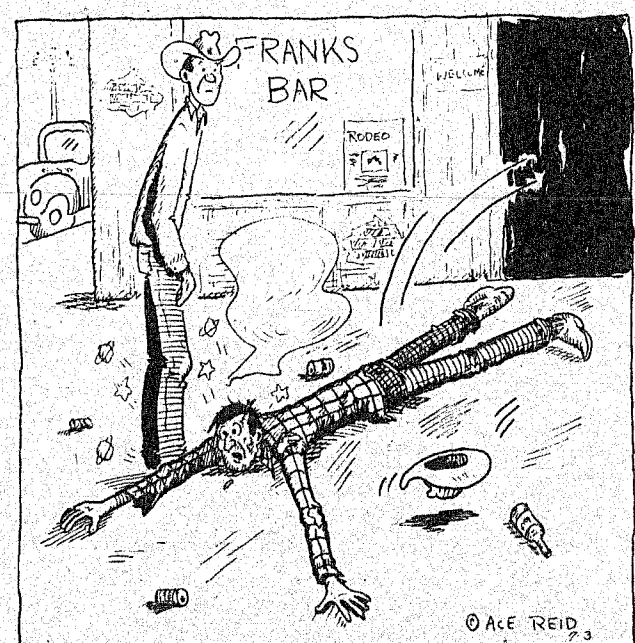

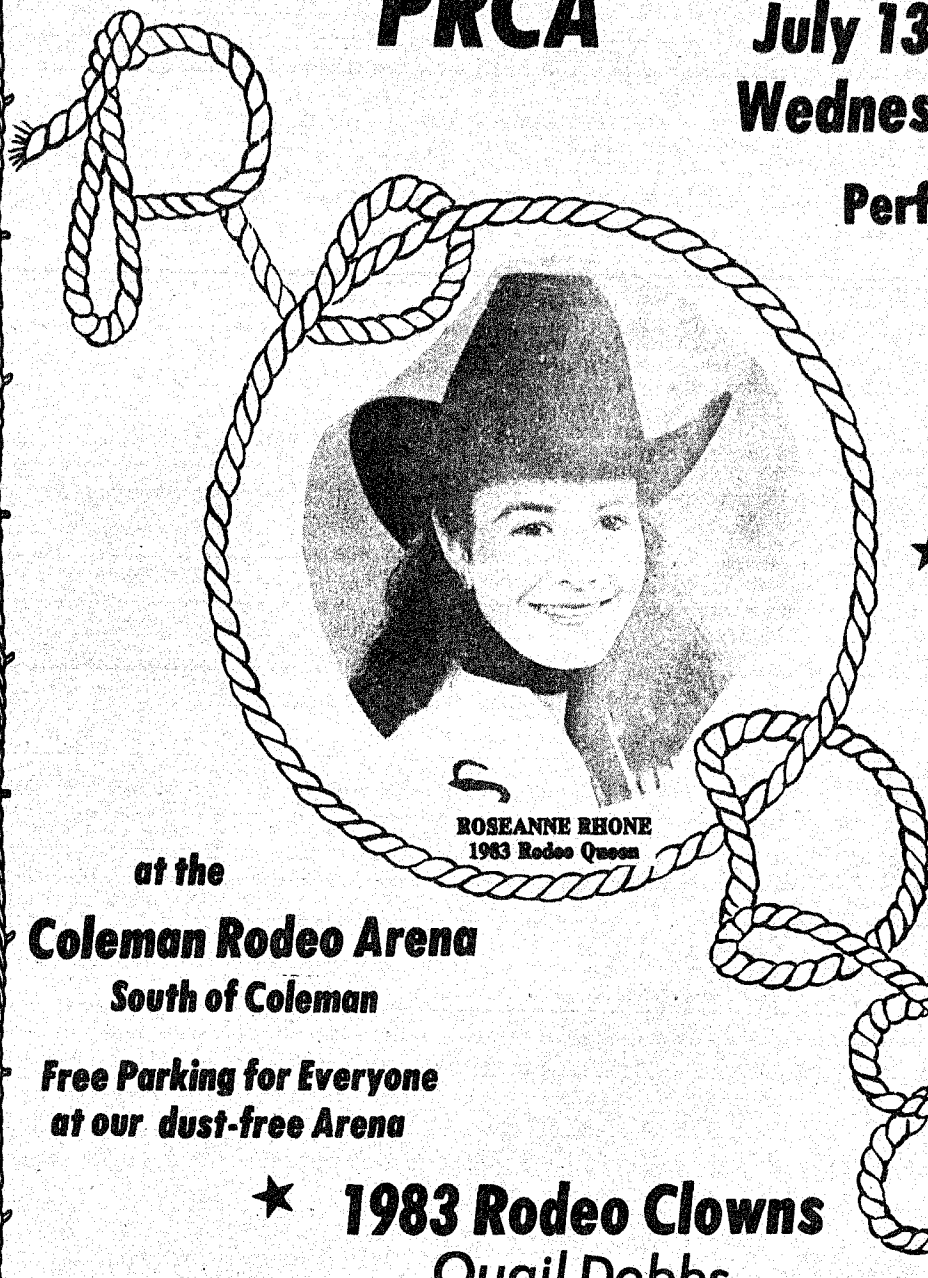

CAPITOL UPDATE

by Jim Parker



Being ever mindful that many reports have already been made concerning the Special Session just passed, I thought I would jump into a discussion of the future Special Session relating to the public school system.

