## All-American Game June 25

More than footballs toted by All-Americans will be "up in the air" the weekend of the Coaches All-America Game in Lubbock. A postgame "All-America Air Show" at Town and Country Airport, Lubbock, has been set for 1 p. m. Sunday, June 25, the day after the game.

Aerobic thrills will be provided by Junior Burchinal, owner and operator of the Flying Tigers School and Air Museum in Paris, Texas. He is an accomplished aerobatic pilot and flying instructor. He has flown in several movies with his planes, including his B-25 in "Catch-22", a Grumman Duck in "Murphy's War", and the B-26 in "12 O'Clock High." Burchinal will perform the hammerhead stall, loop, Immelman, and other aerobatics.

Narration and color will be by Gary McMillan, Lubbock radio personality and flying expert.

Ticket stubs from the Coaches All-America Game will admit spectators free of charge. All profits from the regular admission of \$1. will go to All-America Game charities.

The postgame All-America Air Show was planned to encourage flying enthusiasts to wing their way to Lubbock for the big game, and stay over for the aerobatics at Town and Country Airport, 3 1/2 miles south of Loop 289 on South Quirt.

## Bennett Named Commissioner

Ed Bennett won the precinct one commissioner's post in a close race Saturday. The newly elected commissioner received 266 votes to 253 cast for his run-off opponent Dean Sanders.

Castro County voters also registered their choice of Sanders, Briscoe, Connally and Calvert in the State contests.

Barefoot Sanders polled 802 votes to Yarborough's 727 in the Senate race. Overwhelmingly approved in Castro County,

Dolph Briscoe compiled 1104 votes for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination with Frances "Sissy" Farenthold drawing 439.

Wayne Connally, loser in the lieutenant governor's race, drew 862 votes to Bill Hobby's 660. Comptroller incumbent Robert S. Calvert won 798 to 685 among Castro voters.

In the Republican balloting, Grover received nine votes with Fay taking eight.

## David Barham, Dirk Rambo Are Attending Boys State

David Barham and Dirk Rambo are in Austin this week attending the thirty-second annual American Legion Boys State. Sponsored by the Department of Texas and held on the campus of the University of Texas, Boys State got under way with 840 high school boys from across Texas and one from Mexico registering.

Following registration, each citizen was assigned to one of two political parties - the Nationalist or Federalist. Each citizen then functions as a member of his party, he attends its precinct, county and state conventions and votes in its primary.

Boys State helps to develop civic leadership and pride in American citizenship. This program arouses a keen interest in the detailed study of our government. These civic workshops stress the importance of maintaining our form of government and bring better understanding of our national traditions and beliefs to the more than 28,000 young men who are participating this year.

In Boys State, The American Legion provides the type of program where the young citizen has the opportunity to learn for himself that his government is just what he makes it. The boy "learns to do by doing." The program takes an added

significance this year as the vote is extended to 18 year olds. Most Boys Staters are in the 16 to 17 age category.

Highlight of Boys State will be a trip to the Capitol Tuesday morning where each elected Boys State Official will be given an opportunity to serve in his respective office for a day.

Boys State enrollment this year brings the total to 16,619 junior high school boys who have attended since 1940, when Boys State was first inaugurated in Texas.

Mrs. Baldrige is a 1969 graduate of Hart High School.

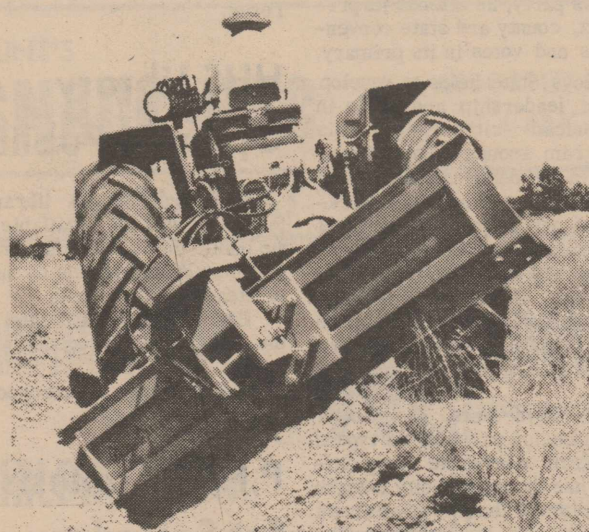

### CHERRY COKE SALAD

2 boxes cherry Jello

1 large can bing cherries pitted  
2 - 6 oz. Cokes  
1 med. can crushed pineapple  
1 c. chopped nuts.

Boil cherry and pineapple juices with enough water to make 2 cups. Pour over Jello and stir until dissolved. Add Cokes. When Jello begins to thicken add pineapple, cherries and nuts. Pour in flat pan to set. Cut into squares and serve on lettuce leaf.

### CRACKER PIE

3 egg whites  
1 c. sugar  
18 saltine crackers (crushed)  
1 tsp. baking power  
1 c. nuts

Beat 3 egg whites until stiff. Gradually add 1 cup sugar and 1 tsp. flour. Fold all together and put in greased pie pan. Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

### BANANA PUDDING

6 egg yolks  
3/4 c. sugar  
2 T. flour  
2 1/2 c. milk  
1 tsp. vanilla  
dash of salt

Beat yolks. Combine flour and sugar, sift 1/2 in yolks. Mix well, add milk and cook in double boiler until thick as desired. Cool and add vanilla and dash of salt.