At this point, any definite date is mere speculation; however, Gov. White has expressed hope that the Select Committee on Public Education can begin meeting soon and, after carefully studying all areas of the educational system, be ready with recommendations for the Legislature later this year. Since the issue of education, and every aspect thereof, is a critical need and one which has not been addressed in its entirety for over 34 years, I would like to take the months prior to a called session to become fully aware of the needs, problems and views of my district regarding the school system in Texas. I will begin my addressing the issues regarding teacher pay and time spent for teaching and preparation.

I understand a teacher pay increase is important and will be one of the major issues of discussion for the Committee; however, I would like to explore other ideas such as merit pay,

vacation time, time spent at school, etc., also.

I have heard complaints from opponents of a pay raise because they felt that since teachers worked only 10 months of the year, had six-month days and had long vacations during the year, such as Christmas, spring break, etc., the public was paying more through taxes but was getting less in the way of better education for their children. They cite lower overall achievement scores compared to other countries as proof of their position.

On the other hand, the proponents for a pay increase felt, the teaching profession was not able to attract future good teachers because the pay relative to other professions requiring a college degree was so much lower. The fact that there were only a handful of science and math teacher graduates in the entire state last year seems to back up this view.

Teachers, by State Board of Education policy, are required to teach a minimum of 175 days spent in in-service training. Other time is spent in parent-teacher conferences, PTA meetings, planning time, etc. They do not feel the general public is aware of the many additional hours require to plan lessons, grade papers or participate in school projects and some become downright hostile when it is suggested that they may be allowed to leave school at 4:00 p.m., many must stay later to prepare for the next day's work and most take work home with them. Also, teachers are not allowed an

hour for lunch and must sit with and supervise students even during the short time they have.

Everyone, I think, will agree that some teachers are better than others and should be paid more. This is the reason for the much-touted merit pay suggestions we have all heard about recently. But, again, there are strong feelings from both sides on this issue.

Opponents feel that it would be impossible to reward the better teachers fairly. They believe that any merit money would go to the teachers who spend more time with supervisors and principals rather than those who may actually be spending extra time in school projects, planning, etc. They feel the merit pay system could not work until certain criteria are set-up and, to their way of thinking, no such method has been developed.

Proponents of merit pay believe there is simply not enough money to pay all teachers a substantial increase and feel that those who are willing to spend more time, get advanced degrees and generally improve their teaching by showing an increase in achievement scores should receive additional pay over those who plod along doing the same thing year after year.

Having discussed the views of both proponents and opponents of increased teacher salaries, I would now like to know how my people feel about the ideas I have mentioned.

"Ageism" Serious Problem With Today's Elderly

The most serious problem facing elderly Americans today is "ageism", the prejudice society holds against older people, according to an article in the journal Texas Medicine.

"Think how often we remark on a 'cute' old woman or man and are amazed that they look, move, or get along as well as they do. Barring some debilitating illness, why should they not?"

quoting author Alex Comfort in defining ageism as "the nation that people cease to be people, cease to be the same people, or become people of a distinct and inferior kin, by virtue of having lived a specified number of years".

Like other prejudices, ageism is founded on ignorance and maintained by stereotype. Such stereotypes are self-perpetuating since they are held by many elderly people themselves. The big difference between ageism and other forms of prejudice is that we all hope that we will become old.

Ms. Gross encourages physicians to examine their own feelings about aging since their views may be a primary factor in the success or failure of the doctor-patient relationship....If we wish to help our patients achieve a good old age, we need to ensure that we do not unconsciously perpetuate the cruel practices of ageism.

Elderly people are less often affected by acute illness than are younger people. When it does occur, however, acute illness causes more days of inactivity in older people.

Still, less than one percent of people over 65 were limited in their ability to bathe, dress, feed themselves, or perform toilet functions.

Concerning a typical stereotype, she says, "senile" is a word which has been abused and overused and probably should be struck from the language. When an old man forgets his hat, he is called "senile". When a young man does the same

thing, he is called "forgetful".

Another stereotype is that once retired, older persons are finally able to enjoy life fully without the pressures of day-to-day living.

Ageism denies them the right to choose.

She cites isolation, loss of freedom decreased sense of personal worth, fear of the unknown, and specific biological and psychological changes as reasons for depression, anxiety and frustration in the elderly.

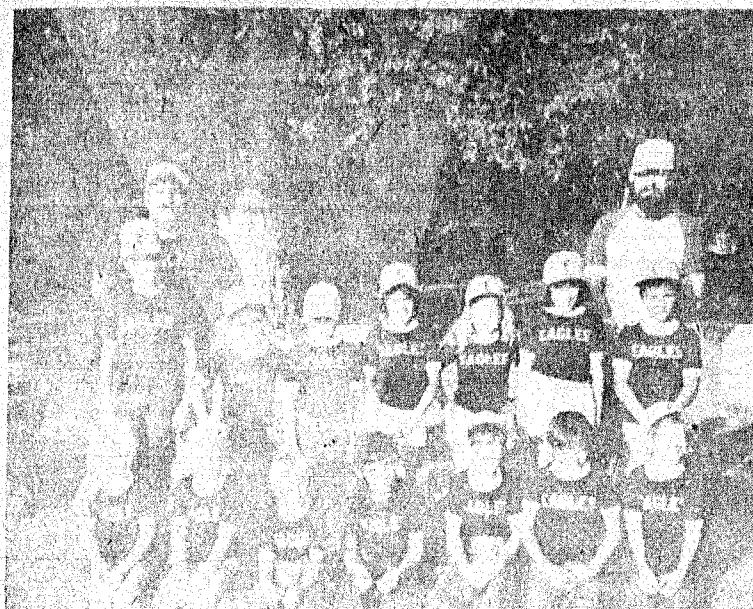