### CHOCOLATE CREAM DESSERT CAKE

2 c. sifted cake flour  
3/4 tsp. soda  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1/2 c. butter or shortening  
1 1/4 c. sugar

1 egg and 2 egg whites, unbeaten  
2 sq. Baker's unsweetened chocolate, melted  
1 c. milk  
1 tsp. vanilla

Sift flour once, measure, add soda and salt, and sift together three times. Cream butter, add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg and egg whites, one at a time, beating thorough-

ly after each. Add chocolate and blend. Add flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add vanilla. Bake in two greased 9-inch layer pans in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 30 minutes, or until done. Split each layer in half to make four tiers. Spread Chocolate Whipped Cream between layers in and on top of cake, arranging a cut surface of cake against a baked surface to avoid slipping of layers. Chill in refrigerator about 2 hours before serving.

### CHOCOLATE WHIPPED CREAM

Combine 1 sq. Baker's unsweetened chocolate, 3/4 c. sugar, dash of salt, and 3 tsp. water. Bring to a boil and boil gently 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Add gradually to 2 well-beaten egg yolks beating until well blended. Cool. Whip 1 1/2 cups heavy cream with 1 tsp. vanilla; fold in cooled chocolate mixture. Chill in refrigerator about 1/2 hour, or until thick enough to spread. (All measurements are level).

## Proposed Wage Causes Concern

Grain sorghum farmers are concerned over increased labor costs that will be forthcoming if a proposed bill passed recently by the Senate Labor Committee becomes law. The bill would raise current \$1.60 minimum wages per hour to \$2.00 in 60 days, and \$2.20 in one year.

Elbert Harp, Executive Di-

rector, Grain Sorghum Producers Association, expressed this concern in a letter sent to each U. S. Senator this week. Harp stated in his letters that, "This

proposed legislation would accelerate the bankruptcies of farmers by a staggering number. Unless action is taken at the same time to guarantee an

increase in prices for farm products, farmers will be forced out of business."

Cost of labor is a significant part of the total cost of production of grain sorghum. The proposed wage hike, if passed by Congress, would increase grain sorghum production costs considerably.

## Irene Keating Writes

Castro Co. H.D. Agent

Our 4-H tri-county Dress Revue training will be held Wednesday, June 14, at 2 p. m. in the Friona High School auditorium. This session will prepare our girls for the county dress revue to be held July 6 in Hart.

We have 70 girls enrolled in clothing projects this summer. I appreciate the leaders who are working with the girls. Some leaders who are busy with clothing now are Evelyn Hill, Sara Hart, Sue Smith, Beverly Cole, Della Hutchins, Marilyn Smith, Nell Ingram, Sandra Bagwell and Pat Bagley.

Others who are leaders are Sue Tischler, Pat Higgins, Patricia Powell, Geneva Dobbs, Mona Acker and Catherine Hochstein. There may be others I don't know about.

I certainly do appreciate these volunteer leaders. If any of you women are interested in helping with this or any other 4-H projects please let me know.

It is again time for our garden calendar.

1. Watch for symptoms of powdery mildew on crepemyrtle roses, evergreen euonymus, and other susceptible plants. Control with Karthane, folpet, wettable sulfur or Parnon.

2. Provide supplemental irrigation for your choice plants. The hot, dry windy, summer weather can be damaging to many plants unless extra moisture is provided. Light summer showers can be misleading in the amount of moisture they supply. It is usually much less than it appears.

3. Do not allow mum plants to become tall and leggy. Pinch out the tip of each stem as soon as 3 or 4 sets of new leaves appear.

4. Bearded iris need fertilizer after blooming. Use about three pounds of a 12-12-12 fertilizer per 100 square feet of bed areas.

5. Check plants closely for spider mites. A hand lens is helpful in checking for the troublesome pest. When used as directed on the label, these trouble makers can be controlled with one of the following: Kelthane, diazinon or cygon.

6. If you want attractive roses this fall don't let up on blackspot controls just because the weather is dry and hot.

7. Check those hanging baskets and container plants as they need more frequent watering during the summer period. Increased water also means additional fertilizing is needed. Apply fertilizer only to moist soil.

8. If your petunias are getting tall and unattractive, cut the plants back to 5 or 6 inches, water and fertilize and wait for a new crop of flowers which will usually appear within a few weeks.

9. This is a good time to make cuttings of your favorite plants, using mature wood of the current seasons growth. Four or five inches of a damp peat and perlite mixture in a plastic bag is excellent for rooting a few cuttings. Tie the top shut and place in a north window out of direct sun light until rooted.

10. There is still time to plant seeds of zinnia and portulaca for summer color.

11. Still not too late to thing the fruit on your fruit trees.

12. Set lawn mower about 1/2 inch higher to provide more shade for roots and solons during hot weather.

13. Make plans for proper yard care while you are on vacation.

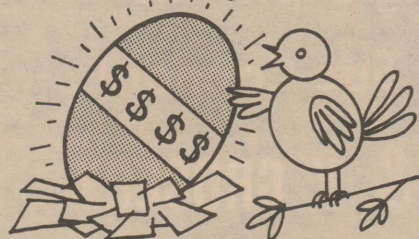

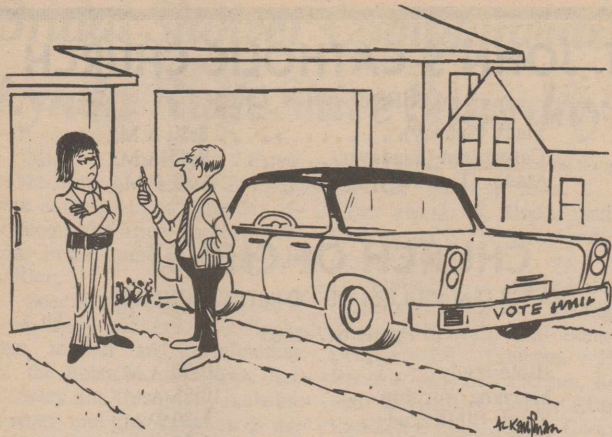
